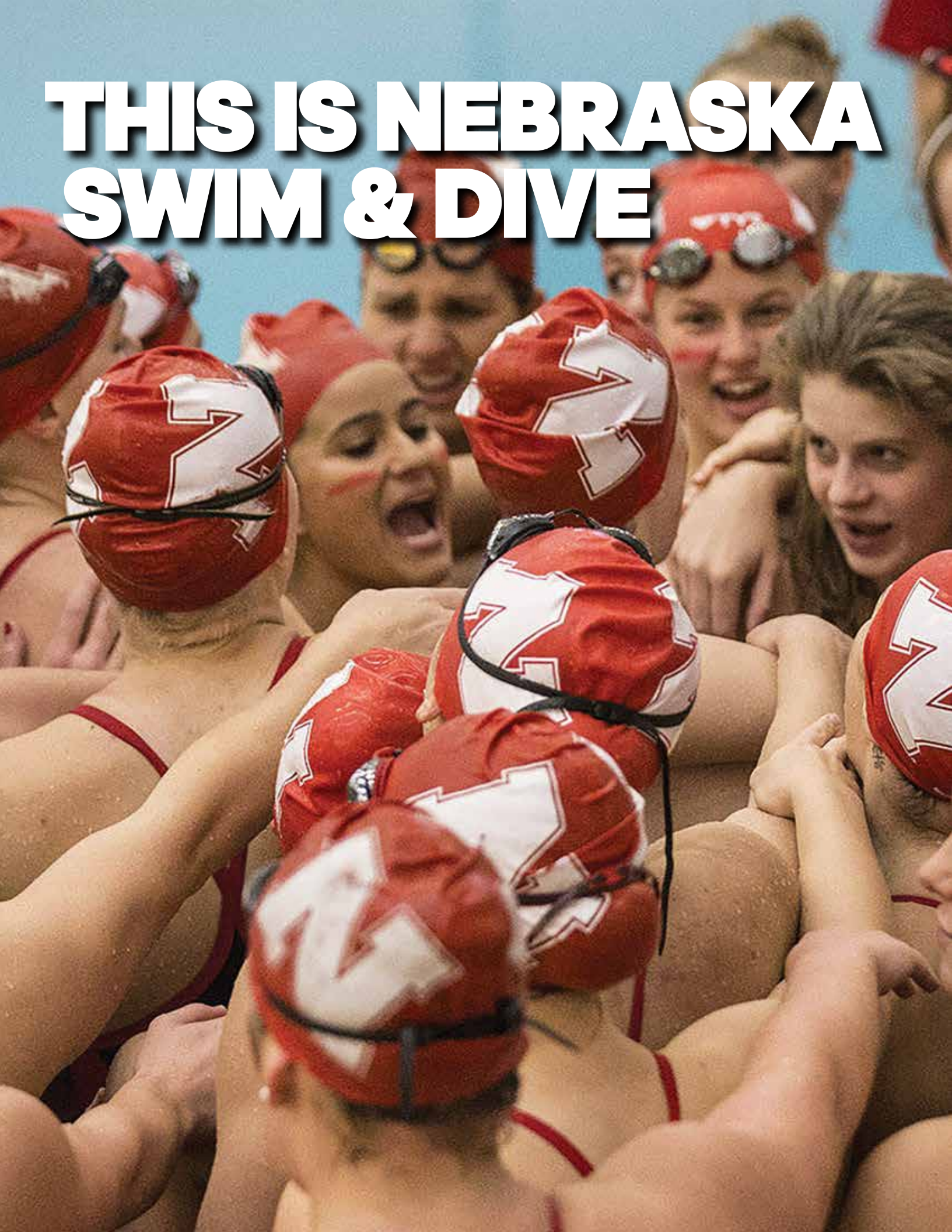

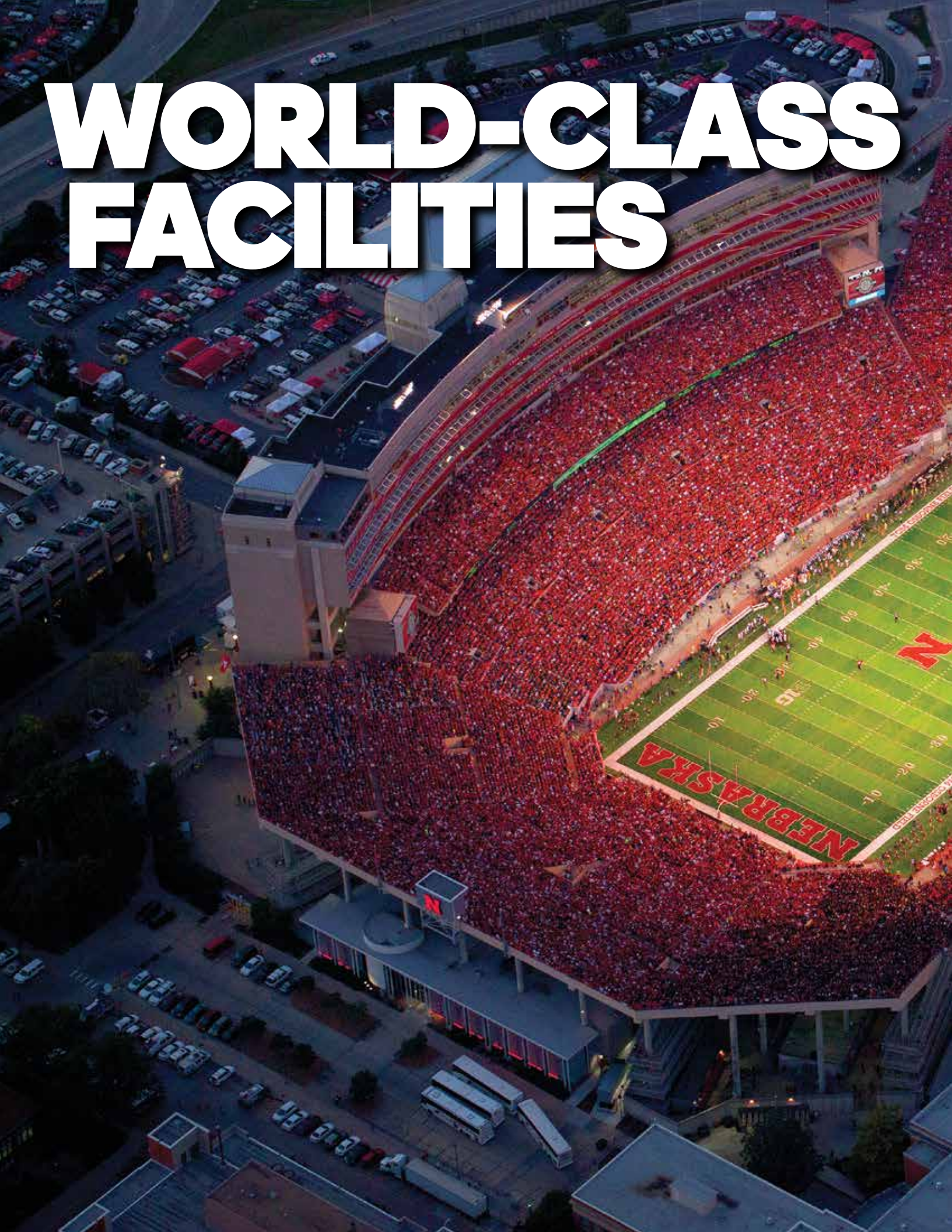

PERFORMANCE NUTRITION

The purpose of the Performance Nutrition department is to provide services that enhance the student-athlete's overall health and recovery.

GOALS

- To offer a variety of food and beverage products that are readily available and accessible for all student-athletes.
- To provide a wealth of education and resources that each student-athlete can utilize to enhance their overall level of knowledge and awareness as it pertains to fueling their body for competition and recovery.

DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

Performance Nutrition seeks to provide fueling options and education to Husker student-athletes, so they are adequately prepared and knowledgeable on the impact nutrition can have in their lives as athletes and after sport.

NUTRITION OVERVIEW

Our Training Table is the primary resource for student-athletes to seek out holistic fueling options. Our Training Table operates and sets its menus with a student-athlete first mentality. We seek to provide healthy, accommodating nutrition options for all our athletes at breakfast, lunch and dinner. The Training Table also features a demo kitchen, allowing our student-athletes to practice their culinary skills and learn more about making nutritious meals.

Our fueling stations are the secondary resource for student-athletes to fulfill their fueling needs. The primary goal of our fueling stations is to provide quick and easy sources of nutrition and hydration to supplement training and competition.

Husker Bucks are provided to student-athletes to supplement meals on their own. Athletes have the chance to purchase a meal at local restaurants or to use for groceries at the grocery store.

