JEANNE SUTHERLAND

Head Coach (Third Season) Northern Iowa (1983)

Long-time collegiate head coach Jeanne Sutherland was named Nebraska's head coach on May 5, 2022. She originally joined the Husker program as an associate head coach on July 1, 2021.

In her first season leading the Big Red, Sutherland guided Nebraska to an NCAA Regional appearance after the Huskers claimed a top-25 national ranking midway through the fall season. Freshman Kelli Ann Strand led the Huskers on the course by claiming All-Big Ten honors. Strand added second-team All-Big Ten accolades again as a sophomore in 2023-24, as Nebraska just missed another regional berth. Strand qualified for NCAA Regionals as an individual before choosing to pursue a professional career.

Sutherland came to Nebraska after spending 10 seasons (2011-2021) as the head coach at SMU. She also spent 15 seasons as the head coach at Texas A&M (1992-2007).

In 2018, Sutherland was named the inaugural winner of the Women's Golf Coaches Association (WGCA) Kim Evans Award, presented annually to the college or high school coach, and Class A PGA Professional, whose support of the game through teaching, coaching and involvement in the community has helped ensure the continued growth of golf, and who represents the finest qualities the sport has to offer. Sutherland also earned the WGCA Founders Award in 2017.

In 2016-17, Sutherland led SMU to its fifth consecutive NCAA Regional berth after producing a runner-up finish at the American Athletic Conference Championship. She also guided the Mustangs to the highest ranking in program history (20th). Three Mustang golfers earned All-AAC honors in 2017.

SMU made an NCAA Regional trip in 2015-16 after producing three All-AAC golfers, including AAC Freshman of the Year Brigitte Dunne. Although SMU's streak of five NCAA Regional bids ended in 2016-17, Dunne advanced to play as an individual in both 2018 and 2019. She was joined in regional play in 2018 by Mustang teammate Faith Summers.

Sutherland guided the Mustangs to a 10th-place NCAA Regional finish in St. George, Utah in 2014-15, the second-best regional showing in program history. In SMU's first season in the American Athletic Conference (2013-14), Sutherland coached Jenny Hagland to the league's individual championship, before leading the Mustangs to an NCAA Regional berth in San Antonio. In 2012-13, Sutherland began a streak of taking five

straight SMU teams to NCAA Regional play, as the Mustangs earned a spot at the Norman Regional.

Prior to her long stay at SMU's head coach, Sutherland spent 15 successful seasons at Texas A&M (1992-2007). A four-time conference coach of the year in Aggieland (3 Big 12, 1 Southwest), Sutherland was also a two-time NCAA Regional Coach of the Year (1997, 2007). She led 13 Texas A&M teams to NCAA Regional play in her 15 years in College Station.

Before Sutherland's arrival at A&M, the Aggies had not won a tournament in seven years. In 15 years, she led Texas A&M to 13 tournament crowns and three Big 12 Conference titles. In addition to the team's success, Sutherland's players earned three All-America honors, four individual conference titles, 22 regular-season individual titles, 25 all-conference accolades, three conference player-of-the-year awards, two newcomer-of-the-year honors, 17 WGCA Scholastic All-America honors and 50 academic all-conference selections.

Sutherland's Texas A&M teams were perennially ranked in the national top 25, including a highest national ranking of No. 14. She led the Aggies to four NCAA Championship appearances, taking 17th in 1997, 19th in 2006, 22nd in 2005, and 23rd in 2004.

Following her time with the Aggies, Sutherland stepped away from college golf for four years (2007-11) to serve as the Head Professional at the Vail Golf Club in Colorado. She had previously served as an Assistant Golf Professional at Vail for seven years (1985-92).

A PGA and WGCA member, Sutherland also has strong Midwestern ties. She earned her bachelor's degree in secondary education (English) from Northern Iowa in 1983, before earning her master's degree in athletic administration from Iowa in 1989.

A member of the University of Northern Iowa Athletic Hall of Fame, Sutherland was named to the 1981 AIAW Division II All-America Team and the 1981 and 1982 AIAW All-Region 6 teams. As a sophomore at the 1981 AIAW Division II National Championships, she grabbed a third-place individual finish and led the Panthers to a third-place team finish. As a junior, she led UNI to a fifth-place national finish, which included her 13th-place individual performance. A native of Dubuque, she is also a member of the Dubuque Senior High School Athletic Hall of Fame.

MATT ZEDRICK

Associate Head Coach (Third Season) Illinois State (2010)

Matt Zedrick enters his third season at Nebraska and his second as the associate head coach of the Husker women's golf team. Zedrick came to Lincoln as an assistant coach after spending the 2021-22 season as an assistant at Chattanooga.

Zedrick joined Nebraska Head Coach Jeanne Sutherland's first Husker staff on June 1, 2022, and brought six seasons of head coaching experience at the NCAA Division I level with him to Lincoln.

In his first season in Lincoln, Zedrick made an instant impact, helping Nebraska capture an NCAA Regional bid after climbing into the top 25 in the national rankings midway through the fall campaign.

The Huskers claimed team tournament titles at both the Badger Invitational (Sept. 18-20, 2022) and the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 26-27, 2023) while adding runner-up finishes at the Green Wave Classic (Sept. 12-13, 2022), the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 10-11, 2022) and the FAU Paradise Invitational (Feb. 6-7, 2023), before advancing to the 2023 NCAA Raleigh Regional.

"We're very happy to add Matt to our staff," Sutherland said. "I've had the privilege to watch him coach over the years and I've always been impressed with his knowledge and ability to communicate with players. His skills in player development and strategy will really add to our ability to compete at the highest levels."

From 2015-16 to 2020-21, Zedrick guided the Purdue Fort Wayne women's golf program to one of the most successful stretches in program history.

His Mastodon teams rewrote virtually every school record on the course, including a 2020-21 team scoring average of

311.8. Purdue Fort Wayne's top golfers, Holly Anderson and Linnzie Richner set school records for 18, 36 and 54 holes, while Anderson claimed school records for the best season and career stroke averages. Anderson capped her career as a second-team All-Horizon League selection in 2020-21.

In addition to their success on the course, Zedrick's Mastodons claimed 19 WGCA All-America Scholar awards in his six seasons leading the program.

Prior to his time at Purdue Fort Wayne, Zedrick spent the 2014-15 season as the men's golf head coach at Garden City Community College in Kansas. He guided Skyler Tebo to an NJCAA Championship appearance in 2015. Tebo went on to compete at both UMKC and Fort Hays State.

Zedrick began his college coaching career in 2012-13 as the assistant women's golf coach at Marshall. He spent two seasons with the Herd women's golf team, helping Kristyn Morrone capture Conference USA Newcomer-of-the-Year honors. He also served as an assistant men's golf coach at Marshall in 2014.

Matt and his wife, Gwen, have two daughters, Sophia and Tillie. Originally from Danville, Ill., Matt earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Illinois State in 2010. He earned his master's degree in adult education from Marshall in 2014.

Matt's brother, Zac, is the associate men's golf coach at Notre Dame.

CRAIG SAGER

Director of Operations (First Season) Central Missouri (2004)

Craig Sager enters his first season as the director of men's and women's golf operations at Nebraska after spending the past four seasons as the head coach of the men's and women's programs at William Jewell in Liberty, Mo.

In 2024, he led the William Jewell men to their best finish in history at the GLVC Tournament. He also guided Bryson Oots to the first individual NCAA Division II national tournament appearance in program history.

In 2022, Sager helped Frida Hammarlund to an individual NCAA Tournament berth as well.

Sager took over the top job at William Jewell in January of 2020, and was selected to the NCAA Division II Men's Golf Midwest Regional Advisory Committee in July of 2021, serving on the committee from 2022 through 2024.

Prior to his time at William Jewell, Sager spent three seasons leading the North Central Missouri College men's

golf program. He led the Pirates to back-to-back NJCAA Region XVI Championships. Nine of his golfers earned trips to the national tournament, while also claiming six all-region and three all-district awards. His 2018 squad was the NJCAA Academic Team of the Year after producing the best GPA in the country. Ten of his golfers earned NJCAA All-Academic honors.

Sager was the course superintendent at the Riverside Country Club from 2010 to 2013, before serving as the general manager at the Green Hills Golf Course in Chillicothe, Mo., from 2013 to 2023. He was also the head professional at the Cameron Golf Club from 2010 to 2024.

A TPI Certified instructor, Sager is a native of Trenton, Mo. He earned his bachelor's degree in business management from Central Missouri in 2004.



ERIC JOHNSON

Women's Golf Strength Coach (Seventh Season) Nebraska (2013)

Eric Johnson was hired as a full-time assistant strength and conditioning coach in September of 2018 after serving as a strength and conditioning intern since July of 2016.

Johnson works with Nebraska's men's and women's golf, cross country, rifle and men's and women's tennis teams.

Prior to his time at Nebraska, Johnson was a strength and conditioning intern at the US Performance Center

in Charlotte, N.C. from January through April in 2016. He worked with all age groups from elementary to professional athletes.

A Wallace, Neb., native, Johnson graduated from UNL with a degree in nutrition, exercise and health science. During his time as a student, Johnson was a student manager for Nebraska track and field team from 2007 to 2011.



ZACH SMITH

Assistant Equipment Manager (First Season) Iowa State (2006)

Zach Smith is in his first season with the Nebraska equipment staff in 2024-25, bringing extensive experience in the industry.

He spent 10 years at the University of Northern Iowa, serving the last five as an athletic equipment manager. In that role, Smith oversaw equipment operations for all 17 university-sponsored sports, managed inventory, was the primary point of contact on the school's Nike contract and trained other staff in the department. Smith transitioned into that role after five years as an assistant equipment manager at UNI.

Before his time at UNI, Smith was the Iowa Barnstormers' head equipment manager for eight months in 2014.

From 2016 to 2024, Smith was also the assistant director of equipment operations for the East-West Shrine Bowl. In that role, Smith worked with game officials to contact invitees and equipment managers, ensured practices were staffed, coordinated locker room setup and installed coach-to-player radio communication in the helmets of both teams.

The Fremont, Neb., native has over 20 years of experience, including time with the Detroit Lions, Miami Dolphins and San Francisco 49ers. He obtained a sports management degree from Iowa State in 2006, where he was a student manager with the football team for four years.



ALVIN BANKS

Coordinator of Student-Athlete Development (22nd Season) Nebraska (1991)

Alvin Banks serves as an academic counselor and the coordinator of student-athlete development for Nebraska's Academic Performance Team. Banks began working as an academic counselor at Nebraska in 2003, after serving two years as an assistant academic counselor.

As Nebraska's coordinator of student-athlete development, he provides academic, athletic, personal and career counseling to all Husker student-athletes. As an academic counselor, he works primarily with the Nebraska men's and women's golf teams, the women's swimming and diving team and the wrestling team, while also assisting with the football team.

Before joining the Academic Performance Team, Banks served six years as a law enforcement officer for the City of Lincoln. He is currently a member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics.

Banks, who lettered in football at Nebraska during the 1991 season, earned his master's degree in vocational education in 1998, after receiving a bachelor's degree in business management in 1992 from Nebraska. Banks and his wife, Lisa, have two children, Kaylie and Darius.



JESSALYN WILSON

Performance Nutrition RD Fellow (First Season) Viterbo (2023)

Jessalyn Wilson is in her first season as an RD Fellow with the Nebraska Performance Nutrition program, where she works directly with the Husker women's golf team, the Nebraska softball program and the NU rifle team.

Wilson graduated summa cum laude with a bachelor's degree in nutrition and dietetics from Viterbo University in La Crosse, Wis., in 2023, before earning her master's degree in the same field from Viterbo in 2024.

Wilson served as a dietetic intern with the Huskers from August to October of 2023. She also did a four-month

internship at Mercyhealth Wisconsin (Janesville) and Illinois (Rockford) from January to April of 2024.

Wilson was heavily involved in competitive dance at Viterbo, where she captured NAIA All-America honors in 2020 and 2023. She was also a College Sports Communicators Academic All-District selection in 2023. She was a three-time Daktronics NAIA Scholar-Athlete award winner.

She gained additional experience as a dance educator and choreographer for five years.



JEFF GRIESCH

Senior Associate Communicators Director (27th Season) Nebraska (1998)

Griesch serves as the Senior Associate Communications Director, coordinating all aspects of media relations for the women's basketball and women's golf programs while also coordinating student assignments for Nebraska's sports.

Griesch hires and supervises the student assistants in the Athletic Communications Office, while also serving as the senior editor for all of Nebraska's media guides.

In addition to his supervisory roles, Griesch helps Associate Athletic Director Keith Mann in promoting the Nebraska football program, along with other office duties assigned by Mann.

Griesch enters his 27th season as a radio color commentator for Nebraska women's basketball in 2024-25. He also spent 11 seasons as the host of the Nebraska Women's Basketball TV Show.

He has served as Nebraska women's basketball contact at 13 NCAA Tournaments, including the first two NCAA Sweet 16 bids in school history (2010, 2013). He also has helped promote three first-round WNBA Draft picks (Lindsey Moore, Kelsey Griffin, Nicole Kubik) and two first-team WBCA All-Americans (Griffin, Jordan Hooper).

