JEANNE SUTHERLAND

Head Coach (Second Season) Northern Iowa (1983)

Long-time collegiate head coach Jeanne Sutherland was named Nebraska's head coach on May 5, 2022. She originally joined the Husker program as an associate head coach on July 1, 2021.

In her first season leading the Big Red, Sutherland guided Nebraska to an NCAA Regional appearance after the Huskers claimed a top-25 national ranking midway through the fall season. Freshman Kelli Ann Strand led the Huskers on the course by claiming All-Big Ten honors.

Sutherland came to Nebraska after spending 10 seasons (2011-2021) as the head coach at SMU. She also spent 15 seasons as the head coach at Texas A&M (1992-2007).

In 2018, Sutherland was named the inaugural winner of the Women's Golf Coaches Association (WGCA) Kim Evans Award, presented annually to the college or high school coach, and Class A PGA Professional, whose support of the game through teaching, coaching and involvement in the community has helped ensure the continued growth of golf, and who represents the finest qualities the sport has to offer. Sutherland also earned the WGCA Founders Award in 2017.

In 2016-17, Sutherland led SMU to its fifth consecutive NCAA Regional berth after producing a runner-up finish at the American Athletic Conference Championship. She also guided the Mustangs to the highest ranking in program history (20th). Three Mustang golfers earned All-AAC honors in 2017.

SMU made an NCAA Regional trip in 2015-16 after producing three All-AAC golfers, including AAC Freshman of the Year Brigitte Dunne. Although SMU's streak of five NCAA Regional bids ended in 2016-17, Dunne advanced to play as an individual in both 2018 and 2019. She was joined in regional play in 2018 by Mustang teammate Faith Summers.

Sutherland guided the Mustangs to a 10th-place NCAA Regional finish in St. George, Utah in 2014-15, the second-best regional showing in program history. In SMU's first season in the American Athletic Conference (2013-14), Sutherland coached Jenny Hagland to the league's individual championship, before leading the Mustangs to an NCAA Regional berth in San Antonio. In 2012-13, Sutherland began a streak of taking five straight SMU teams to NCAA Regional play, as the Mustangs earned a spot at the Norman Regional.

Prior to her long stay at SMU's head coach, Sutherland spent 15 successful seasons at Texas A&M (1992-2007). A four-time conference coach of the year in Aggieland (3 Big 12, 1 Southwest), Sutherland was also a two-time NCAA Regional Coach of the Year (1997, 2007). She led 13 Texas A&M teams to NCAA Regional play in her 15 years in College Station.

Before Sutherland's arrival at A&M, the Aggies had not won a tournament in seven years. In 15 years, she led Texas A&M to 13 tournament crowns and three Big 12 Conference titles. In addition to the team's success, Sutherland's players earned three All-America honors, four individual conference titles, 22 regular-season individual titles, 25 all-conference accolades, three conference player-of-the-year awards, two newcomer-of-the-year honors, 17 WGCA Scholastic All-America honors and 50 academic all-conference selections.

Sutherland's Texas A&M teams were perennially ranked in the national top 25, including a highest national ranking of No. 14. She led the Aggies to four NCAA Championship appearances, taking 17th in 1997, 19th in 2006, 22nd in 2005, and 23rd in 2004.

Following her time with the Aggies, Sutherland stepped away from college golf for four years (2007-11) to serve as the Head Professional at the Vail Golf Club in Colorado. She had previously served as an Assistant Golf Professional at Vail for seven years (1985-92).

A PGA and WGCA member, Sutherland also has strong Midwestern ties. She earned her bachelor's degree in secondary education (English) from Northern Iowa in 1983, before earning her master's degree in athletic administration from Iowa in 1989.

A member of the University of Northern Iowa Athletic Hall of Fame, Sutherland was named to the 1981 AIAW Division II All-America Team and the 1981 and 1982 AIAW All-Region 6 teams. As a sophomore at the 1981 AIAW Division II National Championships, she grabbed a third-place individual finish and led the Panthers to a third-place team finish. As a junior, she led UNI to a fifth-place national finish, which included her 13th-place individual performance. A native of Dubuque, she is also a member of the Dubuque Senior High School Athletic Hall of Fame.





MATT ZEDRICK

Assistant Coach (Second Season)

Illinois State (2010)

Matt Zedrick came to Nebraska as an assistant coach after spending the 2021-22 season as an assistant at Chattanooga.

Zedrick joined Nebraska Head Coach Jeanne Sutherland's first Husker staff on June 1, 2022, and brought six seasons of head coaching experience at the NCAA Division I level with him to Lincoln.

In his first season in Lincoln, Zedrick made an instant impact, helping Nebraska capture an NCAA Regional bid after climbing into the top 25 in the national rankings midway through the fall campaign.

The Huskers claimed team tournament titles at both the Badger Invitational (Sept. 18-20, 2022) and the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 26-27, 2023) while adding runner-up finishes at the Green Wave Classic (Sept. 12-13, 2022), the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 10-11, 2022) and the FAU Paradise Invitational (Feb. 6-7, 2023), before advancing to the 2023 NCAA Raleigh Regional.

"We're very happy to add Matt to our staff," Sutherland said. "I've had the privilege to watch him coach over the years and I've always been impressed with his knowledge and ability to communicate with players. His skills in player development and strategy will really add to our ability to compete at the highest levels."

From 2015-16 to 2020-21, Zedrick guided the Purdue Fort Wayne women's golf program to one of the most successful stretches in program history.

His Mastodon teams rewrote virtually every school record on the course, including a 2020-21 team scoring average of 311.8. Purdue Fort Wayne's top golfers, Holly Anderson and Linnzie Richner set school records for 18, 36 and 54 holes, while Anderson claimed school records for the best season and career stroke averages. Anderson capped her career as a second-team All-Horizon League selection in 2020-21.

In addition to their success on the course, Zedrick's Mastodons claimed 19 WGCA All-America Scholar awards in his six seasons leading the program.

"I want to thank Coach Sutherland and Director of Athletics Trev Alberts for the opportunity to join Husker Nation and the women's golf program. My family and I are excited to get to Lincoln and get to work."

Prior to his time at Purdue Fort Wayne, Zedrick spent the 2014-15 season as the men's golf head coach at Garden City Community College in Kansas. He guided Skyler Tebo to an NJCAA Championship appearance in 2015. Tebo went on to compete at both UMKC and Fort Hays State.

Zedrick began his college coaching career in 2012-13 as the assistant women's golf coach at Marshall. He spent two seasons with the Herd women's golf team, helping Kristyn Morrone capture Conference USA Newcomer-of-the-Year honors. He also served as an assistant men's golf coach at Marshall in 2014.

Matt and his wife, Gwen, have two daughters, Sophia and Tillie. Originally from Danville, Ill., Matt earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Illinois State in 2010. He earned his master's degree in adult education from Marshall in 2014.

Matt's brother, Zac, is the associate men's golf coach at Notre Dame.

A veteran administrator and College Football Hall of Famer, Trev Alberts is in his third year as Vice Chancellor, Director of Athletics at the University of Nebraska in 2023-24. Alberts returned to his alma mater after spending 12 years at Nebraska-Omaha, guiding the program through a successful transition to the Division I level.

In his first season at Nebraska in 2021-22, Alberts helped the Huskers navigate the ever-changing landscape of Name, Image and Likeness guidelines for the benefit of Nebraska student-athletes. He led the development of the N-Vest Nebraska program to award \$5,980 per year to student-athletes who meet academic benchmarks. Alberts also spearheaded the charge to complete the fundraising for Nebraska's Go Big Project, which will provide Nebraska football with a new facility scheduled to open this fall. The project will also house academic, life skills, nutrition and support services for all Nebraska student-athletes.

A tireless worker who puts both the interests of student-athletes and fans first, Alberts helped orchestrate a qualitative survey of Nebraska's fan base to help shape the future of Memorial Stadium's game-day atmosphere. Alberts has also focused much of his time on developing the first strategic plan for Nebraska Athletics in 15 years. He has also committed himself to providing intense support and a unifying vision for Nebraska's coaches across all sports.

He continued to make a mark on Nebraska Athletics in his second year. Alberts conducted a thorough, nationwide search for a new leader for the Husker football program in the fall of 2022 that resulted in the hiring of Matt Rhule as Nebraska's new head coach. Rhule has a proven track record as a program builder at the college level, winning conference championships at both Temple and Baylor. Since his hiring, Rhule has energized the Nebraska fan base and attracted a top-25 recruiting class to the Husker program.

Alberts also spearheaded a new 15-year multimedia rights agreement between Nebraska Athletics and Playfly Sports, an emerging leader in sports marketing, media and technology. The partnership is one of the nation's most comprehensive multimedia rights agreements and has a total value of \$301 million for Nebraska over the life of the contract.

Nebraska's athletic achievements in 2022-23 included NCAA top-10 finishes by wrestling, rifle, bowling, women's outdoor track and field, men's gymnastics and men's indoor track and field. In all, 10 Husker teams posted top-20 national finishes, while the men's track team captured the Big Ten outdoor title under first-year coach Justin St. Clair.

Academically, Nebraska student-athletes continued to shine with a school-record 95 percent graduation rate across all sports for the second straight year. All of Nebraska's programs had at least an 88 percent GSR score in the most recent report.

Alberts' impact on college athletics stretches beyond the Nebraska campus. A respected leader at the Big Ten and national level, Alberts serves on both the NCAA's Division I Football Oversight Committee and the NCAA Division I Competition Committee.

Alberts' tenure leading UNO athletics was marked by successes in competition and in academics; by transitioning the university's athletic programs to NCAA Division I in 2011; and by establishing new homes for many UNO athletic teams, including Baxter Arena, the Maverick Park baseball/softball complex and the soccer pitch at Caniglia Field.

TREV ALBERTS

Vice Chancellor, Director of Athletics (Third Season) Nebraska (1993)

Alberts took the bold step in announcing that Omaha would reclassify from Division II to Division I in all sports in 2011 while simultaneously securing conference affiliation with the Summit League for all of the department's then-Division II programs. His vision for UNO's reclassifying teams was demonstrated even before the four-year transition period had ended. The Omaha baseball team won back-to-back Summit League regular-season championships in 2013 and 2014, while the men's basketball team made its first Division I postseason appearance in 2014 with a berth in the CollegeInsider.com Postseason Tournament.

During UNO's time in the Division I ranks under Alberts tenure, the Mavericks had six teams and four student-athletes qualify for the NCAA Tournament, including hockey advancing to the Frozen Four in 2015 and men's soccer reaching the second round of the NCAA Tournament in the spring of 2021. He also expanded opportunities, adding men's golf and men's soccer in 2011, and Omaha began a men's swimming and diving program in 2021-22.

Throughout his tenure in Omaha, Alberts was focused on enhancing the student-athlete experience, including the construction and staffing of the Hamilton Academic Excellence Room and the development of the Ethel S. Abbott Student-Athlete Development Wing. Those efforts paid off in Nebraska-Omaha student-athletes posting consistent collective semester grade point averages above 3.3 for 18 consecutive semesters, including at least a 3.5 in each of his final three semesters.

The facilities around Omaha Athletics received a major uplift during his tenure. Maverick Park opened in March of 2021 to rave reviews as the home to the Mavericks' baseball and softball programs. Funding for the complex, which includes a 1,500-seat baseball facility and a 650-seat softball facility, were raised privately and provided both programs a permanent on-campus home for the first time.

Another crowning achievement was the opening of Baxter Arena in 2015. Alberts directed efforts to secure community support and funding to build the on-campus arena, which allowed the nationally prominent hockey program to play on campus and also serve as the home of the men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. Caniglia Field underwent renovations in 2012, making it one of the finest collegiate soccer facilities in the country, highlighted by a FIFA 2-star rated playing surface and one of the largest LED videoboard in a soccer-only college facility.

Alberts' work on behalf of hockey, UNO's established Division I sport, also paid dividends. He successfully guided the Mavericks into the new National Collegiate Hockey Conference in 2013-14. The following year, Omaha reached the 2015 NCAA Frozen Four.

In addition, Alberts and his team led Omaha Athletics into a partnership with Learfield, a national leader in the marketing of collegiate athletics, and developed Omaha Sports Properties. As the exclusive corporate sponsorship sales unit for UNO Athletics,

Omaha Sports Properties further enhanced revenue and increased brand prominence locally, regionally and nationally.

As part of UNO's reclassification to Division I, Alberts oversaw the rebranding of UNO athletics with new primary and secondary logos and a greater focus on strengthening the Maverick brand both regionally and nationally.

As a student-athlete, Alberts was an All-American on and off the football field as a Husker Blackshirt. He was Nebraska's first Butkus Award winner in 1993, helping Coach Tom Osborne's Huskers to an undefeated regular season and an Orange Bowl appearance against Florida State. A first-team All-American by every major publication in 1993, he was also the Football News National Defensive Player of the Year, the Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year, and the Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year. His No. 34 jersey was retired at the 1994 Red-White Spring Game. In 2015, he was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame.

Off the field, Alberts earned the NCAA's highest honor, The Today's Top Six Award. A three-time Academic All-Big Eight honoree, he was an Academic All-American in 1993. He graduated from Nebraska before his senior season.

