Nebraska kicks off its 135th season on Saturday when the Cornhuskers begin the 2024 campaign with their first-ever matchup against UTEP. Saturday's season opener at Memorial Stadium will be televised on FOX with radio coverage on the Huskers Radio Network. Kickoff is set for 2:30 p.m.

Nebraska is coming off a 5-7 record in Matt Rhule's first season in 2023. The five wins in Rhule's first season in Lincoln were more than the win total from his first season at Temple and Baylor combined, which is notable considering it took only three years for Rhule to lead both programs to school-record win totals.

The Huskers narrowly missed a bowl game last season, falling one win short of bowl eligibility. Five of Nebraska's seven losses were by three points or in overtime, including four November losses by a total of 16 points. The Huskers return 10 offensive and seven defensive players who started at least six games last season. NU also returns its starting punter and place-kicker.

Nebraska is playing its first game of the season at home for the first time since the 2019 season. The Huskers are also beginning the season with a non-conference opponent for the first time since 2019. Each of the past four seasons, Nebraska began the year by facing a Big Ten opponent either on the road or at a neutral site.

Saturday's opener against UTEP marks the first of four straight home games to begin the season for the Big Red. The five-game homestand is Nebraska's longest season-opening homestand since the 2013 season when the Huskers opened the season with five consecutive home games.

NEBRASKA BOASTS 14-3 RECORD IN AUGUST

Saturday's season opener will mark the 18th August game in the history of Nebraska football. The Huskers are playing an August game for the fourth straight season but are looking for their first win in the month since 2019, which is also the last year Nebraska opened a season at home.

- Nebraska is 14-3 all-time in the month of August. NU is a perfect 12-0 against non-conference opponents in the month and is also a perfect 10-0 at Memorial Stadium in August.
- The Huskers have lost their last three August games. Those three losses came by a combined 14 points, with each game on the road or at a neutral site against a Big Ten opponent.

HUSKER HISTORY IN SEASON OPENERS

Nebraska has an impressive history in season openers. The Huskers have won 98 of their 134 season openers, winning their first game 75 percent of the time while posting a 98-31-5 record. NU is opening a season at home for the first time since 2019. Since 1980, Nebraska has lost only twice when playing its season opener at home (1986 and 2015).

NINE HUSKERS EARN SPOTS ON PRESEASON WATCH LISTS

Nine Nebraska Cornhuskers made a preseason watch list for a major national award this summer.

- True freshman **Jacory Barney Jr.** was named to the watch list for The Jet Award, presented to the nation's top returner. The award is named after Husker Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Rodgers.
- Bryce Benhart was one of 75 linemen named to the preseason watch list for the Outland Trophy. Benhart was an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection as Nebraska's starting right tackle in 2023. The Outland Trophy is presented annually to the nation's best interior lineman.
- Brian Buschini, the 2021 FCS Punter of the Year, was one of 33 punters named to the preseason watch list for the Ray Guy Award, which is presented annually to the nation's best punter.
- Thomas Fidone II was one of 48 tight ends named to the preseason watch list for the John Mackey Award, presented annually to the nation's best tight end. Fidone led Nebraska with four touchdown catches in 2024, the most by a Husker tight end since 2010.
- Isaac Gifford was honored for his work on the field and in the community with an appointment to the Allstate Wuerffel Trophy Watch List. Gifford led Nebraska with 86 tackles while earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten accolades. Off the field, he earned a Sam Foltz 27 Hero Leadership Award in 2024 and was named to both the Brook Berringer and Tom Osborne Citizenship teams.
- Nash Hutmacher was one of 90 players and 37 defensive linemen named to the preseason watch list for the Chuck Bednarik Award, presented annually to the outstanding defensive player in college football. Hutmacher was an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection last season.
- Dylan Raiola was named to the Polynesian College Football Player of the Year watch list.
- Isaiah Neyor was one of 93 players named to the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award watch list. The award is presented to the top offensive player who played high school or college football in Texas.
- Ben Scott, an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection in 2023, was one of 40 centers named to the Rimington Trophy watch list. The Rimington Trophy named after former Husker center Dave Rimington is presented annually to the nation's top center.

NOTES FROM NEBRASKA'S 2023 SEASON

Nebraska finished with a 5-7 record in Matt Rhule's first season in 2023. Four of the seven losses were by three points with a fifth loss by a touchdown in overtime. Due to injuries, Nebraska used three different starting quarterbacks in its five one-score losses.

