HUSKERSTIP EXHIBITION PLAY WITH DAKOTA WESLEYAN

- The Nebraska women's basketball team opens its 2023-24 season by taking on Dakota Wesleyan in its lone exhibition game of the year on Sunday, Oct. 29.
- Tip-off between the Huskers and Tigers is set for Noon (CT) at Pinnacle Bank Arena with tickets available now at Huskers.com/Tickets or by calling the Nebraska Athletic Ticket Office during regular business hours (Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-5 p.m.). Season Tickets, Starting 5 Pack and single-game tickets are all available to provide exciting options for fans to watch the Huskers in person throughout the season at PBA.
- A live video stream of the game will be provided to subscribers of B1G+. Nebraska fans can listen across the Huskers Radio Network, including 107.3 FM in Lincoln and 590 AM in Omaha, the Huskers App and Huskers.com, as Matt Coatney and Jeff Griesch team up for their 23rd season together calling the action. Pregame starts at 11:30 a.m. (CT).
- Nebraska enters the season with three returning starters, including preseason All-Big Ten selections **Jaz Shelley** and **Alexis Markowski**. Shelley and Markowski were both named to preseason national player-of-the-year watch lists at their positions last week.
- Graduate guard Maddie Krull, who started 60 games in two seasons at South Dakota, before transferring to Nebraska prior to last season, joins Shelley and Markowski as returning starters. Krull made 24 starts for the Big Red a year ago. The Millard South High School grad earned her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in August, just three seasons into her college career.
- The Huskers, who are coming off an 18-15 season that included a trip to the Super 16 in the Postseason WNIT, will be shooting for a trip to the NCAA Tournament. Six returning Huskers (Shelley, Markowski, Kendall Coley, Kendall Moriarty, Annika Stewart, Allison Weidner) were members of Nebraska's 2022 NCAA Tournament team, while Krull helped South Dakota to a pair of NCAA berths, including the 2022 NCAA Sweet Sixteen. Newcomer Darian White also competed in the 2022 NCAA Tournament after leading Montana State to the Big Sky Tournament title.
- White is expected to make an instant impact on Nebraska's roster in 2023-24. The 5-6 graduate transfer was a three-time first-team All-Big Sky selection and two-time Big Sky Defensive Player of the Year at Montana State. She scored 1,716 points (14.3 ppg), grabbed 612 rebounds (5.1 rpg), dished out 449 assists (3.7 apg) and grabbed 260 steals (2.2 spg) in 120 starts as a Bobcat. She was the 2022 Big Sky Tournament MVP and the 2020 Big Sky Freshman of the Year.

HUSKER NUGGETS

- Nebraska has won 36 consecutive exhibition games dating back to an 81-58 loss to the Australian Institute of Sport at the Bob Devaney Sports Center on Nov. 12, 2000.
- Last season, the Huskers defeated Washburn, 70-27, at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Oct. 30, 2022.
 Alexis Markowski led Nebraska with 18 points and 10 rebounds in 22 minutes. NU's only other active returning starter from that game is Jaz Shelley, who managed four points, three rebounds and four assists.
- In two career exhibition games, Markowski has produced 33 points and 19 rebounds in 39 minutes. Shelley owns 18 points, five rebounds and 10 assists in 41 minutes of exhibition play as a Husker.
- Nebraska has won its last five exhibition games by an average of 47.6 points per game, dating back to an 88-55 win over Minnesota State-Mankato on Nov. 5, 2017.
- The Huskers have hit at least one three in 464 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two threes in 343 consecutive games.
- Nebraska has hit 10 or more threes 27 times in the last 73 games, including 15 times in 2022-23. The Huskers knocked down a season-high 14 threes in a season-opening win over Omaha (Nov. 7, 2022).
- Through the first 20 seasons with the three-point shot in women's basketball (1988-2007), Nebraska hit 10 threes in a game just six times (591 games).

