1950



### #42 - DAVE HOPPEN (1983-86)

Nebraska's all-time leading scorer, Hoppen had his No. 42 jersey retired at the end of Senior Night on Feb. 26, 1986. Hoppen totaled 2,167 points before a knee surgery cut short his senior year Hoppen broke or tied 19 school records as a Husker. A third-round draft pick in 1986, he spent six seasons in the NBA. Hoppen was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1996 and Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2017.

### #22 - STU LANTZ (1966-68)

Stu Lantz became the second Husker basketball player to have his jersey retired when he was honored on Oct. 17, 1989. A two-time first-team All-Big Eight performer, Lantz totaled 1,269 points and 571 rebounds in his three-year Husker career. He went on to play eight years in the NBA with four teams (San Diego/Houston Rockets, Detroit Pistons, New Orleans Jazz, Los Angeles Lakers). Lantz was a charter member of the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1989.

### #52 - ERIC PIATKOWSKI (1991-94)

Eric Piatkowski became the third Husker to have his jersey retired, as he was honored on Feb. 18, 2006. Piatkowski was a two-time All-Big Eight selection as he totaled 1,934 points in helping NU to four straight NCAA Tournaments during his collegiate career. A first-round draft pick in 1994, he spent 14 seasons in the NBA with the Los Angeles Clippers, Houston Rockets, Chicago Bulls and Phoenix Suns. Piatkowski, who was also inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 2006, highlighted the inaugural class of the Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2015.

### #10 - TYRONN LUE (1996-98)


Tyronn Lue became the fourth Husker to have his jersey retired when he was honored on Feb. 2, 2017. Lue, who ranks in the top 10 in 13 categories during his three-year Husker career, earned All-Big 12 honors in 1998 helping Nebraska to the NCAA Tournament. A first-round draft pick in 1998, he spent 11 seasons in the NBA, including a pair of titles with the Los Angeles Lakers. A 2013 Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame inductee, Lue coached the Cleveland Cavaliers to an NBA title in 2016 and three NBA Finals appearances. He was named head coach of the Los Angeles Clippers in October of 2020.

### NEBRASKA'S ACADEMIC RESOURCES ACADEMIC COUNSELING

Eight academic counselors, three learning specialists, two assistant academic counselors and one computer specialist are in place to monitor daily academic progress, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/registration process and monitor eligibility and progress toward graduation.

### **TUTORIAL SUPPORT**

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, unlimited tutorial support from approximately 75-100 tutors on staff is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. The tutorial program is certified as a model tutoring program by the College Reading and Learning Association.

### **STUDY HALL**

Nebraska's study hall program is housed in the Scott Technology Center within the Student Life Complex. Student-athletes attend a supervised, flex-time study hall that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student-athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week as determined by their academic counselor and/or coach. Additional performance-based or tutor-based study hall also may be determined by the academic counselor.

### **MENTORING**

Academic support staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes and select returning student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information and discuss academic success strategies.

### **EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS**

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor, or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a consulting neuropsychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

### STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators, and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

### PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.


### **COMPUTER RESOURCES**



### LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM

The Life Skills staff provides proactive education to all incoming and returning student-athletes designed to promote responsible decision-making, enhance one's personal brand and preparing student-athletes for life after sports. Interactive presentations are delivered during summer bridge sessions, orientations and year-by-year tiered development workshops.

### **INDIVIDUAL MEETINGS**

Every Nebraska student-athlete is assigned a Life Skills staff member who will assist with personal and career development. The meetings help each student-athlete identify a career focus and implement a plan to increase career marketability.

### **CAREER COMMITMENT & NETWORKING**

Nebraska Life Skills organizes an annual Student-Athlete Career Fair Networking Night and other career events aimed at connecting Huskers with companies desiring competitive, hard-working, accountable candidates. Athlete Network and UNL's Handshake Link provide opportunities to explore career opportunities across the country.

### **COMMUNITY OUTREACH**

Nebraska student-athletes readily accept the role-model challenge, collectively giving more than 8,000 hours annually to impact thousands across the state of Nebraska. Outreach events include but are not limited to hospital visits, mentoring, school assemblies, statewide rallies, Make-A-Wish, School is Cool and Husker Heroes. During the 2019-20 academic year, 299 Husker student-athletes completed at least six service projects earning spot on the coveted Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

### **LEADERSHIP**

Nebraska Life Skills provides student-athletes with countless opportunities to enhance leadership skills while distinguishing themselves from the competition. Student-athletes can be members of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, Nebraska Football Road Race, Inner Circle, N-Vest or N-VOLVED. UNL offers more than 600 recognized student organizations allowing athletes to collaborate with other campus leaders for common goals. Nebraska Life Skills has funded and coordinated an annual service abroad trip that allows 20 student-athletes to work together toward a common goal while enriching cultural competencies.

### **RECOGNITION**


In 2019-20, Husker basketball players Akol Arop, Charlie Easley and Derrick Walker were named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship team for completing a minimum of six service projects in the calendar year. A host of other recognition opportunities at the institutional, Big Ten and NCAA levels that all reflect the high ideals, character and servant leadership nurtured through community involvement also are available.

### **POST-ELIGIBILITY OPPORTUNITIES**

Since 2015, every student-athlete who letters and graduates will have a three-year window to benefit from one of three post-eligibility opportunities each valued at \$7,500. Upon completion of required seminars, graduates can either study abroad, complete an internship or begin graduate school within the University of Nebraska-Lincoln or the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

### **DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION**

The Life Skills program also is responsible for all Diversity and Inclusion initiatives for Husker Athletics. Since 2016, the Diversity and Inclusion Summit has reached all student-athletes and staff with programming emphasizing respect, acceptance and unity. Numerous other special events are coordinated in collaboration with campus departments highlighting the diversity within Husker Nation. N-Vest is a new mentoring program aimed at fostering successful transitions while connecting participating athletes with campus or community mentors to aid in personal and career development.

#### SEASON OUTLOOK



For Nebraska Head Coach Fred Hoiberg, the first season was always going to be a challenge.

While the 2019-20 Huskers brought back the fewest experience by a Big Ten team in over a decade, it was probably the worst year to attempt a rebuilding project in the Big Ten Conference. With potentially 11 teams heading to postseason play when the season ended in mid-March, the wins were tough to come by, but there were early signs of growth.

Hoiberg used his first season to implement an up-tempo system that radically changed Nebraska's philosophy. The Huskers went from 238th nationally to 16th in tempo, playing at a pace which topped the Big Ten. To put the increase into perspective, the 2019-20 Huskers were the only Big Ten squad to be in the top-25

nationally in tempo in the KenPom era (since 2002).

Nebraska's 7.90 3-pointers per game were the program's highest since the 2001-02 campaign, while the Huskers also finished in the top three in both 3-pointers per game (third) and turnover margin (second) in conference play. Those were key traits which helped lowa State lead the Big 12 in scoring offense in each of Hoiberg's final three seasons (2013-15).

"We were able to establish what we feel can have long-term success with our overall pace," Hoiberg said. "We were 16th nationally in pace and third among Power Five schools. We feel good about where we got our shots, but we need to finish better (around the rim), and we need to knock down shots when they present themselves."

The Huskers' short-handed roster situation a year ago also made it challenging on the defensive end. Last season, NU had just two post players taller than 6-6, and that forced the Huskers to play an undersized lineup most of the time. The Huskers finished last in the league in rebounding and scoring defense, and that was an area Hoiberg and the Huskers coaching staff worked hard to address in the offseason.

"The first thing that stands out is we need to be much better defensively, and we need to be a much better rebounding team if we're going to have a chance to be a consistent winner," Hoiberg said.

To that end, the Huskers retooled their roster with size and experience for the coming year. Not only did NU add seven scholarship players, including six who are 6-foot-6 or taller, but Nebraska also gained the services of a trio of sit-out transfers in Dalano Banton (6-9), Derrick Walker (6-8) and Shamiel Stevenson (6-6). Seven of the nine eligible newcomers have Division I experience, combining for 334 games played, including 174 career starts and have played in the ACC, SEC and Big 12 Conferences.

When you add the three transfers to a roster which features returning starters Thorir Thorbjarnarson and Yvan Ouedraogo, along with sophomore Akol Arop, there is a group of players who all have a year of experience in the system.

"I feel really good knowing that we had three players who were sitting out last year having the opportunity to play in the system to build chemistry, similar to what we did when we took over at lowa State when we had four very high level transfers sitting out," Hoiberg said. "We feel good about the players we brought in, and I think we are longer and more athletic than last year. We have the ability to be flexible and can play either big or small with our lineups."

While the Big Ten enters the 2020-21 season as the deepest conference in the country, Hoiberg understands what the Huskers need to do to make the next step.

"The thing I want to see from this group is consistency and improvement," Hoiberg said. "Last year, we took care

of the basketball and played with pace, but didn't finish well enough and were not consistent on the defensive end. Hopefully, if we can improve in those areas and continue to play the right way, we have a chance to make a big jump."

#### **BACKCOURT**

The Husker backcourt could make significant improvements this season behind a trio of transfers. Kobe Webster (Western Illinois), Trey McGowens (Pitt) and Banton (Western Kentucky) combine for 161 career starts at the Division I level and are all eligible this season. Freshman Elijah Wood brings an intriguing mix of size, versatility and potential to the backcourt.

Banton brings a unique skill set to the Husker backcourt and has a year of experience in the Husker system. A 6-foot-9, 205-pound guard, he impressed the Husker coaches with his playmaking ability during his sit-out season after transferring from Western Kentucky. A former top-100 recruit, Banton played in 31 games as a freshman in 2018-19, averaging 3.4 points, 3.0 rebounds and 2.1 assists per game. He made 12 starts and showed his versatility in a win over No. 15 Wisconsin when he nearly had a triple double with 13 rebounds, 10 assists and eight points. He also had 11 points and six assists against St. Mary's, one of three double-figure efforts on the season.

Webster's addition provides leadership and shotmaking ability, as he was a three-year starter for Western Illinois before joining the Huskers as a grad transfer. A two-time All-Summit League pick, he totaled over 1,400 points and dished out 300 assists while starting all 85 games he appeared in for the Leathernecks. Last season, Webster averaged 17.1 points, 3.6 assists and 3.2 rebounds per game, ranking among the conference leaders in scoring (sixth), assists (fifth) and assist-to-turnover ratio (1.72-to-1, fourth). He totaled six 20-point games in 2019-20, highlighted by a school-record 40-point outburst against Omaha. Webster is also a career 37 percent shooter from 3-point range, giving NU another long-range offensive threat.