Alberts was the fifth pick in the 1994 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts and played for the Colts until 1996. Following his NFL career, he served as an analyst on college and professional football games for major national networks, including ESPN, CNN/SI and CBS Sports Network.

Alberts and his wife Angela have three children – Chase (and his wife, Cassie), Ashlynn and Breanna, and one grandson, Walker John.





MARQUITA ARMSTEAD

**Executive Associate A.D./SWA
Second Season
Mississippi State (2005)**

Marquita Armstead was hired as Nebraska's Executive Associate Athletic Director and Senior Woman Administrator on Dec. 16, 2021, and officially began her duties on Feb. 1, 2022. At Nebraska, Armstead has sport supervision for men's basketball and volleyball. She is a member of the Big Ten Sport Management Council, and has oversight of athletic medicine, sports psychology, the athletic performance lab (NAPL), strength and conditioning, performance nutrition, Title IX and gender equity.

Armstead came to Nebraska from the University of South Florida, where she served in a similar role. Armstead was a member of the South Florida athletics administration from March of 2016 to January of 2022. She originally joined USF as Associate Athletic Director for Compliance, before being elevated to Senior Associate Director of Athletics/Senior Woman Administrator in August of 2017.

In her role with the Bulls, Armstead served as the sport administrator for men's and women's basketball, and had previous sport oversight of softball, men's soccer, women's tennis and as the secondary sport administrator for football. Armstead also oversaw several USF student-athlete support departments, including academic services, student-athlete enhancement, sports medicine, nutrition, sport psychology, student rights and responsibilities and Title IX.

In addition to her work at USF, Armstead has a strong athletic administration background at four other schools. Before her time at South Florida, Armstead worked at Georgia Tech from 2012 to 2016, where she served as Director of Compliance for her final three years in Atlanta. Prior to Georgia Tech, Armstead was the Director of Compliance at the University of Tennessee Chattanooga for six years. She also served internships in compliance at Mississippi State and Ohio University.

Armstead earned her bachelor's degree from Mississippi State in 2005 and earned a master's of sports administration from the school in 2006. She received a Master of Business Administration degree from Tennessee Chattanooga in 2013 and is a 2012 NCAA Leadership Institute graduate.

Armstead is married to Demetric Armstead and the couple has a son, Braylon.



DR. LAWRENCE CHATTERS

**Executive Associate A.D./Strategic Initiatives
Third Season
Midland (2002)**

Dr. Lawrence Chatters currently serves as the Executive Associate Athletic Director for Strategic Initiatives. In addition to leading the department's diversity, equity and inclusion efforts, Dr. Chatters serves as a senior administrator advising the Director of Athletics. He also provides support to the Human Resources department, directs departmental professional and leadership development, and provides oversight of the implementation and progress of Nebraska Athletics' strategic plan. Chatters is the primary sports administrator for men's and women's golf, men's and women's gymnastics, wrestling and swimming and diving.

Most recently, Chatters served as Vice President of Student Affairs at Midland University and as the school's Chief Diversity Officer. Chatters oversaw residential life, mental health, student health and the academic success center on campus, and he was responsible for creating and implementing strategic initiatives to bring inclusive change on campus and in the community. He previously spent six years at Nebraska, working in a wide range of capacities, including positions within Nebraska Athletics as the Diversity and Inclusion Coordinator, and in the UNL Women's Center as the Men's Program Coordinator. He holds a Ph.D (2018) and a Masters' degree (2014) in counseling psychology from UNL.

As Nebraska's Diversity and Inclusion Coordinator, Chatters helped develop and implement Nebraska Athletics' diversity and inclusion strategic plan and played a crucial role in creating the Huskers' annual diversity and inclusion summit for NU Athletics staff and Husker student-athletes. He also provided inclusive outreach opportunities within the Lincoln community.

Prior to accepting the position at Midland, Dr. Chatters served as a postdoctoral fellow in the Center for Counseling and Psychological Services at Penn State University. He also served as an adjunct professor in the school's counselor education department.

Dr. Chatters has also worked as an academic advisor, course instructor and mental health counselor with focused efforts and experience in students' mental, social and emotional health, providing individual counseling, group counseling, inclusive outreach and crisis management. He also had success as a business owner and was the executive director of the Goldwin Foundation, an organization that raised funds for providing grants for National Children's Hospitals and other programs that focused on serving children with special medical needs.

Dr. Chatters graduated from Midland University in 2002 with a degree in psychology. He has been a licensed mental health practitioner since 2006.

ALVIN BANKS

Alvin Banks serves as an academic counselor and the coordinator of student-athlete development for Nebraska's Academic Performance Team. Banks began working as an academic counselor at Nebraska in 2003, after serving two years as an assistant academic counselor.

As Nebraska's coordinator of student-athlete development, he provides academic, athletic, personal and career counseling to all Husker student-athletes. As an academic counselor, he works primarily with the Nebraska men's and women's golf teams, the women's swimming and diving team and the wrestling team, while also assisting with the football team.

Before joining the Academic Performance Team, Banks served six years as a law enforcement officer for the City of Lincoln. He is currently a member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics.

Banks, who lettered in football at Nebraska during the 1991 season, earned his master's degree in vocational education in 1998, after receiving a bachelor's degree in business management in 1992 from Nebraska. Banks and his wife, Lisa, have two children, Kaylie and Darius.



LISA KOPECKY

**Director of Performance Nutrition
Sixth Season
Mount Marty (1995)**

Lisa Kopecky was named the director of performance nutrition in January of 2023 after serving as the assistant director of performance nutrition since September of 2018.

Kopecky is responsible for performance related fueling and medical nutrition therapy of student-athletes, as well as team nutrition education. She also works directly with the men's and women's golf, baseball, softball, men's and women's gymnastics and soccer programs.

Kopecky has practiced medical nutrition therapy and food service management in Nebraska and South Dakota for over 20 years. She previously served as the assistant coordinator of performance nutrition for the athletic department from 1998 to 2002.

Kopecky earned her bachelor's degree in nutrition and food science from Mount Marty College in 1995. She completed her dietetic internship at Oklahoma State in 1996 and earned a master's degree in nutrition from UNL in 2005.

Jeff Griesch is in his 21st season as media relations contact for the Nebraska women's golf program and his 29th season overall with Nebraska Athletics.

Griesch serves as the Senior Associate Communications Director, coordinating all aspects of media relations for the women's basketball and women's golf programs while also coordinating student assignments for Nebraska's sports.

Griesch hires and supervises the student assistants in the Athletic Communications Office, while also serving as the senior editor for all of Nebraska's media guides.

In addition to his supervisory roles, Griesch helps Associate Athletic Director Keith Mann in promoting the Nebraska football program, along with other office duties assigned by Mann.

Griesch enters his 26th season as a radio color commentator for Nebraska women's basketball in 2023-24. He also spent 11 seasons as the host of the Nebraska Women's Basketball TV Show.

He has served as Nebraska women's basketball contact at 12 NCAA Tournaments, including the first two NCAA Sweet 16 bids in school history (2010, 2013). He also has helped promote three first-round WNBA Draft picks (Lindsey Moore, Kelsey Griffin, Nicole Kubik) and two first-team WBCA All-Americans (Griffin, Jordan Hooper).

Griesch spent six years as an assistant director and two years as a graduate intern in the Media Relations Office, after starting his sports information career as a student in October of 1995.

In 2007-08, Griesch's Nebraska's women's basketball media and recruiting guide was voted the third-best guide in the nation. His women's golf guide also finished third in the national contest, the highest rankings in history for both of those publications.

Griesch's 1997-98 wrestling guide was voted "Best in the Nation" by Amateur Wrestling News and finished second in the College Sports Communicators publications contest. The Nebraska women's soccer guide finished in the top 10 four straight seasons, including a third-place finish in 2000. His 2003-04 women's basketball guide was voted "Best in the District" and 11th in the nation, after finishing 12th and winning "Best in the District" honors in 2001-02.

From 2000 to 2009, Nebraska's media and recruiting publications and posters earned nearly 200 national publication awards, with Griesch helping to coordinate the printing of those publications.

Griesch earned a bachelor's of journalism degree in news-editorial from Nebraska in 1996. He was the first two-time recipient of the Wylie Smith Postgraduate Scholarship and was a Regents Scholar as both an undergraduate and graduate student. He served a three-year term as the chair of the College Sports Communicators prestigious graduate and undergraduate scholarship committee, which has awarded hundreds of thousands of dollars to exceptional candidates in the media relations field since its inception.

Griesch and his wife, Emily, are originally from Wayne, Neb., and have a daughter, Hollan, and three sons, Jackson, Brennan and Isaac.

Chancellor Bennett came to Nebraska after nine years of successful leadership at the University of Southern Mississippi. During his tenure as president, USM was reclassified from a Carnegie R2 to an R1 university, signaling growth in research prestige and funding. Dr. Bennett also invested in programs to support student recruitment, retention and outcomes, including for the 30 percent of USM students who were first-generation. His efforts led to an improvement in the university's six-year graduation rate.

While at USM, Dr. Bennett established new faculty positions in high-growth areas and increased the average salary for full-time faculty; oversaw \$300 million in facilities work; and launched the largest fundraising campaign in the University of Southern Mississippi's history. He was a strong champion of the Division I athletics program, investing in new facilities and programs to support student-athletes, including a dedicated mental health counselor to serve student-athletes. Throughout his time as president, he brought a conservative approach to budget management,

meeting or exceeding the budgetary goals set by the Mississippi Institutions of Higher Learning Board of Trustees.

Prior to his role at the University of Southern Mississippi, Dr. Bennett served at the University of Georgia for more than a decade. He was the senior administrator for student programs and services for Georgia's 34,000-plus students; oversaw \$150 million in capital projects; and made key staff and programmatic investments in extracurriculars, mental health programs and other areas to better support students.

Dr. Bennett has also been the dean of students at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina, and associate dean of student life at Middle Tennessee State University.

Chancellor Bennett values community leadership and service. He has served on numerous boards, including the Mississippi Aquarium, Northeast Georgia Girl Scouts of America, Catholic Health East (Philadelphia), and St. Mary's Health Care System in Athens, Georgia. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and Past Sire Archon for Sigma Pi Phi fraternity, The Boulé.

Dr. Bennett earned a bachelor's degree in mass communication (1990), a master's degree in educational administration (1992), and an education specialist degree (1993) from Middle Tennessee State. He earned his Doctor of Education degree from Tennessee State University (1996).

He and his wife, Temple, are the parents of two adult daughters, Colby and Logan.

HUSKERS SHOOT FOR ANOTHER NCAA BERTH



Kelli Ann Strand returns for her sophomore season after earning All-Big Ten honors as a true freshman for the Huskers in 2022-23. Strand set the Nebraska season stroke average record (72.05), while powering the Big Red to a 2023 NCAA Regional appearance. She was also a WGCA Scholastic All-American.

The Nebraska women's golf team shoots for its third NCAA Regional appearance in the past four seasons, when the Huskers take aim at the 2023-24 campaign.

Coach Jeanne Sutherland, who led her 19th collegiate team to an NCAA Regional berth in her first season as Nebraska's head coach in 2022-23, thinks the Huskers can continue to improve in her second season in Lincoln.

"We have some strong golfers with some really good experience back to lead our team this season," Sutherland said. "Our seniors Lindsey Thiele and Michaela Vavrova have played a lot of golf as Huskers, and Kelli Ann Strand and Miu Takahashi had two of the best seasons in school history by underclass golfers a year ago. We have some of the pieces in place, but we will need to be committed to improving every day and building great team chemistry if we want to achieve our goals."

Although the Huskers must replace a five-year member of the lineup with the loss of Megan Whittaker to graduation, the cupboard is far from bare for the Big Red.

Five of Nebraska's top six golfers from 2022-23 return, including All-Big Ten performer Kelli Ann Strand. The sophomore from Challis, Idaho, smashed the Husker single-season record with her 72.05 stroke average while competing in every team round for the Big Red as a true freshman.

Strand opened the season by firing a school-record 202 (-14), including a Nebraska freshman-record 65 (-7) on her way to capturing an individual title at the Green Wave Classic. The second-team All-Big Ten choice ended her first season as a Husker with six top-10 tournament finishes, while tying for 20th at the Big Ten Championship before concluding the year with a tie for 30th at the NCAA Raleigh Regional.

After a strong summer that included appearances in the U.S. Women's Amateur and the Women's Western Amateur,

Strand is preparing to show growth as a sophomore.

Strand was joined at the 123rd U.S. Women's Amateur by teammate Miu Takahashi. The junior from Nasu-machi, Japan, finished with Nebraska's No. 3 stroke average last season, trailing only Strand and Whittaker. Takahashi's sophomore season featured three top-10 finishes, including an individual championship at the Dale McNamara Invitational. After producing a Nebraska sophomore record 73.49 stroke average for the Huskers, she claimed the Nebraska Women's Amateur Championship in the summer of 2023.