Griesch spent six years as an assistant director and two years as a graduate intern in the Media Relations Office, after starting his sports information career as a student in October of 1995.

In 2007-08, Griesch's Nebraska's women's basketball media and recruiting guide was voted the third-best guide in the nation. His women's golf guide also finished third in the national contest, the highest rankings in history for both of those publications.

Griesch earned a bachelor's of journalism degree in news-editorial from Nebraska in 1996. He was the first two-time recipient of the Wylie Smith Postgraduate Scholarship and was a Regents Scholar as both an undergraduate and graduate student. He served a three-year term as the chair of the College Sports Communicators prestigious graduate and undergraduate scholarship committee, which has awarded hundreds of thousands of dollars to exceptional candidates in the media relations field since its inception.

Griesch and his wife, Emily, are originally from Wayne, Neb., and have a daughter, Hollan, and three sons, Jackson, Brennan and Isaac.

Jeff Griesch is in his 22nd season as media relations contact for the Nebraska women's golf program and his 30th season overall with Nebraska Athletics.

TROY DANNEN

Athletic Director (First Season) Northern Iowa (1989)



Troy Dannen, a leading voice in collegiate athletics with extensive experience as an athletic director and deep ties to the Midwest, is in his first year as Nebraska's Director of Athletics. Dannen was hired on March 20, 2024, and has hit the ground running in Lincoln.

Nebraska Athletics enjoyed success during Dannen's first championship season, as the Husker baseball program won its first Big Ten Tournament title and reached the 40-win plateau for the first time since 2014 while the Husker track teams put together impressive showings. The Husker men won the Big Ten Outdoor title and earned their best NCAA Championship finish since 2016 with a 13th-place finish, while the Husker women posted their second straight top-10 NCAA finish and placed ninth at the national meet. Nebraska finished 22nd in the final 2023-24 Learfield Director's Cup, the program's highest finish since 2010.

Dannen has been a leader in charting the course for a new era of collegiate athletics, serving from 2021 to 2023 as a member of the NCAA Constitution Committee and the Division I Transformation Committee. Dannen also previously served as the chair of the NCAA Football Competition Committee and was an Executive Committee member of the Football Oversight Committee. In total, Dannen has served on seven NCAA committees.

In 2022, Dannen was a finalist for Sports Business Journal's Athletic Director of the Year award, and he received the Distinguished American Award from the Sugar Bowl Chapter of the National Football Foundation.

Dannen came to Lincoln after serving as Director of Athletics at the University of Washington. He helped guide the Huskies' transition to the Big Ten Conference and oversaw a football program that reached the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in January of 2024.

He arrived at Washington in the fall of 2023 after serving as Director of Athletics at Tulane University since 2015.

While at Tulane, Green Wave student-athletes earned 49 All-America honors, a national championship, 21 conference championships and 41 postseason appearances.

In 2022-23, Tulane football won its first American Athletic Conference football championship and won the Cotton Bowl over USC, which was ranked ninth in the nation at that time. The men's basketball program won 20 regular-season games for the first time in two decades. Additionally, men's tennis advanced to its sixth NCAA Tournament in seven years, both bowling and beach volleyball finished ranked in the top 20, and baseball won the conference championship.

Tulane's football program participated in an unprecedented three consecutive bowl games from 2018 to 2020, winning back-to-back bowl games for the first time in 128 years of football at the University.

In the classroom, Tulane student-athletes excelled at a high-level. At the end of the 2022-23 academic year, over 68 percent of Green Wave student-athletes earned a 3.0 GPA or better, with a 93 percent Graduation Success Rate and a record-setting department Academic Progress Report of 992, with seven teams earning a perfect 1000 APR score.

Dannen spearheaded fundraising efforts and numerous capital projects at Tulane. He helped secure the largest unrestricted gift in Tulane Athletics history, an endowment gift that funded the operation of a new sport (sailing), and a \$10 million lead gift for capital renovations, which was the second-largest gift in department history. In addition, marketing and licensing revenue grew four-fold, and in 2022-

23, Tulane football, basketball and volleyball set ticket sales and revenue records. Under Dannen's leadership, the Green Wave Club Annual Fund grew by 40 percent in terms of donors, and 45 percent in terms of dollars.

Increases in fundraising and major gift donors positively impacted capital project development and completion. A \$13 million renovation to the Reilly Natatorium, home of the swimming and diving program, as well as \$8 million in renovations to locker rooms and the sports medicine area

inside the Wilson Center were completed in 2023. Dannen also oversaw construction of a new dining facility, weight room, basketball and volleyball locker rooms. Tulane also completed a \$2.4 million academic center renovation and a \$5 million television and digital production center.

Dannen came to Tulane after serving eight years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Northern Iowa (UNI) from 2008 to 2015. During his tenure, the Panthers enjoyed success at both the conference and national levels, highlighted by an NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in 2010 by the UNI men's basketball team. During his eight-year tenure, UNI was recognized with 39 All-Americans, 13 Coaches of the Year and nine Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) Players of the Year. UNI football, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball and softball combined to reach 15 NCAA tournaments and 20 postseason berths during that stretch. For his efforts, Dannen was recognized as NACDA's FCS Athletic Director of the Year in 2014.

Prior to his time at UNI, Dannen served as the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union's Executive Director for seven years, overseeing 400 high schools and 10 sports.

Dannen grew up on a farm just outside Marshalltown, Iowa, and graduated from UNI in 1989 with a degree in communications. He is married to Amy, and has four children: Elle, Emily, Holly and William.



KRISTEN BROWN

Deputy A.D./SWA (First Season) Northern Illinois (2003)

Kristen Brown joined Nebraska Athletics in July of 2024. She will serve as Deputy Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator, with sport administrator duties for several Husker sports including volleyball and women's basketball.

Brown joins the Huskers after serving as the Deputy Athletics Director for Administration and Leadership at Texas A&M (2020-24).

At Texas A&M, Brown directed a newly created Engagement unit that worked to ensure the talents of all coaches and administrators are supported at the highest level, and she oversaw the compliance department on a permanent basis. Working closely with Athletic Director Ross Bjork and serving as the department's Senior Woman Administrator, Brown was the sports administrator for women's basketball, volleyball, soccer, men's and women's tennis and men's and women's swimming and diving.

She spent her first two years at Texas A&M as Deputy Athletics Director for Student-Athlete Experience, during which she provided executive leadership for the department on all matters related to student-athlete engagement including academics, life skills and career development served as sports administrator for seven sports, and led the department's Diversity & Inclusion efforts.

Prior to serving the Aggies, Brown worked as the Associate Athletic Director of Administration at the University

Prior to her tenure at Maryland, Brown served as a conference administrator for the American Athletic Conference, the Big East and the Big Ten Conference.

In addition to her administrative duties at Maryland, Brown served as the department's Diversity & Inclusion Officer and was a member of the university's Diversity & Inclusion Cabinet. Within the department, she played a key role in the development of a professional development program for department's staff, served on the Big Ten sports management committee, and chaired numerous committees related to head coach hiring searches. Externally, Brown led the department's Championships and Community Engagement units, which included the Share the Shell program, the winner of the 2017 NACDA Community Service Award presented by the Fiesta Bowl.

A graduate of Northern Illinois University, Brown was a two-time letter winner in women's basketball. The Rockford, Ill., native also holds a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University.

Women's Golf Sport Administrator (Second Season) Nebraska (2005)

Jena Johnson enters her second season as the sport administrator for Nebraska's women's golf.

An associate director of compliance at Nebraska since 2017, Johnson began her full-time work in the Nebraska Athletic Department as an assistant compliance director in 2005.

Johnson helps ensure that all 24 of Nebraska's varsity sports adhere to the rules and regulations set forth by the NCAA and the Big Ten Conference. Johnson focuses her attention on athletic scholarships, the NCAA Student Assistance Fund and student athlete education.

Prior to her full-time employment with Nebraska Athletics, Johnson worked as a student-assistant in the compliance office throughout her time as a student in Lincoln from 2001 to 2005.

A native of Exeter, Neb., Johnson graduated from Nebraska in 2005 with a degree in marketing. She and her husband, Jose, were married in 2004, and the couple has three children, Isabel, and twin daughters, Elena and Alexis.



Dr. Rodney D. Bennett began his work as the 21st chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on July 1, 2023. He is a 30-year veteran of higher education with a track record of growing research, increasing student success and building impactful partnerships.

In his first year at Nebraska, the University experienced rising retention and graduation rates, demonstrated positive signs related to enrollment, and expanded its research and creative activity efforts. In the fall of 2023, almost 4,700 first-time freshmen enrolled at UNL—an increase of 1.3 percent from 2022.

Spring 2024 overall enrollment reversed a trend of five straight years of spring enrollment declines.

Over the last five years, UNL retention from first to second year has increased 2.3 percent and the four-year graduation rate has increased more than 8.5 percent.

RODNEY BENNETT

Chancellor (Second Season) Middle Tennessee State (1990)

In 2023, the university's total research expenditures grew to \$366 million, a 37 percent increase over the past decade. UNL has also experienced tremendous growth in externally sponsored federal funding, increasing to a record \$163 million in 2023.

Chancellor Bennett came to Nebraska after nine years of successful leadership at the University of Southern Mississippi. During his tenure as president, USM was reclassified from a Carnegie R2 to an R1 university, signaling growth in research prestige and funding. Dr. Bennett also invested in programs to support student recruitment, retention and outcomes, including for the 30 percent of USM students who were first-generation. His efforts led to an improvement in the university's six-year graduation rate.

Prior to his role at the University of Southern Mississippi, Dr. Bennett served at the University of Georgia for more than a decade. He was the senior administrator for student programs and services for Georgia's 34,000-plus students; oversaw \$150 million in capital projects; and made key staff and programmatic investments in extracurriculars, mental health programs and other areas to better support students.

Dr. Bennett has also been the dean of students at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina, and associate dean of student life at Middle Tennessee State University.

Chancellor Bennett values community leadership and service. He has served on numerous boards, including the Mississippi Aquarium, Northeast Georgia Girl Scouts of America, Catholic Health East (Philadelphia), and St. Mary's Health Care System in Athens, Georgia. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and Past Sire Archon for Sigma Pi Phi fraternity, The Boulé.

Dr. Bennett earned a bachelor's degree in mass communication, a master's degree in educational

academic divisions and research and extension centers across the state. He serves as chief spokesman and chief executive officer for the system, which operates on a \$3 billion annual budget and includes a flagship Big Ten institution, a world-renowned academic health sciences center, Division I athletics programs, and preeminent institutes focused on water and agriculture, national security and defense, infectious disease and early childhood education.

He is a nationally recognized higher education and health care leader and advocate. He was the chancellor of the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) and board chair for the Nebraska Medicine Health System from 2014 to 2024. As UNMC's chief operating officer, Dr. Gold was responsible for all aspects of campus leadership, program quality and operation—including 7 colleges, 37 institutes and centers, 5,429 faculty and staff and 4,700 health professions students.

In July 2021, Dr. Gold was named the Provost and Executive Vice President of the University of Nebraska System in addition to his ongoing UNMC/Nebraska Medicine responsibilities. In this role, he served as the chief academic officer of the University of Nebraska System and liaison to the Board of Regents for academic affairs. From May 2017 through June 2021, Dr. Gold served as the chancellor of the University of Nebraska at Omaha,

Jeffrey P. Gold, M.D., became the ninth president of the University of Nebraska System on July 1, 2024, following a national search by the Board of Regents.

As president, Gold leads a four-campus university system that enrolls nearly 50,000 students and employs 16,000 faculty and staff on campuses in Lincoln, Omaha and Kearney, plus

the state's only public metropolitan university—a role he held concurrently with being UNMC's chancellor.

