HUSKERS READY TO KEEP CLIMBING IN 2023-24



Gentry Scheve, Will Marshall and Harry Crockett were recognized as Nebraska's Big Ten Golfers to Watch heading into the 2023-24 season.

The Nebraska men's golf team plans to continue building momentum in Head Coach Judd Cornell's second season leading the program in 2023-24.

Cornell, a former Husker golfer who also spent six seasons with the Big Red as an assistant before returning to guide the Nebraska program after three seasons as Creighton's head coach, has a solid nucleus of returning golfers this season.

He hopes to see Nebraska's more experienced golfers make significant strides on the course this season while also looking for greater impacts from young Huskers.

Will Marshall enters his fifth season at Nebraska as the Big Red's most experienced golfer. The graduate student from Elburn, Ill., posted a 73.68 stroke average over 28 rounds for the Huskers as a senior in 2022-23. He has competed in 61 rounds for Nebraska through his first four seasons in Lincoln while producing a 74.57 career stroke average.

Marshall was Nebraska's top finisher at four of 11 events last season, including a tie for 12th at the Seahawk Intercollegiate (March 26-27) and a tie for 16th at the season-opening Badger Invitational (Sept. 11-13). He is also a three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.

Marshall, who was one of three Huskers to be recognized as a Big Ten Golfer to Watch for 2023-24, was joined on that list by senior Gentry Scheve and junior Harry Crockett.

Scheve enters his fourth season at Nebraska after recording a 73.35 stroke over 14 rounds for Coach Judd Cornell's team a year ago. The senior from Emporia, Kan., has competed in 26 rounds for the Huskers in his career, posting a 74.50 stroke average. Scheve came on strong late in the 2022-23 campaign for the Huskers, producing Nebraska's best finishes at its final two regular-season tournaments. He closed the regular season with a fourth-place finish at the Fighting Illini Spring Collegiate (April 22-23) after tying for 12th at the Tiger Collegiate in Columbia, Mo. (April 10-11). He has also earned Academic All-Big Ten honors.

Crockett (Oxted, England) enters his second season as a Husker after transferring from Hutchinson (Kan.) Community College, where he was the 2021 NJCAA individual runner-up and a two-time first-team All-American for the two-time NJCAA Division I champions. As a sophomore at Nebraska in 2022-23, Crockett set the school single-season stroke average record (71.82) while playing in 11 rounds, including a third-place finish at the Purdue Fall Invitational.

Crockett was one of NU's top four finishers at each of the first four events to open the season, but did not compete during the spring semester for the Big Red. His return could provide a significant boost in Nebraska's hunt for postseason contention.

Reed Malleck also brings extensive college experience to the table for Nebraska's lineup. The senior from York, Neb., ranked second among the Huskers with 22 rounds played a year ago while posting a 74.86 stroke average. He posted a season-best tie for 25th at the Tiger Collegiate while also leading the Huskers with a tie for 28th at the Desert Mountain Collegiate in Arizona (March 4-5). Malleck is also a standout in the classroom as a 2022 Big Ten Distinguished Scholar.

Fellow Nebraskan Grant Jabenis also looks to increase his contributions in his second season with the Huskers. The Omaha Westside grad took third at The Prestige in Indio, Calif. (Feb. 20-22) to match Nebraska's top individual finish of the season. He competed in 20 rounds and posted a solid 74.50 stroke average. Jabenis joined Malleck, Scheve, Marshall and Davis Johnson in the Husker lineup at the 2023 Big Ten Championship to close the season.

Johnson, a sophomore from Chaska, Minn., competed in 11 rounds as a true freshman and posted a 76.00 stroke average, including a season-best tie for 36th at the Purdue Fall Invitational (Oct. 10-11).

Fellow freshmen Evan McDermott and Quinn Yost also saw lineup time for the Huskers a year ago and will be hungry for more in 2023-24.

McDermott, a sophomore from Spring Lake, Mich., led the Husker freshmen with 20 rounds and a 75.45 stroke average, including a tie for 13th at the Stampede at The Creek.

Yost, a sophomore from Farmington, N.M., added a 76.06 stroke average over 17 rounds, including a tie for 17th at the Stampede at The Creek.

The Big Red will also be bolstered by the addition of senior Evan Myers (Northbrook, Ill.), junior Hamish Murray (Sydney, Australia) and freshman Rhett Hughes (Edmond, Okla.). Myers posted a 73.13 stroke over eight rounds in 2022-23, including a fifth-place finish at the Badger Invitational and a tie for 13th at the Huntsville Toyota Bearkat Invite (April 3-4). Murray comes to Nebraska after being named the Cameron University Athlete of the Year in 2023. He set the career stroke average record (73.325) at the Lawton, Okla., school and was named a second-team All-Lone Star Conference golfer.

Hughes was the runner-up at the Oklahoma Junior Amateur and took 10th at the Oklahoma Class 6A-1 State Championship.

The Huskers open the 2023-24 campaign at the first-ever Visit Knoxville Collegiate hosted by Tennessee (Sept. 8-10). They play their second of five fall tournaments at Cincinnati's Bearcat Invitational (Sept. 18-19), before heading to Wisconsin for the Badger Invitational (Oct. 1-3).

Nebraska returns to the Purdue Fall Invitational (Oct. 9-10), before closing the fall campaign at the Little Rock Invitational (Oct. 15-16).

The Huskers will use November, December and January to hone their games before returning to the course for the first stroke-play event of the spring in the Battle at Briar's Creek hosted by the College of Charleston (Feb. 5-6). The Big Red then head to Florida for the first time to compete in The Gator (Feb. 17-18).

Nebraska travels to New Jersey for The Johnnie O hosted by Rutgers (March 10-12), before competing at the Tiger Collegiate in Missouri (April 8-9). The Huskers wrap up the regular season with the Hawkeye Invitational in lowa City (April 13-14), before traveling to the Big Ten Championship at Scioto Country Club in Columbus, Ohio (April 26-28).

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders.

The history of the Big Ten traces back more than 125 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago, where on January 11, 1895, then-Purdue president James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, University of Illinois, University of Michigan, University of Minnesota, Northwestern University and University of Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility appointed lactify representatives was outlined. The presidents in Kindown action Testificed rigibility for athletics to bonafide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On February 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the

same Palmer House and officially established the mechanics of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905. Indiana University and the State University of Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State University joined the conference, bringing its membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred

to as the "Big Ten" by media members, and that name was eventually incorporated in 1987.

As the 1900s opened, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were held at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women. One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in

the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by the leaders of the charter members of the conference

and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to a student of the graduating class who has attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a student competing in Big Ten athletics can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith

Griffith was the first of seven men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's isitory, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971, Jim Delany in 1989, Kevin Warren in 2020 and Tony Petitti in 2023.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when the University of Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once agets. conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all conference institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produced over \$10 billion in funded research, \$5 billion more than any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily

adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992. In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of instant replay, where it approved nationwide testing in 2005. A year later, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

Also in 2006, Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with FOX Networks to create what would become the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 2,200 live events annually as the first internationally distributed network dedicated to covering one of the premier collegiate conference in the country. BTN is in almost 60 million homes in the U.S. and Canada alone via all major video distributors in those countries and approximately 300 additional video providers across North America. BTN is also available through the majority of OTT providers, and via the Fox Sports App, which delivers live and on-demand programming to computers, smartphones and tablets. In addition, the B1G+ ("Big Ten Plus") platform streams more than 1,700 conference events each season.

The Big Ten took its media reach to unprecedented heights on Aug. 18, 2022, with the announcement

of a groundbreaking media rights agreement to provide fans with unparalleled access and exposure to its student-athletes and member institutions. Beginning with the 2023-24 academic year and continuing through 2029-30, the Big Ten will increase distribution coast-to-coast, featuring exclusive content across linear networks FOX, CBS and NBC, as well as NBCUniversal's direct-to-consumer streaming platform, Peacock. The breadth of new partners, in addition to BTN and FS1, will place conference football, women's and men's basketball and Olympic sports student-athletes on the biggest stage and provide fans with the most exciting matchups across traditional over-the-air linear television and direct-to-consumer streaming.

On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011. The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from the University of Maryland and Rutgers University on November 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams. The Big Ten officially stretched from coast to coast on June 30, 2022, when it was announced the COP/C had unanimously voted to admit the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) and the University of Southern California (USC), effective Aug. 2, 2024. Competition will begin for those institutions in conference sports in the 2024-25 academic year.

Since opening in the fall of 2013, the Big Ten Headquarters and Conference Center, located in Rosemont, Illinois, hosts more than 300 meetings annually for member institutions, Big Ten Academic Alliance-related committees and coaches' groups. The headquarters also features an interactive digital museum — the Big Ten Experience — which brings the conference's storied academic and

adhletic history to life.

In June 2014, the Big Ten opened a second office in New York City, featuring both office and meeting space in Midtown Manhattan. Big Ten staff members are based in the New York City office to provide expanded coverage and service, while other conference and institutional administrators utilize the space as necessary when conducting business on the East Coast. The Big Ten and its member institutions also have access to satellite office space in Washington, D.C.

Petitti and his staff work to meet the educational needs of student-athletes to allow them to excel

in all areas of their lives. The conference office manages 27 different championships and tournaments, offers legislative and compliance services, oversees the production and distribution of more than 2,000 events annually, provides staff services to coaching and administrative personnel, and remains a vital resource for media and fans seeking information on the Big Ten.

On March 7, 2020, in advance of the rising tide of the COVID-19 pandemic, the conference partnered

with all 14 of its member institutions to create the Big Ten Task Force for Emerging Infectious Diseases. This group was formed to provide counsel and sound medical advice to ensure the health, safety and wellness of the Big Ten's students, coaches, administrators and fans. Less than two months later on May 4, 2020, the conference announced the formation of the Big Ten Mental Health and Wellness Cabinet, featuring representation from all 14 member institutions, as well as sport affiliate members Johns Hopkins (men's and women's lacrosse) and Notre Dame (men's ice hockey). The goal of the cabinet is to promote optimal mental health for Big Ten student-athletes through a comprehensive, systemic and interdisciplinary approach to establishing mental health programs, while also providing counsel, advice and expertise to the conference office.

One of the signature moments of Warren's tenure as commissioner came on June 1, 2020, when,

following the death of Minneapolis resident George Floyd, he penned an open letter in which he announced the formation of what became known as the Big Ten Equality Coalition. This group, which features student-athletes, coaches, athletic directors, chancellors, presidents and other members of the Big Ten family from all 14 member institutions, has a stated goal of seeking tangible ways to actively and constructively combat racism and hate around the world, while also empowering student-athletes

to express their rights to free speech and peaceful protest.

A product of the conversations emerging from the coalition was the creation of the Big Ten Voter Registration Initiative. This non-partisan, conference-wide collaboration encourages student-athletes to take part in the electoral process and is led by a Voter Registration Committee that includes

representatives from all 14 Big Ten institutions.

More than 125 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.

JUDD CORNELL

Former Nebraska's men's golfer and assistant coach Judd Cornell returned to his alma mater to lead the Husker program in August of 2022.