Nebraska's backcourt got a major boost in early October, as McGowens was ruled eligible for the upcoming season. A 6-foot-4, 190-pound guard, he is one of the best athletes on the Husker roster and has the potential to be an elite defender. A former top-100 recruit out of high school, McGowens started 64 games at Pittsburgh over the two seasons. Last year, he started 32 games for the Panthers and averaged 11.5 points, 3.6 assists, 3.3 rebounds and 1.9 steals per game. McGowens ranked in the top 10 of the ACC in both steals (fourth) and assists (10th) while posting 20 double-figure efforts. He was a two-time ACC Freshman of the Week in 2018-19, highlighted by a career-high 33-point performance against Louisville.

Wood was a late addition to the Husker roster, signing in late June after reclassifying from the class of 2021. At 6-foot-5, Wood has good length and size for a guard and has shown the ability to play on or off the ball. He was ranked among the top-150 seniors by several recruiting services heading into the summer of 2019, but did not play AAU ball that summer. Wood spent his senior year at Berkmar (Ga.) High School, helping the school to a Class AAAAAAA quarterfinals appearance in 2020. He averaged 10 points, 2.0 assists and 1.5 steals per game in his only season at the school.

Jace Piatkowski, the son of former Husker legend

and NBA standout Eric Piatkowski, is in his second year in the program after redshirting in 2019-20. A walk-on, Jace averaged 18.6 points and 3.3 rebounds per game at Elkhorn South High School as a senior in 2018-19, including a team-high 46 3-pointers.

Chris McGraw walked on to the Husker program after spending last season at Otterbein College in Ohio. McGraw, a 6-0, 170-pound guard, began his collegiate career at Ohio University, playing in four games for the Bobcats. He also played at Hargrave Military Academy in 2017-18 where he teamed with McGowens and helped the school to a 33-4 record. He will help run the scout team in practice this season.

#### WINGS


The Huskers will rely on a mix of veterans and newcomers on the wing in 2020-21. Thorbjarnarson started 24 games a year ago and is the Huskers' top returning scorer at 8.8 points per game. NU also returns Arop, who played in 21 games as a freshman last year, and Stevenson, who sat out after transferring into the program. NU also adds a pair of proven scorers in junior college transfer Teddy Allen and senior transfer Trevor Lakes

Thorbjarnarson is the veteran of the 2020-21 roster, as he begins his fourth year in the Husker program. He started NU's last 24 contests in 2019-20, averaging

8.8 points and 4.8 rebounds per game. The 6-foot-6 senior was second on the team in rebounding while shooting a team-best 37 percent from 3-point range. Thorbjarnarson was one of the Big Ten's most improved players, as he raised his conference scoring average by more than nine points per game from his sophomore campaign, while also finishing in the top three on the team in conference action in field goal percentage (first), rebounding (second) and assists (third).

Arop gained valuable experience during the final portion of his freshman campaign. While he averaged just 1.0 points and 1.3 rebounds per game in 2019-20, Arop saw most of his action down the stretch, playing at least 20 minutes in each of the Huskers' final three games. He set personal bests in minutes (23) and blocked shots (two) in the Big Ten Tournament against Indiana, while the 6-foot-5 forward snared a season-high six rebounds in 20 minutes of work at No. 25 Michigan. Arop is one of the Huskers' top defenders and has worked hard to expand his shooting after playing the post extensively in high school.


Stevenson, who sat out last season, possesses the physicality to match up with the bigger wings in the Big Ten. Stevenson, a 6-foot-6, 245-pounder from Toronto, began his collegiate career at Pittsburgh in 2017-18, as he played in 32 games, including 13 starts as a true freshman. He averaged 8.5 points on a team-high 50.5

percent shooting and was second on the Panthers with 4.4 rebounds per game. Stevenson, who reached double figures 13 times, showed good touch, hitting nearly 38 percent from long range. Stevenson, who has not played a collegiate game since leaving Pittsburgh in November of 2018, is not afraid to step out to the 3-point line and can play inside if NU goes with a smaller lineup.

Allen is a prolific offensive scorer and was ranked as one of the nation's top junior college recruits in 2020. The 6-foot-6, 222-pound guard led all junior college players in scoring at 31.4 points per game at Western Nebraska Community College last season which was the highest average by a junior college player in six years. Allen, who also averaged 7.4 rebounds and 3.7 assists per game, ranked in the top 10 nationally in field goals (286, first), free throws made (229, third) and attempted (260, third) and free throw percentage (88.1, eighth). Allen posted 17 games with at least 30 points, including a quartet of 40-point outbursts. He began his collegiate career at West Virginia, averaging 7.0 ppg off the bench in helping the Mountaineers to a berth in the 2018 NCAA Sweet 16.

Lakes rounds out the Huskers' rotation, as he will sit out this season after transferring from the University of Indianapolis. Lakes, a 6-foot-7, 215-pound forward, is one of the top shooters in all of college basketball and enters the 2020-21 season among the top 20 among all NCAA basketball players with 235 career 3-pointers, while shooting 41 percent from beyond the arc in his career. Last season, he averaged 15.7 points and 6.2 rebounds per game last season, while averaging a conference-best 3.5 3-pointers per game to help Indianapolis to a 24-6 record and top seed in the 2020 NCAA Division II Regional Tournament. Lakes will use the season to adjust to the rigors of Division I and will

have one year of eligibility remaining with the 2021-22 campaign.

#### FRONTCOURT

NU relied on a pair of freshmen to handle the majority of the minutes in 2019-20, and will have more size and depth this season. Ouedraogo returns after making 30 starts last year. The Huskers add some size and experience, as Walker becomes eligible after transferring from Tennessee, and the Huskers signed junior college transfer Lat Mayen in the spring. In addition, freshman Eduardo Andre has the length and ability to be a contributor early in his college career.

Ouedraogo was thrust into a starting role as a true freshman and performed admirably, averaging 5.7 points and a team-high 6.3 rebounds per game despite being the youngest player in the Big Ten and not turning 18 until after the season ended. The 6-foot-9 forward tied NU's school record for double-doubles by a freshman (three), while also shattering the class mark for rebounds in a season (203). He played some of his best basketball down the stretch, averaging 6.8 points and 7.6 rebounds per game over the Huskers' last nine contests. His initial Husker campaign was highlighted by a 19-rebound effort against Northwestern – the most caroms by a Husker since 2007. Ouedraogo has worked hard to reshape his body during the offseason, losing nearly 20 pounds while adding strength and explosiveness.

Walker brings much-needed experience to the Husker frontcourt after sitting out last season. Walker, a 6-foot-8, 235-pound forward from Kansas City, spent two seasons at Tennessee, helping the Vols to an SEC title in 2018 and a Sweet 16 appearance in 2019. He played in 30 games off the bench in 2018-19, averaging 0.8 points and 1.1 rebounds per game as a sophomore, while

shooting 53 percent from the field. As a freshman, he was an integral part of the Tennessee rotation, shooting nearly 60 percent from the floor, including 68 percent in SEC play.

Mayen will provide an inside-out threat for the Husker frontcourt. After battling injuries during his two seasons at TCU, Mayen put together a strong season at Chipola (Fla.) College in 2019-20. He earned first-team all-conference honors, as the 6-foot-9 forward averaged 11.8 points and 8.4 rebounds per game. Mayen, who was ranked among the top 20 JUCOs in the 2020 recruiting class, shot nearly 40 percent from 3-point range and over 80 percent from the foul line.

Andre provides an intriguing option and length for the Husker front line. At 6-foot-10, 225 pounds, he possesses a 7-foot-4 wingspan that will aid a Husker defense which was last in the Big Ten in blocked shots last year. A three-star recruit by both Rivals and 247Sports, he averaged 10.3 points, 9.8 rebounds and 3.9 blocked shots per game at AZ Compass Prep. He was a late bloomer to the sport, having played competitively for just four years before coming to Nebraska.

Redshirt freshman Bret Porter adds depth to the Husker frontcourt. The walk-on was on the scout team last year after starting three seasons at Millard North High School. Porter overcame a torn ACL in the summer of 2018 to return to action in time for his senior year. As a junior, he averaged 13.5 points and 7.5 rebounds per game.



#### HUSKER BASKETBALL NOTEBOOK

Nebraska Coach Fred Hoiberg is looking to orchestrate a turnaround similiar to his second season at Iowa State. That Cyclone team was similar to the 2020-21 Huskers, as they featured several sit-out transfers from the previous year, and added them to a pair returning starters. The Huskers have two starters back, as well as three sit-out transfers from a year ago.

Nebraska adds an influx of veterans in 2020-21, gaining the services of seven scholarship players with previous Division I experience. The group has combined for nearly 3,000 points along with over 1,000 rebounds and 600 steals during their careers and includes multi-year starters Kobe Webster (Western Illinois) and Trey McGowens (Pittsburgh). The Huskers also gain the services of three players (Dalano Banton, Shamiel Stevenson and Derrick Walker) who had to sit out the 2019-20 campaign after transferring to Nebraska.

When Nebraska coach Fred Hoiberg talks about playing with pace, he means it. His first Nebraska team led the Big Ten and was the only conference program in the top 50 nationally in tempo in 2019-20. It was the highest finish of any Big Ten program in the KenPom database since the site began tracking in 2001-02. In six seasons as a college head coach, his teams have ranked in the top 50 in tempo five times - that matches the entire number of times that Big Ten programs have done it since 2001-02.

- Nebraska signed a pair of top-20 junior college prospects for the second straight season. Junior guard Teddy Allen was rated eighth by JUCORecruiting.com, while forward Lat Mayen was tabbed 18th nationally by the publication. The Huskers were one of three programs nationally to sign a pair of top-20 JUCO recruits (St. John's and Southern Miss).
- Nebraska returns its entire coaching staff intact from 2019-20, including assistant coaches Matt Abdelmassih, Armon Gates, Doc Sadler and special assistant Bobby Lutz. Three of the staff members had worked with Hoiberg as assistant coaches during his tenure at Iowa State. Abdelmassih also worked under Hoiberg in the front office with the Minnesota Timberwolves, while Lutz was an assistant coach with the Windy City Bulls in the G League while Hoiberg coached the Chicago Bulls.

▶ Since moving into Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2013, the Huskers have ranked in the top 15 nationalluy in attendance in each of the past seven years. In 2019-20, the Huskers ranked 11th nationally in attendance with an average of 16,605 fans per game, breaking a school record which was originally set in the 2014-15 season.

Nebraska is one of nine schools in the country to average 15,000+ fans per contest every year since 2013-14. The others include Kentucky, Syracuse, Louisville, North Carolina, Wisconsin, Indiana, Kansas and Creighton.