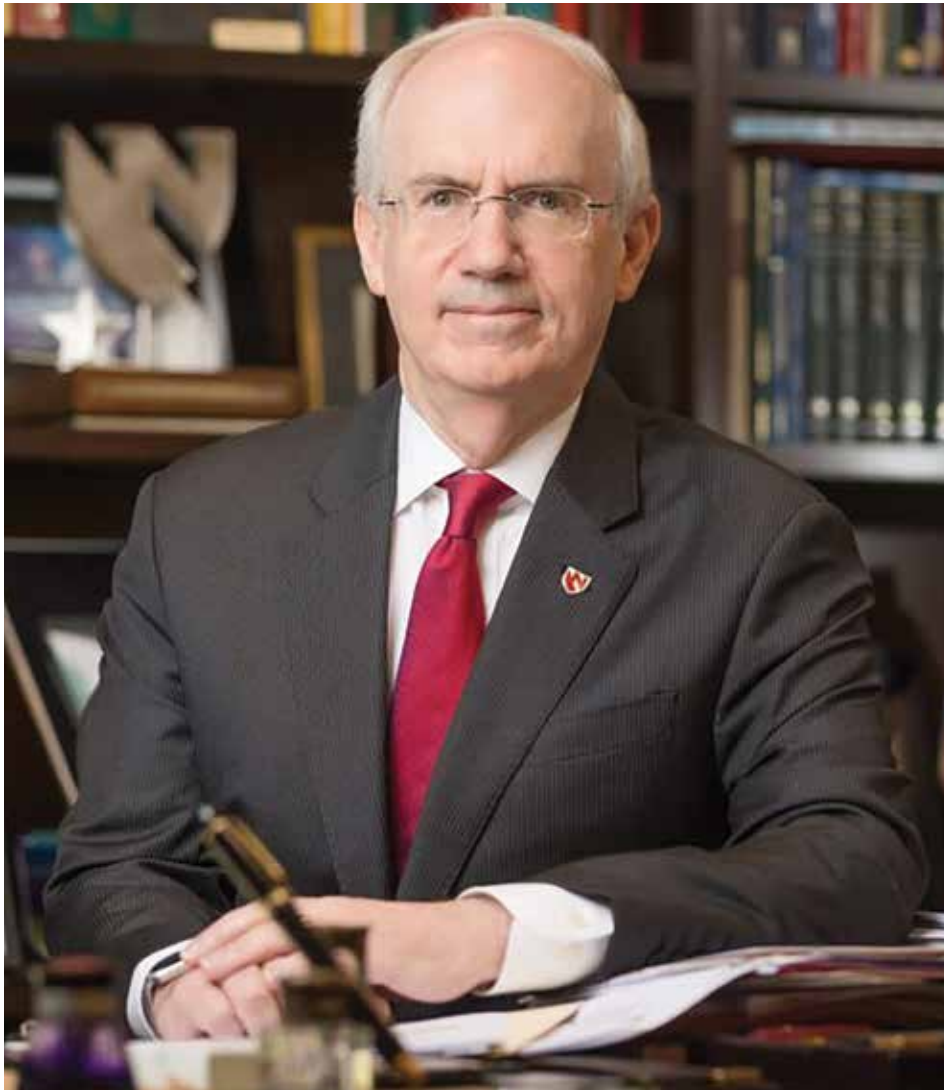

He has been certified by the American Board of Surgery and by the American Board of Thoracic Surgery, specializing in adult and pediatric cardiac surgery. Dr. Gold is licensed in Nebraska, Ohio, New York and New Jersey.

Dr. Gold leads several key economic development boards for the State and the University System, including the Greater Omaha Chamber, University Tech Development Corp, the University Tech Transfer Corp, and UNeTech Corp.

His national leadership roles have included more than 50 national professional committees and more than 100 national organizations, volunteer boards, government and public health councils. He has worked extensively with national- and state-level elected and appointed governing and administrative bodies as an advisor and trusted resource in the areas of higher education, research and clinical care.

Dr. Gold has been married for more than forty years to a medical school classmate. He has two adult children and two grandchildren.

HUSKERS AIM FOR RETURN TO NCAA REGIONALS



Miu Takahashi is Nebraska's top returning golfer in 2024-25. The senior from Nasu-machi, Japan owns the No. 3 career stroke average in school history and has played nearly 100 rounds in the Husker lineup entering her fourth season with the Huskers.

A new-look Nebraska lineup will take aim at its third NCAA Regional bid in the past five seasons, when the Husker women's golf team hits the course for the 2024-25 campaign.

Jeanne Sutherland, who enters her third season at the helm of the Huskers, will try to guide her team to a 20th NCAA Regional berth as a head coach.

In her first season leading the Huskers in 2022-23, Sutherland led the Big Red to the NCAA Raleigh Regional. Last season, Nebraska just missed out on a regional appearance, while Kelli Ann Strand captured an NCAA Regional berth after capturing All-Big Ten honors for the second consecutive season.

However, Strand chose to pursue a professional career early and the Huskers also lost veteran contributors Lindsey Thiele and Michaela Vavrova to graduation. The 2024-25 Nebraska lineup must also replace part-time contributors Sydney Harz and Lena Hassert.

Although the Big Red must fill the voids left by five letterwinners, including three of its top four golfers from 2023-24, Sutherland is confident Nebraska's roster has the firepower to shoot the Huskers back to NCAA Regional competition.

Miu Takahashi will likely anchor Nebraska's lineup in 2024-25. The senior from Nasu-machi, Japan enters her fourth year as a regular in the Husker lineup. Last season, Takahashi ranked second among the Huskers with a 73.91 stroke average over 32 rounds. She owns a 74.82 stroke average over 98.5 career rounds, which ranks as the No. 3 average in Nebraska history.

Takahashi's consistency and her ability to go low have helped produce nine career top-25 finishes, including five top-10 performances through her first three seasons. She captured a tournament title as a sophomore at the 2022 Dale McNamara Invitational.

Arden Louchheim joins Takahashi as a returning golfer to the Nebraska lineup. The sophomore from Park City, Utah, ranked fifth among the Huskers with a solid 75.73 stroke average as a true freshman in 2023-24. Louchheim competed in 30 rounds and performed well both on and off the course. The three-time Utah Class 2A state champion and the 2023 Utah Girls Amateur Champion was a 2024 WGCA Scholastic All-American.

With a year of collegiate experience under her belt, the Huskers are hoping to see Louchheim regularly climb the leader board during the 2024-25 campaign.

Nebraska's third returning letterwinner is fifth-year Husker Andrea Velez. The three-time letterwinner carries a 76.92 stroke average over 43.5 career rounds. The senior from Pereira, Colombia competed in just eight rounds a year ago, but the 2023 WGCA Scholastic All-America owns a pair of top-25 finishes in her career.

Brooke Bream enters her fourth season at Nebraska hunting for her first significant lineup time. A late-comer to golf during the pandemic, Bream has competed as an individual at one tournament each of the past two seasons. In the classroom, Bream has performed at a high level, earning Academic All-Big Ten honors in both 2023 and 2024 before claiming her bachelor's degree in economics in May of 2024. The redshirt junior from Phoenix, Ariz., has two years of eligibility remaining on the course as she pursues a master's degree at Nebraska.

Brooke's younger sister, Mackenzie, also returns to the Big Red roster. Mackenzie Bream redshirted a year ago and hopes to contend for her first playing time in the Husker lineup along with seven other talented newcomers in 2024-25.

Sophomore Hannah Kono along with redshirt sophomores Symran Shah and Lauren Thiele are leading contenders as transfers to fill lineup spots for the Huskers.

Kono, a second-year collegiate golfer from Enköping, Sweden, finished sixth individually to help Oakland (Mich.) University to the 2024 Horizon League Championship. At the NCAA East Lansing Regional, Kono tied for 41st as an individual to close her freshman season with a 75.85 stroke average over 27 rounds. The two-time Horizon League Golfer of the Week was also a WGCA Scholastic All-American in 2024.

"We're very excited to add Hannah to our team," Sutherland said. "She has the desire to be a great player and has experience at both the college and international levels. She's one of those players who loves to spend her day at the golf course and enjoys every aspect of the game."

Shah comes to Lincoln after redshirting in her second season at Virginia Tech in 2023-24. The redshirt sophomore from Carrolltown, Texas, was the 2021 First Tee National Champion before competing in two rounds for the Hokies as a true freshman in 2022-23.

"We're very excited for Symran to join our team," Sutherland said. "I watched her play a lot of golf when she was in high school, and she is a focused competitor and a very skilled player. Her sister Serena played for me at SMU, so I'm familiar with the support her family brings to her and to our team. I know it's a great fit."

Thiele also brings a strong family connection to Sutherland and Nebraska. The fourth Thiele sister to compete in women's golf for the Huskers, following Haley (2016-20), Hannah (2018-20) and Lindsey (2020-24), Lauren spent her first two collegiate seasons at Wichita State. As a redshirt freshman in 2023-24, Lauren Thiele produced a 76.80 stroke average over 20 rounds. She was WSU's No. 2 golfer during the spring, when she notched a 76.07 average over 15 rounds, while continuing another family tradition as a WGCA Scholastic All-American.

"We're happy that Lauren Thiele is coming back home to be a Husker," Sutherland said. "Lauren brings power, athleticism and the desire to develop into a great player. She is a great person and will make us a better team."

The four members of Nebraska's freshman class also could make immediate impacts.

Four-time Iowa High School Athletic Union Player-of-the-Year Eden Lohrbach was a three-time Iowa Class 3A state individual champion at Ames High School.

"Eden will make an immediate impact on our team," Sutherland said. "She loves the game of golf. She knows how to score, and plays her best when it matters most. She went undefeated as a junior in high school golf, and that speaks to her competitiveness and focus on the course. She is very excited to join the Huskers and do her best to help us win tournaments."

Bridget Butler (Barrington, Ill.) and Danica Lundgren (Austin, Texas) also bring strong credentials to Nebraska. Butler was a three-time all-conference and all-regional golfer while helping Barrington High School to a Class 2A state championship in 2021.

"Bridget is a tremendous athlete who has the ability to grow into a leader at Nebraska," Sutherland said. "She has a strong work ethic and the desire to help the Huskers win championships. She brings a strong team spirit and love of competition to the team."

Lundgren was the 2023 Southern Texas PGA Junior Golfer of the Year and captured 55 Southern Texas PGA titles from 2015 to 2023. She was also a first-team Texas University Interscholastic League (UIL) Class 6A all-state selection in 2023 at Vandegrift High School. She helped Vandegrift to state team championships in 2023 and 2024.

"Danica is the type of player we love at Nebraska," Sutherland said. "She helped her team win two state championships, which makes her one of five players in our incoming class who won state high school team titles."

Four-time Nebraska Class C all-state choice Olivia Lovegrove from Lincoln Christian High School rounds out the Husker newcomers. The 2022 Class C individual state champion, Lovegrove added a runner-up individual finish as a senior in 2023. She was also a three-time Nebraska Super-State selection.

"Olivia has been a dominant player in Lincoln and the state of Nebraska," Sutherland said. "She loves Nebraska and has worked hard to be the best player she can be to help us be a better team. She is strong in the classroom and a wonderful person. We are looking forward to her being a Husker."

The Huskers open the season at the Badger Invitational at University Ridge Golf Club in Verona, Wis. (Sept. 8-10), before traveling to Texas for the Red Raider Invitational at the Rawls Course in Lubbock (Sept. 24-25). Nebraska returns to Texas for the Jim West Challenge at Kissing Tree Golf Club in San Marcos (Oct. 20-21), before closing the fall at the Hurricane Invitational at the Biltmore Golf Club in Miami (Oct. 28-29).

Nebraska jumps into a busy spring by returning to Florida for the UCF Challenge at Eagle Creek Golf Club in Orlando (Feb. 2-4).

The Big Red then make back-to-back trips to Arizona, beginning with the Westbrook Spring Invitational in Peoria (Feb. 23-24), before heading to Tucson for the MountainView Collegiate at the Preserve Golf Course (March 2-4).

Nebraska returns to Florida for the Spring Break Shootout at the Lake Jovita Golf Club in Dade City (March 17-18), before traveling to South Carolina for the Clemson Invitational at The Reserve at Lake Keowee in Sunset (March 28-30).

The Huskers close the regular season by competing at the Maryland Invitational on the University of Maryland Golf Course in College Park (April 6-7), before returning to Maryland for the Big Ten Championship at Bulle Rock Golf Club in Havre de Grace (April 18-20).

The Big Red will learn its 2025 NCAA Regional fate during the NCAA Selection Show on Wednesday, April 23, before NCAA competition is held May 5-7 at six regional sites around the country (Charlottesville, Va.; Columbus, Ohio; Golf Canyon, Ariz.; Lexington, Ky.; Lubbock, Texas; Norman, Okla.).

The NCAA Championship returns to the Omni La Costa Resort and Spa Champions Course in Carlsbad, Calif. (May 16-21).

MIU TAKAHASHI

Senior (Three Letters)

Nasu-machi, Japan (Kaishi Kokusai)

OUTLOOK (2024-25)

The most experienced golfer on Nebraska's 2024-25 roster, Miu Takahashi will look to lead the Huskers back to NCAA Regional play this season. The senior from Nasu-machi, Japan, produced Nebraska's second-best stroke average (73.91) as a junior in 2023-24 while competing in 32 rounds.

In 98.5 career rounds as a Husker, Takahashi ranks third in Nebraska history with a 74.82 stroke average.

The other 11 golfers on Nebraska's 2024-25 roster enter the season having combined for 128.5 collegiate rounds.

JUNIOR (2023-24)

Takahashi produced her best effort of the season with a career-best 211 (-5) to tie for 29th at the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 25-26) in Peoria, Ariz. She posted three consecutive rounds better than par (71-69-71) including a season-best-tying 69 in the second round on the par-72, 6,248-yard layout of the Westbrook Village Golf Club. She followed with consistent showings of 221 (74-74-73) to tie for 29th at the Briar's Creek Invitational (March 11-12) in Johns Island, S.C., before tying for 28th with a 220 (71-73-76) at the Florida State Match Up in Tallahassee (March 15-16). She tied for 29th with teammates Michaela Vavrova and Arden Louchheim with three-round scores of 228 (+12) at the Therese Hession Buckeye Invitational (April 13-14). It was Takahashi's fifth top-30 finish of the season.

She closed her junior season by tying for 49th with a 227 (+11) at the Big Ten Championship. Nebraska's No. 3 individual finisher, Takahashi produced rounds of 76, 73 and 78 at the Bulle Rock Golf Course in Havre de Grace, Md.