Cornell came back to Lincoln after spending three seasons (2019-22) as the head coach at Creighton. An Omaha native, Cornell was an assistant coach at Nebraska for six seasons, including his final two years in Lincoln as associate head coach (2017-18 and 2018-19).

"We are excited that Judd Cornell will be coming back to Nebraska to lead the young men in the Husker golf program," Nebraska Director of Athletics Trev Alberts said. "Judd is a hard-working, high-character leader who knows the importance of helping student-athletes develop both on and off the course. He knows our program as well as anyone in the country and will take great pride in continuing the growth of our program."

Upon the announcement of his hiring on Aug. 11, 2022, Cornell immediately focused his attention on helping the Huskers improve.

"My family and I are thrilled to be back in Lincoln, and I can't wait to lead the Husker men's golf program," Cornell said. "I want to thank Trev Alberts for giving me the opportunity to return to the University of Nebraska and lead a program that means so much to me. The Husker program has been climbing in the national standings the past several years, and we plan to keep moving forward in the years to come."

Cornell began to lay his foundation by leading the Huskers to five top-eight team finishes in 2022-23. Every Husker posted an individual stroke average of better than 76.1 during the season, while competition on a daily basis became the standard. Ten different Huskers played at least nine competitive rounds on the year.

The Huskers feature eight returning letter winners in 2023-24, led by fifth-year senior Will

Marshall alongside seniors Reed Malleck and Gentry Scheve.

Cornell, who took over the top spot at Creighton on Aug. 15, 2019, had his first season with the Jays cut short by the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite an early end to the spring, Cornell's first season featured strong performances from junior Nate Vontz, who led CU with a 73.40 scoring average in 2019-20. It was CU's best individual single-season scoring average since 2007-08.

Creighton continued to make strides in Cornell's second year, as the Jays' 296.67 scoring average in 2020-21 was the program's best since at least 2002-03. Vontz also continued to thrive under Cornell's tutelage with a 72.06 scoring average that ranked No. 2 in program history. Vontz went on to earn first-team All-BIG EAST honors. Charlie Zielinski, an Omaha native, added an impressive freshman season in 2020-21, capturing second-team All-BIG EAST accolades with his 73.56 stroke average. A third Bluejay, Jackson Thompson, qualified for the 2021 U.S. Amateur Championship at Oakmont.

With Vontz and Zielinski leading the way again in 2021-22, Cornell's Jays slashed 4.5 strokes per round off their 2020-21 average. Creighton, which finished with a 292.17 team average, also notched the three best team rounds in program history. The Bluejays won Stampede at the Creek in October of 2021 with an 836 (-28), including a program-best first round aggregate of 275 (-13). Vontz won the tournament with a 197 (-19), including individual rounds of 63 (-9) and 65 (-7). Vontz repeated as a first-team All-BIG EAST selection, while Zielinski repeated as a secondteam all-conference honoree. Zielinski also earned a spot on the BIG EAST All-Tournament Team after a third-place individual finish at the league championship. Zielinski added a fourth-place finish at the Nebraska Amateur Championship and qualified for the U.S. Amateur Championship in Paramus, N.J. Another Bluejay, Shaun Campbell, a junior from Tauranga, New Zealand, claimed the 2022 Nebraska Amateur title with a 72-hole score of 282 (-2) at Firethorn Golf Club in Lincoln (July 25-28).

Off the course, Creighton's team led the BIG EAST with a 3.758 GPA, including three golfers who posted perfect 4.0 grade-point averages in

the spring of 2021. The team's performance in the classroom earned Cornell's squad a second straight BIG EAST Team Academic Excellence Award, which is presented to the program with the best GPA in each league sport.

Cornell's experience and extensive time with many of the top instructors throughout the United States played a huge role in the preparation and development on and off the course for the golfers he has coached. He worked with Michael Colgate in 2015-16 when Colgate qualified for the NCAA Regionals as an individual. In 2019, Cornell assisted Nebraska to its highest Big Ten finish in school history (5th), as well as its best finish at the Big Ten Match Play Championship (4th).

A member of the Golf Coaches Association of America (GCAA), Cornell also served as tournament director for the Git-R-Done Husker Invitational in 2019, NU's first home tournament in 12 years.

As a Husker golfer, Cornell was part of Nebraska's 2006 NCAA Regional team that included PGA Tour player Brady Schnell and PGA Tour Latino America winner Ty Capps. Cornell was a three-time team captain, a firstteam Academic All-Big 12 honoree and the first recipient of the Dick Spangler Memorial Scholarship for his leadership on and off the golf course. He was named 2004 Nebraska Amateur Player of the Year and competed in some of the nation's top amateur events, including the U.S. Amateur, Western Amateur and North and South Amateur. During his time as a professional, Cornell had success on multiple tours such as the Hooters Tour, Egolf, Dakotas Tour, Gateway, Web.com and Adams tour where he was named 2007 Rookie of the Year and finished among the top 20 on the money list.

Cornell graduated from the University of Nebraska in 2007. He and his wife, Bridget, have two children, Michael (5) and Grace (3). His family includes his parents, Mike and Patti Cornell and his two sisters Katy and Meggie Cornell. His father Mike is Director of Instruction at Champions Run in Omaha. Mike has been named top golf instructor in the state of Nebraska and the Midwest region multiple times in more than 35 years in the golf business.

Minzel, a team captain as a golfer on the 2004 Nebraska Wesleyan team that qualified for the NCAA Division III Championships, brings strong credentials and a passion for helping young players improve their games to the Husker staff.

A Lincoln High School graduate, Minzel earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Nebraska Wesleyan in 2004. He has worked professionally in private business since graduation, but he has remained extremely active in the Nebraska golf community.

From 2017 to 2019, Minzel was a tournament committee member for the Nebraska Golf Association. A three-time Nebraska Mid-Amateur champion with wins in 2010, 2011 and most recently in 2018, Minzel is also a two-time Nebraska Four-Ball champion (2011, 2015). In 2010, he was a member of USGA Nebraska State Team.

Following his senior season at Nebraska Wesleyan, Minzel was the 2004 Nebraska Match Play champion. He was also a Cleveland Golf All-America Scholar as a senior for the Prairie Wolves

A three-time Class A state qualifier at Lincoln High (1997, 1998, 1999), Minzel spent his first two collegiate seasons helping Northeast Community College in Norfolk to NJCAA national tournament appearances in 2001 and 2002. He was a member of the South Dakota men's golf program in the fall of 2002 before transferring to Nebraska Wesleyan.

SENIOR (2022-23)

Will Marshall emerged as a leader in his fourth season as a Husker in 2022-23. He closed the year with a team-best five top-25 finishes while competing in a team-best 28 rounds. His 73.68 stroke average ranked third among the Huskers. He opened the season with a then-career-best 68 (-4) in the second round of the Badger Invitational (Sept. 11-13) in Verona, Wis., on his way to a tie for 16th.

He led Nebraska with a 218 (73-70-75) to tie for 23rd at the William H. Tucker Intercollegiate in Albuquerque (Sept. 23-24).

Marshall faced challenging scoring conditions at the Purdue Fall Invitational (Oct. 10-11), managing a 228 (79-75-74) to tie for 41st in the 15-team field.

He closed the fall with a 220 (72-75-73) to tie for 50th at the White Sands Invitational in the Bahamas (Oct. 28-30).

Marshall's 73.45 stroke average during the fall helped Nebraska establish a record for best fall stroke average by the Huskers (289.64).

He continued his strong play to open the spring by going 1-1 at the Big Ten Match Play in Palm Coast, Fla. (Feb. 3-4).

Marshall then led the Nebraska lineup with a 222 (76-75-71) to tie for 47th at The Prestige in Palm Springs, Calif. (Feb. 20-22). He was NU's No. 3 individual finisher at the Desert Mountain Collegiate in Scottsdale, Ariz. (March 4-5), closing with a 228 to tie for 48th.

He put together a strong performance with a 213 (70-76-67) that included a career-best 67 (-5) to tie for 19th individually at the Seahawk

Intercollegiate in Wilmington, N.C. (March 26-27). Marshall followed that performance with a career-best 54-hole score of 210 (71-71-68) to finish at six-under-par and tie for 21st at the Tiger Collegiate on a par-72, 7,221-yard layout at The Club at Old Hawthorne in Missouri (April 10-11).

Marshall notched a third consecutive top-25 finish by tying for 19th with a 223 (75-74-74) at the Fighting Illini Spring Collegiate (April 22-23).

He closed the year as Nebraska's No. 5 finisher with a 159 over two rounds in a rain-shortened Big Ten Championship at Galloway, N.J. (April 28-29).

JUNIOR (2021-22)

Marshall contributed to Nebraska's impressive team performances to close the fall campaign. Marshall earned lineup spots in each of Nebraska's final three tournaments of the fall and put up strong numbers.

He closed with a then-career-best 212 (-4) to produce his first career top-25 finish at the Quail Valley Collegiate in Vero Beach, Fla. (Oct. 17-18). Marshall finished the fall with four consecutive rounds under par, including a then-career-best 70 (-2) in the first round on the 7,460-yard layout at Quail Valley. He added back-to-back rounds of 71 to tie for 25th in a strong 84-player field.

Marshall made his first appearance in the Husker lineup at the William H. Tucker Intercollegiate in Albuquerque (Sept. 24-25) and was Nebraska's top finisher at the 18-team event, producing a then-career-best tie for 28th with a then-career-best 221 (75-73-73) in a 100-player field on the UNM Championship Course.

He followed with a 216 (E) on a 7,200-yard layout at the Rich Harvest Farms Invitational in his home state of Illinois. His final round 71 (-1) began a string of four consecutive rounds better than par to close the season. With Marshall playing great golf in the heart of the Husker lineup, Nebraska ended the fall with six consecutive team rounds under par - which is believed to be the first time that happened in school history.

Marshall closed the fall campaign with a 72.11 stroke average over nine rounds to rank second among the Huskers heading into the spring.

After playing in three matches to open the spring at the Big Ten Match Play in Palm Coast, Fla. (Feb. 4-5), Marshall tied for 46th with a 228

(76-72-80) at the Desert Mountain Collegiate in Scottsdale, Ariz. (March 5-6). He followed with a strong performance to lead the Huskers and tie for 32nd overall with a 222 (71-72-79) at the Seahawk Intercollegiate in Wilmington, N.C. (March 27-28).

Marshall wrapped up the 2021-22 season with a 73.27 stroke average through 15 rounds.

SOPHOMORE (2020-21)

Marshall earned his first lineup appearance of the season at the Hoosier Collegiate (April 3-4), and contributed to Nebraska's third-place team finish. Marshall tied for 39th by posting a three-round score of 232 (82-78-72). His final-round 72 (+1) was Nebraska's second-best individual round on The Pfau Course in Bloomington.

His performance in Indiana also helped him earn a lineup spot at the Aggie Invitational (April 9-11), where he tied for 57th with a three-round score of 230 (77-76-77). Marshall helped the Huskers to a seventh-place team finish in a loaded 17-team field at the Traditions Club. Marshall made his third straight lineup appearance at the Git-R-Done Husker Invitational (April 17-18), tying for 46th with a 230 (77-75-78) over three rounds at Firethorn Golf Club.

