Nebraska kicks off its 134th season on Thursday when the Cornhuskers begin the 2023 campaign with a Big Ten Conference road matchup at Minnesota. Thursday's season opener - the Nebraska debut for head coach Matt Rhule - will be televised on FOX with radio coverage on the Huskers Radio Network.

Rhule returns to the college game after spending the past three seasons as a head coach in the National Football League. In his last season as a college head coach in 2019, Rhule was the Big 12 Coach of the Year after guiding Baylor to an 11-3 record and a No. 13 final ranking. Each of the Bears' three losses came to top-10 opponents: a three-point setback to No. 10 Oklahoma in November, a seven-point overtime loss to the sixth-ranked Sooners in the Big 12 Championship Game and a 26-14 defeat to No. 5 Georgia in the Sugar Bowl.

A proven program builder, Rhule guided both Temple and Baylor to the highest win total in school history in his third season at each school. Rhule will not make his Memorial Stadium debut until Sept. 16, as NU begins the season with back-to-back road games for the first time since 1995. Rhule is the first Husker head coach to make his debut in a road game since Bernie Masterson, whose first game was also at Minnesota on Sept. 28, 1946 (33-6 loss).

As for Nebraska, the Huskers are beginning the season with a Big Ten Conference game away from home for the fourth straight season. NU traveled to Ohio State to open the Covid-shortened 2020 season, while the Huskers began the 2021 season at Illinois and took on Northwestern in Dublin, Ireland, in last year's season opener.

THIS WEEK'S NUMBERS

Thursday marks the Nebraska head coaching debut of Matt Rhule. Rhule is the first Husker coach to begin his career with a road game since Bernie Masterson, whose first game was also at Minnesota on Sept. 28, 1946.

Nebraska begins the season with road games at Minnesota and Colorado. The Huskers are opening a season with back-to-back road games for the first time since 1995, when Nebraska traveled to Oklahoma State and then to Michigan State.

Each of the last three meetings between Nebraska and Minnesota have been decided by seven points, with the Gophers winning each game. Going back further, five of the last nine meetings have been one-score games.

SERIES HISTORY: NEBRASKA VS. MINNESOTA

Nebraska and Minnesota have met every year since the Huskers joined the Big Ten with the 2023 season marking the 13th straight year the schools have played. Overall, Nebraska has faced Minnesota more than any other Big Ten team with Thursday's game marking the 64th all-time meeting between the two schools. Minnesota holds a 36-25-2 advantage in the series.

- Minnesota has a 7-5 edge since Nebraska joined the Big Ten in 2011, with four straight victories and five wins in the last six meetings.
- Nebraska owned a 16-game win streak in the series between 1963 and 2012, before the Gophers snapped the streak with a 2013 victory in Lincoln.
- The 2020 game in Lincoln was played on Dec. 12, the only December game in Memorial Stadium history.
- Five of the last seven meetings between the teams have been decided by seven or fewer points, with Minnesota holding a 4-1 record in those close games.
- Each of the last three meetings have been seven-point Minnesota victories. The Huskers held a 10-0 halftime lead last season before Minnesota outscored Nebraska 20-3 in the second half. In the 2021 meeting, NU had three second-half drives come up scoreless inside the Minnesota 35-yard line, including two empty drives inside the 10-yard line in a 30-23 loss. In the 2020 meeting, Minnesota outscored Nebraska 14-0 in points off turnovers in a 24-17 victory.

HUSKER HISTORY IN SEASON OPENERS

Nebraska has an impressive history in season openers. The Huskers have won 98 of their 133 season openers, winning their first game more than 75 percent of the time while posting a 98-30-5 record.

- Nebraska is 32-5 in its first game of the season since 1986.
- The Huskers are opening a season away from home for the fourth straight year, the only four times this century that Nebraska has played its season opener away from Lincoln.
- Nebraska is 11-4 when it opens the season against a conference opponent. The Huskers are facing a conference foe in the season opener for just the sixth time since 1950, but Thursday marks the fourth consecutive year that Nebraska begins a season with a Big Ten Conference game.
- Matt Rhule is making his Nebraska head coaching debut on Thursday and is looking to become the first Husker head coach to win his first game since Bo Pelini in 2008. Overall, seven of Nebraska's last 10 head coaches dating back to 1949 have been victorious in their debut game.

NOTING LAST YEAR'S GAME

- Anthony Grant rushed 21 times for 115 yards in the game. The 115-yard effort marked Grant's fifth and final 100-yard rushing game of the 2022 season. Grant's five 100-yard rushing games in 2022 were the most by a Husker since Devine Ozigbo also had five 100-yard rushing performances in 2018.
- Quarterback Chubba Purdy made his first Husker start against Minnesota. It marked his second collegiate start as he started one game while at Florida State. Purdy rushed for a 4-yard touchdown on the opening drive of the game.
- Nebraska had 3.0 sacks in the game, tying for the most sacks Minnesota allowed during the 2022 season.
- Nebraska held Minnesota scoreless in the first half, marking the first time NU had shut out an opponent in the first half since Buffalo in 2021 and the first time the Huskers had held a Big Ten opponent scoreless in the first half since Maryland in 2019.
- Beginning with the Minnesota game, Nebraska held its opponent scoreless in the first half in three of its final four games in 2022.
- Nebraska punter Brian Buschini averaged a career-high 55.5 yards on six punts, including five punts of longer than 50 yards.

