**SCHEDULE NOTES**

The Nebraska wrestling team will face another challenging season as the 2023-24 slate features 11 of the top-25 finishers from last season's NCAA Championships, Coach Mark Manning announced on Monday.

The Huskers will kick off the season on the road against North Dakota State on Nov. 4. NU will then return home to host Campbell on Friday, Nov. 10 before traveling to Annapolis, Md., for the Navy Classic on Saturday, Nov. 18.

NU will stay on the road and compete at the Cliff Keen Invite in Las Vegas on Dec. 1-2. The Huskers will conclude the 2023 year as they host South Dakota State on Saturday, Dec. 16. The team will then remain home to begin the year as NU hosts Wyoming and Northern Iowa on Saturday, Jan. 6.

Conference competition will feature eight duals, four home and four away, with Big Ten action beginning with Nebraska's home opener against Iowa on Friday, Jan. 12. Minnesota will then host the Huskers in Minneapolis on Friday, Jan. 19 before NU returns home to host Purdue on Sunday, Jan. 21.

The following weekend NU kicks off a two-match road stint as it faces Northwestern on Friday, Jan. 26 and Wisconsin on Sunday, Jan. 28, before returning home to host Illinois on Sunday, Feb. 4 and Michigan on Friday, Feb. 9.

NU will close out Big Ten regular season action on the road with a dual against Penn State on Sunday, Feb. 18, before traveling to Arizona to face ASU on Sunday, Feb. 25 to wrap up the regular season.

The Big Ten Championships will be hosted by Maryland on Saturday, March 9 and Sunday, March 10. The NCAA Championships will be in Kansas City, Mo., Thursday, March 21 through Saturday, March 23.

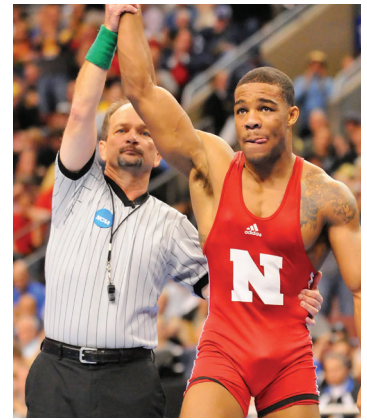


# THIS IS NEBRASKA

The Nebraska wrestling program continues its excellence both on and off the mat. Coach Mark Manning has continued a tradition of success in his 23 years at the helm of the Huskers. With hard work and a dedication to excellence, Manning has developed a program that consistently competes with the nation's best in collegiate wrestling.

Since its inaugural season in 1910-11, Nebraska has earned more than 700 dual victories, including 282 wins under Manning. Over the past 23 years, the Huskers have finished in the top 10 at the NCAA Championships 12 times and racked up 70 All-America honors, including five individual national titles. In the classroom, NU wrestlers have earned 73 NWCA All-Academic Team selections en route to seven CoSIDA Academic All-America awards.

One reason NU has been able to develop such a successful program is its top-notch facilities. In the fall of 2011, the Husker wrestling program moved into the state-of-the-art Hendricks Training Complex, which provides three full-sized practice mats, office suites and areas for both strength and conditioning and athletic medicine. The Hendricks Complex is attached to the Devaney Center, which hosts the majority of Nebraska's duals this season. With a wealth of support and a history of success, Nebraska wrestling expects to contend for conference and national championships every year.

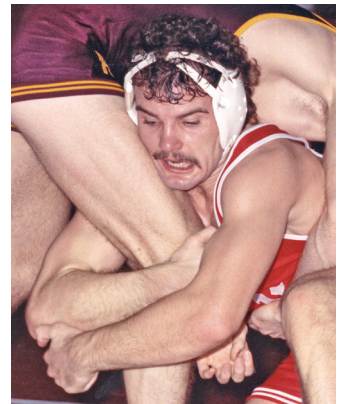
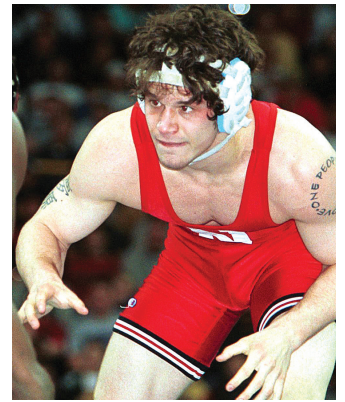


# SUCCESS BEYOND WRESTLING

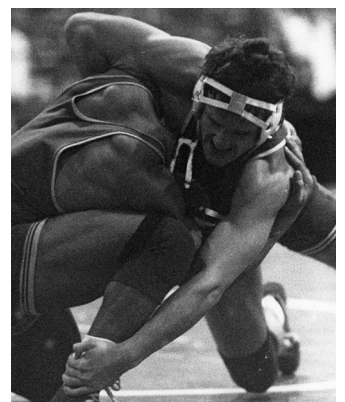

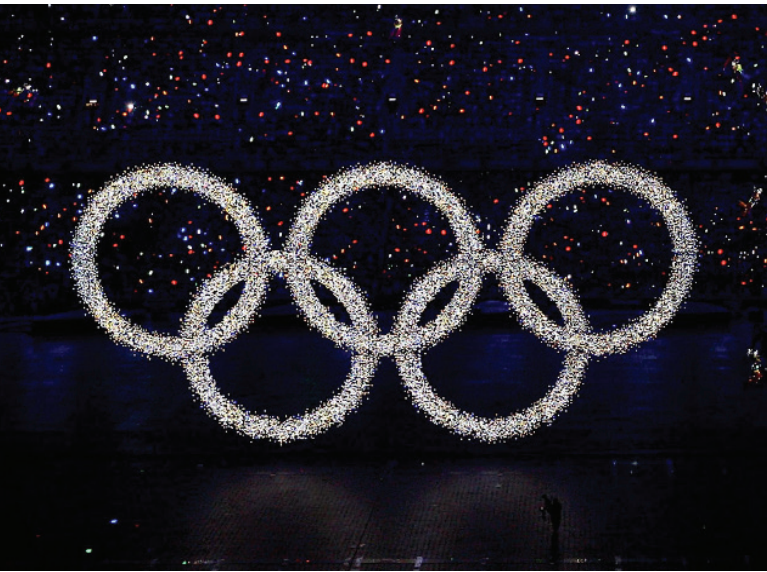

# OLYMPIC GLORY

Nebraska wrestling has climbed its way into the Olympic spotlight during the past several Olympics. Former Huskers who have continued their careers on the international stage include 2012 freestyle gold medalist and 2016 Olympian Jordan Burroughs and two-time Olympic medal-winner Rulon Gardner, who won a gold medal in 2000 and a bronze in 2004 in Greco-Roman. Overall, seven Nebraska wrestlers have participated on eight U.S. Olympic teams and claimed six medals.

A three-time All-American and two-time national champion for Nebraska, Jordan Burroughs (top) won the gold medal in freestyle at 163 pounds at the 2012 Olympics in London. He also wrestled at the 2016 Games in Rio.

A 1993 All-American at heavyweight for Nebraska, Rulon Gardner (middle) pulled off one of the most remarkable upsets in sports history with his victory over previously undefeated Alexander Karelin of Russia in the gold medal match in the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia. Gardner also earned a bronze medal in the 2004 Olympics in Athens, Greece.

Matt Lindland (bottom) was a 1993 Big Eight champion for Nebraska and went on to earn a silver medal at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia. He is currently the head coach of the U.S. Greco-Roman team.



# INTERNATIONAL EXCELLENCE



Numerous Nebraska wrestlers have continued their careers on the international stage after their time at NU. Most recently, Jordan Burroughs competed at the 2022 World Championships in Belgrade, Serbia. Burroughs earned the gold medal at 79 kg, which made him the most decorated champion in U.S. wrestling history with a freestyle record of seven World and Olympic Championships combined. Prior to the 2021 World Championships, Burroughs and James Green also helped the United States to its first World Cup title since 2003, going a combined 7-1 at the 2018 UWW Freestyle World Cup in Iowa City, Iowa, for a Team USA that also featured former Nebraska Assistant Coach Kendric Maple.

Huskers have won 25 medals at the World Championships, including titles by Bill Scherr in 1985, Rulon Gardner in 2001 and Burroughs in 2011, 2013, 2015 and 2017. Green also medaled for the United States in 2015, when he took bronze in freestyle at 70 kg. Brad Vering was named the 2007 Greco-Roman Wrestler of the Year by USA Wrestling after his silver-medal performance at the 2007 World Championships.

