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



## ACADEMIC COUNSELING

Eight academic counselors, three learning specialists, two assistant academic counselors and one administrative assistant are in place to monitor daily academic progress, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/ registration process and monitor eligibility and progress toward graduation.

### **TUTORIAL SUPPORT**

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, unlimited tutorial support from approximately 75-100 tutors on staff is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. Tutorial support is provided both in-person and virtually. Nebraska's tutorial program is certified as a model tutoring program by the College Reading and Learning Association.

## STUDY HALL

Student-athletes attend a supervised, flex-time study hall within the Herman Student Life Complex that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student-athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week as determined by Additional performance-based or tutor-based study hall also may be determined by the academic counselor.

### MENTORING

Academic staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information and discuss academic success strategies.

## EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor, or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a consulting neuropsychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

### STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators, and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while explanation expresses of average transition enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

### PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

### COMPUTER RESOURCES

All student-athletes are provided the opportunity to have a laptop for use during their academic career at Nebraska. The Herman Student Life Complex has printers and desktop computers available for student-athletes to use in the facility.







# **Trischa Zorn-Hudson** 55x Paralympic medalist

Husker Trischa Zorn-Hudson (1984-87) won more medals than any Olympian in history. Blind since birth, she is honored in the U.S. Olympic & Paralympic Museum in Colorado Springs.

# TRISCHA ZORN

Trischa Zorn-Hudson is the most decorated athlete in Olympic or Paralympic history. Her Paralympic swimming career spanned from 1980 to 2004, earning a total of 55 medals – 41 golds, nine silvers, and five bronzes. She was recognized for her incredible performances with a nonination as Sports Illustrated Woman of the Year in 1988 and an induction into the International Paralympic Hall of Fame in 2012 for her storied career across seven Paralympic Games.

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

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## **HUSKERS READY FOR STRONG 2023-24 SEASON**

Sophomore, Gena Jorgenson, returns for the Huskers after a record-breaking first season. She swam a then-record mile time of 16:13.54 at the Big Ten Championships, placing sixth. Jorgenson broke her own record at the NCAA Championships with a time of 16:13.34 to place 28th overall. She also qualified for the NCAAs in the 400 IM (41st, 4:18.00), and in the 500 freestyle (56th, 4:46.43). Jorgenson holds Nebraska's top returning times in the mile, the 1,000 freestyle (9:53.58) and the 500 free (4:45.02). She earned a 13th-place finish in the 500 freestyle at the Big Ten Championships (4:45.02) and won the 400 IM C Final (4:15.95).

Sarah Barton returns as the leader in the 200 backstroke (2:00.05), the 200 butterfly (1:59.46), the 200 IM (1:59.68) and the 400 IM (4:15.60). She is a three-time letterwinner for Nebraska and a three-time finalist at the 2023 Big Ten Championships. She placed 13th in the 400 IM with a 4:15.60, 18th in the 200 butterfly with a career-best 1:59.46 and 21st in the 200 IM with a 2:00.82. At the 2023 CSCAA National Invitational Championships, she finished sixth in the 400 IM with a 2:02.30 and 11th in the 200 butterfly with a 2:00.63.

JoJo Randby, a junior from Omaha, Neb., highlighted her sophomore season with a Nebraska program record and seventh-place finish in the 100 breaststroke at the Big Ten Championships. She is the top returner in the event with a time of 1:00.07. At the 2023 CSCAA National Invitational Championships, she placed fourth in the 50 breaststroke (28.13), fourth in the 100 breast (1:00.99) and 23rd in the 200 breast (2:16.29).

Lexi Kucera, a senior from Hutchinson, Minn., is a three-time letterwinner with the Huskers. She is the top returner in the 100 freestyle (50.38), the 200 freestyle (1:48.47) and the 100 butterfly (54.17). She qualified for the 100 butterfly C Final at the Big Ten Championships and placed 22nd with a 54.60. She was a member of four relays at the conference meet, including the ninth-place 400 medley relay and the 800 freestyle relay.

A senior from Colorado Springs, Colo., Caitlin Cairns returns for the Huskers after three impressive seasons. The three-time letterwinner posted career-best times in the 50 freestyle (23.39), 100 backstroke (56.73) and 100 butterfly (54.59). Her times in the 100 butterfly and 100 backstroke earned her spots in the A Final of the Hawkeye Invitational, where she placed fourth and eighth, respectively. Later, Cairns competed in the C Final in the 100 butterfly at the Big Ten Championships. At the CSCAA National Invitational Championships, she placed 24th in the 100 butterfly (54.98) and fifth in the 200 medley relay (1:40.76).

Emily Haimes returns to the Huskers for her fifth year of eligibility. She was a contributing member of four relays at the 2023 Big Ten Championships, including the ninth-place 200 medley relay and the 400 medley relay. Individually, she placed 35th in the 100 butterfly with a time of 55.88. Maia Hall, a junior from Whitby, England, swam the third-fastest time in NU history in the 200 breaststroke (2:10.76) in 2022-23. She finished ninth overall in the event at the 2023 Big Ten Championships with a 2:11.63. In the 100 breaststroke, she placed 10th (1:00.76) and ranks fifth on the Huskers' all-time list.

A senior from Oviedo, Fla., Gabby Donahue posted career-best times in all three events at the 2023 Big Ten Championships. She qualified for the finals in the 200 IM and placed 24th with a time of 2:02.82. She placed 25th in the 100 backstroke with a 54.49 and 45th in the 100 freestyle with a 51.29.

Madison Lloyd posted season-best times in all three events at the 2023 Big Ten Championships. The junior from Houston, Texas, placed 29th in the 400 IM with a time of 4:26.10, 31st in the 200 backstroke with a 2:00.98 and 38th in the 200 IM with a career-best 2:04.14.

Sydney McCracken, a junior from Kennett Square, Pa., placed in both the 100 and 200 breaststroke at the 2023 Big Ten Championships. She earned a 21st-place finish in the 100 breaststroke with a time of 1:02.72 and a 23rdplace finish in the 200 breaststroke with a time of 2:16.82.

A sophomore from Asola, Italy, Guilia Marchi made solid contributions for Nebraska in her freshman season. She was a member of four top-25 relay teams at the CSCAA National Invitational Championships. At the 2023 Big Ten Championships, she was a member of the 800 freestyle and 400 freestyle relays.

Kelsey Clairmont is the top returner in all three diving events for the Huskers. She posted a 281.70 in the one-meter dive, a 314.25 in the three-meter dive and a 496.00 in the platform dive throughout the season. She qualified for the 2023 NCAA Championships and placed 34th overall in the platform dive with a 214.00. Clairmont notched five first-place finishes, five second-place finishes and four third-place finishes in 2022-23.

Ellee Delcamp, a sophomore diver from Seward, Neb., posted three third-place finishes in her freshman season. She competed in the platform dive for the first time at the collegiate level at the Hawkeye Invite and placed 10th with a 193.40.

Antonina Harned joins the Huskers as a four-time, top-three finisher at the Florida state meet. She captured the title her senior year and added two second-place finishes her freshman and sophomore years and produced a third-place finish her junior year. Harned qualified for the USA Diving Junior National Championships each year (2015-23). She was named the AAU Red, White and Blue National Champion on the platform. At the 2023 USA Diving Zone B Championships, Harned placed third on the one-meter dive, second on the three-meter dive and eighth on the platform.

A freshman from Coppell, Texas, Abigail Baxter joins the Huskers with AAU Finals experience in both the one-meter and threemeter. She qualified for USA Diving Nationals and finished 18th in the one-meter dive.

#### 2022-23 (SENIOR)

Emily Haimes made a significant impact for the Huskers during her senior campaign, both in individual events and relays. The senior from London contributed in four relays at the Big Ten Championships, including the ninth-place 200 medley relay and 400 medley relay. Haimes' top individual finish at conference came in the 100 butterfly, as she placed 35th with a time of 55.88. At the Minnesota and South Dakota double-dual, Haimes took third in the 100 butterfly with a 56.73 and fourth in the 50 freestyle with a 24.30. She followed that up with three straight 100 butterfly victories in duals with Iowa (55.72), Kansas (56.67) and Omaha (56.22).

At the Hawkeye Invitational, Haimes earned a spot in the 100 freestyle and 100 butterfly A Finals, placing sixth in both. Haimes was a member of three third-place relays at the Hawkeye invitational, including the 200 freestyle, 400 freestyle and 200 medley relays. Throughout the season, Haimes contributed to seven winning relays.

#### 2021-22 (JUNIOR)

Haimes had a solid start in her first season at Nebraska, highlighted by a victory in the 400 freestyle relay and a runner-up finish in the 100 freestyle at the Iowa dual (Oct. 23). She continued to excel in the sprints as October closed, racing to a runner-up finish against Iowa State and a fifthplace finish against Minnesota in the 50 freestyle.

During the dual against the Jayhawks (Nov. 5), the junior from England, notched a pair of thirdplace finishes in the 50 free and 100 free. Haimes qualified for the finals in the 100 freestyle at the Mizzou Invitational (Nov. 17-19), where she went on to finish eighth with a 50.71. She added a 10th-place finish in the 50 freestyle (23.35) and an 11th-place finish in the 100 butterfly (56.75). Haimes capped off the dual season with four topfive finishes between the 50 free and 100 free at the Illinois and Rutgers duals.

At the 2022 Big Ten Championships, Haimes was an asset in the relays, swimming in the 200 free relay, 200 medley relay and 400 free relay. Haimes placed 33rd in the 100 fly, while also competing in the 50- and 100-freestyle events.

#### 2020-21 (SOPHOMORE)

As a sophomore at West Virginia in 2021, Haimes claimed first-team All-Big 12 honors again by racing to a third-place finish in the 100 butterfly (54.13). She added a sixth-place finish in the 100

#### 2022-23 (JUNIOR)

Sarah Barton continued to produce career-best times and top finishes for NU during the 2022-23 season. The junior from Huntersville, N.C. tallied three top-five finishes at the mid-season Hawkeye Invite, including a runner-up effort in the 200 IM with a career-best 1:59.68. Barton added a pair of fourth-place finishes in the 200 backstroke (2:00.05) and the 400 IM (4:19.16), after clocking a then-career-best 4:18.38 in the 400 IM prelims. At the Kansas dual, Barton swam her first 400 IM of the season and won the event in 4:29.48. added an additional top-five finish in the 200 backstroke (1:59.40) and a top-25 finish in the 500 freestyle (4:59.81). Barton finished the dual season strong with a pair of runner-up finishes in the 200 back and a then-career-best time in the 200 IM (2:03.84) against Rutgers to nab second place. She also earned two top-three finishes in the 400 IM in the last two duals. At the Big Ten Championships, Barton notched career-best times in all three individual events that she swam. She qualified for C-finals in the 200 backstroke (23rd, 1:59:46) and 400 IM (20th, 4:20.09).

#### 2020-21 (FRESHMAN)

Barton produced solid results in an abbreviated 2021 regular season before competing in three events for the Huskers at the 2021 Big Ten Swimming Championships in Minneapolis. Barton finished 43rd in the 200 backstroke in a then-career-best time of 2:02.74 in the Big Ten prelims. She added a 44th-place finish in the 100 back (57.01) at the Big Ten Meet, along with taking 51st in a time of 2:05.04 in the 200 IM at the conference championships. Her regular season was highlighted by a third-place finish in the 200 back (2:07.49) in a dual with Illinois (Jan. 23). Barton posted a top 400 IM time of 4:32.18 in a tri-meet with Minnesota and Iowa (Feb. 6).

A three-time USA Swimming Scholastic All-American, Barton competed at the 2019 Speedo Junior Nationals and also qualified for Winter Nationals in the backstroke and butterfly events.

During an abbreviated 2021 regular season, Cairns earned a trio of topfive finishes, including fourth-place showings in the 50 and 100 freestyles in a season-opening dual at Iowa (Jan. 16). She added a tie for fifth in the 50 free in a home dual with Illinois (Jan. 23).

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Cairns was a three-time CHSAA 3A state champion for St. Mary's High School in Colorado Springs. She won state championships in the 50yard freestyle in both 2018 and 2020, while adding a runner-up finish in 2019. She added a 2020 state title in the 100 butterfly, after taking second place in the event in both 2018 and 2019. Cairns also swam club with Pikes Peak Athletics. Cairns came to Nebraska with career-best times in the 50 free (23.09), 100 free (51.18) and 100 fly (55.17).