- Nebraska had the program's fewest penalty yards per game (42.8) since 1998.
- The Huskers ranked among the nation's 15 most-improved teams in rushing offense, rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense. Nebraska had the nation's No. 2 most-improved rush defense, the No. 3 most-improved total defense and the No. 10 most-improved scoring defense. Offensively, the Huskers had the 14th most-improved rushing attack from the 2022 to the 2023 season.
- Nebraska posted its best statistical rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense since joining the Big Ten in 2011. The Huskers allowed their fewest points per game (18.3) since 2010, their fewest yards per game (303.5) since 2009 and their fewest rushing yards per game (92.9) since 1999.
- NU ranked eighth nationally in rushing defense, 11th nationally in total defense and 13th nationally in scoring defense in 2023. The Huskers posted their highest national ranking in rushing defense since 1999 and best national ranking in total and scoring defense since 2010.
- Nebraska held eight opponents to 14 or fewer points in 2023, a first for the program since the 2009 season, when the Huskers led the nation in scoring defense.
- The Huskers held six of their 12 opponents in 2023 to fewer than 300 total yards, while also limiting eight of 12 opponents to fewer than 100 rushing yards.
- Nebraska totaled its most sacks (32) since 2014 and most tackles for loss (76) since 2016.
- Offensively, the Huskers ranked second in the Big Ten in rushing last season (176.8 ypg).
- Nebraska also had one of the best big-play offenses in the Big Ten. The Huskers ranked second in the Big Ten with eight plays of 50 yards or longer in 2023 while leading the league in rushes of 40 yards or longer, 60 yards or longer and 70 yards or longer.
- From a special teams standpoint, Nebraska ranked third nationally with four blocked kicks in 2023. The Huskers recorded their most blocked kicks since the 2014 season.

HUSKERS POSSESS VETERAN OFFENSIVE LINE

The most experienced unit on the Nebraska team is the offensive line. Husker offensive linemen have combined to play in 224 career games with 153 career starts entering this season.

- According to research compiled by West Virginia's Mike Montoro, Nebraska's 153 combined
 offensive line starts ranks as the fifth-most in the country entering the 2024 season. Husker
 offensive linemen have also combined for 224 career games played, a total that ranks ninth
 nationally entering the season.
- Bryce Benhart, a member of the Outland Trophy watch list, leads the way with 41 career starts, starting 41 of Nebraska's 44 games at right tackle the past four seasons. Benhart's 41 career starts are tied with Jeremiah Sirles for the most starts by an offensive lineman in program history.
- Turner Corcoran has started 31 games for the Huskers with 26 starts at left tackle, three starts at left guard and two starts at right tackle. Corcoran had started 30 consecutive games before suffering a season-ending injury against Northwestern last season.
- Ben Scott returns for his second season as Nebraska's starting center. A member of the Rimington Trophy watch list, Scott started 11 games for the Huskers last season, and he has made 39 career starts including his three seasons at Arizona State.
- Bolstering the line is the addition of transfer **Micah Mazzccua**. Mazzccua has started 21 games in his career, including 11 starts at right guard for Florida in 2023 and 10 starts at Baylor in 2022.
- **Teddy Prochazka** has started 11 games for Nebraska, but he will miss the 2024 campaign after suffering an injury during fall camp. The injury marked the third time in four seasons that Prochazka has suffered a season-ending injury.
- Justin Evans (5 starts), Henry Lutovsky (4 starts) and Joey Mancino (1 start) have also started at least one game on the Nebraska offensive line.

TRANSFERS ADD EXPERIENCE TO NEBRASKA ROSTER

During the offseason, Nebraska added 60 newcomers to its roster. That number includes a large freshman class of 48, but adding experience to the roster are 12 first-year transfers.