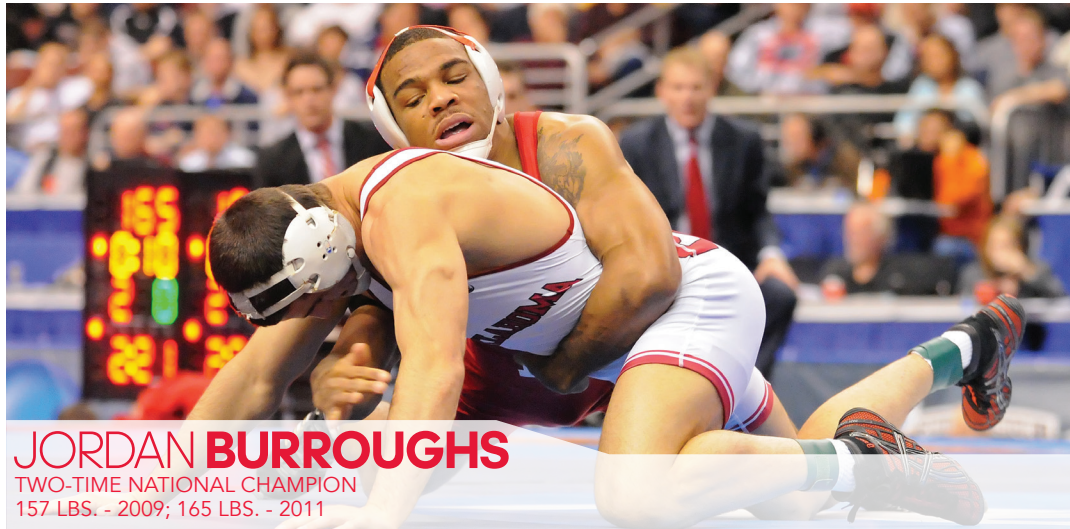
# NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

One of the nation's premier wrestling programs, Nebraska has produced 11 national champions, including five in the last 23 years. Husker wrestlers have earned 131 All-America honors, including 96 awards since 1990 and 70 since Coach Mark Manning took the reins of the program in 2000-01.

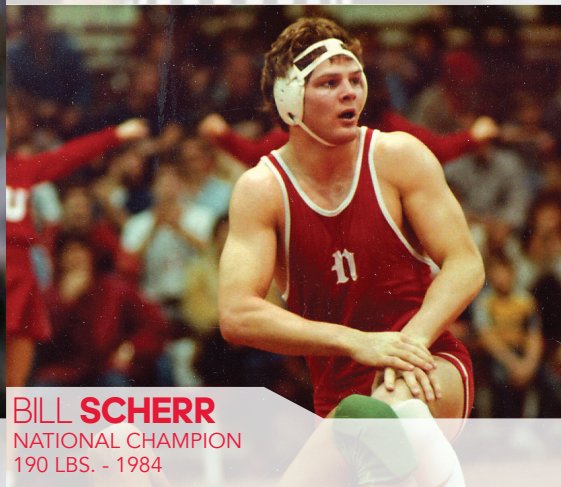

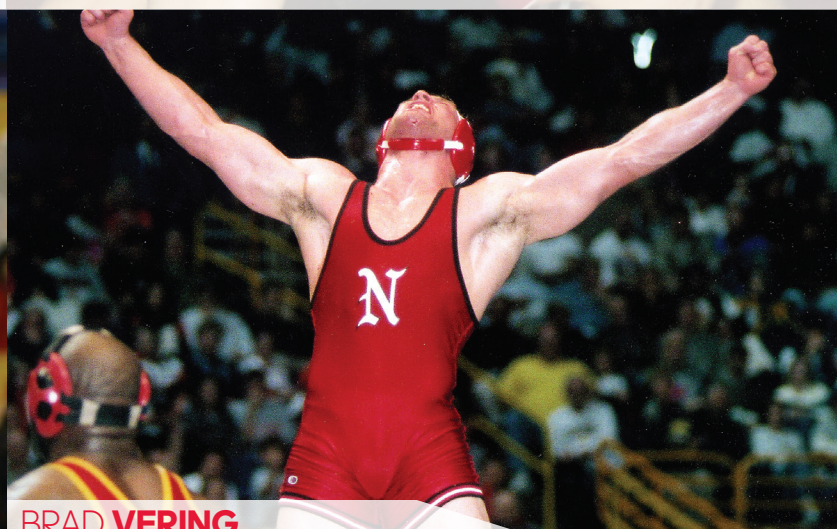

# BOB DEVANEY SPORTS CENTER



Nebraska Wrestling has hosted nearly all of its home duals at the Bob Devaney Sports Center since moving into the masterfully renovated facility from the NU Coliseum in 2013-14.

The Huskers ranked 11th nationally in home attendance during the 2022-23 season according to The Open Mat with an average of 2,514 fans over six home duals. The Huskers attracted a total of 15,082 fans over the course of six duals, including a season-high 3,821 fans in the dual against Minnesota on Jan. 13, 2023.

In addition to hosting duals, the Devaney Center and Hendricks Training Complex house the wrestling offices, locker room, weight room, wrestling room and athletic areas all just steps from each other, providing an atmosphere conducive to elite training.

# HENDRICKS TRAINING COMPLEX



The Nebraska wrestling program experienced some major facility improvements in the fall of 2011, starting with the addition of the Hendricks Training Complex.

The Hendricks Training Complex provides three full-sized practice mats, office suites and areas for both strength and conditioning and athletic medicine attached to the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The facility was completed in October of 2011.

# HEAD COACH MARK MANNING



The all-time winningest wrestling coach in program history, Nebraska Head Coach Mark Manning enters his 24th season as the head coach of the Huskers in 2023-24. Since 2000, Manning's squads have racked up a total of 282 dual wins, 12 top-10 NCAA finishes and one conference championship. Under Manning, Husker wrestlers have won five national championships and 68 All-America awards. Manning continues to coach freestyle wrestlers and former Huskers Jordan Burroughs and James Green, leading the pair to a combined 10 Olympic and World Championship medals.

**ACADEMIC COUNSELING**

Eight academic counselors, three learning specialists, two assistant academic counselors and one administrative assistant are in place to monitor daily academic progress, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/registration process and monitor eligibility and progress toward graduation.

**TUTORIAL SUPPORT**

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, unlimited tutorial support from approximately 75-100 tutors on staff is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. Tutorial support is provided both in-person and virtually. Nebraska's tutorial program is certified as a model tutoring program by the College Reading and Learning Association.

**STUDY HALL**

Student-athletes attend a supervised, flex-time study hall within the Herman Student Life Complex that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student-athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week as determined by their academic counselor and/or coach. Additional performance-based or tutor-based study hall also may be determined by the academic counselor.

**MENTORING**

Academic staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information and discuss academic success strategies.

**EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS**

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor, or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a consulting neuropsychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

**STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION**

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators, and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

**PERSONAL COUNSELING**

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

**COMPUTER RESOURCES**

All student-athletes are provided the opportunity to have a laptop for use during their academic career at Nebraska. The Herman Student Life Complex has printers and desktop computers available for student-athletes to use in the facility.

Chartered in Lincoln by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a university system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration. The flagship University of Nebraska-Lincoln is an educational institution of international stature. Nebraska is classified within the Carnegie "R1: Doctoral Universities – Highest Research Activity" category. Nebraska is also a land-grant university and a member of the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities. The university is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission.

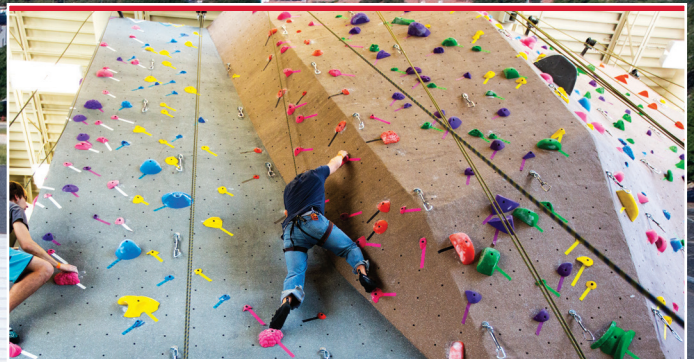

**MARK MANNING**  
HEAD COACH | 24TH SEASON

With more than 100 years of history, Nebraska wrestling is one of the most storied programs in the collegiate wrestling ranks. Head Coach Mark Manning has taken the Huskers to new heights during his tenure and has established himself as one of the top wrestling coaches in the nation.