Takahashi, who was the only Husker to compete in all 32 rounds during the season, finished with a 73.91 stroke average, which ranked second among the Huskers on the year.

She tied for 41st at 151, including a 69 (-3) in the second round of the rain-shortened Spartan Sun Coast Invitational in Sarasota, Fla. (Feb. 18-19). Takahashi opened her third season as a Husker by tying for 54th with a 220 (+4) at the Sam Golden Invitational (Sept. 11-12). She carded scores of 74-72-74 on the par-72, 6,413-yard layout at the Oakmont Country Club in Corinth, Texas to help Nebraska to a tie for fifth in a 12-team field that included seven 2023 NCAA Regional-qualifying teams.

She was Nebraska's No. 2 finisher in a tie for 29th at the Mary Fossum Invitational (Sept. 17-18). Takahashi's 54-hole score of 224 included Nebraska's only individual round better

than par (71) in the second round on the par-72, 6,370-yard layout at Forest Akers West Golf Course in East Lansing. Her 71 came in between rounds of 77 and 76. She helped the Huskers to a tie for sixth in a 15-team field that included nine 2023 NCAA Regional-qualifying teams.

Takahashi fired another 224 to tie for 44th at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 9-10). Her score included a season-best 69 (-3) in the second round on the par-72, 6,246-yard layout at the Golf Club of Oklahoma in Broken Arrow. She helped the Huskers to a fifth-place finish in a 14-team field that featured 10 top-100 teams.

She closed the fall as Nebraska's No. 2 finisher at the Landfall Tradition in Wilmington, N.C. (Oct. 27-29). Takahashi tied for 54th with a 220 (+4) in an NCAA-caliber 96-player field on the 6,194-yard layout at the Country Club of Landfall.

Takahashi posted a 74.00 stroke average through 12 fall rounds, before opening the spring with a 219 (+3) at the UCF Challenge (Feb. 3-5). She was Nebraska's No. 2 finisher in a tie for 45th in a strong 96-player field with rounds of 73, 74 and 72 at the Eagle Creek Golf Club in Orlando.

SOPHOMORE (2022-23)

Takahashi was one of Nebraska's top golfers as a sophomore in 2022-23, helping the Huskers to an NCAA Raleigh Regional appearance.

Takahashi set the Nebraska sophomore stroke average record (73.49) and capped her second season in Lincoln with a tie for 42nd at the NCAA Raleigh Regional with a 226 (+10), including an opening-round 74 and a final-round 73 on the par-72, 6,324-yard layout at the Lonnie Poole Golf Club.

Takahashi captured her first career collegiate individual title by posting a then-career-best 213 (-3) in a 75-player field at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 10-11). She closed with a career-best final-round 69 (-3), taking the title after entering the final round in a tie for sixth at even-par 144 (71-73) on the 6,302-yard layout of the Cedar Ridge Country Club in Broken Arrow, Okla. She helped the Huskers to a runner-up team finish, just one stroke back of the champions from Tulsa. Her performance earned Takahashi the first Big Ten Golfer-of-the-Week award of her career.

Takahashi, who ended the year at No. 247 in the Golfweek individual rankings, opened the season as Nebraska's No. 3 golfer in the lineup at the Green Wave Classic. She closed the tournament in a tie for 35th with a then-career-best 218

PERSONAL

The daughter of Yasunori and Junko Takahashi, Miu was born Oct. 31, 2002. A sports media and communication major, Takahashi claimed Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2023 and 2024. She has earned five spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. She is also a two-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

"I chose Nebraska because the coaches are very kind and I felt like I'd like to play golf for them," Takahashi said. "I was impressed by the golf practice facilities and golf program. Many people suggested Nebraska is a safe place."



(+2). She helped the Huskers to the best team score in school history with an 835 (-29) to finish second in the 14-team field.

The following week, Takahashi added the second top-10 finish of her career, tying for eighth individually in a 75-golfer field to help the Huskers to the team title at the Badger Invitational (Sept. 18-20). Takahashi put together a then-career-best 215 (-1) with rounds of 73, 70 and 72 on the 6,248-yard layout of the University Ridge Golf Course in Wisconsin.

She opened the spring with a top-10 finish, firing a three-round score of 214 (69-70-75) to tie for 10th at the FAU Paradise Invitational in Boca Raton, Fla. (Feb. 6-7). Takahashi helped the Huskers to a runner-up team finish, trailing only No. 19 Vanderbilt in a 14-team field that featured 11 top-100 teams.

Takahashi was even better the next time out, notching her fourth top-10 finish of the season with a career-best 212 (71-71-70) to tie for eighth individually and help the Big Red to a team tournament championship at the Westbrook Spring Invitational in Peoria, Ariz. (Feb. 27-28). Takahashi's three rounds better than par helped the Huskers finish with a 54-hole total of 843 (-21) to outclass a 14-team field that featured 12 top-100 teams, including No. 24 Ohio State.

She added another top-20 finish by tying for 18th in a 90-player field at the Briar's Creek Invitational in South Carolina (March 13-14). Takahashi closed the 54 holes on the par-72, 6,152-yard layout at The Golf Club at Briar's Creek with a 218 (72-71-75).

She added a top-25 finish at the Hurricane Invitational in Coral Gables, Fla. (Oct. 31-Nov. 1) with a three-round total of 217 (+1) to tie for 24th in a talented field. Her performance included a career-best first-round total of 69 (-3). She tied for 47th in challenging weather and scoring conditions at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational (Oct. 17-18). The tournament in Lawrence, Kan., was eventually shortened to 27 holes.

She managed a 219 (78-72-69) over three rounds in a loaded field at the Mountain View Collegiate in Tucson, Ariz. (March 17-19). Her final-round 69 matched her best third-round score as a collegian.

Her 73.49 stroke average over 37.5 rounds in 2022-23 ranked No. 5 all-time in Husker history. She did not record a final individual finish at the 2023 Big Ten Championship appearance because illness forced her to withdraw midway through the first round. She bounced back with a one-over-par 72 in the second round at the Fox Chapel Golf Club in Pittsburgh before closing the tournament with an 81 in the final round.

She also tied for 54th at 229 (73-81-75) in a loaded field at the Lady Buckeye Invitational (April 15-16) and tied for 36th in a strong 84-player field at The Bruzzy in Ardmore, Okla. (April 1-2). She finished with a three-round total of 223 (72-75-76) on the par-70, 5,976-yard layout at the Dornick Hills Golf & Country Club.

She played at par or better in 16 rounds in 2022-23, including 11 rounds under par.

In the summer of 2023, Takahashi qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship at Bel-Air Country Club in Los Angeles (Aug. 7-13). Takahashi earned a spot at the 123rd U.S. Women's Amateur by tying for third with a 72 (+1) in the qualifier at the Shady Valley Country Club in Dallas. She joined Husker teammate Kelli Ann Strand in the U.S. Women's Amateur field.

FRESHMAN (2021-22)

Takahashi closed her first fall season in the Nebraska women's golf program by producing her third top-25 individual finish in five events. She tied for 25th with a solid three-round total of 224 (+6) to help the Huskers to a runner-up team finish at the White Sands Intercollegiate in the Bahamas (Oct. 22-24). Her effort on the 6,415-yard layout of the Ocean Club at Paradise Island included an even-par 72 in the first round before back-to-back rounds of 76 to close the tournament.

Takahashi's performance to close the fall followed a lineup appearance at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 11-12). She helped the Big Red to another runner-up team finish in a 13-team field by firing an opening-round 71 (-1) on the 6,200-yard layout at The Golf Club of Oklahoma in Broken Arrow. She finished with a three-round score of 232 to tie for 53rd.



Takahashi opened her college career by earning a lineup spot for the Huskers at the season-opening Wolverine Invitational (Sept. 13-14). She was NU's No. 5 finisher at the 16-team event that included 12 teams that advanced to 2021 NCAA Regionals. Takahashi finished with a 54-hole score of 238 that included a 78 (+7) in the final round on the par-71, 6,232-yard layout at the University of Michigan Golf Course in Ann Arbor. She tied for 77th individually in the 90-golfer field.

She did not earn a spot in Nebraska's top lineup the following week at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational, but she did produce a breakout performance. Takahashi was instrumental in leading the Big Red's four-player "B" squad to the team championship. She tied for fifth individually with a 54-hole score of 222 (75-68-79) that included a career-best 68 (-4) in the second round. Takahashi was seven-under through 14 holes in the second round before settling for three bogeys on the final four holes. Her 68 tied for the best score by any golfer in the tournament, joining Kansas State's Remington Isaac as the only golfers to shoot a round better than 70 on the par-72, 6,221-yard layout at Colbert Hills Golf Club in Manhattan, Kan.

Takahashi, individual co-champions Nicole Hansen and Lindsey Thiele, and fellow freshman Andrea Velez (T19th) captured the team crown with a six-stroke win over Sam Houston. It marked Nebraska's first Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational team title in 11 all-time trips to the tournament.

She returned to Nebraska's lineup at The Molly Collegiate (Sept. 27-28), closing as Nebraska's No. 2 finisher with a three-round total of 226 (75-76-76) in a tie for 18th in an 83-player field on the par-72 layout of the Bayonet Golf Club in Seaside, Calif.

Takahashi closed the fall with Nebraska's No. 5 stroke average (76.13).

She opened the spring by going 1-0-1 at the Big Ten Match Play (Jan. 31-Feb. 1) before completing two rounds (83-79) while playing as an individual outside Nebraska's lineup at the Tulane Classic (Feb. 13-15). Takahashi followed with the best tournament score of her college career with a 219 (+3) to help the Huskers to a runner-up team finish in a loaded field at the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 27-28). She tied teammate Michaela Vavrova for 30th in Arizona, after carding three straight solid rounds (72-73-74).

Takahashi competed in the Nebraska lineup again at the Briar's Creek Invitational in John's Island, S.C. (March 14-15). She was NU's No. 5 finisher in a tie for 77th at 234 (76-83-75). She added another lineup appearance in the six-count-four format at the Lady Buckeye Spring Invitational (April 15-16). Takahashi finished 57th with a 251 (84-83-84) in rugged scoring conditions against a talented field on the Scarlet Course in Columbus, Ohio. She closed her freshman campaign by tying for 80th in the six-count-four format of the 2022 Big Ten Championship. Takahashi finished with a three-round total of 241 (79-81-81) on the par-71 layout of the Fox Chapel Golf Club in Pittsburgh.

Overall, Takahashi ended the season with a 77.55 stroke average over 29 rounds in 2021-22.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Takahashi tied for second at the Niigata prefecture golf tournament and finished fifth at the Yonex Junior Golf Championship. She did not compete in tournaments during the summer of 2020 in Japan because of restrictions sparked by the world-wide outbreak of the coronavirus. Takahashi attended Kaishi Kokusai High School. She was coached by Hiroyuki Fujita.

ANDREA VELEZ

Senior (Three Letters) Pereira, Colombia (Liceo de Frances Pereira)



OUTLOOK (2024-25)

One of the most experienced Huskers, Andrea Velez enters her fifth season at Nebraska hoping to play a significant role on a new-look roster in 2024-25.

The senior from Pereira, Colombia competed in eight rounds last season, after competing in 26.5 rounds for the Huskers as a sophomore in 2022-23.

Velez, Miu Takahashi and Brooke Bream are the only Huskers on the 2024-25 roster who have been at Nebraska for more than one season.

JUNIOR (2023-24)

Velez posted a 76.88 stroke average over eight rounds in 2023-24. She made her first tournament appearance of the season at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 9-10), where she produced a three-round total of 229 while competing as an individual outside Nebraska's lineup. She carded a season-best 74 (+2) in the opening round on the par-72, 6,246-yard layout at the Golf Club of Oklahoma in Broken Arrow.

Velez opened the spring with her first lineup appearance of the year at the UCF Challenge (Feb. 3-5). She closed the three-round tournament in a tie for 84th at 229 (+13), including a season-best 72 in the final round at the Eagle Creek Golf Club in Orlando.

She competed as an individual outside Nebraska's lineup at the rain-shortened Spartan Sun Coast Invitational in Sarasota, Fla. (Feb. 18-19). Velez tied for 67th at 157 (79-78) in challenging scoring conditions on the 6,191-yard, par-72 layout of the Palm Aire Country Club.

SOPHOMORE (2022-23)

Velez helped the Huskers secure their second NCAA Regional bid in the past three seasons by earning lineup spots late in her third season at Nebraska. The sophomore was Nebraska's No. 5 finisher with a 234 (75-81-78) at the Big Ten Championship at Fox Chapel Golf Club in Pittsburgh, Pa. (April 21-23). In her fourth lineup appearance of the season, Velez closed in a tie for 62nd in her first Big Ten Championship, and the Huskers counted her scores in both the first and third rounds. She served as Nebraska's alternate at the 2023 NCAA Raleigh Regional but did not compete.

Velez earned a lineup spot in a six-count-four format for the Huskers at the Lady Buckeye Invitational (April 15-16). Playing out of the No. 6 spot on the 6,319-yard layout at the Scarlet Course in Columbus, Ohio, Velez was Nebraska's No. 2 finisher, closing with a three-round total of 228 (75-74-79) to tie for 51st individually in a loaded 14-team field that featured 13 Big Ten teams.