NEBRASKA BOASTS 14-2 RECORD IN AUGUST

Thursday's game will mark the 17th August game in the history of Nebraska football. The Huskers have lost just twice in the month, bringing a 14-2 record into the contest at Minnesota.

- Nebraska is not only 14-2 all-time in the month of August, but the average score of those 16 games has been 38-17. The Huskers are 7-2 in August when facing a current Power Five Conference opponent, with the average score of those six contests being 32-14.
- In the history of Nebraska football, Thursday's contest will mark the fourth-earliest date of a conference game in Husker history.

THROWBACK THURSDAY: A HUSKER HISTORY ON THURSDAY

Nebraska has played on Thursday a total of 60 times, including the first game in program history - a 10-0 shutout of the Omaha YMCA on Nov. 27, 1890. Nebraska owns a 40-17-3 all-time record on Thursday, including a 38-15-3 mark in regular-season contests.

- Nebraska played on Thursday 45 times from 1890 to 1938. Since World War II, the Huskers have played only 15 Thursday games, including four bowl games.
- In the modern era, Nebraska is 9-2 in regular-season Thursday games. The Huskers have won seven straight regular-season Thursday matchups dating back to a 27-13 win at Oklahoma State in 1993.
- Eight of Nebraska's 11 modern-day Thursday games have been played on the road, with the Huskers holding a 7-1 record in those eight games.
- Eight of Nebraska's 11 modern-day Thursday games have also been played against conference opponents, with the Huskers holding a 6-2 record in those eight games.
- Nebraska's most common opponent on Thursday has been Iowa. The Huskers and Hawkeyes played on Thanksgiving every season from 1891 to 1898, including the first six meetings in Omaha and the final two in Council Bluffs, Iowa. NU went 4-2-2 against Iowa in those Thursday games.
- Nebraska and Minnesota have played once previously on a Thursday. The teams played on Thanksgiving Day on Nov. 29, 1900, with the Gophers earning a 20-12 win in Lincoln to hand the Huskers their only loss of a 6-1-1 campaign.

RHULE SET FOR FIRST SEASON

Matt Rhule is set for his first season at Nebraska in 2023. Rhule is in his eighth season as a college head coach and 11th season overall after previously leading programs at Temple (2013-16) and Baylor (2017-19) along with an NFL stint as head coach of the Carolina Panthers (2020-22).

- Rhule owns a career record of 47-43 in his first seven seasons as a college head coach. Including his time in the NFL, Rhule is 58-70 in his first 10 seasons as a head coach.
- He has a proven record as a program builder. Rhule led both Temple and Baylor to the highest win totals in program history in his third season at each school.
- Rhule guided Temple to a pair of trips to the American Athletic Conference title game, the first
 two appearances in the league title game in school history. His 2016 Owl team won the schools'
 first conference title in nearly 40 years.
- Rhule led Temple to back-to-back bowl appearances for the first time in school history in 2015 and 2016. He built the foundation for Temple to appear in five straight bowl games from 2015 to 2019.
- At Baylor, Rhule became the first head coach in Power Five history to take a team from 11 losses to 11 victories in two or fewer seasons.
- The 2019 Baylor team set a school record for wins with 11 and the Bears' 9-0 start was the best in school history.
- Rhule carries a pair of streaks from his Baylor days into Thursday's season opener at Minnesota.
 From his time at Baylor, Rhule has won 13 consecutive games against unranked opponents, and he has a five-game winning streak in road conference games.
- Rhule is one of just seven current FBS head coaches to have experience as an NFL head coach

NINE NEW FACES AMONG 10 FULL-TIME ASSISTANTS

Nine of Nebraska's 10 full-time assistant coaches are in their first season on the Husker sideline in 2023. The lone returning member of the coaching staff is offensive line coach **Donovan Raiola**, who is in his second season at Nebraska in 2023. Including Head Coach Matt Rhule, nine of Nebraska's 11 full-time coaches have experience at both the college and NFL levels.