Marshall closed the season by tying for 51st at the Big Ten Championship (April 30-May 2). He finished with a three-round total of 236 (78-79-79) at Crooked Stick Golf Club in Carmel, Ind.

Marshall ended the year with a 77.33 stroke average over 12 spring rounds.

FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Marshall got his first taste of collegiate golf by posting a 76.50 stroke average over six rounds for the Huskers as a freshman in 2019-20. Marshall competed for the Huskers at the Maridoe Intercollegiate, finishing with a 234 (+18) in a tie for 45th. In his first college round, he fired a 73 (+1) to close the first 18 holes at Maridoe in the top 10.

His performance at Maridoe helped him earn a lineup spot at the Royal Oaks Intercollegiate, where he tied teammate Branden Meyer for the top finish among the Huskers with a then-careerbest 225 (+12), which included a then-careerbest 71 (E) in the final round. Marshall tied for 57th overall at Royal Oaks.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

As a senior in the fall of 2018, Marshall led Kaneland High School to its first state championship appearance since 2012. He fired a program record 63 (-9) en route to repeating as the individual champion at the Northern Illinois Big 12 Conference Tournament. He then placed third at the Illinois Class 2A Sectional to help Kaneland advance to the state finals.

Marshall finished his high school career with three top-five finishes in four years at the Illinois State Championships.

He earned two individual tournament titles during the high school season in 2018 and received honors for both the Northern Illinois Big 12 All-Conference and IHSA All-State teams.

Marshall finished off his high school career with a tie for fifth at the 2018 Illinois Class 2A State Championship. He was also honored as the Daily Chronicle 2018 Boys Golfer of the Year.

Marshall had a standout summer of 2018 as well, posting three top-10 finishes at the national level in American Junior Golf Association tournaments in Kansas, Illinois and Colorado. He was ranked as the No. 3 golfer in the state of Illinois for 2019.

JUNIOR (2022-23)

Reed Malleck ranked second among the Huskers with 22 rounds played in 2022-23 while posting a 74.86 stroke average on the year. He opened his junior campaign by tying for 72nd with a two-round total of 152 (79-73) at the Badger Invitational in Verona, Wis. (Sept. 12-13).

Malleck missed Nebraska's next two fall events with injury before returning to compete at the White Sands Invitational (Oct. 28-30). He tied for 46th with a then-career-best 219 (79-71-69) in the Bahamas that included a career-best-tying 69 (-3) in the final round.

After a slow start to the spring with a 236 at The Prestige in Palm Springs, Calif., Malleck rebounded to tie for 28th at the Desert Mountain Collegiate with a 223 (69-79-75) that included a career-best-tying 69 in the opening round. He matched that with another 69 in the final round at the Seahawk Intercollegiate (March 26-27) to finish with a then-career-best 216 (E) on his way to a tie for 36th.

Malleck notched another 69 in the second round at the Tiger Collegiate on his way to a career-best 211 (70-69-72) and a tie for 25th at the Club at Old Hawthorne in Columbia, Mo. It marked his third career-best tournament score in a span of five events. His 69 also helped the Huskers to a second-round team total of 274 (-14), which was the best round in school history.

He capped his season as Nebraska's top finisher at the Big Ten Championship (April 28-29) with a two-round total of 152 (79-73) to tie for 41st in Galloway, N.J. (April 28-29).

SOPHOMORE (2021-22)

Malleck made his Nebraska lineup debut in the season-opening Rod Myers Invitational (Sept. 11-12) and was NU's top individual finisher at the 14-team event. He tied for 41st with a



then-career-best 223 (+7) in an 81-player field. Malleck's performance included an opening-round 71 (-1) on the par-72, 7,154-yard layout of the Duke University Golf Course. He added rounds of 74 and 78 to produce one of NU's counting scores in all three rounds.

He returned to the lineup at the Rich Harvest Farms Invitational in Sugar Grove, III. (Oct. 2-4), producing solid scores to finish at 224 (73-76-75) and tie for 63rd individually.

Malleck opened the spring with a perfect 3-0 record to lead Nebraska at the Big Ten Match Play in Palm Coast, Fla. (Feb. 5-6). He made his first stroke play appearance of the spring at the Stitch Intercollegiate in Raleigh, N.C. (April 8-9), where he tied for 40th with a 226 (71-75-80) while playing as an individual outside the Husker lineup. His opening-round 71 (-1) matched his then-career best. Malleck played outside the lineup again at the Hawkeye Invitational on April 16-17, putting up a 225 (74-74-77) to tie for 39th. Malleck capped the season in the lineup at the Big Ten Championship, where he shot a 239 (74-80-85) to place 64th.

He finished the 2021-22 season with a 75.80 stroke average over 15 rounds.

FRESHMAN (2020-21)

Malleck got his first taste of collegiate action by tying for 34th in a 60-player field at the Git-R-Done Husker Invitational (April 17-18). He put up solid numbers with a three-round score of 224 (75-74-75) on the par-71, 7,040-yard layout at Firethorn Golf Club in Lincoln.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Ranked as the No. 1 golfer in the Class of 2020 in the state of Nebraska, Malleck enjoyed one of the best careers in York Duke golf history.

He holds the competitive course record at York Country Club after shooting a 62 (-8), which also set the 18-hole high school meet record.

Malleck tallied six high school invitational victories and 13 runner-up finishes during his three-year career. He was a first-team Nebraska Super-State selection as a junior in 2019, before the worldwide outbreak of the coronavirus forced the cancellation of his senior season of high school golf in 2020.

During the summer of 2020, Malleck captured the Nebraska Junior Match Play championship at Hillcrest Country Club in Lincoln. He fired a 68 (-4) in the qualifying round.

Malleck was the top point scorer at the 2019 Nebraska-Kansas Junior Cup Matches. A talented multi-sport athlete, Malleck was also a basketball letterwinner for the York Dukes.

Gentry Scheve made a major move up the Nebraska lineup late in the spring and closed his third season as a Husker with the team's No. 2 stroke average (73.35) over 14 rounds. His season stroke average and rounds played were both career bests.

Scheve, who earned lineup spots in each of Nebraska's last four tournaments of the season, was NU's top finisher at the Fighting Illini Spring Collegiate (April 22-23). He posted a career-best fourth-place individual finish with a 215 (69-72-74) on the par-71, 7,538-yard layout of the Atkins Golf Club.

His effort in Illinois followed a career-best 208 (70-66-72) as Nebraska's top finisher at the Tiger Collegiate (April 10-11). His tie for 12th included a career-best 66 (-6) in the second round on the par-72, 7,221-yard layout of the Club at Old Hawthorne. With Scheve leading the way in the second round, Nebraska posted the best team round in school history with a 274 (-14).

His spring lineup appearances began with a tie for 44th with a 219 (74-75-70) as NU's No. 3 finisher at the Seahawk Intercollegiate in Wilmington, N.C. (March 26-27).

Scheve closed the season as Nebraska's No. 3 finisher in a tie for 46th with a 154 (78-76) at the rain-shortened Big Ten Championship (April 28-29) in Galloway, N.J.

He made his lone lineup appearance of the fall at the William H. Tucker Intercollegiate in Albuquerque (Sept. 23-24). He finished with a 231 (73-77-81) to tie for 91st while playing out of the No. 1 spot in Nebraska's lineup.

SOPHOMORE (2021-22)

Scheve opened his second season as one of the top players in Nebraska's lineup at the Rod Myers Invitational in Durham, N.C. (Sept. 11-12). He closed with a three-round score of 227 (+11), including a then-career-best 71 (-1) in the opening round on the par-72, 7,154-yard layout of the Duke University Golf Course.

Scheve added his second lineup appearance at the Stitch Intercollegiate in Raleigh, N.C. (April 8-9). He tied for 69th individually and fourth among the Huskers with a 231 (74-75-82). Scheve earned the No. 3 finish for the Huskers at the Hawkeye Invitational (April 16-17) with a 227, including a 71 (-1) in the opening round.

For the 2021-22 season, he recorded a 76.11 stroke average over nine rounds.

FRESHMAN (2020-21)

Scheve opened his collegiate career by competing for Nebraska in three of four team matches at the Big Ten Match Play Championship at the Hammock Beach Resort in Palm Coast, Fla. (Feb. 5-6). He managed a 1-2 record.

Scheve made his stroke play debut by competing as an individual outside Nebraska's lineup at the Git-R-Done Husker Invitational (April 17-18). He posted a 225 (74-73-78) to finish 36th in a 60-player field.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Scheve was a two-time Kansas 5A first-team all-state member for the Emporia Spartans. He finished in the top 12 at the state tournament in each of his first three seasons.

After finishing 12th at state as a freshman, he took third in Salina as a sophomore in 2018. As a junior in 2019, Scheve tied for first with a

then career-best 67 (-5) in Dodge City, but lost a playoff with Wichita Eisenhower's Tyler Trudo.

Scheve was the back-to-back Centennial League Player of the Year in 2018 and 2019, and ended his junior season with five individual and three runner-up finishes. His senior season was canceled due to the coronavirus outbreak.

In the summer of 2019, Scheve won the Kansas Junior Golf Association Tour Championship by three strokes after shooting a blazing first-round 64 (-8) and followed it up with a second-round 70 (-2) for a 134 (-10). He went on to claim the KJGA Match Play Championship by winning four consecutive matches.

The sophomore from Oxted, England carded a career-best 67 (-5) in the final round at Purdue, before adding another 67 at the White Sands Bahamas Invitational on his way to a Division I career-best 210 for the tournament. He added an 11th-place finish in the Bahamas but did not compete during the spring season.

Crockett made his first lineup appearance at the Badger Invitational (Verona, Wis.). He tied for 34th on the par-72, 7,259-yard layout at the University Ridge Golf Course.

Crockett was back in the lineup at the William H. Tucker Intercollegiate in Albuquerque, N.M., where he fired a three-round score of 222 (+6) to earn a tie for 45th.

Crockett competed in all four of Nebraska's fall tournaments, finishing with Husker season and career stroke average records (71.82) over 11 rounds.

In his first season as a Husker, Grant Jabenis made regular contributions to the lineup, competing in 20 rounds while posting a 74.50 stroke average.

He earned his first lineup appearance at the Purdue Fall Invitational (Oct. 10-11). The Omaha Westside product finished 33rd in Indiana, before closing the fall with a tie for 59th at the White Sands Bahamas Invitational.

His 74.83 stroke average helped Nebraska establish a record for fall stroke average (289.64).

Jabenis opened spring stroke play at The Prestige in Indio, Calif. (Feb. 20-22). He opened with back-to-back rounds of 71 and finished in third place at 215 (-1) to match Nebraska's top individual finish of the season

Evan McDermott produced a solid freshman season by tying for third among the Huskers with 20 rounds played while posting a 75.45 stroke average.

McDermott made immediate contributions in the fall, competing in the Husker lineup at the Purdue and White Sands invitationals after playing as an individual outside the Husker lineup at the season-opening Badger Invitational.

He capped the fall with a career-best 216 (67-74-75) that included a career-best 67 (-5) at the White Sands Invitational in Paradise Island, Bahamas (Oct. 28-30). McDermott tied for 32nd overall as NU's No. 3 finisher at the event. His effort in the Bahamas followed a tie for 41st at Purdue with a 228 (74-74-80), Oct. 10-11.