She opened the season as NU's No. 5 golfer at the Green Wave Classic in New Orleans (Sept. 12-13). She helped the Huskers to the best three-round team score in school history with an 835 (-29) by carding a career-best 218 (+2) on their way to a runner-up finish in a 14-team field at Tulane. Velez tied teammate Miu Takahashi for 35th in an 81-golfer field in New Orleans.

Velez competed as an individual outside Nebraska's lineup at the Badger Invitational (Sept. 18-20). She tied for 60th in a 75-player field at Wisconsin with a three-round total of 236 (76-76-84). She added another solid effort by tying for 40th

She replaced Michaela Vavrova in the lineup at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational, tying for 56th (200) in challenging scoring and weather conditions in a tournament that was eventually shortened to 27 holes.

Velez opened the spring by playing as an individual outside the Husker lineup at the FAU Paradise Invitational in Boca Raton, Fla. (Feb. 6-7). She produced a three-round total of 230 (76-74-80) to tie for 64th. She traveled with the Huskers to the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 26-27), tying for 73rd with a 230 (76-79-75) while competing as an individual outside the Nebraska lineup. She tied for 75th in a 90-player field at the Briar's Creek Invitational in South Carolina (March 13-14), covering the 54 holes on the par-72, 6,152-yard layout in 234 (75-78-81).

She produced a 76.91 stroke average over 26.5 rounds for the Huskers in 2022-23.

FRESHMAN (2021-22)

Velez showed continued improvement throughout the 2021 fall season, producing a pair of top-25 tournament

finishes for the Huskers while competing in three events. The redshirt freshman from Colombia closed the fall with a collegiate career-best 223 (+5) to tie for 23rd while playing as an individual outside the Nebraska lineup at the White Sands Intercollegiate in the Bahamas (Oct. 22-24). Velez's performance on the 6,415-yard layout of the Ocean Club at Paradise Island included a career-best even-par 72 in the final round.

Velez ended the fall with a 77.00 stroke average over nine rounds.

Velez made her collegiate debut with a top-20 finish at the Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational in Manhattan, Kan. (Sept. 20-21). She carded consistent rounds of 75 to finish with a 54-hole score of 225 to tie for 19th in the 62-player field. Although Velez did not earn a top-five lineup spot for the Huskers at Colbert Hills Golf Club, she did help Nebraska's four-player "B" squad to the tournament title with a three-round total of 885. Velez joined individual co-champions Lindsey Thiele and Nicole Hansen and fellow freshman Miu Takahashi (T5th) in bringing home Nebraska's first Marilyn Smith/Sunflower Invitational championship in 11 all-time trips to the tournament.

Velez tied for 32nd with a 245 (80-83-83) at the Stampede at The Creek (Oct. 4-5) in Elkhorn, Neb.

REDSHIRT (2020-21)

Velez redshirted in her first season at Nebraska after arriving on campus in January of 2021. Velez became the first Colombian in the Nebraska women's golf program. She signed with Nebraska in November of 2019 but was forced to delay her enrollment until the spring semester of 2021 because of the worldwide outbreak of the coronavirus.

She earned a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in her first semester in Lincoln in the spring of 2021.

Velez won the Colombian Golf Federation Master International Infantil & Juvenil in 2018, before adding a third-place finish at the same event in 2019. Velez posted a fifth-place finish at the 2019 Campeonato Nacional e Internacional Juvenil Stroke Play in Guatemala, which featured top players from Central America and the Caribbean. She finished 11th at the 2019 Optimist International Junior Golf Championship at Trump National in Doral, Fla.

Redshirt Junior

OUTLOOK (2024-25)

A multi-sport athlete in high school, Brooke Bream was a high school and club soccer player and a middle distance runner as a track athlete in Arizona. She began to focus on golf at the Arizona Country Club when the COVID-19 pandemic forced the cancellation of her junior track and field season and club soccer competitions.

Bream, who did not play high school golf, was a 2021 Junior Golf Association of Arizona Player of the Year finalist after winning three tournament titles and adding a pair of runner-up finishes.

An outstanding student, Bream is a two-time Academic All-Big Ten selection who earned her bachelor's degree as an economics major in just three years from Nebraska. She is pursuing a master's degree in strategic innovation and entrepreneurship.

Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the fall and spring semesters of 2022-23. She was also a member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

REDSHIRT (2021-22)

Bream redshirted in her first season as a walk-on at Nebraska in 2021-22. She earned two spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll and was a member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Bream began her competitive golf career on the Junior Golf Association of Arizona Tour in March of 2020, tying for 18th at the Desert Mashie Championship at Cave Creek. Her scores continued to fall the next week by tying for fifth at the Antigua Milt Coggins Arizona Junior Stroke Play (June 8-9), finishing at 155 (75-80).

Her performance set up her win at the Thunderbird Junior Classic (June 21-22), and she added a tie for second at the Mesa City Junior/Junior World Qualifier (June 30-31).

She added another runner-up finish with a 147 (75-72) over two rounds at the Prescott City Junior Championship (July 7-8), before winning the PING Invitational (July 19-20) at Grand Canyon University Golf Course with a 155 (75-80).

Bream added another victory at the Phoenix City Junior Championship (July 22-23) with a single round of 75. She managed a fourth-place showing at the Maricopa Junior Championship (Aug. 2-3), her seventh consecutive top-five tournament finish.

REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE (2023-24)

Bream posted a 79.33 stroke average over three rounds in her third season as a Husker. She traveled with the Huskers to the Briar's Creek Invitational in Johns Island, S.C. (March 11-12). Competing as an individual, Bream produced a 238 (85-76-77) that included a career-best four-over-par 76 in the second round. She tied for 95th individually.

REDSHIRT FRESHMAN (2022-23)

Bream made her collegiate golf debut at the Big O Classic at Oak Hills Country Club in Omaha (Oct. 3-4). Playing as an individual, Bream finished 57th in her first outing as a Husker with a score of 259. That included a best round of 79 in the second round. Bream finished with an 86.33 stroke average.

Bream performed at a high level off the course, claiming Academic All-Big Ten honors while capturing spots on the

He continued in the Tigers organization as an advance scout in 1999, and has spent all but two (2011-12, Padres) of the last 24 seasons in the Tigers organization.

An economics major, Brooke earned her bachelor's degree in just three years from Nebraska, claiming her diploma in August of 2024. A two-time Academic All-Big Ten choice and a six-time Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll member, Bream is pursuing a master's degree in strategic innovation and entrepreneurship.

Bream is also a three-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team. She and Mackenzie are the women's golf team's representatives on the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Committee in 2024-25.





ARDEN LOUCHHEIM

Sophomore (One Letter) Park City, Utah (Rowland Hall)

OUTLOOK (2024-25)

Arden Louchheim (pronounced LOCK-hime) will be one of Nebraska's most experienced returning golfers in 2024-25. The sophomore from Park City, Utah, competed in 30 rounds and produced a 75.73 stroke average as a true freshman for the Huskers in 2023-24.

Louchheim enjoyed a strong summer of 2024 that included a runner-up finish at the Nebraska Women's Amateur.

FRESHMAN (2023-24)

Louchheim kicked off her college career by earning a lineup spot at the season-opening Sam Golden Invitational (Sept. 11-12). She was Nebraska's No. 4 individual finisher with a three-round total of 218 (+2) on the par-72, 6,413-yard layout at the Oakmont Country Club in Corinth, Texas. She began the tournament with a career-best 70 (-2), before adding rounds of 73 and 75 to help Nebraska to a tie for fifth in a 12-team field that included seven 2023 NCAA Regional-qualifying teams.

She added a tie for 65th in a strong 84-player field at the Mary Fossum Invitational (Sept. 17-18). Louchheim counted her first round (73) and third round (74) for Nebraska to help the Huskers tie for sixth in a 15-team field that featured nine 2023 NCAA Regional-qualifying teams. She finished with a three-round score of 233 on the par-72, 6,370-yard layout at Forest Akers West Golf Course in East Lansing, Mich.

Louchheim was back in the Nebraska lineup at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 9-10), tying for 60th with a 228 (81-76-71). Her final-round 71 (-1) on the par-72, 6,246-yard layout of the Golf Club of Oklahoma in Broken Arrow was her second round better than par of the season and counted toward Nebraska's team score. She helped the Huskers to a fifth-place finish in a 14-team field that featured 10 top-100 teams.

She closed the fall with her fourth consecutive lineup appearance, tying for 64th with a 224 (+8) in an NCAA-caliber 96-player field at the Landfall Tradition in Wilmington, N.C. (Oct. 27-29). Louchheim produced steady rounds of 75, 73 and 76 on the 6,194-yard layout at the Country Club of Landfall.

Louchheim capped her first fall season at Nebraska with a 75.25 stroke average over 12 rounds, before opening the spring in the Husker lineup at the UCF Challenge (Feb. 3-5). She finished with a three-round total of 228 (+12) in a tie for 80th in a strong 96-player field at the Eagle Creek Golf Club in Orlando.

She produced her best performance of the season with a career-best three-round total of 214 (-4) at the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 25-26) in Peoria, Ariz. Louchheim fired rounds of 70-73-71 to tie for 40th on the par-72, 6,248-yard layout at the Westbrook Village Golf Club. She added a 231 (78-75-78) to tie for 80th at the Briar's Creek Invitational in Johns Island, S.C. (March 11-12), before taking 65th with a 232 (76-79-77) at the Florida State Match Up in Tallahassee (March 15-16).

Louchheim produced a career-best tie for 29th on a challenging par-72, 6,319-yard layout at the Scarlet Course in Columbus, Ohio at the Therese Hession Buckeye Invitational (April 13-14). She tied for Nebraska's second-best individual finish in Ohio, matching teammates Miu Takahashi and Michaela Vavrova with a 228 (+12), just one shot back of Lindsey Thiele's 227.

Louchheim capped her freshman season by tying for 72nd with a 236 (+20) at the Big Ten Championship (April 19-21). She opened her first conference championship with a 75 at the Bulle Rock Golf Course in Havre de Grace, Md., to provide Nebraska with its No. 2 individual score, before closing with rounds of 81 and 80.

Louchheim ended the year with a 75.73 stroke average through 30 rounds on the season, including four rounds better than par. Her 30 rounds were the second most by a Husker, trailing only Miu Takahashi's 32.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

A four-time IMG Junior World Championship participant, Louchheim was a two-time Girls Junior Americas Cup team member. She was also an AJGA Rolex Scholastic All-American.

Louchheim won the 18th hole for a 1 up match play victory to claim the title at the 40th Utah Junior Amateur event in June of 2023 at Park City Golf Club. The three-time Utah Class 2A high school state champion added an individual state runner-up finish to her list of honors in the spring of 2023, while helping Rowland Hall to a second-place team finish during the spring.

In addition to her success on the course and in the classroom, Louchheim was also a two-time high school letterwinner in alpine ski racing and was a competitive skier for 11 years, qualifying for U.S. Nationals in 2020.

HANNAH KONO

Redshirt Sophomore Enköping, Sweden (Oakland University)

OUTLOOK (2024-25)

NCAA Division I transfer Hannah Kono joined the Nebraska women's golf team in early June ahead of the 2024-25 season. Kono, who was a freshman at Oakland (Mich.) University in 2023-24, will have three seasons of eligibility remaining. The sophomore from Enköping, Sweden produced Oakland's No. 2 individual stroke average (75.85) over 27 rounds last season. The physics major was also a WGCA Scholastic All-American.

"We're very excited to add Hannah to our team," Sutherland said. "She has the desire to be a great player and has experience at both the college and international levels. She's one of those players who loves to spend her day at the golf course and enjoys every aspect of the game."

FRESHMAN (OAKLAND, 2023-24)

Kono helped Oakland to the Horizon League Tournament championship and an automatic berth to the NCAA East Lansing Regional. She tied for 41st individually as Oakland's No. 2 finisher at the Forest Akers Golf Course at Michigan State with a three-round total of 225 (75-76-74).

Her NCAA Regional performance followed her sixth-place finish at the Horizon League Championship in Howey in the Hills, Fla. She managed rounds of 76, 79 and 79 to finish at 234 (+18) over three rounds at the El Campeon Golf Course.

Kono produced the best individual finish of her freshman season by tying for second at the Nevel Meade Collegiate hosted by Cleveland State in Prospect, Ky. (March 19-20). She posted a two-round total of 151 (+7), including an opening-round 73 to help the Golden Grizzlies share the team title with Illinois-Chicago. She was named the Horizon League Golfer of the Week (March 21) following her performance.

Kono, who notched seven top-20 finishes in 10 tournaments on the year, opened her college career with a tie for 20th at the A-Ga-Ming Invitational (Sept. 3-4). Her three-round total of 226 (+10) included a career-best second-round 71 (-1) in between rounds of 79 and 76.

She did not compete at the Mary Fossum Invitational in East Lansing (Sept. 17-18) in a tournament that Nebraska defeated Oakland by 55 strokes in the team standings. Kono returned to the lineup with her tie for 11th with a career-best 223 (+7) at the Shirley Spork EMU Invitational (Oct. 2-3). Her effort in Ypsilanti included a career-best-tying 71 (-1) in the second round and an even-par 72 in the final round.

