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RIFLE GLOSSARY

Air rifle – A gun that uses a .177 caliber lead pellet propelled by compressed air instead of a gunpowder charge. The rifles can weigh up to 12.12 pounds.

Cleaned – A perfect target, in which the shooter hits a 10 on each of the 10 targets on the sheet for a score of 100. Can also be used to refer to a perfect match.

Front sight – The sight attached to the end of the barrel of the rifle, holding the front aperture.

Electronic targets – A target system that uses microphones and sound waves from the bullet or pellet going through the paper to send to a monitor on each point.

Iron sights – Sights that employ no magnification.

Kneeling – Shooting from a kneeling position with a sling and kneeling roll to support the position.

Off hand – The unsupported standing position.

Perfect match score – In air rifle and smallbore, 600 is perfect.

Prone – Shooting from a lying position.

Record shots – Also known as “shots for record,” those shots that are counted toward the match score, with “sighters” not included.

Relay – One group of shooters firing the match at the same time.

Shooting glove – A padded glove, with or without fingers, used to ensure the comfort of the non-dominant hand (i.e., a right-handed shooter wears a glove on the left hand) as the shooter supports the rifle.

Shooting jacket – The jacket is made of leather or canvas and provides support and pads the shooter to minimize the effect of pulse and recoil. There are strict guidelines regarding the thickness.

Shooting boots – Boots designed for rifle shooting. They have the toe end of the sole and the heel cut flat for stability.

Shooting trousers – Snug canvas and/or leather pants usually worn over running tights or sweatpants. They often have padded reinforcements sewn on both knees and the seat to prevent the slipping of elbows and knees when firing from the kneeling position.

Sighting shots – Practice shots taken before going “for record.” Sighting shots are unlimited and may be fired before the beginning of each position. Once a position’s first record shot has been fired, no further sighting shots are permitted.

Sling – Adjustable strap with buckle adjustments and arm cuffs that provide stability. A sling is attached to the rifle and helps to support it in prone and kneeling positions.

Smallbore – A .22 caliber gun with an iron sight used in competition. It can be customized with special accessories and/or alterations (barrel length and style, stock, design, etc.) to fit the shooter’s needs and comforts.

SCORING SYSTEM

AIR RIFLE

Course of Fire – Competitors stand and shoot lead pellets from .177 caliber rifles at targets 10 meters away.

Rifle – Air rifles can be either air or gas powered and weigh up to 12.12 pounds by NCAA regulations.

Time – Competitors have 75 minutes to fire 60 shots from the standing position.

Perfect Match Score – A perfect match score of 600 is the maximum for air rifle.

SMALLBORE

Course of Fire – In smallbore three-position rifle, athletes fire .22 caliber rifles from the kneeling, prone, and standing (also called off hand) positions at targets 50 feet away.

Rifle – Smallbore rifles may not exceed 17.6 pounds by NCAA regulations.

Time – Competitors have 105 minutes for 20 record shots in the kneeling position, 20 record shots in the prone position and 20 record shots in the standing position.

Perfect Match Score – A perfect match score of 600 is the maximum for smallbore.



Actual size of a smallbore target

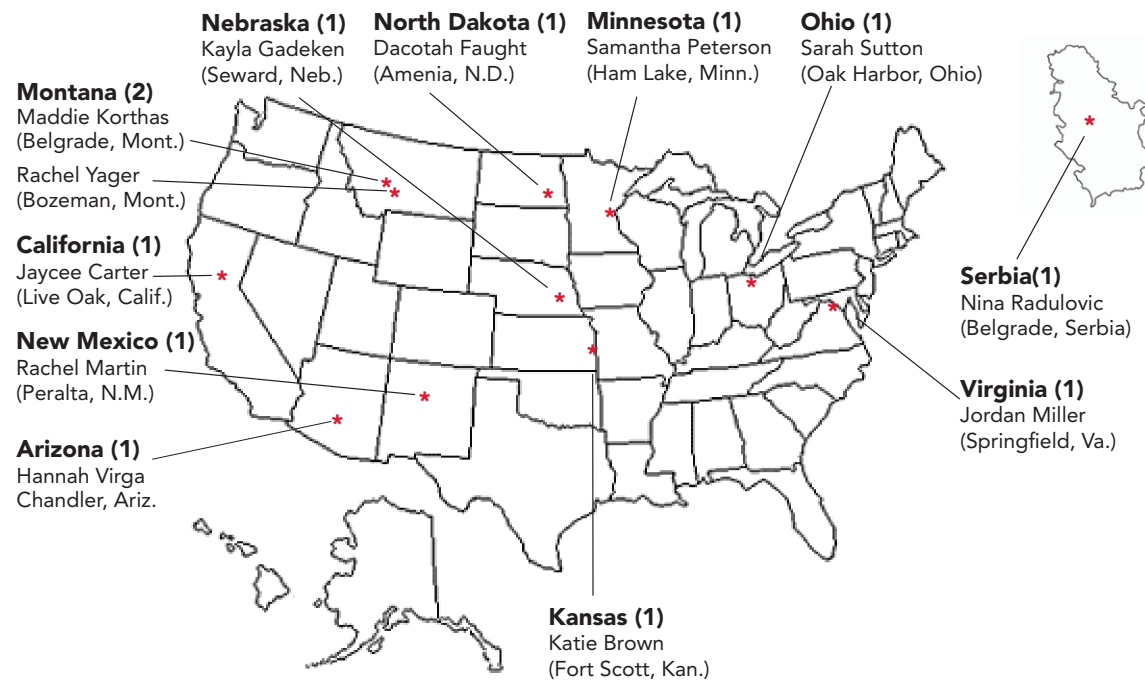

YOUNG HUSKERS EAGER FOR SHOT AT NCAA TITLE

Head coach Ashley MacAllister begins her third year at the helm of the Nebraska rifle team in 2016-17. She is joined by assistant coach Rick Johnson who has one year at Nebraska under his belt. The duo led the Nebraska rifle team to its fourth consecutive top-eight finish in 2015-16 and looks to tie the school record for most consecutive trips to the NCAA Championships (five) this season.

"I believe that with the team we have, taking into account other teams, that we can be top six in the country [in 2016-17]," MacAllister said. "We have the potential to do a lot of great things... and I hope that we exceed all expectations."

The Husker squad consists of only two seniors in Jaycee Carter and Rachel Martin. The pair has significant collegiate experience and will be looked to for leadership both on and off the range by a team with nine underclassmen and a junior transfer.

"Jaycee and Rachel [were] wonderful leaders to the underclassmen last year, and I expect that this will continue," MacAllister said. "They are important to this team not only on the range, but most importantly cultivating an environment where everyone will be successful."

Carter and Martin, co-captains this season, have each appeared more than 40 times in their first three years as Huskers in both smallbore and air rifle. Martin, the 2015 smallbore national champion, is a seven-time All-American, while Carter earned an All-America award in 2015 in air rifle. Both Carter and Martin have competed for the Huskers at the NCAA Championships. Off the range, they have been stellar examples for the team. Carter and Martin are each two-time Academic All-Big Ten picks, have earned spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll each semester at Nebraska and have been named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team for three consecutive years.

Joining the seniors as returners this season are five sophomores. Katie Brown, Jordan Miller, Nina Radulovic, Hannah Virga and Rachel Yager all saw some action last year as freshmen but will play much bigger roles in 2016-17 after Nebraska lost four seniors from last season.

"We lost four seniors this past year [and] we have relied on all of these girls at some point in time," MacAllister said. "It is next to impossible to replace one of these four girls, but we have to keep moving forward in hopes that working hard to get better will be enough for now. It will be very hard to replace Denise [Martin's] scores, but I have confidence that the returning team members will work to get better on the range. If our team can focus on pushing forward with their scores then we won't need to replace [Martin], we [will be] able to make the whole team better."

Radulovic has the most experience of the sophomores. The Serbian competed in every match for the Huskers as a freshman in both smallbore and air rifle. She fired career highs of

592 (air rifle) and 584 (smallbore).

Virga saw the second-most action as a freshman behind Radulovic, appearing 12 times in smallbore and 13 times in air rifle. The Chandler, Ariz., native broke the school record for highest air rifle score (597) ever shot by a freshman and looks to compete for a spot in both disciplines.

Miller earned some time on the range in her debut season, appearing six times in air rifle and seven times in smallbore. Miller tallied career highs of 567 and 588 in smallbore and air rifle, respectively.