EDUCATION AND CONSULTATION

Each team has a sport specific dietitian who oversees the nutritional needs per team. Our dietitians are a great resource for education and consultation to our student-athletes. The dietitians conduct DEXAs for bone density and lean mass trending, hydration testing, consult with athletes individually, provide nutrition education team talks (hydration, pre-workout fueling, recovery nutrition), host cooking classes and grocery store tours, and assist with fueling options surrounding competitions.

HUSKERS & FLIK

Flik athletics specializes in fueling athletes. Flik Athletics currently fuels over 25 professional teams across NFL, NBA, WNBA, MLB, MLS and USL Championship league. Nebraska will be the first college athletic program they have partnered with. In partnership with team dietitians, trainers, and coaches, Flik's team of chefs and dietitians create customized hospitality services and programming that elevate the athlete's culinary experience.

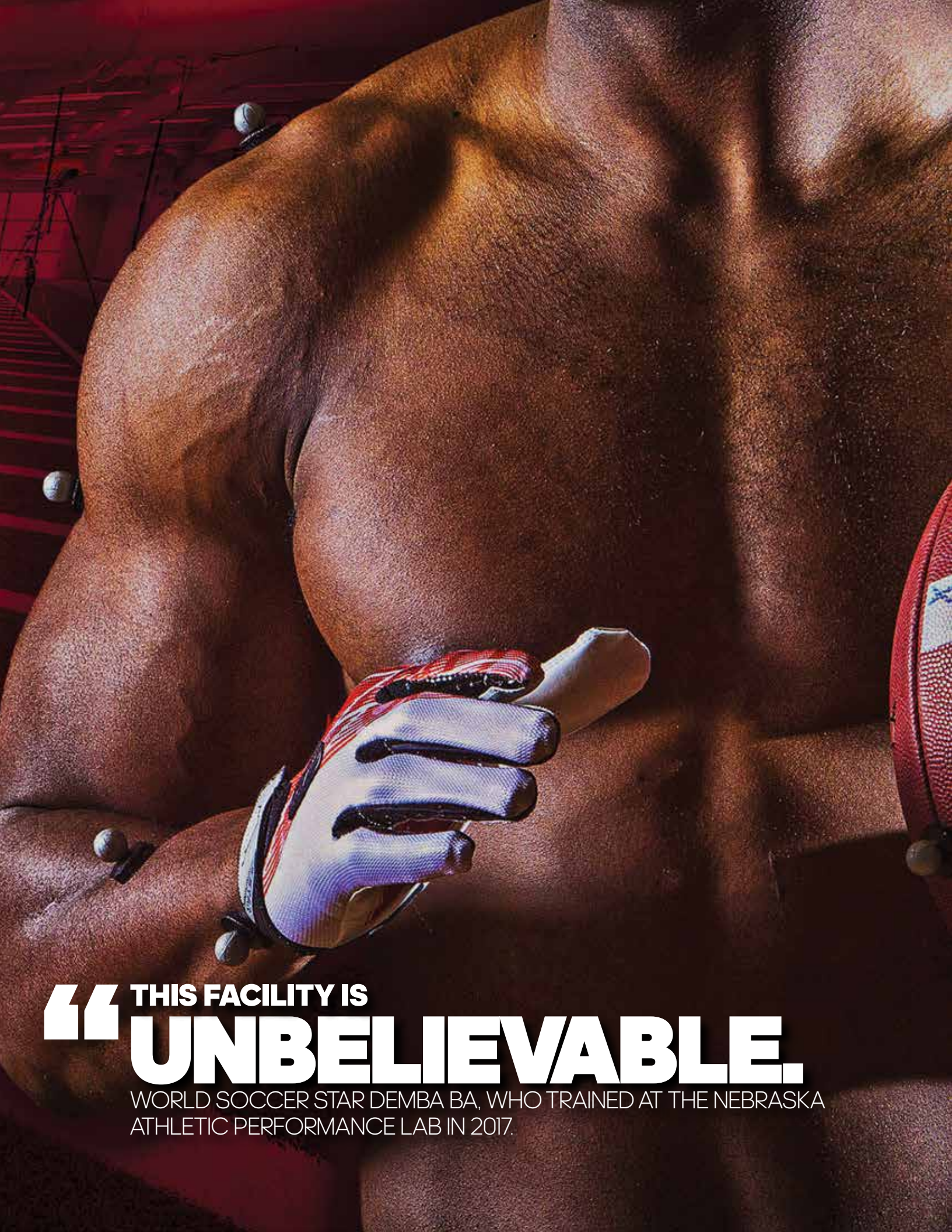

ACADEMIC COUNSELING

A team of 14 academic staff members are in place to monitor daily academic progress, promote skill development, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/registration process and monitor eligibility and progress toward graduation.