Kono closed the fall with a third consecutive top-20 finish with a two-round total of 157 (+13) at the Chippewa Invitational in Birmingham, Mich. (Oct. 16-17). Her rounds of 80 and 77 were good enough for a tie for 20th, as she ended the fall campaign with a 75.75 stroke average over eight rounds.

She got the spring season off to a strong start with an 11th-place finish at the Texas State Invitational in New Braunfels (Feb. 5-6), where she carded three solid rounds of 74, 73 and 77 on a par-71 course to finish at 224 (+11). For her effort, Kono earned her first Horizon League Golfer of the Week award (Feb. 8).

Kono, who closed her lone season at Oakland with 20 consecutive rounds better than 80, added a 226 (77-75-74) to tie for 50th at the Rio Verde Invitational in Arizona (Feb. 23-25), before tying for 26th (77-77-78) at the Huntsville Invitational in Alabama (March 4-6).

She continued to play consistent golf with a career-best tie for second (78-73=151) at the Nevel Meade Collegiate, before adding a tie for 15th at 150 (74-76) at the Dolores Black Falcon Invitational in Bowling Green, Ohio (April 6-7).

In early June of 2024, Kono notched a runner-up finish on the Swedish Junior Tour (Division 1) with an impressive three-round total of 205 at the Karsta Golf Club in Sweden.

BEFORE COLLEGE

Prior to coming to the United States, Kono won the Swedish Junior Classics at Golf Uppsala with a three-round total of 214 (-2), including an opening-round 67 (-5) and a second-round 71 (-1) in late July of 2023. OUTLOOK (2024-25)

Lauren Thiele continues a family tradition at Nebraska by joining the Huskers as a transfer after spending her first two college seasons at Wichita State. Thiele (pronounced TEEL), who has three seasons of eligibility, follows her three older sisters - Haley, Hannah and Lindsey - to the Husker women's golf program.

Lauren was Wichita State's No. 2 golfer during the spring of 2024, posting a 76.07 stroke average over 15 rounds.

"We're happy that Lauren Thiele is coming back home to be a Husker. Lauren brings power, athleticism and the desire to develop into a great player. She is a great person and will make us a better team."

She produced a career-best tie for 15th with a 156 (+10) with rounds of 80 and 76 (+3) at the rain-shortened Big O Classic at the Oak Hills Country Club in Omaha (Oct. 2-3), after opening her season in a tie for 70th with a 239 (+23) at the season-opening Payne Stewart Memorial in Springfield, Mo. (Sept. 11-12).

REDSHIRT (WICHITA STATE, 2022-23)

Thiele redshirted as a true freshman in 2022-23. Off the course, she earned spots on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in both the fall and spring semesters.

BEFORE COLLEGE

A four-year letter winner and two-time captain of the boys' golf team at Bishop Neumann High School in Wahoo, Thiele was the only girl to be a member of a Nebraska team championship in boys golf. She finished seventh individually to help Neumann to the state title in 2021. During the 2021 season, Thiele captured a pair of individual tournament titles among a trio of top-five finishes. She also finished among the top 10 individually in seven tournaments. She finished with a 72.8 scoring average, which included a personal-best five-under 66. During the summer of 2021, she was the Nebraska Girls Match Play champion and added a runner-up finish at the Nebraska Girls Amateur Championship. She also qualified for the Girls Junior PGA Championship. In the summer of 2020, she was a semifinalist at the Nebraska Women's Match Play Championship.

An outstanding all-around athlete, Thiele was an all-state selection in both basketball and volleyball, while setting the school game and season record for three-pointers made. She was also an Academic All-State pick in volleyball, basketball and golf.

REDSHIRT FRESHMAN (WICHITA STATE, 2023-24)

Thiele competed in seven tournaments for the Shockers in her second season in Wichita, including all five events during the spring. She fired a career-best 71 (-1) in the second round of the AAC Championship. It followed on the heels of a then-career-best-tying 73 in the opening round. She struggled to an 83 in the final round to finish in a tie for 38th at 227 (+11), tying for WSU's No. 2 individual finish at the conference tournament. She entered the final round in a tie for 15th at even-par 144.

She opened the spring with a career-best 223 (+7) to tie for 35th as Wichita State's No. 2 finisher at the Rio Verde Invitational (Feb. 23-25), which included a then-career-best 73 (+1) in the final round. Her performance in Arizona helped her become a fixture in the lineup the rest of the spring.

After a 236 (78-79-79) to tie for 68th at the Tulane Classic (March 10-12), Thiele bounced back with a 226 (75-78-73) to tie for 44th as Wichita State's No. 2 finisher at the Red Rocks Invitational in Sedona, Ariz. (March 16-17). She tied for 31st with a 229 (75-78-76) as WSU's No. 2 finisher at the ORU Spring Invitational in Broken Arrow, Okla. (April 8-9), before her effort at the AAC Championship in Brooksville, Fla. Prior to her final round at the conference tournament, Thiele notched 15 consecutive rounds of 79 or better. Her spring season stroke average was 76.07 over 15 rounds, after posting a 79.00 stroke average over five fall rounds.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten Conference is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders. Even in its infancy, the conference established itself as the preeminent collection of institutions in the nation, where the pursuit of academic excellence prevailed as the definitive goal.

The history of the Big Ten traces back more than 125 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago where, on Jan. 11, 1895, Purdue President James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Northwestern and Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bona fide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On Feb. 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the fundamentals of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905.

Indiana and the State University of Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State joined the conference, bringing the membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, a name that was eventually incorporated in 1987.

As the 1900s dawned, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were conducted at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women. Big Ten schools compete in a total of 42 different sports, furthering the conference's commitment to broad-based programming and providing more participation opportunities than any conference in the country.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations. But Michigan's appearance in 1902 cultivated a relationship that has endured for more than a century.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915, the first award to demonstrate support for the educational emphasis placed on intercollegiate athletics. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to one male and one female student of the graduating class who have attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a Big Ten student-athlete can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of seven men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971, Jim Delany in 1989, Kevin Warren in 2020, and current commissioner Tony Petitti in 2023.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produce over \$10 billion in funded research, doubling any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of the pioneering technology, where it approved country-wide testing in 2005. In 2006, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

In 2006, Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with FOX Networks to create the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 2,200 live events across all platforms each year. The 24/7 network is the ultimate destination for Big Ten fans and alumni across the country and around the world, allowing them to see their favorite teams, regardless of where they live.

On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011.

The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from Maryland and Rutgers on Nov. 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams.

In recent years the Big Ten has worked to meet the educational needs of modern student-athletes to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. In May of 2020, the conference announced the formation of the Big Ten Mental Health and Wellness Cabinet, featuring representation from all 14 member institutions, as well as sport affiliate members. The goal of the cabinet is to promote optimal mental health for Big Ten student-athletes through a comprehensive, systemic and interdisciplinary approach to establishing mental health programs, while also providing counsel, advice and expertise to the conference office.

In June of 2020 the conference launched the Big Ten Equality Coalition. This group, which features student-athletes, coaches, athletic directors, chancellors, presidents and other members of the Big Ten family from all 14 member institutions, has a stated goal of seeking tangible ways to actively and constructively combat racism and hate around the world, while also empowering student-athletes to express their rights to free speech and peaceful protest. One product of conversations emerging from the coalition was the creation of the Big Ten Voter Registration Initiative. This non-partisan, conference-wide collaboration encourages student-athletes to take part in the electoral process and is led by a Voter Registration Committee that includes representatives from all 14 Big Ten institutions. The Voter Registration Committee has partnered with the National Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law to develop educational programming and outreach tools, and to collaborate with other established civic platforms.

On June 30, 2022, the Big Ten Conference furthered its legacy of transformation when the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) voted unanimously to admit UCLA and USC to the conference effective Aug. 2, 2024. Competition will begin for all conference sports in the 2024-25 academic year.

In July of 2022, the Big Ten traveled a delegation of student-athletes and administrators from its member institutions to Selma and Montgomery, Alabama, for an immersive experience entitled: "Big Life Series: Selma to Montgomery." The pilgrimage to one of the key centers of the civil rights movement was highlighted by a march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, which is the site of the 1965 Bloody Sunday attack. The delegation also visited the Montgomery Interpretive Center on the campus of Alabama State University to learn more about the profound impact that students had on the civil rights movement, and the significance of the Knight vs. Alabama landmark trial which ended the segregation of funding in higher education across the State of Alabama.

In April of 2023, the Big Ten announced that Petitti was selected as the conference's seventh commissioner. With nearly four decades of sports, business and media industry acumen, he served as deputy commissioner and chief operating officer of Major League Baseball and president and chief executive officer of MLB Network. A 14-time National Sports Emmy Award winner, Petitti also held senior executive roles at CBS Sports and ABC Sports overseeing rights acquisition deals for a variety of sports leagues and collegiate and professional sports events, including the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, regular season men's basketball, college football, NFL, PGA Tour, the Masters, U.S. Open Tennis Championships, and the Little League World Series, as well as leading in the creation of the Bowl Championship Series to determine college football's national champion.

On Aug. 4, 2023, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors voted unanimously to admit the University of Oregon and the University of Washington to the conference effective Aug. 2, 2024, with competition to begin in all sports for the 2024-25 academic year. With the schools' admission, Oregon and Washington would also join the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), a consortium of world-class research institutions dedicated to advancing their academic missions.

More than 125 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.

ALL-BIG TEN STRAND EARNS NCAA REGIONAL BID



Two-time All-Big Ten golfer Kelli Ann Strand led Nebraska with a school-record 71.53 stroke average as a sophomore in 2023-24. She earned an individual berth to the NCAA Cle Elum Regional where she tied for 24th - the best individual finish by a Husker at regionals since 2008. A Big Ten Distinguished Scholar, Strand was also a 2024 WGCA Scholastic All-American.

The Nebraska women's golf team produced the second-best season stroke average in school history, but the Huskers came up just short in their bid for a second straight NCAA Regional appearance in 2024.

The Big Red closed the season with a 292.59 team stroke average, trailing only the 2023 squad's school-record 292.21 among the best averages in Husker history.

Nebraska was led on the course by Kelli Ann Strand, who produced a school-record 71.53 stroke average over 32 rounds, eclipsing her own previous school record of 72.05 set over 38.5 rounds as a freshman in 2022-23.

Strand, who earned second-team All-Big Ten honors for the second consecutive season, went on to finish 24th as an individual at the 2024 NCAA Cle Elum Regional. It was Nebraska's best individual finish at NCAA regionals since 2008.

The sophomore from Challis, Idaho added WGCA Scholastic All-America honors after being named to the College Sports Communicators Academic All-District VII team. The accounting major was also a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and an Academic All-Big Ten selection for her performance in the classroom.

However, at the conclusion of her second season in Lincoln, Strand chose to end her college career early and pursue professional golf on a full-time basis.

Lindsey Thiele and Michaela Vavrova added strong seasons on the course and in the classroom. Thiele, a senior from Wahoo, Neb., captured WGCA Scholastic All-America honors for the fourth consecutive season while also being named one of nine Nebraska Outstanding Scholars across all Husker sports. Thiele, who finished the year with NU's No. 3 stroke average (74.04) also claimed a prestigious Big Ten Postgraduate Scholarship and was named a Nebraska Heart & Soul Award winner for her exceptional commitment to community service.

Vavrova, a senior from Bojnice, Slovakia, added Nebraska's No. 4 individual stroke average (74.48). The Big Red's Big Ten Sportsmanship Award winner for 2024, Vavrova was Nebraska's top finisher at the Big Ten Championship, closing her career tied for 28th at 220 at the conference

tournament in Havre de Grace, Md. Vavrova also joined Thiele as a three-time Academic All-Big Ten choice.

Miu Takahashi continued to provide strong and consistent play near the top of Nebraska's lineup. The junior from Nasu-machi, Japan closed the year with NU's second-best stroke average (73.91) over 32 rounds. She was also the No. 3 Husker finisher at the Big Ten Championship. Takahashi will enter her senior season for the Huskers in 2024-25 with Nebraska's No. 3 career stroke average (74.82) while owning nine career top-25 finishes. The sports media and communication major is also a two-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.

Freshman Arden Louchheim made an immediate impact on the Husker lineup in 2023-24. The three-time Utah Class 2A state champion played 30 rounds for the Huskers and posted a 75.73 stroke average in her inaugural college season. The sports media and communication major also notched perfect 4.0 grade-point averages in both the fall and spring semesters of 2023-24 to help the Husker women's golf team earn its first Herman Team GPA Award since 2003. The Huskers finished with a 3.736 team GPA during the 2023 academic year - the fourth-best GPA ever by any men's or women's team at Nebraska.

Overall, the Husker women's golfers collected four WGCA Scholastic All-America honors (Thiele, Strand, Louchheim, Lena Hassert) and four Big Ten Distinguished Scholar awards (Thiele, Strand, Hassert, Sydney Harz) along with eight Academic All-Big Ten accolades (Strand, Thiele, Harz, Hassert, Vavrova, Takahashi, Brooke Bream, Andrea Velez). Nebraska women's golf also produced a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate for the 19th consecutive season.