McDermott opened the season as Nebraska's top finisher by tying for sixth with a 148 (72-

76) while playing as an individual at the rainshortened Badger Invitational (Sept. 11-13).

He opened the spring by going 1-2 at the Big Ten Match Play, before carding a 232 (76-75-81) at The Prestige (Feb. 20-22). He was the No. 2 finisher in Nebraska's lineup in California, before earning his final lineup appearance of the year at the Desert Mountain Collegiate in Scottsdale (March 4-5). He was NU's No. 4 finisher in Arizona with a 234 (77-75-82).

He added a tie for 13th with a 215 (72-71-72) at the Huntsville Toyota Bearkat Invitational at Lake Conroe Golf Course (April 3-4), before closing his A&M career with a tie for 50th with a 224 (73-77-74) at the Aggie Invitational at the Traditions Golf Club (April 10-11).

As a sophomore in 2021-22, Myers competed in four tournaments, including an eighth-place

tie individually with a 223 (71-75-77) at the Aggie Invitational. He added a tie for 49th with a 221 (78-71-72) while playing as an individual outside the Aggie lineup at the Louisiana Classics in Lafayette, La. (March 14-15). Myers also competed as an individual at the John Burns Intercollegiate in Lihue, Kauai, Hawaii (Feb. 17-19), tying for 52nd with a 222 (75-68-79) that included a career-best 68 in the second round at the Ocean Course at Hokuala.

He opened 2021-22 by tying for second at the Bosque River Classic in Waco, Texas (Sept. 20-21). He fired a career-best three-round total of 214 (74-70-70) on the par-72, 7,478-yard layout at Bear Ridge Golf Club.

He added a victory with a final-round 66 (-6) to finish with a 281 (73-71-71-66) at the Dixie Amateur at Eagle Trace Golf Club in Coral Springs, Fla. (Dec. 18-19).

In the summer of 2022, Myers fired a 66 in the second round at the 121st Wisconsin State Amateur Championship.

He did not compete for Texas A&M during a COVID season in 2020-21, after redshirting as a true freshman in 2019-20.


A native of Northbrook, Ill., Myers closed his high school senior season at Glenbrook North after competing at Carmel Catholic during his sophomore and junior seasons.

A talented multi-sport athlete, Myers was an all-conference performer in both golf and basketball, while earning all-state honors on the course at Carmel Catholic as a junior in 2017-18. He was also the Class 3A three-point state champion as a sophomore at Carmel Catholic in 2016-17. He missed his senior athletic seasons after suffering a knee injury.

However, he returned to the course to compete in the Western Junior for the second straight year in 2019. He was also the runner-up at the IJGA Player-of-the-Year Championship in 2017

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Hamish Murray comes to Nebraska after two strong collegiate seasons at NCAA Division II Cameron University in Lawton, Okla.

In 24 career tournaments, Murray never totaled higher than 227, while amassing six top-five finishes, nine top-10 performances and top-25 showings in 19-of-24 tournaments.

As a sophomore in 2022-23, Murray was named Cameron's Athlete of the Year across all sports after posting a 71.95 stroke average over 37 rounds. He notched top-25 finishes in 11 of 12 tournaments, while breaking his own school record with 128 birdies on the season. He produced five top-10 finishes, including a

season-best tie for third at the Hrnciar (Oct. 17-18). He added a top-five finish with a tie for fourth at the Lone Star Men's Championship with a 213 that included a career-best-tying 67 for the fourth time in his career. Murray also fired a season-best 207 (68-72-67) to finish three-under-par in seventh place at the Ryan Palmer Foundation Invitational (Oct. 3-4).

He closed the season with a tie for eighth with a 214 (74-69-71) to finish two-under-par at the NCAA Division II West/South Central Regional (May 11-13). He finished the year ranked No. 3 in the region and No. 47 nationally by Golfstat, while helping Cameron to a final No. 15 national ranking by Golfstat.

A model of consistency, Murray's highest three-round tournament total of the season was 222, which came with a tie for 11th at the Rattler Invitational (Feb. 20-21) and a tie for 14th at the King-Alfred Invitational (March 20-21).

He earned second-team Lone Star honors on the course and excelled in the classroom to win the Lone Star Academic Player of the Year award.

As a freshman at Cameron in 2021-22, Murray competed in all 13 tournaments for the Aggies while posting a team-best 72.70 stroke average. Murray was ranked No. 19 regionally and No. 166 in NCAA Division II by Golfstat.

The Lone Star Conference Freshman of the Year, Murray produced four top-five efforts, including a career-best runner-up finish at the Oak Tree Invite (March 14-15) with a 213 (72-69-72). He added third-place finishes at The Hrnciar (Oct. 18-19) and the DBU Men's Classic (April 4-5), when he carded a career-best 206 (68-71-67) including a career-best, final-round 67 (-5).

He closed the year with a tie for 42nd with a 215 (71-71-73) at the NCAA West/South Central Regional (May 5-7). He set the Cameron record with 116 birdies as a freshman while tying the school single-season record with six eagles.

Murray went to Cameron after competing for the New South Wales Development Squad in Sydney, Australia. A 2020 New South Wales Sports Leadership Award winner, Murray fired a low round of 66 on his way to a tie for fifth at the adidas Junior 6's National Final. He was also the 2020 Pennant Hills Junior Champion before winning the 2021 Massey Park Cup Championship.

Rhett Hughes comes to Nebraska after a strong high school career in Oklahoma. The four-year varsity golfer out of Edmond Santa Fe High School produced a 10th-place finish at the 2022 Oklahoma Class 6A High School State Championship as a junior in 2022.

Hughes added a tie for 33rd at the state tournament as a senior. A three-time All-Central Oklahoma Athletic Conference performer on the course, Hughes added a runner-up finish at the Oklahoma Boys Junior Amateur in 2022.

He also placed third at the Red River Challenge, which consists of the top juniors in Texas and Oklahoma.

"It's been great getting to know Rhett and he's going to be a fantastic fit to our program," Nebraska Head Coach Judd Cornell said. "He will have a great opportunity to play immediately and really grow as a player. He's shown that he can compete with some of the top juniors in the country on multiple occasions and I'm really excited for him because he's going to have a great career here."

Hughes also placed fourth at the AJGA GreatLife Junior Challenge along with finishing 10th at the Oklahoma 6A-1 State Championships.

PERSONAL

The son of Nick and Ashley Hughes and Lisa and Jeff Adams, Rhett was born April 5, 2005. He has a brother, Chase Hughes, and sisters Bree Hughes and Emmy Adams. Rhett is majoring in finance at Nebraska.

Hughes chose Nebraska over Grand Canyon and Pacific.

"It's closer to home, it's a higher level of competition, and I've always loved Lincoln and its environment," Hughes said. "I've always wanted to play in a Power Five conference."







TREV ALBERTS

VICE CHANCELLOR, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS THIRD YEAR

A veteran administrator and College Football Hall of Famer, Trev Alberts is in his third year as Vice Chancellor, Director of Athletics at the University of Nebraska in 2023-24. Alberts returned to his alma mater after spending 12 years at Nebraska-Omaha, guiding the program through a successful transition to the Division | Tevel

In his first season at Nebraska in 2021-22, Alberts helped the Huskers navigate the ever-changing landscape of Name, Image and Likeness guidelines for the benefit of Nebraska student-athletes. He led the development of the N-Vest Nebraska program to award \$5,980 per year to student-athletes who meet academic benchmarks. Alberts also spearheaded the charge to complete the fundraising for Nebraska's Go Big Project, which will provide Nebraska football with a new facility scheduled to open this fall. The project will also house academic, life skills, nutrition and support services for all Nebraska student-athletes.

A tireless worker who puts both the interests of student-athletes and fans first, Alberts helped orchestrate a qualitative survey of Nebraska's fan base to help shape the future of Memorial Stadium's game-day atmosphere. Alberts has also focused much of his time on developing the first strategic plan for Nebraska Athletics in 15 years. He has also committed himself to providing intense support and a unifying vision for Nebraska's coaches across all sports.

He continued to make a mark on Nebraska Athletics in his second year. Alberts conducted a thorough, nationwide search for a new leader for the Husker football program in the fall of 2022 that resulted in the hiring of Matt Rhule as Nebraska's new head coach. Rhule has a proven track record as a program builder at the college level, winning conference championships at both Temple and Baylor. Since his hiring, Rhule has energized the Nebraska fan base and attracted a

top-25 recruiting class to the Husker program.

Alberts also spearheaded a new 15-year multimedia rights agreement between Nebraska Athletics and Playfly Sports, an emerging leader in sports marketing, media and technology. The partnership is one of the nation's most comprehensive multimedia rights agreements and has a total value of \$301 million for Nebraska over the life of the contract.

Nebraska's athletic achievements in 2022-23 included NCAA top-10 finishes by wrestling, rifle, bowling, women's outdoor track and field, men's gymnastics and men's indoor track and field. In all, 10 Husker teams posted top-20 national finishes, while the men's track team captured the Big Ten outdoor title under first-year coach Justin St. Clair.

Academically, Nebraska student-athletes continued to shine with a school-record 95 percent graduation rate across all sports for the second straight year. All of Nebraska's programs had at least an 88 percent GSR score in the most recent report.

Alberts' impact on college athletics stretches beyond the Nebraska compus. A respected leader at the Big Ten and national level, Alberts serves on both the NCAA's Division I Football Oversight Committee and the NCAA Division I Competition Committee.

Alberts' tenure leading UNO athletics was marked by successes in competition and in academics; by transitioning the university's athletic programs to NCAA Division I in 2011; and by establishing new homes for many UNO athletics teams, including Baxter Arena, the Maverick Park baseball/softball complex and the soccer pitch at Caniglia Field.

Alberts took the bold step in announcing that Omaha would reclassify from Division II to Division I in all sports in 2011 and simultaneously securing conference affiliation with the Summit

League for all of the department's then-Division II programs. His vision for UNO's reclassifying teams was demonstrated even before the four-year transition period had ended. The Omaha baseball team won back-to-back Summit League regular-season championships in 2013 and 2014, while the men's basketball team made its first Division I postseason appearance in 2014 with a berth in the CollegeInsider.com Postseason Tournament.

During UNO's time in the Division I ranks under Alberts tenure, the Mavericks had six teams and four student-athletes qualify for the NCAA Tournament, including hockey advancing to the Frozen Four in 2015 and men's soccer reaching the second round of the NCAA Tournament in the spring of 2021. He also expanded opportunities, adding men's golf and men's soccer in 2011, and Omaha began a men's swimming and diving program in 2021-22.

Throughout his tenure in Omaha, Alberts was focused on enhancing the student-athlete experience, including the construction and staffing of the Hamilton Academic Excellence Room and the development of the Ethel S. Abbott Student-Athlete Development Wing. Those efforts paid off in Nebraska-Omaha student-athletes posting consistent collective semester grade point averages above 3.3 for 18 consecutive semesters, including at least a 3.5 in each of his final three semesters.