Senior Lindsey Thiele adds talent, experience and leadership for the Huskers on and off the course in 2023-24. The fourth-year golfer from Wahoo, Neb., posted a career-best 74.88 stroke average while competing in every round for the Big Red last season. A steady influence in the middle of the lineup with the ability to go low, Thiele notched seven top-35 finishes a year ago, including a season-best tie for eighth at the Green Wave Classic.

Thiele is also a three-time WGCA Scholastic All-American and one of the most active Huskers in the community. She follows in the footsteps of older sisters Haley and Hannah as Nebraska women's golf letterwinners.

Michaela Vavrova adds a fourth returning starter to Nebraska's lineup. The senior from Bojnice, Slovakia ranked fifth among the Huskers with a 75.80 stroke average last season. One of Nebraska's most experienced golfers, Vavrova was the 2022 Slovakian Player of the Year. She also owns more career collegiate rounds (83.5) than any other active Husker.

The Huskers also bring back Andrea Velez, who was regularly Nebraska's No. 5 or No. 6 golfer in 2022-23. Velez earned lineup spots at the Green Wave Classic, Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational, Lady Buckeye Invitational and the Big Ten Championship. She played in 26.5 rounds on the

season and posted a solid 76.91 stroke average. The junior from Pereira, Colombia hopes to put together her best season in 2023-24 to help solidify a spot in the Big Red lineup.

Third-year Huskers Lena Hassert (Kreuzau, Germany) and Brooke Bream (Phoenix, Ariz.) and redshirt freshman Sydney Harz (Freiburg, Germany) plan to push for spots in the Nebraska lineup along with true freshman Arden Louchheim. A three-time Utah Class 2A High School Champion, Louchheim captured the 2023 Utah Girls Amateur title over the summer. A two-time Girls Junior Americas Cup Team member, Louchheim was also a four-time participant at the IMG Junior World Championships.

"We're so pleased to sign Arden and have her join the Huskers," Sutherland said. "She is a very talented athlete and is focused on being the best player she can be in the future. Arden is also an excellent student and a wonderful person, so she will add to our team in many ways."

Nebraska's nine-player roster, which features golfers from five countries (Colombia, Germany, Japan, Slovakia, United States), will be challenged by an aggressive schedule in 2023-24.

The Huskers open the season at the Sam Golden Invitational at Oakmont Country Club in Corinth, Texas (Sept. 11-12), before traveling to East Lansing, Mich., for the Mary Fossum Invitational at Forest Akers West Golf Course. The trip to Michigan State could serve as a preview for the postseason, as the Spartans will host one of the five NCAA Regionals in early May. It will be Nebraska's first trip to the Mary Fossum Invitational since the fall of 2002.

The Big Red return to Oklahoma for the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 10-11) for the third consecutive season. Nebraska finished second in the 13-team field at Tulsa's tournament in the fall of 2021, before adding another runner-

up finish in a 13-team field in 2022. The 2023 edition will be held at the Golf Club of Oklahoma in Broken Arrow.

Nebraska closes its 2023 fall campaign by traveling to North Carolina for its first-ever appearance at the Landfall Tradition (Oct. 27-29), hosted by UNC Wilmington.

After competing against four challenging fields during the fall, the Huskers will prepare for a busy spring season that includes six tournaments and the Big Ten Championship.

Nebraska's spring season opens at the UCF Challenge at Eagle Creek Golf Club in Orlando, Fla. (Feb. 4-6), before the Huskers return to Florida for the Spartan Sun Coast Invitational at Palm Aire CC in Sarasota (Feb. 18-19).

The following week, Nebraska journeys to Peoria, Ariz., to defend its 2023 team championship at the Westbrook Spring Invitational at Westbrook Village Golf Club (Feb. 25-26).

The Huskers return to South Carolina for the third consecutive season to compete in the Briar's Creek Invitational hosted by the College of Charleston. Competition at the Golf Club at Briar's Creek on John's Island runs March 11-12, before the Huskers head back to the Sunshine State to compete in the Florida State Match Up at the Seminole Legacy Golf Club in Tallahassee (March 15-17).

The Big Red will take nearly a month-long break from competition to prepare for the Lady Buckeye Invitational at the Scarlet Course in Columbus, Ohio (April 13-14), as a final tune-up for the Big Ten Championship. The 2024 conference tournament will be held for the first time at Bulle Rock Golf Club in Havre de Grace, Md. (April 19-21).

NCAA Regionals are scheduled to be held in Auburn, Ala., College Station, Texas, East Lansing, Mich., Las Vegas, Nev., and Winston-Salem, N.C. (May 5-7), before the NCAA Championship moves to the Omni La Costa Resort and Spa Champions Course in Carlsbad, Calif. (May 16-21).



Lindsey Thiele enters her senior season at Nebraska as a three-time WGA Scholastic All-American. A three-year contributor in the lineup, Thiele was a CSC Academic All-District VII selection as a junior in 2022-23.

Wahoo, Nebraska (Bishop Neumann)

OUTLOOK (2023-24)

Lindsey Thiele (pronounced TEEL) enters her fourth season as a Husker hoping to help Nebraska advance to its third NCAA Regional appearance during her time in Lincoln.

As a junior in 2022-23, Thiele was an integral part of Nebraska's success. She produced a career-best 74.88 stroke average, which ranked fourth among the Huskers, while competing in all 38.5 rounds. She helped the Big Red claim an NCAA Central Regional berth while slashing two strokes per round off her average from her sophomore campaign.

Thiele is also a star in the classroom as a three-time WGCA Scholastic All-American and a College Sports Communicators Academic All-District selection in 2023. She is a two-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and also one of Nebraska's most active student-athletes in community service across all sports.

During the summer of 2023, Thiele participated in the Nebraska Athletics No Filter Service Trip to Panama, before winning the Nebraska Women's Match Play Championship.

Thiele followed in the footsteps of her older sisters, Haley (2015-20) and Hannah (2018-21), who were also letterwinners and WGCA Scholastic All-Americans at Nebraska.

JUNIOR (2022-23)

Thiele helped Nebraska to its second NCAA Regional appearance in the past three seasons by competing in all 38.5 rounds for the Huskers in 2022-23. The junior from Wahoo produced Nebraska's No. 4 stroke average on the season with a career-best 74.88 - a two-stroke improvement per round from 2021-22 (76.89). Her 74.88 stroke average also ranked No. 2 among juniors in Nebraska history, trailing only All-American and Big Ten Champion Kate Smith's 73.52 in 2018-19.

Thiele was Nebraska's No. 2 finisher at the 2023 Big Ten Championship, tying for 34th at 228 (74-75-78) on the par-71, 6,045-yard layout at the Fox Chapel Golf Club in Pittsburgh, Pa. She capped her third season as a Husker by tying for 47th at the NCAA Raleigh Regional with a 230 (76-76-78) on the par-72, 6,324-yard layout at the Lonnie Poole Golf Club.

She opened her third season as a Husker with a career-best 209 (-7) to notch her second career top-10 finish at the Green Wave Classic in New Orleans (Sept. 12-13). Thiele's strong performance on the 6,158-yard layout of the Bayou Oaks South Course included three rounds better than par, including a career-best 69 (-3) in the first round. Thiele, who added back-to-back rounds of 70 to close the tournament, helped the Huskers to the best team score in school history (835, -29) and a runner-up team finish in New Orleans.

She continued her solid play by tying for 31st in a 75-player field to help Nebraska to the tournament title at the Badger Invitational (Sept. 18-20). Thiele put together strong rounds of 73, 75 and 75 to close at 223 on the 6,248-yard layout at the University Ridge Golf Course in Wisconsin.

Thiele added a tie for 30th (226) in another 75-player event to help the Huskers to a runner-up team finish at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 10-11). Thiele's final-round 72 (E) capped a tournament-best 280 (-8) for the Huskers, who fell just one stroke short of the team title.

She contributed a fourth consecutive top-35 finish by tying for 26th (195) at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational (Oct. 17-18). In challenging weather and scoring conditions that eventually led to the shortening of the tournament to 27 holes, Thiele put together one of Nebraska's best rounds with a 74 in the second round.

Thiele closed the fall with tie for 37th (220) at the Hurricane Invitational in Coral Gables, Fla. (Oct. 31-Nov. 1). Her performance included an even-par 72 in the second round on the 6,162-yard layout at the Biltmore Golf Club.

She opened the spring with a three-round total of 225 (79-71-75) to tie for 51st at the FAU Paradise Invitational in Boca Raton, Fla. (Feb. 6-7). Her performance included a second-round 71 (-1) that helped Nebraska earn a runner-up team finish, trailing only No. 19 Vanderbilt, in a 14-team field that featured 11 top-100 teams.

Thiele notched her second top-25 finish of 2022-23 by firing a 217 (+1) over three rounds to help Nebraska to the Westbrook Spring Invitational team title in Arizona (Feb. 26-27). Thiele fired a career-best-tying 69 (-3) in the second round between rounds of 74 in the first and third rounds. Thiele's performance helped the Huskers finish at 843 (-21) to outclass a 14-team field that featured 12 top-100 teams including No. 24 Ohio State.

She contributed a tie for 41st in a 90-player field at the Briar's Creek Invitational in South Carolina (March 13-14). Thiele covered the 54 holes on the par-72, 6,152-yard layout of The Golf Club at Briar's Creek in 224 (73-75-76). She added a three-round score of 228 (71-81-76) at the Mountain View Collegiate (March 17-19) to finish 83rd in a loaded field in Tucson, Ariz.

Thiele collected her sixth top-35 finish of the season by tying for 31st at 222 (73-77-72) at The Bruzzy in Ardmore, Okla. (April 1-2). Her performance on the par-70, 5,976-yard layout at the Dornick Hills Golf & Country Club helped Nebraska to a pair of wins over top-40 teams (Houston, TCU) in a 15-team field that featured 14 top-100 foes.

She managed a tie for 75th with a 236 (80-77-79) at the Lady Buckeye Invitational (April 15-16).

SOPHOMORE (2021-22)

Thiele unleashed the best performance of her collegiate career, sharing the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational individual title with teammate Nicole Hansen (Sept. 20-21). Thiele finished the 54-hole event with a season-best 219 (+3) that included her first two rounds better than par as a collegian. She opened the tournament with a season-best 70 (-2) before adding a 71 (-1) in the second round to head to the final round atop the leader board in the 62-player field. She managed a 78 in the final round on the par-72, 6,221-yard layout at Colbert Hills Golf Club.

With Thiele and Hansen leading the way, Nebraska's four-player "B" lineup won the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower team title, becoming the first Husker team in 11 all-time trips to the tournament to come away with a trophy. The "B" team finished with a three-round total of 885, six strokes ahead of runner-up Sam Houston (891). Thiele and Hansen also shared Big Ten Co-Golfer-of-the-Week honors (Sept. 22).

Thiele capped a strong fall by showing continued improvement, tying for 21st with a four-over-par 222 (74-74-74) while playing as an individual outside Nebraska's lineup at the White Sands Intercollegiate in the Bahamas (Oct. 22-24). It marked her second top-25 finish of the fall and allowed her to finish with a 76.80 stroke average over 15 rounds - a 3.33 strokes per round improvement compared to spring 2021.

Following her tournament title at Kansas State, Thiele played out of the top spot in NU's lineup at The Molly Collegiate in Seaside, Calif. (Sept. 27-28). She closed as Nebraska's No. 4 finisher with a three-round total of 240 (84-79-77) in a tie for 67th in an 83-player field at the Bayonet Golf Club.

She traveled with the Huskers to the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 11-12), competing as an individual outside the Husker lineup. Thiele finished 59th with a three-round total of 234 that included solid and consistent rounds of 77, 79 and 78 on the 6,200-yard layout at The Golf Club of Oklahoma in Broken Arrow.

Thiele opened her second season at Nebraska by earning a lineup spot at the Wolverine Invitational (Sept. 13-14). She was NU's No. 4 finisher at the 16-team event that included 12 teams that advanced to 2021 NCAA Regional play. She closed with a 54-hole score of 237 that included a second-round 77 (+6) on the par-71, 6,232-yard layout of the University of Michigan Golf Course in Ann Arbor. She finished 76th individually in the 90-player field.

She opened the spring season by going 0-1 at the Big Ten Match Play (Jan. 31-Feb. 1). Thiele earned her first lineup spot of the spring and tied for third among the Huskers with a 232 (76-76-80) to tie for 70th overall at the Briar's Creek Invitational in John's Island, S.C. (March 14-15).

FRESHMAN (2020-21)

Thiele produced the best tournament performance of her young career at the Allstate Sugar Bowl Intercollegiate (March 14-16). She notched a season-best tie for 23rd with a then-season-best three-round total of 229 (74-83-72) to help Nebraska to its first team tournament title since the spring of 2019. Her final-round 72 was a season best.

Thiele opened her competitive career in the Husker lineup as Nebraska's No. 2 individual finisher at the SMU Trinity Forest Invitational in Dallas (Feb. 1-2). Thiele tied for 43rd individually in a talent-rich field with a three-round total of 232 (76-82-74).

She returned to the Husker lineup in the second tournament of the spring at the Bruin Wave Invitational in Somis, Calif. In extremely challenging scoring conditions, Thiele tied for 67th in an 82-golfer field with a 252.