The NU record book is a testament to Manning's accomplishments in Lincoln. In his 23 years at the helm, he has coached 70 of Nebraska's 131 All-Americans. He has led the Huskers to eight top-eight finishes at the NCAA Championships, compared to just eight for the 14 NU coaches before him. He became the winningest coach in school history on Feb. 21, 2015 when he picked up his 200th win at Nebraska. He won back-to-back Big 12 Coach-of-the-Year awards (2008, 2009) after guiding Nebraska to a share of the conference crown in 2009 and a runner-up finish in 2008. Manning has also guided four wrestlers to five individual NCAA championships.

Manning earned one of the top coaching honors in the entire sport when he was named the 2011 FILA Freestyle Coach of the Year by USA Wrestling after helping Jordan Burroughs capture the gold medal at the World Championships in Istanbul, Turkey. In 2015, Manning received the honor for a second time, as Burroughs earned another world title and a spot on the U.S. Olympic Team. Burroughs reached the pinnacle of the sport, earning Olympic gold in 2012, while winning world titles in 2011, 2013, 2015, 2017, 2021 and 2022 with Manning in his corner. Manning has also overseen the growth of James Green, who earned world bronze in 2015 and silver in 2017. Manning and Nebraska Associate Head Coach Bryan Snyder were honored as the Terry McCann Award winners as USA Wrestling's Freestyle Co-Coaches of the Year in 2017 for their accomplishments.

Records go on paper and in books and get tucked away. More important to Manning is the fact that he has helped numerous young men grow into upstanding adults by teaching them the correct principles of life. Regarded as one of the nation's top recruiters, Manning has a keen eye for finding the athletes with the right work ethic and dedication that he can develop.

Manning's coaching philosophy is one that he began during his competitive days, developed during his time as an assistant coach and continues to modify during his time as head coach at Nebraska. It focuses on developing wrestlers to reach their potential. A wrestler who brings a positive attitude and work ethic to the room can use goal setting and responsibility to develop into an upstanding citizen who is committed to excellence. Manning works daily with the team on every detail in and out of practice, while keeping in mind the best long-term interests of his student-athletes.

Known for his fiery nature on the edge of the mat, Manning instills in his wrestlers a sense of determination and pride through his actions and demeanor. His guidance teaches his athletes to become winners in life, which translates into success in the classroom, on the mat and in their lives beyond wrestling.

In addition to their success on the mat, Husker wrestlers under Manning have earned 116 academic all-conference selections, including 109 Academic All-Big Ten awards during Nebraska's membership in the conference. In 2012, Nebraska turned in the nation's best team grade-point average (3.46). Manning's beliefs and values in developing student-athletes are evident right outside his office, where Snyder, a former Husker All-American, is a member of the NU staff.

### MANNING'S MARK AT NEBRASKA

Manning began teaching his methods immediately when he was hired at Nebraska in May of 2000. His efforts first paid dividends when he led Nebraska to back-to-back eighth-place team finishes at the NCAA Championships in 2001 and 2002. Four Huskers (Snyder, Todd Beckerman, Ati Conner and Brad Vering) claimed All-America honors in Manning's first year coaching the Huskers in 2000-01, as NU finished with an 11-6 dual record. Powell and Snyder also gave Manning his first two Big 12 Conference champions that year.

During the 2001-02 season, Manning led the Huskers to their third consecutive third-place finish at the Big 12 Championships. Justin Ruiz and Powell earned their first All-America accolades under Manning, while Snyder became Nebraska's first four-time All-American with his second-place finish at 157 pounds.

Nebraska claimed a 16-7 dual record in 2002-03, as Manning guided NU to seven victories over ranked opponents, including a 20-17 victory over fifth-ranked Illinois at the Virginia Duals. At the 2003 NCAA Championships, Manning led a young lineup that included two juniors, five sophomores and three redshirt freshmen to a 13th-place showing. The finish marked the eighth time in nine seasons that NU had claimed a spot in the top 15 in the nation.

The 2003-04 Huskers and Manning posted one of the best wrestling seasons ever at NU with a 19-3 overall record, tying the second-highest win total in NU history. The Huskers posted two team titles during the season, winning the prestigious Las Vegas Invitational behind individual titles from Powell, Travis Shufelt and Travis Pascoe and winning the Virginia Duals with a 25-13 victory over Lehigh in the finals. Manning directed the Huskers to second at the Big 12 Championships, while qualifying eight wrestlers for the NCAA Tournament, where NU earned a fifth-place finish. Manning coached his first national champion at Nebraska, as Powell claimed the title at 125 pounds with a 17-2 technical fall in the finals.

The Huskers' success continued in 2004-05, with Nebraska winning 19 duals for the second straight year. NU's 19-2-1 dual record was the second-best mark in school history. The Huskers started the campaign with eight straight dual wins, and ended the season by winning 12 of the last 13 duals. Nebraska posted eight wins over ranked foes, including a 16-15 upset of No. 2 Iowa State to end the dual season.

Manning's 2005-06 squad was relatively inexperienced, but the Huskers earned a solid 12-5 dual record and a third-place finish at the National Duals. NU claimed third at the Big 12 Championships and two Huskers went on to finish as All-Americans. Manning's legacy continued to grow in 2006-07, as he watched his second Husker claim a national title. Paul Donahoe earned the crown at 125 pounds after helping Nebraska to a 10-7-1 dual record.

The 2007-08 Husker campaign was one of the best ever under Manning. NU finished second at the Big 12 Championships with three individual champions and claimed fourth at the NCAA Championships with five Huskers finishing as All-Americans. That success would no doubt be a challenge to match, but the 2008-09 Nebraska wrestling team did just that. The Huskers won a share of the Big 12 championship for the first time in school history behind individual titles from Burroughs, Brandon Browne, Craig Brester and Vince Jones. Seven NU wrestlers qualified for the NCAA Championships, where the Huskers finished fourth with All-America accolades going to Burroughs (1st at 157), Brester (2nd at 197), Browne (4th at 174) and Jones (6th at 184). For his work with the 2009 squad, Manning was named Dan Gable Coach of the Year by WIN Magazine.

In 2010, Nebraska fought through a rash of injuries, including a season-ending setback to Burroughs. Despite the unfortunate luck, the Huskers still qualified five wrestlers for the NCAA Championships and finished 12th in the team standings, marking the seventh top-15 finish under Manning.

History was made in 2011, when Manning helped Burroughs become the first two-time national champion in school history by winning the

165-pound title at the NCAA Championships in Philadelphia, Pa. After the season, Burroughs was awarded the school's first-ever Hodge Trophy, given annually to the nation's top wrestler. As a team, the Huskers qualified seven total wrestlers for the national tournament and finished in 12th place for the second consecutive season.

In 2011-12, the Huskers finished 21st at the NCAA Championships as two wrestlers (Josh Ihnen and James Green) earned All-America accolades. Senior Tucker Lane also became the 20th member of Nebraska's 100-win club.

In 2012-13, Robert Kokesh led Nebraska with a 38-4 record and a third-place finish at the NCAA Championships at 174 pounds. Green captured his second consecutive All-America honor at 157 pounds to help NU to a 13th-place finish. Ihnen fell one match short of All-America status but picked up his 100th collegiate win at the national tournament. He also earned CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, and helped the Huskers to an 11-6 dual record.

Green and Kokesh repeated as All-Americans in 2014, as Green took third at 157 pounds and Kokesh earned a fourth-place finish at 174. The pair also took home Big Ten titles, becoming the first Husker champions in three seasons as members of the conference. The Huskers returned to the newly renovated Devaney Center for all of their home duals after years of wrestling at the NU Coliseum. NU finished the dual season with a 12-2 record before finishing 11th at the NCAA Championships.

In 2014-15, the Huskers notched a ninth-place finish at the NCAA Championships, marking the 19th top-10 result in school history and first since 2009. Kokesh and Green each collected third-place finishes, while TJ Dudley earned his first All-America honor with an eighth-place showing at 184 pounds. During the dual season, NU set a school record for winning percentage (.933) after a 14-1 season, which included a tie for second in the Big Ten dual standings.

Dudley repeated as an All-American in 2015-16, this time making it to the NCAA Finals at 184 pounds. His runner-up finish led the team, which produced two additional All-Americans, Eric Montoya and Austin Wilson. As a team, NU finished eighth at the NCAA Championships and fourth at the Big Ten Championships. For the first time since 1995, NU qualified all 10 wrestlers for the national tournament. The Huskers posted an 11-6 record overall, going 5-4 in Big Ten duals.