The Huskers also continued a tradition of excellence in the community, as all 11 golfers on the roster earned spots on the annual Tom Osborne Citizenship Team for the second consecutive year.

Nebraska's experienced lineup got off to a strong start in the fall of 2023, claiming three consecutive top-six finishes at the Sam Golden (Sept. 11-12), Mary Fossum (Sept. 17-18) and Dale McNamara (Oct. 9-10) invitationals. With a 24-13-2 head-to-head record, the Huskers closed the fall at the Landfall Tradition in Wilmington, N.C. (Oct. 27-29), where they settled for a tie for 14th in an 18-team field.

The spring season started with a pair of challenging tournaments in Florida, including a 14th-place showing at the UCF Challenge in Orlando (Feb. 3-5), before an 11th-place finish at the Spartan Sun Coast in Sarasota (Feb. 18-19).

The Big Red bounced back with a fifth-place finish at the Westbrook Spring Invitational in Arizona (Feb. 25-26), before battling strong fields at the Briar's Creek Invitational (March 11-12) and the Florida State Match Up (March 15-16).

Nebraska closed the season with 10th-place finishes at the Therese Hession Buckeye Invitational (April 13-14) and the Big Ten Championship (April 19-21).

LISA JOHNSON (2019-22)

Lisa Johnson was named the fourth head coach in program history on June 17, 2019. She came to NU after serving as the head coach at Idaho (2007-19). In her first season at Nebraska, Johnson helped Kate Smith become NU's first All-Big Ten golfer since 2012. Smith also captured Nebraska's first Mary Fossum Award for owning the Big Ten's best stroke average. After the COVID-19 pandemic cut the 2019-20 season short, Johnson guided the Huskers to their best conference tournament finish since 1984 by tying for second at the 2021 Big Ten Championship. Kate Smith became Nebraska's first Big Ten Champion and the Huskers made their first NCAA Regional appearance since 2008. Johnson left NU following the 2021-22 season after her husband, John, was named the Athletic Director at Portland State.

JEANNE SUTHERLAND (2022-PRESENT)

Jeanne Sutherland was named the fifth head coach of the Nebraska women's golf program, May 5, 2022, after spending one season as an associate head coach under Lisa Johnson. In 25 seasons as a head coach before coming to Nebraska, Sutherland led 18 teams to NCAA Regional appearances, including four NCAA Championship bids. She was a two-time NCAA regional/district coach of the year and a four-time conference coach of the year. She coached three individuals to All-America honors and five individual conference champions during her time at Texas A&M (1992-2007) and SMU (2011-21). She guided Nebraska to an NCAA Regional berth in 2023.

NEBRASKA'S NCAA ALL-AMERICANS



Joanne Brooks
1989-1992
Honorable Mention, 1992

The first NCAA All-American in Nebraska women's golf history, Joanne Brooks was one of the best golfers ever to compete for the Huskers.

When Brooks completed her eligibility after the 1993 season, she held nearly every NU individual school record. She earned All-Big Eight Conference and academic All-Big Eight honors three times. Brooks won the Edith Munson Award given to the nation's top student-athlete, was named an WGCA Scholastic All-American in 1990, 1991 and 1992, and was named to Nebraska's 25 Women of Distinction List in April 2000.

A native of Tauranga, New Zealand, Brooks was the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Committee President.



Sarah Sasse
1998-2003
First Team, 2003

Sarah Sasse became Nebraska's first women's golfer to earn first-team All-America honors in 2003. One of 11 golfers to make the All-America list, Sasse was the only Big 12 golfer selected. Sasse was the 2003 Big 12 Player of the Year, a 2003 Scholastic All-American, the 2003 April Big 12 Golfer of the Month, a three-time All-Big 12 honoree, a four-time academic All-Big 12 pick and a three-time NCAA participant. She also set the school record

for best 36- and 54-hole scores with 138 and 209, respectively. The Lincoln native graduated from Nebraska in 2003 with a degree in marketing. She was selected as the first women's golfer inducted into the University of Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2015.

Honorable Mention, 2021

Nebraska's third women's golf All-American, Kate Smith claimed WGCA honorable-mention accolades after capturing the 2021 Big Ten Championship. In a remarkable season, Smith tied the Big Ten tournament record and her own school record with a final-round 64 (-8) to storm to the title. She helped Nebraska to its best conference team finish (tied for second) since 1984.

In a history-making season, Smith became the first Husker to compete in the Augusta National Women's Amateur and the first Nebraska men's or women's golfer to play in the Arnold Palmer Cup. Smith represented the United States in the Palmer Cup and went 3-1 to play a key role in a 33-27 U.S. victory.

Elizabeth (Bahensky) Schott owns six NU NCAA Tournament records, including best single-round (68) and final score (301), which she set on her way to a 25th-place individual finish at the 2000 NCAA Championship. She was honored with induction to both the Nebraska Golf Hall of Fame and the Nebraska High School Sports Hall of Fame in September of 2021. The Kearney High School graduate was a two-time Class A state high school champion while leading the Bearcats to four state team titles. She was also a five-time Nebraska women's state champion. 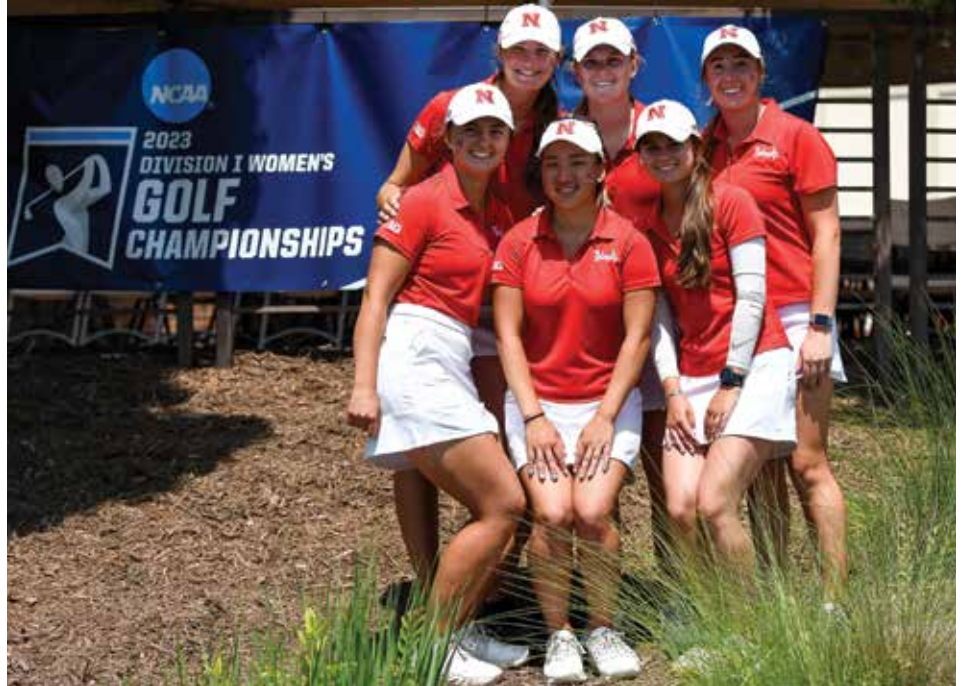

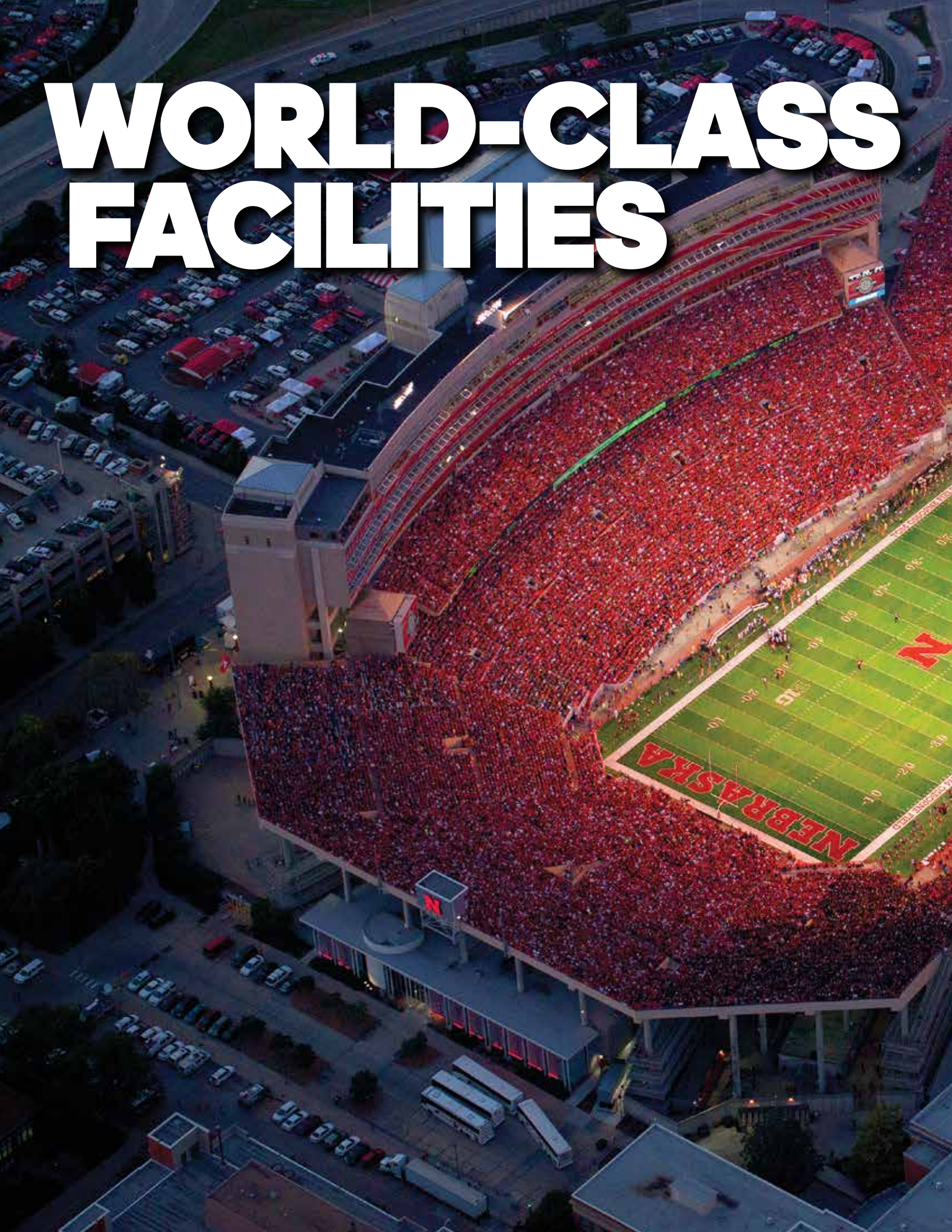

PERFORMANCE NUTRITION

The purpose of the Performance Nutrition department is to provide services that enhance the student-athlete's overall health and recovery.

GOALS

- To offer a variety of food and beverage products that are readily available and accessible for all student-athletes.
- To provide a wealth of education and resources that each student-athlete can utilize to enhance their overall level of knowledge and awareness as it pertains to fueling their body for competition and recovery.

DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

Performance Nutrition seeks to provide fueling options and education to Husker student-athletes, so they are adequately prepared and knowledgeable on the impact nutrition can have in their lives as athletes and after sport.

NUTRITION OVERVIEW

Our Training Table is the primary resource for student-athletes to seek out holistic fueling options. Our Training Table operates and sets its menus with a student-athlete first mentality. We seek to provide healthy, accommodating nutrition options for all our athletes at breakfast, lunch and dinner. The Training Table also features a demo kitchen, allowing our student-athletes to practice their culinary skills and learn more about making nutritious meals.

Our fueling stations are the secondary resource for student-athletes to fulfill their fueling needs. The primary goal of our fueling stations is to provide quick and easy sources of nutrition and hydration to supplement training and competition.

Husker Bucks are provided to student-athletes to supplement meals on their own. Athletes have the chance to purchase a meal at local restaurants or to use for groceries at the grocery store.

EDUCATION AND CONSULTATION

Each team has a sport specific dietitian who oversees the nutritional needs per team. Our dietitians are a great resource for education and consultation to our student-athletes. The dietitians conduct DEXAs for bone density and lean mass trending, hydration testing, consult with athletes individually, provide nutrition education team talks (hydration, pre-workout fueling, recovery nutrition), host cooking classes and grocery store tours, and assist with fueling options surrounding competitions.

HUSKERS & FLIK

Flik athletics specializes in fueling athletes. Flik Athletics currently fuels over 25 professional teams across NFL, NBA, WNBA, MLB, MLS and USL Championship league. Nebraska will be the first college athletic program they have partnered with. In partnership with team dietitians, trainers, and coaches, Flik's team of chefs and dietitians create customized hospitality services and programming that elevate the athlete's culinary experience.