Thiele managed a 248 (85-78-85) at the Indiana Spring Invitational (April 17-18) to tie for 94th individually, before participating as Nebraska's No. 6 golfer in the six-count-four format at the 2021 Big Ten Championship. Thiele tied for 74th individually with a three-round total of 241 (81-79-81), as Nebraska tied for second to produce its best finish at a conference tournament since 1984 (2nd, Big Eight).

She closed her first collegiate season with an 80.13 stroke average over 15 spring rounds.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Thiele produced a solid summer that included a runner-up finish at the 2020 Nebraska Women's Amateur at the Country Club of Lincoln in early August. Thiele finished the three-round tournament at 215 (71-73-71, -1). The tournament field included Huskers Kirsten Baete, Nicole Hansen, Noor Ahmed, Jessica Haraden, Hannah Thiele and Megan Whittaker, who all finished in the top 12.

A strong all-around athlete, Thiele finished sixth individually at the 2019 Class B Boys State Golf Championship. She helped the Bishop Neumann boys team to a Class B state tournament appearance as a junior. Her eighth-place district finish helped Neumann finish second at districts to qualify for state. As a sophomore in the spring of 2018, Thiele was a Class C boys individual district champion while helping Bishop Neumann to a district runner-up finish and an appearance at the state tournament.

As a junior golfer, Thiele qualified for the 2019 PGA Girls Junior National Tournament at Keney Park Golf Club in Hartford, Conn. She won the 2019 Nebraska Girls Junior PGA Championship at Indian Trails Country Club in Beemer and the 2019 Hale Irwin AJGA Preview at Walnut Creek in Westminster, Colo. She was also the runner-up at the 2019 John Deere Classic at TPC Deere Run in Silvis, Ill. Thiele also placed third at the 2019 USGA Nebraska Junior Girls Qualifier at Wild Horse Golf Club in Gothenburg.

Before high school, Thiele qualified for the 2016 Optimist International Golf Tournament at PGA National Resort in Palm Beach Gardens, Fla., by winning the Nebraska Girls Junior Optimist Qualifier. As a seventh grader, she was the 2015 Girls Junior PGA Champion (Ages 13-15).

Thiele was also an outstanding basketball and volleyball player at Bishop Neumann. As a junior in basketball in 2019,

Thiele earned a spot on the Class C1 All-Tournament team by leading Neumann to the Class C1 state title. She earned second-team Class C1 all-state honors from the Lincoln Journal Star. She was an honorable-mention all-state selection in basketball as a freshman, sophomore and senior. Thiele helped Bishop Neumann to a runner-up finish at state in 2018, after the team finished third at state her freshman season. Thiele was also honorable-mention Class C1 in volleyball as a freshman, sophomore and junior, and helped the Cavaliers to the state tournament in 2019.

A standout in the classroom, Thiele carried a 4.0 GPA and was the student body president and a class president for three years at Bishop Neumann. She was a four-year member of the student council and was involved in many different clubs and volunteer activities.

PERSONAL

The daughter of Kevin and Lisa Thiele, Lindsey has two younger sisters, Lauren and Brooke, and two older sisters, Haley and Hannah. A psychology major, Lindsey is a three-time WGA Scholastic All-American. A two-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and a two-time Academic All-Big Ten selection, Thiele was a 2023 College Sports Communicators Academic All-District VII choice. She is a six-time member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll.

Thiele participated in the Nebraska Athletics No Filter Service Trip to Panama in May of 2023. She also earned a prestigious Sam Foltz 27 Hero Leadership Award in 2022. She is a three-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

Lindsey chose Nebraska over Missouri, Iowa, Oklahoma, Kansas State, Northern Illinois, Evansville and Wyoming.

"There is something about being able to say that 'I am a Husker' that makes me beyond excited for the future," Thiele said. "From academically to athletically, this University has it all, and I am so honored and humbled to have the opportunity to be a part of this great school and team."

MICHAELA VAVROVA

Senior (Three Letters)

Bojnice, Slovakia (Slovak National Team)

OUTLOOK (2023-24)

The first Slovakian women's golfer in Husker history, Michaela Vavrova has been a leader and consistent performer for three seasons in the lineup, helping Nebraska to a pair of NCAA Regional berths in 2021 and 2023.

She enters her senior season with the No. 8 career stroke average (76.12) in school history after competing in 83.5 rounds in her first three seasons in Lincoln. Vavrova owns nine career top-25 finishes and has competed for the Huskers at the Big Ten Championship all three seasons, including a 17th-place finish in 2022.

JUNIOR (2022-23)

Vavrova capped her junior season with a tie for 47th at the NCAA Raleigh Regional with a 230 (78-76-76) on the par-72, 6,324-yard layout at the Lonnie Poole Golf Course. She finished with a career-best 75.80 stroke average that ranked No. 5 among juniors in Nebraska history. She also tied for 58th at the Big Ten Championship with a 233 on the par-71, 6,045-yard layout at the Fox Chapel Golf Club in Pittsburgh, Pa. (April 21-23). She was Nebraska's No. 4 finisher at the conference tournament.

Vavrova made her first appearance of 2022-23 by competing as Nebraska's No. 5 golfer at the Badger Invitational (Sept. 18-20). She put together solid rounds of 75-75-74 to finish with a three-round total of 224 to help the Huskers to the tournament title. Vavrova tied for 34th individually while helping the Huskers post an 863 (-1) team score on a 6,248-yard layout at the University Ridge Golf Course in Wisconsin.

She notched her first top-25 finish of the season by tying for 22nd with teammate Megan Whittaker at the Dale McNamara Invitational in Broken Arrow, Okla. (Oct. 10-11). Vavrova closed the tournament with a then-career-best third-round score of 70 (-2). She helped the Huskers to a runner-up finish at the Dale McNamara Invitational, falling by just one stroke to the team champs from Tulsa on the 6,302-yard layout of the Cedar Ridge Country Club.

Originally slated to be in Nebraska's five-player lineup at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational, Vavrova was moved into a role as an individual competing outside the Husker lineup while battling a health issue in Lawrence. She managed a tie for 60th (201) in challenging scoring and weather conditions that eventually shortened the tournament to just 27 holes.

She closed the fall strong with a tie for 32nd with a season-best 219 (+3) at the Hurricane Invitational in Coral Gables, Fla. (Oct. 31-Nov. 1). Vavrova's performance on the 6,162-yard layout at the Biltmore Golf Club included a career-best-matching final-round 70 (-2).

Vavrova opened the spring with a 226 (72-77-77) to tie for 53rd at the FAU Paradise Invitational in Boca Raton, Fla. (Feb. 6-7). Vavrova's opening-round 72 (E) helped the Huskers to a runner-up team finish, trailing only No. 19 Vanderbilt, in a 14-team field that featured 11 top-100 teams.

She fired a career-best 66 (-6) in the final round of the Westbrook Spring Invitational to fly 30 spots up the leader board on the final day of competition to tie for 20th with a career-best 216 (E). Vavrova's performance helped the Huskers capture the team title in a 14-team field that featured 12 top-100 teams, including No. 24 Ohio State.

Vavrova managed a 237 (79-77-81) to finish 77th at the Lady Buckeye Invitational (April 15-16). She tied for 55th with a 227 (74-80-73) at The Bruzzi in Ardmore, Okla. (April 1-2). Vavrova's final-round 73 helped the Huskers take sixth in a loaded field that featured 14 top-100 teams on the par-70, 5,976-yard layout at the Dornick Hills Golf & Country Club.

She also tied for 79th in a 90-player field at the Briar's Creek Invitational in South Carolina (March 13-14) and added a tie for 63rd with a 220 (73-72-75) at the Mountain View Collegiate in Tucson, Ariz. (March 17-19).

Vavrova capped a strong summer of 2022 by competing for Slovakia at the Women's Amateur Team Championships in Paris

in late-August. She was the top Slovakian finisher (three-player lineup) in the tournament that featured 56 of the world's best teams. She was named the 2022 Slovakian Women's Player of the Year in February of 2023.

Vavrova was named a Big Ten Golfer to Watch for the second straight season prior to 2022-23, joining Husker teammates Megan Whittaker and Kelli Ann Strand on the list announced on Aug. 31, 2022.

SOPHOMORE (2021-22)

Vavrova continued as one of Nebraska's top players as a sophomore in 2021-22. She closed her second season at Nebraska by tying for 17th at the 2022 Big Ten Championship. She opened the conference tournament with a then-career-best 68 (-3) to sit atop the leader board after the first 18 holes. She added a 73 (+2) in the second round to remain in the top five heading into the final 18 holes of competition at the Fox Chapel Golf Club in Pittsburgh, before closing the tournament with a three-round total of 220 (+7).

Vavrova competed in 27 rounds for the Huskers throughout the season and finished with a 76.37 stroke average. She ended the season with four top-25 individual finishes, including a pair of top-10 showings.

Vavrova capped a strong fall of 2021 by tying for 10th with a career-best-tying 217 (+1) to help Nebraska to a runner-up team finish at the White Sands Intercollegiate in the Bahamas (Oct. 22-24). Her performance on the 6,415-yard layout of the Ocean Club at Paradise Island included a then-career-best 69 (-3) in the second round, sandwiched between rounds of 74. Her 69 was part of a season-best 280 (-8) in the second round for the Big Red in the Bahamas. Her overall performance was her second top-10 finish of the fall and the fifth top-25 finish of her young career.

She stormed to her first collegiate tournament title with a then-career-best 217 (+1) over three rounds at Indian Creek in Elkhorn, Neb. (Oct. 4-5). Her performance included a 71 (-1) in the second round and an even-par 72 in the final round, after opening with a solid 74 on the 5,988-yard layout. Her effort at the Stampede earned her the first Big Ten Golfer-of-the-Week award of her career (Oct. 6).

Her performance in Elkhorn propelled her back into Nebraska's lineup for the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 11-12), where she helped the Huskers to a runner-up team finish in a 13-team field by tying for 56th individually. Her three-round total of 233 included a final-round 74 (+2) on the 6,200-yard layout at The Golf Club of Oklahoma.

Vavrova opened her second season in the lineup at the Wolverine Invitational in Ann Arbor, Mich. (Sept. 13-14). She tied for 65th (233) in a loaded 16-team field that included 12 teams that advanced to 2021 NCAA Regional play. Her second-round 75 (+4) was a season best. She earned a second lineup spot for the Huskers at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational in Manhattan, Kan. (Sept. 20-21), finishing 42nd (235) in a 62-player field. She did not compete at The Molly Collegiate (Sept. 27-28).

Her 75.67 stroke average over 15 fall rounds ranked fourth among the Huskers.

She opened the spring by going 0-1-2 at the Big Ten Match Play (Jan. 31-Feb. 1), before finishing 84th at the Tulane Classic with a three-round total of 253. Vavrova bounced back with a 219 (76-69-74) at the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 27-28) that included a career-best-tying 69 (-3) in the second round. She tied for 30th individually with teammate Miu Takahashi in Arizona to help the Huskers to a runner-up finish in a loaded 14-team field. She did not compete at the Briar's Creek Invitational (March 14-15), but returned to Nebraska's lineup at the Lady Buckeye Spring Invitational (April 15-16). She tied for 25th with a 235 (83-77-75) in challenging scoring conditions against a strong field at the Scarlet Course in Columbus, Ohio.



FRESHMAN (2020-21)

In her first season of collegiate golf, Vavrova proved herself as one of Nebraska's top golfers, competing in all 21 rounds in the lineup during the spring of 2021. She capped her true freshman year as NU's No. 2 individual finisher at the NCAA Columbus Regional, tying for 45th with a three-round score of 229 (78-75-76) on the 6,358-yard, par-72 layout of Ohio State's Scarlet Course.

Vavrova was instrumental in propelling the Huskers to their first NCAA Regional appearance since 2008, by producing Nebraska's No. 5 individual finish at the 2021 Big Ten Championship. She finished in a tie for 33rd in the 78-player field with a three-round total of 224 (76-75-73) on the 6,300-yard, par-72 layout at TPC River's Bend in Maineville, Ohio. Her final-round 73 helped the Huskers to a season-best 281 (-7) on championship Sunday, allowing Nebraska to secure a tie for second.

NU's team performance marked its best-ever Big Ten finish and the best conference finish by a Husker women's golf team since taking second at the 1984 Big Eight Championship.

Vavrova produced a breakthrough performance at the Arizona Wildcat Invitational in Tucson (March 8-9), matching Kate Smith for the team's top individual score with a then-career-best three-round total of 219. Vavrova's effort in Arizona included a then-career-best 70 (-2) in the second round.

She followed with her first career top-20 finish at the Allstate Sugar Bowl Intercollegiate (March 14-16). Her three-round score of 228 included three consistent rounds of 76 in challenging scoring conditions at the English Turn Golf and Country Club in New Orleans. Vavrova's steady play helped the Huskers capture their first team tournament title since the spring of 2019.

Vavrova added a second consecutive top-20 finish with her season-best tie for 19th at the Indiana Spring Invitational (April 17-18). In a loaded 98-player field, Vavrova totaled 221 (74-75-72) including an even-par final round to help the Huskers tie for sixth in a 16-team field that featured 14 top-100 teams.