SCOUTING THE DAKOTA WESLEYAN TIGERS

- Dakota Wesleyan comes to Lincoln to meet the Huskers for the first time in history. The NAIA Tigers will make the four-plus hour drive from Mitchell, S.D., to Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Dakota Wesleyan competes in the Great Plains Athletic Conference alongside Nebraska's College of Saint Mary, Concordia, Doane, Hastings and Midland.
- Last season, the Tigers finished with a 23-9 overall record and advanced to the second round of the NAIA Tournament in Fayette, Mo., falling 57-53 to Central Methodist (Mo.), which advanced to the national semifinals in Sioux City, Iowa. Dakota Wesleyan went 15-7 in the GPAC.
- In 2022, DWU won the GPAC Tournament title and advanced to the NAIA second round, falling to Bethel (Tenn.), 54-53 at DJ Sokol Arena on the Creighton campus. The Tigers finished with a 27-8 record that included a regular-season loss at South Dakota State. Dakota Wesleyan finished 15-7 in the GPAC.
- The Tigers must replace their top two scorers from a year ago 6-4 center Jada Campbell (14.3 ppg) and 5-10 forward Matti Reiner (14.0 ppg), who both started all 32 games. Campbell was also DWU's leading rebounder (6.4 rpg), while Reiner led the Tigers in assists (4.0 apg) and steals (1.5 spg), while ranking third on the team in rebounding (5.3 rpg).
- Dakota Wesleyan's roster does not include any players taller than 5-11, as the Tigers will rely on returning guards Isabel Ihnen and Morgan Edelman for production and leadership.
- Ihnen averaged 9.3 points, 2.2 rebounds and 2.2 assists while making all 32 starts last season. The 5-7 senior connected on a team-best 57 three-pointers.
- The 5-6 Edelman added 8.4 points and 5.8 rebounds to go along with 3.2 assists and 1.6 steals per game, while starting 29 of DWU's 32 contests as a sophomore a year ago.
- Sophomore Rylee Rosenquist, a 5-7 guard, returns after starting 15 games as a freshman for the Tigers a year ago. Rosenquist averaged 8.4 points and 4.9 rebounds while connecting on 53.1 percent of her shots from the floor.
- Lacey Sprakel, a 5-10 junior forward who made two starts and played in all 32 games a year ago, could step in to replace Reiner in the starting five. Sprakel averaged 6.3 points and 2.5 rebounds in just 12.7 minutes per game last season.
- The Tigers return just four other players who saw action a year ago, including 5-3 senior Mya Wilson (2.0 ppg, 1.0 rpg), 5-7 sophomore Maleighya Estes (1.4 ppg, 0.9 rpg), 5-6 sophomore Taliyah Hayes (0.9 ppg, 0.2 rpg) and the tallest returning player on the roster 5-11 senior Anna Campbell (0.9 ppg, 0.5 rpg).
- As a team, Dakota Wesleyan averaged 72.1 points while surrendering 58.3 points per game a year ago. The Tigers carried a plus-7.8 team rebounding margin and a positive assist-to-turnover ratio (1.2). They hit 44.2 percent of their field goals, including 31.5 percent of their three-pointers while averaging 4.9 threes per game. DWU also sank 74.7 percent of its free throws.

NEBRASKA VS. DAKOTA WESLEYAN SERIES HISTORY

- Sunday's meeting will be the first in history between Nebraska and Dakota Wesleyan.
- The last time the Huskers faced a team from the Dakotas (either North or South) came on Dec. 21, 2013, when South Dakota came to Lincoln and suffered an 87-53 loss to No. 19 Nebraska at Pinnacle Bank Arena. That South Dakota team was coached by current Nebraska Head Coach Amy Williams, who took that Coyote team to the Summit League Tournament title and the 2014 NCAA Tournament.