TUTORIAL SUPPORT

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, tutorial support is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. Tutorial support is provided both in-person and virtually. Nebraska's tutorial program is certified by the College Reading and Learning Association.

STUDY HALL

Student-athletes attend a supervised study hall within the newly-opened Osborne Legacy Complex that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week and/or a list of academic tasks as determined by their academic counselor, learning specialist and coach.

MENTORING

Academic staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes and select returning student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information and discuss academic success strategies.

EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a neuropsychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

COMPUTER RESOURCES

All student-athletes are provided the opportunity to have a laptop for use during their academic career at Nebraska. The Osborne Legacy Complex has printers and desktop computers available for student-athletes to use in the facility. A full-time computer specialist is on-site and available to assist with technology needs.

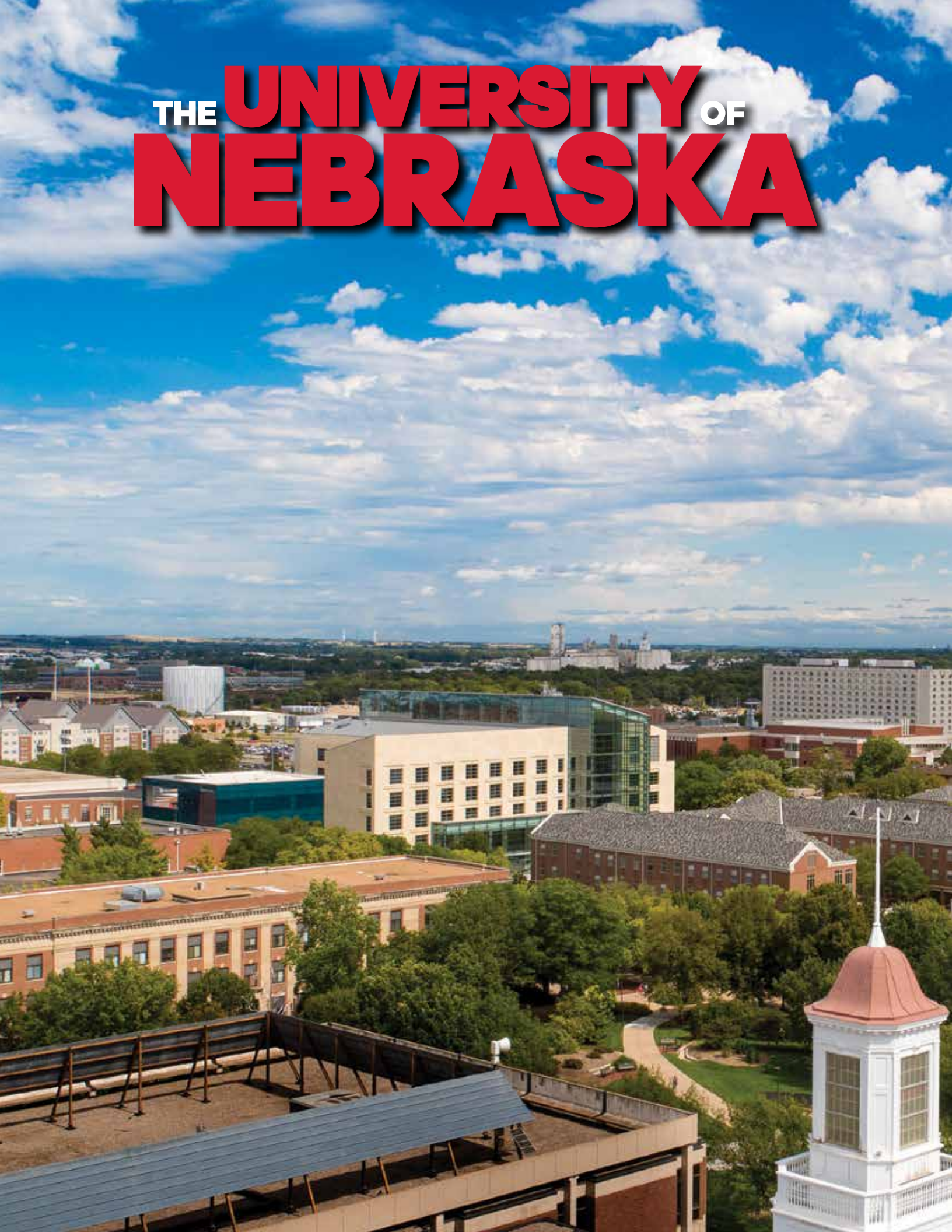

THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

Chartered in Lincoln by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a university system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration. The flagship University of Nebraska–Lincoln is an educational institution of international stature. Nebraska is classified within the Carnegie “R1: Doctoral Universities – Highest Research Activity” category. Nebraska is also a land-grant university and a member of the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities. The university is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission.