- Six of Nebraska's 12 first-year transfers are FBS transfers with three junior college transfers, two FCS transfers and one NAIA transfer.
- The group of six FBS transfers all came from Power Conference programs. The six players have combined for 160 games played and 81 starts in their careers. Five transfers have started at least 13 games in their careers.
- Stefon Thompson played in 36 games with 21 starts at linebacker for Syracuse. He enters the season with 169 career tackles, 20.0 tackles for loss and 10.5 sacks. Thompson owns the most tackles, TFLs and sacks of any Husker on the 2024 roster.
- Micah Mazzccua started 21 games on the offensive lines at Baylor and Florida. In 2022 at Baylor, PFF ranked Mazzccua as the best run-blocker in the Big 12 and the 15th-best run blocker in the country.
- Ceyair Wright made 15 starts at cornerback for USC in 2022 and 2023. He totaled 41 tackles as a Trojan with 1.0 tackle for loss, one interception and five pass breakups.
- Isaiah Neyor has started 13 games in his career. He was a second-team All-Mountain West Conference selection in 2021 at Wyoming before spending two seasons at Texas. Neyor has caught 53 passes for 1,140 yards and 12 touchdowns in his career. Neyor ranks second to fellow first-year transfer Jahmal Banks in career receptions, career receiving yards and career receiving touchdowns among all active Huskers.
- Jahmal Banks played in 43 games with 11 starts at Wake Forest before transferring to Nebraska.
 Banks totaled 107 receptions for 1,404 yards and 13 touchdowns as a Demon Deacon. He owns
 the most career receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns of any Husker on the
 2024 roster.
- Dante Dowdell spent one season at Oregon before transferring to Nebraska. Dowdell had 17 carries for 90 yards and one touchdown in 2023 for a Duck team that went 12-2 and ranked second nationally in total offense and scoring offense.

A LOOK AT NEBRASKA'S 2024 SCHEDULE

Nebraska will play three non-conference games and nine Big Ten contests in 2024, including games against UCLA and USC, each of whom are in their first season as a Big Ten member. The 2024 season marks the first time since Nebraska joined the conference in 2011 that the Big Ten will not utilize a divisional format.

- Nebraska will play Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Ohio State, Purdue, Rutgers, UCLA, USC and Wisconsin.
 The Huskers will not play Maryland, Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Northwestern, Oregon, Penn State or Washington.
- The 2024 season begins Saturday against UTEP at Memorial Stadium. This year marks the first season since 2019 that Nebraska is playing its first game of the season at home, and it is also the first time since 2019 that the Huskers have opened the season against a non-conference opponent.
- The Huskers are also playing in August for the fourth straight season and for the fifth time in the
 past five full seasons (2020 excluded).
- Nebraska will play each of its first four games at home. The four straight home games to open
 the season marks the Huskers' longest season-opening homestand since 2013 (five games).
- Beginning with the Colorado game on Sept. 7, the Huskers will play three consecutive home night games for only the third time in program history (also 2002 and 2008).
- The Big Ten opener is against Illinois on Friday, Sept. 20 at Memorial Stadium. That contest
 will mark Nebraska's NCAA-record 400th consecutive sellout while also being the Huskers' first
 weekday home game since 2001, when Nebraska played Rice on Thursday, Sept. 20, in a game
 postponed five days due to the Sept. 11 attacks.

RHULE LOOKS FOR ANOTHER STRONG SECOND SEASON

Nebraska went 5-7 in Matt Rhule's first season. The Huskers aim to increase their win total this season, something Rhule has done at each of his previous two collegiate head coaching stops.

- In his first head coaching job at Temple, Rhule helped the Owls to a four-win improvement from his first season to his second. Then at Baylor, Rhule guided the Bears to a six-win improvement from year one to year two. That improvement ranked third nationally and was the largest win improvement of any Power Conference program.
- Rhule took on rebuilding jobs at Temple, Baylor and Nebraska, which contributed to an 8-28 combined record in his first season at each school. But excluding his first season at Temple, Baylor and Nebraska, Rhule boasts a 44-22 record with three 10-win seasons in five years.
- Rhule has a proven record as a program builder. He led both Temple and Baylor to the highest win totals in program history in his third season at each school.
- Rhule guided Temple to a pair of trips to the American Athletic Conference title game, the first two appearances in the league title game in school history. His 2016 Owl team won the school's first conference title in nearly 40 years.
- Rhule led Temple to back-to-back bowl appearances for the first time in school history in 2015 and 2016.
- At Baylor, Rhule became the first head coach at a Power Conference school to take a team from 11 losses (1-11 in 2017) to 11 victories (11-3 in 2019) in two or fewer seasons.
- The 2019 Baylor team set a school record for wins with 11 and the Bears' 9-0 start was the best in school history.

