HUSKERS FACE LADY DEMONS IN SEASON OPENER

- The Nebraska women's basketball team tips off its 2023-24 regular season by playing host to the Northwestern State Lady Demons on Monday, Nov. 6 in Lincoln.
- Tip-off between the Huskers and Lady Demons is set for Noon (CT) at Pinnacle Bank Arena with tickets available now at Huskers.com/Tickets or by calling the Nebraska Athletic Ticket Office during regular business hours (Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-5 p.m.). Season Tickets, Starting 5 Pack and singlegame tickets are all available to provide exciting options for fans to watch the Huskers in person throughout the season at PBA.
- Ā live video stream of the game will be provided to subscribers of B1G+. Nebraska fans can listen across the Huskers Radio Network, including 107.3 FM in Lincoln and 590 AM in Omaha, the Huskers App and Huskers.com, as Matt Coatney and Jeff Griesch team up for their 23rd season together calling the action. Pregame starts at 11:30 a.m. (CT).
- Monday's opener features the annual Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally ahead of the game at the arena, beginning at 9:30 a.m. This year's pep rally will include nearly 3,000 students and nearly 350 accompanying adults from more than 60 schools across Nebraska.
- Nebraska opened exhibition play with an 83-47 win over Dakota Wesleyan at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Sunday, Oct. 29. Freshman **Natalie Potts** led the Huskers with 15 points while adding eight rebounds off the bench. Senior **Annika Stewart** contributed 14 points off the bench, while newcomer **Darian White** made an impressive debut with 13 points, eight assists, seven rebounds and four steals.
- Nebraska enters the season with three returning starters, including preseason All-Big Ten selections **Jaz Shelley** and **Alexis Markowski**. Shelley and Markowski were both named to preseason national player-of-the-year watch lists at their positions last week.
- Graduate guard **Maddie Krull**, who started 60 games in two seasons at South Dakota, before transferring to Nebraska prior to last season, joins Shelley and Markowski as returning starters. Krull made 24 starts for the Big Red a year ago. The Millard South High School grad earned her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in August, just three seasons into her college career.
- Northwestern State comes to Lincoln for the second time in school history (Nov. 28, 1994) after working its way to an 11-18 record that included a 7-11 Southland Conference mark a year ago. The Lady Demons feature three returning starters (Jiselle Woodson, Sharna Ayres, Jasmin Dixon).

HUSKER NUGGETS

- Nebraska has won 37 consecutive exhibition games dating back to an 81-58 loss to the Australian Institute of Sport at the Bob Devaney Sports Center on Nov. 12, 2000.
- The Huskers rolled to an 83-47 win over NAIA Dakota Wesleyan (Oct. 29) at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Freshman Natalie Potts produced 15 points and eight rebounds off the bench, while Annika Stewart added 14 points. Newcomer Darian White contributed 13 points, seven rebounds and game highs of eight assists and four steals.
- The Huskers jumped to a 14-0 lead and outscored Dakota Wesleyan 30-11 in the third quarter to cruise to victory. NU hit nine threepointers, including two each from Jaz Shelley, Maddie Krull and Darian White.
- Nebraska has won its last six exhibition games by an average of 45.7 points per game, dating back to an 88-55 win over Minnesota State-Mankato on Nov. 5, 2017.
- The Huskers have hit at least one three in 464 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two threes in 343 consecutive games.
- Nebraska has hit 10 or more threes 27 times in the last 73 games, including 15 times in 2022-23. The Huskers knocked down a season-high 14 threes in a season-opening win over Omaha (Nov. 7, 2022).
- Through the first 20 seasons with the three-point shot in women's basketball (1988-2007), Nebraska hit 10 threes in a game just six times (591 games).

HUSKER OPENER TO FEATURE LIFE SKILLS PEP RALLY

- Nebraska's regular-season opener with Northwestern State (Nov. 6, noon) will include the annual Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally.
- The 2023 Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally, which is co-sponsored by the Nebraska High School Hall of Fame, will feature messages from Husker student-athletes and coaches. This year, the Huskers expect 2,966 students and 348 accompanying staff members from 62 schools across the state of Nebraska.

- The 2023 opener marks the fifth time (2013, 2019, 2021, 2022) Pinnacle Bank Arena and Nebraska women's basketball have teamed with the Nebraska High School Hall of Fame to host the Pep Rally for middle grades students. The students and accompanying staff are provided complimentary water from Pepsi and pizza from Nebraska Athletics.
- The Sportsmanship Pep Rally begins at 9:30 a.m. on the main court at Pinnacle Bank Arena and will feature messages from Nebraska Head Coach Amy Williams and Husker women's basketball players Annika Stewart and Callin Hake, along with appearances by Olympian Jordan Larson and Husker Bekka Allick (volleyball) and All-American men's

gymnast Taylor Christopulos. Coaches and student-athletes from other Nebraska programs are being finalized, while world champion jump roper Tori Boggs will perform at both the rally and at halftime of Monday's game. The Sportsmanship Pep Rally will conclude at 10:45 a.m.