SHELLEY, MARKOWSKI NAMED PRESEASON ALL-BIG TEN

- Jaz Shelley and Alexis Markowski captured preseason All-Big Ten honors from both coaches and media when the conference announced its honors on Oct. 4.
- Nebraska joined Ohio State (Cotie McMahon, Jacy Sheldon) as the only schools in the conference to place two players on the Preseason All-Big Ten teams.
- Shelley, a 2023 first-team All-Big Ten selection, averaged 14.5 points, 4.8 rebounds and a team-leading 6.2 assists while also ranking among Big Ten leaders with 79 three-pointers last season.
- The 5-9 guard from Moe, Australia (pronounced MO-ee) was a second-team All-Big Ten choice in her first season with the Huskers in 2021-22. She was also a member of the media's Big Ten All-Defensive Team, helping Nebraska to a 2022 NCAA Tournament berth. She was the only Big Ten player to rank among the top 20 in all five major statistical categories scoring (13.1 ppg), rebounding (6.3 rpg), assists (5.0 apg), steals (1.8 spg) and blocked shots (0.9 bpg) in 2021-22.
- Markowski claimed Preseason All-Big Ten honors for the second consecutive season. The two-time second-team All-Big Ten choice averaged 11.9 points and 9.8 rebounds per game as a sophomore for the Huskers in 2022-23.
- The 6-3 center led the Big Ten with 322 total rebounds and was the only conference player to average a double-double (12.4 ppg, 10.2 rpg) during regular-season Big Ten action a year ago. She also led all league post players with 15 double-doubles.
- The 2022 Big Ten Freshman of the Year, Markowski averaged 12.8 points and 8.0 rebounds while becoming a starter during the conference season. She helped the Huskers to three wins over AP Top 10 teams and a trip to the Big Ten semifinals before advancing to the 2022 NCAA Tournament.

MARKOWSKI NAMED TO LISA LESLIE AWARD WATCH LIST

- Nebraska's **Alexis Markowski** was named to the Lisa Leslie Center of the Year Watch List when the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame announced its list of 20 preseason candidates for the award on Oct. 20.
- Markowski, a 6-3 center from Lincoln, Neb., has been one of the nation's top post players each of her first two seasons as a Husker. The junior earned preseason first-team All-Big Ten honors for the second straight year entering 2023-24. A two-time second-team All-Big Ten choice, Markowski was

the only Big Ten player to average a double-double (12.4 ppg, 10.2 rpg) during the 2022-23 regular season. She finished the year by averaging 11.9 points and a Big Ten-best 9.8 rebounds, while leading Nebraska and tying for seventh in the conference with 31 blocks.

- She scored in double figures 23 times, while adding 19 double-digit rebound games, while leading all Big Ten posts with 15 double-doubles on the year. Markowski's 322 total rebounds also led the Big Ten and ranked as the fifth-highest season total in Nebraska history.
- The 2022 Big Ten Freshman of the Year, Markowski earned her second straight appearance on the Lisa Leslie Award Watch List. Last season, as the only sophomore on the list, she advanced to the Midseason Top 10 for the award.
- The list of candidates will be narrowed to 10 in late January, with plans to announce five finalists for the award in late March. South Carolina's Aliyah Boston won the past four consecutive awards.
- The Lisa Leslie Award, presented by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the WBCA, honors the nation's top center in NCAA Division I women's basketball. It is named after three-time All-American and 1994 National Player of the Year Lisa

Leslie, who was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 2015.

SHELLEY NAMED TO MEYERS-DRYSDALE WATCH LIST

- Nebraska's Jaz Shelley was named to the Ann Meyers-Drysdale Shooting Guard of the Year Watch List when the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame announced its list of 20 preseason candidates for the award on Oct. 17.
- Shelley, a 5-9 guard from Moe, Australia (pronounced MOee), has been one of the nation's best guards in each of her first two seasons as a Husker. The graduate student earned first-team All-Big Ten honors last season after averaging 14.5 points and 4.8 rebounds per game. She also ranked third in the Big Ten in both assists (6.2 apg) and three-pointers per game (2.4).
- Shelley, who also earned recognition on the Ann Meyers-Drysdale Preseason Watch List a year ago, opened her Husker career by claiming second-team All-Big Ten accolades in 2022. She was also a member of the Big Ten All-Defensive Team while leading Nebraska to the 2022 NCAA Tournament. She averaged 13.1 points, 6.1 rebounds and 5.0 assists per game.
- Shelley is one of five Big Ten Conference shooting guards on the 2023 Meyers-Drysdale Watch List, joining 2021 award winner Ashley Owusu, who claimed the honor at Maryland. She spent the 2023 season at Virginia Tech, before transferring to Penn State for the 2023-24 campaign.