Yager and Brown saw limited action as freshmen, but are eager to make contributions this year. The pair appeared a combined total of eight times in smallbore and nine times in air rifle in 2015-16. Brown posted career-best scores of 556 in smallbore and 575 in air rifle. Yager notched high scores of 559 in smallbore and 579 in air rifle.

The seven returners are joined by five newcomers, including four freshmen and one transfer. Dacotah Faught (Amenia, N.D.) comes to Nebraska from the University of Tennessee at Martin, where she earned NRA All-America honors as a sophomore. Kayla Gaden (Seward, Neb.), Maddie Korthas (Belgrade, Mont.), Samantha Peterson (Ham Lake, Minn.) and Sarah Sutton (Oak Harbor, Ohio) are part of the incoming freshman class. The group will have the

opportunity to make a significant impact on the team in their first year.

"All of these girls are bringing a lot of experience to the table," MacAllister said. "Dacotah is coming to us from UT Martin where she was an All-American. Not only does she excel athletically, but she is an exceptional person who embodies everything we are looking for here at Nebraska. Dacotah is going to bring experience to a team that is relatively young."

"Kayla is a local girl who I expect will be able to help us in both air rifle and smallbore this year. I look forward to seeing Sarah grow throughout this next year. She is a strong air rifle shooter and will be a great addition to Rachel Martin and Jaycee Carter. I think [Samantha] is going to have the most impact right away in smallbore. She has had recent success in smallbore and is exactly what we need for next year. Maddie [comes from a club with] a rich tradition of rifle shooters, and I expect Maddie to be one of those. Maddie is a hard worker, and I expect her to improve throughout her years at Nebraska."

This talented team will take aim at some of the top teams in the country throughout the 2016-17 season.

The Huskers open the season on Oct. 15 in Oxford, Miss., with a conference matchup against Ole Miss.

NU returns home and takes a week off before its home opener against Ohio State at the NU Rifle Range on Oct. 29.

Then the Huskers head to Lexington, Ky., for a pair of matches on Nov. 5 (Akron) and Nov. 6 (Kentucky).

On Nov. 12 and 13, the Big Red will host the University of Texas at El Paso for the final matches of the fall semester.

The team will then take more than two months off before resuming competition.

NU opens the spring semester with five conference opponents, starting with Army West Point on Jan. 15 in New York. The following day, on Jan. 16, Nebraska faces NC State at West Point, N.Y.

The Huskers continue a series of away matches in Morgantown, W. Va. On Jan. 21, the team will face off against defending national champion West Virginia, followed by a meeting with Navy on Jan. 22.

Nebraska will conclude its away matches with a trip to Memphis, Tenn., on Jan. 28, to take on the Memphis Tigers.

MacAllister, Johnson and the Huskers close the regular season at home on Feb. 2 against Alaska.

On Feb. 19, the team takes a shot at a fifth consecutive NCAA Championship appearance when it competes at the NCAA Qualifiers in Murray, Ky.

On Feb. 24-26, NU fights for the conference title at the GARC Championships.

The NCAA Championships are set for March 10-11 in Columbus, Ohio.

GREAT AMERICA RIFLE CONFERENCE



Nebraska joined the Great America Rifle Conference in 2004-05 after seven years as an independent program. The conference, which enters its 20th year of operation, includes Nebraska, Army West Point, Kentucky, Memphis, Mississippi, West Virginia, Navy, Akron and North Carolina State.

Before joining the organization, the Huskers faced nearly a month-long break between qualifiers and the NCAA Championships. As a member of the GARC, Nebraska can compete for the conference championship in the interim, allowing it to gauge its performance before heading to nationals. Over the last 12 seasons since joining the GARC, Nebraska has finished as high as a program-best second place at the ensuing NCAA Championships.

Ashley MacAllister was named the fifth rifle coach in the history of the Nebraska rifle program in July 2014. She begins her third season in 2016-17 after taking the Huskers to the NCAA Championships each of her first two seasons at Nebraska.

MacAllister came to Nebraska after spending the 2013-14 season as an assistant coach at Kentucky. She inherited a Nebraska program that finished fifth at the 2014 NCAA Championships.

In her first season (2014-15) at Nebraska, MacAllister led the Huskers to their third consecutive NCAA Championship appearance, where the team finished fourth overall. MacAllister also coached Rachel Martin to an individual smallbore championship. Martin captured the title and became only the third Husker to win an individual championship. Under MacAllister, the team finished third in the conference and 7-5 during the regular season.

In 2015-16, MacAllister added assistant coach Rick Johnson to her staff. The pair led the Huskers to a 8-6 regular-season record, along with a sixth-place finish at the GARC Championships. Additionally, the pair took NU to its fourth consecutive NCAA appearance, where the team finished eighth in her second season at Nebraska. MacAllister also produced two All-Americans in Rachel and Denise Martin. MacAllister also led the the Puerto Rico National Team at the 2016 Summer Olympics in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, as its head coach.

Before coming to Nebraska, MacAllister assisted in the day-to-day management of the Kentucky rifle program under Coach Harry Mullins. MacAllister coordinated practice plans, matches, team travel, equipment and facility management at Kentucky. She also assisted in recruiting. MacAllister helped the Wildcats to a third-place finish at the 2014 NCAA Championships.

MacAllister was a four-year letterwinner and a team captain at Murray State. Her career for the Racers included a third-place overall team finish in air rifle at the 2010 NCAA Championships. She was a member of the Ohio Valley Conference All-Newcomer Team in air rifle in 2009. She was

a two-time second-team All-OVC selection in air rifle. MacAllister was also a leader on Ohio Valley Conference championship teams in 2010 and 2011. She helped Murray State to a fifth-place team finish as a junior at the 2011 NCAA Championships and a seventh-place team finish in 2010.

MacAllister earned her bachelor's degree in political science from Murray State in May of 2012, before spending the 2012-13 season as a graduate assistant for the Racers rifle team. She assisted in the daily operations of the program, including the coordination of team travel and operation of the target system during team matches. She earned her master's degree in human development and leadership from Murray State in May of 2013. MacAllister also spent a year as an intern within the Murray State athletic department, gaining a working knowledge of each area in the department.

In addition to her experience at Murray State and Kentucky, MacAllister spent five years assisting with the Civilian Marksmanship Program. In the summers of 2012, 2013 and 2014, she served as assistant director, preparing for summer camps by hiring and training camp counselors, coordinating travel and managing the daily operations of the summer camps. She began her association with the Civilian Marksmanship Program in 2009 and 2010, serving as a camp counselor and teaching shooting skills to junior high and high school students.

A native of Eubank, Ky., MacAllister was heavily involved in campus and community activities at Murray State. She served on the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee's executive committee and represented Murray State at annual Ohio Valley Conference meetings. She was also the vice-chairman of the Kentucky Federation of College Republicans and the Murray State College Republicans. She also spent two months in the summer of 2011 working in the office of Kentucky Congressman Hal Rogers at the U.S. House of Representatives.

Her husband Tim is the video coordinator for Creighton University's basketball program. The couple lives in Ashland.

Rick Johnson was named the assistant rifle coach at Nebraska on Aug. 20, 2015. He begins his second season with the Huskers in 2016-17.

In his first season at Nebraska, Johnson helped lead NU to its fourth consecutive NCAA appearance, where the team finished eighth. Johnson produced two All-Americans in Denise and Rachel Martin in 2015-16. Additionally, he helped the Huskers to a 8-6 regular-season record, along with a sixth-place finish at the GARC Championships in his debut season with Nebraska.

Prior to coming to Nebraska, Johnson served as the assistant coach at Army West Point for three seasons under head coach Ron Wigger from 2011 to 2014. During the 2014-15 season, Johnson was the acting head coach at Army West Point and helped mentor the team to a 7-6 record and a seventh-place finish at the GARC Championships.

During his first year at Army West Point, Johnson played an instrumental part in the team's fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships. In the four years Johnson served as coach, the Black Knights finished 30-17 and made three NCAA appearances (2012-13-14). His peers rewarded his efforts by voting him the GARC Assistant Coach of the Year for the 2013-14 and 2014-15 seasons. He was the CRCA Coach of the Year in 2014-15.

Prior to working at Army West Point, Johnson founded a junior marksmanship program at Harvard in 2005. The program is meant for individuals 10-20 years old who are interested in competitive shooting. The program teaches firearm safety, along with marksmanship skills.

He served as the director for the program until 2011. From 2006 to 2011, Johnson coached the Massachusetts Junior Rifle Team, comprised of the top shooters within the state.