MAJORITY OF STAFF RETURNS & RULE CHANGE BOLSTERS STAFF

The Huskers return eight of their 10 full-time assistants from last season, welcoming two new full-time assistants to the coaching staff. In addition to the two new assistants, an NCAA rule change has permitted additional staff members to provide on-field coaching.

- Donovan Raiola is in his third season at Nebraska in 2024 after being the lone assistant coach retained by Matt Rhule following the 2022 season.
- Other returning coaches on the offensive staff include offensive coordinator Marcus Satterfield (second season), running backs coach E.J. Barthel (second season) and wide receivers coach Garret McGuire (second season). The four returning offensive assistants helped the Huskers rank second in the Big Ten in rushing last season.
- Glenn Thomas is the lone new addition to the offensive staff, serving as Nebraska's quarterbacks coach and co-offensive coordinator. He came to Lincoln after one season as an offensive assistant with the Pittsburgh Steelers, helping the Steelers to a berth in the AFC playoffs in 2023.
- Thomas spent five seasons on Matt Rhule's coaching staffs at Temple and Baylor, serving as the offensive coordinator for the Owls in 2016 and as the co-offensive coordinator at Baylor from 2017 to 2019. Thomas also has recent experience as a quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator at Arizona State (2022) and UNLV (2020-21).
- On defense, coordinator Tony White (second season) returns as does linebackers coach Rob Dvoracek (second season) and defensive line coach Terrance Knighton (second season). Last year, that trio helped Nebraska post its best scoring defense, total defense and rushing defense since the Huskers joined the Big Ten in 2011.
- John Butler is the only new defensive assistant, serving as the Huskers' secondary coach and pass game coordinator. Butler came to Nebraska after spending the previous six seasons as the defensive backs coach for the Buffalo Bills. Buffalo had a top-five pass defense rating in five of his six seasons, helping the Bills win four AFC North titles and make five playoff appearances.
- Special teams coordinator **Ed Foley** also returns for his second season in 2024. He helped Nebraska rank third nationally in blocked kicks in his first season last fall.
- With the removal of the NCAA rule limiting the number of on-field coaches, Matt Rhule has announced 10 more staff members who will provide additional on-field coaching this fall.

NINE HUSKERS NAMED TO SENIOR BOWL WATCH LIST

A total of nine Huskers made the preseason watch list for the Reese's Senior Bowl. The Reese's Senior Bowl is widely regarded as the preeminent college football all-star game and the first stage in the NFL Draft process. The 2025 game will be played on Feb. 1 in Mobile, Ala.

- Five offensive players made the Senior Bowl watch list: wide receivers Jahmal Banks and Isaiah Neyor, tight end Thomas Fidone II and offensive linemen Micah Mazzccua and Ben Scott.
- Four defenders also made the Senior Bowl watch list: defensive linemen Nash Hutmacher and Ty Robinson and defensive backs Tommi Hill and DeShon Singleton.

SINGLE-DIGIT NUMBERS AWARDED TO 'TOUGHEST' HUSKERS

For the second straight season, single-digit jersey numbers were awarded to the team's "toughest" players. The single-digit honorees were chosen through a players-only vote and the players then got to choose which single-digit number they wanted.

• The tradition of single-digit numbers being reserved for the chosen few dates back to Rhule's time at Temple.

"I got really tired of having a guy in my program who had spent three years at like No. 47... wanted to wear No. 1 or No. 3, and he had earned it and we would give it to a recruit," Rhule said prior to the 2023 season. "What we decided was (numbers) 1-9, now 0-9, would go to the nine or now 10 'toughest' guys on the team. When I say 'toughest', we define that for the guys, but really the guys who best exemplify what it means to be a Cornhusker. To be accountable, to be dependable, to be tough, hard-working, competitive every single day."

NEBRASKA AMONG TOP ALL-TIME PROGRAMS

Nebraska is playing its 135th football season this fall, and the Huskers have historically been one of the top programs in college football history.

- Nebraska ranks eighth in NCAA history with 917 wins and 53 all-time bowl game appearances.
- The Huskers have won five national titles. Nebraska's four Associated Press national championships (1970, 1971, 1994, 1995) rank seventh all-time and NU's four coaches poll titles (1971, 1994, 1995, 1997) rank fourth.
- Nebraska's 46 conference titles rank second in NCAA history.
- The success extends to the classroom as well. Nebraska football has produced more Academic All-Americans (108) and more NCAA Top 10 Award winners (9) than any other team in any sport in NCAA history.