- Michigan's Laila Phelia, Indiana's Sara Scalia and Ohio State's Celeste Taylor join Shelley in accounting for 25 percent of the watch list.
- A group of returning AP All-Americans also fills the list, including Paige Bueckers (UConn), Sonia Citron (Notre Dame), Shaylee Gonzales (Texas), Ta'Niya Latson (Florida State), Charlisse Leger-Walker (Washington State), Charisma Osborne (UCLA), Owusu, Taylor and Hailey Van Lith (LSU). Bueckers (first team) and Owusu (second team) were AP All-Americans in 2021, while the rest of the previously named group earned honorable-mention accolades from the AP in either 2022 or 2023.
- A national committee of top college basketball personnel determined the watch list of 20 candidates for the Ann Meyers-Drysdale Award. In late January, the watch list of 20 players for the 2023 Ann Meyers-Drysdale Award was narrowed to 10. In late February a final list of five candidates will be selected. In March, the five finalists will be presented to Meyers-Drysdale and the Hall of Fame selection committee with a winner being selected.
- Shelley is one of 14 graduate students (9) or seniors (5) among the 20 Ann Meyers-Drysdale Award candidates, while five juniors also fill the list. The lone sophomore in the group is Florida State's Latson. The list of candidates will be narrowed to 10 in late January, with plans to announce five finalists for the award in late March.
- The Ann Meyers-Drysdale Award, presented by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the WBCA, honors the nation's top shooting guard in NCAA Division I women's basketball. It is named after the first player, male or female, selected to an All-America team in four straight college seasons (UCLA, 1975-78).

WHITE READY FOR HUSKER DEBUT

- Nebraska expects to get an immediate boost in the backcourt from three-time first-team All-Big Sky guard Darian White.
- The 5-6 graduate student transferred into the Husker program during the summer after averaging 14.3 points, 5.1 rebounds, 3.7 assists and 2.2 steals over 120 starts in four seasons at Montana State.
- The No. 2 scorer in Montana State history, White finished with 1,716 points, 612 rebounds, 449 assists and 260 steals
- White was the 2022 Big Sky Tournament MVP, leading the Bobcats to the conference title and a trip to the 2022 NCAA Tournament.
- She was also a two-time Big Sky Defensive Player of the Year (2021, 2022) and the 2020 Big Sky Freshman of the Year.
- White was the 2019 Idaho Gatorade High School Player of the Year and joins three-time North Dakota Gatorade Player of the Year Logan Nissley, two-time Missouri MaxPreps Player of the Year Natalie Potts and Australian National Program forward Jessica Petrie in Nebraska's group of four newcomers for 2023-24.

RETURNING STARTER WEIDNER OUT FOR SEASON

- Allison Weidner suffered a right leg injury in practice on Friday, Oct. 13, and will miss the 2023-24 season. She underwent surgery on Oct. 25.
- Weidner, a 5-10 junior from Humphrey, Neb., averaged 10.2 points and 6.2 rebounds through 13 games as a starter in 2022-23 before suffering a season-ending left leg injury in the fourth quarter of an 85-79 triple-overtime victory over No. 20 Kansas at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Dec. 21. Weidner's recovery and rehabilitation on her left leg since surgery on Jan. 10, 2023, had gone well, and she was expecting to return to action for the start of this season before suffering the right leg injury.
- Weidner averaged 13.0 points, 10.6 rebounds and 6.0 assists in two wins over Big Ten opponents Maryland and Wisconsin in December of 2022. Nebraska was 10-3 overall with Weidner in the starting
- As a true freshman, Weidner played in all 33 games, including nine starts, helping Nebraska to the 2022 NCAA Tournament. She averaged 7.2 points, 3.7 rebounds and 2.2 assists as a freshman.

HUSKERS FACED HISTORIC STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE

- Nebraska finished 2022-23 with an 18-15 record after facing arguably its strongest schedule in school history with 12 games against Associated Press Top 25 opponents at game time.
- Since joining the Big Ten (2011-12), the Huskers had not played more than eight games in a season vs. AP Top 25 foes prior to 2022-23.
- Nebraska's second game with Iowa (Feb. 18) was its fifth against an AP Top 10 team in 2022-23. The Huskers have never faced more than five AP Top 10 teams in the same season. In fact, Nebraska played six games against teams that entered the NCAA Tournament ranked in the AP top seven nationally, including No. 2 Indiana (1), No. 3 Iowa (2), No. 4 Virginia Tech (1) and No. 7 Maryland (2).