• A group of Valentine Middle School students will be traveling nearly five hours and just over 300 miles, making the longest journey to the pep rally for the second consecutive year. A strong representation of Northeast, Southeast and Central Nebraska community schools are also attending, including 160 from Raymond Central and well over 100 each from Centennial, Fort Calhoun, Freeman, Malcolm, North Bend Central and Seward public schools.

SCOUTING THE NORTHWESTERN STATE LADY DEMONS

- Head Coach Anna Nimz enters her fourth season at Northwestern State. The Lady Demons come to Lincoln from Natchitoches, La., after posting an 11-18 overall record that included a 7-11 Southland Conference mark last season.
- Nimz and her coaching staff are no strangers to the Midwest. She played and coached collegiately at Pittsburg State in Kansas, while assistant coach Addae Houston played and coached at Northwest Missouri State. Houston spent last season as an assistant at Nebraska Wesleyan. Assistant coach Mike Brown graduated from Drake and was the head coach at Iowa Central Community College, Upper Iowa and William Penn.
- On the court, the Lady Demons will be challenged to replace their top two scorers from a year ago Candice Parramore (13.5 ppg) and Shelby Rayner (8.9 ppg) along with six other players from their 2022-23 roster.
- The Lady Demons return three key starters led by guard Sharna Ayres. The 5-10 guard from Melbourne, Australia was the only Lady Demon to start all 29 games a year ago, averaging 8.1 points and 4.2 rebounds, while hitting a team-best 55 three-pointers. She also connected on 92 percent (23-25) of her free throws on the season.
- Jasmin Dixon, a 6-3 junior forward, joined Ayres in the starting lineup for 25 games, averaging 3.2 points and 4.0 rebounds while leading NSU with 1.0 blocks per game. Dixon hit 50.6 percent of her field goals on the year.
- Senior Jiselle Woodson is Northwestern State's top returning scorer. The 5-5 guard averaged 8.4 points, 2.9 rebounds and a team-best 2.4 assists last season. She also led the Lady Demons with 32 steals and connected on 36.1 percent of her three-pointers (22-61).
- Northwestern State features a pair of Alaskans senior forward Jordan Todd and junior guard Mikaila Pickard on their 16-player roster. The teammates at Anchorage Christian High School are 4,160 miles (68-hour drive) away from home when they are in Natchitoches. NSU also has two newcomers from Spain Carla Celaya (Montbau) and Ane Astarloa (Berriz) and two players from New Jersey Jordan Brown (Plainsboro) and Niaisya Ervin (Newark).
- Three Lady Demons earned roster spots at their home state school, including Nia Hardison (Natchitoches) and Jermesha Frierson and Jordan McLemore (Shreveport).

NEBRASKA VS. NORTHWESTERN STATE SERIES HISTORY

- Nebraska will meet Northwestern State in women's basketball for just the second time in school history on Monday. The Huskers battled their way to a 70-57 victory over the Lady Demons at the Bob Devaney Sports Center on Nov. 28, 1994.
- Center Pyra Aarden led Nebraska with 19 points and 12 rebounds while hitting 8-of-10 shots from the field in the 1994 meeting, which was NU's third game of the season. Tina McClain added 11 points, eight rebounds, four assists and four steals, while freshman Anna DeForge contributed 11 points and five rebounds off the bench.
- Current Nebraska Head Coach Amy Williams played one minute off the bench as a freshman in that game, wearing No. 34.
- Former Nebraska baseball coach Dave Van Horn was the head coach at Northwestern State (1995-97) before leading the Huskers in 1998. Van Horn led Nebraska to three straight Big 12 Tournament titles (1999, 2000, 2001) and NU's first two College World Series appearances (2001, 2002).
- Current Husker pitching coach Rob Childress was an assistant at Northwestern State alongside Van Horn from 1995 to 1997 before coming to Nebraska. Childress was the pitching coach at Nebraska from 1998 to 2005 before taking the head coaching job at Texas A&M (2006-21). He returned to Nebraska in the fall of 2021 and resumed his pitching coach duties following the 2023 season.