The Huskers had four All-Americans to finish ninth as a team at the 2017 NCAA Championships. Dudley finished third to capture his third All-America honor. Montoya took sixth to finish his career as a two-time All-American. Aaron Studebaker and Tyler Berger each made the podium for the first time. Nebraska finished fourth at the Big Ten Championships after going 12-4 during the dual season.

Nebraska posted another top-10 finish at the NCAA Championships in 2018, as the Huskers placed ninth with three All-Americans. Berger earned his second All-America honor, as he finished third, while Taylor Venz and Chad Red Jr. became the first pair of freshmen to earn All-America honors for NU in the same season, as Venz placed fourth and Red took seventh. The Huskers went 10-4 on the dual season and placed fifth at the Big Ten Championships after returning just two starters from the 2017 team.

The Huskers stretched their streak of top-10 NCAA finishes to five in 2019. The Huskers placed 10th with four All-Americans. Tyler Berger earned his third All-America honor with a runner-up finish at the NCAA Championships. Red earned All-America honors for the second consecutive season with an eighth-place finish while freshman Mikey Labriola capped off a stellar debut

campaign by finishing sixth. Isaiah White placed fifth as a junior. The Huskers went 12-5 on the dual season and placed fifth at the Big Ten Championships.

The 2019-20 campaign featured incredible highs and difficult-to-fathom lows. The early portion of the season saw the Huskers climb as high as No. 2 in the NWCA Division I Coaches Poll, tying the highest ranking in program history. NU capped a remarkable two-day run in Las Vegas by winning its third Cliff Keen Invitational team title in program history. The team showed incredible resilience, rebounding from a three-meet losing streak (all against Top 10-opponents) to defeat No. 3 Ohio State at the Devaney Center, the program’s first win over a Top-three team since 2008. The Huskers ultimately ended the regular season on a six-match winning streak and carried that positive momentum to the Big Ten Championships, where the Big Red placed second, the program’s best finish as a member of the Big Ten Conference. NU qualified all 10 starters for the NCAA Championships but none of them had the chance to take the mat in Minneapolis as the tournament was canceled due to concerns regarding the spread of the coronavirus. All told, the Huskers finished the season 11-3, marking Coach Manning’s 10th consecutive 10-win campaign and the 18th time in 20 seasons Manning’s Huskers amassed at least 10 victories.

**THE ROAD TO LINCOLN**

Manning showed his ability to develop a top-notch program was universal, as he led a turnaround in the tradition-rich Northern Iowa program in his first head coaching position. Manning coached three seasons for the Panthers from 1997 to 2000 in Cedar Falls. Under Manning, UNI compiled a 23-24-2 dual record and improved its mark in each of his three seasons. His rebuilding effort with the Panthers included strong showings at the NCAA Championships. Northern Iowa tied for 30th in Manning’s first year, but improved to a 17th-place showing in 1998 and added an 11th-place finish at nationals, which was the school’s best showing in seven seasons.

Individually, several UNI wrestlers excelled on the national stage under Manning. In each of his last two seasons, the Panthers had a pair of All-Americans, including Tony Davis. A two-time NCAA finalist, Davis was the national champion at 149 pounds in 2000 and finished second in 1999.

Manning returned the Northern Iowa program to national prominence by attracting some of the nation’s top wrestling talent. His first Panther recruiting class was ranked second in the nation, while his second class was tabbed as the top class in the country





in 2000.

Before his appointment as the head coach at UNI, Manning had extensive experience as an assistant coach, including ties to the Big 12 Conference. Manning spent four seasons on Jack Spates' staff at Oklahoma from 1993 to 1997 before accepting Northern Iowa's head position. Manning helped guide the Sooners to three top-10 team finishes at the NCAA Championships during his tenure, including a seventh-place showing at the 1997 national tournament. He assisted in coaching 14 OU wrestlers to All-America accolades, and five Sooners to the NCAA finals. John Kading also claimed the 1996 190-pound title under him. Manning aided in the recruitment of three top-five national recruiting classes while in Norman.

Manning began his coaching career as an assistant at North Carolina from 1985 to 1993. While pursuing his master's degree in sports administration, Manning assisted Coach Bill Lam in guiding 15 Tar Heel wrestlers to All-America honors, including four NCAA finalists and a pair of national champions. UNC posted top-10 NCAA finishes in 1986, 1987 and 1993 with Manning on staff, and captured four Atlantic Coast Conference titles. He also helped attract the nation's top recruiting class to Chapel Hill, N.C., in the spring of 1990.

In addition to his extensive collegiate coaching experience, Manning has been selected numerous times to coach the United States in international competition. He has coached on U.S. Olympic teams as an assistant in 1996, 2000, 2012 and 2016, while also being named the head coach at U.S. Olympic Festivals in 1991, 1993 and 1995. Manning was chosen to head the U.S. freestyle team at the 2001 FILA World Championships and was an assistant on the U.S. delegation to the FILA World Championships eight times. He has also been active at the FILA Junior level, serving as the head coach twice, and traveling to the 2008 FILA Junior World Championships in Turkey as an assistant coach, where he coached Burroughs to a 10th-place finish. In 2009, Manning was a coach for the U.S. Freestyle World Team at the World Wrestling Championships in Herning, Denmark.

**MOLDING MANNING**

Manning had plenty of experience to build his coaching philosophies, as he was one of the top wrestlers in the nation during his competitive career. Manning wrestled collegiately at Nebraska for one year, before transferring to the University of Nebraska-Omaha. After redshirting a season, Manning went on to become a two-time NCAA Division II national champion and three-time All-American under Coach Mike Denney. Manning posted a 121-23 record for the Mavericks, while capturing titles at 150 pounds in 1983 and 1985. Manning helped UNO earn a third-place team finish in 1983 and runner-up honors in 1985. While competing for the Mavericks, he was the leader of UNO's chapter of Fellowship of Christian Athletes for four years. Manning was inducted into the NCAA Division II Hall of Fame for his accomplishments as a wrestler and coach in 1999.

Manning's competitive career also extended beyond the collegiate ranks. He was a member of the U.S. freestyle team from 1986 to 1989. He won a silver medal at the 1989 Pan American Games.

The Vermillion, S.D., native received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Nebraska-Omaha in 1985, with a specialization in exercise science. Manning was the recipient of an NCAA postgraduate scholarship

**BRYAN SNYDER**  
ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH | 15TH SEASON

Bryan Snyder enters his 15th season as a coach for the Nebraska wrestling program and his 13th season as associate head coach in 2023-24. Since returning to the NU staff in 2011, Snyder has helped turn Nebraska's middle weight classes into national powers, as Huskers at the weight classes of 157, 165, 174 and 184 have earned a total of 30 All-America honors since 2011.

Snyder was the 2017 Terry McCann Award winner as USA Wrestling's Freestyle Co-Coach of the Year, and serves alongside Nebraska Head Coach Mark Manning as personal coaches for Jordan Burroughs and James Green, in addition to his duties with the NU wrestling team.

From 2011-12 to 2022-23, Snyder has assisted in helping the Huskers rack up 42 All-America honors. Mikey Labriola became the first five-time All-American in Husker wrestling history, Green earned All-America accolades four times, while Robert Kokesh and TJ Dudley each ended their careers as three-time All-Americans. Green and Kokesh also collected the first two Big Ten titles in school history in 2014, Kokesh added a second one in 2015 and Silas Allred tallied another in 2023.

In 2019-20, Snyder helped Nebraska to a second-place finish at the Big Ten Championships, the team's best finish at the event. A program-high eight Huskers garnered All-America honors, including Chad Red Jr. earning his third honor and Taylor Venz, Isaiah White and Mikey Labriola picking up their second awards.

In his first season at NU as a coach, Snyder played a key role in helping Burroughs win his second national championship with a perfect 36-0 record. Snyder also helped Burroughs win the 2011 74-kilogram freestyle World Championship in Istanbul, Turkey, becoming the first U.S. wrestler to win a freestyle title since 2006. Additionally, Snyder helped Burroughs win the freestyle gold medal at the 2012 London Olympics as well as the 2013 and 2015 FILA World Championships. Burroughs also represented the United States in the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio. Most recently, Snyder helped Burroughs to gold at the 2021 World Championships. He also helped Green to bronze at the 2015 World Championships and silver at the 2017 World Championships.