- Nebraska's offensive staff is led by offensive coordinator Marcus Satterfield, who also guides
 the Husker quarterbacks. Satterfield is in his 12th season as an offensive coordinator, including
 the past two seasons at South Carolina. He also owns two seasons of experience as a head
 coach, leading Tennessee Tech in 2016 and 2017.
- Running backs coach E.J. Barthel has three seasons of prior experience on Rhule's staffs at Temple and Carolina. Most recently, he guided the UConn running backs in 2022, helping the Huskies rank as one of the most improved teams in the country.
- Josh Martin was promoted to tight ends coach in July of 2023. He boasts previous experience
 as a tight ends coach at SMU (2018-21) and Arizona State (2015). Martin helped a pair of tight
 ends become NFL Draft picks in his four seasons at SMU.
- Garret McGuire coaches the Husker receivers. McGuire played for Rhule at Baylor and served on his Panthers' staff. Garret is the son of Texas Tech head coach Joey McGuire.
- The defensive staff is entirely new, led by coordinator **Tony White**. White has 15 seasons as a full-time assistant at the FBS level, including the past three seasons as the defensive coordinator at Syracuse. White led the Orange to back-to-back top-25 total defense rankings in 2021 and 2022, one of only 12 programs nationally to achieve that statistical milestone.
- Evan Cooper has served on Rhule's staff at each of his four head coaching stops. Cooper served as a defensive backs coach with the Panthers and at Baylor and also brings an extensive player personnel and evaluation background to the staff.
- Rob Dvoracek leads the linebackers. He played for Rhule at Temple before coaching with the Owls, and Dvoracek also went on to be a part of Rhule's staffs at both Baylor and in the NFL.
- Defensive line coach Terrance Knighton spent the past two seasons working on Rhule's staff
 with the Panthers. Knighton owns the most accomplished playing career among Nebraska's
 coaches, starting 96 games during his seven-year career as an NFL defensive lineman.
- Ed Foley is also in his first season at Nebraska, serving as the Huskers' special teams coordinator.
 Foley is the most experienced member of the coaching staff, heading into his 35th year of
 coaching this fall. He has been with Rhule at each of his three previous stops, and Foley also
 has head coaching experience, leading Fordham for two seasons and twice serving as Temple's
 interim head coach.

10 POWER FIVE TEAMS ON HUSKER SCHEDULE

Nebraska will play three non-conference games and nine Big Ten contests in 2023. In the last year of the Big Ten divisional format, the Huskers will play each of the other six teams in the Big Ten West while taking on Maryland, Michigan and Michigan State from the Big Ten East.

- Nebraska opens its season with a conference matchup for just the 16th time in school history but for the fourth straight season.
- NU opens with back-to-back road games at Minnesota (Aug. 31) and Colorado (Sept. 9). The
 Huskers will begin a season with consecutive road games for the first time since 1995, when
 second-ranked NU won at Oklahoma State (64-21) and Michigan State (50-10).
- Among the 69 Power Five schools, Nebraska and Stanford are the only teams who play consecutive road games to open the 2023 season.
- The Huskers' first home game is Sept. 16 against Northern Illinois. Excluding the 2020 Covid season, the Sept. 16 date ties for Nebraska's latest home opener since 1981.
- Nebraska plays three games against opponents ranked in the preseason AP poll (No. 2 Michigan, No. 19 Wisconsin and No. 25 Iowa). The Huskers also face Minnesota and Illinois teams that are receiving votes in the AP top-25 poll.

MEMORIAL STADIUM CELEBRATES 100 YEARS

One of the most iconic venues in all of college sports reaches a milestone this fall as Nebraska's Memorial Stadium hits the 100-year mark. Nebraska will celebrate the anniversary of Memorial Stadium throughout the 2023 home season.

- Memorial Stadium was built at a cost of \$450,000 in 1923 and had an original capacity of 31.080.
- The first game in Memorial Stadium occurred on Oct. 13, 1923, with the official dedication of
 the stadium a week later when Nebraska hosted Kansas on Oct. 20, 1923. Memorial Stadium
 was dedicated to honor Nebraskans who served in the Civil War and the Spanish-American
 War, and Nebraskans who died in World War I. Later, the dedication was expanded to honor
 Nebraskans who died in World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War.
- Nebraska owns an all-time record of 428-147-13 at Memorial Stadium entering the 2023 season.
- The Huskers have posted 33 unbeaten seasons in Memorial Stadium history, most recently in 2016.
- Every game at Memorial Stadium since 1962 has been sold out, a streak of 389 consecutive games entering the 2023 season. The 389-game sellout streak spans nearly two-thirds of all games played at Memorial Stadium.
- Nebraska opens the 2023 season under the lights at Memorial Stadium against Northern Illinois
 on Sept. 16. The first night game in Memorial Stadium occurred in the 1986 season opener in a
 win over Florida State. Nebraska is 49-10 all-time in home night games.

TRANSFERS ADD EXPERIENCE TO NEBRASKA ROSTER

During the offseason, Nebraska added 63 newcomers to its roster. That number includes a large freshman class of 43, but adding experience to the roster are 20 first-year transfers.

- Fifteen of Nebraska's 20 first-year transfers are FBS transfers with three junior college transfers, one Division II transfer and one Division III transfer.
- The group of 15 FBS transfers includes 14 transfers from Power Five programs. Eleven players came to Lincoln with previous Power Five experience, combining for 252 games played and 87 starts in their careers.
- The transfers add considerable experience to the Husker offense. Arizona State transfer Ben Scott ranks second among all current Husker offensive players with 28 career starts while Virginia transfer wide receiver Billy Kemp IV is third with 25 career starts and Georgia Tech transfer quarterback Jeff Sims is fifth among current Husker offensive players with 23 career starts.

DUAL-THREAT SIMS SET TO START AT QUARTERBACK

Jeff Sims is expected to be Nebraska's starting quarterback Thursday at Minnesota. The first-year transfer has previous starting experience at Georgia Tech, where he started 23 games over the 2020, 2021 and 2022 seasons.