SHELLEY, MARKOWSKI NAMED PRESEASON ALL-BIG TEN

- Jaz Shelley and Alexis Markowski captured preseason All-Big Ten honors from both coaches and media when the conference announced its honors on Oct. 4.
- Nebraska joined Ohio State (Cotie McMahon, Jacy Sheldon) as the only schools in the conference to place two players on the Preseason All-Big Ten teams.
- Shelley, a 2023 first-team All-Big Ten selection, averaged 14.5 points, 4.8 rebounds and a team-leading 6.2 assists while also ranking among Big Ten leaders with 79 three-pointers last season.
- The 5-9 guard from Moe, Australia (pronounced MO-ee) was a second-team All-Big Ten choice in her first season with the Huskers in 2021-22. She was also a member of the media's Big Ten All-Defensive Team, helping Nebraska to a 2022 NCAA Tournament berth. She was the only Big Ten player to rank among the top 20 in all five major statistical categories scoring (13.1 ppg), rebounding (6.3 rpg), assists (5.0 apg), steals (1.8 spg) and blocked shots (0.9 bpg) in 2021-22.
- Markowski claimed Preseason All-Big Ten honors for the second consecutive season. The two-time second-team All-Big Ten choice averaged 11.9 points and 9.8 rebounds per game as a sophomore for the Huskers in 2022-23.
- The 6-3 center led the Big Ten with 322 total rebounds and was the only conference player to average a double-double (12.4 ppg, 10.2 rpg) during regular-season Big Ten action a year ago. She also led all league post players with 15 double-doubles.
- The 2022 Big Ten Freshman of the Year, Markowski averaged 12.8 points and 8.0 rebounds while becoming a starter during the conference season. She helped the Huskers to three wins over AP Top 10 teams and a trip to the Big Ten semifinals before advancing to the 2022 NCAA Tournament.

MARKOWSKI NAMED TO LISA LESLIE AWARD WATCH LIST

- Nebraska's **Alexis Markowski** was named to the Lisa Leslie Center of the Year Watch List when the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame announced its list of 20 preseason candidates for the award on Oct. 20.
- Markowski, a 6-3 center from Lincoln, Neb., has been one of the nation's top post players each of her first two seasons as a Husker. The junior earned preseason first-team All-Big Ten honors for the second straight year entering 2023-24. A two-time second-team All-Big Ten choice, Markowski was the only Big Ten player to average a double-double (12.4 ppg, 10.2 rpg) during the 2022-23 regular season. She finished the year by averaging 11.9 points and a Big Ten-best 9.8 rebounds, while leading Nebraska and tying for seventh in the conference with 31 blocks.
- She scored in double figures 23 times, while adding 19 double-digit rebound games, while leading all Big Ten posts with 15 double-doubles on the year. Markowski's 322 total rebounds also led the Big Ten and ranked as the fifth-highest season total in Nebraska history.
- The 2022 Big Ten Freshman of the Year, Markowski earned her second straight appearance on the Lisa Leslie Award Watch List. Last season, as the only sophomore on the list, she advanced to the Midseason Top 10 for the award.
- The list of candidates will be narrowed to 10 in late January, with plans to announce five finalists for the award in late March. South Carolina's Aliyah Boston won the past four consecutive awards.

SHELLEY NAMED TO MEYERS-DRYSDALE WATCH LIST

- Nebraska's Jaz Shelley was named to the Ann Meyers-Drysdale Shooting Guard of the Year Watch List when the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame announced its list of 20 preseason candidates for the award on Oct. 17.
- Shelley, a 5-9 guard from Moe, Australia (pronounced MOee), has been one of the nation's best guards in each of her first two seasons as a Husker. The graduate student earned first-team All-Big Ten honors last season after averaging 14.5 points and 4.8 rebounds per game. She also ranked third in the Big Ten in both assists (6.2 apg) and three-pointers per game (2.4).
- · Shelley, who also earned recognition on the Ann Meyers-Drysdale Preseason Watch List a year ago, opened her Husker career by claiming second-team All-Big Ten accolades in 2022. She was also a member of the Big Ten All-Defensive Team while leading Nebraska to the 2022 NCAA Tournament. She averaged 13.1 points, 6.1 rebounds and 5.0 assists per game.
- Shelley is one of five Big Ten Conference shooting guards on the 2023 Meyers-Drysdale Watch List, joining 2021 award winner Ashley Owusu, who claimed the honor at Maryland. She spent the 2023 season at Virginia Tech, before transferring to Penn State for the 2023-24 campaign.
- Michigan's Laila Phelia, Indiana's Sara Scalia and Ohio State's Celeste Taylor join Shelley on the watch list.
- A group of returning AP All-Americans also fills the list, including Paige Bueckers (UConn), Sonia Citron (Notre Dame), Shaylee Gonzales (Texas), Ta'Niya Latson (Florida State), Charlisse Leger-Walker (Washington State), Charisma Osborne (UCLA), Owusu, Taylor and Hailey Van Lith (LSU). Bueckers (first team) and Owusu (second team) were AP All-Americans in 2021, while the rest of the previously named group earned honorable-mention accolades from the AP in either 2022 or 2023.
- A national committee of top college basketball personnel determined the watch list of 20 candidates for the Ann Meyers-Drysdale Award. In late January, the watch list of 20 players for the 2023 Ann Meyers-Drysdale Award was narrowed to 10. In late February a final list of five candidates will be selected. In March, the five finalists will be presented to Meyers-Drysdale and the Hall of Fame selection committee with a winner being selected.
- Shelley is one of 14 graduate students (9) or seniors (5) among the 20 Ann Meyers-Drysdale Award candidates, while five juniors also fill the list. The lone sophomore in the group is Florida State's Latson. The list of candidates will be narrowed to 10 in late January, with plans to announce five finalists for the award in late March.
- The Ann Meyers-Drysdale Award, presented by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the WBCA, honors the nation's top shooting guard in NCAA Division I women's basketball. It is named after the first player, male or female, selected to an All-America team in four straight college seasons (UCLA, 1975-78).