Johnson graduated from the University of Massachusetts-Lowell with a degree in meteorology in 1999. Following graduation, he served as an assistant staff meteorologist at MIT for eight years.

Johnson has been a competitive smallbore shooter for over 25 years. He is a three-time Massachusetts state champion, claiming the 3-position Junior State Titles in 1985 and 1986, and also capturing the 1986 Prone Junior State Championship.

Johnson is a licensed USA shooting level one rifle official and advanced rifle coach. He and his wife Ann have one son, Erik.

GETTING TO KNOW COACH JOHNSON

What is your coaching philosophy?

"I like to keep things as simple as possible. This sport is so technical with all the specialized gear [and] it is easy to become lost in all that. Breathe, relax and shoot the middle of the target. What I mean by that is to do all your hard work in training; match day is just about being relaxed and letting your training take over."

What is your favorite part about being a coach?

"I enjoy working with each individual. Everyone thinks, acts and reacts differently to situations. I like figuring out how to best coach each individual athlete so that they can meet and surpass their goals."

Shawn Eichorst was recruited and hired by the University of Nebraska in 2012 and quickly displayed an incredible passion for the University and for its student-athletes as well as the State of Nebraska. As the leader of a tradition-rich athletic program with 24 intercollegiate teams, 600-plus student-athletes and more than 325 full-time employees, Eichorst has relied on a strong value system and a student-centered approach to lead the department. Nebraska's primary mission is to provide student-athletes with the resources and support they need to be successful in academics, athletics and life. The health, safety and welfare of student-athletes are priority one and the essence of every decision made at Nebraska. Since Eichorst arrived in Lincoln, resources and services in every student-athlete support unit have been reviewed, improved and enhanced, including academics, athletic medicine, life skills, nutrition, sports psychology, strength and conditioning and performance/research [i.e. Nebraska Athletic Performance Laboratory (NAPL) and the Center for Brain, Biology and Behavior (CB3)].

Eichorst has continued to move Nebraska forward aggressively with several new initiatives to enhance the student-athlete experience. Beginning in the summer of 2015, Nebraska became the first athletic department in the country to offer laptop computers to every student-athlete and created a data analytics department. Husker student-athletes in all sports now receive four-year, full cost of attendance-based scholarships. Nebraska was also the first-known department of athletics to create a post-eligibility opportunity (PEO) program, where every Husker letterwinner who graduates and has exhausted his or her eligibility has an opportunity to pursue either an internship, study abroad or graduate school program valued at \$7,500. Nebraska was also one of the first institutions to create a spring service abroad trip, taking a team of student-athletes and staff to Guatemala in 2015 and to the Dominican Republic in 2016.

Eichorst is in high demand and has made more than 500 public appearances around the state and

country and his monthly radio show and "Connecting on Campus" online column provide opportunities to connect and share the incredible activities, initiatives and accomplishments happening at the greater University and in the department. As a member of the Chancellor's Senior Administrative Team, Eichorst maintains a strong connection and collaboration between the University and athletics.

A highly respected national leader, Eichorst was appointed in 2015 to the Division I Football Oversight Committee. Most recently, Eichorst was named co-chair of the NCAA Division I Football Recruiting ad hoc working group. He also serves on the Big Ten Conference Program and Budget Review Committee. Eichorst was the first Director of Athletics from any conference to visit the Big Ten Conference-based Academic Alliance (formerly known as the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) at its Champaign, Ill., headquarters. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is a highly successful academic-based consortium of 15 schools, including all 14 in the Big Ten Conference. Nebraska is leading the Big Ten and the Big Ten Academic Alliance in several areas, including Digital Humanities and head injury research.

Under Eichorst, Nebraska extended its nation-leading total of CoSIDA Academic All-Americans to 325 and its nation-leading total of NCAA Top Ten Award winners to 17. More than 700 awards were presented at the 26th Annual Student-Athlete Awards Show—A Night at the Lied. In 2015-16, 109 student-athletes earned undergraduate or graduate degrees and the Big Ten Conference honored 209 Husker student-athletes with Academic All-Big Ten awards. For the first time in school history, all Nebraska teams had an NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) of 960 or higher and the overall Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 86 percent is the highest in program history. In addition, seven Husker teams (women's basketball, golf, gymnastics, softball, tennis and volleyball and men's tennis) had a GSR of 100 percent as reported in the fall of 2015.

During Eichorst's tenure, Nebraska has won three NCAA team Championships, increasing its total to 27. In 2012-13 and in 2014-15, the Nebraska women's bowling team earned the program's fourth and fifth NCAA titles, while the Husker volleyball team won the 2015 NCAA Championship, the program's fourth national title.

In 2016, the Husker men's track and field team swept the Big Ten Indoor and Outdoor Championships and 14 Nebraska teams competed in NCAA postseason action, including bowling, football, volleyball, women's swimming and diving, wrestling, softball, baseball, men's and women's gymnastics, rifle, and men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field. In 2015-16, Nebraska produced 41 All-Americans who won 49 national awards, including 21 first-team honorees.

In 2013-14, Nebraska became one of only two NCAA institutions—and the first Big Ten program in history—to qualify for a football bowl game, and advance to NCAA postseason in the major team sports of volleyball, soccer, men's and women's basketball, baseball and softball. Additionally, Nebraska was the only institution to win a postseason game in six of those seven sports.

Nebraska's fan support continues to be unparalleled in college athletics. In 2015-16, top 15 national rankings for average attendance were reached across 10 sports—football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, wrestling, soccer, softball, baseball and men's and women's gymnastics. Nebraska is the only school in the country to rank among the top 15 nationally in both football and men's basketball attendance and in volleyball and women's basketball. A tribute to loyal Husker fans, two sports lead the nation with consecutive home sellout streaks. Football has 347 consecutive sellouts and volleyball has 204 consecutive regular-season sellouts.

Under Eichorst's leadership, Nebraska continues to focus on improving its facilities and the game-day experience at all athletic venues. In August of 2015, Hibner Stadium and Barbara Hibner Field for soccer and the Sid and Hazel Dillon Tennis Center were completed. A new center-hung video board and sound system was installed in the Devaney Center in 2015 to improve the game-day experience for volleyball, wrestling and men's and women's gymnastics. In 2014, the largest wireless

network system at a college football stadium in history was installed in Memorial Stadium, along with a state-of-the-art sound system. In the summer of 2013, Memorial Stadium expansion added the innovative NAPL inside East Stadium next to the Center for Brain, Biology and Behavior (CB3). That same year, Nebraska's men's and women's basketball teams became the primary tenants at Pinnacle Bank Arena, and the renovated Devaney Center became the home for Husker volleyball, wrestling and the men's and women's gymnastics programs.

Eichorst came to Nebraska after serving as Director of Athletics at Miami in 2011 and 2012. He hired legendary men's basketball coach Jim Larrañaga, who led Miami to the NIT Second Round in his first season and ACC regular-season and tournament titles as well and the NCAA Sweet 16 in his second. The women's basketball program posted its highest national ranking in school history (No. 5) and advanced to the Second Round of the NCAA Tournament. The Miami women's tennis team advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight for the fourth straight season, and the baseball team made its 40th consecutive NCAA appearance. The Hurricane women's soccer team posted its first NCAA Tournament win in school history, and the volleyball team made its third straight NCAA Tournament trip.

Before heading to Miami, Eichorst was the Deputy Athletics Director at Wisconsin. He was the Chief Operating Officer and oversaw the department's daily operations, as well as the men's basketball program under the direction of Director of Athletics and former Husker Barry Alvarez.

From 2004 to 2006, Eichorst served as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Administration at South Carolina, overseeing the department's daily operations, as well as the football and baseball programs under legendary coaches Lou Holtz, Steve Spurrier and Ray Tanner, respectively.

From 1999 to 2003, Eichorst served as the Director of Athletics at Wisconsin-Whitewater, which produced four top 10-percent finishes in the NACDA Directors Cup, one NCAA team title and two NCAA runner-up finishes. The program also featured 11 CoSIDA Academic All-America selections.

A native of Lone Rock, Wis., Eichorst was an all-conference defensive back, three-time letterwinner and 1990 football team captain for the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. He graduated magna cum laude in business from UW-Whitewater in 1990 and in 2015 was awarded the Distinguished Alumni Award for Professional Achievement. He earned a law degree from Marquette Law School in 1995, practiced law in Milwaukee until 1999 and is a past member of the State Bar of Wisconsin Board of Governors. He served as an assistant adjunct professor of law at Marquette, where he taught classes in sports law. He serves on the Marquette University National Sports Law Institute Board of Advisors and in 2006, Marquette awarded Eichorst the Sports Law Alumnus of the Year Award. He is also a graduate of the Sports Management Institute and serves on its Executive Committee.