#### 2022-23 (JUNIOR)

Gabby Donahue continued to drop time, while making significant contributions in both individual events and relays during her junior season. Donahue posted career-best times in all three of her individual events at the Big Ten Championships, including an appearance in the 200 IM finals. With a 2:02.82, Donahue went on to finish 24th in the 200 IM. She was on the cusp of qualifying for the 100 backstroke final, placing 25th with a 54.49. Donahue added a careerbest 51.29 in the 100 freestyle to finish 45th. Donahue was one of five Huskers to wrap up the season at the CSCAA National Invitational Championships. She pitched in a fourth-place 100 IM finish and was a member of four relays at the invitational. At the Hawkeye Invite (Dec. 1-3), Donahue earned a spot in the 100 backstroke A Final and went on to finish fifth with a 55.04. She added an 11th-place finish in the 100 freestyle with a 51.39. Donahue also pitched in impressive relay efforts, as a member of the third-place 400 freestyle and 200 medley relays at the Hawkeye invitational. Earlier in the season, Donahue swam to two individual third-place efforts in the 100 freestyle and the 100 backstroke at the Iowa dual. She followed that up with another top-five finish in the 100 backstroke at the Kansas dual (58.48).

## **GABBY DONAHUE**

#### 2021-22 (SOPHOMORE)

Donahue was one of NU's top swimmers in the backstroke events throughout her sophomore campaign. She kicked off her season at the South Dakota State dual, where she swam in two winning relays, the 200 medley relay and the 200 freestyle relay. Donahue added a secondplace finish in the 200 IM. At the dual against lowa (Oct. 23), she swam to a runner-up finish in the 200 backstroke and placed fourth in the 100 breaststroke. She added another top-five finish in the Minnesota dual, swimming to fourth in the 200 IM. In the following week, she finished fourth in the 100 backstroke against Kansas (Nov. 5). At the Mizzou Invitational (Nov. 17-19), Donahue produced three top-15 finishes, including an appearance in the finals and an eighth-place finish in the 200 IM (2:08.95). She also finished 11th in the 200 backstroke (2:03.68) and 12th in the 100 backstroke (55.94). A pair of third-place finishes in the 100 back highlighted the end of dual season for Donahue. At the Big Ten Championships, Donahue swam a careerbest time of 2:00.94 in the 200 backstroke. She also swam in the 100 backstroke and 200 IM at the conference meet.

#### 2020-21 (FRESHMAN)

Donahue brought a championship resumé with



her to Nebraska and showed that she is poised to be a major contributor during her first season with the Huskers. At her first Big Ten Swimming Championships in Minneapolis, Donahue tied for 32nd with a then-career-best time of 55.28 in the 100 backstroke. She added a time of 2:01.20 to finish 39th in the 200 backstroke at the Big Ten meet. Donahue added another collegiate best (2:02.05) to finish 32nd in the 200 IM at the Big Ten Championships. She capped her conference meet with a 23.55 in a 50 freestyle time trial. Donahue, who also represents Trinidad in international competition, captured four top-five individual finishes during an abbreviated 2021 regular season. She took third in the 200 IM in a dual with Iowa (Jan. 16), while adding a fifth-place finish in the 100 backstroke against the Hawkeyes. She also raced to a third-place finish in the 100 back in a home dual with Illinois (Jan. 23), while adding a fifth-place finish in the 100 free in a then-careerbest 53.49 against the Fighting Illini.

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Donahue helped Oviedo High School to a Florida Class 4A team title with an individual win in the 100 back (54.72) and relay wins in the 400 free and 200 medley relay. She also finished third in the 200 IM (2:01.98). Donahue, who swam for the Blue Dolfins Swim Club, also represents Trinidad in international competition. In the summer of 2019, she finished 11th in the 100 backstroke at the Pan Am Games, while finishing third in the 50 backstroke, 200 IM and 400 IM at the CCCAN Swimming Championships. She added a fourthplace finish in the 100 breaststroke and seventh in the 100 backstroke at CCCAN. In April 2019, she won the 50-meter backstroke, 100-meter breaststroke and 200-meter IM at the XXXIV Carifta Swimming Championships. She added a runner-up finish in the 100 backstroke and took third in the 100 freestyle.

The daughter of Brian and Karen Donahue, Gabby was born Feb. 4, 2002 in Oviedo, Fla. She has three sisters, Emma, Ally and Caroline, and a brother, TJ. A marketing major, Gabby earned Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2022 and 2023. #### 2022-23 (JUNIOR)

Lexi Kucera has been a crucial part of Nebraska's success with her contributions in individual and relay events. At the mid-season Hawkeye Invite, Kucera swam to a runner-up finish in the 100 butterfly (54.17) and third-place finishes in the 100 freestyle (50.41), the 200 freestyle (1:48.47) and the 200 butterfly (2:00.97). Her times in the 200 freestyle and the 200 butterfly were careerbests. In the first duals of the year, Kucera won the 200 freestyle at SDSU (1:53.88) and took first in the 100 butterfly (56.65) against Iowa State. At the Iowa dual, Kucera swam to a pair of victories in the 100 (51.91) and 200 freestyles (1:52.39), while finishing runner-up in the 100 butterfly (57.06). In a battle with the Jayhawks, Kucera notched two second-place finishes, clocking a 52.20 in the 100 freestyle and a 1:52.97 in the 200 freestyle. Kucera qualified for the 100 butterfly C Final at the Big Ten Championships and went on to place 22nd with a 54.60. She was a member of four relays at conference, including the ninth-place 400 medley relay and 800 freestyle relay. On top of Kucera's 21 top-three finishes in individual races, she was a member of seven winning relays on the season. The most notable victory came in the 800 freestyle relay at the Hawkeye Invite (7:16.24).

## **LEXI KUCERA**

Senior | Freestyle/Butterfly | Hutchinson, Minnesota (Hutchinson)

#### **2021-22 (SOPHOMORE)**

Kucera was one of Nebraska's top sprinters and consistent contributors during her sophomore campaign. She opened the 2021-22 season with solid performances in a team dual victory over South Dakota State. Kucera was the runner-up in the 200 freestyle, while swimming the opening leg of Nebraska's winning 200 free relay. She was also a member of NU's second-place 200 medley relay. She performed at an even higher level in a dominant Big Ten dual win over Iowa, when she captured a pair of titles in the 50 freestyle and 100 butterfly, after opening the meet as part of Nebraska's winning 200 medley relay team. Kucera's three victories helped the Huskers to their largest dual margin (134 points, 193-59) over a Big Ten opponent in school history. To close October, Kucera raced to two runner-up finishes, in the 100 freestyle against Iowa State and in the 100 butterfly against Minnesota. She followed this up with a big win in the 50 freestyle against Kansas to help the team to a victory over its old Big 12 rival. Continuing to prove that she is a force in the sprints, Kucera swam a thencareer best to finish runner-up in the 100 butterfly (54.30) at the Mizzou Invitational (Nov. 17-19). She added two more career bests, including one in the 100 freestyle (50.09) to finish seventh and swam another in the 50 freestyle prelims (23.33). At the invite in Columbia, Mo., Kucera was also a member of the winning 800 freestyle relay with a 7:15.75. She closed the dual season with a 100 fly victory and a third-place swim in the 50 free at Illinois, along with two additional third-place finishes against Rutgers (100 free, 200 free). At the 2022 Big Ten Championships, Kucera swam career-best times in the 50 free (23.16), 100 free (50.02) and 100 fly (54.09). She qualified for the C-finals in the 100 fly and was also a constant in NU's relays, competing in four events.

#### 2020-21 (FRESHMAN)

Kucera made an immediate impact at Nebraska as a freshman. At the Big Ten Championships, she raced to the C Final with a 50.11 in the 100 free prelims. She tied for 23rd in the 100 free to score 1.5 points for the Huskers. She just missed scoring in the 100 fly, finishing 26th in prelims with a 54.77. Kucera also played a huge role on five Husker relays (200 medley, 400 medley, 200 free, 400 free and 800 free) that combined for 216 of NU's 542.5 points at the conference meet to produce Nebraska's best Big Ten finish since joining the league in 2012. During an abbreviated regular season, Kucera claimed five topfive finishes, including a second-place showing in the 100 fly against Illinois (Jan. 23). She added

She closed the regular season with a fourth-place finish and career-best 23.49 in the 50 free in a tridual at Minnesota with Iowa (Feb. 6).

Kucera competed for five years at the Minnesota Class A State Championships for Hutchinson High School, completing her career as a two-time state champion and nine-time individual state finalist. She posted eight top-three state finishes. She also competed for the Tides Swimming Club. A talented power swimmer, Kucera came to Nebraska with personal-best times in the 50 free (23.81), 100 free (50.99), 200 free (1:50.18), 100 fly (55.57) and 200 IM (2:11.53).

#### 2022-23 (SOPHOMORE)

Maia Hall continued to achieve and progress throughout her sophomore campaign. At the mid-season Hawkeye Invite, Hall clocked a career-best 2:10.76 in the 200 breaststroke to win the event and hit the NCAA B Standard Cut. It was also the third-fastest time in Nebraska history. Hall added a third-place finish in the 100 breaststroke with a 1:01.72 and finished sixth in the 200 IM with a career-best 2:02.26. At the Big Ten Championships, Hall won the 200 breaststroke B Final to finish ninth overall with a time of 2:11.63. In the 100 breaststroke, Hall clocked a career-best 1:00.76 to place 10th and move to fifth on Nebraska's all-time list. Hall collected four-straight mid-season 200 breaststroke victories, including wins in duals against Iowa (2:20.64), Kansas (2:21.25) and Omaha (2:19.70). She also won the 100 breaststroke in 1:07.48 at the season-opening dual against SDSU. Hall tallied six individual wins and 11 finishes within the top three throughout the season.

#### 2021-22 (FRESHMAN)

During her freshman campaign, Hall was a consistent leader in the breaststroke group. She scored the second-most points at the Big Ten Championships for NU after making B-final appearance in both the 100 and 200 breaststroke events. Hall finished 12th in the 200 breaststroke and 13th in the 100 breaststroke.

#### MAIA HALL Junior | Breaststroke | Whitby, England (Ellesmere College)

Her 100 breaststroke prelims time of 1:00.98 put her at fourth on Nebraska's all-time list and her 200 breaststroke prelims time of 2:11.72 was the fifth-fastest in Nebraska history. Hall made her collegiate debut at the South Dakota State dual, where she swam to a third-place finish in the 200 IM and 200 medley relay. The freshman put up her first victory of the season in the 100 breaststroke at the Iowa dual (Oct. 23), followed by a fourth-place swim in the 100 fly. Hall swam to two consecutive fourth-place finishes in the 100 breaststroke, against Minnesota and Iowa State, while adding a third-place finish in the 200 breaststroke. Against the Jayhawks, Hall dropped her 200 breaststroke time by almost three seconds to claim a runner-up finish, in addition to finishing third in the 100 breaststroke. Two weeks later, Hall swam five seconds faster in the 200 breast (2:14.62) to place third at the competitive Mizzou Invitational (Nov. 17-19). She nabbed another top-five finish in the 100 breaststroke with a 1:02.64. Hall attacked the opportunity to swim against the best in the country at the U.S. Opens (Dec. 1-4), where she earned a spot in the 200-meter breaststroke A-finals. She went on to finish eighth overall with a 2:38.43. In the 100-meter breaststroke, Hall added a B-finals appearance and swam to 12th place with a 1:12.98. She closed the dual season with two victories in the 200 breaststroke, including a career-best swim against Rutgers (Jan. 28).

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

A breaststroke specialist who was the 2017 British 15U National Champion in the 50-meter race, Hall has won multiple medals at the British National Championships and was the winner of the Junior Final at the British Olympic Trials in 2019. At the 2019 Scottish Short-Course National Championships, Hall finished fourth in the 50 (32.16), 100 (1:09.40) and 200 breaststroke (2:28.21).

Madison Lloyd cruised to a pair of top-eight finishes at the mid-season Hawkeye Invitational with a 2:04.48 in the 200 backstroke and a 4:29.02 in the 400 IM. She added a 15th-place effort in the 100 backstroke with a 58.45. At the Omaha dual, Lloyd posted a 59.66 in the 100 backstroke and a 2:07.78 in the 200 backstroke to place third in both. Through the first duals, Lloyd produced a fourth-place 200 backstroke finish at Kansas in 2:06.82, while taking fifth in the event against Iowa State (2:07.65) and in a double-dual against Minnesota and South Dakota (2:08.02). Lloyd added another top-five finish at the competitive double-dual, taking fifth in the 100 backstroke with a 59.65. In duals with Illinois and Rutgers, Lloyd pitched in two sixthplace finishes in the 100 backstroke, a seventhplace finish in the 400 IM and two eighth-place finishes in the 200 backstroke. Lloyd capped off her year with season-best times in all three of her events at the Big Ten Championships, including a career-best 2:04.14 in the 200 IM to place 38th. In the 400 IM, Lloyd finished 29th with a 4:26.10, and she added a 31st-place finish in the 200 backstroke with a 2:00.98.