BIG TEN ACADEMIC ALLIANCE

As a member of the Big Ten, the University of Nebraska–Lincoln is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), which is the academic consortium of the universities in the Big Ten Conference. The BTAA includes all 18 Big Ten Institutions and partners with the University of Chicago. Being in the Big Ten Academic Alliance gives Nebraska several advantages, including: access to library collections across the conference, reduced costs through tech collaborations, lower student costs on course materials through collective purchasing and licensing, and study abroad partnerships and course-sharing agreements — students can take courses across Big Ten institutions.

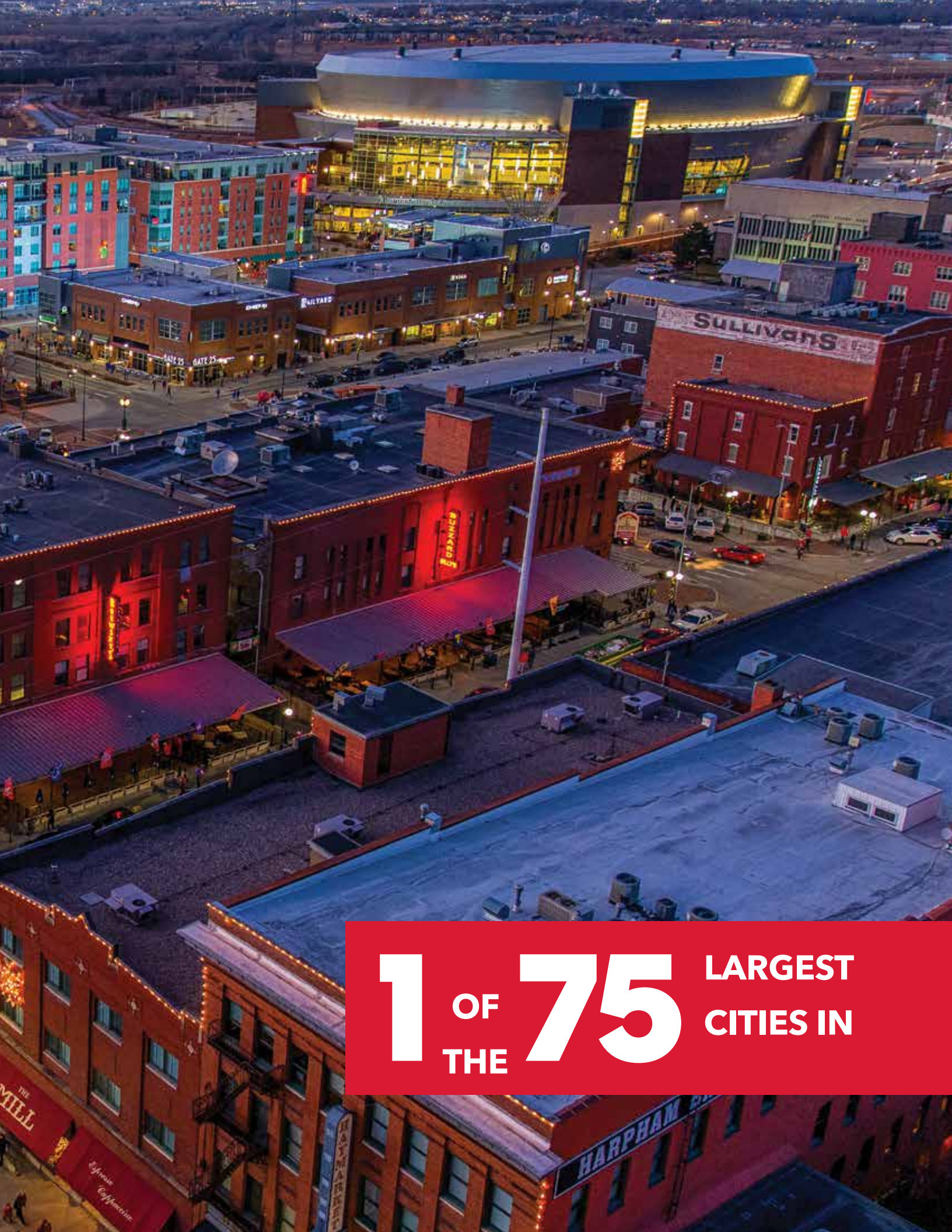

U.S. OLYMPIC TRIALS, HOME IN NEBRASKA



The CHI Health Center in Omaha played host to four consecutive U.S. Olympic Trials (2008, 2012, 2016, 2020). Former Huskers Autumn Haebig and Audrey Coffey earned spots in multiple events to represent Nebraska at the trials during the summer of 2021.

The state of Nebraska played host to the U.S. Olympic Swimming Trials (June 13-20) at the CHI Health Center in Omaha for the fourth consecutive time in 2021. The event, which was a showcase event with sellout crowds of 14,000 for each day of the trials, gave Nebraska a chance to showcase its love and support for swimming. The original 2020 version of the U.S. Olympic Swimming Trials was postponed to 2021 by the world-wide outbreak of the coronavirus.

Nebraska three-time All-American Autumn Haebig advanced to Wave II in three events for the trials, after the Wisconsin native qualified in the 100 back, 200 free and 400 free. In February of 2021, Haebig became Nebraska's first Big Ten swimming champion before claiming All-America honors in both the 200 and 500 freestyles at the 2021 NCAA Championships in March. Haebig set the Nebraska records in the 400-meter free (4:14.96) and 100-meter back (1:01.91), while also establishing NU records in the 100-yard back (52.29), 200-yard free (1:44.39) and 500-yard free (4:41.83) during her time in Lincoln.

Audrey Coffey secured her ticket to Omaha for the U.S. Olympic Trials as she raced to victory in the 1,500-meter free (16:48.76) at the 2019 Speedo Sectionals in Jenks, Okla. Coffey set the school record in the event before adding CSCAA All-America honors in the 1,650-yard free in 2020. The Illinois native also swam to a school-record in the 1,000-yard free (9:48.15) as a junior.