RONNIE GREEN

University, respectively. His doctoral program was completed jointly at the University of Nebraska and the USDA-ARS U.S. Meat Animal Research Center in animal breeding and genetics in 1988.

Green has served on the animal science faculties of Texas Tech University and Colorado State University, and as the national program leader for animal production research for the USDA's Agricultural Research Service and executive secretary of the White House's interagency working group on animal genomics within the National Science and Technology Council where he was one of the principal leaders in the international bovine, porcine, and ovine genome sequencing projects. Prior to returning to NU, Green served as senior global director of technical services for Pfizer Animal Health's animal genomics business.

Green has published 130 refereed publications and abstracts, nine book chapters and 56 invited symposia papers; and has delivered invited presentations in 43 U.S. states and 21 countries around the world. He is a past-president of both the American Society of Animal Science and the National Block and Bridle Club, and has served in a number of leadership positions for the U.S. Beef Improvement Federation, National Cattlemen's Beef Association, National Pork Board, Federated Animal Science Societies and the National Research Council. He was named a fellow of ASAS in 2014 and, in 2015, a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the world's largest general scientific society.

Ronnie Green assumed full authority as the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's 20th chancellor on May 8, 2016.

Prior to being named chancellor, Green served for six years as the Harlan Vice Chancellor of the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources. In this role, he also jointly served as the Vice President for Agriculture and Natural Resources of the University of Nebraska system. Since 2015, Green also was UNL's Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, the institution's chief academic officer and responsible authority in the absence of the chancellor.

Green was raised on a mixed beef, dairy, and cropping farm in southwestern Virginia. He received bachelor and master's degrees in animal science from Virginia Tech and Colorado State

A sports law expert, Potuto regularly lectures and consults on sports issues in general and NCAA processes in particular. She is an expert witness in litigation involving sports issues. She testified before the House Subcommittee on the Constitution regarding due process in NCAA infractions hearings.

She has appeared in media reports in the New York Times, Los Angeles Times, USA Today, Washington Post, CBSSports.com, the Chronicle of Higher Education, and Insider Higher Ed among others. She has presented to the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics, the National Association of College and University Attorneys, the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities, the Texas Commission of Higher Education, NCAA regional conferences, law conferences and law firms, NACDA, and to universities and law colleges, including the Universities of Istanbul, Washington, Maryland, Oklahoma, Santa Clara, Arizona State, Baltimore, and Mississippi.

Potuto is a past adviser to the Uniform Law Commissioners Committee to draft a sports agent statute, has drafted rules governing search and seizure and hearings for the Nebraska Racing Commission, and also has written on issues of gender equity in college athletics. She has authored numerous articles on sports law issues. She just completed articles on NCAA treatment of student-athlete violations and on NCAA and Olympic treatment of athlete violations (co-authored with an Olympic arbitrator).

Potuto delivered the 2012 Chancellor's Distinguished Lecture. She serves on the senate's intercollegiate athletics committee. She is a past member of the UNL academic senate and also served on Nebraska's NCAA site certification steering committee.

Josephine (Jo) R. Potuto, the Richard H. Larson Professor of Constitutional Law, has been Nebraska's faculty representative (FAR) at the NCAA and conference level since May 15, 1997.

In 2002, Potuto was named Outstanding Faculty Athletics Representative by the All-American Football Foundation. From 2008-09 to 2011-12 she was president of the 1A FAR (FARs from FBS institutions). Among her NCAA positions, Potuto spent nine years (the maximum) on the NCAA Division I Committee on Infractions (chair her last two years). She was one of three Big 12 Conference representatives on the NCAA Division I Management Council, and served on the NCAA Men's Gymnastics Championship Committee and an NCAA-wide (all divisions) committee to advise NCAA staff on student-athlete issues and educational programming for coaches, staff, and student-athletes.

Potuto teaches constitutional law, procedure, federal jurisdiction, and sports law. She has been a visiting professor of law at the University of Arizona, Rutgers University, the Cardozo College of Law at New York's Yeshiva University, the University of Oregon, the University of North Carolina, and Seton Hall University. She has worked as an assistant prosecutor in both the Essex and Morris County (N.J.) prosecutor's offices.

Potuto was project director and a drafter of the Uniform Law Commissioners Sentencing and Corrections Act, as well as the drafter for the Nebraska Supreme Court Committee to Draft Criminal Jury Instructions. She is the author of three books. She was elected to membership in the American Law Institute, the Nebraska State Bar Foundation, and the Douglass Society.

Potuto earned her bachelor's degree in journalism at Rutgers' Douglass College, and her master's degree in English literature at Seton Hall. She earned her juris doctorate at the Rutgers Law College.

She is a member of the bars of Nebraska and New Jersey and is admitted to practice before the U.S. Supreme Court, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, and the U.S. District Courts for Nebraska and New Jersey.

SEASON OUTLOOK (2016-17)

Jaycee Carter will be looked to for leadership both on and off the range, as one of only three upperclassmen on a young Husker squad. The Live Oak, Calif., native broke the Nebraska junior class record for average air rifle score with an average of 589.40 in 2015-16.

As a junior she competed in every match for the Huskers in both smallbore and air rifle. She helped carry the team into the postseason, including an eighth-place NCAA finish and a sixth-place GARC finish. She earned a career-best in air rifle (594) last season and a season-best score of 574 in smallbore.

Carter is a returning All-American and hopes to lead the team back to the NCAA Championships for the fifth consecutive season and take aim at a national title in her final season at Nebraska.

Carter has a reputation for being a star in the classroom as well and is expected to represent the team in the same manner this season. She is a two-time Academic All-Big Ten pick and has been named to the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll each semester she has been enrolled at Nebraska.

JUNIOR (2015-16)

As a junior, Carter became one of Nebraska's top shooters, appearing in every match during the season. She posted a career-best air rifle score of 594 during the 2015-16 season. Her air rifle average (589.40) during the season broke the school record for the highest air rifle average from a junior.

Carter played an important role in the team's fourth consecutive trip to the NCAA Championships. She tallied a 591 in air rifle to lead the Huskers in the discipline. She helped

As a senior, she hopes to lead the team back to the NCAA Championships for the fifth consecutive season and get a shot at bringing home her second individual national title.

JUNIOR (2015-16)

The 2015 NCAA smallbore champion, Martin returned as a leader for Nebraska as a junior in 2015-16. The All-American from Peralta, N.M., competed in every meet for the Huskers, including the postseason, where the team qualified for its fourth consecutive trip to the NCAA Championships, finishing eighth. Martin added her sixth and seventh All-America honors as a junior, one from the NRA and one from the CRCA.

The seven-time All-American added Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2015, and earned a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in both the fall and spring semesters.

SOPHOMORE (2014-15)

Martin emerged as one of the nation's top shooters in her second season at Nebraska. The sophomore captured the NCAA smallbore title while earning All-America honors from both the NRA and CRCA. Martin's performances helped the Huskers to a fourth-place team finish at the 2015 NCAA Championships.

The third Husker to ever win an NCAA championship, Martin tied her career-best smallbore score of 585 twice and shattered her previous career-best air rifle score by four points. Her personal-best air rifle score of 597 also set the record for the best individual air rifle score at Nebraska. She was an NRA and CRCA All-American for the second consecutive year, and was also a second-team All-GARC selection in smallbore, air rifle and combined.

Off the range, Martin earned academic All-Big Ten honors in 2015, and was named to the Nebraska-Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll both the fall and spring semesters. She claimed a spot on the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team for her efforts in the community.

FRESHMAN (2013-14)

Martin produced a strong freshman campaign, averaging 586.67 in air rifle and 579.64 in smallbore. She fired a then-career-high score of 593 in air rifle two times, once against NC State and again at the NCAA Qualifiers. In smallbore, Martin fired a 585 against NC State,

BEFORE NEBRASKA (UT MARTIN)

In 2015-16, Faught redshirted to train for the Olympics.