- Sims accounted for more than 5,600 yards of total offense in 24 career games at Georgia Tech, including an average of 233.7 yards in his 23 starts. He was a dual threat, passing for 4,464 yards and rushing for 1,152 yards.
- Sims enters the 2023 season as one of 14 active FBS quarterbacks with 4,000 career passing yards and 1,000 career rushing yards.
- In his career, Sims has posted three 300-yard passing games, nine 200-yard passing performances, two 100-yard rushing efforts and 13 games where he accounted for multiple touchdowns.
- In August, Sims was one of 35 FBS quarterbacks and four Big Ten signal callers named to the Davey O'Brien Award preseason watch list.

BUSCHINI ON RAY GUY AWARD WATCH LIST

Punter **Brian Buschini** was named to the Ray Guy Award Watch List in August, one of 50 FBS punters to make the list. Buschini is in his second season at Nebraska in 2023 after beginning his career at FCS Montana.

- Buschini averaged 44.0 yards per punt in his first season at Nebraska in 2022. That average ranked 25th nationally and eighth in Husker history.
- The 2021 FCS Punter of the Year at Montana, Buschini averages 45.0 yards per punt in his career.
 More than one-third of Buschini's 143 career punts have covered 50 or more yards, while more than one-third of his career punts have been placed inside the opponent's 20-yard line.
- Buschini wore No. 95 last season but he switched to No. 18 this fall. Buschini made the number switch after learning about the life of former Nebraska quarterback Brook Berringer. A two-time national champion who wore No. 18, Berringer was killed in a plane crash on April 18, 1996, less than four months after helping Nebraska to the 1995 national title. Berringer was an active member of the community and every year since 1997, Nebraska football players who serve the community are honored with an appointment to the Brook Berringer Citizenship Team.

KEMP RANKS AMONG ACTIVE LEADERS IN CAREER RECEPTIONS

Virginia transfer **Billy Kemp IV** enters his first season at Nebraska as one of the most experienced and accomplished receivers in the country. Kemp played in 50 games with 25 starts in five years at Virginia. He is eligible to play this fall after the NCAA granted all Cavalier football players in their final season of eligibility one additional year of eligibility in response to a shooting on the Charlottesville campus that killed three football players and led to the cancellation of the final two games of Virginia's season.

- Kemp caught 192 passes for 1,774 yards and eight touchdowns in his Virginia career. He ranked fourth all-time at Virginia in receptions and 10th in receiving yards.
- Kemp enters the season ranked sixth among all active FBS players with his 192 career receptions.

HUSKERS POSSESS VETERAN OFFENSIVE LINE

Arguably the most experienced unit on the Nebraska team is the offensive line. The group is also the only unit that does not have a new position coach in 2023, as **Donovan Raiola** was the lone full-time assistant on Nebraska's 2022 coaching staff to join Head Coach Matt Rhule's staff.

- Husker offensive linemen have combined for 120 career starts, including 92 starts at Nebraska.
 According to research compiled by West Virginia's Mike Montoro, Nebraska's 120 combined offensive line starts ranks as the 15th-most in the country entering the 2023 season.
- Bryce Benhart leads the way with 29 career starts, starting 29 of Nebraska's 32 games at right tackle the past three seasons. Turner Corcoran has started 24 of Nebraska's last 25 games including 23 straight with 19 starts at left tackle, three starts at left guard and two starts at right tackle. Ethan Piper has started 18 games at left guard the past three seasons.
- Benhart, Corcoran and Piper have started together on the offensive line 10 times in their careers.
 Nebraska boasts a 6-4 record in those 10 games.
- Bolstering the line is the addition of Arizona State transfer **Ben Scott** and the return of **Nouredin Nouili**. Scott, who was named to the preseason watch list for the Rimington Trophy, made 28 starts for the Sun Devils the past three seasons with starting experience at center (11 starts) and right tackle (17 starts). Nouili, who sat out the 2022 season, is back after he started the final seven games of the 2021 campaign at left guard.
- Teddy Prochazka (5 starts) and Henry Lutovsky (2 starts) have also started multiple games on the Husker offensive line. Prochazka emerged as a true freshman starter at left tackle midway through the 2021 before suffering a season-ending injury. He then started the first three games last season at left tackle before suffering another season-ending injury.

REIMER AIMS TO CLIMB NEBRASKA'S ALL-TIME TACKLES LIST

Linebacker **Luke Reimer** has been Nebraska's leading tackler each of the past two seasons, recording 194 tackles in 22 games during that stretch. In his career, Reimer has amassed 245 tackles with 4.0 sacks and 15.5 tackles for loss. In August, Reimer was one of 80 FBS players named to the Lombardi Award preseason watch list.

- With 245 career tackles, Reimer is the Big Ten's active career tackles leader (excluding transfers in their first season at a Big Ten school). Reimer is one of only three returning Big Ten players with 200 career tackles, and he is the only returning Big Ten player with 220 or more tackles.
- Reimer is looking to become the fourth Husker to lead Nebraska in tackles three straight seasons since complete tackle statistics are available beginning in 1965.

Sixteen Huskers are playing this season as college graduates, including 11 players who earned their degrees from Nebraska and five players who joined the Husker program as graduate transfers. In addition to the 16 players who have already graduated, 13 Huskers are on track to earn their degrees in December of 2023.