## MADISON LLOYD

#### 2021-22 (FRESHMAN)

In Lloyd's collegiate debut she swam to a 200 IM title, placed fourth in the 100 breaststroke and was a member of the third-place 200 medley relay in Nebraska's season-opening dual win over South Dakota State (Oct. 2). She contributed in a big way again for the Huskers in their Big Ten dual victory over Iowa at the Devaney Natatorium (Oct. 23). Lloyd raced to an individual title in the 200 backstroke after swimming to a runner-up finish in the 100 backstroke against the Hawkeyes. She helped the Huskers to their largest margin of victory against a Big Ten opponent in school history. The Mizzou Invitational was highlighted by Lloyd putting up top-10 finishes in four events. She finished eighth in the 100 backstroke (56.69), ninth in the 200 IM (2:04.43), 10th in the 400 IM (4:28.05) and 10th in the 200 backstroke (1:58.78). Lloyd wrapped up dual season with two career-best times (100 backstroke, 400 IM) against Rutgers, placing third in the 400 IM (4:24.70) and fourth in the 100 backstroke (56.02). She added a runner-up finish in the 100 backstroke and claimed third in the 200 backstroke at Illinois. At her first conference meet. Llovd swam in three individual events and notched her top finish in the 400 IM, finishing 32nd with a 4:25.40.

**BEFORE NEBRASKA** 

Lloyd was a three-time Texas UIL Class 6A state finalist in the 100 backstroke, finishing fourth in 2020 and 2021 after taking eighth as a sophomore in 2019. Her effort helped her earn NISCA All-America honors in the 100 backstroke in 2020. She raced to a 55.55 in the 100 back to take second at the Texas UIL Class 6A Regional Championships in 2020. Lloyd swam to a time of 1:58.82 in the 200 back at the 2019 Speedo Winter Junior Championship West. She posted a 50-yard backstroke time of 26.90 at the Gulf Swimming Southern Senior Championships in November of 2018. She also posted a 50 free time of 24.23 as a member of the Kingwood High School 200 relay team at the 2021 UIL 6A District 21 Championships. She swam a 50 back time of 26.43 as the leadoff swimmer in the 200 medley at the 2021 UIL 6A District 21 Championships. She added NISCA All-America

honors as a member of Kingwood's 200 free relay team in both 2019 and 2020, and as a member of the 200 medley relay in 2020. She was also an NISCA All-American as a freshman as part of Kingwood's 400 free relay team in 2018. Lloyd helped Kingwood to a state runner-up team finish in Austin in 2020 and a No. 7 NISCA national team finish. She swam club for Blue Tide Aquatics.

#### 2022-23 (SOPHOMORE)

Sydney McCracken continued to improve and provide top finishes in the individual medley and breaststroke events during her sophomore season. At the mid-season Hawkeye Invite, McCracken had three A Final swims and went on to finish fourth in the 200 breaststroke (2:15.43), fifth in the 200 IM (2:01.54) and sixth in the 100 breaststroke (1:02.58). Earlier in the season, McCracken chipped in a pair of runner-up finishes in the Iowa dual in the 200 breaststroke (2:21.49) and the 200 IM (2:07.95), while adding a fourth-place finish in the 100 breaststroke (1:05.10). McCracken finished fourth in each of her first four 100 breaststroke swims, including a double-dual with Minnesota and South Dakota and duals against Iowa State, Iowa and Kansas. In the 200 breaststroke, McCracken started the season with a third-place finish against Iowa State (2:24.74) and a fifth-place swim in the double-dual against Minnesota and South Dakota (2:23.83). The sophomore from Pennsylvania also managed a fifth-place finish at Kansas (2:28.44) in the event. McCracken rounded out dual season with five more topfive finishes against Illinois and Rutgers. At the Big Ten Championships, McCracken qualified for the 100 breaststroke and 200 breaststroke C Finals. She went on to place 21st overall in the 100 breaststroke (1:02.72) and 23rd in the 200 breaststroke (2:16.82).

#### 2021-22 (FRESHMAN)

McCracken kicked off her career at Nebraska at the South Dakota State dual, where she swam to a fourth-place finish in the 200 IM. At the Iowa dual, the freshman finished third in the 200 breaststroke and fifth in the 100 backstroke. McCracken continued to see her times improve, as she claimed three sixth-place finishes in the last weekend of October with duals against Iowa State and Minnesota in the 100 and 200 breaststroke events. McCracken gualified for the finals in the 200 breaststroke (2:19.91) and went on to finish eighth at the Mizzou Invitational (Nov. 17-19). She added two more top-15 finishes in the 100 breaststroke and 200 IM. McCracken wrapped up dual season with a pair of runner-up finishes in the 100 breaststroke. She also claimed two fourth-place finishes in the 200 breaststroke. At the Big Ten Championships, McCracken cruised to three career-best times, clocking a 1:02.54 in the 100 breaststroke to place 33rd, a 2:14.20 in the 200 breaststroke to finish 33rd and a 2:02.85 in the 200 IM for 48th place.

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Ranked as the No. 446 recruit in the nation among the Class of 2021, McCracken was an NISCA All-American in the 100-yard breaststroke in 2020. She posted her top 100-yard breaststroke time of 1:02.62 at the PIAA Boys and Girls 3A States in March 2020. She added a career-best time of 29.18 in the 50-yard breast at the PIAA state meet for Kennett High School. McCracken was also a finalist in the 50-meter breaststroke at the 2018 YMCA Long Course National Championships, while competing for the Kennett Area YMCA. McCracken has been competitive at the YMCA national level in all four strokes and the medley events. She owns a top time of 2:05.26 in the 200-yard IM, which helped her to a 15th-place finish at the PIAA AAA state meet in 2020. She also carried a 4:43.13 in the 400 IM. McCracken was a member of the National Honor Society at Kennett High School and was an honor roll selection every semester.

#### 2022-23 (SOPHOMORE)

JoJo Randby's season was highlighted by her record-breaking performance at the Big Ten Championships. In the 100 breaststroke, Randby clocked a 1:00.10 in the prelims to shatter the 29-year-old school record. The sophomore from Omaha broke the record again in the final with a 1:00.07 to place seventh overall. Randby tallied eight top-two finishes and six NCAA B Standard Cuts in the 100 breaststroke throughout the season. She added a career-best 2:13.25 in the 200 breaststroke final to place 12th and move up to No. 10 on the all-time list. At the Minnesota and South Dakota double-dual, Randby swam to victory in 1:04.63. The mid-season Hawkeye Invitational was highlighted by Randby clocking a 1:01.20 in the 100 breaststroke prelims to notch her first NCAA B Standard Cut of the season. She went on to finish as runner-up in the event, while taking sixth in the 200 breaststroke (2:15.86) and eighth in the 100 freestyle (51.57). She also swam

She wrapped up dual season with a 100 breaststroke victory against Illinois (1:02.64) and runner-up finish at Rutgers (1:01.66). Randby was one of five Huskers to compete at the CSCAA National Invitational Championships, where she brought in a pair of fourth-place finishes in the 50 breaststroke and 100 breaststroke.

#### 2021-22 (FRESHMAN)

Randby grew to become one of Nebraska's top swimmers in a variety of events. She was also a major asset in the relays during her freshman season. She kicked off her season at the South Dakota State dual, where she placed second in the 200 medley relay and claimed an individual third place in the 100 freestyle. She continued her dominant start in the dual against Iowa with a victory in the 200 medley relay and a runnerup finish in the 100 breaststroke. The Iowa State dual for Randby was highlighted by a fourthplace swim in the 50 freestyle. She notched another top-five finish in the 100 breaststroke against Kansas. At the Mizzou Invitational, Randby swam to three top-15 finishes including seventh in the 100 breaststroke (1:03.99), 12th in the 100 freestyle (51.80) and 13th in the 50 freestyle (23.64). Randby got the opportunity to compete on the national stage in three different events at the U.S. Open Championships (Dec. 1-4). She was one of three Huskers to qualify for the B-finals in the 100-meter breaststroke, placing 16th with a 1:14.49. She added an 18th-place finish in the 200-meter breaststroke (2:42.11) and finished 32nd in the 50-meter freestyle (27.25). In the final dual of the season, Randby finished runner-up in the 50 freestyle with a 23.70 and took third in the 100 breast with a 1:03.22. Randby made a pair of C-final appearances in the breaststroke events, where she placed 18th in the 100 breaststroke (1:01.50) and 20th in the 200 breaststroke (2:14.89). She also earned a spot on NU's 200 freestyle relay and 400 freestyle relay at the conference meet.

#### 2022-23 (FRESHMAN)

Gena Jorgenson had a historic freshman season, breaking the 1,650 freestyle school record on two occasions and punching her ticket to the NCAA Championships. The South Dakota-native cut 20 seconds off her previous career-best mile time (16:13.54) at the Big Ten Championships to set a new school record and place sixth overall. At NCAAs, Jorgenson broke the record again with a 16:13.34 to place 28th overall. She added a 41st-place finish in the 400 IM (4:18.00) and a 56th-place finish in the 500 freestyle (4:46.43) at the Allan Jones Aquatic Center in Knoxville, Tenn. Jorgenson added a 13th-place finish in the 500 freestyle at conference with a career-best 4:45.02, while winning the 400 IM C Final with a career-best 4:15.95. She swam to a pair of 500 freestyle titles in the first two meets of the season, at South Dakota State (5:04.50) and against Iowa State (4:58.68). She added a 1,000 freestyle win against the Cyclones with a 10:13.63. NU hosted Minnesota and South Dakota for a double-dual, where Jorgenson notched a pair of runner-up finishes in the 1,000 freestyle and 200 IM with times of 10:15.03 and 2:09.25, respectively. She added a third-place finish in the 500 freestyle, clocking a 5:03.16. At the Iowa dual, Jorgenson

She won every individual event at the state championship for five-straight seasons. Jorgenson qualified for the Futures Championship, held in July of 2022. It was her third appearance and her best showing at the esteemed event. To qualify, swimmers must record a time that is in the top 3 percent of swimmers in the United States. Jorgenson swam to titles in the 800-meter and 1500-meter freestyle events, while placing third in the 400-meter freestyle and fourth in the 400-meter IM.

Pablo Morales continues to see the Nebraska swimming and diving program climb in national prominence in and out of the water in his 22nd season leading the Husker program.

Nebraska experienced a successful 2023 season, marked by freshmen Gena Jorgenson and Kelsey Clairmont making NCAA Championship appearances. Additionally, five school records were shattered throughout the season.

The 2023 season saw a number of broken records. Jorgenson set the 1,650-yard freestyle record, previously held by Audrey Coffey, with a time of 16:13.34. Sophomore JoJo Randby added her name to the top of the list in the 100 breaststroke with a time of 1:00.07, which surpassed previous record holder Penny Heyns. Shannon Stott added a trio of records last season in the 500 freestyle, 400-meter freestyle and 200-meter butterfly.

In 2022, Autumn Haebig took her fourth trip to the NCAA Championships and notched a 23rd-place finish in the 200 freestyle. As a team, Nebraska finished 7-1 in duals and placed ninth at Big Tens.

In 2021, Nebraska earned its best team finish since 2001, placing 26th at the NCAA Championships. Led by a pair of first-team All-America performances by diver Abigail Knapton and two more All-America efforts by Haebig in the pool, the Huskers just missed a top-25 team finish.

Knapton became the first diver or swimmer in school history to earn first-team All-America

honors four times in the same event (platform). The six-time All-American was also the Big Ten Diver of the Championships after winning gold in both the platform and one-meter dives, while taking second on the three-meter board. A firstteam College Sports Communicators Academic All-American as well, Knapton was chosen as Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year and Best Female Athlete across all sports. An NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship award winner, Knapton was also one of 30 finalists for NCAA Woman of the Year honors. She also went on to be the only diver at the Olympic Trials to finish among the top eight in all three competitive dives.

In 2020, three Husker swimmers (Haebig, Coffey, Sara Troyer, Madison Coughlen) qualified for the NCAA Championships. The national meet was ultimately canceled due to the world-wide outbreak of the coronavirus, but the four Huskers combined for five CSCAA All-America awards.

In 2019, Nebraska captured its fourth consecutive top-40 finish at the NCAA Championships by taking 33rd. Knapton captured her third consecutive first-team All-America honor on the platform, while adding an honorablemention accolade in the three-meter dive.

In 2018, Nebraska finished 35th at the NCAA Championships, as Knapton captured first-team All-America honors on the platform for the second straight season. She was joined at the NCAA Championships by Haebig.