At the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials, the Huskers were represented by Omahans Alexandra Bilunas (50 free) and Erin Oeltjen (100 back, 200 back), and Husker teammates Taryn Collura (Phoenix, Ariz., 50 free, 100 fly), Jordan Ehly (Albuquerque, N.M., 200 breast), Morgan McCafferty (Reynoldsburg, Ohio, 100 back) and Katt Sickle (Grain Valley, Mo., 400 free). The 2016 Huskers tripled the number from the 2012 trials (Bailey Pons, 400 free; Shannon Guy, 100 fly).

The state of Nebraska, the Midwest and the entire swimming community took a monumental step on June 28, 2005, when USA Swimming announced Omaha as the host city for the 2008 U.S. Olympic Swimming Trials. After the 2008



Trials proved to be a resounding success, as well as the subsequent 2012 and 2016 Trials, officials from USA Swimming and the Omaha Sports Commission announced the return of the event to Omaha in 2020.

The 2008 Trials drew 160,003 fans over eight days and 15 sessions. The 2016 Trials smashed those numbers, with all 15 sessions sold out and attendance exceeding 200,000 for the first time. In 2004, attendance was just over 100,000.

The CHI Health Center has served as a home away from home for Husker Athletics for many years. In 2015, the Nebraska volleyball team won its fourth NCAA title and its second in Omaha. The 2006 Huskers claimed Nebraska's third NCAA volleyball title in Omaha as well, and the arena played host to the 2012 NCAA Volleyball Championships. Nebraska also hosted the Big 12 Wrestling Championships in the building, while the men's basketball team played a regular-season game against Oregon in 2007.

The 2024 U.S. Olympic Trials moved to Indianapolis, where Huskers Gena Jorgenson and JoJo Randy represented Nebraska. Jorgenson posted career-best times in the 400, 800 and 1,500-meter freestyles, shattering the Husker school record in both the 800 and 1,500.

Randy competed in the 100-meter breaststroke in Indianapolis, while former Husker All-American Abigail Knapton finished fourth in the Synchronized Women's Platform alongside Katerina Hoffman in Knoxville, Tenn.