A LOOK AT NEBRASKA'S OFFENSIVE EXPERIENCE

Nebraska returns 18 offensive players who started at least one game last fall, including 10 players who made at least six starts in 2023. Nebraska, which ranked second in the Big Ten in rushing last season, returns 56 percent of its rushing yards, nearly 60 percent of its passing yards and 75 percent of its scoring from the 2023 season.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Nebraska returns a group of veteran linemen. The group has a combined 153 collegiate starts, with three players with at least 30 career starts.

Bryce Benhart started all 12 games last season and has 41 career starts, tying the most ever by a Husker offensive lineman. Benhart returns for his sixth season after earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten honors last fall.

Ben Scott was also an honorable-mention all-conference choice in his first year with the Huskers. He started 11 games in 2023 and has 39 career starts including his time at Arizona State. **Turner Corcoran** started seven games last season before suffering a season-ending injury and has 31 career starts at Nebraska.

Justin Evans moved into a starting role late last season as the Huskers battled injuries. He returns for his sophomore season. Junior **Henry Lutovsky** also has four career starts on the offensive line. Adding to the returnees is veteran transfer **Micah Mazzccua** who has 21 career starts between his time at Baylor and Florida.

QUARTERBACK

Junior **Heinrich Haarberg** is NU's lone returning quarterback with collegiate experience. A dual threat quarterback, Haarberg started eight games in 2023, leading NU to a 5-3 record. He is Nebraska's top returning passer and rusher. **Luke Longval** is the only other returning quarterback while four new players enter the mix. The new quarterbacks include 2023 NAIA Player of the Year **Jalyn Gramstad** and a pair of highly recruited freshmen: **Daniel Kaelin** and **Dylan Raiola**, with Raiola regarded as the No. 1 high school quarterback in his class.

RUNNING BACK

The Huskers return three running backs with extensive experience at Nebraska and add a talented transfer at the position. Sixth-year senior **Rahmir Johnson** missed the final nine games of 2023 with an injury but has nearly 1,000 career all-purpose yards including 739 rushing yards. Junior **Gabe Ervin Jr.** has also been slowed by injuries throughout his career, but has more than 400 career rushing yards.

Emmett Johnson emerged last season after Rahmir Johnson and Ervin were sidelined by injuries. Johnson played in every game with six starts and ran for more than 400 yards as a redshirt freshman. **Kwinten Ives** saw action as a true freshman and looks to build on his role this season. Sophomore **Dante Dowdell** played in six games at Oregon last fall before joining the Huskers in January. **Barret Liebentritt** returns at fullback after seeing playing time last season.

RECEIVER/TIGHT END

Nebraska returns several pass catchers who made an impact last season and added a pair of veterans through the transfer portal. Junior tight end **Thomas Fidone II** made 25 catches for 260 yards and four touchdowns last season, topping Husker returnees in each of those categories. Fellow junior **Nate Boerkircher** has played in 27 games with 11 starts in his career at Nebraska, while **Luke Lindenmeyer** saw significant action as a third tight end as a redshirt freshman.

Junior Alex Bullock is the most veteran of Nebraska's returning wideouts after making eight starts last season and catching 15 passes. Malachi Coleman (8 catches, 1 TD) and Jaylen Lloyd (6 catches, 3 TD) both saw action as true freshmen last season and could grow into larger roles this fall. Isaiah Garcia-Castaneda was injured in the first game last season but has 766 career receiving yards, the most of any returning Husker. Janiran Bonner played a key role at fullback last season and has moved to wideout.

Nebraska added a pair of veteran wideouts in the transfer portal. **Jahmal Banks** (Wake Forest) and **Isaiah Neyor** (Texas/Wyoming) add big-body targets and extensive game experience to the NU passing game. Banks (1,404) and Neyor (1,140) own the most career receiving yards of any players on Nebraska's roster.

A LOOK AT NEBRASKA'S DEFENSIVE EXPERIENCE

Nebraska returns a strong core of veterans who helped the Huskers rank as one of the nation's most improved defenses in 2023. Nebraska finished 11th nationally in total defense and was eighth against the run. Six players who started at least eight games last season return for the Blackshirts in 2024. The Huskers return at least two-thirds of last season's total in tackles, tackles for loss, sacks and interceptions.