As a sophomore in 2014-15, Faught became just the third member in UT Martin rifle history to earn an All-America honor after being named to the second team in smallbore by the NRA. At the 2015 NCAA Championships, she placed 11th in smallbore and 36th in air rifle and was only the sixth Skyhawk in program history to compete in consecutive NCAA championships. Faught broke the school smallbore record (585). She earned first-team All-Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) accolades in air rifle and second-team All-OVC honors in smallbore and competed with the junior U.S. National Team at the World Championships after winning the national air rifle title.

Faught had an impressive freshman year with the Skyhawks, finishing eighth in air rifle at the 2014 NCAA Championships. She was named the Ohio Valley Conference Freshman of the Year, becoming just the fourth person in school history to win the honor. Faught broke the school air rifle record with a 597. She earned first-team All-OVC honors in smallbore and second-team All-OVC accolades in air rifle and All-Newcomer in both disciplines. Faught was also a star in the classroom, being named to the OVC's Commissioner Honor Roll and the CRCA All-Academic Team.

Faught dominates the UTM record books, holding the top three scores in both disciplines since the scoring change in 2005.

Miller posted a career-best in smallbore (567) in the first match of the season against Air Force on Oct. 10. In air rifle, she earned a personal-high score of 588 against Murray State on Jan. 23.

In the classroom, Miller made an immediate mark, earning a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the fall of 2015.

The 2015-16 Nebraska rifle team produced its fourth consecutive top-eight finish after placing eighth at the 2016 NCAA Championships under second-year head coach Ashley MacAllister and first-year assistant coach Rick Johnson.

The Huskers qualified for the NCAA Championships for the fourth consecutive year, marking the second-longest streak since rifle became a varsity sport at NU in 1998-99.

The team's eighth-place finish at the NCAA Championships capped a very successful 2015-16 season that included several personal-best scores, new school records and a pair of All-Americans.

The Huskers started the season by traveling to Colorado Springs for a pair of matches. On Oct. 10, NU battled Air Force. Despite solid air rifle performances from Rachel Martin (593), Jaycee Carter (591) and Hannah Virga (591), the Huskers fell to the Falcons 4,680-4,662. Freshmen Jordan Miller and Hannah Yager each shot well in their collegiate debut, firing a 567 in smallbore and a 579 in air rifle, respectively.

On Oct. 11, Hannah Virga broke the school record for highest air rifle score by a freshman (594) against No. 1 West Virginia. Maggie Mical notched a season-high air rifle score of 588, but the Mountaineers outlasted the Huskers 4,714-4,654.

NU had a bye week to prepare for a two-day match against TCU and Memphis on Oct. 24-25 in Fort Worth, Texas. The Huskers came in second, defeating Memphis, but falling to TCU. Carter tallied a career-best air rifle score of 594. NU finished with a final team score of 4,675. TCU scored 4,708 and Memphis scored 4,654.

Despite starting the season 1-3, the Huskers showed their resiliency by bouncing back to win three of their next four matches, beginning with a weekend sweep in Charleston, S.C., on Oct. 31 and Nov. 1. The Huskers topped NC State 4,666-4,636, on Oct. 31, after dominating in smallbore by more than 20 points. The following day, NU overcame Army West Point 4,663-4,616. Virga fired a 597 in air rifle to break her own record for highest air rifle score ever shot by a freshman, which she set earlier in the season. Additionally, she tied Rachel Martin as the school record holder for highest overall air rifle score (597).

After another off week, Nebraska had its only two home matches of the season. On Nov. 14, the Huskers welcomed the top-ranked Kentucky Wildcats to the NU Rifle Range. The Huskers tallied a higher smallbore score, but the Wildcats got the best of the Huskers in air rifle and defeated NU 4,676-4,645.

The following weekend, Nebraska hosted Akron on Senior Day Nov. 21. The team ended

the fall season on a high note, flying by the Zips 4,670-4,612. The Huskers continued their hot streak in air rifle, firing a score of 2,360, the sixth-best score in school history. Rachel Martin was the top shooter of the day with 596. Denise Martin and Alexandra Lorentz both made a mark during their last home match of the season, firing personal-best air rifle scores of 593 and 591, respectively. Katie Brown and Rachel Yager also notched career-high scores in smallbore, finishing with 556 and 559, respectively. Mical posted a season-high score in smallbore (578).

Nebraska finished the fall season 4-4 and had almost a two-month break before returning to competition.

On Jan. 16, Nebraska traveled to Oxford, Miss., to compete against Murray State and Ole Miss. The Huskers finished with a team score of 4,672. Murray State ended in first with a score of 4,687, while Ole Miss placed third with 4,593. Nina Radulovic earned a personal-high in smallbore (584).

The following weekend, NU faced Murray State in Kentucky, and fell to the Racers 4,691-4,677. Denise Martin and Miller earned personal-best scores; Martin in smallbore (589) and Miller in air rifle (588).

Nebraska continued a series of away matches on Jan. 31 in Columbus, Ohio, where the Huskers knocked off Ohio State 4,674-4,672.

After a week off, Nebraska competed in its final two matches of the regular season in Annapolis, Md. On Feb. 13, NU dominated Ole Miss 4,667-4,631. Freshman Nina Radulovic fired a career-best score of 593 in air rifle against the Rebels.

On Feb. 14, Nebraska had an impressive finish to its regular season, including several personal-best scores, a season-high team score (4,680) and a team victory over Navy. Rachel Martin earned a career-high score (590) in smallbore, while Denise Martin tallied a personal best in air rifle (594). With the win over Navy, Nebraska finished the regular season 8-6, including winning its last three matches.

A week later, the Huskers began postseason action at the NCAA Qualifiers in Murray, Ky., where the team finished second in their session and qualified for the 2016 NCAA Championships for the fourth consecutive season with a score of 4,668.

Nebraska competed at the GARC Championships in Oxford, Miss., Feb. 26-28.

Brown earned a career high in air rifle (575), Marissa Major tied her career-best air rifle score (584) and Virga clinched a career best in smallbore (570) at the championships. As a team, the Huskers finished sixth with 4,638.

Denise Martin and Rachel Martin were recognized for their efforts by the conference. Denise Martin was honored in each of the three categories. The Chewelah, Wash., native earned honorable-mention in smallbore, air rifle and the two combined. It was her third consecutive season earning All-GARC honors. Rachel Martin earned a spot on the second team in smallbore and combined. She was also the Nebraska recipient for the scholar-athlete award. As a team, Nebraska placed third in the conference during the regular season, behind West Virginia and Kentucky.

The Huskers concluded their season at the NCAA Championships in Akron, Ohio, on March 11-12. NU finished eighth with a score of 4,650. West Virginia took home its fourth consecutive national title with a combined score of 4,703.

TCU claimed second (4,694), while Murray State clinched third (4,690).

Denise Martin and Rachel Martin each claimed All-America honors for their tremendous efforts on the rifle range. Both Huskers claimed second-team honors from the NRA in smallbore. Rachel Martin was also named a CRCA honorable-mention All-American (combined).

Rachel Martin returns for her senior season in 2016-17, along with 2015 NRA All-American Jaycee Carter. As the only two seniors, Martin and Carter will serve as primary leaders on a young Husker squad in pursuit of a fifth straight NCAA appearance in 2017.



Jordan Miller competed seven times in smallbore and six times in air rifle for the Huskers as a freshman, firing career-highs of 567 and 588, respectively.