The facilities around Omaha Athletics received a major uplift during his tenure. Maverick Park opened in March of 2021 to rave reviews as the home to the Mavericks' baseball and softball programs. Funding for the complex, which includes a 1,500-seat baseball facility and a 650-seat softball facility, were raised privately and provided both programs a permanent on-campus home for the first time.

Another crowning achievement was the opening of Baxter Arena in 2015. Alberts directed efforts to secure community support and funding to build the on-campus arena, which allowed the nationally prominent hockey program to play on campus and also serve as the home of the men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. Caniglia Field underwent renovations in 2012, making it one of the finest collegiate soccer facilities in the country, highlighted by a

Alberts' work on behalf of hockey, UNO's established

Division I sport, also paid dividends. He successfully guided the Mavericks into the new National Collegiate Hockey Conference in 2013-14. The following year, Omaha reached the 2015 NCAA Frozen Four.

In addition, Alberts and his team led Omaha Athletics into a partnership with Learfield, a national leader in the marketing of collegiate athletics, and developed Omaha Sports Properties. As the exclusive corporate sponsorship sales unit for UNO Athletics, Omaha Sports Properties further enhanced revenue and increased brand prominence locally, regionally and nationally.

As part of UNO's reclassification to Division I, Alberts

oversaw the rebranding of UNO athletics with new primary and secondary logos and a greater focus on strengthening the Maverick brand both regionally and

nationally.

As a student-athlete, Alberts was an All-American on and off the football field as a Husker Blackshirt. He was Nebraska's first Butkus Award winner in 1993, helping Coach Tom Osborne's Huskers to an undefeated regular season and an Orange Bowl appearance against Florida State. A first-team All-American by every major publication in 1993, he was also the Football News National Defensive Player of the Year, the Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year, and the Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year. His No. 34 jersey was retired at the 1994 Red-White Spring Game. In 2015, he was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame.
Off the field, Alberts earned the NCAA's

highest honor, The Today's Top Six Award. A three-time Academic All-Big Eight honoree, he was an Academic All-American in 1993. He graduated from Nebraska before his senior

Alberts was the fifth pick in the 1994 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis' Colts and played for the Colts until 1996. Following his NFL career, he served as an analyst on college and professional football games for major national networks, including ESPN, CNN/SI and CBS Sports Network.

Alberts and his wife Angela have three children – Chase (and his wife, Cassie), Ashtynne and Breanna, and one grandson, Walker John.





DR. LAWRENCE CHATTERS

EXECUTIVE ASSOCIATE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR/STRATEGIC INITIATIVES

Dr. Lawrence Chatters serves as the Executive Associate Athletic Director for Strategic Initiatives at Nebraska. In addition to leading the department's diversity, equity and inclusion efforts, Dr. Chatters serves as a senior administrator advising the Director of Athletics. He also provides support to the Human Resources department, directs departmental professional and leadership development, and provides oversight of the implementation and progress of Nebraska Athletics' strategic plan.

Chatters is the primary sports administrator for the men's and women's golf, men's and women's gymnastics, wrestling and swimming and diving teams.

Most recently, Chatters served as Vice President of Student Affairs at Midland University and as the school's Chief Diversity Officer. Chatters oversaw residential life, mental health, student health and the academic success center on campus, and he was responsible for creating and implementing strategic

initiatives to bring inclusive change on campus and in the community. He previously spent six years at Nebraska, working in a wide range of capacities, including positions within Nebraska Athletics as the Diversity and Inclusion Coordinator, and in the UNL Women's Center as the Men's Program Coordinator. He holds a Ph.D (2018) and a Masters' degree (2014) in counseling psychology from UNL.

As Nebraska's Diversity and Inclusion Coordinator, Chatters helped developed and implement Nebraska Athletics' diversity and inclusion strategic plan and played a crucial role in creating the Huskers' annual diversity and inclusion summit for NU Athletics staff and Husker student-athletes. He also provided inclusive outreach opportunities within the Lincoln community.

Prior to accepting the position at Midland, Dr. Chatters served as a postdoctoral fellow in the Center for Counseling and Psychological Services at Penn State University. He also served as an

adjunct professor in the school's counselor education department.

Dr. Chatters has also worked as an academic advisor, course instructor and mental health counselor with focused efforts and experience in students' mental, social, and emotional health, providing individual counseling, group counseling, inclusive outreach and crisis management. He also had success as a business owner and was the executive director of the Goldwin Foundation, an organization that raised funds for providing grants for National Children's Hospitals and other programs that focused on serving children with special medical needs.

Dr. Chatters graduated from Midland University in 2002 with a degree in psychology. He has been a licensed mental health practitioner since 2006.

RODNEY BENNETT

UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA-LINCOLN CHANCELLOR **FIRST YEAR**

Dr. Rodney D. Bennett is the 21st chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Nebraska's flagship, Land-Grant and Big Ten institution. He is a 30-year veteran of higher education with a track record of growing research, increasing student success and building impactful partnerships.

Chancellor Bennett came to Nebraska after nine years of successful leadership at the University of Southern Mississippi. During his tenure as president, USM was reclassified from a Carnegie R2 to an R1 university, signaling growth in research prestige and funding. Dr. Bennett also invested in programs to support student recruitment, retention and outcomes, including for the 30 percent of USM students who were first-generation. His efforts led to an improvement in the university's sixyear graduation rate.

While at USM, Dr. Bennett established new faculty positions in high-growth areas and increased the average salary for full-time faculty; oversaw \$300 million in facilities work; and launched the largest fundraising campaign in the University of Southern Mississippi's history. He was a strong champion of the Division I athletics program, investing in new facilities and programs to support student-athletes, including a dedicated mental health counselor to serve studentathletes. Throughout his time as president, he brought a conservative approach to budget management, meeting or exceeding the budgetary goals set by the Mississippi Institutions of Higher Learning Board of Trustees.

Prior to his role at the University of Southern Mississippi, Dr. Bennett served at the University of Georgia for more than a decade. He was the senior administrator for student programs and services for Georgia's 34,000-plus students; oversaw \$150 million in capital projects; and made key staff and programmatic investments in extracurriculars, mental health programs and other areas to better support students.

Dr. Bennett has also been the dean of students at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina, and associate dean of student life at Middle Tennessee State

Chancellor Bennett values community leadership and service. He has served on numerous boards, including the Mississippi Aquarium, Northeast Georgia Girl Scouts of America, Catholic Health East (Philadelphia), and St. Mary's Health Care System in Athens, Georgia. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and Past Sire Archon for Sigma Pi Phi fraternity, The Boulé.

Dr. Bennett earned a bachelor's degree in mass communication (1990), a master's degree in educational administration (1992), and an education specialist degree (1993) from Middle Tennessee State. He earned his Doctor of Education degree from Tennessee State University (1996).

He and his wife, Temple, are the parents of two adult daughters, Colby and Logan.

FACULTY ATHLETIC REPRESENTATIVE FOURTH YEAR

Scott M. Fuess Jr. is in his fourth year as Nebraska's Faculty Athletics Representative, having started on July 1, 2020.

As faculty athletics representative, Fuess serves as a liaison between the Office of the Chancellor and Athletic Department. He also serves on the Athletic Department's Executive Staff. His areas of focus in the role include the welfare of student-athletes, NCAA and Big Ten Conference compliance, maintaining the positive relationship between athletics and faculty, developing and responding to NCAA legislative proposals and representing the university at related NCAA and Big Ten Conference meetings.

The half-time position - which was restructured to an expected term of five years - reports directly to Nebraska's President and consults with Director of Athletics Trev Alberts. He splits time between faculty representative duties and academic responsibilities.

Fuess, the Steinhart Distinguished Professor of Business and former chair of the College of Business' economics department, has worked at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln since 1986. He serves on the Faculty Senate's Intercollegiate Athletics Committee, having chaired the committee for 2018-19 and a sub-committee in 2017-18. He also has served on numerous Big Ten Conference committees, including the Sports Management Committee, the Compliance and Reinstatement Committee and the Legislative Review Committee. For 2022-23 he served as Chair of the B1G Compliance and Reinstatement Committee.

Fuess earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Delaware, as well as master's and doctoral degrees from Purdue University.














































HUSKERS SET MULTIPLE RECORDS IN 2022-23



Gentry Scheve finished with a career-best 208 (-8) to lead Nebraska at the Tiger Collegiate. Scheve's second-round 66 helped the Huskers set the school single-round record with a 274 (-14) on the par-72, 7,221-yard layout of The Club at Old Hawthorne in Columbia, Mo., April 10, 2023.

The Nebraska men's golf team made steady improvements in Coach Judd Cornell's first season leading the Huskers in 2022-23.

Cornell, who returned to Nebraska after three seasons at Creighton, helped the Huskers to a school-record 274 (-14) in the second round of the Tiger Collegiate at The Club at Old Hawthorne in Columbia, Mo., April 10.

He also helped lead first-year Husker Harry Crockett to a school-record 71.82 stroke average through 11 fall rounds in 2022.

Junior Gentry Scheve shaved strokes off his game and gained confidence throughout his third season in Lincoln, finishing with a career-best 73.35 stroke average on the year. Scheve fired a career-best 208 (-8) in Missouri that included a career-best 66 (-6) in Nebraska's record-setting team round. He followed with a fourth-place finish in a strong field at the Fighting Illini Spring Collegiate (April 22-23) as a final tune-up for the Big Ten Championship.

Cornell also got solid play and improvement throughout the season from senior Will Marshall, who finished with a 73.68 stroke average over a team-high 28 rounds. Marshall closed his fourth season in Lincoln with five top-25 finishes in 2022-23, before deciding to return for a fifth season to lead the Huskers in 2023-24.

While Crockett, Scheve and Marshall set the tone for laying the foundation of Nebraska's future, they were far from alone in giving Cornell plenty of reasons for optimism.

Junior Reed Malleck continued to cut strokes off his game, and the third-year golfer from York, Neb., capped his season as Nebraska's top finisher at the 2023 Big Ten Championship at the Galloway National Golf Club in New Jersey (April 28-29). Malleck finished the rain-shortened

conference tournament with a 36-hole total of 152 to tie for 41st. Malleck closed the year with a 74.86 stroke average over 22 rounds, ranking second among the Huskers in rounds played on the season trailing only Marshall's 28.

Malleck was followed in the Big Ten Championship standings by first-year Husker Grant Jabenis, who finished just one stroke back in a tie for 43rd. Jabenis, a sophomore from Omaha, contributed 20 rounds and finished with a solid 74.50 average. His season highlights included a second-place finish while playing as an individual at the Stampede at The Creek and a third-place finish while playing at The Prestige Individual in California early in the spring.

Another young Husker, Davis Johnson posted Nebraska's No. 4 finish at the Big Ten Championship while closing the season strong down the stretch. The freshman from Minnesota earned lineup spots in each of Nebraska's last three tournaments beginning with the Tiger Collegiate.

Overall, the Huskers are set to return all five of the members of their lineup from the 2023 Big Ten Championship.

Nebraska opened the 2022-23 season with a solid fourth-place finish in an 18-team at the Badger Invitational in Verona, Wis. (Sept. 11-13). Marshall led the Big Red with a tie for 16th (142) over two rounds that included a second-round 68 (-4). Senior Jeremy Sisson and freshman Quinn Yost added ties for 20th at 143 (-1), while Crockett tied for 34th at 145 (+1).