Snyder, an Easton, Pa., native spent the 2009-10 season as the head assistant coach at Arizona State and helped guide five Sun Devils to the NCAA Championships in Omaha. Snyder began his coaching experience as an assistant at Harvard in 2002-03, while returning to the Husker wrestling program as a graduate assistant coach for two seasons (2003-04 and 2004-05), as NU went 38-5-1 in duals and finished fifth at the 2004 NCAA Championships. He helped coach eight All-Americans at NU during that time.

Snyder graduated from Nebraska with a bachelor's degree in sociology and communication studies in 2002. He earned a Master of Arts in 2005 before earning a Ph.D. in 2012.

One of the most decorated wrestlers in program history, Snyder owns the best winning percentage all-time at Nebraska with a mark of .925, compiling a 136-11 record from 1999 to 2002. A member of Nebraska's 100-win club, he claimed All-America accolades and a Big 12 championship all four years, while finishing as the NCAA runner-up at 157 pounds in 2001 and 2002.

He amassed more than 30 wins in a season three times, including his 43-3 record as a sophomore that stands as the second-best single-season mark in school history. A four-time NWCA All-Academic selection, Snyder was named the 2002 Nebraska Male Student-Athlete of the Year and was also a four-time first-team academic All-Big 12 selection.

Prior to Nebraska, Snyder was a three-time state place-winner and a 1997 state champion at Easton (Pa.) High School. He finished with a 112-12 record and was one of the nation's most highly regarded recruits.

# TERVEL DLAGNEV

ASSISTANT COACH | FIRST SEASON

Former NCAA National Champion and Olympic medal winner Tervel Dlagnev enters his first season as Nebraska's assistant coach in 2023-24, after serving as the team's volunteer assistant in 2021-22 and 2022-23.

"We are extremely excited to announce the addition of Tervel," Coach Manning said. "He brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to Nebraska, will provide another piece to our coaching staff and will add value to our student-athletes' experience on and off the mat."

One of the nation's best heavyweight freestyle wrestlers in history, Dlagnev won the Olympic bronze medal at the 2012 London Olympic Games and placed fifth in the 2016 Rio Olympic Games. He also won World bronze medals for the United States in 2009 and 2014 and was a 2011 Pan American Games and 2008 University World Champion. In college, Dlagnev was a two-time NCAA Champion and four-time All-American at the University of Nebraska-Kearney.

A native of Arlington, Texas, Dlagnev came to Nebraska after serving as an assistant coach at Ohio State University, where he was hired before the 2016-17 season. Dlagnev has also worked with athletes at the Ohio Regional Training Center.

Former Nebraska wrestling legend James Green has been named a full-time assistant coach for the Husker wrestling program, head coach Mark Manning announced ahead of the 2023-24 season.

A native of Willingboro, N.J., Green will join Manning, associate head coach Bryan Snyder and assistant coach Tervel Dlagnev.

"We're extremely excited about James, Chandell, Glory and Aubrey being back in Lincoln," Manning said. "The attitude, work ethic and commitment to excellence that James competed with both as a Husker and a six-time USA Wrestling World Team member gives our student-athletes a prime example of someone to imitate. His leadership as one of the world's top competitors, coupled with his coaching experience provides our program with an amazing asset as we continue our march to the top. James' passion and heart for Nebraska Wrestling will serve us well."

This past June, Green announced he was coming out of retirement and will return to train at the Nebraska Wrestling Training Center (NWTC) after spending 14 months as USA Wrestling's National Freestyle Developmental Coach in Colorado Springs, Colo.

"I am extremely grateful and excited to have the opportunity to be a part of the Husker Wrestling staff," Green said. "I have learned a lot in my short time with USA Wrestling and look forward to sharing my knowledge with the current and future Nebraska wrestlers. As an alum, I've always imagined giving back to the program that has given so much to me. I am really grateful for Coach Manning giving me this opportunity. Go Big Red!"

As a Husker, the 2014 Big Ten Champion became just the second four-time All-American in school history as he placed seventh twice and third twice at NAAs. On the professional side, he represented the United States on the World Team at the 70kg spot from 2015 to 2021, winning bronze in 2015 and silver in 2017.

## 2023-24 NEBRASKA SEASON NOTEBOOK

### HUSKERS TO FACE STRONG SCHEDULE

The Nebraska wrestling team will face another challenging season as the 2023-24 slate features 11 of the top-25 finishers from last season's NCAA Championships, Coach Mark Manning announced on Monday. The Huskers will kick off the season on the road against North Dakota State on Nov. 4. NU will then return home to host Campbell on Friday, Nov. 10 before traveling to Annapolis, Md., for the Navy Classic on Saturday, Nov. 18. NU will stay on the road and compete at the Cliff Keen Invite in Las Vegas on Dec. 1-2.

The Huskers will conclude the 2023 year as they host South Dakota State on Saturday, Dec. 16. The team will then remain home to begin the year as NU hosts Wyoming and Northern Iowa on Saturday, Jan. 6.

Conference competition will feature eight duals, four home and four away, with Big Ten action beginning with Nebraska's home opener against Iowa on Friday, Jan. 12. Minnesota will then host the Huskers in Minneapolis on Friday, Jan. 19 before NU returns home to host Purdue on Sunday, Jan. 21.

The following weekend NU kicks off a two-match road stint as it faces Northwestern on Friday, Jan. 26 and Wisconsin on Sunday, Jan. 28, before returning home to host Illinois on Sunday, Feb. 4 and Michigan on Friday, Feb. 9.

NU will close out Big Ten regular season action on the road with a dual against Penn State on Sunday, Feb. 18, before traveling to Arizona to face ASU on Sunday, Feb. 25 to wrap up the regular season.

The Big Ten Championships will be hosted by Maryland on Saturday, March 9 and Sunday, March 10. The NCAA Championships will be in Kansas City, Mo., Thursday, March 21 through Saturday, March 23.

### ROBB LOOKS TO EARN FIFTH ALL-AMERICAN AWARD

A 157-pound senior from Owatonna, Minn., Peyton Robb returns looking to become the fourth four-time Nebraska All-American. Robb is currently one of 15 three-time All-Americans in the history of Nebraska wrestling. Last season, he finished second at the Big Ten Championships and his sixth-place finish at NAAs cemented his All-American status. Robb was second on the team last season with 28 wins, giving him a career record of 78-27. Additionally, he finished the regular season undefeated with a 23-0 record and joined former Husker standout Mikey Labriola as the first Husker pair to post undefeated regular season records since 1961.

### VETERAN BUNCH RETURNS TO LEAD NU

Nebraska will be guided by a strong group of veteran returners in 2023-24. NU loses four senior starters, but returns six starters as they get set for this year's campaign. Brock Hardy, Ridge Lovett and Peyton Robb all return as all-Americans, as well as Bubba Wilson, Lenny Pino and Silas Allred who look to capitalize on last year's success. Seven total Huskers qualified for the NCAA Championships in 2022-23 and six were seeded in the top 20 of their weight classes.

### NU GOES FOR THIRD-STRAIGHT TOP 10 FINISH

Nebraska's strong group of upperclassmen enter the 2023-24 season looking to ensure that NU follows last season's success. Graduate transfer Caleb Smith is the top competitor projected to take over the starting job at 125 pounds, while junior Kyle Burwick and redshirt freshmen Jacob Van Dee and Hayden Mills will battle for the 133 spot. Redshirt junior Ridge Lovett returns this season to become the 149 starter. Sophomore Elise Brown Ton looks to be the front-runner at 174 points and redshirt freshman Harley Andrews looks to compete for the starting spot at heavyweight.

### DUAL EXPERIENCE A PLUS FOR NU

The Huskers have 17 wrestlers this season with dual experience, including all-Americans Brock Hardy, Ridge Lovett and Peyton Robb. Along with the three aforementioned wrestlers, Caleb Smith, Bubba Wilson, Lenny Pinto and Silas Allred return as NCAA qualifiers who gained significant dual experience last season. As a team, NU won 12 of its 15 duals overall and seven of its eight Big Ten duals.