- Nebraska expects to get an immediate boost in the backcourt from three-time first-team All-Big Sky guard Darian White.
- The 5-6 graduate student transferred into the Husker program during the summer after averaging 14.3 points, 5.1 rebounds, 3.7 assists and 2.2 steals over 120 starts in four seasons at Montana State.
- The No. 2 scorer in Montana State history, White finished with 1,716 points, 612 rebounds, 449 assists and 260 steals.
- White was the 2022 Big Sky Tournament MVP, leading the Bobcats to the conference title and a trip to the 2022 NCAA Tournament.
- She was also a two-time Big Sky Defensive Player of the Year (2021, 2022) and the 2020 Big Sky
- White was the 2019 Idaho Gatorade High School Player of the Year and joins three-time North Dakota Gatorade Player of the Year Logan Nissley, two-time Missouri MaxPreps Player of the Year Natalie Potts and Australian National Program forward Jessica Petrie in Nebraska's group of four newcomers for 2023-24.
- White took the court for the first time at Pinnacle Bank Arena in Nebraska's exhibition win over Dakota Wesleyan (Oct. 29), producing 13 points, seven rebounds and game highs of eight assists and

- Weidner averaged 13.0 points, 10.6 rebounds and 6.0 assists in two wins over Big Ten opponents Maryland and Wisconsin in December of 2022. Nebraska was 10-3 overall with Weidner in the starting
- As a true freshman, Weidner played in all 33 games, including nine starts, helping Nebraska to the 2022 NCAA Tournament. She averaged 7.2 points, 3.7 rebounds and 2.2 assists as a freshman.

DOUBLE-HEADER BRINGS BACK HUSKER STAR CANNON

- For the second straight season, the Nebraska men's and women's basketball programs open the year with a home, day-night double-header at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- After the women take on Northwestern State Monday at noon, the Husker men will face visiting Lindenwood at 7 p.m.
- Last season, the Husker women opened the year with a 100-36 win over Omaha at noon, following the Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally, before the men's team worked its way to a 79-66 season-opening victory over Maine on Monday, Nov. 7.
- This season's double-header is expected to bring back former Husker star Keasha Cannon (Berry), who was a two-year starter at guard for Nebraska in 2002 and 2004. Cannon, a Kansas City native who played junior college basketball at Penn Valley CC before starting her career under Coach Paul Sanderford in Lincoln, was the 2002 Big 12 Newcomer of the Year as a Husker.
- As a junior, Cannon led Nebraska in scoring (12.9 ppg), rebounding (8.4 rpg), assists (4.0 apg) and steals (2.1 spg). After redshirting in 2002-03, Cannon returned for her final season to average 11.1 points, 8.4 rebounds, 3.3 assists and 1.4 steals while helping Coach Connie Yori's club to the second round of the Postseason WNIT.
- Cannon was a two-time honorable-mention All-Big 12 pick for the Huskers after winning a pair of junior college All-America awards at Penn Valley.
- Cannon's son, Nathan Johnson Jr., is in his first season on the roster at Lindenwood after spending his first two seasons at Coffeyville CC in Kansas. Johnson was born in Lincoln on April 8, 2003. Nate Johnson Sr., led Nebraska with 12.8 points per game as a senior in 2004. Johnson averaged 13.3 points per game as a junior and was a two-time honorable-mention All-Big 12 selection.