She finished with NU's No. 4 stroke average (76.33) through 21 rounds. She shot 76 or better in 14 of her final 15 rounds of the season.

Vavrova opened her collegiate career at Nebraska by earning a lineup spot at the season-opening SMU Trinity Forest Invitational in Dallas (Feb. 1-2). She finished as the No. 4 Husker at the event with a three-round total of 237 (80-79-78) to tie for 55th in a loaded 14-team field. Vavrova earned her second lineup spot at the Bruin Wave Invitational, where she was Nebraska's No. 4 finisher with a three-round total of 245 in extremely challenging scoring conditions. Vavrova shot a 77 (+5) in the final round to help the Huskers climb the leader board in a talent-rich 15-team field. She took 49th overall in an 82-player field.

During the fall season, Vavrova finished as the No. 2 female at the Wells Fargo Nebraska Open in Lincoln, trailing only teammate Alice Duan at the event. The Nebraska Open featured top professionals and men's collegiate players across the Cornhusker state, and Vavrova and Duan made the cut to compete in the championship round against the men at the event.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

A member of the Slovakian National Team since 2016, Vavrova joined the Slovakian Elite National Team in 2021. She has represented Slovakia three times at the European Championships.

In addition to several victories in junior tournaments in Slovakia, Vavrova has an extensive international background, competing in many tournaments in Italy and such events as the ANNKA Invitational Europe and the European Girls' Team Championship in Sweden, the Duke of York Young Champions Trophy in England, the Helen Holm Scottish Women's Open, the European Ladies' Team Championship, the Austrian Stroke Play U21 and the Junior Orange Bowl International, Doral Publix Junior Classic and the IMG Academy Junior World Championship in the United States.

PERSONAL

The daughter of Angelika Vavrova and Igor Vavro, Michaela was born Oct. 10, 2000, in Bratislava, Slovakia. She has a younger sister, Zuzana. Michaela, who is a hospitality, restaurant and tourism management major, is a two-time Academic All-Big Ten selection. She is a six-time member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. She also earned spots on the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2022 and 2023.

She began playing golf at the age of 9, and credits much of her success and commitment in the game to her grandfather, who has served as a coach, caddy and all-around support system as a golfer.

"My first feelings about Lincoln and the University of Nebraska were amazing. Everything is so nice, safe and clean," Vavrova said. "I really like the system and program for students the university has. It is very important for me to have friendly, helpful and nice people around me, and I met a lot of them during my official visit."



MIU TAKAHASHI

Junior (Two Letters)

Nasu-machi, Japan (Kaishi Kokusai)

OUTLOOK (2023-24)

One of the top young golfers in Japan, Miu Takahashi could contend for All-Big Ten honors as a junior in 2023-24. Takahashi set the Nebraska sophomore season stroke average record in 2022-23 while helping the Huskers claim an NCAA Regional appearance for the second time in three seasons. She enjoyed a strong summer of 2023, capturing the Nebraska Women's Amateur Championship and qualifying for the U.S. Women's Amateur alongside teammate Kelli Ann Strand.

SOPHOMORE (2022-23)

Takahashi was one of Nebraska's top golfers as a sophomore in 2022-23, helping the Huskers to an NCAA Raleigh Regional appearance.

Takahashi set the Nebraska sophomore stroke average record (73.49) and capped her second season in Lincoln with a tie for 42nd at the NCAA Raleigh Regional with a 226 (+10), including an opening-round 74 and a final-round 73 on the par-72, 6,324-yard layout at the Lonnie Poole Golf Club.

Takahashi captured her first career collegiate individual title by posting a then-career-best 213 (-3) in a 75-player field at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 10-11). She closed with a career-best final-round 69 (-3), taking the title after entering the final round in a tie for sixth at even-par 144 (71-73) on the 6,302-yard layout of the Cedar Ridge Country Club in Broken Arrow, Okla. She helped the Huskers to a runner-up team finish, just one stroke back of the champions from Tulsa. Her performance earned Takahashi the first Big Ten Golfer-of-the-Week award of her career.

Takahashi, who ended the year at No. 247 in the Golfweek individual rankings, opened the season as Nebraska's No. 3 golfer in the lineup at the Green Wave Classic. She closed the tournament in a tie for 35th with a then-career-best 218 (+2). She helped the Huskers to the best team score in school history with an 835 (-29) to finish second in the 14-team field.

The following week, Takahashi added the second top-10 finish of her career, tying for eighth individually in a 75-golfer field to help the Huskers to the team title at the Badger Invitational (Sept. 18-20). Takahashi put together a then-career-best 215 (-1) with rounds of 73, 70 and 72 on the 6,248-yard layout of the University Ridge Golf Course in Wisconsin.

She opened the spring with a top-10 finish, firing a three-round score of 214 (69-70-75) to tie for 10th at the FAU Paradise Invitational in Boca Raton, Fla. (Feb. 6-7). Takahashi helped the Huskers to a runner-up team finish, trailing only

No. 19 Vanderbilt in a 14-team field that featured 11 top-100 teams.

Takahashi was even better the next time out, notching her fourth top-10 finish of the season with a career-best 212 (71-71-70) to tie for eighth individually and help the Big Red to a team tournament championship at the Westbrook Spring Invitational in Peoria, Ariz. (Feb. 27-28). Takahashi's three rounds better than par helped the Huskers finish with a three-round total of 843 (-21) to outclass a 14-team field that featured 12 top-100 teams, including No. 24 Ohio State.

She added another top-20 finish by tying for 18th in a 90-player field at the Briar's Creek Invitational in South Carolina (March 13-14). Takahashi closed the 54 holes on the par-72, 6,152-yard layout at The Golf Club at Briar's Creek with a 218 (72-71-75).

She added a top-25 finish at the Hurricane Invitational in Coral Gables, Fla. (Oct. 31-Nov. 1) with a three-round total of 217 (+1) to tie for 24th in a talented field. Her performance included a career-best first-round total of 69 (-3). She tied for 47th in challenging weather and scoring conditions at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational (Oct. 17-18). The tournament in Lawrence, Kan., was eventually shortened to 27 holes.

She managed a 219 (78-72-69) over three rounds in a loaded field at the Mountain View Collegiate in Tucson, Ariz. (March 17-19). Her final-round 69 matched her best third-round score as a collegian.

Her 73.49 stroke average over 37.5 rounds in 2022-23 ranked No. 5 all-time in Husker history. She did not record a final individual finish at the 2023 Big Ten Championship appearance because illness forced her to withdraw midway through the first round. She bounced back with a one-over-par 72 in the second round at the Fox Chapel Golf Club in Pittsburgh before closing the tournament with an 81 in the final round.

She also tied for 54th at 229 (73-81-75) in a loaded field at the Lady Buckeye Invitational (April 15-16) and tied for 36th in a strong 84-player field at The Bruzzy in Ardmore, Okla. (April 1-2). She finished with a three-round total of 223 (72-75-76) on the par-70, 5,976-yard layout at the Dornick Hills Golf & Country Club.

She played at par or better in 16 rounds in 2022-23, including 11 rounds under par.

In the summer of 2023, Takahashi qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship at Bel-Air Country Club

in Los Angeles (Aug. 7-13). Takahashi earned a spot at the 123rd U.S. Women's Amateur by tying for third with a 72 (+1) in the qualifier at the Shady Valley Country Club in Dallas. She joined Husker teammate Kelli Ann Strand in the U.S. Women's Amateur field.

FRESHMAN (2021-22)

Takahashi closed her first fall season in the Nebraska women's golf program by producing her third top-25 individual finish in five events. She tied for 25th with a solid three-round total of 224 (+6) to help the Huskers to a runner-up team finish at the White Sands Intercollegiate in the Bahamas (Oct. 22-24). Her effort on the 6,415-yard layout of the Ocean Club at Paradise Island included an even-par 72 in the first round before back-to-back rounds of 76 to close the tournament.

Takahashi's performance to close the fall followed a lineup appearance at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 11-12). She helped the Big Red to another runner-up team finish in a 13-team field by firing an opening-round 71 (-1) on the 6,200-yard layout at The Golf Club of Oklahoma in Broken Arrow. She finished with a three-round score of 232 to tie for 53rd.

Takahashi opened her college career by earning a lineup spot for the Huskers at the season-opening Wolverine Invitational (Sept. 13-14). She was NU's No. 5 finisher at the 16-team event that included 12 teams that advanced to 2021 NCAA Regionals. Takahashi finished with a 54-hole score of 238 that included a 78 (+7) in the final round on the par-71, 6,232-yard layout at the University of Michigan Golf Course in Ann Arbor. She tied for 77th individually in the 90-golfer field.

She did not earn a spot in Nebraska's top lineup the following week at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational, but she did produce a breakout performance. Takahashi was instrumental in leading the Big Red's four-player "B" squad to

the team championship. She tied for fifth individually with a 54-hole score of 222 (75-68-79) that included a career-best 68 (-4) in the second round. Takahashi was seven-under through 14 holes in the second round before settling for three bogeys on the final four holes. Her 68 tied for the best score by any golfer in the tournament, joining Kansas State's Remington Isaac as the only golfers to shoot a round better than 70 on the par-72, 6,221-yard layout at Colbert Hills Golf Club in Manhattan, Kan.

Takahashi, individual co-champions Nicole Hansen and Lindsey Thiele, and fellow freshman Andrea Velez (T19th) captured the team crown with a six-stroke win over Sam Houston. It marked Nebraska's first Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational team title in 11 all-time trips to the tournament.

She returned to Nebraska's lineup at The Molly Collegiate (Sept. 27-28), closing as Nebraska's No. 2 finisher with a three-round total of 226 (75-76-76) in a tie for 18th in an 83-player field on the par-72 layout of the Bayonet Golf Club in Seaside, Calif.

Takahashi closed the fall with Nebraska's No. 5 stroke average (76.13).

She opened the spring by going 1-0-1 at the Big Ten Match Play (Jan. 31-Feb. 1) before completing two rounds (83-79) while playing as an individual outside Nebraska's lineup at the Tulane Classic (Feb. 13-15). Takahashi followed with the best tournament score of her college career with a 219 (+3) to help the Huskers to a runner-up team finish in a loaded field at the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 27-28). She tied teammate Michaela Vavrova for 30th in Arizona, after carding three straight solid rounds (72-73-74).

Takahashi competed in the Nebraska lineup again at the Briar's Creek Invitational in John's Island, S.C. (March 14-15). She was NU's No. 5 finisher in a tie for 77th at 234 (76-83-75). She added another lineup appearance in the six-count-four

format at the Lady Buckeye Spring Invitational (April 15-16). Takahashi finished 57th with a 251 (84-83-84) in rugged scoring conditions against a talented field on the Scarlet Course in Columbus, Ohio. She closed her freshman campaign by tying for 80th in the six-count-four format of the 2022 Big Ten Championship. Takahashi finished with a three-round total of 241 (79-81-81) on the par-71 layout of the Fox Chapel Golf Club in Pittsburgh.

Overall, Takahashi ended the season with a 77.55 stroke average over 29 rounds in 2021-22.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Takahashi tied for second at the Niigata prefecture golf tournament and finished fifth at the Yonex Junior Golf Championship. She did not compete in tournaments during the summer of 2020 in Japan because of restrictions sparked by the world-wide outbreak of the coronavirus. Takahashi attended Kaishi Kokusai High School. She was coached by Hiroyuki Fujita.

OUTLOOK (2023-24)

After claiming All-Big Ten honors in a record-setting first year on the course for the Huskers as a true freshman in 2022-23, Kelli Ann Strand returns to lead an experienced Nebraska lineup as a sophomore.

Strand set the Nebraska season stroke average record (72.05) as a freshman while leading the Huskers to an appearance in the NCAA Raleigh Regional. She tied the Nebraska 54-hole school record with her 202 (-14) on her way to winning the Green Wave Classic in her collegiate debut.

She went on to produce six top-10 showings as a freshman before tying for 20th at the Big Ten Championship and 30th at the NCAA Raleigh Regional. Strand competed in the 123rd U.S. Women's Amateur in August of 2023, after advancing to match play at the Women's Western in July.

Strand also excelled in the classroom as a WGCA Scholastic All-American.

FRESHMAN (2022-23)

Strand captured second-team All-Big Ten honors while putting together the best season by a freshman in Nebraska history in 2022-23. She closed her first year as a Husker by leading the Big Red with her tie for 30th at the NCAA Raleigh Regional (May 8-10). Strand's three-round score of 220 (74-74-72) on the 6,324-yard, par-72 layout at the Lonnie Poole Golf Course matched the best regional score by a Husker in school history.

Strand's effort at the NCAA Raleigh Regional followed her tie for 20th individually at the Big Ten Championship in Pittsburgh, Pa. (April 21-23). She closed the three-day event with a 223 (74-72-77) on the par-71, 6,045-yard layout at Fox Chapel Golf Club.