The 6-0 guard from Bismarck was a three-time North Dakota Gatorade High School Player of the Year in basketball. She led Bismarck Century to three straight state championship game appearances, including a title in 2022. Nissley was also the North Dakota Volleyball Player of the Year as a junior (2021) and senior (2022)

• Fellow freshman **Natalie Potts** added a pair of **Missouri** MaxPreps High School Player of the Year honors in 2021 and 2023. She was also

the Gatorade Player of the Year in 2021. Potts, a 6-2 forward from O'Fallon, Mo., led Incarnate Word Academy to a 100-game winning streak to close her career. She finished her high school career with 2,108 points and 1,008 rebounds - just the third player in Missouri high school history to achieve that combined milestone.

- Junior center Alexis Markowski was the 2021 Nebraska Gatorade and MaxPreps High School Player of the Year at Lincoln Pius X. One of 10 semifinalists for the Lisa Leslie Center of the Year Award in 2023, Markowski was the 2022 Big Ten Freshman of the Year at Nebraska. She is a two-time preseason All-Big Ten selection and a two-time second-team All-Big Ten choice. Before arriving at Nebraska, Markowski led Pius X to back-to-back Class A state titles in 2020 and 2021 as the captain of the Class A All-Tournament team.
- Sophomore center/forward Maggie Mendelson was the Utah High School Player of the Year in both basketball and volleyball in 2021. Mendelson graduated from Fremont High School in Utah a year early and joined the Nebraska volleyball and women's basketball programs for the 2022-23 season. She has helped the volleyball team to a current No. 1 national ranking. In the summer of 2021, Mendelson helped the U.S. Under 16 National Team to gold at the FIBA Americas Championship in August. - Graduate transfer Darian White was the 2019 Idaho Gatorade Player of the Year at Mountain View High School. HUSKER HISTORY OF HOME-OPENING SUCCESS

- Nebraska owns a history of season-opening success on the Huskers' home court. NU improved to 46-3 in home season openers with a 100-36 victory over Omaha on Nov. 7, 2022.
- NU is 9-1 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in season openers. The lone loss came on Nov. 7, 2018, with an 83-77 setback to Drake. In the first regularseason game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena, Nebraska powered its way to a 77-49 win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.
- Nebraska's only season-opening home losses have come to Drake (2018), South Dakota State (Nov. 19, 2005) and Kansas (Nov. 21, 1980).
- Nebraska has been strong in its first four home games every season. In fact, NU is 170-25 (.872) over 49 seasons in its first four home contests, including 42-7 in Game No. 2, 40-9 in Game No. 3 and 43-6 in Game No. 4.

OPENER TO FEATURE LIFE SKILLS PEP RALLY

- Nebraska's regular-season opener with Northwestern State (Nov. 6, noon) will include the annual Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally.
- The 2023 Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally, which is co-sponsored by the Nebraska High School Hall of Fame, will feature messages from Husker student-athletes and coaches. This year, the Huskers expect nearly 3,333 students and 377 accompanying staff members from 68 schools across the state of Nebraska.
- The 2023 opener marks the fifth time (2013, 2019, 2021, 2022) Pinnacle Bank Arena and Nebraska women's basketball have teamed with the Nebraska High School Hall of Fame to host the Pep Rally for middle grades students. The students and accompanying staff are provided complimentary water from Pepsi and pizza from Nebraska Athletics.
- The Sportsmanship Pep Rally begins at 9:30 a.m. on the main court at Pinnacle Bank Arena and will feature messages from Nebraska Head Coach Amy Williams and Husker women's basketball players Annika Stewart and Callin Hake, along with appearances by Olympian Jordan Larson and Husker Bekka Allick (volleyball) and All-American men's gymnast Taylor Christopulos. Coaches and student-athletes from other Nebraska programs are being finalized, while world champion jump roper Tori Boggs will perform at both the rally and at halftime of Monday's game. The Sportsmanship Pep Rally will conclude at 10:45 a.m.
- A group of Valentine Middle School students will be traveling nearly five hours and just over 300 miles, making the longest journey to the pep rally for the second consecutive year. A strong representation of Northeast, Southeast and Central Nebraska community schools are also attending, including more than 300 from Raymond Central and well over 100 each from Centennial. Exeter-Milligan, Freeman, Malcolm, North Bend Central and Seward public schools.