In all, the Big Ten has led NCAA Basketball in attendance for 44 straight years, dating back to the 1976-77 season. Big Ten schools totaled nearly three million fans in 2019-20, while 10 Big Ten programs ranked in the top 30 nationally in attendance. The Big Ten was one of just three conferences (ACC and SEC) to draw at least two million fans last season.

#### 2020-21 OUTLOOK

Thorir Thorbjarnarson (pronounced Thor-EAR thorb-YAR-nar-son) enters his senior campaign as one of NU's unquestioned leaders. The only returning player with Big Ten experience on the roster heading into last season, Thorbjarnarson moved into the starting lineup in December and started NU's final 24 contests. The Reyjkavik, Iceland, product tallied 13 double figure efforts, while leading the team in 3-pointers and ranking second in rebounds and steals. His all-around ability suits Coach Fred Hoiberg's offense philosophy, as he reads defenses exceptionally well and take advantage of opposing defenses. He is rarely is out of position and his basketball IQ allows him to anticipate the moves of his teammates. Thorbjarnarson will be counted on heavily as the Huskers look to climb in the Big Ten.

#### 2019-20 (JUNIOR)

Thorbjarnarson emerged as a vital part of the Huskers' offensive attack and one of the most improved players in the Big Ten. He played in all 32 games, making 24 starts, and averaged 8.8 points, 4.8 rebounds, 1.3 assists and 1.1 steals per game, finishing 10th in the Big Ten in steals. Thorbjarnarson shot 46 percent from the field and a team-best 37.2 percent from 3-point range to rank 14th in the conference. He reached double figures 13 times on the season, highlighted by a trio of 17-point performances.

He was one of two Huskers to start all 20 Big Ten games and averaged 10.6 ppg while leading NU in both field goal percentage (.455) and 3-point percentage (.364). Thorbjarnarson ranked second on the Huskers in rebounding (5.5 rpg), third in assists (1.7 apg) and fourth in steals (1.0) in Big Ten play. He finished among the Big Ten leaders in both 3-pointers per game (1.8 per game) and rebounding (20th) in league action, while his 9.1 ppg increase in conference play from last season was the third-largest jump in the Big Ten, trailing only Big Ten Player of the Year Luka Garza and All-Big Ten pick Daniel Oturu.

Thorbjarnarson came off the bench for the Huskers' first eight games before a breakout performance at Georgia Tech in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge showed his allaround game. He finished with 11 points on 4-of-7 shooting and seven boards in 21 minutes and moved into the starting lineup for the first time in 2019-20 at Creighton with 12 points on 4-of-5 shooting. He established a career high in scoring for the third straight contest with 17 points, including a trio of 3-pointers, in an overtime loss at Indiana. His best performance of the season came against Iowa on Jan. 7, when he propelled the Huskers to a 76-70 win with season highs in both points (17) and rebounds (nine), including back-to-back 3-pointers to give the Huskers the lead for good after the Hawkeyes tied the score at 59 with just over five minutes remaining. He continued

his strong play later in January, averaging 14.5 points per game in a four-game stretch, including 15 points on 5-of-8 shooting from 3-point range at Ohio State and a 17-point, eight rebound effort in a 75-72 loss at No. 24 Rutgers, where he hit five 3-pointers for the second time in 2019-20. Thorbjarnarson played well in NU's last-second loss at No. 9 Maryland on Feb. 11, finishing with 15 points and seven rebounds. He grabbed seven or more rebounds nine times, including a season-high nine caroms against Indiana and Northwestern.

Thorbjarnarson played in three games for Iceland's Senior National Team during the Games of the Small States of Europe in 2019, averaging 10 points per game in about 20 minutes per contest. He had 14 points against Montenegro and closed out the event with 14 points against Cyprus in the third-place game.

#### 2018-19 (SOPHOMORE)

Thorbjarnarson made an impact, as he played in 25 games, including seven starts, as NU made its second straight NIT appearance. He averaged 2.0 points, 2.1 rebounds and 1.2 assists per game, while posting a 2.2-to-1 assist-to-turnover ratio in just over 12 minutes per game. He earned a spot in the rotation after a season-ending injury to Isaac Copeland Jr., and played in 16 of the Huskers' final 17 contests, including all five postseason games.

After a rash of season-ending injuries in the backcourt, he moved into the starting lineup for the Huskers' postseason run and filled in admirably. He averaged 5.2 points, 2.8 rebounds, 1.6 assists and 2.2 steals per game over NU's final five games, closing the year with eight points, three assists and two steals in the second-round NIT loss at TCU. Thorbjarnarson had a career-high four assists and three steals in the first-round win over Butler. He played a major role in NU's win over No. 21 Maryland in the Big Ten Tournament, recording a personal-best five steals. He also had five points against No. 19 Wisconsin and four against both Maryland and Rutgers.

Thorbjarnarson's biggest moment of the year came in the final seconds of overtime against Iowa in the regular-season finale, as he blocked Jordan Bohannon's 3-point attempt to preserve NU's 93-91 win. He had four points, three assists and two blocked shots as NU rallied from a nine-point deficit in the final 50 seconds of regulation. He played double-digit minutes five times in Big Ten play. He took advantage of an

opportunity against No. 24 Wisconsin, grabbing a career-high 10 rebounds in 17 minutes. That performance started a string of four straight games in which he played at least 10 minutes, including starts against nationally ranked Maryland and at Purdue. In all, he played in 11 of NU's final 12 Big Ten games.

His biggest offensive effort came in the season opener against Mississippi Valley State, when he scored a career-high nine points and grabbed four rebounds in 21 minutes. He also provided a spark against Oklahoma State, dishing out two assists in a four-minute stint that helped NU erase a seven-point deficit.

Thorbjarnarson played for Iceland's U-20 National Team in July of 2018. At the FIBA U-20 European Championships, he averaged 9.4 points, 4.0 rebounds, 3.7 assists and 1.6 steals per game, ranking second on the team in scoring and first in assists. He closed tournament action with three straight double figure efforts and averaged 18.5 points on 67 percent shooting, including 55 percent from 3-point range, in Iceland's final two contests.

#### 2017-18 (FRESHMAN)


Thorbjarnarson was one of three true freshmen to earn playing time on NU's 22-win team. He played in nine games, totaling eight points, four rebounds and three assists in 19 minutes of work. His best performance of the year came in the win over Delaware State on Dec. 22, when he had six points, including a pair of 3-pointers, and an assist in four minutes of action. He also had a basket, rebound, assist and steal in just two minutes against Marist on Nov. 24. He appeared in three Big Ten games, as well as the Big Ten Tournament opener against No. 13 Michigan at Madison Square Garden. He tallied two rebounds and an assist in the win over No. 23 Michigan on Jan. 18.

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Thorbjarnarson was one of the top youth players in Iceland, playing in the country's top league as well as in the national team program. Thorbjarnarson made his national team debut in 2017, representing his nation in the Small States of Europe event, helping Iceland to a third-place finish. He also played for the U-20 national team at the FIBA European Championships. At the 2016 FIBA U-18 European Championships, Thorbjarnarson was the third-leading scorer in the tournament, averaging 19.6 points per game, including a 39-point effort and three other 30-point games. He also chipped in 6.3 rebounds, 1.8 assists and 4.9 steals per game. In 2016, he was selected as MVP of the Nordic Championships with the U-18 team, including a 33-point performance in the finals to lead Iceland to victory. Thorbjarnarson played for KR Reykjavik in the Icelandic League for three years, helping the team to three straight titles and a pair of Icelandic Cups in 2016 and 2017. In his final season, he averaged 10.2 points, 2.6 rebounds and 1.9 assists per game for a team that went 26-8 and won the league championship in the top pro league in the country. Throbjarnarson shot 53 percent from the field, including 38 percent from 3-point range and was selected as the top young player in the league. He also considered UMass, UConn, Utah, Drexel and UAB before signing with Nebraska.

#### PERSONAL

The son of Thorbjorn Jonsson and Hildur Fridleifsdottir, Thorir was born on May 26, 1998, in Akureyri, Iceland. Thorir graduated from Menntaskólinn i Reykjavik in May of 2017. He has three older brothers, Leifur, Jon Askell and Kristofer. Thorir is majoring in psychology.

#### 2020-21 OUTLOOK

Very few 17-year-old college basketball players have experienced a season like Yvan Ouedraogo (pronounced I-van WOO-drah-oh-go) did in 2019-20. He had to learn on the fly, starting at center in the Big Ten in a year where the league had a plethora of high-quality centers. Ouedraogo was up for the challenge and performed well in a tough situation. He averaged 5.7 points and a team-high 6.3 rebounds per game, ranking third among Big Ten freshmen in rebounding. He set or tied school single-season freshman records for rebounds (203) and double-doubles (three), while shattering NU's singlegame freshman rebounding record with 19 against Northwestern. He made significant strides, averaging 6.8 points and 7.6 rebounds per game over the Huskers' final nine games. Ouedraogo was one of the last Husker players to return to campus, but took great strides to change his body in the offseason. He lost 15 pounds, while adding strength and explosiveness, and the changes have made him more effective during the fall. If Ouedraogo continues the progresses he made late in his rookie campaign, that would be significant for the Huskers for the upcoming season.

#### 2019-20 (FRESHMAN)

Ouedraogo emerged as the Huskers' starting center, playing in all 32 games, including 30 starts, and averaging 5.7 points and a team-high 6.3 rebounds in 21.4 minutes per game. Ouedraogo, who became just the third freshman to lead the Huskers in rebounding, set or tied three freshman records, including double-doubles (three), rebounds in a season (203) and rebounds in a game (19) despite being the youngest player in the Big Ten in 2019-20. He finished third among Big Ten freshmen in rebounding and played some of his best basketball down the stretch, averaging 6.8 points on 49 percent shooting and 7.6 rebounds per game over Nebraska's last nine games. His biggest impact came on the boards, as he grabbed eight or more rebounds in nine games, including six games with at least 10 caroms.

Ouedraogo's best performance of the year came against Northwestern on March 1, when he posted his third double-double of the season with season highs in points (11), rebounds (19) and minutes (38). His 19 rebounds were the most ever by a Husker freshman – and second nationally among any freshman in 2019-20 - and most by any Husker since 2007. That performance capped a strong six-game stretch where he averaged 8.5 points on 55.2 percent shooting and 9.3 rebounds per game against all three Big Ten co-champions as well as Ohio State and Northwestern. He put up a second double-double in Big Ten action at Illinois with 11 points and 10 rebounds and grabbed 10 rebounds and chipped in eight points against Wisconsin. He nearly posted a doubledouble in his Big Ten debut, finishing with 10 rebounds and nine points in an overtime loss at Indiana, as his 10 rebounds marked the second-highest rebounding total by a Husker making his conference debut.