Strand, who ended her first season at Nebraska with a 72.05 stroke average over 38.5 rounds, not only smashed the Nebraska freshman stroke average record (73.90, Kate Smith, 2016-17) but also Smith's overall season school record (72.18, 2019-20). Smith was an All-American and Big Ten Champion at Nebraska as a fifth-year senior in 2020-21. Strand notched nine top-25 finishes, including six top-10 performances while carding 18 rounds better than par.

The star from Challis, Idaho opened her Husker career with a record-setting collegiate debut on her way to an individual victory at the Green Wave Classic in New Orleans (Sept. 12-13). Strand set the Nebraska freshman record with a second-round 65 (-7) while tying the school record for best 54-hole tournament score with a 202 (-14) on the 6,158-yard layout at the Bayou Oaks South Course. Strand opened with a 67 (-5) before adding a 70 (-2) in the final round to claim a two-stroke win over LSU's Latanna Stone, a three-time All-American and three-time Palmer Cup participant.

Strand helped the Huskers to a school-record three-round team total of 835, smashing the previous team mark by eight strokes (843, Westbrook Spring Invitational, 2018).

She added a second consecutive top-five finish by tying for fourth with a 213 (-3) while helping Nebraska to a team title at the Badger Invitational (Sept. 18-20). After getting off to a slow start with a 77 to sit in a tie for 50th through 18 holes, Strand rebounded with rounds of 69 (-3) and 67 (-5) to climb 46 spots in the standings over the next 36 holes.

Strand made it three top-five finishes in a row to begin her career by tying for third with a 215 (-1) to help Nebraska to a runner-up team finish at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 10-11). After opening with a 76, Strand closed with rounds of

70 (-2) and 69 (-3) on the 6,302-yard layout of the Cedar Ridge Country Club in Broken Arrow, Okla.

She tied for 26th (195) at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational. In challenging conditions throughout the tournament, which was shortened to 27 holes, Strand tied for Nebraska's third-best individual finish. Strand closed the fall in a tie for 37th at 220 (+4) in a talented field at the Hurricane Invitational in Coral Gables, Fla. (Oct. 31-Nov. 1). She finished the fall season with a team-best 72.07 stroke average and produced eight rounds better than par.

Strand got her first spring season at Nebraska off to an impressive start with a seventh-place finish at the FAU Paradise Invitational. She fired three consecutive rounds better than par (70-70-71) to finish at 211 (-5). She helped the Huskers to a runner-up team finish in a 14-team field that featured 11 top-100 teams.

She was even better in the second tournament of the spring, carding three more rounds better than par to lead Nebraska to its second tournament title of the season with her fourth top-five individual finish of the year. Strand fired rounds of 71-69-69 to close in fifth place at 209 (-7), helping the Huskers to a championship in a 14-team field that included 12 top-100 teams, including then-No. 24 Ohio State.

She led the Huskers with a tie for 18th in a 90-player field at the Briar's Creek Invitational in South Carolina (March 13-14). Strand closed with a three-round total of 218 (74-70-74) on the par 72 layout at The Golf Club at Briar's Creek.

Strand notched her sixth top-10 finish of the season by tying for ninth in a 90-player field at the Mountain View Collegiate in Tucson, Ariz. (March 17-19). Her three-round total of 208 (-8) was her second-best as a Husker, including a second-round 66 (-6) at the Mountain View Golf Club.

Strand tied for 40th in a loaded 84-player field at The Bruzzy (April 1-2) in Ardmore, Okla. She finished with a three-round total of 224 (77-72-75) on the par-70, 5,976-yard layout at the Dornick Hills Golf & Country Club. She led Nebraska with a tie for 12th at 216 (E) in challenging scoring conditions at the Lady Buckeye Invitational (April 15-16), including her 18th round better than par this season with an opening-round 70 (-2) on the 6,319-yard layout at the Scarlet Course.

She ended her season ranked No. 113 nationally by both GolfStat and Golfweek.

During the summer of 2023, Strand qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship at Bel-Air Country Club in Los Angeles (Aug. 7-13). She won the USGA Qualifier in Sundre, Alberta, Canada with a 69 to claim her spot and join teammate Miu Takahashi in the 123rd U.S. Women's Amateur. Strand also advanced to the round of 32 at the Women's Western Amateur Championship at White Eagle Golf Club in Naperville, Ill. (July 18-22). She tied for 16th through 36 holes of stroke play, including an opening-round 67 (-5).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Strand captured three consecutive Idaho Class 2A state championships and never lost an individual high school match at Challis High School while playing for her uncle Eric Strand in the small town of approximately 1,000 residents. Kelli Ann won the 2022 2A title with a state Class 2A record 129 (64-65, -15) through two rounds, which was good for a 21-stroke win.

She was one of 24 members of the USA Today High School Sports Awards Golf Team in 2021-22.

Strand captured her second Idaho Class 2A individual high school state championship in May of 2021 with a two-round total of 135 (66-69). Strand's nine-under-par score at Circling

Raven Golf Course in Worley, Idaho, allowed her to win the title by 25 strokes over the second-place finisher.

She also won the 2A state championship as a freshman in 2019. The 2020 championship was canceled because of COVID-19.

In October of 2021, Strand won the Idaho Golf Association Women's Championship, firing a two-day total of 142 (72-70).

In August of 2019, Strand added a title at the Idaho Junior Amateur in the girls 15-18 age group by 13 strokes with a three-round total of 209 (66-71-72). It was her third Idaho Junior Amateur title.

In the summer of 2018, Strand placed second at the Idaho Women's State Amateur in Boise with a three-day total of 228, just four strokes behind the champion. At age 14, Strand was the youngest golfer in the women's field.

During the summer of 2021, Strand led Idaho to a runner-up finish at the Girls Junior Americas Cup at Banbury Golf Course in Eagle, Idaho. Strand fired a 64 in the second round to help Idaho finish with a team score of 610 (-16), just three strokes back of the champions from Team Mexico. Southern California finished third at 614 (-12).

PERSONAL

The daughter of Matt and Stephanie Strand, Kelli Ann was born on March 22, 2004. She has an older brother, Lane, who was also an Idaho Class 2A state champion and is a standout college golfer at Northwest Nazarene. Kelli Ann was also the class valedictorian at Challis in a class of 14 seniors that included just one other female.

Strand has not declared a major but she did earn spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll with a perfect 4.0 GPA in the fall and spring semesters of 2022-23. She was also a member of the 2023 Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.



ANDREA VELEZ

Junior (Two Letters) Pereira, Colombia (Liceo de Frances Pereira)

OUTLOOK (2023-24)

Andrea Velez enters her third season at Nebraska looking to make a greater impact on the Big Red lineup. In her first year on the course as a Husker in 2021-22, Velez competed in nine rounds and posted a 77.00 stroke average.

The junior from Pereira, Colombia increased her contributions in her second season at Nebraska, competing in 26.5 rounds, including a spot in the Husker lineup at the Big Ten Championship.

SOPHOMORE (2022-23)

Velez helped the Huskers secure their second NCAA Regional bid in the past three seasons by earning lineup spots late in her third season at Nebraska. The sophomore from Pereira, Colombia was Nebraska's No. 5 finisher with a 234 (75-81-78) at the Big Ten Championship at Fox Chapel Golf Club in Pittsburgh, Pa. (April 21-23). In her fourth lineup appearance of the season, Velez closed in a tie for 62nd in her first Big Ten Championship, and the Huskers counted her scores in both the first and third rounds. She served as Nebraska's alternate at the 2023 NCAA Raleigh Regional but did not compete.

Velez earned a lineup spot in a six-count-four format for the Huskers at the Lady Buckeye Invitational (April 15-16). Playing out of the No. 6 spot on the 6,319-yard layout at the

Scarlet Course in Columbus, Ohio, Velez was Nebraska's No. 2 finisher, closing with a three-round total of 228 (75-74-79) to tie for 51st individually in a loaded 14-team field that featured 13 Big Ten teams.

She opened the season as NU's No. 5 golfer at the Green Wave Classic in New Orleans (Sept. 12-13). She helped the Huskers to the best three-round team score in school history with an 835 (-29) by carding a career-best 218 (+2) on their way to a runner-up finish in a 14-team field at Tulane. Velez tied teammate Miu Takahashi for 35th in an 81-golfer field in New Orleans.

Velez competed as an individual outside Nebraska's lineup at the Badger Invitational (Sept. 18-20). She tied for 60th in a 75-player field at Wisconsin with a three-round total of 236 (76-76-84). She added another solid effort by tying for 40th (228) in a 75-golfer field at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 10-11). Velez played as an individual outside the Husker lineup in Oklahoma.

She replaced Michaela Vavrova in the lineup at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational, tying for 56th (200) in challenging scoring and weather conditions in a tournament that was eventually shortened to 27 holes.

Velez opened the spring by playing as an individual outside the Husker lineup at the FAU Paradise Invitational in Boca Raton, Fla. (Feb. 6-7). She produced a three-round total of

REDSHIRT (2020-21)

Velez redshirted in her first season at Nebraska after arriving on campus in January of 2021. Velez became the first Colombian in the Nebraska women's golf program. OUTLOOK (2023-24)

Lena Hassert hopes to fight for consistent lineup time in her third season at Nebraska. Hassert has competed in 15 rounds for the Big Red through her first two seasons in Lincoln, including six rounds as a sophomore in 2022-23.

The young golfer from Kreuzau, Germany was the Austrian U16 and U18 Junior Stroke Play champion before becoming a Husker. She also tied for second at the German National Championship in 2017.

A multi-sport athlete in high school, Bream was a high school and club soccer player and a middle distance runner as a track athlete in Arizona. She began to focus on golf at the Arizona Country Club when the COVID-19 pandemic forced the cancellation of her junior track and field season and club soccer competitions.

Bream, who did not play high school golf, was a 2021 Junior Golf Association of Arizona Player of the Year finalist after winning three tournament titles and adding a pair of runner-up finishes.

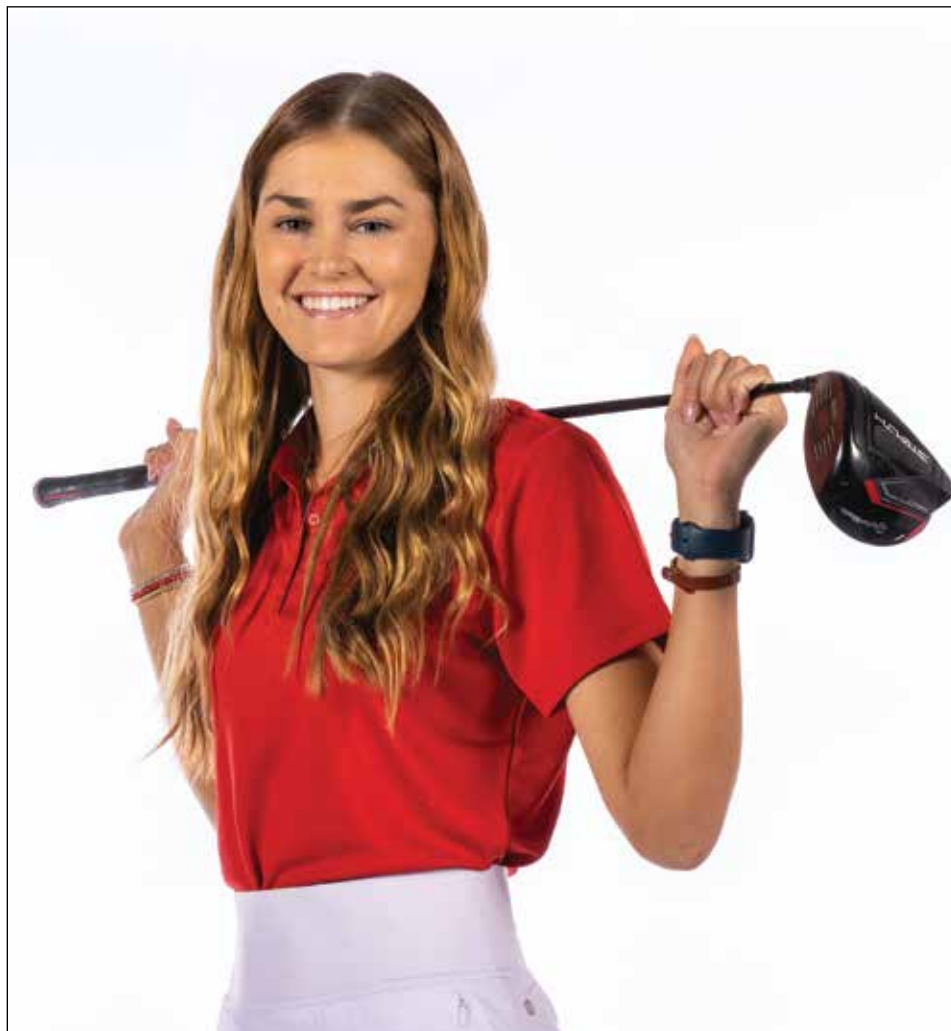

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders.

The history of the Big Ten traces back more than 125 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago, where on January 11, 1895, then-Purdue president James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, University of Illinois, University of Michigan, University of Minnesota, Northwestern University and University of Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bonafide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On February 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the mechanics of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905. Indiana University and the State University of Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State University joined the conference, bringing its membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, and that name was eventually incorporated in 1897.