The Huskers traveled next to New Mexico for the William H. Tucker Intercollegiate in Albuquerque, where Marshall notched his second straight top-25 finish by tying for 23rd at 218 (+2). Sisson and Yost again tied for

Nebraska's No. 2 finish, this time at 222 (+6) while Crockett also tied them for 45th overall.

Crockett broke through at the Purdue Fall Invitational with a third-place individual finish at 213 (-3). Crockett's performance included a final-round 67 (-5) on the 7,465-yard layout at the Kampen Course. Jabenis also made his first contributions as a Husker by tying for 33rd as Nebraska's No. 2 finisher at 225 (+9) to help the Big Red to a fifth-place finish in a 15-team field at Purdue.

The Huskers closed the fall with an eighth-place finish in a 12-team field at the White Sands Bahamas Invitational at Paradise Island (Oct. 28-30). Sisson led the Big Red with his tie for sixth at 207 (-9), while Crockett added a tie for 11th at 210 (-6) that included another final-round 67. Freshman Evan McDermott also performed well with an even-par 216 as NU's No. 3 finisher in a tie for 32nd.

After opening the spring with a 1-2-0 record at the Big Ten Match Play, the Huskers struggled at The Prestige in Palm Springs, Calif., settling for 22nd in a 24-team field.

NU added an 11th-place showing in a 16-team field at the Desert Mountain Collegiate in Scottsdale, Ariz. (March 4-5), before taking 12th at the Seahawk Intercollegiate in North Carolina (March 26-27). Marshall led the Huskers with his tie for 19th at 213 (-3), which included a final-round 67 (-4) to start a stretch of three straight top-25 finishes for the senior from Elburn, III.

The Huskers finished seventh among 14 teams at the Tiger Collegiate, before taking sixth in the regular-season finale at the Fighting Illini Spring Collegiate. The season concluded with a 12th-place effort over just two rounds at the Big Ten Championship.





Will Marshall was a consistent factor in the Nebraska lineup throughout 2022-23. The senior from Elburn, Ill., produced five top-25 finishes and a 73.68 stroke average over 28 rounds. He will return to the Huskers in his fifth season in 2023-24.







Brady Schnell (Omaha, Nebraska/Mesa, Arizona)

HUSKERS IN PROFESSIONAL GOLF

Brady Schnell claimed his PGA Tour card by finishing 22nd on the Web.com Tour money list in 2018. His \$178,081 in earnings in 2018 included a victory in the Wichita Open. Schnell, who is a graduate of Millard West High School, competed on the Web.com Tour from 2010 to 2018. In 2019, he earned more than \$200,000 on the PGA Tour. He finished 23rd at the AT&T Byron Nelson Classic in May, after taking 12th at the Corales Puntacana Resort & Club Championship in March. He competed on the Korn Ferry Tour in 2020 and 2021. He also owns a pair of PGA Latinoamerica Tour victories, and he competed on the PGA Tour Canada in 2009, when he shot an amazing 59 at the ATB Financial Classic in August of 2014. He became just the 16th player

on a major professional tour in history to break

60 in a round. Schnell lists his home club as

One of the best professional golfers in Nebraska history, Scott Gutschewski was a three-year letterman at Nebraska in 1997, 1998 and 1999. He was also a member of the Huskers' most successful team - the 1999 squad that finished 14th at the NCAA Championships. Gutschewski spent several years on the Canadian Tour and the Nationwide Tour. He earned his first spot on the PGA Tour in 2005 after finishing 17th on the Nationwide Tour money list in 2004. He added PGA Tour seasons in 2006, 2007, 2009 and 2011. He finished in the top 25 on the Nationwide Tour in three separate seasons (2004, 2008, 2010). He earned his 2007 PGA Tour card through qualifying school. He returned to the University of Nebraska to earn his bachelor's degree in professional golf management in 2014. He continued to compete on the Korn Ferry Tour in 2019, 2020 and 2021, earning his PGA Tour card again for the 2021-22 season. He took fifth at the 2022 Barracuda Championship and added a tie for 18th at the Valero Texas Open. He also tied for 31st at the 3M Open. In 2022-23, Gutschewski posted six top-25 finishes on the Korn Ferry Tour through August, including a \$180,000 win at the LECOM Suncoast Classic (April 20-23). He was ranked in the top 40 on the Korn Ferry Tour at the end of August. He resides in Elkhorn, Neb., with his wife and four children. He grew up in Omaha.

Jeff Klein (Scottsbluff, Nebraska)


A former Husker who took a long road to the PGA Tour, Jeff Klein earned his PGA Tour card in 2003 at the age of 44. Klein, who was a member of the South African Tour in 1991, was also a member of the Champions Tour after his brief stint on the PGA Tour. In 2008, he shot a six-under-par 64 in the first round of the U.S. Senior Open at the Broadmoor Golf Club in Colorado Springs. He went on to finish ninth in the event. Klein won the Nebraska Open in 1993. He lettered for the Huskers in 1979 and 1980.

Steve Gotsche (Manhattan, Kansas)

A talented player and coach, Steve Gotsche competed for three seasons on the PGA Tour in 1994, 1995 and 2000. He earned his first tour card through qualifying school, and went on to produce the best PGA Tour finish of his career when he took fifth at the New England Classic in 1994. He returned to the PGA Tour in 1995 after advancing through qualifying school again, then joined the Nationwide Tour in 1996. In 1999, Gotsche won the Nike Monterrey Open and the Nike Upstate Classic on his way to a 15thplace finish on the Nationwide Tour money list to earn a place back on the PGA Tour in 2000. He returned to the Nationwide Tour in 2001 and 2002, and registered more than \$500,000 in career earnings as a professional before turning his attention to teaching. He is currently the Head PGA Professional at Colbert Hills in Manhattan, Kan. He was also the head men's golf coach at Barton County Community College for nine seasons. He began his collegiate career at Barton County before earning letters as a Husker in 1981, 1982 and 1983.

Tom Sieckmann (Omaha, Nebraska)

A 13-year veteran on the PGA Tour, Tom Sieckmann has been an icon of the Nebraska golf community for nearly 50 years. Sieckmann made his first appearance on the PGA Tour in 1982, then made a 10-year run on the tour from 1985 to 1994, which included a top-10 finish at the 1990 U.S. Open. He recorded a PGA Tour win at the Anheuser-Busch Classic. He reappeared on tour in 1997 and 1999, closing his PGA Tour career with more than \$1.3 million in earnings, which still ranks among the top 500 golfers alltime. He returned to Omaha as the Director of Golf Instruction at the Omaha Country Club. He was also the Director of Instruction for Dave Peltz Golf (1999-2009). The 1974 Nebraska Amateur of the Year in the same season that he earned a letter for the Huskers, Sieckmann transferred



A member of the PGA Tour in 1990 and 1993, Mike Schuchart is the long-time Head PGA Professional/ Director of Instruction at Wilderness Ridge Golf Club in Lincoln. Schuchart is an eight-time Nebraska PGA Section Player of the Year and a four-time Nebraska PGA Teacher of the Year. He was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 2010.





Former Husker Mark Maness has served as the Director of Instruction at The Golf Center at the Highlands since 1995 and is a PGA Professional at the Golden Bear Center in Carrollton, Texas. Maness, who earned a spot on the PGA Tour in 1988, was the Northern Texas PGA Teacher of the Year in 2004. Maness was a four-year letterman for the Huskers from 1980 to 1983.

to Oklahoma State and began pursuing his professional career in 1977. Born in York, Neb., Sieckmann was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 2005. His daughter, Lauren, was a setter for the Nebraska volleyball team in 2012. In 2015, Sieckmann purchased the Palmbrook Country Club in Sun City, Ariz.

Mike Schuchart (Lincoln, Nebraska)

Following in the footsteps of Tom Sieckmann and Mark Maness, Mike Schuchart became the third Husker golfer to earn a spot on the PGA Tour. Schuchart, who was the Nebraska Class A Individual State Champion at Lincoln East High School in 1979, earned a place on the PGA Tour for the first time in 1990. He was back on the PGA Tour in 1993, before turning his attention to teaching. An eight-time Nebraska PGA Section Player of the Year (1992, 2002-08), Schuchart has been a PGA Class A Professional for 29 years. He was named the Nebraska PGA Teacher of the Year in 2003, 2004, 2010 and 2019 and was named the Nebraska PGA Professional of the Year in 2016. He is the Head Professional/ Director of Instruction at Wilderness Ridge Golf Club in Lincoln and the current vice president of the PGA Nebraska Section. He was also an assistant coach for the Nebraska women's golf team from 2002 to 2018. Schuchart was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 2010. He was a four-time letterwinner at Nebraska (1981, 1982, 1983, 1985).

Mark Maness (Carrollton, Texas)

A member of the PGA Tour in 1988, Mark Maness was the second Husker to earn a spot on the professional tour. Following his stint on the PGA

Tour, Maness became an outstanding instructor and is currently a PGA Professional at the Golden Bear Golf Center in Carrollton, Texas. In 2004, he was named the Northern Texas PGA Teacher of the Year. He has served as the Director of Instruction at The Golf Center at the Highlands for more than 28 years (1995-2023). He also spent seven years with the Nicklaus/Flick Golf Schools (1996-2002) and eight years training instructors for Nicklaus Academies. He was the Head Golf Professional at Stonebridge Ranch Country Club in McKinney, Texas (1993-95). Maness was a four-year letterman at Nebraska (1980-83).

Ty Capps (Highlands Ranch, Colorado)

A talented golfer out of Colorado High School powerhouse Thunder Ridge, Ty Capps was active on PGA Tour Latinoamerica, the Nationwide Tour, the Adams Tour, the Florida Professional Golf Tour and the Sunshine Tour. He captured a PGA Tour Latinoamerica victory at the Roberto De Vincenzo Invitational Copa NEC in 2014. Capps spent two seasons at South Mountain Community College in Phoenix, Ariz., before lettering for the Huskers in 2006 and 2007. He is currently a realtor in Flagler Beach, Fla.

Brandon Crick (McCook, Nebraska)

Brandon Crick has been active on several professional tours since completing his final season at Nebraska in 2010. Crick collected three top-20 finishes on the Korn Ferry Tour in 2022 and was ranked among the top 80 players on the Korn Ferry Tour as of late-August 2023, following a tie for 20th at the Pinnacle Bank Championship in Omaha (Aug. 10-13). He finished in the top 50 on the Korn Ferry Tour in 2019. He produced six

top-25 tournament finishes from August of 2020 to August of 2021. He previously participated on the Web.Com Tour, The Dakotas Tour, the eGolf Tour, the Adams Tour, Dreamchasers Tour and the Gateway Tour. He joined the Web.com Tour in 2016. Crick was a member of two Class B state championship teams at McCook High School, producing a trio of top-three individual finishes. He competed at Gonzaga in 2007 and 2008, earning West Coast Conference Freshmanof-the-Year honors in 2007. He transferred to Nebraska and earned letters for the Huskers in 2009 and 2010. He was the Nebraska Amateur of the Year in 2009 and earned an NCAA Regional bid in 2010. He earned his bachelor's degree from Nebraska in 2015.