The Big Red took 33rd at nationals in 2017, when Knapton finished fourth on platform to capture her first All-America award.

In 2016, the Huskers finished 39th at the NCAA Championships, which included a 10th-place finish on the one-meter board by Anna Filipcic. The Huskers have sent at least one diver to the NCAA Championships in seven consecutive seasons.

Nebraska's rise in the pool and the diving well has occurred while maintaining elite performances in the classroom. In addition to Knapton's firstteam CSC Academic All-America award in 2021, Lindsay Helferich captured second-team CSC Academic All-America honors after closing her career with a perfect 4.0 GPA as a civil engineering major in 2019. As a whole, Nebraska leads all of NCAA Division I with 351 CSC Academic All-Americans all time across all sports.

Nebraska posted a program-record 3.747 GPA in the spring of 2020 to earn CSCAA Scholar All-America recognition as a team. The swimming and diving program owned the best GPA of any Nebraska team for three consecutive seasons (2015, 2016, 2017) to win the school's Herman Team GPA Award.

Nebraska's increased competitiveness in the pool and impressive success in the classroom and community are a far cry from the starting point of the Husker program when Morales took over the job in 2001. In his first season at NU, the Huskers went winless in 2001-02 (0-3) with a depleted roster.

Three years later, NU raced to an 8-1 dual record in 2004-05 and became the first Husker swimming and diving team in school history to win eight consecutive meets. Most importantly, Morales led the Huskers out of the bottom of the Big 12 with a fourth-place finish in 2004 and a third-place showing in 2005. Nebraska has continued to pursue a climb in conference


prominence as it has transitioned to the Big Ten.

The Huskers are working to regain the national prowess they enjoyed in the 1990s, when they captured five Big Eight and Big 12 titles from 1994 to 1999.

A 1987 graduate of Stanford University, Morales is one of the greatest male swimmers in U.S. history, winning an NCAA-record 11 individual titles. He also helped lead the Cardinal to three consecutive NCAA titles and four Pac-10 titles, while twice earning Pac-10 Swimmer-of-the-Year honors and garnering six Pac-10 titles himself.

Morales remains the all-time leading scorer at the NCAA Championships, amassing 235 points. Morales was also the recipient of the 1987 Al Masters Award, which is Stanford's highest award for athletic performance, leadership and academic performance. He was the first male swimmer to win the award, and remains one of two to have accomplished that feat. Morales holds the Stanford record in the 200-yard butterfly (1:42.60) and held the school record in the 100yard fly (46.25) until it was broken in 1998 by Sabir Muhammad (46.18).

While at Stanford, Morales was awarded the J.E. Sterling Award, which is presented to a student-athlete based on scholarship, leadership and community service. In addition, he served as the director of the Stanford Volunteers for Youth Program. Morales also found time to become a mainstay on the campus newspaper as the beat writer for the women's basketball team.

A CSC Academic All-America selection in 1987, Morales earned a law degree from Cornell in June of 1994, despite taking two years off from law school to train and compete at the Olympics.

An Olympic swimmer, Morales won three gold and two silver medals in the 1984 and 1992 Games, serving as a team captain for the 1992 squad. Following the 1992 Games, in which he returned to the pool after a three-year layoff to capture a gold medal in the 100-meter butterfly, Morales was named the U.S. Olympic Committee's Sportsman of the Year. He held the U.S. Open and NCAA record in the 100-yard fly with a time of 46.26, which stood for 13 years before being broken at the 1999 NCAA Championships.

Among Morales' greatest swimming accomplishments in the pool is holding the world record in the 100-meter butterfly with a time of 52.84 from 1986 until 1995.

Morales' legend in the Olympic Games lives on today, as the Nebraska coach served on the bid committee for the 2008 U.S. Olympic swimming trials that took place in Omaha. Morales had the chance to see the selection process and serve a role in the decision that gave Nebraska its first Olympic event in state history.

The Swimming Trials were a resounding success, and Omaha proved to be a worthy host for the event. More than 160,000 fans attended the event, shattering the previous mark by more than 50,000. In 2016, the U.S. Olympic Trials made their third consecutive appearance in Omaha, and more than 200,000 fans sold out every session of the event. The 2020 Trials returned to Omaha in the summer of 2021, after a one-year delay caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

Before coming to Nebraska, Morales served as the head women's swimming coach at San Jose State University. He held the reins as head coach from 1998 until being named coach at Nebraska in July of 2001. Morales rejuvenated a Spartan program that was near the bottom of the Western Athletic Conference. He was named the 2000 WAC Coach of the Year for his efforts.

While at San Jose State, Morales rebuilt a program and took the Spartans to the NCAA Championships after a 14-year absence. During his tenure, Morales produced six academic All-WAC swimmers. At the 2001 WAC Championships, five Spartans set school records under Morales' supervision, and three met NCAA qualification times. Seven others swam times that placed among the top three in school history.

Before his stint at SJSU, Morales was an assistant at his alma mater, Stanford, in 1997-98, helping lead the squad to the NCAA team title.

Morales also served as a graduate assistant at Cornell while pursuing his law degree. While at Cornell, Morales prepared and coached daily workouts for swimmers and assisted in recruiting. Morales has assisted in coaching with the San Jose Aquatics club group, as well as serving as head coach of the Stanford Masters Swim Team.

For Morales, the opportunity to coach at Nebraska was a welcome challenge.

"As a coach, taking over the responsibilities at Nebraska represents a great opportunity to take a program with success and use the resources that only Nebraska can offer, the support from the athletic department, the University, the Lincoln area and the state, to take the program to a higher level," Morales said after he was hired. "Our goal is to take this program to the elite national level."

A powerful motivator, Morales hopes to keep his swimmers on the top of their games in and out of the pool, as Nebraska has established itself among the nation's best in academic support and athletics.

"I want our swimmers to achieve their goals of faster times and lifetime bests," Morales said. "I want them to have the best season that they have ever had, and I also want us to establish a team atmosphere and build an excitement toward Husker swimming and diving."

Former Stanford Head Coach Skip Kenny, who coached Morales at Stanford and also with Team USA, spoke highly of his former pupil.

"He's one of the most honest people that you will meet," Kenny said. "You will always get the truth out of him. He's very dedicated to the sport of swimming and to his athletes.

"As soon as the swimmers spend a few days or weeks with him, they will see how much he cares about them and the sport of swimming."

Kenny said Morales may have greater potential as a coach than swimmer.

"I honestly believe that he is a better coach than he was a swimmer, and that is saying a lot since he was one of the best swimmers in the world. He has done things with kids that I thought I would never see. If there is a female swimmer out there that wants to be the best in the world, I'd send her to swim for Pablo."

Morales' experiences as an NCAA and international swimmer, and a club and collegiate coach helps him in coaching and recruiting.

"In my experiences, I have been fortunate to have had a long career as a competitor. I was able to train with coaches who I think are some of the best in the world," Morales said. "I have learned from them, and I have learned from myself. I believe that all of my experiences have prepared me for coaching. I have a good feel for the contours of teams that are successful. I know how they practice, train and compete."

A gifted and noted public speaker and lecturer, Morales was a contributing author to The Swim Coaching Bible, published in 2001. In April of 2007, he was chosen as the U.S. Swimming Diversity Select Camp Head Coach, a four-day camp at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo. Aside from in-pool training, "My job is to instill confidence in a swimmer and teach her to expect a higher level of performance from herself. I want each swimmer to open her mind to what is possible. I want her to strive to exceed what she has done in the past each and every day. I want her to expect that more is possible."

#### Coach Morales' Philosophy

Morales also led motivational and educational sessions and team-building activities for boys and girls from all over the nation. These children were a part of an ethnically under-represented population that is less than 20 percent of the current USA Swimming membership.

Pablo is the son of Pedro and the late Blanca Morales, who came to the United States from Cuba in 1956. Pablo and his wife, Viviana, have four boys, Sam, Benjamin, Eli and Gustavo.

Morales was born in Chicago and grew up in Santa Clara, Calif. He enjoys golfing in his spare time.

Patrick Rowan is in his 10th season as Nebraska's associate head coach, helping the Huskers continue to build a nationally competitive women's swimming and diving program.

During the 2022-23 season, Rowan coached Gena Jorgenson to an NCAA qualification, while posting a school record time in the mile during the season.

In 2021-22, Autumn Haebig took her fourth trip to nationals, competing in the 100 freestyle, the 200 freestyle and the 500 freestyle. She notched a top-25 finish in the 200 freestyle, after swimming to sixth in the event at the conference meet.

In 2020-21, Rowan helped guide Nebraska to its best finish since 2001, placing 26th at the NCAA Championships. NU also sent five swimmers to the 2022 CSCAA National Invitational Championships, where the team placed 14th out of over 50 teams.

Haebig put herself in the Husker record books by capturing All-America honors in both the 200 free (9th) and 500 free (14th) at the NCAA Championships. She became the first Husker swimmer to earn more than one All-America award at nationals since 2001.

Audrey Coffey joined Haebig at the NCAA Championships and just missed All-America honors after finishing 19th in the 1,650-yard freestyle in a school-record time of 16:14.19.

In 2019-20, Rowan helped three Husker swimmers earn CSCAA All-America honors with school-record-setting performances by Haebig (200 free), Coffey (1,000 free) and Madison Coughlen (200 fly).

Rowan, who returned to Nebraska after spending five years as an assistant coach at

Missouri, helped the Tigers become one of the nation's top-15 programs during his time in Columbia (2008-12).

The graduate of Lincoln Southeast High School and former Husker volunteer assistant coach returned to the Big Red for the 2012-13 season and has helped the Huskers produce five consecutive top-40 team finishes at the NCAA Championships.

"Patrick brings extensive and successful coaching and recruiting experience at the collegiate level," Nebraska Coach Pablo Morales said. "Patrick has a tremendous work ethic and an unmatched passion for Nebraska. He has made a major impact on our program and plays a key role in helping us achieve our Big Ten Conference and NCAA goals."

An excellent recruiter, Rowan has helped the Huskers raise their talent level in recent years.

Nebraska's 2023-24 class includes six swimmers and four divers who are expected to bolster NU's team. Five countries are represented in the class, along with competitors from Texas, Minnestoa, Kentucky and Florida. Antonina Harned, Abby Baxter, Jordyn Schmucker, Jenna Brown, Anna Vlachou, Amelia Riggott, Caterina Bisiacchi, Beatrix Tanko, Anastasia Tichy and Frankie Webb are the 10 newcomers who will make up nearly half of the 23-member team. Bisiacchi enters as a junior from the University of Trieste and Webb started her college career at North Carolina State. The other eight will be in their first year of college eligibility.

In Rowan's most recent season at Nebraska, Husker swimmers set five school records across all events.

In 2017-18, Rowan helped Haebig, a 14-time Wisconsin high school state champion, earn her first trip to the NCAA Championships as a true freshman. Haebig, who finished 10th in the 100 backstroke and 12th in the 200 freestyle at the 2018 Big Ten Championships, closed her season with a 40th-place NCAA finish in the 100 back. She added a 43rd-place showing in the 500 free at the NCAA meet. Haebig set career bests in all three of those events late in the season at either the Big Ten Championships or the NCAA Last Chance meet.

In 2018, SwimSwam.com ranked the Nebraska swimming and diving program No. 1 in the nation for recruiting, retention and improvement among all NCAA Division I women's programs.

In 2017-18, the Husker swimmers produced 26 NCAA B qualifying standards, which represented an increase in that total for the sixth consecutive season for Nebraska.

In 2016, six Huskers qualified for the U.S. Olympic Trials, while two more international swimmers qualified for their trials.

In 2016-17, Erin Oeltjen set a school record in the 100 and 200-yard backstroke, while Dana Posthuma notched the second-best time in school history in the 200-yard butterfly (1:58.16).

In 2014-15, Rowan guided the 200-yard freestyle relay to the second-best time in school history at the Big Ten Championships.

In Rowan's second season at NU (2013-14), he helped 14 swimmers to personal bests in the sprint freestyle events.

Rowan served as Nebraska's primary sprint freestyle coach in 2012-13. He saw the 200- and 400-yard freestyle relay teams swim school-record times at the 2013 Big Ten Championships. Taryn Collura swam a school record in the 50-yard freestyle and became the first Husker to qualify for the NCAA Championships in six years.

A Nebraska native, Rowan helped orchestrate a steady rise into national prominence at Missouri. In his first season at MU, Rowan helped the Tiger women's team finish 38th at the 2008 NCAA Championships. After a 28th-place showing in 2009, the Tigers climbed to 23rd in 2011 before finishing 14th at the 2012 NCAA meet.