HUSKERS TO PLAY AT LEAST 10 GAMES ON BIG NETWORKS

- Nebraska will play a minimum of 10 games on conference-affiliated television networks during the 2023-24 regular season.
- The television appearances will come early and often for the Big Red, beginning with a Sunday, Nov. 19 clash with Creighton at Pinnacle Bank Arena that will be televised live by the Big Ten Network with a tip time set for 1 p.m. (CT). It is the first of at least eight regular-season games for the Huskers to be televised by BTN, and each of Nebraska's first four televised home games during the stretch will come against 2023 NCAA Tournament qualifiers (Creighton, Maryland, Indiana, Illinois).
- Nebraska's Big Ten Conference opener at Michigan State on Saturday, Dec. 9 also will be televised by BTN. Tip time in East Lansing is set for 1 p.m. (CT). In fact, each of NU's first five Big Ten contests will be carried by BTN, including its Big Ten home opener with Maryland, Sunday, Dec. 31 at 1 p.m. (CT). The Huskers will be back on BTN on Thursday, Jan. 4 at Wisconsin. Tip time in Madison will be 8 p.m. (CT).
- Nebraska will face Indiana at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Sunday, Jan. 7 in a game televised by BTN. Game time between the Huskers and Hoosiers will not be announced until late-December, as networks await decisions regarding TV time slots in Week 18 of the NFL season.
- The Huskers will wrap up their fifth consecutive Big Ten game on BTN by playing host to Illinois at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Thursday, Jan. 11 at 7 p.m. (CT).
- The Big Red will be back on BTN when the Huskers travel to Iowa City to battle the Hawkeyes on Saturday, Jan. 27 at 1 p.m. (CT). The
- rematch between Nebraska and Iowa is set for Sunday, Feb. 11 at Noon (CT) at Pinnacle Bank Arena in a game televised by FS1 on Super Bowl Sunday. The NFL's championship game does not kick off until 5:30 p.m. (CT), so Husker fans will have plenty of time to come and participate in Play4Kay Day - Nebraska's Pink Game - to promote cancer awareness and support cancer survivors and those currently battling cancer.
- The Huskers will make their first-ever appearance on Peacock when they travel to Ohio State on Wednesday, Feb. 14. Tip off on Valentine's Day in Columbus against the Buckeyes is set for 6 p.m. (CT).

NEBRASKA PUBLIC MEDIA TO TELEVISE THREE GAMES

- The Nebraska women's basketball team will add three games to its television schedule for 2023-24 with Nebraska Public Media producing a trio of regular-season games to be carried statewide, the Huskers announced on Wednesday, Oct. 25.
- The Huskers will make their first appearance of the season on Nebraska Public Media when they play host to 2023 NCAA Tournament qualifier Southern University at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Sunday, Dec. 17 at 2 p.m. The Tigers won the 2023 SWAC tournament

championship and will be Nebraska's final home regular-season non-conference opponent of the year.

- The Big Red will be on Nebraska Public Media World in January when the Huskers play host to Big Ten rival Purdue on Wednesday, Jan. 31 at 7 p.m. The Boilermakers also secured a spot in the 2023 NCAA Tournament.
- The Huskers will be on Nebraska Public Media for a statewide television audience just three days later, when Nebraska takes on Rutgers in Lincoln on Saturday, Feb. 3 at 2 p.m.
- All three of Nebraska's women's basketball games produced by Nebraska Public Media also will be streamed live for subscribers of B1G+.

HUSKER BACKCOURT PLAYING WITH DEGREES IN HAND

- Nebraska's 2023-24 roster features a starting backcourt of graduate students, including two-time Ann Meyers-Drysdale Shooting Guard of the Year candidate **Jaz Shelley**, three-time first-team All-Big Sky point guard **Darian White** and three-year Division I starter **Maddie Krull**.
- Shelley, a 5-9 guard from Moe, Australia, earned her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in May of 2023 as an advertising and public relations major. She is pursuing a master's degree in journalism and mass communications.
- White, a 5-6 guard from Boise, Idaho, earned her bachelor's degree from Montana State in May of 2023 as a community health major. The four-year starting guard for the Bobcats came to Nebraska as a graduate transfer and is seeking a graduate certificate in youth development from UNL.
- Krull, a 5-9 guard from Omaha, Neb., claimed her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in August of 2023 in just three years. Krull, who spent her first two college seasons at South Dakota, was a child, youth and family studies major as an undergraduate. She is pursuing a master's degree in the same field. Krull has two years of basketball eligibility remaining.