DEFENSIVE LINE

The defensive front is anchored by a pair of returning All-Big Ten players in nose tackle **Nash Hutmacher** and defensive end **Ty Robinson**. Hutmacher was among the league's most disruptive interior players, racking up eight tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks among his 40 tackles. Hutmacher spent the winter wrestling for Nebraska as the starting heavyweight.

Robinson has started 34 games in his Husker career and returns for a sixth season. He had four tackles for loss, six breakups and led the Huskers with 11 quarterback hurries. **Jimari Butler** started six games at defensive end last season and led Nebraska with 8.5 tackles for loss and 5.5 sacks. **Cam Lenhardt** returns for his sophomore season after making a splash in 2023 with five tackles for loss and three sacks. **Riley Van Poppel** and **James Williams** showed flashes in their debut seasons last year and are poised for a larger role in 2024.

LINEBACKER

Nebraska returns five players who started at least one game at linebacker last season. The leader of that group is sixth-year senior **John Bullock** who made 10 starts and ranked fourth on the team with 50 tackles. Fellow senior **MJ Sherman** started five games at the JACK position and finished the season with 16 tackles.

Senior **Javin Wright** made only one start in 2023, but he was NU's second-leading tackler with 51 stops and had two interceptions. Wright will miss at least the beginning of the season while dealing with a health issue. **Mikai Gbayor** has the versatility to play inside or at the JACK position. He started four games in 2023 and finished with 24 tackles and three TFLs. **Princewill Umanmielen** was one of the top freshmen linebackers in the Big Ten in 2023 and made 22 tackles, including 4.5 tackles for loss.

SECONDARY

The secondary features four returnees with at least 13 career starts. Leading the way is fifth-year senior **Isaac Gifford**, a Lincoln native who started every game at rover last season. Gifford led the Huskers with 86 tackles, including 6.5 tackles for loss, while adding eight pass breakups. Gifford is one of three safeties with extensive experience. **Marques Buford Jr.** played in only the final four games last season after recovering from a knee injury. Buford has 13 career starts and 80 career tackles. **DeShon Singleton** proved to be a great fit in NU's defensive scheme early last season before missing the final seven games with a knee injury. Singleton made 19 tackles and 2.5 TFLs in his shortened campaign.

Malcolm Hartzog is the most versatile defender in the secondary. The junior has started at both cornerback and safety in his career and had 40 tackles with six pass breakups in 2023. Cornerback **Tommi Hill** was one of the league's best cornerbacks over the second half of the 2023 season. Hill led the Huskers with four interceptions and nine breakups and had 26 tackles.

A pair of transfers will bolster the secondary. A late summer addition, USC transfer **Ceyair Wright** joins Nebraska after starting 15 games in two seasons as a Trojan. FCS transfer **Blye Hill** was impressive during the spring but suffered an injury that could limit his availability this fall.

A LOOK AT THE HUSKER SPECIAL TEAMS

Nebraska returns both its starting place-kicker and punter for the 2024 season. **Tristan Alvano** connected on nine field goals and all 27 of his PAT attempts as a true freshman last fall. He also handled the majority of the Huskers' kickoff duties.

Punter **Brian Buschini** returns for his third season with the Huskers. Buschini averaged nearly 41 yards per punt last season and downed 20 punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line.

Nebraska returns numerous players with kickoff return experience led by **Rahmir Johnson** and **Tommi Hill.** Receiver **Alex Bullock** also saw time at punt returner last fall. Freshman **Jacory Barney Jr.** may also figure into the mix, and he had a 78-yard kickoff return in the Spring Game.

HOME OF THE HUSKERS



Memorial Stadium celebrated its 100th year in 2023. In the fall of 1922, a drive for \$430,000 in stadium construction funds was undertaken by faculty, students, alumni and friends of the University.

The stadium was named Memorial Stadium to honor all Nebraskans who served in the Civil and Spanish-American Wars; the 751 Nebraskans who died in World War I; the 3,839 in World War II; the 225 in Korea; the 422 in Vietnam; and those in Iraq.

Construction was completed in a few more than 90 working days and Memorial Stadium was dedicated on Oct. 20, 1923, at the Homecoming game in which Nebraska was held to a scoreless tie by Kansas.