Rowan served as the power sprints coach while also working with the middle distance group at Missouri. He was the recruiting coordinator for the Tiger men's program while assisting with recruiting on the women's side. The Tiger men's 2011 recruiting class was ranked seventh nationally by collegeswimming.com, while the women's class was ranked 18th. He served as the director of the Mizzou Swim Camp and coached the Mizzou Swim Team (USA Swimming Club).

In addition to serving as a volunteer assistant at Nebraska in 2006-07, Rowan was a long-time coach in the Nebraska Aquatics program.

From 2002 until 2007, Rowan served as the head coach and general manager of the Nebraska Aquatics swim team, where he was the primary coach of the high school and collegiate swimmers. He also served as an age group coach for swimmers from ages 6 to 24 for Nebraska Aquatics from 2000 to 2002.

From 2003 to 2007, he served as the age group chairman for the Midwestern Swimming Executive Board. He was named Midwestern Swimming Coach of the Year in 2006-07, after being named its Age Group Coach of the Year in 2004-05.

A competitive swimmer from 1985 to 2001, Rowan swam collegiately at Eastern Michigan, helping EMU to a pair of Mid-American Conference championships. Individually, he was a 12-time finalist at the MAC Championships for the Eagles.

As a prep swimmer at Lincoln Southeast, Rowan was a two-time Nebraska Class A state champion and a member of a state championship team for the Knights. He was also a team captain and a seven-time Junior National qualifier.

Rowan, who earned his bachelor's degree in psychology from Eastern Michigan in 2000, received his master's degree in education with an emphasis in school and counseling psychology/ sport psychology from Missouri in 2009. He is currently pursuing a Ph.D. with a similar emphasis in sport psychology.

A 10-time All-American and the 2019 Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year, Landon Marzullo was named the Head Diving Coach at the University of Nebraska by Pablo Morales on June 24, 2021.

"Landon brings an outstanding coaching skill set to this position, derived from a high-level competitive career, his own coaching experiences, and being around some of the best coaches in the business," Morales said. "He has made an immediate positive impact at each of his coaching stops. With his skill, energy and positive approach, he has gotten the best out of his divers, supported high achievement in the classroom, and successfully recruited both domestically and internationally. He will do the same here at Nebraska. Husker diving is in great hands."

In his second season with the Cornhuskers, Marzullo coached diver Kelsey Clairmont to the NCAA Championships on the platform. Clairmont notched a 34th-place finish with a score of 214.00 as a freshman. She finished the season with five first-place finishes and 17 top-five showings. Clairmont returns for the Huskers in 2023-24, along with sophomore Ellee Delcamp, who finished the season with six top-five finishes. Along with Clairmont, junior Reagan Hinze also qualified for the NCAA Zone Championships in the one meter and three meter.

In his first season at Nebraska, Marzullo coached all three of his divers to Zones, where Sara Troyer earned a spot in the three-meter finals and placed 18th. Troyer collected 11 victories on the 2021-22 season, managed a top-25 threemeter finish at Winter Nationals and notched

a 13th-place one-meter finish at the 2022 Big Ten Championships. Hallie Roman finished right behind Troyer on one meter at conference to score more team points with a 14th-place finish. Both Roman and Hinze produced career-best dives throughout the year and recorded multiple top-five finishes.

. Marzullo led the men's and women's divers at Wisconsin in 2019-20 after building strong men's and women's diving programs in three seasons at UNLV. He coached Rebel divers to three individual conference titles in his three seasons in Las Vegas, and helped his divers set five school records. In 2019, he was named the WAC Coach of the Year after leading freshman Tazman Abramowicz WAC titles on the three-meter and platform events. Abramowicz also became the first Rebel men's diver to qualify for the NCAA Diving Championships in more than 30 years. In 2018, he coached the first Rebel women's diver (Myka Fielding) to the NCAA Championships for the first time in more than 20 seasons. Marzullo was also the head coach of the Rebel Diving Club from 2015 to 2019.

Marzullo got his first taste of collegiate coaching as a volunteer assistant at Ohio State in 2012-13. He left OSU to work as a high diver for Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines from 2013 to 2015, performing multiple times per day on the three-meter, 10-meter and 17-meter platforms.

Marzullo, who was the Big Ten Diver of the Year at Indiana as a freshman in 2008, spent his first two collegiate seasons with the Hoosiers. He was also the Big Ten Freshman of the Year and the 2008 Big Ten Diver of the Championships after winning conference titles on the one-meter and three-meter springboards and adding a fourthplace finish on platform. He also took fourth on the platform at the 2008 NCAA Championships to claim first-team All-America honors for the first time in his career, while adding top-16 national finishes on both the one- and three-meter boards. Marzullo took fifth on platform for the Hoosiers at the 2009 NCAA Championships.

He transferred to Florida State following his sophomore season in Bloomington. He was an All-ACC Diver for the Seminoles in both 2010 and 2011. As a senior, he was the runner-up in all three diving events at the ACC Championships, before taking seventh on the three-meter board at the NCAA Championships to claim first-team All-America honors. He closed his career as a 10-time All-American overall, including four firstteam All-America awards. He was also named to the 2011 World University Games Diving Team, earning his best finish (4th) on the three-meter synchronized event. He earned his bachelor's degree in criminology from FSU in May of 2012.

Prior to his collegiate career, Marzullo was a six-time junior national champion and captured gold on platform at the 2005 Pan Am Junior Championships. He was a five-time U.S. National Team choice, and he twice qualified for the U.S. Olympic Diving Team Trials. He also finished second on the one-meter board at the 2011 U.S. National Championships.

During his time at UNO, Ruffcorn served as the primary strength coach for the Maverick football and softball teams. A veteran administrator and College Football Hall of Famer, Trev Alberts is in his third year as Vice Chancellor, Director of Athletics at the University of Nebraska in 2023-24. Alberts returned to his alma mater after spending 12 years at Nebraska-Omaha, guiding the program through a successful transition to the Division I level.

In his first season at Nebraska in 2021-22, Alberts helped the Huskers navigate the ever-changing landscape of Name, Image and Likeness guidelines for the benefit of Nebraska student-athletes. He led the development of the N-Vest Nebraska program to award \$5,980 per year to student-athletes who meet academic benchmarks. Alberts also spearheaded the charge to complete the fundraising for Nebraska's Go Big Project, which will provide Nebraska football with a new facility scheduled to open this fall. The project will also house academic, life skills, nutrition and support services for all Nebraska student-athletes.

A tireless worker who puts both the interests of student-athletes and fans first, Alberts helped orchestrate a qualitative survey of Nebraska's fan base to help shape the future of Memorial Stadium's game-day atmosphere. Alberts has also focused much of his time on developing the first strategic plan for Nebraska Athletics in 15 years. He has also committed himself to providing intense support and a unifying vision for Nebraska's coaches across all sports.

He continued to make a mark on Nebraska Athletics in his second year. Alberts conducted a thorough, nationwide search for a new leader for the Husker football program in the fall of 2022 that resulted in the hiring of Matt Rhule as Nebraska's new head coach. Rhule has a proven track record as a program builder at the college level, winning conference championships at both Temple and Baylor. Since his hiring, Rhule has energized the Nebraska fan base and attracted a top-25 recruiting class to the Husker program.

Alberts also spearheaded a new 15-year multimedia rights agreement between Nebraska Athletics and Playfly Sports, an emerging leader in sports marketing, media and technology. The partnership is one of the nation's most comprehensive multimedia rights agreements and has a total value of \$301 million for Nebraska over the life of the contract.

## **TREV ALBERTS**

#### Vice Chancellor, Director of Athletics Third Season

Nebraska's athletic achievements in 2022-23 included NCAA top-10 finishes by wrestling, rifle, bowling, women's outdoor track and field, men's gymnastics and men's indoor track and field. In all, 10 Husker teams posted top-20 national finishes, while the men's track team captured the Big Ten outdoor title under first-year coach Justin St. Clair.

Academically, Nebraska student-athletes continued to shine with a school-record 95 percent graduation rate across all sports for the second straight year. All of Nebraska's programs had at least an 88 percent GSR score in the most recent report.

Alberts' impact on college athletics stretches beyond the Nebraska campus. A respected leader at the Big Ten and national level, Alberts serves on both the NCAA's Division I Football Oversight Committee and the NCAA Division I Competition Committee.

Alberts' tenure leading UNO athletics was marked by successes in competition and in academics; by transitioning the university's athletic programs to NCAA Division I in 2011; and by establishing new homes for many UNO athletic teams, including Baxter Arena, the Maverick Park baseball/softball complex and the soccer pitch at Caniglia Field.

Alberts took the bold step in announcing that Omaha would reclassify from Division II to Division I in all sports in 2011 while simultaneously securing conference affiliation with the Summit League for all of the department's then-Division II programs. His vision for UNO's reclassifying teams was demonstrated even before the four-year transition period had ended. The Omaha baseball team won back-to-back Summit League regular-season championships in 2013 and 2014, while the men's basketball team made its first Division I postseason Tournament.

During UNO's time in the Division I ranks under Alberts tenure, the Mavericks had six teams and four student-athletes qualify for the NCAA Tournament, including hockey advancing to the Frozen Four in 2015 and men's soccer reaching the second round of the NCAA Tournament in the spring of 2021. He also expanded opportunities, adding men's golf and men's soccer in 2011, and Omaha began a men's swimming and diving program in 2021-22.

Throughout his tenure in Omaha, Alberts was focused on enhancing the student-athlete experience, including the construction and staffing of the Hamilton Academic Excellence Room and the development of the Ethel S. Abbott Student-Athlete Development Wing. Those efforts paid off in Nebraska-Omaha student-athletes posting consistent collective semester grade point averages above 3.3 for 18 consecutive semesters, including at least a 3.5 in each of his final three semesters.

The facilities around Omaha Athletics received a major uplift during his tenure. Maverick Park opened in March of 2021 to rave reviews as the home to the Mavericks' baseball and softball programs. Funding for the complex, which includes a 1,500-seat baseball facility and a 650-seat softball facility, were raised privately and provided both programs a permanent on-campus home for the first time.

Another crowning achievement was the opening of Baxter Arena in 2015. Alberts directed efforts to secure community support and funding to build the on-campus arena, which allowed the nationally prominent hockey program to play on campus and also serve as the home of the men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. Caniglia Field underwent renovations in 2012, making it one of the

finest collegiate soccer facilities in the country, highlighted by a FIFA 2-star rated playing surface and one of the largest LED videoboards in a soccer-only college facility.

Alberts' work on behalf of hockey, UNO's established Division I sport, also paid dividends. He successfully guided the Mavericks into the new National Collegiate Hockey Conference in 2013-14. The following year, Omaha reached the 2015 NCAA Frozen Four.

In addition, Alberts and his team led Omaha Athletics into a partnership with Learfield, a national leader in the marketing of collegiate athletics, and developed Omaha Sports Properties. As the exclusive corporate sponsorship sales unit for UNO Athletics, Omaha Sports Properties further enhanced revenue and increased brand prominence locally, regionally and nationally.

As part of UNO's reclassification to Division I, Alberts oversaw the rebranding of UNO athletics with new primary and secondary logos and a greater focus on strengthening the Maverick brand both regionally and nationally.

As a student-athlete, Alberts was an All-American on and off the football field as a Husker Blackshirt. He was Nebraska's first Butkus Award winner in 1993, helping Coach Tom Osborne's Huskers to an undefeated regular season and an Orange Bowl appearance against Florida State. A first-team All-American by every major publication in 1993, he was also the Football News National Defensive Player of the Year, the Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year, and the Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year. His No. 34 jersey was retired at the 1994 Red-White Spring Game. In 2015, he was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame.

Off the field, Alberts earned the NCAA's highest honor, The Today's Top Six Award. A three-time Academic All-Big Eight honoree, he was an Academic All-American in 1993. He graduated from Nebraska before his senior season.

Alberts was the fifth pick in the 1994 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts and played for the Colts until 1996. Following his NFL career, he served as an analyst on college and professional football games for major national networks, including ESPN, CNN/SI and CBS Sports Network.

Alberts and his wife Angela have three children – Chase (and his wife, Cassie), Ashtynne and Breanna, and one grandson, Walker John.





#### **MARQUITA ARMSTEAD** Executive Associate AD - Senior Woman Administrator Second Season

Marquita Armstead was hired as Nebraska's Executive Associate Athletic Director and Senior Woman Administrator on Dec. 16, 2021, and officially began her duties on Feb. 1, 2022. At Nebraska, Armstead has sport supervision for men's basketball and volleyball. She is a member of the Big Ten Sport Management Council, and has oversight of athletic medicine, sports psychology, the athletic performance lab (NAPL), strength and conditioning, performance nutrition, Title IX and gender equity.