SINGLE-DIGIT NUMBERS AWARDED TO 'TOUGHEST' HUSKERS

In a tradition new to Nebraska but familiar to **Matt Rhule**, single-digit jersey numbers were awarded to the team's "toughest" players. The single-digit honorees were chosen through a players-only vote and the players then got to choose which single-digit number they wanted.

The tradition of single-digit numbers being reserved for the chosen few dates back to Rhule's time at Temple.

"I got really tired of having a guy in my program who had spent three years at like No. 47... wanted to wear No. 1 or No. 3, and he had earned it and we would give it to a recruit," Rhule said during the offseason. "What we decided was (numbers) 1-9, now 0-9, would go to the nine or now 10 'toughest' guys on the team. When I say 'toughest', we define that for the guys, but really the guys who best exemplify what it means to be a Cornhusker. To be accountable, to be dependable, to be tough, hard-working, competitive every single day."

The 10 players listed below were selected by their teammates to be worthy of having a single-digit number this season. In addition to the 10 players below, **Ethan Piper** was selected in the first round of team voting to earn a single-digit number, but NCAA rules prevent offensive linemen from wearing a single-digit number.

NEBRASKA AMONG TOP ALL-TIME PROGRAMS

Nebraska is playing its 134th football season this fall, and the Huskers have historically been one of the top programs in college football history.

- Nebraska ranks eighth in NCAA history with 912 wins and seventh with 53 all-time bowl game appearances.
- NU has won five national championships. The Huskers' four AP national titles (1970, 1971, 1994, 1995) rank seventh all-time and NU's four coaches poll titles (1971, 1994, 1995, 1997) rank fourth.
- Nebraska's 46 conference titles rank second in NCAA history.
- The success extends to the classroom as well. Nebraska football has produced more Academic All-Americans (108) and NCAA Top 10 Award winners (9) than any other team in any sport in NCAA history.

A LOOK AT NEBRASKA'S OFFENSIVE EXPERIENCE

Nebraska returns five starters on offense and four others who started at least one game last season. The Huskers must replace two starting linemen (center Trent Hixson and right guard Broc Bando) and their most productive wide receiver (Trey Palmer) and tight end (Travis Vokolek).

Up front, **Turner Corcoran** (12 starts in 2023), **Bryce Benhart** (11 starts) and **Ethan Piper** (8 starts) return as starters. Those three linemen have combined for 71 career starts at Nebraska. The Huskers also welcome back two more linemen who could be considered returning starters. **Teddy Prochazka** started the first three games of 2022 before suffering a season-ending injury. NU also brings back **Nouredin Nouili**, who started seven games in 2021 before sitting out last season. **Henry Lutovsky** also returns after starting two games at right guard in 2022.

Nebraska added more experience to the line with the addition of transfer **Ben Scott**, who started 28 games in his Arizona State career with starting experience at right tackle (17 starts) and center (11 starts). Georgia transfer **Jacob Hood** and Utah transfer **Tyler Knaak** are each in their first season at Nebraska after both redshirted as true freshmen in 2022 at their respective schools.

Nebraska's offensive linemen enter the 2023 season with 120 career starts between them, including 97 starts in a Husker uniform.

NU returns three running backs with starting experience who have combined for 1,807 rushing yards in a Husker uniform. That group is led by **Anthony Grant**, who started all 12 games in 2022 and rushed for 915 yards, the highest total by a Husker in four seasons. **Rahmir Johnson** has started seven games and rushed for 674 yards in his career, while **Gabe Ervin Jr.** has four starts and 218 rushing yards at Nebraska.

Nebraska also plans to utilize a fullback this season. The Huskers have five fullbacks listed on the roster, led by converted tight end **Janiran Bonner** and Notre Dame transfer **Barret Liebentritt.**

At wideout, **Marcus Washington** returns after starting 10 games in 2022. In his first year at NU, Washington was second on the team with 31 catches and 471 receiving yards, setting career highs in both categories. **Isaiah Garcia-Castaneda** is back after he caught five passes for 120 yards in the first four games last season before utilizing his redshirt season.

The Huskers also made some big additions to the wide receiver room in the offseason. **Billy Kemp IV** joined Nebraska for his sixth and final season as a college football player. He is the most experienced player on the roster after he played in 50 games with 25 starts at Virginia. Kemp caught 192 passes for 1,774 yards and eight touchdowns as a Cavalier, ranking fourth in school history in receptions and 10th in yards. He enters the 2023 season ranked fifth among all active FBS players with 192 career catches.

Joshua Fleeks is the second-most experienced player on the roster, as he played in 46 games with three starts at Baylor, catching 67 passes for 658 yards and three touchdowns while rushing for two scores.

At tight end, **Nate Boerkircher** is the only tight end on the roster who has caught a pass at Nebraska. Boerkircher made four starts last season and had six receptions for 52 yards and one touchdown. **Thomas Fidone II** looks for a breakout season after previously being limited by an injury

At quarterback, Georgia Tech transfer **Jeff Sims** is the favorite to replace Casey Thompson, who ranked in the top 10 in Nebraska history in passing yards and passing touchdowns in his lone season as the Husker starter in 2022. Sims started 23 games over three seasons with the Yellow Jackets. He completed 58 percent of his passes while throwing for 4,464 yards and 30 touchdowns and rushed for 1,152 yards and 11 scores. Sims is one of 14 active FBS quarterbacks with 4,000 career passing yards and 1,000 career rushing yards.