### NEBRASKA WELCOMES STRONG CROP OF NEWCOMERS

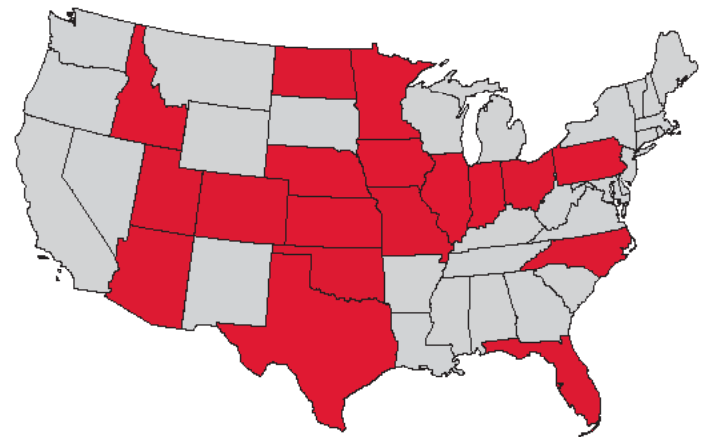

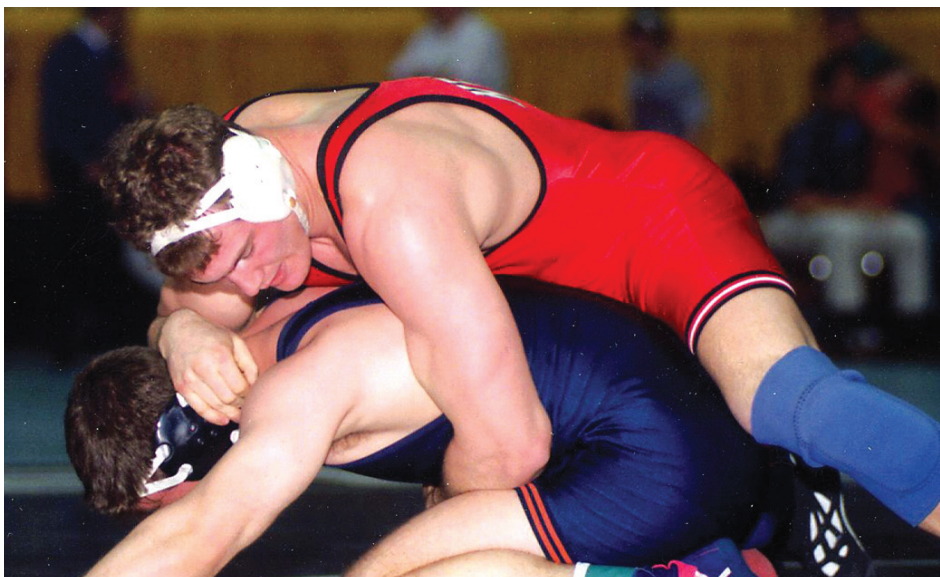

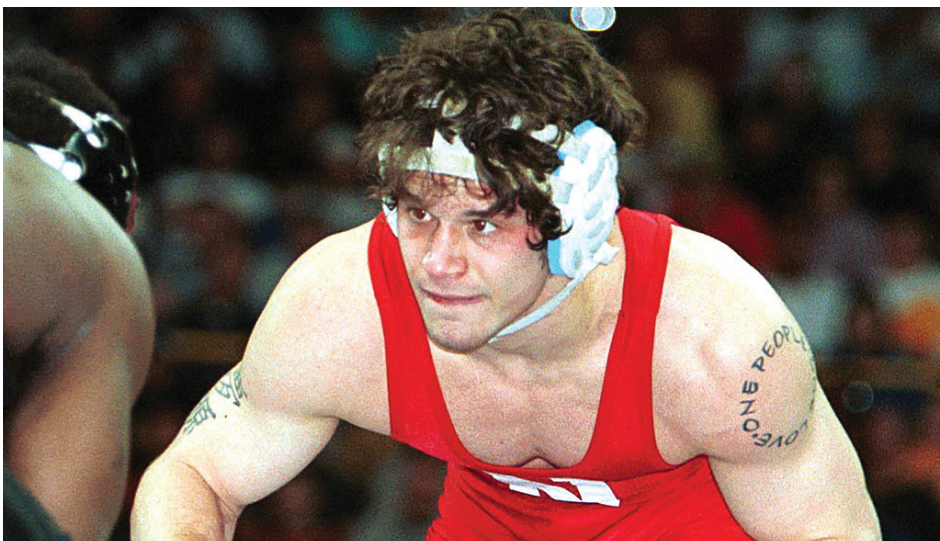

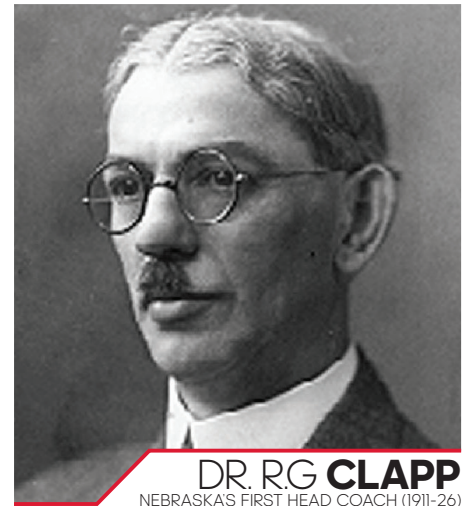


## NEBRASKA'S COACHING HISTORY

Nebraska has had only 16 head coaches in 100 years of wrestling history, including current Husker coach Mark Manning. Combining for 749 dual wins, NU coaches have always set a standard of excellence in the wrestling community. Dr. R.G. Clapp was the Huskers' first wrestling coach and led the team for 11 years before moving on to promote wrestling with the National Wrestling Coaches Association. Jerry Adam coached Nebraska for the majority of the 1930's and 1940's, before giving way to B.R. Patterson.

Orval Borgialli headed the Huskers for 14 years from 1964 to 1978, amassing 72 dual wins, and Bob Fehrs took over the team until 1985. Fehrs finished with a .648 dual-winning percentage with 95 career dual wins at Nebraska. Tim Neumann racked up 199 dual victories from 1985 to 2000 before Manning took over. Manning has amassed a 282-105-3 mark in Lincoln and is the winningest coach in program history.

**DR. R.G. CLAPP**  
NEBRASKA'S FIRST HEAD COACH (1911-26)

Nebraska's first wrestling coach, Dr. Raymond G. Clapp (1911-26), was more than just a mentor for the first athletes who enjoyed the sport at the university. He was a prominent figure locally and internationally in the world of wrestling.

In the 1890s, Clapp distinguished himself as an all-around athlete while a student at Williston Seminary and at Yale University, starring in football, track, gymnastics and tennis.

It was as a track athlete at Yale that he rose to national and world prominence. Clapp won the IC4A pole vault title twice, annexed the national A.A.U. championship, earned a Canadian title and in 1898, he topped all performances to set a then-world mark in the vault of nearly 12 feet.

Dr. Clapp's interest and ability in gymnastics probably were more responsible than any other one thing in creating his great interest in collegiate wrestling. In addition to his many athletic distinctions, Clapp was crowned the all-around individual gymnastics champion of the Eastern Intercollegiate Association in 1889.

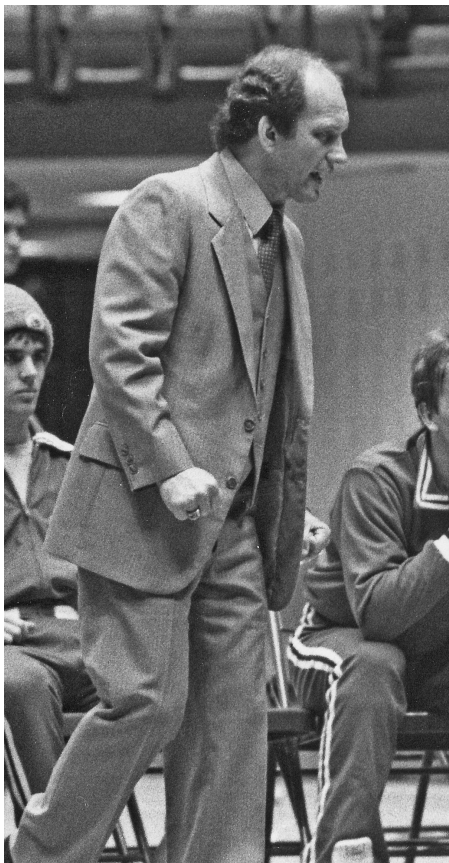
As a member and eventual chairman of the NCAA Wrestling Rules Committee, Clapp was largely responsible for the efficient organization of collegiate wrestling tournaments in the 1930s and 1940s. Clapp pioneered the system that is used to run many of the meets that take place even today.