Steve Friesen (Lincoln, Nebraska)

One of the most accomplished all-around golfers in Nebraska history, Steve Friesen captured six professional wins on the Web.com Tour, the Nationwide Tour and the Canadian Tour in nearly two decades as a competitive professional golfer. He joined the Web.com Tour in 2007 and won the Price Cutter Charity Championship Presented by Dr. Pepper in 2011. On the Nationwide Tour he notched victories in the 2005 Nevada Open, the 2005 New Mexico Open, the 2003 Utah Open, the 2003 Waterloo Open and the 2001 Baton Rouge Open. Friesen turned pro in 1999 after being named the Ben Hogan Award winner as the nation's top scholarathlete in men's golf. An honorable-mention All-American, he joined Scott Gutschewski in leading the Huskers to the best season in school history with a 14th-place finish at the NCAA Championships. Friesen, who earned his bachelor's degree as a biological sciences major from Nebraska in 2000, is currently the Director of Instruction at Firethorn Golf Club in Lincoln. In 2018, he was named the Nebraska PGA Section Assistant Professional Player of the Year. A fouryear letterman for the Huskers (1996-99), Friesen was an inaugural inductee into the Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2015.



Brandon Crick has been a fixture on the Korn Ferry Tour the past four seasons (2019-23), including a trip to the Korn Ferry Tour Finals in 2019.





Kevin Gillick (Lincoln, Nebraska)

A two-year letterman at Nebraska in 2012 and 2013, Kevin Gillick played on The Dakotas Tour and the Adams Tour before competing on the Canadian Tour in 2018. Gillick was a three-time all-state golfer at Lincoln Pius X, while also helping Notre Dame Prep (Scottsdale, Ariz.) to a state title as a sophomore in 2007. He earned his bachelor's degree in finance from Nebraska in 2013. He spent two seasons at the University of Denver (2010, 2011) before transferring to Nebraska to close his collegiate career.

Justin Jennings (Amarillo, Texas)

Justin Jennings tied for 23rd at the PGA Tour Latinoamerica Qualifying Tournament in Argentina in February of 2018. He made his first appearance on PGA Tour Latinoamerica at the Puerto Plata DR Open in May of 2018. He earned his bachelor's degree from Nebraska in marketing in 2017, and his master's degree in finance from SMU. He is a vice president for commercial lending at Origin Bank in Dallas. He was a four-time Husker letterwinner (2014-17).

Ryan Lenahan (Grosse Pointe, Michigan)

A four-year letterman for the Huskers (2003, 2005-07), Ryan Lenahan enoyed successful seasons on The Dakotas Tour before embarking on the European Challenge Tour in 2015. He won the biggest pursed event on the Dakotas Tour in 2011 at the Arrowhead Pro-Am, before winning the 2012 North Dakota Open. He won four Dakotas Tour events overall, while capturing 25 event titles across various pro tours in his career. He also played in the 2014 John Deere Classic and was the first alternate for the 2013 U.S. Open at Merion. He is currently a an instructor at the Kendall Academy at Miles of

Golf in Ann Arbor, Mich. He makes his home in New Hudson, Mich., with his wife, Amy, and sons Mason and Parker.

Scott Allacher (Gretna, Nebraska)

A Husker letterman in 1984 and 1986, Scott Allacher was a long-time pro at the Platteview Country Club (1996-2008) before being named the Director of Golf at Tiburon Golf Club in Omaha (2009-10). Allacher was the Nebraska PGA President (2003-05).

Bryan Bennett (Valparaiso, Indiana)

A Husker letterman in 1992, Bryan Bennett was a PGA assistant professional from 1994 to 2001. He was also an assistant men's golf coach at Valparaiso in 2009.

Charlie Borner Jr. (Lincoln, Nebraska)

The Director of Golf at Hillcrest Country Club in Lincoln for 35 years, Charlie Borner was the Nebraska PGA Professional of the Year in 1986 and won the PGA Section Championship in 1988. He competed in eight PGA National Club Professional Championships. He is currently on the Board of Directors for the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame, after being inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2000. A letterwinner for the Huskers in 1966, 1967 and 1968, Borner was the first Husker to ever earn an individual spot at the NCAA Championships in 1967. Borner was the first player in history to sweep the Nebraska Amateur and the Nebraska Match Play championships in the same year (1970) at the Country Club of Lincoln. A three-time Nebraska Amateur champion (1968, 1970, 1973) he was the Nebraska Amateur of the Year in 1973. He was a two-time Class A State High School Champion at Lincoln High in 1963 and 1964. He spent six years as a teacher and golf coach at North Platte before returning to Lincoln as an assistant pro at Omaha's Highlands Country Club. He also served as an assistant professional at The Country Club of Lincoln for eight years, being named the head professional at Hillcrest Country Club in Lincoln in 1983. He was named the Director of Golf at Hillcrest in 1990.

Steven C. Bruening (Thornton, Colorado)

Steve Bruening is a PGA Professional and the General Manager of the Riverdale Golf Club in Brighton, Colo. He is a member of the Southwest Greens management team of golf courses in the Denver area. Originally from Superior, Neb., Bruening was a two-time letterwinner as a Husker (1982, 1984).

Scott Brunzell (Grand Island, Nebraska)

A long-time PGA Professional, Scott Brunzell was the PGA Professional at Jackrabbit Run Golf Course in Grand Island, Neb., for 30 years from 1977 to 2006. In 1983, he was the Nebraska Section Professional of the Year. Prior to his work at Jackrabbit Run, Brunzell was a teaching pro at Happy Hollow Golf Club in Omaha (1972-75) and was the 1975 Nebraska Section Assistant Professional of the Year. Brunzell was a threeyear letterman at Nebraska (1969, 1971, 1972).

Vic Carder (Elkhorn, Nebraska)

A world-renowned teacher and PGA Professional, Vic Carder has been the Director of Golf at the Foshan Golf Club, Dahanu Resort in the Henggang Nanhai District of Foshan City, China since 2013. Prior to his work in Foshan City, Carder was the Director of Golf at the Lion Lake Country Club (2011-13) and the Head Golf Professional at Mate Golf (2010-11). Carder lettered as a Husker golfer in 1977 and 1979.



A three-time Nebraska letterman, Bryan Hughett is a five-time winner of the Nebraska Senior PGA Professional Championship (2014, 2016, 2017, 2019, 2023). Hughett was a PGA Professional at the Norfolk Country Club (2002-18), before becoming the PGA Professional at the Albion Country Club in 2018. Originally from Lincoln, Hughett was the 1982 Nebraska Class A High School State Champion at Lincoln East while leading the Spartans to the state team title.

Judd Cornell (Omaha, Nebraska)

The head coach at Nebraska beginning in 2022, Judd Cornell was a four-time letterwinner at Nebraska (2003-06), before serving as assistant coach (2013-17) and associate head coach (2017-19) for the Huskers. He served as the head coach at Creighton (2019-22) while also serving as the Director of Instruction at The Players Club in Omaha. He was the 2004 Nebraska Amateur of the Year and a three-time team captain as a Husker, helping Nebraska to a 2006 NCAA Regional berth.

Jay Cottam (Hebron, Nebraska)

An assistant professional at the Awarii Dunes Golf Course in Axtell, Neb., before becoming the assistant pro at Meadowlark Hills in Kearney in 2022, Jay Cottom is in his fifth season as the director of player development for the Nebraska-Kearney women's golf team. The 2022 Nebraska PGA Assistant Player of the Year, Cottam played at both UNK and Nebraska, tying for 16th at the 2019 Big Ten Championship and finishing with a 73.42 stroke average. In the summer of 2020, the Hebron, Neb., native won the PGA Nebraska Section Assistant Match Play Championship. He also won the Nebraska PGA Cup Series Championship in 2020. Cottam was a two-time All-MIAA selection for the Lopers and the 2015 Nebraska Class C state champion at Thayer Central. In 2017, he was the NGA Amateur Match Play champion.

John J. Dinnebier (Ankeny, Iowa)

With 30 years of experience as a golf professional, John Dinnebier became the General Manager at Briarwood Golf Club in Ankeny, Iowa, in 2018. Dinnebier had spent the previous 17 years as the General Manager at Lake Panorama National Golf Club in Panora, Iowa (2002-18). A four-year letterman at Nebraska (1986-89), Dinnebier was an assistant pro at the Des Moines Golf and Country Club (1993-97) and at Red Carpet Golf Club in Waterloo, Iowa (1990-93).

David Donachie (Amarillo, Texas)

With well over 30 years of experience as a PGA Professional, former Husker David Donachie has been the General Manager of Tascosa and La Paloma Golf Clubs in Amarillo, Texas since 2003. Donachie was previously the Director of Golf at Champions Run in Omaha, Nebraska (1993-2001) and the Director of Golf at Picacho Hills Country Club in Las Cruces, N.M. (1986-93). Donachie was a 1976 golf letterman at Nebraska.

Eric H. Eshleman (Birmingham, Alabama)

One of the nation's most acclaimed instructors, Eric Eshleman is the Director of Golf at the Country Club of Birmingham in Alabama. Eshleman was named the 2019 PGA Person of the Year by the PGA of America, which is the highest honor given by the PGA. In 2017, Eshleman was the Alabama/Northwest Florida Section PGA Professional of the Year. Among his more recognizable pupils are Graem McDowell, Paul Dunne from the European Tour and former



A first-team All-Big 12 selection for the Huskers in 1997, Josh Madden is an award-winning PGA Professional in Australia. In 2020, Madden was named the PGA National Management Professional of the Year.

U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice. Eshleman was a two-time letterman at Nebraska in 1989 and 1990. Eric and his wife, Kelli, are Nebraska graduates and have three sons.

Kenny Hughes (Gautier, Mississippi)

With nearly 30 years of experience as a PGA Professional, Kenny Hughes is not only a Class A professional but also the CEO and General Manager of Shell Landing Golf Club on the Mississippi Gulf Coast. His ownership group also owns Mississippi National/Hickory Hill Country Club. Hughes previously served as a Head Golf Pro at the Broadwater Sun Course in Biloxi, Miss., which became President Broadwater Golf Club in 2007, when he was promoted to Director of Golf. He was also an assistant professional at Hickory Hill Country Club (1986-90). Prior to earning a golf letter at Nebraska as a junior in 1982, Hughes attended Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College. He played his senior season at Southern Miss before earning his degree. He was the PGA Apprentice Player of the Year in Mississippi (1989).

Bryan R. Hughett (Albion, Nebraska)

The PGA Professional at the Albion Country Club since 2018, Bryan Hughett was a PGA Professional at the Norfolk Country Club in Nebraska from 2002 to 2018. A five-time Nebraska Senior PGA Pro Champion, Hughett claimed his fifth title in 2023, after also winning the tournament in 2014, 2016, 2017 and 2019.

Originally from Lincoln, Hughett was the 1982 Nebraska Class A Individual State Champion at Lincoln East High School to lead the Spartans to a team title. He lettered for the Huskers as a golfer in 1983, 1984 and 1985.