Armstead came to Nebraska from the University of South Florida, where she served in a similar role. Armstead was a member of the South Florida athletics administration from March of 2016 to January of 2022. She originally joined USF as Associate Athletic Director for Compliance, before being elevated to Senior Associate Director of Athletics/ Senior Woman Administrator in August of 2017.

In her role with the Bulls, Armstead served as the sport administrator for men's and women's basketball, and had previous sport oversight of softball, men's soccer, women's tennis and as the secondary sport administrator for football. Armstead also oversaw several USF student-athlete support departments, including academic services, studentathlete enhancement, sports medicine, nutrition, sport psychology, student rights and responsibilities and Title IX.

In addition to her work at USF, Armstead has a strong athletic administration background at four other schools. Before her time at South Florida, Armstead worked at Georgia Tech from 2012 to 2016, where she served as Director of Compliance for her final three years in Atlanta. Prior to Georgia Tech, Armstead was the Director of Compliance at the University of Tennessee Chattanooga for six years. She also served internships in compliance at Mississippi State and Ohio University.

Armstead earned her bachelor's degree from Mississippi State in 2005 and earned a master's of sports administration from the school in 2006. She received a Master of Business Administration degree from Tennessee Chattanooga in 2013 and is a 2012 NCAA Leadership Institute graduate. Armstead is married to Demetric Armstead and the couple has a son, Braylon.



## **DR. LAWRENCE CHATTERS**

#### **Executive Associate A.D./Strategic Initiatives**

Dr. Lawrence Chatters currently serves as the Executive Associate Athletic Director for Strategic Initiatives. In addition to leading the department's diversity, equity and inclusion efforts, Dr. Chatters serves as a senior administrator advising the Director of Athletics. He also provides support to the Human Resources department, directs departmental professional and leadership development, and provides oversight of the implementation and progress of Nebraska Athletics' strategic plan. Chatters is the primary sports administrator for men's and women's golf, men's and women's gymnastics, wrestling and swimming and diving.

Most recently, Chatters served as Vice President of Student Affairs at Midland University and as the school's Chief Diversity Officer. Chatters oversaw residential life, mental health, student health and the academic success center on campus, and he was responsible for creating and implementing strategic initiatives to bring inclusive change on campus and in the community. He previously spent six years at Nebraska, working in a wide range of capacities, including positions within Nebraska Athletics as the Diversity and Inclusion Coordinator, and in the UNL Women's Center as the Men's Program Coordinator. He holds a Ph.D (2018) and a Masters' degree (2014) in counseling psychology from UNL.

#### **Third Season**

As Nebraska's Diversity and Inclusion Coordinator, Chatters helped develop and implement Nebraska Athletics' diversity and inclusion strategic plan and played a crucial role in creating the Huskers' annual diversity and inclusion summit for NU Athletics staff and Husker student-athletes. He also provided inclusive outreach opportunities within the Lincoln community.

Prior to accepting the position at Midland, Dr. Chatters served as a postdoctoral fellow in the Center for Counseling and Psychological Services at Penn State University. He also served as an adjunct professor in the school's counselor education department.

Dr. Chatters has also worked as an academic advisor, course instructor and mental health counselor with focused efforts and experience in students' mental, social and emotional health, providing individual counseling, group counseling, inclusive outreach and crisis management. He also had success as a business owner and was the executive director of the Goldwin Foundation, an organization that raised funds for providing grants for National Children's Hospitals and other programs that focused on serving children with special medical needs.

Dr. Chatters graduated from Midland University in 2002 with a degree in psychology. He has been a licensed mental health practitioner since 2006.

Lawrence and his wife, Katie, have two daughters, Airalon and Mikayla.



Dr. Rodney D. Bennett is the 21st chancellor of the University of Nebraska–Lincoln, Nebraska's flagship, Land-Grant and Big Ten institution. He is a 30-year veteran of higher education with a track record of growing research, increasing student success and building impactful partnerships.

Chancellor Bennett came to Nebraska after nine years of successful leadership at the University of Southern Mississippi. During his tenure as president, USM was reclassified from a Carnegie R2 to an R1 university, signaling growth in research prestige and funding. Dr. Bennett also invested in programs to support student recruitment, retention and outcomes, including for the 30 percent of USM students who were firstgeneration. His efforts led to an improvement in the university's six-year graduation rate.



Scott M. Fuess Jr. is in his fourth year as Nebraska's Faculty Athletics Representative, having started on July 1, 2020.

As faculty athletics representative, Fuess serves as a liaison between the Office of the Chancellor and Athletic Department. He also serves on the Athletic Department's Executive Staff. His areas of focus in the role include the welfare of student-athletes, NCAA and Big Ten Conference

## **RODNEY BENNETT**

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Chancellor First Season

While at USM, Dr. Bennett established new faculty positions in high-growth areas and increased the average salary for full-time faculty; oversaw \$300 million in facilities work; and launched the largest fundraising campaign in the University of Southern Mississippi's history. He was a strong champion of the Division I athletics program, investing in new facilities and programs to support student-athletes, including a dedicated mental health counselor to serve student-athletes. Throughout his time as president, he brought a conservative approach to budget management, meeting or exceeding the budgetary goals set by the Mississippi Institutions of Higher Learning Board of Trustees.

Prior to his role at the University of Southern Mississippi, Dr. Bennett served at the University of Georgia for more than a decade. He was the senior administrator for student programs and services for Georgia's 34,000-plus students; oversaw \$150 million in capital projects; and made key staff and programmatic investments in extracurriculars, mental health programs and other areas to better support students.

Dr. Bennett has also been the dean of students at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina, and associate dean of student life at Middle Tennessee State University.

Chancellor Bennett values community leadership and service. He has served on numerous boards, including the Mississippi Aquarium, Northeast Georgia Girl Scouts of America, Catholic Health East (Philadelphia), and St. Mary's Health Care System in Athens, Georgia. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and Past Sire Archon for Sigma Pi Phi fraternity, The Boulé.

Dr. Bennett earned a bachelor's degree in mass communication (1990), a master's degree in educational administration (1992), and an education specialist degree (1993) from Middle Tennessee State. He earned his Doctor of

compliance, maintaining the positive relationship between athletics and faculty, developing and responding to NCAA legislative proposals and representing the university at related NCAA and Big Ten Conference meetings.

The half-time position - which was restructured to an expected term of five years - reports directly to the University of Nebraska President's Office and consults with Director of Athletics Trev Alberts. Fuess splits time between faculty representative duties and academic responsibilities.

Fuess, the Steinhart Distinguished Professor of Business and former chair of the College of Business' economics department, has worked at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln since 1986. He serves on the Faculty Senate's Intercollegiate Athletics Committee, having chaired the committee for 2018-19 and a sub-committee in 2017-18. He also has served on numerous Big Ten Conference committees, including the Sports Management Committee, the Compliance and Reinstatement Committee and the Legislative Review Committee. For 2022-23 he served as Chair of the B1G Compliance and Reinstatement Committee.

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

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## **BIG TEN CONFERENCE**

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders. The history of the Big Ten traces back more than 125 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago, where

In history of the Big 1en traces back more than 125 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago, where on January 11, 1895, then-Purdue president James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, University of Illinois, University of Michigan, University of Minnesota, Northwestern University and University of Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bonafide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On February 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the mechanics of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905. Indiana University and the State University of lowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State University joined the conference, bringing its membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, and that name was eventually incorporated in 1987.

As the 1900's opened, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence. In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were held at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by the leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to a student of the graduating class who has attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a student competing in Big Ten athletics can receive. In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of seven men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971, Jim Delany in 1989, Kevin Warren in 2020 and Tony Petitti in 2023.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when the University of Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all conference institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produced over \$10 billion in funded research, \$5 billion more than any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992. In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of instant replay, where it approved nationwide testing in 2005. A year later, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

<sup>1</sup> Ålso in 2006, Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20year agreement with FOX Networks to create what would become the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 2,200 live events annually as the first internationally distributed network dedicated to covering one of the premier collegiate conference in the country. BTN is in almost 60 million homes in the U.S. and Canada alone via all major video distributors in those countries and approximately 300 additional video providers across North America. BTN is also available through the majority of OTT providers, and via the Fox Sports App, which delivers live and on-demand programming to computers, smartphones and tablets. In addition, the B1G+ ("Big Ten Plus") platform streams more than 1,700 conference events each season.

The Big Ten took its media reach to unprecedented heights on Aug. 18, 2022, with the announcement of a groundbreaking media rights agreement to provide fans with unparalleled access and exposure to its student-athletes and member institutions. Beginning with the 2023-24 academic year and continuing through 2029-30, the Big Ten will increase distribution coast-to-coast, featuring exclusive content across linear networks FOX, CBS and NBC, as well as NBCUniversal's direct-to-consumer streaming platform, Peacock. The breadth of new partners, in addition to BTN and FS1, will place conference football, women's and men's basketball and Olympic sports student-athletes on the biggest stage and provide fans with the most exciting matchuos across traditional over-the-air linear television and direct-to-consumer streaming.

most exciting matchups across traditional over-the-air linear television and direct-to-consumer streaming. On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors(COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011. The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from the University of Maryland and Rutgers University on November 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams. The Big Ten officially stretched from coast to coast on June 30, 2022, when it was announced the COP/C had unanimously voted to admit the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) and the University of Southern California (USC), effective Aug. 2, 2024. Competition will begin for those institutions in conference sports in the 2024-25 academic year.

Since opening in the fall of 2013, the Big Ten Headquarters and Conference Center, located in Rosemont, Illinois, hosts more than 300 meetings annually for member institutions, Big Ten Academic Alliance-related committees and coaches' groups. The headquarters also features an interactive digital museum — the Big Ten Experience — which brings the conference's storied academic and athletic history to life.

In June 2014, the Big Ten opened a second office in New York City, featuring both office and meeting space in Midtown Manhattan. Big Ten staff members are based in the New York City office to provide expanded coverage and service, while other conference and institutional administrators utilize the space as necessary when conducting business on the East Coast. The Big Ten and its member institutions also have access to satellite office space in Washington, D.C.

Petitti and his staff work to meet the educational needs of student-athletes to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. The conference office manages 27 different championships and tournaments, offers legislative and compliance services, oversees the production and distribution of more than 2,000 events annually, provides staff services to coaching and administrative personnel, and remains a vital resource for media and fans seeking information on the Big Ten.

On March 7, 2020, in advance of the rising tide of the COVID-19 pandemic, the conference partnered with all 14 of its member institutions to create the Big Ten Task Force for Emerging Infectious Diseases. This group was formed to provide counsel and sound medical advice to ensure the health, safety and wellness of the Big Ten's students, coaches, administrators and fans. Less than two months later on May 4, 2020, the conference announced the formation of the Big Ten Mental Health and Wellness Cabinett, featuring representation from all 14 member institutions, as well as sport affiliate members Johns Hopkins (men's and women's lacrosse) and Notre Dame (men's ice hockey). The goal of the cabinet is to promote optimal mental health for Big Ten student-athletes through a comprehensive, systemic and interdisciplinary approach to establishing mental health programs, while also providing counsel, advice and expertise to the conference office.

One of the signature moments of Warren's tenure as commissioner came on June 1, 2020, when, following the death of Minneapolis resident George Floyd, he penned an open letter in which he announced the formation of what became known as the Big Ten Equality Coalition. This group, which features student-athletes, coaches, athletic directors, chancellors, presidents and other members of the Big Ten family from all 14 member institutions, has a stated goal of seeking tangible ways to actively and constructively combat racism and hate around the world, while also empowering student-athletes to express their rights to free speech and peaceful protest.

A product of the conversations emerging from the coalition was the creation of the Big Ten Voter Registration Initiative. This non-partisan, conference-wide collaboration encourages student-athletes to take part in the electoral process and is led by a Voter Registration Committee that includes representatives from all 14 Big Ten institutions.

More than 125 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.

## **REVIEW & HISTORY**

### HUSKERS BREAK FIVE RECORDS DURING 2022-23 SEASON



Shannon Stott posted record-breaking performances throughout her entire senior season, along with three A Final qualifications at the 2023 Big Ten Championships.

Nebraska's 2022-23 swim and dive season was marked by newcomer accomplishments combined with veteran leadership.

Gena Jorgenson's first season as a Husker saw a program record and an NCAA Championship appearance. She broke the Nebraska 1,650 freestyle record twice. At the 2023 Big Ten Championships, Jorgenson placed sixth overall and swam a then-career-best mile time of 16:13.54. She broke the record again at the 2023 NCAA Championships with a 28th-place finish and time of 16:13.34. During the summer, she posted three Olympic Trials-qualifying times – 4:15.12 in the 400-meter freestyle, 8:44.58 in the 800-meter freestyle and 16:40.17 in the 1500-meter freestyle.