The field at Memorial Stadium was named Tom Osborne Field - after the Huskers' legendary Hall-of-Fame coach - in 1998, one year after Osborne's retirement following 25 years and 255 victories as head coach.

2024 NEBRASKA SEASON NOTEBOOK

SCHEDULE NOTES

- Nebraska's schedule consists of three nonconference games to open the season followed by nine Big Ten contests. The 2024 season marks the first time since Nebraska joined the conference in 2011 that the Big Ten will not utilize a divisional format.
- Nebraska will play Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Ohio State, Purdue, Rutgers, UCLA, USC and Wisconsin. The Huskers will not play Maryland, Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Northwestern, Oregon, Penn State or Washington.
- Nebraska will play its first four games at home, markings the longest season-opening homestand since 2013 (five games).
- Beginning with the Colorado game on Sept. 7, the Huskers will play three consecutive home night games for only the third time in program history (also 2002 and 2008).
- The Big Ten opener against Illinois on Friday, Sept. 20 will mark the 400th sellout at Memorial Stadium. The game will also mark the first Friday night home game in school history while being the first weekday home game (excluding Black Friday) since 2001, when Nebraska played Rice on Thursday, Sept. 20, in a game postponed five days due to the Sept. 11 attacks.

COACHING STAFF NOTES

- Matt Rhule is in his second season at Nebraska in 2024. Rhule is in his 12th season as a head coach after previously leading programs at Temple (2013-16) and Baylor (2017-19) along with an NFL stint as head coach of the Carolina Panthers (2020-22).
- Rhule owns a career record of 52-50 in his eight seasons as a college head coach. He has a proven record as a program builder after taking on rebuilding projects at Temple, Baylor and Nebraska.
- Rhule's college teams have taken a step forward in his second season at each school. Temple improved by four wins in Rhule's second season in 2014 and Baylor improved by six wins in his second season in 2018, an improvement that led all power conference teams and ranked third in the FBS.
- Rhule then guided both the Owls and Bears to a school-record win total in his third season, when both teams also played in the conference championship game.
- Eight Husker assistants return from last season: Marcus Satterfield (offensive coordinator/tight ends), Tony White (defensive coordinator), Ed Foley (special teams coordinator), E.J. Barthel (running backs), Rob Dvoracek (linebackers), Terrance Knighton (defensive line), Garret McGuire (wide receivers) and Donovan Raiola (offensive line).
- John Butler (secondary/pass game coordinator) and Glenn Thomas (co-offensive coordinator/ quarterbacks) are in their first season at NU.

- The roster features 91 returning players and 60 newcomers. Nebraska returns a total of 20 starters and 39 letterwinners.
- Nebraska has added 12 transfers and 48 true freshmen to its roster in 2024. Among the 12 transfers are six FBS transfers, three junior college players, two FCS transfers and one NAIA transfer.
- All six of Nebraska's FBS transfers came from Power Conference programs (Florida, Oregon, Syracuse, Texas, USC and Wake Forest).
- The roster features players from 29 states and one foreign country (Germany).
- Nebraska has had a letterwinner from 47 of the 50 states in its history, missing only Idaho, New Hampshire and Rhode Island.
- States with multiple players on the Huskers' 2024 roster include: Nebraska (53), Texas (12), Iowa (8), Florida (7), Pennsylvania (7), California (6), New Jersey (5), Arizona (4), Colorado (4), Georgia (4), Illinois (3), Louisiana (3), Maryland (3), Minnesota (3), Missouri (3), New York (3), Tennessee (3), Hawaii (2), Kansas (2), Michigan (2), Mississippi (2), Montana (2) and South Dakota (2).

- The players who are wearing a single-digit jersey number (0-9) earned the right to wear that number through a team vote.

SCOUTING THE UTEP MINERS

UEP

UTEP finished the 2023 campaign with a 3-9 overall record, picking up wins against Incarnate Word, FIU and Sam Houston.

The Miners must replace their top three rushers from last season. Deion Hankins paced the UTEP rushing attack with 812 yards last season, while Torrance Burgess Jr. had 620 yards on 124 carries. The Miners return Ezell Jolly, who carried 15 times for 53 yards in 2023.

In the passing game, Cade McConnell returns after completing 53.5 percent of his passes for 1,437 yards with six touchdowns and four interceptions in seven games.