As the 1900s opened, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were held at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by the leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to a student of the graduating class who has attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a student competing in Big Ten athletics can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of seven men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971, Jim Delany in 1989, Kevin Warren in 2020 and Tony Petitti in 2023.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when the University of Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all conference institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produced over \$10 billion in funded research, \$5 billion more than any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of instant replay, where it approved nationwide testing in 2005. A year later, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

Also in 2006, Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with FOX Networks to create what would become the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 2,200 live events annually as the first internationally distributed network dedicated to covering one of the premier collegiate conference in the country. BTN is in almost 60 million homes in the U.S. and Canada alone via all major video distributors in those countries and approximately 300 additional video providers across North America. BTN is also available through the majority of OTT providers, and via the Fox Sports App, which delivers live and on-demand programming to computers, smartphones and tablets. In addition, the B1G+ ("Big Ten Plus") platform streams more than 1,700 conference events each season.

The Big Ten took its media reach to unprecedented heights on Aug. 18, 2022, with the announcement of a groundbreaking media rights agreement to provide fans with unparalleled access and exposure to its student-athletes and member institutions. Beginning with the 2023-24 academic year and continuing through 2029-30, the Big Ten will increase distribution coast-to-coast, featuring exclusive content across linear networks FOX, CBS and NBC, as well as NBCUniversal's direct-to-consumer streaming platform, Peacock. The breadth of new partners, in addition to BTN and FS1, will place conference football, women's and men's basketball and Olympic sports student-athletes on the biggest stage and provide fans with the most exciting matchups across traditional over-the-air linear television and direct-to-consumer streaming.

On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011. The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from the University of Maryland and Rutgers University on November 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams. The Big Ten officially stretched from coast to coast on June 30, 2022, when it was announced the COP/C

had unanimously voted to admit the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) and the University of Southern California (USC), effective Aug. 2, 2024. Competition will begin for those institutions in conference sports in the 2024-25 academic year.

Since opening in the fall of 2013, the Big Ten Headquarters and Conference Center, located in Rosemont, Illinois, hosts more than 300 meetings annually for member institutions, Big Ten Academic Alliance-related committees and coaches' groups. The headquarters also features an interactive digital museum — the Big Ten Experience — which brings the conference's storied academic and athletic history to life.

In June 2014, the Big Ten opened a second office in New York City, featuring both office and meeting space in Midtown Manhattan. Big Ten staff members are based in the New York City office to provide expanded coverage and service, while other conference and institutional administrators utilize the space as necessary when conducting business on the East Coast. The Big Ten and its member institutions also have access to satellite office space in Washington, D.C.

Petitti and his staff work to meet the educational needs of student-athletes to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. The conference office manages 27 different championships and tournaments, offers legislative and compliance services, oversees the production and distribution of more than 2,000 events annually, provides staff services to coaching and administrative personnel, and remains a vital resource for media and fans seeking information on the Big Ten.

On March 7, 2020, in advance of the rising tide of the COVID-19 pandemic, the conference partnered with all 14 of its member institutions to create the Big Ten Task Force for Emerging Infectious Diseases. This group was formed to provide counsel and sound medical advice to ensure the health, safety and wellness of the Big Ten's students, coaches, administrators and fans. Less than two months later on May 4, 2020, the conference announced the formation of the Big Ten Mental Health and Wellness Cabinet, featuring representation from all 14 member institutions, as well as sport affiliate members Johns Hopkins (men's and women's lacrosse) and Notre Dame (men's ice hockey). The goal of the cabinet is to promote optimal mental health for Big Ten student-athletes through a comprehensive, systemic and interdisciplinary approach to establishing mental health programs, while also providing counsel, advice and expertise to the conference office.

One of the signature moments of Warren's tenure as commissioner came on June 1, 2020, when, following the death of Minneapolis resident George Floyd, he penned an open letter in which he announced the formation of what became known as the Big Ten Equality Coalition. This group, which features student-athletes, coaches, athletic directors, chancellors, presidents and other members of the Big Ten family from all 14 member institutions, has a stated goal of seeking tangible ways to actively and constructively combat racism and hate around the world, while also empowering student-athletes to express their rights to free speech and peaceful protest.

A product of the conversations emerging from the coalition was the creation of the Big Ten Voter Registration Initiative. This non-partisan, conference-wide collaboration encourages student-athletes to take part in the electoral process and is led by a Voter Registration Committee that includes representatives from all 14 Big Ten institutions.

More than 125 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.

HUSKERS CLAIM 2023 NCAA REGIONAL BID



Nebraska won its first of two team championships during the 2022-23 season at the Badger Invitational in Wisconsin (Sept. 18-20). Kelli Ann Strand (T4th, 213) and Miu Takahashi (8th, 215) both finished in the top 10 for the Big Red. The Huskers added a title at the Westbrook Spring Invitational (also hosted by Wisconsin) in Peoria, Ariz. (Feb. 26-27), while Strand (5th, 209) and Takahashi (T8th, 212) were both back in the top 10 again.

The Nebraska women's golf team captured its second NCAA Regional berth in the past three seasons when the Huskers heard their name called to participate in the 2023 NCAA Raleigh Regional.

The Huskers, under the direction of first-year Nebraska Head Coach Jeanne Sutherland, capped a strong season with a ninth-place finish in a 12-team field at the Lonnie Poole Golf Course at North Carolina State.

Nebraska's performance in Raleigh put the finishing touches on a season that included a school-record 292.21 stroke average. The 2022-23 Huskers smashed the previous record by 6.56 strokes per round (298.77, 2021-22).

Although it marked Coach Sutherland's first season leading the Huskers, it was far from her first trip to NCAA Regionals. In fact, the long-time Texas A&M and SMU head coach guided her 19th team to an NCAA Division I Regional bid in 2022-23.

While Sutherland was leading Nebraska to record-setting performances, Kelli Ann Strand produced a record-breaking season of her own, posting a school-record 72.05 stroke average while claiming second-team All-Big Ten honors.

The freshman from Challis, Idaho brought home a tournament title in her collegiate debut, winning the Green Wave Classic with a school-record tying 202 (-14) in New Orleans. She added a tie for fourth to help the Huskers to a team title at the Badger Invitational in Wisconsin in Nebraska's second tournament of the season, before adding a tie for third at the Dale McNamara Invitational in Oklahoma for her third collegiate competition.

Strand's hot start helped Nebraska to a 35-2 record and an appearance in the national top 25 by mid-October.

Strand, who finished the season ranked No. 113 nationally by both Golfweek and GolfStat, had plenty of help early in the season from another young Husker teammate who enjoyed a breakthrough season.

Miu Takahashi stormed to the Dale McNamara Invitational individual championship with a three-round total of 213 (-3) to help the Huskers to their runner-up team finish. It followed on the heels of an eighth-place performance at the Badger Invitational for the sophomore from Nasu-machi,

Japan. Takahashi added a tie for 10th to open the spring at the FAU Paradise Invitational and a tie for eighth at the Westbrook Spring Invitational in Arizona to help Nebraska to another team tournament title.

Takahashi closed the 2022-23 season with a sophomore school-record 73.49 stroke average.

While the two youngest players in Nebraska's lineup were breaking records, graduate student Megan Whittaker continued to be a leader on and off the course while slashing strokes from her game.

Whittaker, a five-year contributor from Elkhorn, Neb., ranked second among the Huskers with a 73.48 stroke average, which ranked No. 4 in Nebraska history. She also joined Takahashi with five top-20 finishes on the season. Whittaker and Takahashi both closed the year among the top 250 players in the national rankings.

Whittaker closed her Husker career as a two-time Big Ten Sportsmanship Award winner (2021, 2023) and a four-time WGCA Scholastic All-American. The three-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and Academic All-Big Ten selection earned her bachelor's degree in finance from Nebraska in May of 2022 before pursuing a master's degree in business analytics. In 2023, she took home a Nebraska Heart & Soul Award across all sports for consistently going above and beyond in all phases of Nebraska's Life Skills program.

Juniors Lindsey Thiele and Michaela Vavrova also produced strong third seasons for the Big Red.

Thiele, who finished with a 74.88 stroke average, trimmed 2.01 shots per round off her scoring average as a sophomore. The Wahoo, Neb., native who has cut 5.25 strokes per round since her freshman campaign, also showed her

consistency with seven top-35 finishes on the year, including a tie for 34th at the Big Ten Championship.

Vavrova, a third-year Husker from Bojnice, Slovakia, added a 75.80 stroke average on the season. She was also the 2022 Slovakian Women's National Player of the Year.

Andrea Velez also stepped into a significant role as the No. 6 golfer in Nebraska's lineup. The sophomore from Pereira, Colombia competed in 26.5 rounds for the Huskers and posted a 76.91 stroke average on the year. At the 2023 Big Ten Championship, Velez carded a first-round 75 (+4) for Nebraska's third-best score of the round to help the Huskers overcome an illness by Takahashi that knocked her out midway through the round. Velez also tied for 35th with a 218 (+2) while replacing Vavrova in the lineup at the season-opening Green Wave Classic in New Orleans.

The Huskers also continued a tradition of excellence in the classroom and community. Nebraska produced a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate for the 18th straight season, and four Huskers - Megan Whittaker, Lindsey Thiele, Kelli Ann Strand and Andrea Velez - captured WGCA Scholastic All-America honors. All 10 Huskers were named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

LISA JOHNSON (2019-22)

Lisa Johnson was named the fourth head coach in program history on June 17, 2019. She came to NU after serving as the head coach at Idaho (2007-19). In her first season at Nebraska, Johnson helped Kate Smith become NU's first All-Big Ten golfer since 2012. Smith also captured Nebraska's first Mary Fossum Award for owning the Big Ten's best stroke average. After the COVID-19 pandemic cut the 2019-20 season short, Johnson guided the Huskers to their best conference tournament finish since 1984 by tying for second at the 2021 Big Ten Championship. Kate Smith became Nebraska's first Big Ten Champion and the Huskers made their first NCAA Regional appearance since 2008. Johnson left NU following the 2021-22 season after her husband, John, was named the Athletic Director at Portland State.

JEANNE SUTHERLAND (2022-PRESENT)

Jeanne Sutherland was named the fifth head coach of the Nebraska women's golf program, May 5, 2022, after spending one season as an associate head coach under Lisa Johnson. In 25 seasons as a head coach before coming to Nebraska, Sutherland led 18 teams to NCAA Regional appearances, including four NCAA Championship bids. She was a two-time NCAA regional/district coach of the year and a four-time conference coach of the year. She coached three individuals to All-America honors and five individual conference champions during her time at Texas A&M (1992-2007) and SMU (2011-21). She guided Nebraska to an NCAA Regional berth in 2023.

NEBRASKA'S NCAA ALL-AMERICANS



Joanne Brooks
1989-1992
Honorable Mention, 1992

The first NCAA All-American in Nebraska women's golf history, Joanne Brooks was one of the best golfers ever to compete for the Huskers.

When Brooks completed her eligibility after the 1993 season, she held nearly every NU individual school record. She earned All-Big Eight Conference and academic All-Big Eight honors three times. Brooks won the Edith Munson Award given to the nation's top student-athlete, was named an WGCA Scholastic All-American in 1990, 1991 and 1992, and was named to Nebraska's 25 Women of Distinction List in April 2000.

A native of Tauranga, New Zealand, Brooks was the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Committee President.



Sarah Sasse
1998-2003
First Team, 2003

Sarah Sasse became Nebraska's first women's golfer to earn first-team All-America honors in 2003. One of 11 golfers to make the All-America list, Sasse was the only Big 12 golfer selected. Sasse was the 2003 Big 12 Player of the Year, a 2003 Scholastic All-American, the 2003 April Big 12 Golfer of the Month, a three-time All-Big 12 honoree, a four-time academic All-Big 12 pick and a three-time NCAA participant. She also set the school record for best 36- and 54-hole scores with 138 and 209, respectively. The Lincoln native graduated from Nebraska in 2003 with a degree in marketing. She was selected as the first women's golfer inducted into the University of Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2015.

2017-2021
Honorable Mention, 2021

Nebraska's third women's golf All-American, Kate Smith claimed WGCA honorable-mention accolades after capturing the 2021 Big Ten Championship. In a remarkable season, Smith tied the Big Ten tournament record and her own school record with a final-round 64 (-8) to storm to the title. She helped Nebraska to its best conference team finish (tied for second) since 1984. In a history-making season, Smith became the first Husker to compete in the Augusta National Women's Amateur and the first Nebraska men's or women's golfer to play in the Arnold Palmer Cup. Smith represented the United States in the Palmer Cup and went 3-1 to play a key role in a 33-27 U.S. victory.