He reached double figures in scoring six times, including a season-best 11 points against Southern, Texas A&M-Corpus Christi and Illinois. Against TAMU-CC, Ouedraogo posted his first career double-double with 11 points and 14 rebounds, marking the first double-double by a Husker freshman since 2013.

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Ouedraogo attended the National Institute of Sport, Expertise and Performance (INSEP). In 2018-19, Ouedraogo played in 26 games for Centre Fédéral de Basketball, which is a program in the top amateur league in France. He averaged 5.4 points and 4.4 rebounds per game, while playing most of the season as a 16-year-old. Other prominent players to come from the INSEP program have included Clint Capela, Boris Diaw and Tony Parker.

Prior to enrolling at Nebraska, he was selected for the French U-18 National Team and helped the squad to a fifth-place finish at the 2019 European Championships. He averaged 4.0 points, 3.6 rebounds and 0.8 steals per game while posting a pair of double-figure efforts.

He represented France in other international competition, including the 2018 FIBA U-16 European Championships, when he averaged 12.7 points and 9.7 rebounds per game. He finished second on the team in both scoring and rebounding to help France to a fourth-place finish and earned team MVP honors. He had a pair of double-doubles in the tournament, including a 23-point, 15-rebound performance in a win over Serbia in the quarterfinals and a 14-point, 15-carom effort against Estonia in the group phrase.

Ouedraogo was selected for the Adidas Next Generation Tournament in the U-18 Division, averaging 5.3 points and 4.3 rebounds against some of Europe's top youth competition, including a nine-point, 10-rebound performance. Ouedraogo selected Nebraska over TCU, Georgia Tech, Vanderbilt, Oregon and Miami.

#### 2020-21 OUTLOOK

Akol Arop (pronounced A-call uh-rope) hopes the experience he gained as a true freshman will pay dividends this year. Arop played in 21 games, but was thrust into extensive action late in the season. He played 64 of his 114 minutes in the Huskers' final three games, including a career-high 23 minutes in the Big Ten Tournament against Indiana. Arop, who played exclusively in the post in high school, has worked hard to extend his range since coming to Nebraska. He is one of the Huskers' top defenders and his combination of a high motor and athleticism allow him to guard a variety of positions. Off the court, Arop is also a strong student and active in the Huskers' Life Skills program. Last year, he was one of 27 student-athletes to receive the Sam Foltz Hero 27 Leadership Award for his work in the community. Akol's older brother, Aguek, plays at San Diego State.

#### 2019-20 (FRESHMAN)

Arop was one of four freshmen who played in at least 20 games for the Huskers in 2019-20. He appeared in 21 contests, averaging 1.0 point and 1.3 rebounds per game. While he averaged just 5.3 minutes per game, Arop saw most of his action down the stretch, playing at least 20 minutes in each of the Huskers' final three games, including the Big Ten Tournament loss to Indiana. Against the Hoosiers, Arop set personal bests in minutes (23) and blocked shots (two) while grabbing a pair of rebounds. He enjoyed his best offensive performance in the regular-season finale at Minnesota, finishing with



five points on 2-of-2 shooting, including his first career 3-pointer. Arop also had five points and a season-best six rebounds in 20 minutes of work at No. 25 Michigan. He also had chipped in four points, three rebounds and a blocked shot at No. 17 Iowa and had four points and two boards in just three minutes of work against No. 24 Penn State.

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Arop was the top senior prospect in Nebraska in 2019, playing for Coach Josh Luedtke at Omaha Creighton Prep. A three-year all-state honoree, Arop finished his varsity career with 1,268 points on 66 percent shooting, 733 rebounds and 162 blocked shots as Creighton Prep posted a 69-10 record and three state tournament appearances over the last three seasons.

Arop was the Gatorade Player of the Year in Nebraska and first-team all-state pick by

the Omaha World-Herald and Lincoln Journal Star in 2018-19, averaging 19.4 points on 62 percent shooting, 10.9 rebounds and 2.6 blocks per game. He was second in Class A in rebounding and third in blocked shots, as the Junior Jays went 22-5 and advanced to the 2019 Class A State Tournament. Arop reached double figures in 26 of 27 games as a senior, including 19 double-doubles. He recorded a pair of 30-point games as a senior, including a 35-point, 12-rebound performance against Omaha Benson.

A three-star prospect by Rivals, ESPN and 247Sports, Arop helped Creighton Prep to a 26-1 record and the Class A state title in 2018. He was a first-team all-state selection from both the Omaha World-Herald and the Lincoln Journal Star, averaging 16.0 points on 66 percent shooting, 9.7 rebounds and 2.1 blocks per game. He garnered all-state and first-team all-metro accolades for the first time as a sophomore, averaging 15.0 points, 8.6 rebounds and 1.7 blocks per game, while setting the Class A single-season record for highest field goal percentage (.755). #### 2019-20 (SIT OUT)

Banton sat out the 2019-20 season after transferring from Western Kentucky and honed his skills on the scout team. Banton played during the Huskers' trip to Italy in August of 2019, averaging 5.8 points, 3.5 rebounds. 2.5 assists and 1.3 steals per game in helping the Huskers post a 4-0 record.

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

#### 2020-21 OUTLOOK

Shamiel Stevenson (pronounced Shameal) provides the Huskers a versatile player with the ability to play on the wing or in the frontcourt. At 6-foot-6, 245 pounds, Stevenson's size provides a physical presence, while he has the ability to stretch defenses with his 3-point shooting. Stevenson will be looking to play in his first competitive game since November of 2018, when he played at Pittsburgh. The Husker coaches hope for a return to his freshman year at Pitt, when he averaged 8.5 points per game while shooting over 50 percent from the field and ranking second on the team in rebounding. With a year in the system, the Husker coaches believe that Stevenson will carve out a significant role for the Huskers.

Stevenson sat out the 2019-20 season

after transferring from Nevada. He was hoping to gain immediate eligibility, but his appeal was declined in November of 2019. He was able to play for the Huskers on their trip to Italy in August of 2019, averaging 7.8 points, 3.3 rebounds and 1.3 steals per game in four wins.

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Stevenson spent the 2017-18 season and the first semester of 2018-19 at Pittsburgh before transferring to Nevada in January of 2019. As a freshman at Pitt in 2017-18, Stevenson played in 32 games, including 13 starts, and averaged 8.5 points, 4.4 rebounds and 1.0 assist per game for the Panthers. He shot a team-high 50.5 percent from the field and was second on the team in rebounding. He also shot 37.5 percent from 3-point range and got to the foul line a team-high 112 times, a total which ranked fourth among ACC freshmen. He reached double figures 13 times as a freshman, including a careerhigh 19 points against Montana, when he went 7-of-10 from the field and added six rebounds and three assists. Stevenson posted seven of his double-figure efforts in ACC play, including 17 points against Florida State and 16 at nationally-ranked Miami. He grabbed five or more rebounds on 15 occasions, including a career-high nine caroms at Virginia Tech, at Navy and against Mount St. Mary's. He played in just four games in 2018-19 before transferring to Nevada following the fall semester, where he sat out the remainder of 2018-19 before coming to Nebraska.

Stevenson played his senior year at Hillcrest Prep in Arizona, averaging 14.2 points, 6.3 rebounds, 2.1 assists and 1.2 blocks in his only season at the school. He shot 38 percent from 3-point range and 85 percent from the line, helping the school to a 33-6 record and a No. 9 ranking in the MaxPreps Independent poll. He was selected to play also won the slam dunk contest in the event. Stevenson was also the MVP of the North Pole Hoops Showcase in Ontario, finishing with 22 points, 15 rebounds, four assists, two steals and two blocks in the Top 20 Prospect Game. He was rated as the No. 34 small forward in the 2017 recruiting class by 247 Sports. He also spent two seasons at Wassatch Academy in Utah, averaging 10.9 points and 5.9 rebounds as a junior in helping the school to a 29-4 record and an appearance in the Dick's Sporting Goods High School National Tournament. Stevenson played on the AAU circuit with U-Play Canada, and was invited to compete for a spot on the 2015 Canadian U19 FIBA World Championship National Team. 

Walk-on Jace Piatkowski begins his second year in the Husker program looking to make an impact. He continues the Piatkowski legacy in the Husker basketball program, as his father, Eric, ranks second in school history in scoring and is one of four Huskers to have their jersey retired. His uncle, Troy, played three seasons in the late 1990s, helping NU make three postseason appearances. Jace was a valuable member of the Husker scout team last season and adds depth on the wing for the Big Red. Piatkowski averaged 18.3 points a game at Elkhorn South High School, including 45 3-pointers, as a senior in 2018-19.

2019-20 (REDSHIRT)

Piatkowski redshirted during the 2019-20 season, working extensively with the Husker scout team in practice. He did accompany the team on the Huskers' trip to Italy in August of 2019, playing in four games and hitting a 3-pointer in the opener.

#### 2020-21 OUTLOOK

Nebraska added one of the top junior college players in the nation with the signing of Teddy Allen in April. A 6-foot-6, 222-pound guard, Allen led all of junior college basketball in scoring last season at 31.4 points per game. He is a physical wing who can score at all three levels and possesses a knack for getting to the foul line. Allen ranked in the top 10 of the NJCAA in free throws made, attempted and percentage last season. His versatility will allow Head Coach Fred Hoiberg to mix and match lineups. Allen also brings NCAA Tournament experience from his season at West Virginia, when he came off the bench in the Mountaineers' Sweet 16 run as a freshman.

**BEFORE NEBRASKA** 

Allen was one of the top junior college players in the nation playing for Coach Cory Fehringer at Western Nebraska Community College. Allen, rated the No. 8 player in the country by JUCORecruiting.com, led all of the NJCAA in scoring in 2019-20, averaging 31.4 points per game, which was the highest average by a junior college player since 2013-14. He became the first Nebraska high school player since 2008 to put up more than 30 points per game, highlighted by a school-record 47-point effort against Douglas County West. He

game and shot 39.7 percent from 3-point range, while ranking among conference leaders in scoring (11th), rebounding (12th) and blocked shots (0.7, 12th). Mayen spent the 2019-20 season at Chipola (Fla.) College playing for Coach Brendan Foley, helping the school to an 18-10 record. Mayen, who was the No. 18 prospect in the final JucoRecruiting Top 100, averaged 11.8 points per game on 47 percent shooting along with 8.4 rebounds and 2.7 assists per game. He shot 38 percent from 3-point range (38-99) and 81.5 percent from the foul line for the season. McGowens, a 6-foot-4, 191-pound guard from Pendleton, S.C., started 64 of 66 games at Pittsburgh over the last two seasons, totaling 764 points, 213 rebounds, 173 assists and 127 steals. McGowens possesses elite-level athleticism, which shows in his work on the defensive end and in finishing around the basket. He has impressed the coaching staff with the work he has done to be a more efficient shooter, and has made great strides since arriving in June. He has two years of

eligibility remaining and is eligible for the 2020-21 season after receiving an NCAA ruling on Oct. 5. McGowens, a former top-100 recruit out of high school, has the ability to be a difference maker for the Huskers this season.