While Ed Gallagher was building wrestling popularity in the Southwest, and Charlie Maysr was doing likewise in the East and Midwest, Dr. Clapp initiated college wrestling at the University of Nebraska in the earliest days of the sport, serving as head coach from 1911 to 1926.

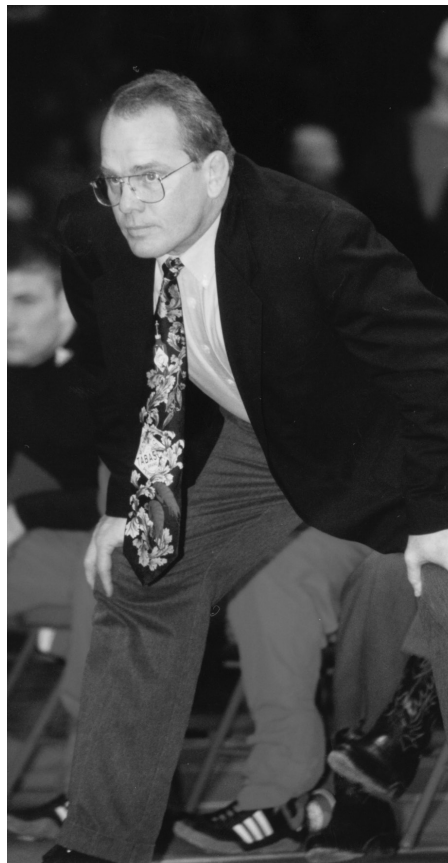
Known widely as a leader in the promotion of collegiate wrestling, Clapp served in the administrative branch of the National Collegiate Wrestling Association for numerous years.

In 1932 and 1936, Clapp was secretary of the American Olympic Wrestling Committee and in 1940 was elected chairman of the committee. As chairman of the USA-Pan American Wrestling Committee and the committee representative to the 1942 Pan-American Games Committee, Clapp became increasingly prominent in the wrestling community.

For over 30 years, Clapp freely and willingly gave his time and energy to popularize collegiate wrestling.



Bob Fehrs patrolled the mat for the Huskers from 1978 to 1985, racking up 95 dual wins and coaching 11 Nebraska wrestlers to All-America honors.



Tim Neumann coached Nebraska from 1985 to 2000, producing five top-10 finishes at the NCAA Championships, 40 Husker All-Americans and four NU national champions.

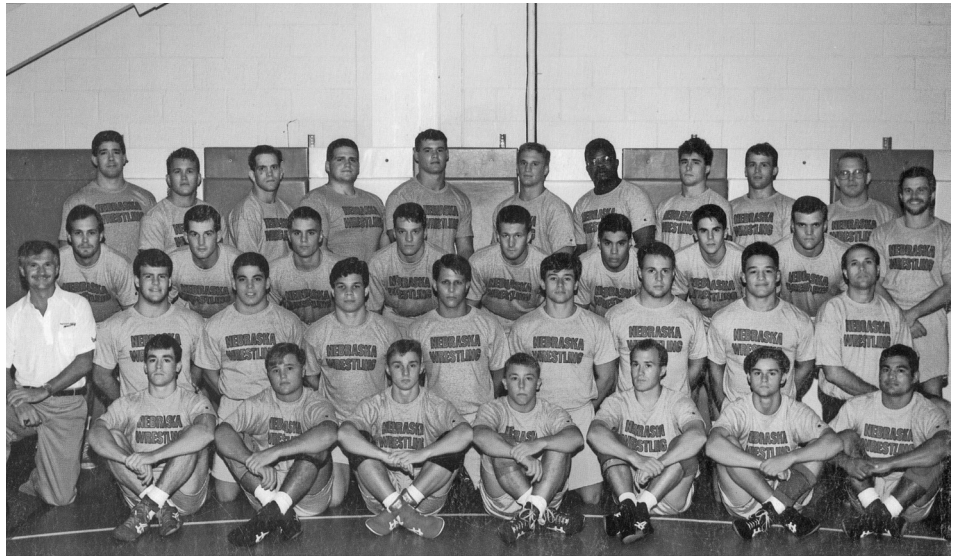

# TREV ALBERTS

Vice Chancellor, Director of Athletics Second Season Nebraska (1993)

A veteran administrator and College Football Hall of Famer, Trev Alberts is entering his third year as Vice Chancellor, Director of Athletics at the University of Nebraska in 2023-24. Alberts, who was hired on July 14, 2021, returned to his alma mater after spending 12 years at Nebraska-Omaha, guiding the program through a successful transition to the Division I level.

In his first season at Nebraska in 2021-22, Alberts helped the Huskers navigate the ever-changing landscape of Name, Image and Likeness guidelines for the benefit of Nebraska student-athletes. He led the development of the N-Vest Nebraska program to award \$5,980 per year to student-athletes who meet academic benchmarks.

Alberts also spearheaded the charge to complete the fundraising for Nebraska's Go Big Project, which will provide Nebraska football with a new facility scheduled to open in the summer of 2023. The project will also house academic, life skills, nutrition and support services for all Nebraska student-athletes.

A tireless worker who puts both the interests of student-athletes and fans first, Alberts helped orchestrate a qualitative survey of Nebraska's fan base to help shape the future of Memorial Stadium's game-day atmosphere.

Alberts has also focused much of his time on developing the first strategic plan for Nebraska Athletics in 15 years. He has also committed himself to providing intense support and a unifying vision for Nebraska's coaches across all sports.

Nebraska's athletic achievements in 2021-22 included top-five NCAA finishes from Husker volleyball, wrestling and men's gymnastics programs, while the NU women's basketball and softball teams enjoyed breakout seasons that concluded with trips to the 2022 NCAA Tournament. The women's track and field team added a 14th-place finish at the NCAA Outdoor Championships - its best showing since 2006.

Academically, Nebraska student-athletes continued to shine with a school-record 95 percent graduation rate across all sports.

Alberts' tenure leading UNO athletics was marked by successes in competition and in academics; by transitioning the university's athletic programs to NCAA Division I in 2011; and by establishing new homes for many UNO athletics teams, including Baxter Arena, the Maverick Park baseball/softball complex and the soccer pitch at Caniglia Field.

Alberts took the bold step in announcing that Omaha would reclassify from Division II to Division I in all sports in 2011 and simultaneously securing conference affiliation with the Summit League for all of the department's then-Division II programs. His vision for UNO's reclassifying teams was demonstrated

even before the four-year transition period had ended. The Omaha baseball team won back-to-back Summit League regular-season championships in 2013 and 2014, while the men's basketball team made its first Division I postseason appearance in 2014 with a berth in the CollegelInsider.com Postseason Tournament.

During UNO's time in the Division I ranks under Alberts tenure, the Mavericks had six teams and four student-athletes qualify for the NCAA Tournament, including hockey advancing to the Frozen Four in 2015 and men's soccer reaching the second round of the NCAA Tournament in the spring of 2021. He also expanded opportunities, adding men's golf and men's soccer in 2011, and Omaha began a men's swimming and diving program in 2021-22.

Throughout his tenure in Omaha, Alberts was focused on enhancing the student-athlete experience, including the construction and staffing of the Hamilton Academic Excellence Room and the development of the Ethel S. Abbott Student-Athlete Development Wing. Those efforts paid off in Nebraska-Omaha student-athletes posting consistent collective semester grade point averages above 3.3 for 18 consecutive semesters, including at least a 3.5 in each of his final three semesters.

The facilities around Omaha Athletics received a major uplift during his tenure. Maverick Park opened in March of 2021 to rave reviews as the home to the Mavericks' baseball and softball programs. Funding for the complex, which includes a 1,500-seat baseball facility and a 650-seat softball facility, were raised privately and provided both programs a permanent on-campus home for the first time.

Another crowning achievement was the opening of Baxter Arena in 2015. Alberts directed efforts to secure community support and funding to build the on-campus arena, which allowed the nationally prominent hockey program to play on campus and also serve as the home of the men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. Caniglia Field underwent renovations in 2012, making it one of the finest collegiate soccer facilities in the country, highlighted by a FIFA 2-star rated playing surface and one of the largest LED videoboards in a soccer-only college facility.

Alberts' work on behalf of hockey, UNO's established Division I sport, also paid dividends. He successfully guided the Mavericks into the new National Collegiate Hockey Conference in 2013-14. The following year, Omaha reached the 2015 NCAA Frozen Four.

In addition, Alberts and his team led Omaha Athletics into a partnership with Learfield, a national leader in the marketing of collegiate athletics, and developed Omaha Sports Properties. As the exclusive corporate sponsorship sales unit for UNO Athletics, Omaha Sports Properties further enhanced revenue and increased brand prominence locally, regionally and nationally.