HUSKERS FACED HISTORIC STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE

- Nebraska finished 2022-23 with an 18-15 record after facing arguably its strongest schedule in school history with 12 games against Associated Press Top 25 opponents at game time.
- Since joining the Big Ten (2011-12), the Huskers had not played more than eight games in a season vs. AP Top 25 foes prior to 2022-23.
- Nebraska's second game with Iowa (Feb. 18) was its fifth against an AP Top 10 team in 2022-23. The Huskers have never faced more than five AP Top 10 teams in the same season. In fact, Nebraska played six games against teams that entered the NCAA Tournament ranked in the AP top seven nationally, including No. 2 Indiana (1), No. 3 Iowa (2), No. 4 Virginia Tech (1) and No. 7 Maryland (2).

NEBRASKA NOTABLES

- Two-time All-Big Ten center Alexis Markowski (Lincoln, Neb.) was the Big Ten's top rebounder with 322 rebounds in 2022-23. She was the only Big Ten player to average a double-double (12.4 ppg, 10.2 rpg) during regular-season conference play.
- Jaz Shelley is 104 points away from becoming the 37th 1,000-point scorer in Nebraska history. Alexis Markowski is 186 points from reaching 1,000 career points.

HUSKER ROSTER FILLED WITH STATE PLAYERS OF THE YEAR

• The 2023-24 Nebraska women's basketball roster features five state players of the year in basketball, who won their respective awards from their home states from 2019 to 2023. The group of five combined for eight state basketball player-of-the-year honors, while adding three state volleyball player-of-the-year awards. Nebraska's group does not include Allison Weidner, who was the state of Nebraska's overall girls athlete of the year across all sports in 2021.

• Freshman Logan Nissley carries the most state player-of-theyear honors with her to Lincoln. The 6-0 guard from Bismarck was a three-time North Dakota Gatorade High School Player of the Year

in basketball. She led Bismarck Century to three straight state championship game appearances, including a title in 2022. Nissley was also the North Dakota Volleyball Player of the Year as a junior (2021) and senior (2022)

• Fellow freshman Natalie Potts added a pair of Missouri MaxPreps High School Player of the Year honors in 2021 and 2023. She was also the Gatorade Player of the Year in 2021. Potts, a 6-2 forward from O'Fallon, Mo., led Incarnate Word Academy to a 100-game winning streak to close her career. She finished her high school career with 2,108 points and 1,008 rebounds - just the third player in Missouri high school history to achieve that combined milestone.

- Junior center Alexis Markowski was the 2021 Nebraska Gatorade and MaxPreps High School Player of the Year at Lincoln Pius X. One of 10 semifinalists for the Lisa Leslie Center of the Year Award in 2023, Markowski was the 2022 Big Ten Freshman of the Year at Nebraska. She is a two-time preseason All-Big Ten selection and a two-time second-team All-Big Ten choice. Before arriving at Nebraska, Markowski led Pius X to back-to-back Class A state titles in 2020 and 2021 as the captain of the Class A All-Tournament team.
- Sophomore center/forward Maggie Mendelson was the Utah High School Player of the Year in both basketball and volleyball in 2021. Mendelson graduated from Fremont High School in Utah a year early and joined the Nebraska volleyball and women's basketball programs for the 2022-23 season. She has helped the volleyball team to a current No. 1 national ranking. In the summer of 2021, Mendelson helped the U.S. Under 16 National Team to gold at the FIBA Americas Championship in August. She also played for the U.S. Under 18 National Volleyball Team at the FIVB U18 World Championships a month later, before winning volleyball gold with the U.S. Under 19 National Team at the Pan American Cup in July of 2022. She played in 22 basketball games for the Huskers as a freshman.
- Graduate transfer Darian White was the 2019 Idaho Gatorade Player of the Year at Mountain View High School. The 5-6 point guard averaged 15.2 points, 5.7 rebounds, 3.2 assists and 3.4 steals on her way to All-Idaho Player-of-the-Year honors. She led Mountain View to a 25-1 record and a state runner-up finish as a senior, before earning 2020 Big Sky Freshman-of-the-Year accolades at Montana State. She went on to be a three-time first-team All-Big Sky selection at Montana State (2021, 2022, 2023) and a two-time Big Sky Defensive Player of the Year (2021, 2022). She was also the Big Sky Tournament MVP in 2022.
- Junior Allison Weidner was not a state basketball player of the year, but she was Nebraska's overall Girls High School Athlete of the Year in 2021. The two-time first-team all-class all-state pick in basketball was a two-time Class D2 first-team all-state volleyball player and an eight-time Nebraska state track and field champion at Humphrey St. Francis.