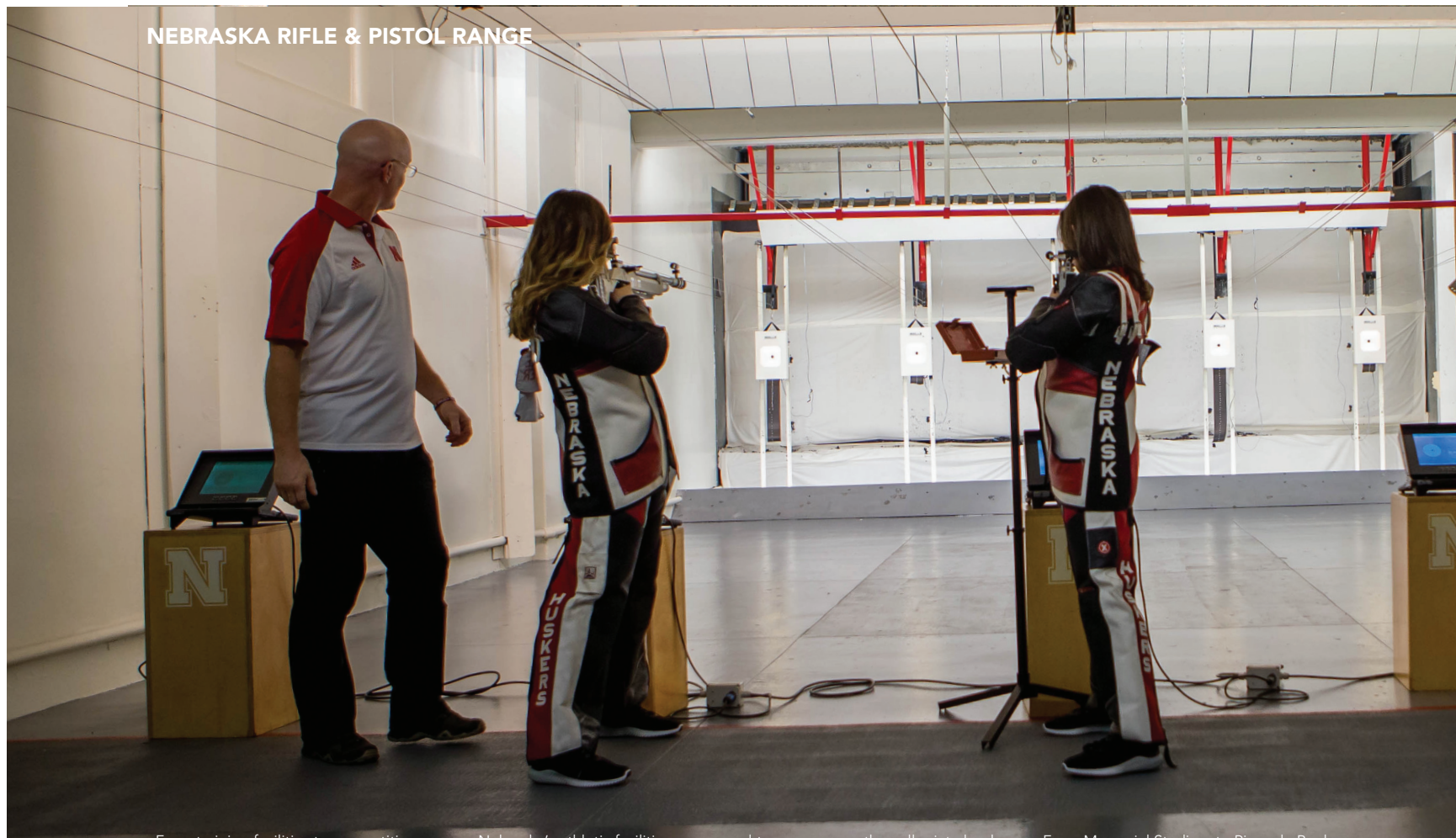

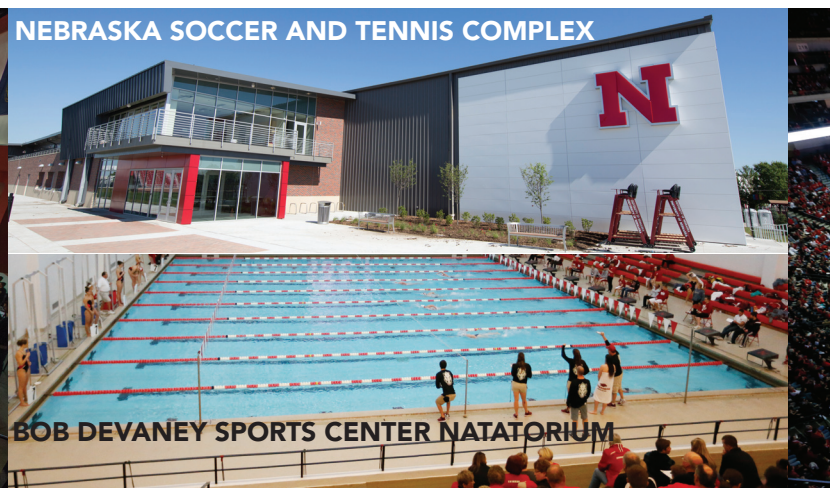
From training facilities to competition venues, Nebraska's athletic facilities are second-to-none across the collegiate landscape. From Memorial Stadium to Pinnacle Bank Arena to the new Nebraska Soccer and Tennis Complex, Husker student-athletes have the benefits of training and competing in state-of-the-art facilities. Fans across the state and region support Husker Athletics, as football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, baseball, men's and women's gymnastics, wrestling, women's soccer and softball all finished in the top-15 nationally in attendance during the 2015-16 year.

In April 2006, Nebraska became just the second university in the nation to add electronic targets to its rifle facilities. First seen only in international and Olympic competition, the electronic targets were added to the U.S. Air Force Academy's facilities before the Huskers adopted the new technology.

Electronic targeting enables shooters to aim at only one target instead of 10 different targets. The machine contains a roll of black paper, which refills the open target with a clean piece of paper after every shot. Four microphones in the electronic targets sense the precision of the shot, transmitting the information to an online computer monitor. One of the nation's finest training facilities, the Nebraska Rifle Range is located in the lower level of the Military and Naval Science Building.

NATIONAL POWERS



The Nebraska volleyball team captured its fourth NCAA title with a win over Texas in the championship match at the CenturyLink Center in Omaha on Dec. 19, 2015. Five Husker volleyball players, including NCAA Tournament Most Outstanding Player Mikaela Foecke, earned All-America honors in 2015. Volleyball's championship was the first of seven top-10 NCAA team finishes for Husker programs in 2015-16.



Ryan Boldt helped the Huskers advance to the 2016 NCAA Tournament. The two-time CoSIDA Academic All-American was chosen in the second round of the 2016 MLB Draft by the Tampa Bay Rays.



Tierra Williams earned a trio of All-America awards in 2016. She finished fifth in the triple jump at the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships. She also swept the Big Ten indoor and outdoor titles in the triple and long jumps.



Nick Percy captured the 2016 NCAA discus crown. The two-time All-American from Ventnor, England, also won the Big Ten discus title to help the Husker men sweep the Big Ten indoor and outdoor championships.



MJ Knighten claimed first-team All-America honors at third base while helping the Nebraska softball team advance to the 2016 NCAA Regional final. Knighten hit .376 with 21 homers and 60 RBIs in 55 games.



Rachel Martin became the Nebraska rifle team's most recent national champion, winning the smallbore title at the 2015 NCAA Rifle Championships. In 2016, the Peralta, N.M., native earned her sixth and seventh career All-America awards.

BIG TEN LEADERS



The Nebraska men's track and field team swept the Big Ten indoor and outdoor titles, giving the Big Red their first sweep since 2004. A total of 19 Huskers combined for 24 All-America awards in men's and women's track and field in 2016.



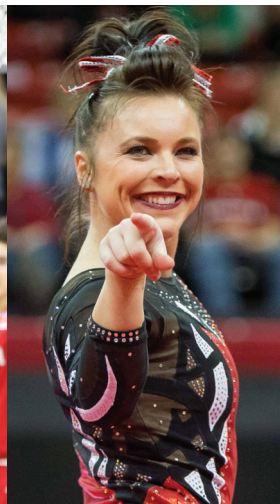
TJ Dudley (184 pounds) took second at the 2016 NCAA Wrestling Championships. NU's Male Athlete of the Year, Dudley helped the Huskers to eighth place for their 20th top-10 team finish in history.



Kadie Rolfzen captured first-team All-America honors as an outside hitter while leading the Nebraska volleyball team to the 2015 NCAA title. Rolfzen, a three-time All-American, was Nebraska's Female Athlete of the Year.



Shavon Shields earned second-team All-Big Ten honors after averaging 16.8 points and 5.1 rebounds in 2015-16. Nebraska's Male Student-Athlete of the Year, Shields was a two-time first-team CoSIDA Academic All-American.



A six-time All-American and two-time Big Ten champion for the Nebraska women's gymnastics team in her career, Holie Blanske took third on vault at the 2016 NCAA Championships to help the Huskers finish eighth.

NATION'S BEST FANS

Nebraska was the only NCAA Division I program to rank in the top 15 nationally in attendance in football and men's basketball in 2015-16. In fact, Nebraska ranked in the top 15 in attendance across 10 sports and drew well over 1.3 million fans in 2015-16.