Chubba Purdy returns for his second season at Nebraska in 2023. Purdy is the only quarterback who has started a game for the Huskers, as he earned starts against Minnesota and Michigan in 2022.

A LOOK AT NEBRASKA'S DEFENSIVE EXPERIENCE

Nebraska returns seven starters from last season on defense, including five who started 10 or more games. The eight returning starters have combined for 112 starts at Nebraska.

Ty Robinson anchors the defensive line after he started all 12 games in 2022. Robinson has made 23 starts in his career and has recorded 51 tackles, 8.0 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks over the past two seasons. **Nash Hutmacher** (2 starts) is the only other returning defensive lineman with starting experience, while **Blaise Gunnerson** (15 games) and **Ru'Quan Buckley** (1 game) are the only other defensive linemen who have played in a game at Nebraska.

Nebraska added an impressive group of freshmen defensive linemen along with a pair of transfers. **Elijah Jeudy** joins the fold as a transfer from Texas A&M, where he played in three games over two seasons after joining the Aggies as a four-star recruit. Junior college transfer **Kai Wallin** is in his first season in Lincoln after he posted 33 tackles, 7.5 TFLs and 5.0 sacks in 10 games at American River Community College in 2022.

Veterans **Luke Reimer** and **Nick Henrich** return to lead the Husker linebacking corps. Reimer has started 27 career games and has led the Huskers in tackles the past two seasons (108 in 2021 and 86 in 2022). Reimer averages nearly nine tackles per game in his 27 career starts, and he enters the 2023 season in 15th place in Nebraska history with 246 career tackles.

Henrich has battled injuries throughout his career but has been a productive player when healthy. He started five games last season before suffering a season-ending injury. In his career, Henrich has started 18 games and recorded 163 tackles, including 99 tackles in 2021.

Also returning and looking to figure into the linebacker rotation are **Jimari Butler**, **John Bullock** and **Javin Wright**. Butler has played in 14 games in his Husker career, and he recorded nine tackles and 1.5 tackles for loss in 2022. Bullock has been a special teams standout while playing in 22 games the past two seasons, but he impressed the coaching staff with his work at linebacker during the spring season. Wright is a converted defensive back in his first season at linebacker who has played in 13 games with one start in his Husker career, totaling nine tackles.

SEC transfers **MJ Sherman** and **Chief Borders** bring more experience to the linebacker corps. Sherman played in 39 games the past three seasons at Georgia, playing in every game of back-to-back national championship seasons in 2021 and 2022. Sherman made 15 tackles in his Georgia career. Borders played in all 12 regular-season games at Florida in 2022, recording two tackles.

In the secondary, Nebraska returns both starting cornerbacks and safeties, as well as its starting nickel back. The experienced unit includes four of Nebraska's five leading returning tacklers. The secondary allowed fewer than 180 passing yards in each of the final five games of 2022.

At cornerback, **Quinton Newsome** and **Malcolm Hartzog** return as starters. Newsome started every game last season, and he enters the 2023 season with a streak of 24 consecutive starts. An honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection in 2022, Newsome has recorded 112 tackles in his career with 14 pass breakups. Hartzog earned a starting spot as a true freshman in 2022, starting the final eight games. He led Nebraska with three interceptions while totaling 22 tackles and two pass breakups. **Tommi Hill** gives Nebraska another cornerback with starting experience, as he started the Huskers' first five games at cornerback in 2022.

Isaac Gifford and **Omar Brown** also boast starting experience as versatile members of the secondary. Gifford started 10 games in 2022, including eight starts at nickel and two at safety. He recorded 70 tackles with three pass breakups last season. An FCS All-American at Northern Iowa, Brown played in every game in his first season at Nebraska in 2022.

At safety, Marques Buford Jr. started 11 games last fall, but he will be limited early this season while recovering from offseason surgery. Buford recorded 59 tackles in 2022, and he had two interceptions and three pass breakups before suffering a season-ending injury in the 11th game.

DeShon Singleton, Phalen Sanford, Javier Morton and **Tamon Lynum** all saw playing time in the Husker secondary in 2022. Florida transfer **Corey Collier** also played in five games in his two seasons as a member of the Gator secondary.

A LOOK AT NEBRASKA'S SPECIAL TEAMS EXPERIENCE

Nebraska returns its starting punter and place-kicker from last season, as well as its top kickoff returner. The Huskers must replace their kickoff specialist, punt returner and long snappers.

Brian Buschini averaged 44.0 yards per punt in 2022. His average ranked 25th nationally and was the eighth-best season average in school history. **Timmy Bleekrode** was 9-of-12 on field goals and he led the Huskers in scoring with 61 points.

Tommi Hill returned 12 kickoffs for 221 yards last season, leading NU in both categories. **Joshua Fleeks** and **Anthony Grant** also have experience as a kick returner. Fleeks has returned 41 kickoffs for 776 yards in his career, while Grant has returned 14 kickoffs for 294 yards. In the punt return game, **Billy Kemp IV** returned 63 punts for 367 yards during his Virginia career.