McGowens played two seasons for Coach Jeff Capel at Pittsburgh before transferring at the end of the 2019-20 season As a sophomore, McGowens started 32 of 33 contests for the Panthers, averaging 11.5 points, 3.6 assists, 3.3 rebounds and 1.9 steals per game. He ranked in the top 15 in the Atlantic Coast Conference in steals (fourth), assists (10th), assist-to-turnover ratio (15th,

1.26-to-1) and minutes played (13th, 33.8 per game). He posted 20 double-figure scoring games, including three 20-point performances. Military Academy for Head Coach Lee Martin, helping the school to a 33-4 record and a No. 4 national ranking after averaging 18.4 points, 6.3 assists, 5.4 rebounds and 3.2 steals per game. He earned Region 1 AAAA Player of the Year and first-team all-state honors after averaging 18.3 points, 6.8 assists, 4.3 rebounds and 3.6 steals per game. He reached double figures in 27 of 28 games, including 11 games with 20-or-more points and averaged 18.2 points per game during his sophomore campaign. McGowens played for Team United on the 2017 EYBL AAU circuit, averaging 12.6 points, 3.8 rebounds, 2.2 assists and 1.5 steals per game in his final AAU campaign, reaching double figures in nine of 16 games with game-highs of 22 points against CIA Bounce and Each1 Teach1.

#### 2020-21 OUTLOOK

Graduate transfer Kobe Webster has wasted little time in becoming one of the leaders for the Husker program. Webster, a 6-foot, 172-pound guard from Indianapolis, Ind., spent the last three seasons at Western Illinois, scoring over 1,400 points and dishing out nearly 300 assists in 85 career starts. He paced WIU in scoring and assists in each of his three seasons, earning second-team All-Summit League accolades in 2019 and 2020. His basketball IQ has helped make it a smooth transition, and Webster's shot-making ability will be a boost to the Huskers' offensive attack. A career 37 percent shooter from 3-point range, Webster has the ability to thrive in the Huskers' attack.

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Webster spent the last three seasons at Western Illinois University, scoring

over 1,400 points and dishing out nearly 300 assists in 85 career starts. He led WIU in scoring and assists in each of his three seasons, earning second-team All-Summit League accolades in 2019 and 2020.

Webster started all 26 games as a junior, averaging 17.1 points, 3.6 assists and 3.2 rebounds per game in 2019-20. He ranked among the Summit League leaders in scoring (sixth), assists (fifth) and assist-to-turnover ratio (1.72-to-1, fourth) en route to garnering second-team all-conference recognition. Webster totaled a team-high 21 double-figure efforts, including six 20-point efforts. His junior campaign was highlighted by a school-record 40-point performance against Omaha, when he went 15-of-24 from the field, including five 3-pointers. In the classroom, he was selected to the 2019-20 Summit League All-Academic Team.

He emerged as one of the top guards in the Summit League as a sophomore, averaging a team-high 17.0 points, 4.0 rebounds and 3.1 assists per game. A second-team all-conference pick, he was fifth in the conference in scoring, assist-to-turnover ratio (1.94-to-1) and 3-pointers per game (2.5) while shooting 41 percent from 3-point range. He had 10 20-point games, including a season-high 26 points at Northern Illinois, while he recorded a double-double at Creighton with 24 points and 10 rebounds. He also shined in the classroom, as he was a first-team CoSIDA Academic All-District V pick and

was named to the 2018-19 Summit League All-Academic Team.

Webster started all 28 games as a freshman, leading the Leathernecks in scoring at 15.9 points per game while adding 3.5 assists per game to rank third in the Summit League. He shot 43 percent from the field, including 37 percent from 3-point range, and shot 78 percent from the foul line. Webster, who was named to the Summit League All-Newcomer Team and collected honorable-mention all-conference honors, reached double figures in 22 contests, including eight 20-point performances. He scored a season-high 27 points and dished out a career-high eight assists against IUPUI.

Webster previously starred at Park Tudor School in Indianapolis, helping the school to a pair of state titles in 2014 and 2015 and started his last three seasons at the school. He was a third-team all-state selection as a senior, as he averaged 16 points, four rebounds and four assists. He was invited to the Indiana's Top 60 showcase following a junior campaign when he averaged 14.5 points and 3.7 assists per game. He played his AAU ball with the Indiana Elite, winning a national championship in 2015.

The son of Isaac and Nikki Webster, Kobe was born on July 31, 1999, in Indianapolis. He has one sister (Sydney). Kobe is working on a master's degree in higher education administration after graduating from Western Illinois in three years with a management degree. #### 2020-21 OUTLOOK

Freshman Elijah Wood was the final member of the Huskers' recruiting class, as he signed with Nebraska in late June. Wood, who reclassified from the class of 2021, provides the Huskers versatility, as he has the skill set to play either position in the backcourt. At 6-foot-5, his length and defensive ability are tools that give him an opportunity to contribute early in his collegiate career, and he uses his athleticism to get inside and finish. His playing time will depend on adding additional strength and his transition to Big Ten basketball. Wood, who was ranked in the top 150 nationally by several recruiting services after his junior year, played at Berkmar (Ga.) High School, helping the school to an 18-10 mark as a senior.

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Wood was ranked among the top 150 players in the country by both Rivals and 247 Sports and a four-star recruit by both websites in the spring of 2019, but fell out of the rankings after not playing AAU basketball after his junior year. He spent his senior year at Berkmar (Ga.) High School, helping Coach Greg Phillips' squad to a 18-10 record and a Class AAAAAA quarterfinals appearance. He averaged 10 points, 2.0 assists and 1.5 steals per game during his senior campaign.

Wood, who originally signed with Rhode Island in the fall of 2019, played his sophomore and junior seasons at Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School. As a junior, he averaged 11 points, 5.4 rebounds, 4.1 assists and 1.8 blocks per game. Wood reached double figures in 12 of 19 contests and dished out five or more assists eight times as a junior. During his sophomore year, he moved into the lineup and averaged 11.5 points, 5.3 assists and 4.5 rebounds per game. His season was highlighted by a 10-point, 11-assist double-double vs. Northwest.

Wood, who chose Nebraska over schools such as Florida, Mississippi, Providence and TCU among others, played AAU basketball with Team Thrill.

Fred Hoiberg ushered in a new era for Nebraska basketball, as he was named head coach on March 30, 2019, and formally introduced on April 2, 2019. Hoiberg, who was born in Lincoln, is the 28th coach in the history of Nebraska men's basketball, a fraternity that includes his grandfather, Jerry Bush, who guided the Husker program for nine seasons from 1955 to 1963. Hoiberg's ties run deep to Nebraska as his other grandfather, Otto Hoiberg, was a history professor at the University, while his father, Eric, received his doctorate degree from Nebraska.

Hoiberg brings a distinguished resume to Lincoln that includes four years as an NBA front office executive, four years as an NBA head coach and five years at lowa State, where he orchestrated the biggest turnaround in Big 12 history in 2011-12 and guided the school to four straight NCAA Tournament appearances.

Following his 10-year NBA playing career, Hoiberg worked in the front office for the NBA's Minnesota Timberwolves, serving as assistant general manager before being promoted to vice president of basketball operations. He left the Timberwolves to get into coaching, accepting the head job at lowa State, his alma mater. Hoiberg led the Cyclones to four NCAA Tournament appearances and a pair of Big 12 Tournament championships in his five seasons at the school. His success in Ames led him back to the NBA as head coach of the Chicago Bulls, where he helped the Bulls to a playoff appearance in his second season.

Hoiberg has experienced incredible success at the collegiate level. He won more games than any other player during his time as a Cyclone guard and then returned to post the top winning percentage of any coach in Iowa State history. He won four NCAA Tournament games at Iowa State — a program record — and developed four players who eventually became NBA Draft picks and four All-Americans in his five seasons.

In Lincoln, he laid the foundation during his first season, as Nebraska played at one of the fastest paces in the country in 2019-20. NU ranked 16th nationally and led the Big Ten in pace, while the Huskers' 7.9 3-pointers per game were the most by a Husker team since 2001-02. In conference action, NU ranked in the top three in 3-pointers per game (third) and turnover margin (second). Despite having just one returning letterwinner on the roster and the fewest returning points by a Big Ten team in more than a decade, the Huskers knocked off Iowa and Purdue in Big Ten play, while losing on the road to nationally ranked Maryland and Rutgers in the final seconds. The Huskers, who had just 10 scholarship players, also tied a school record with four overtime games.

#### CHICAGO BULLS HEAD COACH

Hoiberg was named an NBA head coach just five years into his coaching career. He led Chicago to immediate success, as the Bulls finished with a 42-40 record in his first year in 2015-16, when Hoiberg became just the fifth coach in franchise history to have a winning record in his debut season. The next season, Hoiberg took Chicago to the Eastern Conference Playoffs. The No. 8 seed Bulls went on the road and won the first two games of a first-round series against the top-seed Boston Celtics, becoming the first No. 8 seed to take a 2-0 lead against a No. 1 seed since 1993. Hoiberg became the fifth coach in NBA history to have each of his first two career playoff

victories come on the road. The 2017 playoffs also marked the first time Chicago had won the first two games of a playoff series on the road since the 1993 NBA Finals. Overall, Chicago won more than 40 games in two of Hoiberg's three full seasons.

#### **IOWA STATE HEAD COACH**

Hoiberg led a resurgence at his alma mater, leaving a lasting legacy in five seasons. He guided lowa State to a 115-56 record – including a 99-40 mark in his final four seasons – to post the top winning percentage (.673) in Cyclone history. Hoiberg led lowa State to a program-record four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, while tying the school record with four NCAA Tournament coaching victories.

Hoiberg also posted the top conference winning percentage (.557) in ISU history and guided lowa State to back-to-back Big 12 Tournament titles in 2014 and 2015.

Hoiberg inherited a Cyclone program that had not made the NCAA Tournament or had a winning conference record in five years. But after just one rebuilding year, Hoiberg guided the Cyclones to four consecutive NCAA Tournaments before leaving for the NBA. His 115 wins were the most by any coach in a five-year span in lowa State history.