Autumn Haebig competed in the 200-meter freestyle, 400 free and the 100 backstroke at the 2020 U.S. Olympic Trials in June of 2021 in Omaha. She was joined by teammate Audrey Coffey (1,500-meter free) in advancing to Wave II of the trials at CHI Health Center.

JORGENSEN, CLAIMONT LEAD EXPERIENCED SQUAD

The Nebraska swimming and diving team takes aim at more All-America-caliber success after a top-30 finish at the NCAA Championships in 2024.

Gena Jorgenson returns for her junior season with the Huskers after breaking four school records and finishing eighth in the 1,650 freestyle at the 2024 NCAA Championships. Her career-best, 15:55.71 finish in the event earned her first-team All-American honors. Jorgenson added career-best finishes in the 500 freestyle (27th, 4:41.03) and 400 IM (33rd, 4:11.51) at the NCAA Championships. She now holds six school records for the Huskers. At the Big Ten Championships, Jorgenson finished fifth in the 1,650 freestyle (16:01.72) and 10th in the 500 freestyle (4:41.19), hitting the NCAA B standard in both events.

The current school record holder in the 100 breaststroke, JoJo Randby enters her senior season with the Huskers. Randby highlighted her junior campaign with a first-place finish in the 100 breaststroke at the midseason Hawkeye Invite. She qualified for the A Final and went on to finish in an NCAA B Standard time of 1:00.54. At the Big Ten Championships, Randby placed 13th.

A senior from Whitby, England, Maia Hall picked up a pair of fifth-place finishes at last season's Big Ten Championships. She clocked a career-best 1:00.16 in the 100 breaststroke final to place fifth and climb to second all-time for the Huskers. In the 200 breaststroke final, Hall picked up another fifth-place finish with a time of 2:10.90. She cut nearly a second off her time in the event at the Mizzou Last Chance Meet and moved to second all-time for NU with a time of 2:09.87.

A sophomore from Budapest, Hungary, Beatrix Tanko was a key contributor both individually and in relay events for the Huskers. She broke the school record in the 100 butterfly at the Big Ten Championships with a 10th-place finish and a time of 53.16. Tanko added 14 top-three finishes with six titles, while contributing to 10 winning relays, including four against Rutgers (Feb. 2-3).

Anna Vlachou competed in three events at the Big Ten Championships. She clocked a prelim time of 54.32 to qualify for the C final in the 100 butterfly. Vlachou finished 21st-overall with a time of 54.14. She was a member of four winning relays, contributing to a 400 medley relay team that finished eighth at the Big Ten Championships and moved up to third all-time for NU. At the Hawkeye Invite, Vlachou added a third-place finish in the 100 freestyle (50.57) and a pair of eighth-place finishes in the 200 freestyle and the 100 butterfly.

A senior from Trieste, Italy, Caterina Bisiacchi earned a pair of top-24 finishes at the Big Ten Championships. She logged a career-best time of 16:37.28 in the 1,650 freestyle to finish 20th at the conference meet. Bisiacchi qualified for the 200 butterfly C final and went on to finish 23rd with a time of 2:01.35. At the Hawkeye Invite, she logged a third-place finish in the 1,650 freestyle (16:43.29), a fourth-place finish in the 500 freestyle (4:50.19) and a seventh-place finish in the 200 butterfly (2:03.59).

Sydney McCracken, a senior from Kennett Square, Pa., enters her senior season with the Huskers in 2024-25. She qualified for the C final in two events at last season's Big Ten Championships. McCracken placed 23rd in the

100 breaststroke (1:03.11) and added a 24th-place finish in the 200 breaststroke (2:17.05). At the midseason Hawkeye Invite, she picked up a fifth-place finish in the 100 breaststroke (1:03.07) and a sixth-place finish in the 200 breaststroke (2:19.13).

Giulia Marchi, a junior from Asola, Italy, is expected to be a key contributor for the Huskers in both individual and relay events. Marchi set her career best in the 200 freestyle at the midseason Hawkeye Invite. She clocked a time of 1:49.06 in the finals to finish runner-up. Marchi added a sixth-place finish in the 100 freestyle and a pair of 17th-place finishes. At the Big Ten Championships, she contributed to an 800 freestyle relay team that finished eighth and moved to third all-time for NU.

Madison Lloyd posted five top-five finishes early in the season for the Big Red, before being limited by injury late in the year. The senior from Houston, Texas competed in three events at Kansas (Nov. 3) and finished four in the 200 backstroke, fifth in 400 IM and sixth in the 100 back. She is looking forward to returning to Nebraska's competitive group at the 2025 Big Ten Championships, after missing the conference meet as a junior.