At long snapper, Florida transfer **Marco Ortiz** is in his first season at Nebraska after he played in 16 games with the Gators.

HOME OF THE HUSKERS



Memorial Stadium celebrates its 100th year in 2023. In the fall of 1922, a drive for \$430,000 in stadium construction funds was undertaken by faculty, students, alumni and friends of the University.

The stadium was named Memorial Stadium to honor all Nebraskans who served in the Civil and Spanish-American Wars; the 751 Nebraskans who died in World War I; the 3,839 in World War II; the 225 in Korea; the 422 in Vietnam; and those in Iraq.

Construction was completed in a few more than 90 working days and Memorial Stadium was dedicated on Oct. 20, 1923, at the Homecoming game in which Nebraska was held to a scoreless tie by Kansas.

The field at Memorial Stadium was named Tom Osborne Field - after the Huskers' legendary Hall-of-Fame coach - in 1998, one year after Osborne's retirement following 25 years and 255 victories as head coach.

2023 NEBRASKA SEASON NOTEBOOK

SCHEDULE NOTES

- Nebraska is scheduled to play three games against opponents ranked in the 2023 preseason AP poll. The Huskers take on Michigan (2nd) on Sept. 30, Wisconsin (19th) on Nov. 18 and Iowa (25th) on Nov. 24.
- In addition to the three preseason ranked opponents Nebraska will face Minnesota and Illinois, both of whom were among the teams receiving votes outside of the top 25.
- Nebraska plays a total of seven opponentss who played in a bowl game in 2022.
- The Huskers open the season with back-toback road games at Minnesota (Aug. 31) and Colorado (Sept. 9). Nebraska begins a season with consecutive road games for the first time since 1995. Nebraska and Stanford are the only two Power Five programs who open the 2023 season with back-to-back road games.
- Nebraska's first home game is Sept. 16 against Northern Illinois. Excluding the 2020 Covid season, the Sept. 16 date ties for Nebraska's latest home opener since 1981.
- The Huskers will recognize the 100-year anniversary of Memorial Stadium against Northwestern on Oct. 21. The first game played in Memorial Stadium was a 24-0 shutout of Oklahoma on Oct. 13, 1923.

COACHING STAFF NOTES

- Matt Rhule is in his first season at Nebraska in 2023. Rhule is in his 11th season as a head coach after previously leading programs at Temple (2013-16) and Baylor (2017-19) along with an NFL stint as head coach of the Carolina Panthers (2020-22).
- In his last full season at the collegiate level in 2019, Rhule was named the Sporting News National Coach of the Year and the Big 12 Coach of the Year after leading Baylor to appearances in the Big 12 Championship Game and the Sugar Bowl.
- Rhule built winning programs at Temple and Baylor. After laying the foundation in his first two seasons at each stop, Rhule guided both the Owls and Bears to a school-record win total in his third season, when both teams also played in the conference championship game.
- Seven Husker assistants previously coached on a Rhule staff: Marcus Satterfield (offensive coordinator), **Ed Foley** (special teams coordinator), **E.J. Barthel** (running backs), **Evan Cooper** (secondary/defensive pass game coordinator), Rob Dvoracek (linebackers), Terrance Knighton (defensive line) and Garret McGuire (wide receivers).
- Three Husker assistants are serving on a Rhule staff for the first time: Tony White (defensive coordinator), Josh Martin (tight ends) and Donovan Raiola (offensive line).
- Eight of Nebraska's 11 full-time coaches have experience coaching in the National Football League.

- The roster features 73 returning players and 64 newcomers. Nebraska returns a total of 14 starters and 36 letterwinners.
- Nebraska has added 20 transfers and 44 true freshmen since the end of the 2022 season. Among the 20 transfers are 15 FBS transfers. three junior college players, one Division II transfer and one Division III transfer.
- The Huskers added a total of 14 transfers from Power Five programs, including: Florida (3), Georgia (3), Arizona State (1), Baylor (1), Georgia Tech (1), Notre Dame (1), Ole Miss (1), Texas A&M (1), Utah (1) and Virginia (1).
- The roster features players from 28 states and two foreign countries (Canada & Germany).
- Nebraska has had a letterwinner from 47 of the 50 states in its history, missing only Idaho, New Hampshire and Rhode Island.
- States with multiple players on the Huskers' 2023 roster include: Nebraska (52), Texas (11), Georgia (9), Iowa (6), California (5), Florida (5), Arizona (4), New Jersey (4), Pennsylvania (4), Michigan (3), Minnesota (3), Missouri (3), South Dakota (3), Tennessee (3), Colorado (2), Illinois (2), Kansas (2), Louisiana (2), New York (2) and Virginia (2).
- The states of Alabama, Hawaii, Maryland, Mississippi, Montana, Oklahoma, Utah and Washington are each represented with one player on Nebraska's 2023 roster.
- The players wearing a single-digit jersey number (0-9) earned the right to wear that number through a team vote. Offensive lineman Ethan Piper was also selected to wear a single-digit number but NCAA rules prohibited him from wearing a single-digit number.