Bradford Lindahl (Omaha, Nebraska)

A 20-year PGA Professional in the Omaha area, Bradford Lindahl passed away on Feb. 2, 2008, after a battle with cancer at the age of 43. Lindahl lettered at Nebraska in 1998.

Steve Mack (Huntsville, Alabama)

The Vice President of Golf Operations and Director of Golf at SunBelt Golf Corporation, Steve Mack is a PGA Professional at The Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail @ Hampton Cove River, Short and Highlands courses. The Nebraska Class A State Champion at Grand Island High School in 1977, Mack lettered in golf at Nebraska in 1981 and 1982.


Josh Madden (Perth, Australia)

A four-year letterwinner at Nebraska, Josh Madden returned to Australia as one of the country's top PGA Professionals. He was named the General Manager of Wembley Golf Course in Perth in 2018 and opened Australia's second PGA Centre for Learning and Performance in 2019. He was named the 2020 PGA National Management Professional of the Year. He spent two years at the Toowoomba Golf Club. He was a PGA Professional in Western and South Australia (2014-16). He served as the Marketing & Student Recruitment Manager for the PGA of Australia from 2009 to 2014. He was an apprentice professional at Surfers Paradise Golf Club in Gold Coast, Australia (2004-07) before becoming a full-time professional in 2008. Madden was a first-team All-Big 12 selection in 1997 and helped Nebraska to its most successful seasons in school history from 1996 to 1999.

Derek Nannen (Fountain Hills, Arizona)

A PGA Professional for more than 15 years at the Eagle Mountain Golf Club and Eagle Mountain Golf Academy, Derek Nannen is establishing himself as a successful teacher of the game. Nannen was the 1990 Nebraska Class C State Champion at Geneva High School, before earning a letter at Nebraska in 1993. He went on to earn GCAA All-America Scholar honors at Grand Canyon in 1996. As a 16-year-old at the Nebraska Junior Amateur Championship in 1989, Nannen recorded two holes in one in the same round at York Country Club.





Late Nebraska men's golf coach Larry Romjue led the Huskers to their most successful season in school history with a 14th-place finish at the 1999 NCAA Championships. Romjue, who was a letterman at Nebraska (1958-60), coached the Huskers from 1969-70 to 2000-01 and was named the Nebraska PGA Professional of the Year in 1984. He is pictured with Steve Friesen, the current Director of Instruction at Firethorn Golf Club in Lincoln and the winner of the 1999 Ben Hogan Award.

Tyler Parsloe (Lone Tree, Colorado)

One of the most recent PGA Professionals the Nebraska golf program has produced, Tyler Parsloe serves as a professional at Jake's Academy in Lone Tree, Colo. He won the 2020 Colorado PGA Pro-Assistant Championship. He has been a member of the PGA Colorado Section since 2012. Parsloe led ThunderRidge High School in Littleton to four consecutive Colorado Class 6A state championships and was the Colorado Junior Player of the Year in both 2005 and 2006. He lettered at Nebraska in 2008, 2009 and 2010.

Tony Pesavento (Omaha, Nebraska)

A PGA Professional in Nebraska for more than 30 years, Tony Pesavento was the Nebraska PGA President from 1989 to 1991. The Head Professional at the Omaha Country Club, Pesavento was the Nebraska PGA Professional of the Year in both 1991 and 2015. Pesavento lettered at Nebraska in 1976 before graduating from Creighton in 1979.

Seth Porter (Omaha, Nebraska)

Seth Porter was recently named the Director of Instruction at The Club at Indian Creek in Elkhorn in 2023, after previously serving as the head men's (2014-23) and women's (2016-23) golf coach at Omaha. He was an assistant professional at the Granite Falls Golf Club in Surprise and the Union Hills Country Club in Sun City, Ariz., before returning to Nebraska as the assistant men's golf coach at UNO. He was

a four-year letterman at Nebraska (1999, 2000, 2001, 2003).

Jeff Rafferty (Cheyenne, Wyoming)

With nearly 30 years as a PGA Professional, Rafferty is in his second as the Head Professional at the Cheyenne Golf Club. He spent nine years at the Buffalo Golf Club. Rafferty served as the Head PGA Professional at The Powder Horn in Sheridan, Wyo., (2012-13), after working as the head pro at the Casper Country Club (2003-09). A 1987 graduate of Buffalo High School, Rafferty returned to Wyoming after serving as the head professional at Elks Country Club in Columbus, Neb. (2001-02). He has been a PGA member since 1996. Rafferty, who lettered at Nebraska in 1989, 1991 and 1992, is married to Nebraska women's golf letterwinner Melissa Busskohl, who is originally from Norfolk.

Steven G. Reiter (Brandon Valley, South Dakota) A four-year letterman at Nebraska (1992-95), Steve Reiter helps run the Hidden Valley Golf Course in Brandon Valley, S.D., which has been owned by the Reiter family for more than 50 years. It was his home course when he won the South Dakota state high school title in 1989.

Rick Reynolds (Blue Springs, Missouri)

A PGA Class A Professional for more than 35 years, Rick Reynolds currently serves as a club pro at Stone Canyon Golf Club in Blue Springs, Mo. He previously served as the Head Golf Pro at Lakewood Oaks Golf Club (1982-2007)

after working as an assistant pro at the same club (1979-81). Reynolds was a three-time letterwinner at Nebraska from 1977 to 1979.

Larry Romjue (Lincoln, Nebraska)

The head men's golf coach at the University of Nebraska for more than 30 years (1969-70 to 2000-01), Larry Romjue was an active member of the Lincoln and Nebraska golf communities before his death in 2019. The Nebraska PGA Professional of the Year in 1984 and the Nebraska PGA Section Player of the Year in 1980, Romjue was the Vice President of the Nebraska Golf Association in 2016. He was posthumously inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 2021. He was a three-time letterman at Nebraska (1958-60).

Robert G. Saffer (Lincoln, Nebraska)

A long-time PGA Professional at Crooked Creek Golf Club, Robert Saffer became a PGA Pro in 1997. He was named the Nebraska PGA Section Teaching Professional of the Year in 2009. He was a Nebraska Class A High School champion at Omaha Westside in 1959, while playing for his father. Saffer earned a scholarship to Arizona out of high school, before transferring to Nebraska and lettering as a Husker in 1964 and 1965.

Rick Schultz (Independence, Missouri)

A PGA Member for nearly 50 years, Rick Schultz is the head PGA Professional at The Golf Club at Creekmoor in Independence, Mo. He is also the Tournament and Event Coordinator for



the Midwest PGA. Schultz oversees the HOPE program, PGA Junior Championship and the PGA Junior League Championship. He was named the PGA Midwest Section Patriot Award winner in 2019. He is a 1973 Husker alum and qualified for the NCAA Championship twice as an individual and was a part of the first Nebraska team to qualify for Nationals. Schultz is one of three Husker golfers to win a gold or silver medal at the U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship.

James Sieckmann (Omaha, Nebraska)

A legendary golf teacher and PGA Professional, James Sieckmann was selected as the PGA National Teacher of the Year in 2018. In more than 25 years as a PGA member, Sieckmann has been named the Nebraska PGA Teacher of the Year 10 times (1996, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2006, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016). He has served as the PGA Director of Golf at the Academy at Shadow Ridge Country Club in Omaha since 1994, and has been named one of Golf Magazine's Top 100 Teachers in America and a Top 30 Instructor by Golf Digest. He is a Titleist Performance Institute Advisory Board Member and was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 2016. He was a four-year letterman at Nebraska (1985-88).

Ron Thayer (Superior, Nebraska)

The manager of the Superior Country Club, Ron Thayer earned a letter for the Huskers in 1987.

Jim Troy (Mount Vernon, Ohio)

A four-time Northern Ohio PGA Section Player of the Year (2018, 2020, 2021, 2022), Jim Troy is one of the most recent Huskers to earn PGA Professional status. He spent nearly three years as the First Assistant Professional at the Mount Vernon Country Club in Ohio. He recently joined the instruction staff at The Golf Dome in Chagrin Falls, Ohio, where he leads the Junior Golf Academy. He was previously a Golf Instructor/ Coach at the Golf Performance Academy of Southwest Michigan (2015-18) and an Assistant

Golf Professional at the Sunset Ridge Country Club in Northfield, Ill. (2014). He was also the First Assistant Golf Professional at the Elyria Country Club, when he was named the 2013 Northern Ohio PGA Section Apprentice Player of the Year. He competed on the NGA Tour and the Fore the Players Tour (2007-13) and was named the Fore the Players Tour Player of the Year in 2013. A four-year letterman at Nebraska (2000-03), he earned his bachelor's degree from NU in 2004.

Mike Troy (Woodridge, Illinois)

In his 25th year as a Class A PGA Professional, Mike Troy has been teaching at Zigfield Troy Golf in Woodbridge, Ill., since 1998. Troy was the Illinois PGA Assistant Player of the Year in both 2000 and 2001, and he competed in the U.S. Open in 2000. In September of 2020, Troy won the Illinois PGA Senior Match Play Championship. He lettered at Nebraska in 1989 and 1990.

Ralph Alan (Bud) Williamson (Kansas City, Missouri) A legendary teacher of the game, Bud Williamson was a PGA Professional for 46 years (1965-2011) and was a long-time coach of Tom Watson. Williamson, who lettered as a Nebraska golfer in 1961 and 1962, was the Third Head Professional at Blue Hills Country Club from 1976 until his death in 2011. He served on the PGA Midwest Section Committee and Board and was the PGA Midwest Section President in 1983. He was also on the National PGA Board of Directors and was the PGA District 7 Director. He was inducted into the PGA Midwest Section Hall of Fame in 2011, the same year he was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame. Before moving to the Kansas City area, Williamson was a nine-time Nebraska PGA Championship winner (1956-60, 1962-64, 1966). He was the Nebraska Class A State Champion at Lincoln High School, while also leading his team to the state title in 1957.



James Sieckmann has been recognized throughout his career as one of the game's top PGA Professionals. In 2018, the former Husker was named the PGA National Teacher of the Year. He is a 10-time Nebraska PGA Teacher of the Year working out of Shadow Ridge Country Club in Omaha.



A four-time Husker letterwinner (2011-14) from Aguascalientes, Mexico, Manuel Lavin earned the Dick Spangler Golf Scholarship in 2012-13. Lavin was an event associate for PGA Tour Latinoamerica (2015-19). He founded Nuevo Swing - Mexico's first on-line golf store - and Golf Asesores.

DICK SPANGLER SCHOLARSHIP

The Dick Spangler Golf Scholarship Award is presented at the end of each golf season to a sophomore or junior golfer who has made significant contributions to the men's golf program through his attitude, effort and team spirit. Branden Meyer received the award for the 2020-21 season. The recipient is selected by the Dick Spangler Scholarship Committee.

Dick Spangler earned three letters for the Nebraska golf team from 1950 to 1952, was a Nebraska Amateur champion and served on the board of the Trans-Mississippi Golf Association. Always a gentleman, his quick wit, enjoyable sense of humor and his dedication to the game of golf bring honor and credit to the University of Nebraska and the great game of life.

Dick Spangler was inducted into the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame in 1997. He passed away on Saturday, Nov. 8, 2003, in Lincoln.