ATHLETIC MEDICINE



EXCEPTIONAL CARE FOR ALL STUDENT-ATHLETES

Providing expert care to more than 600 Husker student-athletes, Nebraska features one of the most well-trained and highly skilled athletic medicine staffs in the country. Under the guidance of Director of Athletic Medicine Dr. Lonnie Albers, Head Athletic Trainer and Physical Therapist Jerry Weber and Rifle Head Athletic Trainer Tom Dufresne, the 2016-17 Nebraska athletic medicine staff consists of five doctors, 13 full-time athletic trainers, seven graduate assistant athletic trainers, a full-time in-house athletic sports psychologist and sports psychiatry consultants who work directly with student-athletes.

Nebraska's medical facilities have long been among the nation's best, and NU's athletic medicine center within the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex will keep the Huskers on the front line of technology for decades to come. In addition to Nebraska's North Stadium facility, Haymarket Park, the Bob Devaney Sports Center, Pinnacle Bank Arena and the Nebraska Soccer and Tennis Complex all feature athletic medicine areas. The Devaney Center's Athletic Medicine facility underwent an extensive expansion as part of the Hendricks Training Complex addition in 2011.

NAPL: INTEGRATING SPORT



The Nebraska Athletic Performance Laboratory (NAPL) is recognized as the first performance research center within a collegiate department of athletics. The NAPL features a talented, multidisciplinary team that includes a full-time director and endocrinology lab director, two research post-doctoral fellows and a research analyst.

Located in East Memorial Stadium adjacent to UNL's Center for Brain, Biology and Behavior (CB3), the NAPL collaborates with Nebraska's Strength and Conditioning team, Husker Nutrition staff, Nebraska's Athletic Medicine staff and sports programs to offer the highest level of integration of sport performance technologies and systems.

The NAPL is made up of the Mark and Debra Classen Cardio Area, James and Karen Linder Dynamic Performance Center, Markin Family Collaborative Center, Thayer Family Athletic Research Lab and cutting-edge equipment donated by the Suzanne and Walter Scott Foundation. The main entrance for the research facilities is located in the Janet and Gerard Keating Family Concourse.

Focused on student-athlete health, safety and welfare, the NAPL is a world-leading research and performance facility focusing on the performance enhancement, safety and long-term well-being of student-athletes.

The NAPL includes simulated athletic environments for studying performance, incorporating a camera system to track human movement in 3D, force plates to measure ground reaction forces and state-of-the-art technology to assess physiological biomarkers, investigate exercise cardiovascular capacity and measure body composition.

All 24 Husker athletic programs conduct performance testing at NAPL. Force plates and motion capture videos (3D) are used to measure athletes in their development through testing results to create an athletic performance index for each athlete.

The NAPL uses iDexa as an advanced, accurate and reliable method to analyze and measure body composition.

The focus of the Thayer Family Athletic Research Lab is recovery from competition by measuring salivary biomarkers 24 hours prior to and 24 hours post-competition.

Collaborative research projects are conducted in conjunction with the Center for Brain, Biology and Behavior (CB3), including concussion prevention, treatment and return to play.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Nebraska increased its nation-leading total of CoSIDA Academic All-America awards to 325, adding five Huskers in 2015-16. Senior guard Shavon Shields (Olathe, Kan., Biological Sciences) earned his second consecutive first-team Academic All-America award in men's basketball before being named Nebraska's Male Student-Athlete of the Year. Shields (pictured right with Director of Athletics Shawn Eichorst) was also a member of the Allstate NABC Good Works Team for his outstanding community service. He was joined by Nebraska Female Student-Athlete-of-the-Year Mattie Fowler (Tucson, Ariz., Finance) as a first-team Academic All-American in 2015-16. Fowler (pictured below) was the President of the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Board in 2014-15. She and Shields were Nebraska's Big Ten Medal of Honor winners in 2015-16.

The Nebraska men's track and field team continued its extraordinary run of CoSIDA Academic All-America success with three-time first-team honoree Levi Gipson (Lincoln, Neb., Nutrition, Exercise and Health Science) and fellow first-team award winner Cody Rush (Grand Island, Neb., Nutrition Science). Rush, who earned second-team CoSIDA Academic All-America accolades in 2014, joined baseball outfielder Ryan Boldt (Red Wing, Minn., Nutrition Science) as a two-time honoree. Boldt also earned third-team recognition in 2015.

Graduation is the ultimate achievement, and 109 Husker student-athletes earned undergraduate and graduate degrees in three commencement exercises at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16.



A total of 109 Nebraska student-athletes earned their degrees in 2015-16, including 62 in May 2016, 39 in December 2015 and eight in August 2015. Alexandrea Lorentz (above left) earned her bachelor's degree in May after producing a decorated career. A two-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and academic All-Big Ten selection, Lorentz was a three-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team and the winner of a 2015 Nebraska Student-Athlete HERO Leadership Award. Kelsey Hansen (above right) also earned her degree from Nebraska in May of 2016. Hansen was a three-time academic All-Big Ten selection and a three-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.



Eight Huskers earned Outstanding Scholar Awards in 2015-16. The seniors with 3.900 GPAs or better were Melanie Blum (Track and Field), Michaela Cunningham (Swimming and Diving), Levi Gipson (Track and Field), Lane Hovey (Football), Ryan Irick (Men's Gymnastics), Katie Kraeutner (Soccer, pictured above), Ethan Lottman (Men's Gymnastics) and Cody Rush (Track and Field).



In 2015-16, 109 Huskers earned their college degrees including senior track and field standout Levi Gipson. Gipson became just the second three-time first-team CoSIDA Academic All-American across all sports at Nebraska, while adding prestigious NCAA and Big Ten Postgraduate scholarships worth a total of \$15,000. Gipson was also a seven-time All-American on the track.



Nebraska student-athletes regularly earn prestigious postgraduate scholarships from the Big Ten and NCAA. That tradition continued in 2015-16, as two-time CoSIDA Academic All-American Cody Rush earned a \$10,000 Wayne Duke Postgraduate Scholarship from the Big Ten before claiming an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship worth \$7,500. Rush was also an 11-time All-American on the track.



Junior outfielder Ryan Boldt earned his second CoSIDA Academic All-America award in 2016, after helping the Nebraska baseball team to the NCAA Tournament. Boldt, who was a member of the Golden Spikes Award Midseason Watch List, was a second-round pick of the Tampa Bay Rays in the 2016 Major League Baseball Draft.

Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame Inductee (2015)**

The athletic academic unit, located in the Dick and Peg Herman Family Student Life Complex, provides personal and academic support to ensure that student-athletes will get the most out of their years as Huskers. Featuring one of the most innovative and comprehensive academic support systems in the country, Nebraska is dedicated to helping its student-athletes become outstanding leaders in their chosen fields. The academic support team is composed of 14 full-time staff members and is certified by the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics (N4A) as meeting the standards established by the N4A.

ACADEMIC COUNSELING

Seven academic counselors, three learning specialists and two assistant academic counselors are in place to monitor daily academic progress, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/registration process and monitor continuing eligibility and progress toward graduation.

TUTORIAL SUPPORT

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, unlimited tutorial support from approximately 120 tutors on staff is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. The tutorial program is certified as a model tutoring program by the College Reading and Learning Association.

STUDY HALL

Nebraska’s study hall program is housed in the D.J. Sokol Enrichment Center within the Student Life Complex. Student-athletes attend a supervised, flex-time study hall that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student-athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week as determined by their academic counselor and/or coach. Additional performance-based or tutor-based study hall also may be determined by the academic counselor.

MENTORING

Academic support staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes and a select group of returning student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information, and discuss academic success strategies.

EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor, or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a consulting psychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators, and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

COMPUTER RESOURCES

The Herman Student Life Complex has two computer labs available for student-athletes. The Scott Technology Center features two tech tables for use on group computer projects and group study sessions. Additionally, each student-athlete is provided a laptop for use throughout their academic career at Nebraska.

HUSKER STUDENT-ATHLETES

Nebraska Athletics is one of the few self-sustaining athletic programs in the country. In 2015-16, Nebraska was one of only two collegiate programs in the nation to attract more than 1.3 million fans across its seven major team sports through the doors of its world-class facilities. This incredible interest and support enables Nebraska Athletics to invest in the student-athlete experience, as well as the overall game-day experience. Nebraska is a leader in providing all the resources and support necessary for student-athletes to become successful in Academics, Athletics and Life. Nebraska will continue to strategically plan for avenues to strengthen the resources to support more than 600 Husker student-athletes across 24 sports.