After a 16-16 debut season, Hoiberg led the Cyclones to a 23-11 record and the third round of the 2012 NCAA Tournament. ISU went 12-6 in Big 12 play in Hoiberg's second season, winning nine more conference games than the previous season to post the biggest one-year turnaround in Big 12 history. Hoiberg was named the Big 12 Co-Coach of the Year for his efforts.

Hoiberg guided the Cyclones to another 23-win season in his third year, when lowa State advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year. In his fourth season, the Cyclones finished 28-8, won the 2014 Big 12 Tournament and advanced to the Sweet 16. In Hoiberg's final season, lowa State defended its Big 12 Tournament title and earned a No. 3 seed for the NCAA Tournament.

Hoiberg oversaw one of the nation's top offenses during his tenure at lowa State. The Cyclones led the Big 12 with an average of 77.9 points per game in Hoiberg's final four seasons, ranking in the top 10 nationally in scoring twice in those four seasons. His Cyclones led the Big 12 in 3-pointers in four of his five seasons and in his final season at ISU, his team led the conference in scoring offense (77.8), field goal percentage (.476) assists per game (16.1), turnovers per game (11.0) and 3-pointers per game (7.7).

management and NBA Draft preparations. He served as the Timberwolves' assistant general manager in his first three seasons in the front office, where he helped Minnesota orchestrate a draft-day trade for five-time all-star Kevin Love in 2008.

#### **NBA PLAYING CAREER**

Hoiberg was a 10-year NBA veteran, playing for the Indiana Pacers (four seasons), Chicago Bulls (four seasons) and Minnesota Timberwolves (two seasons). Hoiberg played in 541 games in his NBA career and was a member of three playoff teams, including a Timberwolves team that reached the 2004 Western Conference Finals. Hoiberg scored 2,944 points in his NBA career, and he was a 40 percent career 3-point shooter. Hoiberg led the NBA in 3-point shooting percentage in his final season in 2004-05 (48.3 percent) and was fourth in 2003-04 (44.2 percent). His pro career ended abruptly at the age of 33 after undergoing open-heart surgery to repair an aneurysm in his aortic root. Hoiberg was a second-round pick in the 1995 NBA Draft, when the Indiana Pacers chose him with the 54th overall selection.

#### IOWA STATE AND HIGH SCHOOL PLAYING CAREER

Hoiberg was a four-year starter at Iowa State from 1991 to 1995. He is a member of the ISU Hall of Fame and his No. 32 jersey was retired in 1997. Hoiberg is also a member of the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame. Hoiberg was a two-time academic All-America selection as a player, including a first-team honoree as a senior. On the court,

Hoiberg was recognized as a two-time All-Big Eight selection in addition to being named the 1992 Associated Press Big Eight Freshman of the Year and the 1995 Co-Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year. Hoiberg was also named a third-team All-American as a senior, averaging 19.9 points per game to help the Cyclones win a then-school-record 23 games.

Hoiberg started 123 of his 126 games as a Cyclone with career averages of 15.8 points, 6.9 rebounds, 2.8 assists and 1.6 steals per game. The lowa State record holder for consecutive made free throws (34) and steals in a game (7), Hoiberg currently ranks fourth on the Cyclones' all-time scoring chart (1,993 points) and is in the top 10 in five other categories. He made 183 3-pointers in his career and won 78 games, both of which were the most in school history at the time of his graduation.

Hoiberg was a standout athlete for Ames High School before remaining in his hometown to attend Iowa State. As a senior, Hoiberg was Iowa's Mr. Basketball and he was also the Iowa Gatorade Player of the Year in football. On the basketball court, Hoiberg averaged 38.1 points per game in six tournament games while leading Ames to a state championship as a senior. On the gridiron, Hoiberg turned down a football scholarship offer from Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne to play basketball at Iowa State.


#### PERSONAL

The son of an Iowa State professor, Hoiberg earned his degree in finance from Iowa State in 1995. He was born in Lincoln on Oct. 15, 1972, and his grandfather, Jerry Bush, was Nebraska's men's basketball head coach for nine seasons from 1955 to 1963. Fred and his wife, Carol, have four children: one daughter, Paige; and three sons, Jack and twins Sam and Charlie.



Hoiberg's grandfather is former Husker basketball coach Jerry Bush. Known as the "Big Bear of the Coliseum," Bush guided NU from 1955 to 1963, and directed two of the greatest upsets ever – a 43-41 victory over top-ranked Kansas and Wilt Chamberlain, and a 55-48 victory over No. 4 Kansas State and Olympian Bob Boozer during the 1957-58 campaign.

Hoiberg, being guarded by Eric Piatkowski, was a third-team All-American as a senior at lowa State in 1994-95, averaging 19.9 points per game to help the Cyclones win a then-school-record 23 games.

One of the top young recruiters in the country, Matt Abdelmassih (pronounced Matt Abdel-massey) is in his second year on the Husker bench.

Abdelmassih, who had worked with Fred Hoiberg with both the Minnesota Timberwolves and at lowa State, joined the Husker staff in April of 2019.

Adbelmassih, who was featured by ESPN.com in 2020 as one of the top 40 coaches in college basketball under the age of 40, has made an immediate impact at Nebraska. His first recruiting class, which was put together in six weeks, ranked in the top 45 nationally and was NU's second-best class in the Big

Ten era. His 2020 recruiting class was highlighted by four players with previous Division I experience, including the nation's leading scorer from the junior college ranks, along with two freshmen and a Division II transfer who ranks among the nation's top 3-point shooters.

During his four-year tenure at St. John's, Abdelmassih helped the Red Storm improve from eight wins in his first season on the staff to 21 wins and the school's first NCAA Tournament appearance in five years before coming to Lincoln to rejoin forces with Hoiberg.

Abdelmassih, who was tabbed the top transfer recruiter in the country by ESPN college basketball experts, recruited a majority of the 2018-19 Red Storm roster, led by two-time, first-team All-Big East selection Shamorie Ponds. In fact, all five starters on the 2018-19 team were recruited by Abdelmassih, as he brought in talented transfers





such as Mustapha Heron (Auburn), Justin Simon (Arizona) and Marvin Clark Jr. (Michigan State) along with junior college transfer LJ Figueroa.

In 2016, Abdelmassih helped the Red Storm land a consensus top-25 recruiting class, according to major national recruiting services, which featured Ponds and Bashir Ahmed, who was one of the top junior college transfers in the country, . Ponds, along with fellow first-Wyear performer Marcus LoVett, was part of one of the top freshmen scoring duos in the nation in 2016-17. For their efforts, both Ponds and LoVett were unanimously selected to the Big East All-Freshman team.

In his first year at St. John's, Abdelmassih quickly assembled nearly an entire roster of talented newcomers, including Big East All-Freshman Team honoree Kassoum Yakwe, to help rebuild the foundation.

Before returning to his alma mater, Abdelmassih was at Iowa State for five years under Hoiberg, spending his last four seasons as an assistant as the Cyclones made four straight NCAA Tournament appearances.

An assistant director of operations for Iowa State in 2010-11, Abdelmassih was promoted to assistant coach in April of 2011. In his four seasons as an assistant coach, Iowa State amassed a 99-40 (.712) record, won back-to-back Big 12 Tournament titles (2014, 2015), made four straight trips to the "Big Dance" (2012-15) and reached one NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 (2014).

Abdelmassih was instrumental in making lowa State one of the primary destinations for some of the top transfers in the country, including DeAndre Kane and Royce White.

Recruited by Abdelmassih, Kane helped lead a 2013-14 squad that advanced to just the fourth Sweet 16 in program history and finished with a 28-8 mark that included a school-record nine wins against ranked teams. Kane earned All-America, first-team All-Big 12 and Big 12 Newcomer-of-the-Year accolades.

Another Abdelmassih recruit, White was the only Division I player to lead his team in scoring, rebounding, assists, blocks and steals in 2011-12. White earned All-America honors, was a unanimous first-team All-Big 12 choice and was the 16th overall selection in the 2012 NBA Draft.

Prior to his time at Iowa State, Abdelmassih worked for the Minnesota Timberwolves for two seasons. He joined the Timberwolves staff in 2008 as a basketball operations intern and worked directly with the coaching staff. Abdelmassih then moved to the front office in 2009-10 with a promotion to basketball operations assistant, a role in which he handled salary cap issues, draft preparation, scouting and free agent analysis.

Abdelmassih was a student manager for the St. John's men's basketball team from 2004-07. During his tenure with the Red Storm, Abdelmassih assisted the director of basketball operations with travel, video and camp responsibilities.

A 2007 graduate of St. John's, Abdelmassih earned a bachelor's degree in sport management. He and his wife Kelly have one son, Shea.

Armon Gates is in his third season on the Nebraska coaching staff. A native of Chicago, Gates returned to the Big Ten after serving as associate head coach at the University of Florida under Mike White. Gates has coached and developed all-conference performers at three schools during his coaching career.

At Nebraska, Gates plays an extensive role in nearly every facet of the program, including coordinating individual skill development programs, while working extensively with the Husker backcourt players. Last season, he worked extensively with All-Big Ten performer Cam Mack, who finished third

on Nebraska's single-season assist chart. Gates also plays a significant role in on-court coaching, opponent scouting and recruiting. In his first season at Nebraska, Gates worked with the Husker backcourt, and helped the development of Glynn Watson Jr., who posted a career-high 13.6 points along with 4.1 rebounds and 3.1 assists per game in 2018-19. Watson finished his career on Nebraska's top-10 lists in assists, steals and 3-pointers.

For the previous five seasons (2013-18), Gates was at Northwestern under Chris Collins, helping the Wildcats to a pair of 20-win seasons, including the program's first NCAA Tournament appearance in 2017. He also helped bring a top-30 recruiting class to Northwestern in 2014, while the 2018 class was listed as high as 24th nationally by 247Sports.

Gates worked with the Wildcat backcourt players, including Bryant McIntosh, who finished fifth on the Big Ten's career assist list with 700 en route to earning multiple All-

Big Ten honors. He also worked with All-Big Ten performers Vic Law, Scottie Lindsey, Tre Demps and Drew Crawford, who also earned first-team Academic All-America honors as a senior in 2014.

Prior to coaching at Northwestern, Gates spent two seasons at Loyola Chicago (2011-13) during Porter Moser's first two seasons leading the program. During Gates' time with the Ramblers, Ben Averkamp earned All-Horizon League honors in both seasons, becoming the first Loyola player in five seasons to earn first- or second-team all-conference honors. Averkamp also garnered second-team Academic All-America honors in 2013.

Gates spent the 2010-11 campaign as an assistant at TCU, working with the Horned Frogs' guards and helping Hank Thorns become a third-team All-Mountain West Conference selection. Thorns ranked fourth nationally in assists per game (7.0 apg) and was 11th in assist-to-turnover ratio. His 225 assists ranked No. 2 in Mountain West Conference single-season history, while he also averaged 10.7 points per game.