NEBRASKA POSTS 18TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

- In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 18 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 18 straight seasons.
- The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report Nov. 15, 2022, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 18th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.
- The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 18 years.
 - Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-tying-high GSR of 95 percent.
- Nebraska continues to lead NCAA Division I in Academic All-Americans across all sports (351) and NCAA Today Top Ten Award winners (18). More than 100 Huskers have also earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in history.

HUSKERS SMASH SINGLE-GAME ATTENDANCE RECORD

- Nebraska shattered its single-game attendance record by attracting 14,289 fans for Pack PBA on Play4Kay Day at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Feb. 18, 2023) vs. No. 7 Iowa.
- Nebraska's Pack PBA crowd eclipsed its previous women's basketball attendance mark of 13,595 fans (sellout) against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.
- The record Pack PBA crowd also eclipsed the previous Pinnacle Bank Arena record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013. The home-opening crowd at PBA is also a Nebraska non-conference record.
- Nebraska ranked No. 13 nationally in average home attendance (5,761) over 17 games in 2022-23. It was an increase of 1,282 fans per contest at Pinnacle Bank Arena over 2021-22, when Nebraska averaged 4,489 fans while going 16-1 at home.

- The Huskers have ranked among the top 25 nationally in attendance for 13 consecutive seasons (not including 2020-21 when no fans were allowed at Pinnacle Bank Arena).
- In 149 games with attendance allowed (excludes 11 games during COVID pandemic in 2020-21), the Huskers have averaged 5,073 fans per game (755,867 total fans/149 games).
- Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

BIG RED DOMINANCE AT PINNACLE BANK ARENA

- Nebraska tied a school record by winning 16 home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2021-22. The Huskers finished 16-1, matching the 1997-98 (16-0), 2009-10 (16-0) and 2013-14 (16-2) teams for most home wins. Coach Amy Williams was a senior guard on Nebraska's 1997-98 team coached by 2022 Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Paul Sanderford.
- Nebraska's 16 home wins matched UNLV for the most regular-season home wins in NCAA Division I women's basketball in 2021-22.
- The Huskers didn't just win at home, they won big, posting the largest home combined cumulative margin of victory in school history despite losing a game to Big Ten co-champion Iowa (Jan. 9). The 2021-22 Huskers produced a total home victory margin of 429 points (25.2 ppg). The 2009-10 Huskers that earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament and finished No. 3 in the AP final regular-season poll won their 16 games by a total of 388 points (24.3 ppg).
- Nebraska delivered double-digit margins in 15 of 16 home wins, including wins over top-10 Michigan (79-58) and Indiana (72-57) teams, with only 2022 NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Creighton falling by single digits (67-62).
- The Huskers also ranked No. 14 nationally in total attendance (76,317) and 18th in average home attendance (4,489).
- Over 17 games in 2022-23, Nebraska ranked No. 13 nationally in average home attendance (5,761) for an increase of 1,272 fans per game. The Huskers went 12-5 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2022-23.

NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

- The Huskers are 506-173 (.745) all-time at home, including 12-5 in 2022-23.
- Nebraska tied the school record for home victories by going 16-1 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2021-22. NU has posted double-figure home victory totals 17 times in the last 20 seasons.
- The Huskers were 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 117-43 (.731) all-time at PBA since the building opened in 2013-14. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.
- The Huskers played the first regular-season game in arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.
- NU won its first Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.
- NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.
- Nebraska notched its first postseason home victory at Pinnacle Bank Arena with its 74-65 win over Missouri State (March 15, 2023), before adding a 77-57 win over Northern Iowa in the second round (March 19, 2023). It marked the first time Nebraska had ever won two home games in the same postseason tournament (NCAA or WNIT). NU's only other postseason home game at PBA came with a 64-62 loss to Northern Iowa (March 17, 2016). The Huskers are 4-3 all-time in Lincoln in Postseason WNIT games, including 4-1 against Missouri Valley Conference opponents.
- The Huskers are 46-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 100-36 win over Omaha on Nov. 7, 2022. Nebraska has won 16 of its last 17 season openers.
- Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