HUSKER HISTORY OF HOME-OPENING SUCCESS

- Nebraska owns a history of season-opening success on the Huskers' home court. NU improved to 46-3 in home season openers with a 100-36 victory over Omaha on Nov. 7, 2022.
- NU is 9-1 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in season openers. The lone loss came on Nov. 7, 2018, with an 83-77 setback to Drake. In the first regularseason game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena, Nebraska powered its way to a 77-49 win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.
- Nebraska's only season-opening home losses have come to Drake (2018), South Dakota State (Nov. 19, 2005) and Kansas (Nov. 21, 1980).
- Nebraska has been strong in its first four home games every season. In fact, NU is 170-25 (.872) over 49 seasons in its first four home contests, including 42-7 in Game No. 2, 40-9 in Game No. 3 and 43-6 in Game No. 4.

- Nebraska's Big Ten Conference opener at Michigan State on Saturday, Dec. 9 also will be televised by BTN. Tip time in East Lansing is set for 1 p.m. (CT). In fact, each of NU's first five Big Ten contests will be carried by BTN, including its Big Ten home opener with Maryland, Sunday, Dec. 31 at 1 p.m. (CT). The Huskers will be back on BTN on Thursday, Jan. 4 at Wisconsin. Tip time in Madison will be 8 p.m. (CT).
- Nebraska will face Indiana at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Sunday, Jan. 7 in a game televised by BTN. Game time between the Huskers and Hoosiers will not be announced until late-December, as networks await decisions regarding TV time slots in Week 18 of the NFL season.
- The Huskers will wrap up their fifth consecutive Big Ten game on BTN by playing host to Illinois at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Thursday, Jan. 11 at 7 p.m. (CT).
- The Big Red will be back on BTN when the Huskers travel to lowa City to battle the Hawkeyes on Saturday, Jan. 27 at 1 p.m. (CT). The rematch between Nebraska and Iowa is set for Sunday, Feb. 11

at Noon (CT) at Pinnacle Bank Arena in a game televised by FS1 on Super Bowl Sunday. The NFL's championship game does not kick off until 5:30 p.m. (CT), so Husker fans will have plenty of time to come and participate in Play4Kay Day - Nebraska's Pink Game - to promote cancer awareness and support cancer survivors and those currently battling cancer.

- The Huskers will make their first-ever appearance on Peacock when they travel to Ohio State on Wednesday, Feb. 14. Tip off on Valentine's Day in Columbus against the Buckeyes is set for 6 p.m. (CT).
- Nebraska will make its eighth scheduled BTN appearance against Northwestern at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Tuesday, Feb. 20 at 8 p.m. (CT).
- The Big Red could be back on BTN for a ninth time in the regular-season finale at Illinois on Sunday, March 3, but that network designation and tip time will not be announced until February.
- All rounds of the Big Ten Tournament at the Target Center in Minneapolis (March 6-10) will be televised by the conference's television partners. All first-round games will be televised by Peacock on Wednesday, March 6, before BTN carries every game from the second round through the semifinals (March 7-9). The Big Ten Championship Game will be televised by CBS on Sunday, March 10.
- All of Nebraska's non-televised home games and all of the Big Red's non-televised Big Ten road games will be live streamed to subscribers of B1G+.

NEBRASKA PUBLIC MEDIA TO TELEVISE THREE GAMES

- The Nebraska women's basketball team will add three games to its television schedule for 2023-24 with Nebraska Public Media producing a trio of regular-season games to be carried statewide, the Huskers announced on Wednesday, Oct. 25. **NEBRASKA ON NPM**
- The Huskers will make their first appearance of the season on Nebraska Public Media when they play host to 2023 NCAA Tournament qualifier Southern University at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Sunday, Dec. 17 at Noon. The Tigers won the 2023 SWAC tournament championship and will be Nebraska's final home regular-season nonconference opponent of the year.
- The Big Red will be on Nebraska Public Media World in January when the Huskers play host to Big Ten rival Purdue on Wednesday, Jan. 31 at 7 p.m. The Boilermakers also secured a spot in the 2023 NCAA Tournament.
- The Huskers will be on Nebraska Public Media for a statewide television audience just three days later, when Nebraska takes on Rutgers in Lincoln on Saturday, Feb. 3 at 2 p.m.
- All three of Nebraska's women's basketball games produced by Nebraska Public Media also will be streamed live for subscribers of B1G+.