Prior to his season at TCU, Gates spent two seasons (2008-10) as an assistant coach at Kent State, helping the Golden Flashes to the 2009-10 Mid-American Conference regular-season title. In his final year at Kent State, Gates was part of a staff that guided the Golden Flashes to the second round of the NIT.

Gates began his coaching career as a graduate staff assistant at Western Kentucky. In his lone season on the Hilltoppers' staff, the team recorded a 29-7 overall record and reached the NCAA Sweet 16.

During his playing days at Kent State, Gates helped the Golden Flashes to an 88-42 record and three postseason appearances. Kent State recorded four straight 20-win seasons during his time on campus, and he closed out his career tied for second in school history with 200 3-point field goals.

Gates graduated from Kent State in 2006 with a degree in leisure studies and earned his master's degree in sports administration from the same institution in 2007. He was a MAC All-Academic selection. Gates prepped at Hillcrest High School and spent one season at Brewster (N.H.) Academy before attending Kent State.

Armon and his wife Ashley have two daughters (Gaida and Milan) and two sons (Kaiere and Blaze). Gates' older brother, Dennis, is in his second season as the head coach at Cleveland State University.

One of the top defensive minds in college basketball, Doc Sadler returned to Nebraska in 2019 after serving as the head coach at Southern Miss for five seasons.

Sadler, who has over 200 wins as a Division I head coach, helped the Golden Eagles improve their win total in each season since 2014-15, becoming one of three teams in the nation to hold that distinction. Despite two years of postseason bans, scholarship reductions and other inherited sanctions, Sadler guided Southern Miss to back-to-back Conference USA Tournament semifinal appearances in 2018 and 2019. In his final season, he led the Golden Eagles to 20 wins and a C-USA runner-up finish.

He first teamed up with Hoiberg at lowa State in 2013-14, helping the Cyclones to a 28-8 record, a Sweet 16 appearance and the school's first Big 12


Tournament title since 2000. He coached a pair of All-Americans in Melvin Ejim and DeAndre Kane, while Ejim was named the Big 12 Player of the Year in 2014.

Sadler served as the head coach of the Nebraska program from 2006 to 2012, leading the Huskers to three NIT appearances (2008, 2009 and 2011) and posting a 101-89 record. Sadler's Huskers led the Big 12 in scoring defense three times in six seasons and posted nine wins over ranked opponents in his tenure. In 2010-11, the Huskers ranked in the top 20 nationally in both scoring and field-goal percentage defense. NU held opponents to 38.9 percent shooting - the lowest total by Nebraska in 50 years - while playing 19 games against teams which reached postseason play. He coached two Olympians at Nebraska, while his most prominent pupil was Aleks Maric, a two-time All-Big 12 selection who totaled 1,630 points and 1,030 rebounds and finished his career holding 19 school or conference records.

Prior to his stint at Nebraska, Sadler had a phenomenal two-year run as the head coach at UTEP (2004-06), producing a record of 48-18. The Miners won 27 games and advanced to the 2005 NCAA Tournament in his rookie season, the ninth-best win total by a first-year head coach in NCAA history. UTEP won 21 games and advanced to the NIT in his last season in El Paso. He also coached for five seasons at Arkansas-Fort Smith (1999-2003), leading the program to a 120-39 mark and three postseason appearances as head coach.

Sadler, who graduated from Arkansas in 1982, previously worked as an assistant coach at eight current Division I schools, including Arkansas (1982-85, under Eddie Sutton), Lamar (1985-86, under Pat Foster), Houston (1986, under Pat Foster), Chicago State (1987-88, under Tommy Suitts), Texas Tech (1991-94, under James Dickey), Arizona State (1994-97, under Bill Frieder), UTEP (2003-04, under Billy Gillispie) and Iowa State (2013-14, under Hoiberg). He also was Director of Basketball Operations at Kansas in 2012-13 working for Bill Self.

Sadler, a Greenwood, Ark., was a four-year student manager at Arkansas under the legendary Eddie Sutton, earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1982 before beginning his collegiate coaching career with Sutton at Arkansas. Sadler added a master's of science degree in education from Northeastern State in 1991. Sadler and his wife, Tonya, have two sons, Landon and Matthew.





BOBBY
LUTZ
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE HEAD COACH

One of the most respected coaches in college basketball, Bobby Lutz (pronounced LOOTS) is in his second season as special assistant to the head coach.

Lutz has a wealth of coaching experience, as he won nearly 400 games as a college head coach and reached the postseason 22 times as either a head coach or an assistant, including 11 NCAA Tournament appearances. He guided his team to postseason play in his 14 of his 21 seasons as a head coach.

Lutz is reunited with Fred Hoiberg as the pair worked together at Iowa State during the 2010-11 campaign, building the foundation which led to the Cyclones' four straight NCAA Tournament appearances. In his Ione season in Ames, Lutz helped the Cyclones post their highest win total since the 2005-06 campaign. Before joining the Nebraska staff in May of 2019, Lutz most recently worked with Hoiberg in the Chicago Bulls organization, serving as an assistant with the Windy City Bulls in the NBA G League, as the team went 23-27 in its inaugural campaign.

Prior to coaching in the professional ranks, he spent five seasons at North Carolina State, where he was instrumental in helping the Wolfpack make four straight NCAA Tournaments, including a pair of Sweet 16 appearances under Mark Gottfried. He joined the staff in 2011-12, and was promoted to associate head coach for his final four years at the school. During that stint, North Carolina State won 108 games and won at least 22 games on four occasions. In 2015, Lutz was ranked by CoachStat.com as the top X's and O's assistant coach in the country.

Lutz is most known for his successful tenure at Charlotte from 1999 to 2010, where he guided his alma mater to eight postseason appearances (five NCAA, three NIT) in his 12 years at the helm. He is the winningest coach in 49er history, posting a record of 218-158 and is the only coach in school history to make back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances twice in his career.

A native of Denver, N.C., Lutz led Charlotte to a school-record five 20-win seasons, averaged more than 18 wins a year and won three Conference USA titles (1999, 2001 and 2004) in his tenure with the 49ers. He had four top-20 national recruiting classes and tutored 10 players who earned first-team all-conference honors. Five times in his career a Lutz-coached 49er squad knocked off a top-10 opponent, including a win over No. 3 Cincinnati in 1999. Five of the eight wins over top-10-ranked opponents in Charlotte's history came under Lutz's watch.

In 2005, Lutz was a finalist for the Jim Phelan National Coach of the Year Award. During his 49ers tenure, he also was tabbed as the 2005 C-USA Coach of the Year by ESPN.com and CollegeInsider.com, and was named 1999 Conference USA Coach of the Year by the Birmingham News.

Prior to being named head coach, Lutz was an assistant coach at Charlotte for three seasons (1996-98) assisting Jeff Mullins for one year and working for Mullins' successor, Melvin Watkins, for two years. The 49ers compiled a record of 56-35 and went to back-to-back NCAA Tournaments when Lutz was an assistant for Watkins.

Prior to his stint at Charlotte, Lutz molded Pfeiffer, an NAIA school in Misenheimer, N.C., into a national power as head coach from 1986 to 1995. He posted a 181-91 record and qualified for six straight NAIA Tournament berths, including three Final Four appearances. His teams had a .785 winning percentage (153-42) from 1990-95, and he developed 10 NAIA All-Americans. Lutz began his coaching career as in 1984, serving as an assistant coach at Clemson for two seasons under Cliff Ellis.

Lutz graduated with High Honors from UNC Charlotte in 1980 with a degree in economics and psychology and a 3.82 GPA. He earned three other degrees: Lenoir-Rhyne, 1981 (A.B. Secondary Education); Winthrop, 1985 (M.A.T. Secondary Social Studies); Clemson, 1986 (M.A. Education - Administration & Supervision). He is a member of Pfeiffer's Athletics Hall of Fame and the UNC Charlotte Alumni Hall of Fame. Lutz and his wife, Janet, have two adult daughters, Natalie and Christine.



VIRGILIO

DIRECTOR OF BASKETBALL OPERATIONS

Luca Virgilio is in his second year as Director of Basketball Operations after being hired in May of 2019. Virgilio came to Nebraska after spending five seasons at St. John's, most recently as a management analyst for the Red Storm basketball program for two seasons. He was a part of the St. John's staff which made a pair of NCAA Tournaments (2015 and 2019) in his tenure at the school.

In his role at Nebraska, Virgilio is responsible for the men's basketball operations budget. He also serves as the primary day-to-day administrator within the basketball office, coordinating team travel and serving as a liaison to administration, academics, HuskerVision, athletic communications, digital communications, marketing and life skills.

In his role as St. John's management analyst, Virgilio was responsible for devising and delivering strategies to improve basketball operations by using advanced knowledge of research methods, information management and quantitative methods to analyze all areas of the program. Virgilio assisted the coaching staff by preparing analytical reports, delivering recommendations and overseeing the implementation of these strategies for practice and training, style of play, scouting, scheduling and recruiting.

During his time as assistant to head coach Chris Mullin, Virgilio provided support for a variety of daily operations within the program. His responsibilities included managing the team's schedule, organizing travel and supervising student-athlete development activities. Virgilio also assisted with the coordination of on-campus recruiting activities, maintaining NCAA compliance-related records and other duties as assigned by the head coach.

He began his tenure as a graduate assistant for two years, where he helped in daily operations, including the team calendar and overseeing the team's managers. Virgilio also aided both the assistant to the head coach and director of basketball operations with administrative responsibilities and team operations.

Virgilio graduated from St. John's in May 2016, earning a master's degree in sport management with a concentration in international dimension of sport. Hailing from Italy, Virgilio earned a bachelor's degree in economics and business administration at Universita degli Studi di Roma Tre in 2012 and a master's of science in business administration at Tor Vergata School of Economics in 2014.

He and his wife, Caterina, were married in Brooklyn, N.Y., in November of 2018.

Sheryl Burbach is in her sixth season with the Husker basketball program and fourth as assistant director of basketball operations.

Burbach handles many of the business and operational functions for the coaching staff, including staff travel, expense accounts and budgeting. She also coordinates events around the Husker basketball program, including Legends Weekend and Senior Night. She also assists in team travel, the coordination of the Fred Hoiberg Basketball Camps and Clinics, as well as day-to-day office operations. Burbach also manages speaking and charitable requests for Coach Hoiberg.

Prior to joining the Huskers, Burbach worked for Nebraska's 4-H Office and Nebraska Extension.