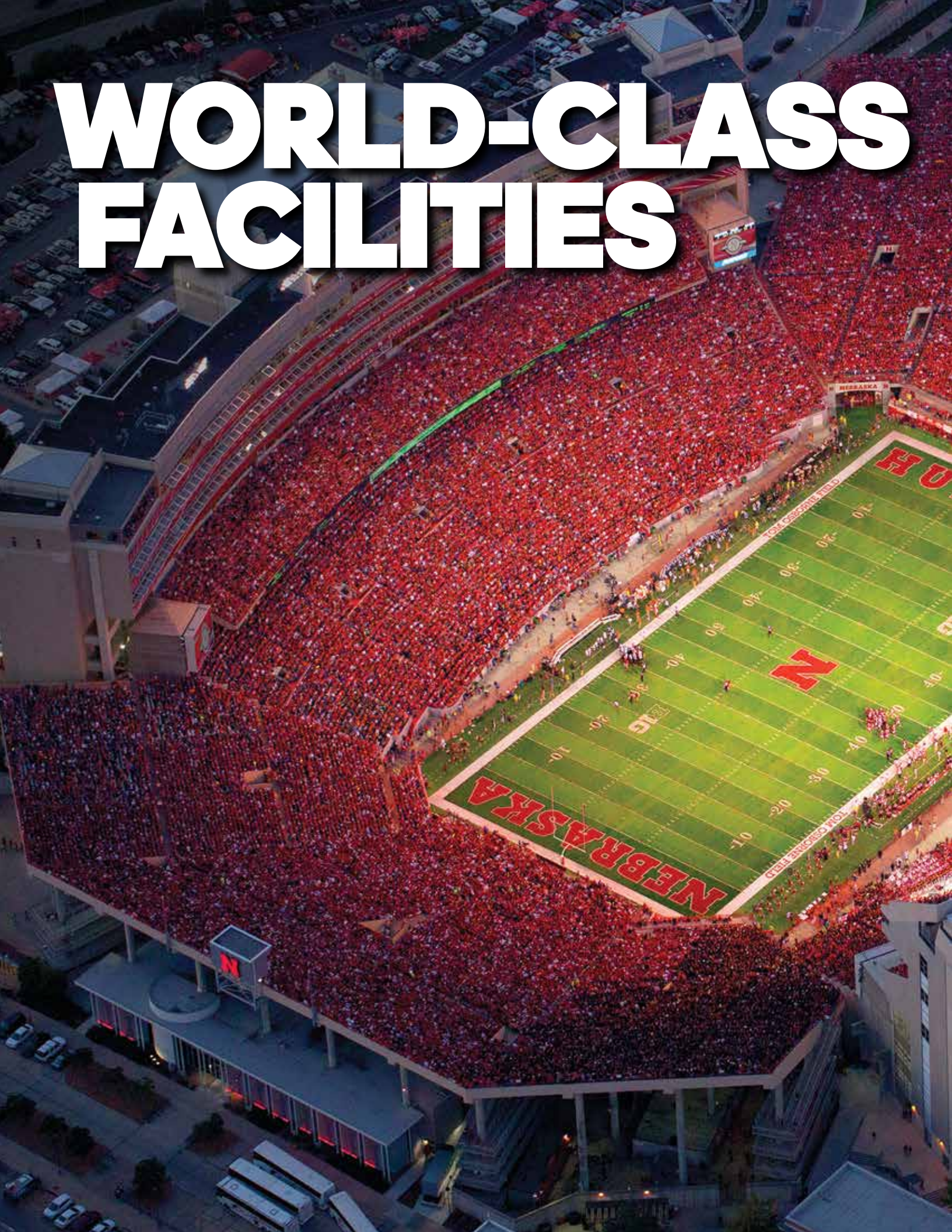

The purpose of the Performance Nutrition department is to provide services that enhance the student athlete's overall health and recovery.

GOALS

- To offer a variety of food and beverage products that are readily available and accessible for all student athletes.
- To provide a wealth of education and resources that each student athlete can utilize to enhance their overall level of knowledge and awareness as it pertains to fueling their body for competition and recovery.

DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

Performance Nutrition seeks to provide fueling options and education to Husker student athletes, so they are adequately prepared and knowledgeable on the impact nutrition can have in their lives as athletes and after sport.

NUTRITION OVERVIEW

Our Training Table is the primary resource for student athletes to seek out holistic fueling options. Our Training Table operates and sets its menus with a student athlete first mentality. We seek to provide healthy, accommodating nutrition options for all our athletes at breakfast, lunch, and dinner.

Our fueling stations are the secondary resource for student-athletes to fulfill their fueling needs. The primary goal of our fueling stations is to provide quick and easy sources of nutrition and hydration to supplement training and competition.

Team rooms and competition fueling are an additional asset our student-athletes can utilize. Each team has a dietitian that coordinates additional nutrition options to team rooms and around competition.

Husker Bucks are provided to student-athletes to supplement meals on their own. Athletes have the chance to purchase a meal at local restaurants or choose to use the dollar value on groceries.

EDUCATION AND CONSULTATION

Each team has a sport specific dietitian who oversees the nutritional needs per team. Our dietitians are a great resource for education and consultation to our student athletes. The dietitians conduct DEXAs for body composition assessment, hydration testing, consult with athletes individually, provide nutrition education team talks (hydration, Pre-workout fueling, recovery nutrition) and coordinating materials, host cooking classes & grocery store tours, and assist with fueling options surrounding competitions.

TUTORIAL SUPPORT

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, unlimited tutorial support from approximately 75-100 tutors on staff is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. Tutorial support is provided both in-person and virtually. Nebraska's tutorial program is certified as a model tutoring program by the College Reading and Learning Association.

STUDY HALL

Student-athletes attend a supervised, flex-time study hall within the Herman Student Life Complex that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student-athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week as determined by their academic counselor and/or coach. Additional performance-based or tutor-based study hall also may be determined by the academic counselor.

MENTORING

Academic staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information and discuss academic success strategies.

EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor, or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a consulting neuropsychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators, and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

COMPUTER RESOURCES

All student-athletes are provided the opportunity to have a laptop for use during their academic career at Nebraska. The Herman Student Life Complex has printers and desktop computers available for student-athletes to use in the facility.

Nebraska has a history of providing unmatched benefits and support to student-athletes. A few examples of these enhanced benefits for Husker student-athletes include:

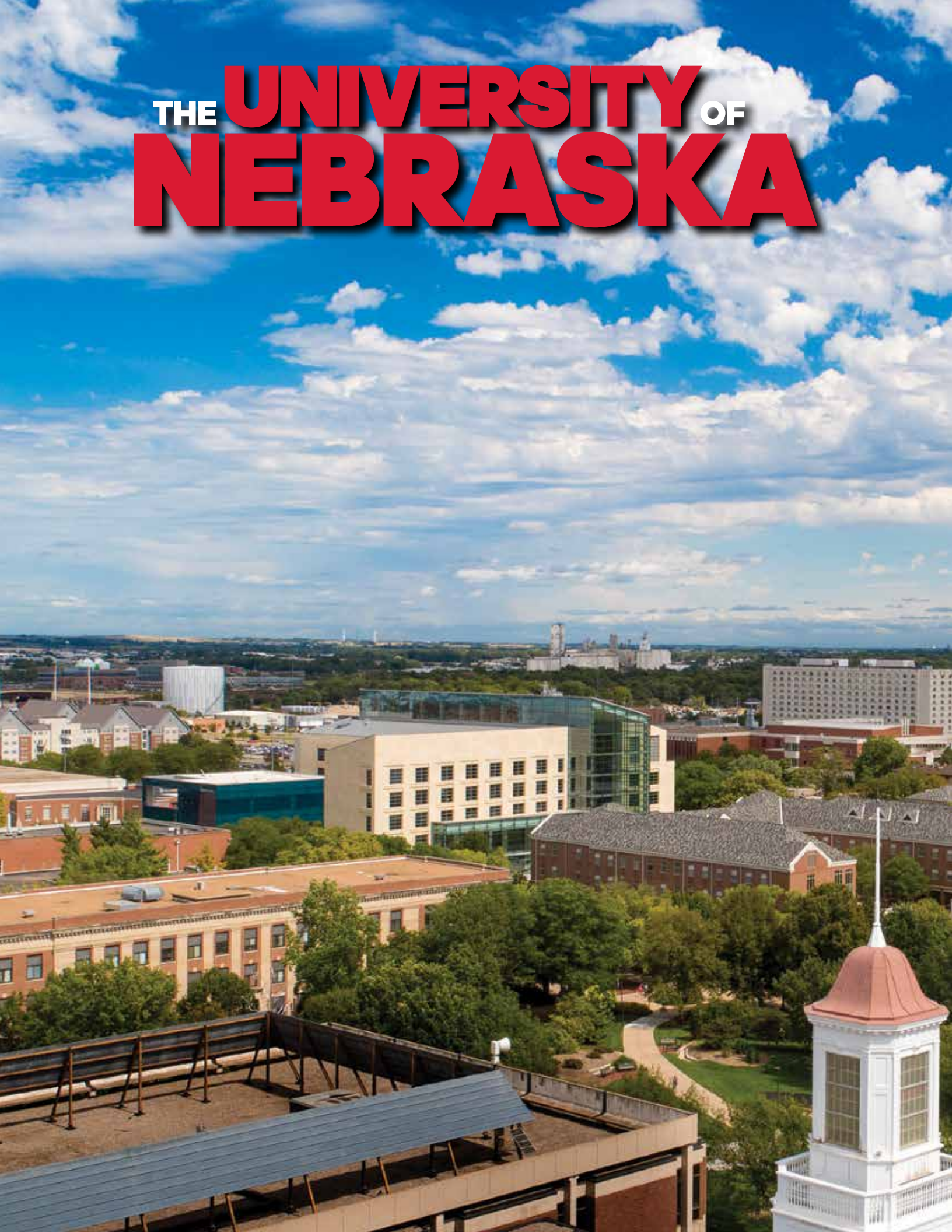
- All scholarship student-athletes have their scholarship calculated based on the full cost of attendance.
- Each student-athlete is offered a free Apple MacBook Air laptop computer to enhance their learning opportunities.
- Nebraska has increased resources and support in all academic and performance related areas including but not limited to Academic Services, Life Skills, Athletic Medicine, Athletic Training, Strength and Conditioning, Nebraska Athletic Performance Laboratory, Nutrition and Sports Analytics.
- The N-Vest Nebraska program begins in the fall of 2022. N-Vest Nebraska will reward Husker scholarship student-athletes for academic performance, success toward graduation and retention. NU student-athletes who meet the established academic benchmarks will receive \$5,980 per year for their academic achievement.
- As part of Nebraska's innovative Post-Eligibility Opportunity (PEO) program, every student-athlete graduate who has exhausted their athletic eligibility has the opportunity to pursue (with Nebraska support) an internship, participate in a study abroad program or attend graduate school within the University of Nebraska system.

#NILBRASKA

In the summer of 2021, Nebraska Athletics introduced #NILbraska, an initiative to educate student-athletes on branding, marketing and financial literacy, among other aspects. #NILNebraska prepares student-athletes to take advantage of Name, Image and Likeness legislation.

The #NILbraska program focuses on a three-pronged approach to providing education for student-athletes to maximize their potential in the NIL category: Ready Now, Accelerate and the Husker Advantage.

THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

Chartered in Lincoln by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a university system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration. The flagship University of Nebraska–Lincoln is an educational institution of international stature. Nebraska is classified within the Carnegie “R1: Doctoral Universities – Highest Research Activity” category. Nebraska is also a land-grant university and a member of the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities. The university is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission.

BIG TEN ACADEMIC ALLIANCE

As a member of the Big Ten, the University of Nebraska–Lincoln is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation, which is the academic consortium of the universities in the Big Ten Conference. The BTAA includes all 14 Big Ten Institutions and partners with the University of Chicago. The Big Ten Academic Alliance and the institutions together have annual research expenditures topping \$11.5 billion — more than the Ivy League and the University of California System combined — and they educate a total of nearly 600,000 students with approximately 50,000 faculty members.

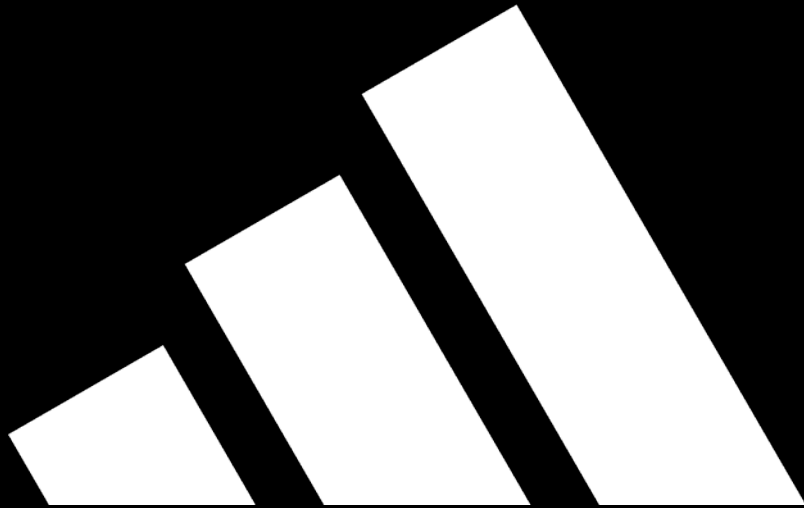