Jorgenson grabbed nine first-place finishes, 10 second-place finishes and five third-place finishes during the season. She was the top finisher on the team in the 1,000 freestyle (9:53.58) and the 1,650 freestyle (16:13.34).

Shannon Stott was a team captain in 2022-23 and set a school record in the 500 freestyle (4:41.65) at the 2023 Big Ten Championships. She broke the record again at the Mizzou Last Chance Qualifier (4:41.34). She led the team in the 200 freestyle (1:46.46), the 500 freestyle and the 200 butterfly (1:57.29). Stott also owns the Nebraska 400-meter freestyle and the 200-meter butterfly long-course records.

Over the course of the 2022-23 season, she posted 10 first-place finishes, nine second-place finishes and two third-place finishes. She also grabbed 14 NCAA B Standard cuts.

Madesyn Ronquillio was also a team captain and led Nebraska in the 200 backstroke with a time of 1:58.45 at the Hawkeye Invite. She notched four first-place finishes, seven secondplace finishes and four third-place finishes last season. Ronquillio swam a leg of the 400 medley relay and finished 25th in the 200 backstroke (1:58.81) at the Big Ten Championships.

Berkeley Livingston, a Lincoln native, was the third team captain in 2022-23. She garnered four first-place finishes, two second-place finishes and five third-place finishes while leading the team in the 400 IM (4:15.41). Livingston placed 16th in the 400 IM at the Big Ten Championships (4:15.41), 23rd in the 200 IM (2:00.88) and 19th in the 200 butterfly (2:01.36).

Sarah Barton, a junior in 2022-23, led NU In the 200 IM (1:59.68). She was a finalist in three events at the 2023 Big Ten Championships:

the 400 IM (13th, 4:15.60), the 200 butterfly (18th, 1:59.46) and the 200 IM (21st, 2:00.82). She competed in the 2023 CSCAA National Invitational Championships and placed sixth in the 400 IM (4:17.46), eighth in the 200 IM (2:02.30) and 11th in the 200 butterfly (2:00.63). Over the summer, Barton posted an Olympic Trials-qualifying time in the 200-meter butterfly (2:13.49).

A sophomore last season, JoJo Randby set a Nebraska program record in the 100 breaststroke with a 1:00.07. She also placed seventh at the Big Ten Championships in that event. She grabbed two first-place finishes, six second-place finishes and one third-place finish over the course of the season. Randby notched an Olympic Trialsqualifying time of 1:10.02 in the 100-meter breaststroke over the summer at the Columbia sectionals.

Newcomer Kelsey Clairmont made an impact on the diving side. The freshman qualified for the NCAA Championships and placed 34th overall on the platform (214.00). She hit NCAA Zone Diving Championship-qualifying standards in the one meter and three meter in her opening weekend as a Husker. Leading NU in all three diving events, she grabbed five first-place finishes, five secondplace finishes and four third-place finishes on the season.

Kaitlyn Barth competed in three events in the Big Ten Championships in her senior season. She placed 27th in the 100 butterfly (54.97), 46th in the 50 freestyle (23.60) and 52nd in the 100 freestyle (52.14). She earned a third-place finish at the Hawkeye Invitational in the 100 butterfly (54.65).

Caitlin Cairns grabbed a first-place finish and two third-place finishes in her junior season. She competed in three events at the Big Ten Championships and qualified for the C Final in the 100 butterfly. She finished in 23rd place, with a time of 54.85. Cairns went on to compete in the CSCAA National Invitational Championships in the 100 butterfly, logging a 24th-place finish (54.98). She competed in the A Final at the Hawkeye Invitational in both the 100 butterfly and 100 backstroke, earning fourth- and eighth-place finishes, respectively. Cairns set a career best with a win in the 100 butterfly at the Illinois dual.

Gabby Donahue produced nine top-five finishes on the season. She competed in three events at the Big Ten Championships and notched a career-best 51.29 in the 100 freestyle. Donahue placed 24th in the 200 IM (2:02.82) and 25th in the 100 backstroke (54.49). She went on to compete at the CSCAA National Invitational Championships in the 100 backstroke and logged a time of 57.42. Earlier in the season, Donahue earned a spot in the 100 backstroke A Final at the Hawkeye Invitational, finishing with a time of 55.04. She notched two third-place finishes at the lowa dual, clocking a 53.82 in the 100 freestyle and a 58.13 in the 100 backstroke.

Emily Haimes earned 13 top-five finishes, including four victories. She competed in three individual events and four relays at the Big Ten Championships. Haimes was a part of two ninthplace relays at the conference meet, as a member

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of the 200 medley relay and the 400 medley relay. At the Hawkeye Invitational, she competed in the A final in the 100 freestyle and the 100 butterfly, earning sixth-place finishes in both events with times of 51.00 and 55.13, respectively. Haimes earned three first-place finishes on the season in the 100 butterfly, swimming her fastest time (55.72) at Iowa.

Maia Hall finished her sophomore campaign with six victories and 16 top-five finishes. She competed in three events at the Big Ten Championships and earned ninth and 10th-place finishes in the 200 breaststroke (2:11.63) and the 100 breaststroke (1:00.76), respectively. Hall's career best in the 100 breaststroke moved her to fifth on Nebraska's all-time list. At the Hawkeve Invitational, Hall logged a career-best time of 2:10.76 in the 200 breaststroke. With her firstplace finish, Hall hit the NCAA B Standard Cut. She also earned a third-place finish in the 100 breaststroke (1:01.72) and a sixth-place, careerbest finish in the 200 IM (2:02.26). Hall captured three-straight victories in the 200 breaststroke, against lowa (2:20.64), Kansas (2:21.25) and Omaha (2:19.70). She added one more with a victory against Rutgers with a time of 2:14.79.

Lexi Kucera enters her senior season for the Huskers after an impressive junior campaign. Kucera racked up five first-place finishes and 21 top-three finishes. She competed in three events at the Big Ten Championships, including the C Final of the 100 butterfly, where she finished 22nd (54.60). Kucera also had a strong showing at the Hawkeye Invitational, capturing a runnerup finish in the 100 butterfly (54.17) and three third-place finishes in the 100 freestyle (50.41), the 200 freestyle (1:48.47) and the 200 butterfly (2:00.97). She set career bests with her finishes in the 200 freestyle and 200 butterfly. Aside from her 22 top-five finishes, Kucera was a part of seven winning relays over the season.

Molly Rosenthal and Katelyn Kilpatrick provided top finishes in the distance freestyle events. Rosenthal, a senior from Glen Ellyn, Ill., finished 21st in the mile at the Big Ten Championships with a time of 16:57.11. Adding a career-best 4:50.72 in the 500 freestyle prelim, she earned a spot in the C Final. Rosenthal opened her senior season with five-straight top-five 1,000 freestyle finishes. Clocking a career-best 1,000 freestyle time of 10:06.53, Rosenthal placed fourth at the Illinois dual.

Kilpatrick, a senior from Ocala, Fla., placed 24th in the mile at the Big Ten Championships with a 17:16.63. She added a ninth-place finish at the mid-season Hawkeye Invitational, clocking a 17:38.46 in the 1,650 freestyle.

As a sophomore, Madison Lloyd had seven top-five finishes. She competed in three events at the Big Ten Championships and set a career-best with a 38th-place finish in the 200 IM (2:04.14). Lloyd also captured two season-best times with a 29th-place finish in the 400 IM (4:26.10) and a 31st-place finish in the 200 backstroke (2:00.98). At the Hawkeye Invitational, Lloyd captured two eighth-place finishes, clocking a 2:04:48 in the 200 backstroke and a 4:29.02 in the 400 IM. She added a 15th-place finish in the 100 backstroke (58.45) and a 17th-place finish in the 200 IM (2:07.08). Earlier in the season, Lloyd captured third in two events against Omaha with a 59.66 in the 100 backstroke and a 2:07.78 in the 200 backstroke. In a meet against Iowa State, Lloyd set a careerbest in the 100 butterfly with a time of 1:02.07.

In Giulia Marchi's first season as a Husker, she garnered 16 top-five finishes, nine top-three finishes and two first-place finishes. Marchi competed in three individual events and two relay events at the Big Ten Championships. She went on to compete at the CSCAA National Invitational Championship, where she helped four relay teams to top-25 finishes. At the Hawkeye Invitational, Marchi took home a fourth-place finish with a career-best time in the 100 freestyle (50.67). She also clocked career bests in the 50 freestyle (23.71), 200 freestyle (1:49.63) and 100 butterfly (57.60). Marchi started the season strong with a second-place finish against South Dakota State in the 50 freestyle (25.49). She took home a first- and second-place finish against Iowa State in the 200 freestyle and 100 freestyle, with times of 1:52.21 and 52.14, respectively. Marchi added another first-place finish later in the season against Omaha in the 100 freestyle (52.49).

Sydney McCracken capped off her sophomore season with appearances in three Big Ten Championship events. She logged a 21st-place finish in the 100 breaststroke (1:02.72) and a 23rd-place finish in the 200 breaststroke (2:16.82). McCracken had a strong showing at the Hawkeye Invitational, setting a career-best in the 200 IM. Her time of 2:01.54 was good for a fifth-place finish. She also captured a fourth-place finish in the 200 breaststroke (2:15.43) and a sixth-place showing in the 100 breaststroke (1:02.58). Earlier in the season, McCracken set a career best in the 100 backstroke with a fourth-place finish at South Dakota State. She swam for a pair of runner-up finishes at the Iowa dual in the 200 breaststroke (2:21.49) and the 200 IM (2:07.95). McCracken totaled four top-three finishes and 14 top-five finishes on the season.

Reagan Hinze posted NCAA Zone-qualifying scores and top finishes on the boards throughout the 2022-23 season. At the Iowa State dual, Hinze scored a 272.48 to win the one meter and qualify for Zones, while finishing as runner-up on the three meter. Scoring a 285.23 on the three meter at Kansas, Hinze punched her ticket to Zones in a second event. Notching a career-best 301.10 on the three meter at the mid-season Hawkeye Invitational, Hinze placed fourth.

In her freshman season with the Huskers, Ellee Delcamp earned three top-three and six top-five finishes. She began the season with fourth and fifth-place finishes against lowa State on the one meter (239.18) and the three meter (242.63). Delcamp set a career best on the one meter in another early season meet with lowa. Her score of 244.70 was good for a sixth-place finish. She set another career best in the three meter, after a sixth-place finish and a score of 261.83 against Kansas. At the Hawkeye Invitational, Delcamp finished 15th on the one meter (237.85) and 16th on the three meter (246.10). She also set a career best on platform with a score of 193.40.

A total of 63 student-athletes from around the world have earned swimming and diving NCAA All-America honors as Huskers. The 63 Husker All-Americans have come to Nebraska from nine countries, including Americans from 18 states.

In all, Huskers have combined for 253 All-America awards, while 32 Huskers have been multi-time All-Americans.

Julia Russell owns the distinction of earning the most All-America certificates as a Husker swimmer with 18 awards from 1994 to 1997. Russell is one of seven Huskers to earn 10 or more All-America awards, including NCAA Champion Penny Heyns (15), Melanie Dodd (15), Helene Muller (15), Therese Alshammar (13), Dana Powers (10) and Shandra Johnson (10).

Alshammar, who captured her 13 All-America awards in just two seasons at Nebraska, went on to become the first female swimmer in history to appear in six Olympic Games, including the 2016 Rio Olympics for her native Sweden.

## **ABI KNAPTON** 2021

Abi Knapton was the first Husker women's swimmer or diver to capture All-America honors in both competition and in the classroom. A six-time All-American, Knapton claimed first-team CSC Academic All-America accolades in the atlarge category in 2021. She posted a 3.93 GPA as a psychology major over her five-year career and was a four-time first-time All-American on platform. She was the first Husker swimmer or diver to earn first-team All-America honors four times in the same event.

As a senior in 2021, Knapton was named the Big Ten Diver of the Meet after winning conference titles in both the platform and the one meter. She added first-team All-America honors on the platform and three-meter events at the 2021 NCAA Championships, before becoming the only female diver to finish in the top eight in both platform and three meter at the U.S. Diving Team Olympic Trials in Indianapolis. Knapton was also the 2021 Big Ten runner-up on three meter and an honorable-mention All-American in the event in 2019.

Knapton was voted Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year and Nebraska's Best Female Athlete across all sports in 2021. She was also an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipient following her Nebraska graduation in May 2021.