Tim Wilson is in his 10th year as Nebraska's strength and conditioning coach for men's basketball. Wilson oversees the year-round training for the Husker basketball team and has played a major role in the physical development of NBA performers Isaiah Roby and Andrew White III, as well as several All-Big Ten performers, including James Palmer Jr., Isaac Copeland, Tai Webster, Terran Petteway and Shavon Shields.

Wilson came to Nebraska after spending three seasons at the University of Oregon, serving as the strength and conditioning coach for the Ducks' men's basketball program. Wilson, a Falls City, Neb., native, spent three seasons at Oregon, helping the Ducks to 21 wins and the CBI Championship in 2011.

Prior to joining the Oregon staff, Wilson spent 11 seasons in the NBA working with the Milwaukee Bucks, where he developed and implemented the strength and conditioning programs on a year-round basis. The Bucks made the playoffs six times in his tenure in Milwaukee, including the Eastern Conference Finals in 2000-01. With the Bucks, he worked with NBA All-Stars Ray Allen, Michael Redd, Glenn Robinson and Sam Cassell, as well as former Husker Erick Strickland.

As strength and conditioning coach at the University of Pittsburgh from 1991 to 1996, Wilson dealt exclusively with the football program. Wilson served under College Football Hall of Famer Johnny Majors and helped several student-athletes on their way to successful professional careers.

Wilson had two tours of duty as strength coach at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, as he was named the first-ever strength coach for UNLV Athletics in 1981. At UNLV, he served under the late Jerry Tarkanian and the UNLV men's basketball program. Wilson, who trained student-athletes from all sports while with the Runnin' Rebels, was a part of the 1989-90 national championship men's basketball program featuring the likes of Larry Johnson, Stacey Augmon and Greg Anthony. He also helped prepare Randall Cunningham and Ickey Woods for future careers in the NFL. Wilson also spent four years with the Chicago White Sox (1986-89). He trained MLB Hall of Famer Carlton Fisk and all-stars Harold Baines and Ozzie Guillen during his time in the Windy City.

Wilson began his career as a graduate assistant at Nebraska after graduating from the school in 1981 with a degree in exercise science. Wilson has received certifications from both the NSCA (National Strength and Conditioning Association) and the NASM (National Academy of Sports Medicine). He has a PES and CES certification from the NASM.

Wilson and his wife Teri have one son, Tyler.



MAI I HOLT VIDEO COORDINATOR

Matt Holt is in his fourth season as video coordinator for the Husker basketball program. In his role, he oversees film breakdown and exchanges for the coaching staff, oversees opponent scouting, coordinates the program's digital catalog and is in charge of the Husker managers.

Holt came to Nebraska after spending three seasons as the director of basketball operations at Northeastern University. During his tenure at Northeastern, Holt served in a variety of roles, as the program won at least 18 games in two of the his three seasons and made the 2015 NCAA Tournament under longtime coach Bill Coen. Some of Holt's duties included video analysis for opponent and self-scouting, assisting the coaching staff in coordinating opponent scouting, helping to coordinate and monitor academic progress, as well as handling team travel and working with campus entities to coordinate team events such as Midnight Madness and Alumni Day. During his three seasons, Northeastern had six All-Colonial Athletic Association selections, including 2017 CAA player of the Year T.J. Williams.

In addition to his three years of experience in basketball administration, Holt also served as an assistant coach for three seasons. During his two-year stint at the University of New Haven, Holt recruited prospective student-athletes and facilitated player development and game preparation. He aided in the development of New Haven's Eric Anderson, who earned NE10 Defensive Player of the Year honors in both seasons Holt

was an assistant. Holt also coordinated team travel, as well as community events such as youth camps, coaching clinics, and alumni weekends.

Holt spent the 2011-12 season at Rhode Island College, where he assisted in scouting opponents. He was responsible for organizing daily team schedules and worked closely with the compliance office to support academic progress for basketball student-athletes.

Holt, who graduated with a journalism degree from Northeastern in 2011, served as the head senior manager for the men's basketball team as an undergrad and helped coordinate team video needs and team travel logistics. He also received a master's degree in management of sports industries from New Haven in December 2013.

Bertram "Buzzy" Caruthers is in his second year as Director of Player Development. Caruthers fills several roles in the day-to-day operation of the Husker program and assists in developing programming for basketball student athletes. Caruthers has also served as an analyst for several Nebraska basketball games on BTN+.

Caruthers has more than a decade of basketball coaching experience. Before joining the Nebraska staff in 2019, he spent two years at Lincoln University in Jefferson City, Mo., before coaching at Maryville University in 2018-19. At Lincoln, he helped the school to consecutive MIAA Tournament appearances, including 17 wins before falling to eventual national champion Northwest Missouri State in 2017.

He gained Division I experience as a graduate assistant at St. John's during the 2015-16 campaign, and he has also worked at Butler Community College, Chipola College, Dodge City Community College, Barstow High School and Sumner Academy of Arts and Science

At the junior college level, Caruthers helped Butler achieve 19 wins and advance to the regional semifinal in 2016. At Dodge City, Butler Community College and Chipola College, Caruthers coached 20 players who went on to play at the either the NCAA Division I or Division II level, including eight all-conference selections.

At the high school level, Caruthers helped turn around the Barstow basketball program, establishing a new culture of winning. He helped lead the team to a program-record 24-win season. Caruthers coached at the MOKAN Elite program, as MOKAN Elite is one of the top grassroots programs in the nation. Caruthers directed with camps run by former Husker great and current Los Angeles Clippers Coach Tyronn Lue and NBA performer Alec Burks. In the offseason, Caruthers works on skill development for professional players, including Burks, Kyle Weems and former Husker Shavon Shields. Through his camps and various coaching stops, Caruthers has coached more than 40 players who have gone on to play at the NCAA Division I or Division II level.

A native of Kansas City, Kan., Caruthers played his high school ball at Sumner Academy, winning two state championships. Caruthers graduated from Hampton University with a bachelor of science degree in finance in 2006.



#### JOHN **HARRIS JR.** GRADUATE MANAGER

John Harris Jr. is in his second season as a graduate assistant for the Nebraska basketball program. In his role, he assists in day-to-day operations for the Husker program.

A Lincoln native, Harris returned home after working in the private sector since earning his undergraduate degree from Benedictine (Kan.) College in business administration in 2017. In addition to working a full-time job, Harris also assisted with the MOKAN AAU Basketball program for the past two years and also handled personal training. At Nebraska, Harris is working on a master's degree in youth development.

As a collegian, Harris was a standout performer at Benedictine, earning All-Heart of America Conference honors in each of his final three seasons at the school. He was a four-year performer who totaled 1,282 career points, 412 assists and 114 steals at the school.

A two-time NAIA honorable-mention All-American, Harris averaged 14.5 points, 5.6 assists and 5.2 rebounds per game as a senior, while shooting 43 percent from 3-point range. Harris helped the school to a conference title and NAIA Division I National Tournament appearance – the first in 44 years for the program – in 2014 before returning to the national tournament the following year.

Harris starred at Lincoln High, earning All-City honors from the Lincoln Journal Star as a junior and senior and garnering second-team Class A all-state honors for the Links as a senior. Harris' grandfather, Albert Maxey, is a member of the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame and played for Fred Hoiberg's grandfather, Jerry Bush, during the 1958-59 and 1959-60 seasons.



## ATHAN **KATSANTONIS**GRADUATE MANAGER

Athan Katsantonis is in his first season as a graduate assistant for the Husker men's basketball program after being named to the position in June of 2020. In his role, Katsantonis helps in day-to-day operations for the Husker program.

Katsantonis comes to Nebraska after spending the past four years as a student manager at Syracuse University for Hall of Fame Coach Jim Boeheim, serving as the Head Student Manager for the Orange during the 2019-20 campaign. DIRECTOR OF NAPL

Chris Bach, Ph.D., CSCS, was named the director of the NAPL in September of 2018 and is in his third year working for the Husker Athletic Department. Prior to his work in the Nebraska Athletic Performance Laboratory, Bach served as a research assistant with the Institute of Sports Sciences and Medicine at Florida State University, where he focused on performance enhancement and the development of elite athletes.

Brett Woods has served as an Athletic Psychologist for the Nebraska Athletics Department since August 2016. He works primarily with the men's and women's basketball and baseball programs.

EXECUTIVE ASSOCIATE A.D./ACADEMICS

Dennis Leblanc was named Nebraska's Executive Associate Athletic Director for Academics in 2015, after being promoted from Senior Associate Athletic Director for Academic Programs and Student Services. He has directed the academic program since 1993. Leblanc, who has been with the Academic Support Program for Student-Athletes since 1987, joined the Nebraska Athletic Department in 1983 as a member of the track and field staff.

Under Leblanc's leadership, Nebraska has become the national leader in CoSIDA Academic All-Americans for football and all sports, NCAA Today's Top Ten Award honorees and recipients of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Postgraduate Scholarship. Since he joined the academic staff in 1987, 264 of Nebraska's 340 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans have been honored, while NU has claimed 15 of its 18 NCAA Today's Top Ten Award recipients. Over 3,000 Husker student-athletes have earned their degrees during Leblanc's tenure.

The 93 percent Graduation Success Rate (GSR), reported in the 2019-20 academic year, for the Nebraska student-athletes was the highest GSR ever achieved for the seventh consecutive year. In addition all Nebraska teams achieved an NCAA Academic Performance Rate (APR) of 964 or higher which marks the sixth consecutive year that all teams attained an APR better than 950.

Over the past decade, Nebraska's academic support program for student-athletes has received outstanding reviews from the NCAA Certification Review Team and the Nebraska Faculty Intercollegiate Athletics Committee. In 2012, Nebraska's program became one of only 21 programs nationally to be certified by the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletes (N4A) for meeting the established standards of service for student-athletes as outlined by the N4A.

Leblanc is a member of the N4A, and in 2002 he received its prestigious Lan Hewlett Award presented to an athletic administrator in recognition of distinguished performance in providing personal, academic and professional guidance to student-athletes.

Leblanc was presented the Chancellor's Award for Exemplary Service to Students at the 2004 University of Nebraska Honors Convocation, which recognizes individuals who go above and beyond their assigned duties, devoting extra time and effort in serving the needs of students. In 2005, he was presented with an Honorary Mortar Board membership honoring him for his leadership and service to students. In 2007, Leblanc received the Hero Mentor Award through the American Red Cross, which annually recognizes a person for outstanding leadership and mentoring. In 2018, he was inducted into the Omicron Delta Kappa Society, which is a national leadership honor society, recognizing his leadership in athletics on campus.

Leblanc earned his bachelor's degree from Bethany College, and a master's degree from Wichita State University. He and his wife, Coreen, have four children: Olivia, Christian and twins Madeleine and Mackenzie.