As part of UNO's reclassification to Division I, Alberts oversaw the rebranding of UNO athletics with new primary and secondary logos and a greater focus on strengthening the Maverick brand both regionally and nationally.

As a student-athlete, Alberts was an All-American on and off the football field as a Husker Blackshirt. He was Nebraska's first Butkus Award winner in 1993, helping Coach Tom Osborne's Huskers to an undefeated regular season and an Orange Bowl appearance against Florida State. A first-team All-American by every major publication in 1993, he was also the Football News National Defensive Player of the Year, the Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year, and the Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year. His No. 34 jersey was retired at the 1994 Red-White Spring Game. In 2015, he was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame.

Off the field, Alberts earned the NCAA's highest honor, The Today's Top Six Award. A three-time Academic All-Big Eight honoree, he was a CoSIDA Academic All-American in 1993. He graduated from Nebraska before his senior season.

Alberts was the fifth pick in the 1994 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts and played for the Colts until 1996. Following his NFL career, he served as an analyst on college and professional football games for major national networks, including ESPN, CNN/SI and CBS Sports Network.

Alberts and his wife Angela have three children – Chase (and his wife, Cassie), Ashtynne and Breanna.





## MARQUITA ARMSTEAD

**Executive Associate A.D./Senior Woman Administrator First Season Mississippi State (2005)**

Marquita Armstead was hired as Nebraska's Executive Associate Athletic Director and Senior Woman Administrator on Dec. 16, 2021, and she officially began her duties on Feb. 1, 2022. Armstead came to Nebraska from the University of South Florida, where she served in a similar role.

Armstead, who serves as the sport administrator for the Nebraska men's basketball and Husker volleyball programs, also serves as a member of the Big Ten Sport Management Council, and has oversight of athletic medicine, sports psychology, the athletic performance lab (NAPL), strength and conditioning, performance nutrition, Title IX and gender equity.

Armstead was a member of the South Florida athletic administration from March of 2016 to January of 2022. She originally joined USF as Associate Athletic Director for Compliance, before being elevated to Senior Associate Director of Athletics/Senior Woman Administrator in August of 2017.

In her role with the Bulls, Armstead served as the sport administrator for men's and women's basketball, and had previous sport oversight of softball, men's soccer, women's tennis and as

the secondary sport administrator for football. Armstead also oversees several USF student-athlete support departments, including academic services, student-athlete enhancement, sports medicine, nutrition, sport psychology, student rights and responsibilities and Title IX.

In addition to her work at USF, Armstead has a strong athletic administration background at four other schools. Before her time at South Florida, Armstead worked at Georgia Tech from 2012 to 2016, where she served as Director of Compliance for her final three years in Atlanta. Prior to Georgia Tech, Armstead was the Director of Compliance at the University of Tennessee Chattanooga for six years. She also served internships in compliance at Mississippi State and Ohio University.

Armstead earned her bachelor's degree from Mississippi State in 2005 and earned a master's of sports administration from the school in 2006. She received a Master of Business Administration degree from Tennessee Chattanooga in 2013 and is a 2012 NCAA Leadership Institute graduate. Armstead is married to Demetric Armstead and the couple has a son, Braylon.



## KEITH ZIMMER

**Executive Associate A.D./Life Skills 36th Season Wayne State**

Keith Zimmer enters his 36th season at Nebraska, where he directs the Life Skills and Enrichment program. The Executive Associate Athletic Director for Life Skills, Zimmer also serves as the sport administrator for women's basketball, softball and men's tennis and women's tennis. Since 2015, Nebraska Life Skills implemented the Post Eligibility Scholarship provided to Huskers who have lettered, graduated and exhausted eligibility at Nebraska. Additional critical components of Nebraska Life Skills includes individual student-athlete career meetings, required four-year tiered proactive education, community outreach, postgraduate scholarship awards life after sports transition and the offering of four leadership organizations. The N-Vest mentoring group, Inner Circle, N-Volved and the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee further develop leadership qualities of more than 150 student-athletes annually.

Zimmer also assists with the direction of

Nebraska's annual student-athlete achievement event, "A Night at the Lied."

Zimmer is the Life Skills sport contact for football, volleyball, softball, swimming and diving, men's tennis and women's tennis.

Zimmer, who worked in Nebraska's Academic Services area from 1987 to 2006, while pioneering Nebraska's Life Skills program, is regarded as a national leader in the life skills area. He received one of the top honors in college athletics, being selected as the Life Skills Administrator of the Year and has also received the Chancellor's Award for Exemplary Service to Students and is an honorary member of both Golden Key National Honor Society and Mortar Board.

Zimmer earned his bachelor's degree at Wayne State College and his master's in education from Springfield (Mass.) College. Zimmer and his wife Michelle, have two sons, Logan and Caden.





Dr. Rodney D. Bennett is the 21st chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Nebraska's flagship, Land-Grant and Big Ten institution. He is a 30-year veteran of higher education with a track record of growing research, increasing student success and building impactful partnerships.

Chancellor Bennett came to Nebraska after nine years of successful leadership at the University of Southern Mississippi. During his tenure as president, USM was reclassified from a Carnegie R2 to an R1 university, signaling growth in research prestige and funding. He also invested in programs to support student recruitment, retention and outcomes, including for the 30 percent of USM's first-generation students. His efforts led to an improvement in the university's six-year graduation rate.

# RODNEY BENNETT

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Chancellor First Season Middle Tennessee State (1990)

While at USM, Dr. Bennett established new faculty positions in high-growth areas and increased the average salary for full-time faculty; oversaw \$300 million in facilities work; and launched the largest fundraising campaign in the University of Southern Mississippi's history. He was a strong champion of athletics, investing in new facilities and programs to support student-athletes, including a dedicated mental health counselor to serve student-athletes. Throughout his time as president, he brought a conservative approach to budget management, meeting or exceeding the budgetary goals set by the Mississippi Institutions of Higher Learning Board of Trustees.

Prior to his role at Southern Miss, Dr. Bennett served at the University of Georgia for more than a decade. He was the senior administrator for student programs and services for Georgia's 34,000-plus students; oversaw \$150 million in capital projects; and made key staff and programmatic investments in extracurriculars, mental health programs and other areas to better support students.

Dr. Bennett also has been the dean of students at Winthrop in Rock Hill, South Carolina, and associate dean of student life at Middle Tennessee State.

Chancellor Bennett values community leadership and service. He has served on numerous boards, including the Mississippi Aquarium, Northeast Georgia Girl Scouts of America, Catholic Health East (Philadelphia), and St. Mary's Health Care System in Athens, Georgia. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and Past Sire Archon for Sigma Pi Phi fraternity, The Boulé.

Dr. Bennett earned a bachelor's degree in mass communication (1990), a master's degree in

Management Committee, the Compliance and Reinstatement Committee and the Legislative Review Committee.

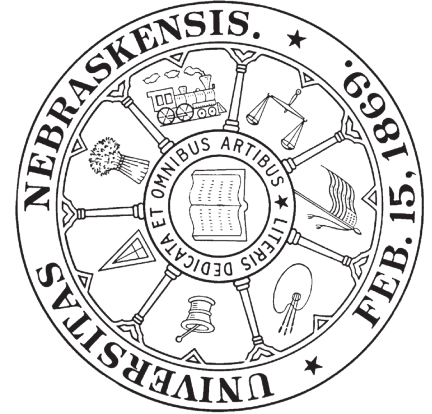

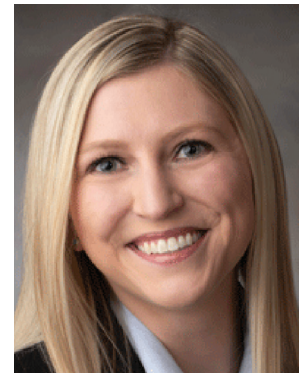

Northwest 12th Street becomes Cornhusker Highway, which intersects with 14th Street. Exit south on 14th Street off Cornhusker Highway. Travel to Military Avenue and turn left. Continue a half mile and enter Innovation Campus. Take the first right turn before the Devaney Center and follow the access road to Lot 4 on the South Side of the arena. From Omaha's Eppley Airfield, follow the signs to downtown Omaha and I-480. Take I-480 West to I-80, then take I-80 West approximately 60 miles to I-180. Exit South on I-180, then exit East to Cornhusker Highway and follow the instructions above.