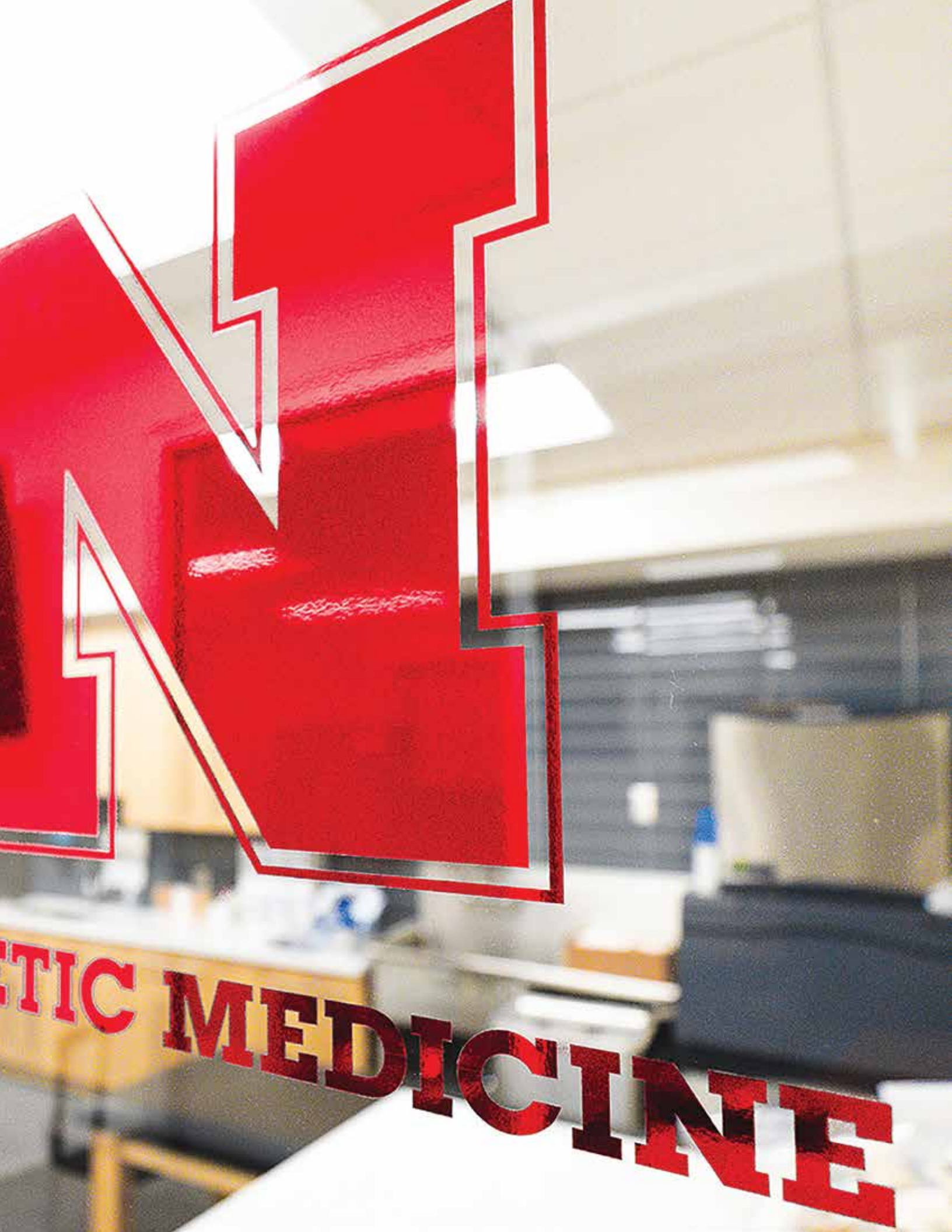

ACADEMIC COUNSELING

A team of 14 academic staff members are in place to monitor daily academic progress, promote skill development, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/registration process and monitor eligibility and progress toward graduation.

TUTORIAL SUPPORT

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, tutorial support is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. Tutorial support is provided both in-person and virtually. Nebraska's tutorial program is certified by the College Reading and Learning Association.

STUDY HALL

Student-athletes attend a supervised study hall within the newly-opened Osborne Legacy Complex that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week and/or a list of academic tasks as determined by their academic counselor, learning specialist and coach.

MENTORING

Academic staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes and select returning student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information and discuss academic success strategies.

EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a neuropsychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

COMPUTER RESOURCES

All student-athletes are provided the opportunity to have a laptop for use during their academic career at Nebraska. The Osborne Legacy Complex has printers and desktop computers available for student-athletes to use in the facility. A full-time computer specialist is on-site and available to assist with technology needs.

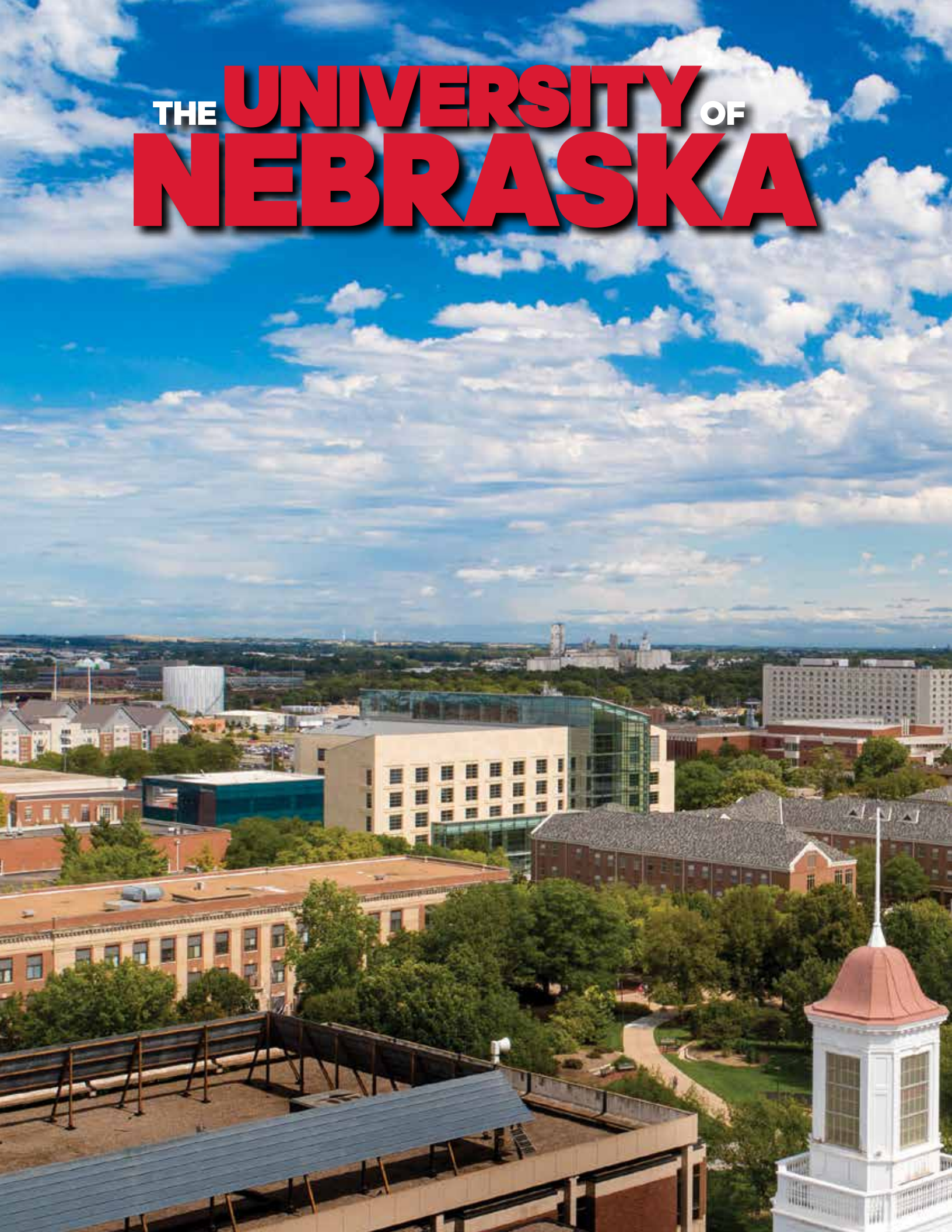

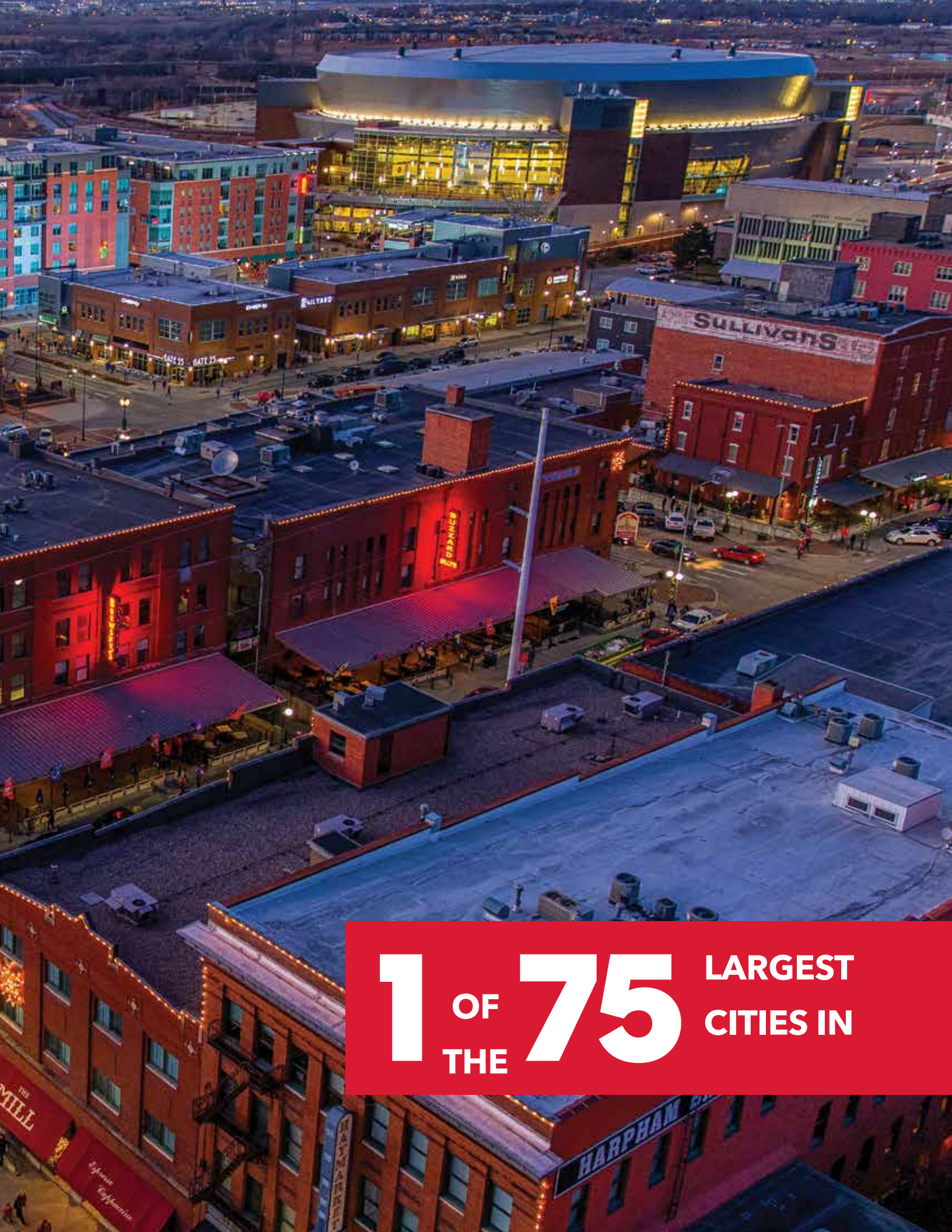

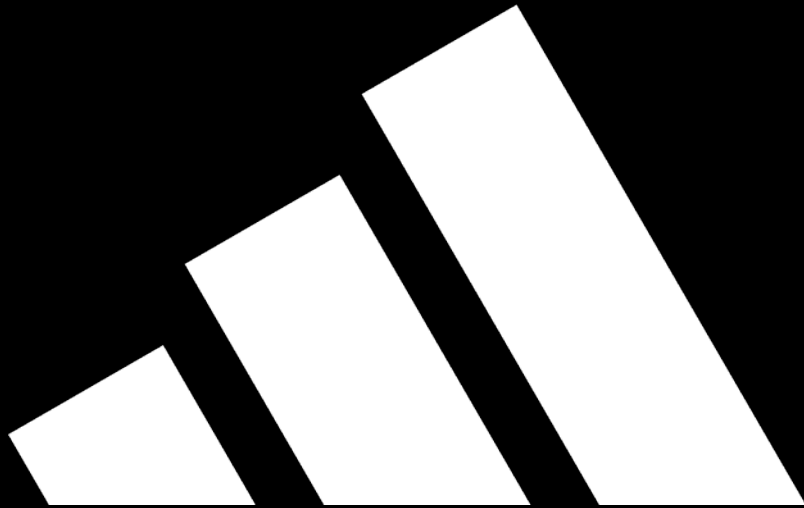