In August of 2014, the NCAA Division I Board of Directors restructured the way member institutions and conferences, including the Big Ten, govern themselves. Nebraska has a great history and tradition of providing first-class benefits and support to our student-athletes. This change in governance, and subsequent legislation, has paved the way for Nebraska to enhance the benefits and experiences for our student-athletes even further. A few examples of these enhanced benefits are:

- All scholarship student-athletes across all sports will have their scholarship calculated based on the full cost of attendance.
- Every student-athlete receives an Apple MacBook Air laptop computer to enhance their learning opportunities (pictured top).
- Nebraska has increased resources and support in all academic and performance related areas including but not limited to Academic Services, Life Skills, Athletic Medicine, Athletic Training, Strength and Conditioning, Nutrition and Dining Services (Training Table).
- Nebraska created the first-known post-eligibility benefit program, where every student-athlete, who has graduated and exhausted their athletic eligibility, will have the opportunity to pursue an internship, participate in a study abroad program or attend graduate school with Nebraska's support.



ATHLETIC MEDICINE: CARING FOR HUSKERS

Nebraska's Athletic Medicine facilities rank among the nation's best, while one of the most experienced medical staffs in the nation care for all Husker student-athletes. Nebraska's medical team consists of 13 full-time athletic trainers and seven graduate assistant trainers, led by Associate Athletic Director Dr. Lonnie Albers (kneeling far left), Head Athletic Trainer and Physical Therapist Jerry Weber and Head Rifle Athletic Trainer Tom Dufresne. A full staff of orthopaedists is also available to the Huskers, led by Dr. Richard Dugas (pictured back in white). The Husker Athletic Medicine team also includes a full-time, in-house athletic psychologist, and sports psychiatry consultants who work directly with Husker student-athletes.

SPORTS NUTRITION

LEWIS TRAINING TABLE

Husker student-athletes have ample places to dine, as the Lewis Training Table is open extended hours for meals, while the North Stadium and Hendricks Training Complexes have areas for supplements for recovery after workouts or for snacks throughout the day. Nebraska's three full-time sports dietitians work with the Lewis Training Table manager and executive chef to plan and prepare meals to help maximize performance for student-athletes. Nebraska's individual nutritional counseling focuses on performance nutrition strategies, hydration, quality food choices and proper supplementation to help student-athletes reach their full potential.



ACADEMIC EXPERIENCE

More than 600 student-athletes, including wide receiver Stanley Morgan Jr., benefit not only from Nebraska's full cost of attendance scholarships and the MacBook Air program, but also the amazing facilities and staff support within the Dick and Peg Herman Family Student Life Complex. Nebraska leads the nation in CoSIDA Academic All-America and NCAA Today's Top Ten awards.



ATHLETIC EXPERIENCE

Nebraska's strength and conditioning has long been at the forefront of college athletics. Under the direction of Boyd Epley, Nebraska has a staff of 14 strength coaches, including football strength coach Mark Philipp, who creates personalized strength and conditioning programs for Husker student-athletes.



LIFE SKILLS EXPERIENCE

The Husker Life Skills program allows student-athletes to continue their development and impact lives in the community. In 2015-16, Husker student-athletes, including Nina Radulovic (pictured above), completed more than 400 outreach activities while volunteering nearly 6,500 hours to impact approximately 25,000 people in Nebraska communities.

LIFE SKILLS

PROACTIVE EDUCATION

The Life Skills team organizes several orientations aimed at acclimating student-athletes to college life. Additionally, all incoming student-athletes attend the fall semester Husker Life Seminar. This interactive class promotes responsible decision-making, personal brand, financial literacy, leadership, involvement and service.

INDIVIDUAL MEETINGS

Every Nebraska student-athlete is assigned a Life Skills Coordinator who will arrange multiple individual meetings throughout the academic year aimed at enhancing personal and career development. The meetings help each student-athlete identify a career focus and implement a plan to increase career marketability.

CAREER COMMITMENT

Annually, Nebraska Life Skills organizes a Student-Athlete Career, Networking Night (pictured bottom right) and other career events aimed at connecting Huskers with companies desiring competitive, hard-working, accountable candidates. Athlete Network and Husker Hire Link provide opportunities to explore career opportunities across the country.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Nebraska student-athletes readily accept the role-model challenge, collectively giving more than 6,500 hours annually to impact thousands across the state of Nebraska. Outreach events include but are not limited to hospital visits, mentoring, school assemblies, statewide rallies (including the Sportsmanship 4 Life Pep Rally, pictured opposite page, bottom left), Make-A-Wish, NFL Play 60 and Husker Heroes.

LEADERSHIP

Nebraska Life Skills provides student-athletes with countless opportunities to enhance leadership skills while distinguishing themselves from the competition. Student-athletes can be members of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, Uplifting Athletes Chapter or Husker Distinction Council. UNL offers more than 600 recognized student organizations allowing athletes to collaborate with other campus leaders for common goals. Nebraska Life Skills funds and coordinates an annual one-week service abroad trip that allows 20 student-athletes to work together toward a common goal while enriching cultural competencies.

RECOGNITION

In 2015-16, eight Husker Rifle student-athletes were named to both the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team for completing a minimum of six service projects in the calendar year. A host of other recognition opportunities at the institutional, Big Ten and NCAA levels that all reflect the high ideals, character and servant leadership nurtured through community involvement also are available.

POST-ELIGIBILITY OPPORTUNITIES

Effective December 2015 and beyond, student-athletes who letter and graduate will have a three-year window to benefit from one of three post-eligibility opportunities each valued at \$7,500. Upon completion of required seminars, graduates can either study abroad, complete an internship or begin graduate school within the University of Nebraska system.

DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

The Life Skills program also is responsible for all Diversity and Inclusion initiatives for Husker Athletics. The first Diversity and Inclusion Summit occurred in January of 2016 and reached all student-athletes and staff members with a message of acceptance and unity.

FOCUS ON SUCCESS IN LIFE OUTSIDE OF ATHLETICS

Regarded as the premier and most comprehensive Life Skills program in college athletics, the Husker program is committed to providing proactive education, resources and support through college and beyond to promote total person development and preparation for life after sports. Led by Senior Associate Athletic Director Keith Zimmer, five full-time staff members coordinate community involvement, career planning, effective communication strategies and much more to benefit Husker student-athletes, including Rachel Yager and Nina Radulovic, pictured below.



RED CARPET EXPERIENCE

Members of the Nebraska rifle team reveled in the red carpet experience of "A Night at the Lied", Nebraska's annual academic and life skills awards banquet in April of 2016. The University of Nebraska was chartered by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869 as the state's public university and land-grant institution. Founded in Lincoln, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a state educational system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration. Nebraska, which joined the Big Ten Conference in 2011, is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance, a consortium of Big Ten universities and the University of Chicago, which has generated unique opportunities for students and faculty by sharing expertise, leveraging resources and collaborating on programs.

BIG TEN ACADEMIC ALLIANCE (BTAA)

As a member of the Big Ten, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation, which is the academic consortium of the universities in the Big Ten Conference. The consortium was renamed on June 29, 2016. The BTAA includes all 14 Big Ten Institutions and the University of Chicago. The Big Ten Academic Alliances and the institutions together have annual research expenditures topping \$10.2 billion — more than the Ivy League and the University of California System combined — and they educate a total of nearly 600,000 students with approximately 50,000 full-time faculty members.

OMAHA, NEBRASKA

Nebraska's largest city, Omaha and its metro-area, is less than an hour's drive from Lincoln and has a population of approximately 900,000. Omaha is home to TD Ameritrade Park, the NCAA College World Series and the world-renowned Henry Doorly Zoo.



NEBRASKA RIFLE

Nebraska rifle continues to build a tradition that rivals the Huskers' most successful programs. Entering its 19th season as a varsity sport at Nebraska, the Husker rifle team has produced 10 top-six team finishes at the NCAA Championships, including a runner-up performance at the 2006 NCAA Championships.

In 2005, the Huskers fired their way to a third-place showing at the NCAA Championships, before adding a fifth-place team finish in 2007. Nebraska made it five consecutive top-five NCAA finishes by taking fourth in 2008.

The Huskers made four consecutive appearances at the NCAA Championships in 2013, 2014, 2015 and 2016, finishing in the top eight each time (2013-7th, 2014-5th, 2015-4th, 2016-8th). In addition, three Huskers have claimed individual national titles.

The NU Rifle Range features 10 firing points with caswell shooting stalls and electronic targets. Movable target carriers, which are controlled at the firing line, allow targets to be placed at any distance up to a maximum firing distance of 50 feet. Permanent stops for the targets are located at 10 meters and at 50 feet for NCAA air rifle and smallbore competition.