UTEP lost its top four receiving targets from last season, including Kelly Akharaiyi who had 48 receptions for 1,033 yards and seven touchdowns. Emari White returns after pulling in eight catches for 132 yards in 11 games last season.

Defensively, UTEP must replace Tyrice Knight, who led the Miner defense with 140 tackles and 15.5 tackles for loss last season. Josiah Allen is the Miners' top returning tackler after he made 41 stops in 2023, while Maurice Westmoreland returns after recording 37 tackles, 10.5 tackles for loss and a team-high 7.5 sacks last season.

Scotty Walden is in his first season as the head coach at UTEP.

Walden arrived at UTEP after spending the past four seasons at the head coach at Austin Peay. In 2023, he led the Governors to a 9-3 overall record, a perfect 6-0 mark in the United Athletic Conference and a No. 13 national ranking in the FCS. It marked the first undefeated conference season in school history. Walden was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award, presented to the FCS National Coach of the Year.

Prior to Austin Peay, Walden coached four seasons at Southern Miss. He was a wide receivers coach in 2017 and 2018 before he was promoted to co-offensive coordinator in 2019. Walden took over as interim head coach in September of 2020, coaching the Golden Eagles to a 1-3 record.

Walden began his coaching career at Sul Ross State in 2012 and was offensive coordinator at East Texas Baptist for three years (2013-15) prior to being elevated to head coach in 2016.

Saturday's matchup is Walden's first meeting vs. Nebraska.

UTEP INFORMATION

UTEP has fielded a football team since 1914, and the Miners have tallied over 400 wins as a program. UTEP has claimed two conference championships.

The Miners have made 15 bowl game appearances, claiming five wins. UTEP's last bowl game came in 2021 when the Miners took on Fresno State in the New Mexico Bowl. Fresno State came away with a 31-24 victory over the Miners.



Matt Rhule has a proven track record as a program builder. In his first two collegiate head coaching jobs at Temple (2013-16) and Baylor (2017-19), Rhule led both the Owls and the Bears to their most victories in school history in just his third season. He also took both teams to the conference championship game in year three.

Rhule took Temple from two wins in his first season to a school-record 10 victories in both his third and fourth seasons with an appearance in the conference championship game both seasons. He then took Baylor from one win in his first season to a school-record 11 victories in his third season and an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and the Sugar Bowl.

Before taking the Nebrasksa job, Rhule one won conference title, three division titles and produced three seasons with double-digit wins in a five-season span (2015-19).

TAKING TEMPLE TO NEW HEIGHTS

In his tenure at Temple from 2013 to 2016, Rhule took the Owls to new heights.

- In Rhule's second season in 2014, Temple posted the program's first win over an SEC team since 1938, its first win over a ranked opponent in 16 seasons and the program's largest margin of victory in nearly 50 years.
- Rhule won 10 games in both 2015 and 2016.
 He is responsible for two of the three 10-win seasons in Temple's 124-year history.
- He also took the Owls to back-to-back bowl games in 2015 and 2016, the first time Temple played in a bowl in consecutive seasons.
- In 2015, Rhule led Temple to the American Athletic Conference Championship Game, the first conference title game in program history.
- The next season, Rhule guided the Owls to their second conference title in program history and the first in nearly 40 years.
- Temple has spent a total of 16 weeks ranked in the 87-year history of the Associated Press top-25 poll. More than half of those top-25 rankings (9) came under Rhule in 2015 and 2016.

AN ENCORE AT BAYLOR

At Temple, Rhule led the Owls to their highest season win total in program history, their first conference championship game appearance and an impressive run in the national rankings. He produced an encore by repeating each of those same feats in three seasons at Baylor.

- Baylor finished with 11 losses in Rhule's first season in 2017 but two years later, he guided the Bears to 11 wins in 2019. Baylor became the first Power Conference program to go from 11 losses to 11 wins in two or fewer seasons
- Baylor won its final two games of the 2018 season and its first nine games of the 2019 campaign. The 11 straight victories marked the second-longest winning streak in school history, while Baylor's 9-0 start in 2019 was the best start in program history.
- In 2019, Rhule led Baylor to its most wins (11) in school history, the Bears advanced to their first Big 12 Championship Game and played in the Sugar Bowl for only the second time in program history.
- Baylor finished with a No. 13 ranking in 2019, the Bears' second-highest final ranking since 1051