HUSKERS RADIO NETWORK COVERS WORLD

- The Huskers Radio Network is in its second season of producing and marketing the live broadcasts of Nebraska women's basketball in 2023-24, but play-by-play announcer Matt Coatney and color commentator Jeff Griesch team up for their 23rd season as the Husker broadcast team.
- The Huskers Radio Network will carry every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com, marking the 23rd year that all of Nebraska's women's basketball games have been free and available to fans. In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Huskers Radio Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the . Huskers also can be heard on CD105.9 FM-KKCD. 880-AM-KRVN (Lexington) also provides a huge AM signal statewide in central Nebraska, while more than 20 stations carry the Huskers Radio Network's women's basketball coverage across the state and the Midwest.
 - Inside Pinnacle Bank Arena, fans can access the direct radio call of the game at 87.7 FM.
- Nebraska's exhibition game with Dakota Wesleyan will be Coatney and Griesch's 733rd women's basketball broadcast together, more than any other Husker radio broadcast team across all sports in history. The 2022-23 regular-season opener with Omaha was their 700th broadcast together.

- Griesch also has an active streak of 692 consecutive Husker games called dating back to Jan. 5, 2003. The last game he missed came against Penn State on Dec. 30, 2002 at the Surf & Slam in San Diego, following the birth of he and his wife Emily's first child, Hollan. She is now a junior at the University of Nebraska and has three younger brothers, Jackson (19), Brennan (15) and Isaac (10).
- Griesch continued his streak in 2022-23 despite undergoing open heart surgery on Sept. 28 to replace his aortic valve. Less than five weeks later, he was on air with Coatney for Nebraska's exhibition game with Washburn. Griesch also had open heart surgery as a junior in high school on May 1, 1990.

NEBRASKA OVERTIME FACTS

- Nebraska is 25-26 all-time in overtime games, including 13-12 at home, 8-11 in true road games and 4-3 on neutral courts in overtime.
- The Huskers were 2-1 in overtime games in 2022-23, following a 74-62 OT loss at No. 4 Indiana (Jan. 1).
- Nebraska notched an 85-79 3OT win over No. 20 Kansas at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Dec. 21, 2022). It matched the longest game in school history and was the first triple-overtime game in women's basketball at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- The Huskers defeated Mississippi State 73-65 in OT at the Puerto Rico Clasico at Roberto Clemente Coliseum in San Juan (Nov. 26, 2022). It marked Nebraska's first overtime game since 2019-20.
- The Huskers, who did not play an overtime game in 2020-21 or 2021-22, were 1-2 in overtime games in 2019-20 with an 80-74 OT loss to Ohio State (Feb. 2) and a 78-70 OT loss at Michigan State (Dec. 31, 2019). The Huskers opened non-conference road action with a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019).
- The 2019-20 season marked the first time that Nebraska played three overtime games in the same season since 2011-12 - NU's first season in the Big Ten. In 2011-12, the Huskers played a total of seven OT periods in those three games.
 - Nebraska has never played four overtime games in the same season.
- Nebraska's lone overtime game of 2018-19 also came in the Huskers' first road game of the season, but NU suffered an 87-84 double-overtime loss at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2019). It marked the second straight season that Nebraska played a multi-overtime game (also at Drake, Dec. 9, 2017).
- The Huskers went 1-1 in overtime in 2017-18, including a 69-64 overtime loss to No. 23 Michigan at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Jan. 13). The Huskers won their first overtime game of 2017-18 with an 89-85 double-overtime win at Drake (Dec. 9).
- Nebraska was 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).
 - The Huskers are 5-6 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.
 - Nebraska is 3-3 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Nebraska is 6-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent contest coming with an 85-79 3OT win over No. 20 Kansas in Lincoln (Dec. 21, 2022). The most recent loss in a multi-overtime game came with an 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in doubleovertime in Indianapolis.
- The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota - a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.
- The Huskers have played 16 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-11 record. NU is 4-8 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.
- Nebraska played its fourth OT game in 73 meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.
- Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin and former Big 12 foe Kansas. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 17 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.
- The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (29 games), including two of the six overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.
- Nebraska recently played its third overtime game in history against its most frequest all-time rival, Kansas. The Huskers defeated Kansas 85-79 in 3OT (Dec. 21, 2022). It marked the third overtime game in 84 all-time contests with the Jayhawks. Nebraska improved to 2-1 in OT against KU with all three games coming in Lincoln.
 - In 22 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.
- Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.