SCOUTING THE MINNESOTA GOPHERS



Minnesota finished the 2022 campaign with five wins in its last six games, including a 28-20 victory over Syracuse in the Bad Boy Mowers Pinstripe Bowl.

The Gophers must replace their top two running backs from last season. Mohamed Ibrahim was third nationally with 1,665 yards on the ground last season, while Trey Potts added 474 yards. The Gophers return Bryce Williams, who carried 51 times for 249 yards and three touchdowns in 2022.

In the passing game, Athan Kaliakmanis returns after completing 54 percent of his passes for 946 yards with

three touchdowns and four interceptions in 11 games last season. Minnesota returns its top two receiving targets in Daniel Jackson and Brevyn Spann-Ford. Jackson totaled 37 receptions for 557 yards and five scores, while Spann-Ford pulled in 42 grabs for 497 yards and two scores in 2022.

Defensively, Minnesota must replace Mariano Sori-Marin, who led the Gopher defense with 88 tackles and recorded six tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks last season. Cody Lindenberg is the Gophers' top returning tackler after he made 71 stops in 2022, while Danny Striggow returns after recording a team-high 3.5 sacks last season.

P.J. Fleck is in his seventh season as the head coach at Minnesota in 2023.

In his first six years, Fleck has recorded three seasons with nine wins or more. In 2019, Minnesota finished 11-2, the most wins for a Gopher team since 1904. Fleck was named the 2019 Big Ten Coach of the Year and was a National Coach of the Year finalist.

Fleck came to Minnesota after spending four years as the head coach at Western Michigan, where he was 30-22 overall and 21-11 in the Mid-American Conference. The Broncos were 1-11 in his first year in 2013 but went 13-1 in his final season in 2016, winning a conference title, plaing in the Cotton Bowl and earning a No. 12 ranking.

Prior to serving as a head coach, Fleck served as a wide receivers coach with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2012), Rutgers (2010-11), and Northern Illinois (2007-2009).

FLECK VS. NEBRASKA

Fleck will face Nebraska for the seventh time as a head coach on Thursday. He holds a 5-1 record against the Big Red.

Fleck last faced the Huskers in 2022, when Minnesota ventured to Lincoln. The Gophers rallied from a 10-point second-half deficit to claim a 20-13 victory.

MINNESOTA INFORMATION

Minnesota has fielded a football team since 1882, and the Golden Gophers have tallied more than 700 wins as a program. Minnesota claims seven national championships and 18 Big Ten Conference titles.

The Gophers were crowned national champions in 1904, 1934, 1935, 1936, 1940, 1941 and 1960. Minnesota has made 22 all-time bowl game appearances, posting a 10-12 record in bowl games.

A total of 24 Minnesota players and six Gopher head coaches are enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame.



Matt Rhule has a proven track record as a program builder. In his first two collegiate head coaching jobs at Temple (2013-16) and Baylor (2017-19), Rhule led both the Owls and the Bears to their most victories in school history in just his third season. He also took both teams to the conference championship game in year three.

Rhule took Temple from two wins in his first season to a school-record 10 victories in both his third and fourth seasons with an appearance in the conference championship game both seasons. He then took Baylor from one win in his first season to a school-record 11 victories in his third season and an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and the Sugar Bowl.

Over his last five collegiate seasons before taking the Nebraska job (2015-19), Rhule won one conference title, three division titles and produced three seasons with double-digit wins.

TAKING TEMPLE TO NEW HEIGHTS

In his tenure at Temple from 2013 to 2016, Rhule took the Owls to new heights.

- In Rhule's second season in 2014, Temple posted the program's first win over an SEC team since 1938, its first win over a ranked opponent in 16 seasons and the program's largest margin of victory in nearly 50 years.
- Rhule won 10 games in both 2015 and 2016. He is responsible for two of the three 10-win seasons in Temple's 124-year history.
- He also took the Owls to back-to-back bowl games in 2015 and 2016, the first time Temple played in a bowl in consecutive seasons.
- In 2015, Rhule led Temple to the American Athletic Conference Championship Game, the first conference title game in program history.
- The next season, Rhule guided the Owls to their second conference title in program history and the first in nearly 40 years.
- Temple has spent a total of 16 weeks ranked in the 87-year history of the Associated Press top-25 poll. More than half of those top-25 rankings (9) came under Rhule in 2015 and 2016.

AN ENCORE AT BAYLOR

At Temple, Rhule led the Owls to their highest season win total in program history, their first conference championship game appearance and an impressive run in the national rankings. He produced an encore by repeating each of those same feats in three seasons at Baylor.

- Baylor finished with 11 losses in Rhule's first season in 2017 but two years later, he guided the Bears to 11 wins in 2019. Baylor became the first Power Five program to go from 11 losses to 11 wins in two or fewer seasons.
- Baylor won its final two games of the 2018 season and its first nine games of the 2019 campaign. The 11 straight victories marked the second-longest winning streak in school history, while Baylor's 9-0 start in 2019 was the best start in program history.
- In 2019, Rhule led Baylor to its most wins (11) in school history, the Bears advanced to their first Big 12 Championship Game and played in the Sugar Bowl for only the second time in program history.
- Baylor finished with a No. 13 ranking in 2019, the Bears' second-highest final ranking since 1951.