HUSKER BACKCOURT PLAYING WITH DEGREES IN HAND

- Nebraska's 2023-24 roster features a starting backcourt of graduate students, including two-time Ann Meyers-Drysdale Shooting Guard of the Year candidate Jaz Shelley, three-time first-team All-Big Sky point guard Darian White and three-year Division I starter Maddie Krull.
- Shelley, a 5-9 guard from Moe, Australia, earned her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in May of 2023 as an advertising and public relations major. She is pursuing a master's degree in journalism and mass communications.
- White, a 5-6 guard from Boise, Idaho, earned her bachelor's degree from Montana State in May of 2023 as a community health major. The four-year starting guard for the Bobcats came to Nebraska as a graduate transfer and is seeking a graduate certificate in youth development from UNL.
- Krull, a 5-9 guard from Omaha, Neb., claimed her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in August of 2023 in just three years. Krull, who spent her first two college seasons at South Dakota, was a child,

youth and family studies major as an undergraduate. She is pursuing a master's degree in the same field. Krull has two years of basketball eligibility remaining.

NEBRASKA POSTS 18TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

- In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 18 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 18 straight seasons.
- The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report Nov. 15, 2022, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 18th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.
- The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 18 years.
 - Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-tying-high GSR of 95 percent.
- Nebraska continues to lead NCAA Division I in Academic All-Americans across all sports (351) and NCAA Today Top Ten Award winners (18). More than 100 Huskers have also earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in history.

HUSKERS SMASH SINGLE-GAME ATTENDANCE RECORD

- Nebraska shattered its single-game attendance record by attracting 14,289 fans for Pack PBA on Play4Kay Day at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Feb. 18, 2023) vs. No. 7 Iowa.
- Nebraska's Pack PBA crowd eclipsed its previous women's basketball attendance mark of 13,595 fans (sellout) against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.
- The record Pack PBA crowd also eclipsed the previous Pinnacle Bank Arena record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013. The home-opening crowd at PBA is also a Nebraska non-conference record.
- Nebraska ranked No. 13 nationally in average home attendance (5,761) over 17 games in 2022-23. It was an increase of 1,282 fans per contest at Pinnacle Bank Arena over 2021-22, when Nebraska averaged 4,489 fans while going 16-1 at home.
- The Huskers have ranked among the top 25 nationally in attendance for 13 consecutive seasons (not including 2020-21 when no fans were allowed at Pinnacle Bank Arena).
- In 149 games with attendance allowed (excludes 11 games during COVID pandemic in 2020-21), the Huskers have averaged 5,073 fans per game (755,867 total fans/149 games).
- Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

BIG RED DOMINANCE AT PINNACLE BANK ARENA

- Nebraska tied a school record by winning 16 home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2021-22. The Huskers finished 16-1, matching the 1997-98 (16-0), 2009-10 (16-0) and 2013-14 (16-2) teams for most home wins. Coach **Amy Williams** was a senior guard on Nebraska's 1997-98 team coached by 2022 Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Paul Sanderford.
- Nebraska's 16 home wins matched UNLV for the most regular-season home wins in NCAA Division I women's basketball in 2021-22.
- The Huskers didn't just win at home, they won big, posting the largest home combined cumulative margin of victory in school history despite losing a game to Big Ten co-champion Iowa (Jan. 9). The 2021-22 Huskers produced a total home victory margin of 429 points (25.2 ppg). The 2009-10 Huskers that earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament and finished No. 3 in the AP final regular-season poll won their 16 games by a total of 388 points (24.3 ppg).
- Nebraska delivered double-digit margins in 15 of 16 home wins, including wins over top-10 Michigan (79-58) and Indiana (72-57) teams, with only 2022 NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Creighton falling by single digits (67-62).
- The Huskers also ranked No. 14 nationally in total attendance (76,317) and 18th in average home attendance (4,489).
- Over 17 games in 2022-23, Nebraska ranked No. 13 nationally in average home attendance (5,761) for an increase of 1,272 fans per game. The Huskers went 12-5 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2022-23.

NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

- The Huskers are 506-173 (.745) all-time at home, including 12-5 in 2022-23.
- Nebraska tied the school record for home victories by going 16-1 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2021-22. NU has posted double-figure home victory totals 17 times in the last 20 seasons.
- The Huskers were 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 117-43 (.731) all-time at PBA since the building opened in 2013-14. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.
- The Huskers played the first regular-season game in arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.
- NU won its first Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.

- NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.
- Nebraska notched its first postseason home victory at Pinnacle Bank Arena with its 74-65 win over Missouri State (March 15, 2023), before adding a 77-57 win over Northern Iowa in the second round (March 19, 2023). It marked the first time Nebraska had ever won two home games in the same postseason tournament (NCAA or WNIT). NU's only other postseason home game at PBA came with a 64-62 loss to Northern Iowa (March 17, 2016). The Huskers are 4-3 all-time in Lincoln in Postseason WNIT games, including 4-1 against Missouri Valley Conference opponents.
- The Huskers are 46-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 100-36 win over Omaha on Nov. 7, 2022. Nebraska has won 16 of its last 17 season openers.
- Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

HUSKERS RADIO NETWORK COVERS WORLD

- The Huskers Radio Network is in its second season of producing and marketing the live broadcasts of Nebraska women's basketball in 2023-24, but play-by-play announcer Matt Coatney and color commentator Jeff Griesch team up for their 23rd season as the Husker broadcast team.
- The Huskers Radio Network will carry every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com, marking the 23rd year that all of Nebraska's women's basketball games have been free and available to fans. In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Huskers Radio Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the Huskers also can be heard on CD105.9 FM-KKCD. 880-AM-KRVN (Lexington) also provides a huge AM signal statewide in central Nebraska, while more than 20 stations carry the Huskers Radio Network's women's basketball coverage across the state and the Midwest.
 - Inside Pinnacle Bank Arena, fans can access the direct radio call of the game at 87.7 FM.
- $\bullet \ \text{Nebraska's game with Northwestern State will be Coatney and Griesch's 734th women's basketball}\\$ broadcast together, more than any other Husker radio broadcast team across all sports in history. The 2022-23 regular-season opener with Omaha was their 700th broadcast together.
- Griesch also has an active streak of 693 consecutive Husker games called dating back to Jan. 5, 2003. The last game he missed came against Penn State on Dec. 30, 2002 at the Surf & Slam in San Diego, following the birth of he and his wife Emily's first child, Hollan. She is now a junior at the University of Nebraska and has three younger brothers, Jackson (19), Brennan (15) and Isaac (10).
- Griesch continued his streak in 2022-23 despite undergoing open heart surgery on Sept. 28 to replace his aortic valve. Less than five weeks later, he was on air with Coatney for Nebraska's exhibition game with Washburn. Griesch also had open heart surgery as a junior in high school on May 1, 1990.

NEBRASKA OVERTIME FACTS

- Nebraska is 25-26 all-time in overtime games, including 13-12 at home, 8-11 in true road games and 4-3 on neutral courts in overtime.
- The Huskers were 2-1 in overtime games in 2022-23, following a 74-62 OT loss at No. 4 Indiana (Jan. 1).
- Nebraska notched an 85-79 3OT win over No. 20 Kansas at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Dec. 21, 2022). It matched the longest game in school history and was the first triple-overtime game in women's basketball at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- The Huskers defeated Mississippi State 73-65 in OT at the Puerto Rico Clasico at Roberto Clemente Coliseum in San Juan (Nov. 26, 2022). It marked Nebraska's first overtime game since 2019-20.
- The Huskers, who did not play an overtime game in 2020-21 or 2021-22, were 1-2 in overtime games in 2019-20 with an 80-74 OT loss to Ohio State (Feb. 2) and a 78-70 OT loss at Michigan State (Dec. 31, 2019). The Huskers opened non-conference road action with a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019).
- The 2019-20 season marked the first time that Nebraska played three overtime games in the same season since 2011-12 - NU's first season in the Big Ten. In 2011-12, the Huskers played a total of seven OT periods in those three games.
 - Nebraska has never played four overtime games in the same season.
- Nebraska's lone overtime game of 2018-19 also came in the Huskers' first road game of the season, but NU suffered an 87-84 double-overtime loss at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2019). It marked the second straight season that Nebraska played a multi-overtime game (also at Drake, Dec. 9, 2017).
- The Huskers went 1-1 in overtime in 2017-18, including a 69-64 overtime loss to No. 23 Michigan at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Jan. 13). The Huskers won their first overtime game of 2017-18 with an 89-85 double-overtime win at Drake (Dec. 9).
- Nebraska was 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).
 - The Huskers are 5-6 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.
 - Nebraska is 3-3 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Nebraska is 6-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent contest coming with an 85-79 3OT win over No. 20 Kansas in Lincoln (Dec. 21, 2022). The most recent loss in a multi-overtime game came with an 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in doubleovertime in Indianapolis.

• The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota - a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.

- The Huskers have played 16 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-11 record. NU is 4-8 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.
- Nebraska played its fourth OT game in 73 meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.
- Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin and former Big 12 foe Kansas. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 17 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.
- The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (29 games), including two of the six overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.
- Nebraska recently played its third overtime game in history against its most frequest all-time rival, Kansas. The Huskers defeated Kansas 85-79 in 3OT (Dec. 21, 2022). It marked the third overtime game in 84 all-time contests with the Jayhawks. Nebraska improved to 2-1 in OT against KU with all three games coming in Lincoln.
 - In 22 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.
- Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.