The Omaha Marian High School grad was a four-time CSCAA Scholastic All-American (2017, 2018, 2019, 2021), a four-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and a four-time Academic All-Big Ten selection (2018, 2019, 2020, 2021). She was a 10-time Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll selection and a five-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

Lindsay Helferich etched her name in Husker history by becoming Nebraska's third swimming and diving CSC Academic All-American in 2019. Helferich claimed secondteam honors in the at-large category following her senior season by posting a perfect 4.0 GPA during her career.

Helferich, a freestyle and backstroke specialist, was one of nine Huskers to be named a Nebraska Outstanding Scholar. She added a 1A FAR Academic Excellence Award and was recognized for the third time as a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar.

She also excelled in competition, finishing 26th in the 50-yard freestyle at the 2019 Big Ten Championships. Helferich posted her top career Big Ten finish by taking 21st in the 100 backstroke in 2018, while adding 27th-place showings in the 50 and 100 freestyles the same year. As a freshman in 2016, she took 24th in the 200 back at the conference meet.

Before coming to Nebraska, Helferich was a top-16 finalist in the 200 back and a top-24 finalist in the 200 free at the Southern Zone Sectional Championships. She was also the valedictorian of her class at Odessa High School in Texas.

She earned her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in May of 2019 as a civil engineering major. She was a three-time academic All-Big Ten choice and earned eight spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. She was also a four-time Tom Osborne Citizenship Team member.



## KAITLIN ARNTZ 2010

Kaitlin Arntz earned third-team CSC Academic All-America honors in the at-large category following her senior season for the Huskers in 2010.

Arntz was one of Nebraska's top breaststroke and individual medley swimmers during her time in Lincoln. She capped her outstanding career by becoming the first CSC Academic All-America women's swimmer in school history.

Arntz capped her competitive career with a fourth-place finish in the 200-yard breaststroke at the 2010 Big 12 Championships. She added a fourth-place performance in the 100 breast and a sixth-place showing in the 200 IM.

She finished fifth in the 200-yard breaststroke and 11th in the 200 IM at the 2009 Big 12 Championships. She was Nebraska's team MVP as a junior.

As both a freshman and sophomore, Arntz finished eighth in the 200 breast and 10th in the 100 breast at the Big 12 Championships.

Arntz joined the Huskers after a stellar high school career at Millard West in Omaha. She was a 16-time All-American at Millard West and a five-Nebraska state champion. She closed her high school career holding seven school records.

An advertising major at Nebraska, Arntz was nominated with a 3.94 cumulative GPA. She also earned first-team CSC All-District VII honors. An honorablemention CSCAA Scholar-All-America selection in 2010, Arntz was also a three-time academic All-Big 12 Conference selection for the Big Red from 2008 to 2010.



## COURTNEY JENSEN 2000

Courtney Jensen capped an outstanding academic and athletic career as a first-team CSC Academic All-America selection in the at-large category as a senior in 2000.

Jensen, a Husker co-captain and four-year letterwinner from Sheridan, Wyo., was a leader for Nebraska in the diving well throughout her career.

As a senior, Jensen produced a career-best 11th-place finish on the three-meter board at the 2000 Big 12 Conference Championships. She added a 17th-place performance in the one-meter dive.

As a junior, Jensen took 13th on the three-meter board at the 1999 Big 12 Championships, while adding a 23rd-place finish in the one-meter event.

Those performances followed a sophomore season in which she placed 21st on the three-meter and 22nd on the one-meter at the 1998 Big 12 Championships.

She opened her Husker career with 13th-place finishes on both the one- and three-meter boards as a freshman at the 1997 Big 12 meet.

A high school All-American both in competition and in the classroom, Jensen was a twotime Wyoming state champion at Sheridan High School.

An elementary education major at Nebraska, Jensen was nominated for the CSC Academic All-America At-Large team with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average. She claimed first-team CSC All-District VII honors to advance to the national ballot and become Nebraska's first female swimming and diving CSC Academic All-American.

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## **HUSKER OLYMPIANS**



### THERESE ALSHAMMAR (SWEDEN) 1996, 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012, 2016

The first six-time female Olympic swimmer in history, Therese Alshammar lettered for the Huskers in 1998 and 1999. Considered one of the top female freestyle sprinters in the world, Alshammar set two records at the 2000 European Short Course Championships. Alshammar took home three medals from the Sydney Olympics, a pair of silvers and a bronze.



### ELVIRA FISCHER (AUSTRIA) 1996, 2000

A two-time Olympian, Fischer was a three-time All-American while at Nebraska. Fischer's top finish at the 1996 Olympics was 23rd in the 200-meter breaststroke (2:33.87). At the Sydney Olympics in 2000, Fischer's top performance was in the 100-meter breaststroke, where she touched the wall in 1:11.58, placing 24th overall, and winning her heat.



## PENNY HEYNS (SOUTH AFRICA) 1992, 1996, 2000

A three-time Olympian, Penny Heyns became the most successful Olympian for South Africa and Nebraska at the same time. A Husker senior in 1996, Heyns' successful year culminated with two Olympic gold medals. For more on Heyns, please see page 100.



#### EMMA JOHNSON (AUSTRALIA) 1996

Emma Johnson competed for the Huskers during the 1998-99 season, earning All-America honors in the 400-yard IM at the 1999 NCAA Championships. She established the Nebraska record in the 400-yard IM at the 1998 Texas Invitational. Johnson finished fifth in the 400-meter IM at the 1996 Olympics, while also earning a bronze medal swimming on the Aussie's third-place 800-meter freestyle relay team.



#### WENDY LUCERO (UNITED STATES) 1988

Wendy Lucero competed for Nebraska from 1981 to 1983. Lucero's freshman season was highlighted by a runner-up finish in three-meter diving and a fourth-place finish on the one meter at the 1982 Big Eight Championships. Later that season, Lucero placed eighth at U.S. Nationals. A native of Denver, Colo., Lucero competed for the United States at the 1988 Olympics.



## LENKA MANHALOVA (CZECH REPUBLIC) 1992, 1996

Lenka Manhalova finished 11th in the 200-meter breaststroke and 29th in the 100-meter breaststroke at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta. A Czech National Team member, Manhalova was a two-time All-American at Nebraska, including a fifth-place 200-yard breaststroke finish at the 1997 NCAA Championships. Manhalova was also the 1998 Big 12 200-yard breaststroke champion.













## ANJA MARGETIC (BOSNIA) 1992

Anja Margetic was a member of the Bosnian team for the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona. Margetic finished 27th in the 200-meter butterfly and 44th in the 100-meter butterfly. Margetic earned All-America honors at Nebraska in 1994 as a member of the 400-yard medley relay that notched a 13th-place finish at the NCAA Championships.

#### **TERRIE MILLER (NORWAY) 1996** A standout breaststroker from 1997 to 1999, Terrie Miller earned All-America honors in each of her three seasons competing for Nebraska. As a freshman

seasons competing for Nebraska. As a freshman, she placed eighth in the 100-yard breaststroke at the NCAA Championships. She earned All-America honors competing on NU's medley relays in both 1998 and 1999. At the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, she placed 20th in the 100-meter breaststroke.

## HELENE MULLER (SOUTH AFRICA) 1996, 2000

Former Husker All-American Helene Muller swam for her native South Africa during the 1996 and 2000 Olympic Games. Muller lettered from 1997 to 2000, garnering All-America honors for the Huskers 13 times, including a bronze medal in the 200-meter freestyle at the 2000 NCAA Championships.

### BEATRIZ PADRON (COSTA RICA) 2020

Beatriz Padron earned an Olympic berth as the lone women's swimmer for Costa Rica at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics in the summer of 2021. Padron competed in the 200-meter freestyle, finishing 25th overall with a lifetime-best 2:04.56 in the preliminary heats. A Costa Rican National Team member since 2015, Padron competed in Tokyo before arriving at Nebraska as a freshman.


## JULIA RUSSELL (SOUTH AFRICA) 1996

Julia Russell took 12th in the 200-meter breaststroke in Atlanta in a career-best time of 2:30.38. She also finished 17th in the 100-meter breast and 26th in the 200 IM. In 1997, the 18time All-American was the NCAA runner-up in the 200-yard breaststroke and the Big 12 Swimmer of the Year. She won three events at the 1997 Big 12 Championships, while finishing with 108 points at the NCAA Championships.

## ANNA WINDSOR (AUSTRALIA) 1996, 2000

Anna Windsor competed for NU during the 1997 and 1998 seasons. A two-time NCAA finalist in the 200-yard freestyle, Windsor placed seventh in the event in 1997. She swam on NU's runner-up 800 freestyle relay at the 1998 NCAA Championships. A nine-time All-American, Windsor swam for Australia's eighth-place 400-meter free relay team at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta. She also competed at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

# NEBRASKA'S GOLDEN PENNY



PENNY HEYNS Amanzimtoti, South Africa Olympic Gold & Bronze Medalist World Record Holder

It's not every day you run across a golden penny.

But for South Africans and Nebraskans alike, there was one shining bright at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta.

Penny Heyns, a former University of Nebraska standout, earned two gold medals and became the first female in Olympic history to sweep the breaststroke events.

Heyns' whirlwind year of success began on the collegiate level. In Husker suit and cap at the 1996 Big Eight Championships in mid-February, Heyns set a then-NCAA and U.S. Open record in the 200-yard breaststroke (2:08.90), as well as an NU record in the 100yard event (1:00.18) to help Nebraska win its third consecutive conference crown.

After setting the records, Heyns was forced to travel home for the South African Olympic Trials, which were inconveniently scheduled between the two most important collegiate meets, the conference and national championships.

Nevertheless, it proved to be a trip Heyns would never forget.

During the preliminary heat of the 100-meter breaststroke at the trials, Heyns set a world record with a time of 1:07.46.

The time broke the record held by Australia's Samantha Riley, who had set a mark of 1:07.69 in September, 1994.

Just days after her return from South Africa, Heyns became the first Husker to win a national championship at the NCAA Championships in Ann Arbor, Mich.

Heyns dominated the 100-yard breaststroke with a pool-record 1:00.27 and also earned a silver medal in the 200-yard breaststroke with a 2:09.71 performance.

Heyns then entered the Olympics as the frontrunner in the 100-meter breaststroke event. She proved she had earned that title in the preliminaries, as she blew away the competition and shattered her own world record in a clocking of 1:07.02 in the process.

In the finals, Heyns got off to a quick start, but didn't dominate as she had in the prelims. America's Amanda Beard began her trademark kick at the 50-meter mark and almost caught Heyns at the wall. Heyns held on to finish in 1:07.72 and edged Beard (1:08.09), to claim gold for the first time. Two days later, Heyns proved she wasn't finished.

After setting an Olympic record of 2:26.63 in the preliminaries of the 200-meter breaststroke, Heyns was timed at 2:25.41 in the finals and again beat out Beard (2:25.75) for the gold. Beard entered the Olympics ranked No. 1 in the 200, but couldn't catch up with the quick pace Heyns set from

the start. "That was one of the hardest races I ever swam," Heyns said following the race. "I'm just glad I had the guts to hang in there."

At a press conference in Lincoln, Neb., the week following her gold medal performances, Heyns admitted she was surprised about the win in the 200. "In some ways, I sit back, and I really can't believe it," Heyns said. "The

200 (win) was totally unexpected. I don't think it has sunk in yet." An extremely successful career at Nebraska fine-tuned Heyns for Olympic success. A 15-time All-American and 14-time conference champion for

success. A 15-time All-American and 14-time conference champion for the Huskers, Heyns left Nebraska as the most decorated swimmer in the program's history. Heyns' accomplishments at Nebraska and on the international level will always be recognized.

Heyns has continually showed her appreciation for the University of Nebraska and its athletic department.

Following her double gold medal performance, Heyns didn't waste any

time in thanking the Nebraska Swimming and Diving Program and its support staff for the role they played in her Olympic success.

"There is no way I would even be swimming today if I didn't come to Nebraska," Heyns said. "Nebraska has done so much for me that I could never express it. It's not just swimming, it's a family to me -- the whole coaching staff and all my friends."

For the next four years Heyns continued to define excellence in the sport of swimming on a world-class level by producing one of the greatest performances in the history of the sport.

At the 1999 Pan Pacific Championships, Heyns established three world records. Winning gold in both the 100- and 200-meter breaststrokes, Heyns touched the wall in 1:06.52 and 2:23.64, respectively, both world bests. In addition, she swam an exhibition 50-meter breaststroke, posting another world record with a time of 30.83.

Heyns took home her third medal at the 2000 Sydney Olympics by earning a bronze medal in the 100-meter breaststroke in a time of 1:07.55.