Amelia Riggott capped her freshman season with three career bests at the Big Ten Championships. She qualified for the C final in the 100 breaststroke with a prelim time of 1:02.53. Riggott swam a 1:02.45 in the final to place 21st. At the Hawkeye Invite, she placed fifth in the 100 breaststroke final with a time of 1:03.07. Riggott finished with seven top-five finishes on the season.

Jenna Brown did not compete because of injury as a true freshman in 2023-24. She looks to make an impact for the Huskers in the butterfly and freestyle events as a redshirt freshman in 2024-25.

The Big Red will feature a strong returning group of divers in 2024-25, led by Kelsey Clairmont. The junior from Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada made her second consecutive NCAA Championships appearance last season on the platform. She put up a score of 502.75 at the NCAA Zone D Diving Championships to finish eighth and qualify for the 2024 NCAA Championships. Clairmont went on to take 20th with a score of 242.70 at nationals. She totaled 18 zone-qualifying scores across all events on the season and added 15 top-five finishes.

A sophomore from Coppell, Texas, Abby Baxter was a key contributor on both the one- and three-meter boards for the Huskers a year ago. At the Big Ten Championships, Baxter qualified for the one-meter final with a preliminary score of 257.35, before taking 12th (263.05). She added a 17th-place finish at the NCAA Zone D Diving Championships on the one meter with a score of 529.70. Baxter totaled 17 top-five finishes, including seven titles on the season.

Antonina Harned competed on the one-meter, three-meter and platform dives for the Huskers in 2023-24. The talented competitor from Windermere, Fla., capped off her freshman season at the NCAA Zone D Diving Championships in Houston, Texas, by claiming a 23rd-place finish on the three meter (281.25) and a 38th-place showing on the one meter (231.80). Harned produced a career-best 331.50 on the

three meter against Kansas. The next weekend against Iowa, she added a career-best 301.45 to earn a runner-up finish on the one-meter board.

Frankie Webb set a three-meter career-best in a dual with Illinois on Jan. 27. The junior from Cambridge, England posted a zone-qualifying score of 295.73 for the runner-up finish. At the NCAA Zone D Diving Championships, she finished 42nd on the three meter (244.80).

A junior from Seward, Neb., Elle Delcamp posted two zone-qualifying scores on the three meter in 2023-24. She set career bests on the one- and three-meters dives in a dual with South Dakota State. Delcamp posted a 248.93 on the one meter and a zone-qualifying 282.38 on the three meter.

Jordyn Schmucker rounded out Nebraska's contributors in the diving well in 2023-24. She began her Husker career in a double-dual with Minnesota and South Dakota. The freshman from Farmington, Minn., notched career bests on both the one meter (253.43) and three meter (268.20) in dual with South Dakota State.

The Huskers will be bolstered in the well by a new face and familiar name in Nettie Knapton. The junior transfer from Wyoming competed at the NCAA Zone E Diving Championships in both the three-meter and platform dives after earning All-Mountain West Conference honors on platform in 2024. Knapton is the younger sister of six-time Husker All-American and Academic All-American Abi Knapton.

Virginia Consiglio also joins the Huskers for the 2024-25 season. The freshman from Genova, Italy was a member of the Italian Junior National Team for the 2021 and 2023 European Junior Championships, where she set a junior national record in the 50 butterfly.

Maisie Gilford is another international transfer who is hoping to make an instant impact for the Huskers. The sprint freestyler competed in

the 2024 British Championships in the 100 and 200-meter freestyles, while taking 12th in the 200 IM. The junior from England swam for the University of Bath and was a teammate of Husker sophomore Amelia Riggott at Mount Kelly.

Jenna Gogel (Bentonville, Ark.) is the reigning Arkansas state champion in the 100 breaststroke (1:05.86). She added a runner-up finish in the 200 IM (2:10.33), earning All-Arkansas Preps honors. Gogel swam for Northwest Arkansas Aquatics and was named the 2022-23 Swimmer of the Year.

Marissa Laurin joins the Huskers from Grand Prairie, Alberta, Canada. She swam for the Grand Prairie Piranhas and led her team to a third-place finish in medium-sized teams at the provincial championships. At the Canada Summer Games, Laurin placed third in the 200 backstroke and finished in the top 10 of her age group in Canada in several other events.

Jazmyn Lunn was the top-ranked prospect from the state of South Dakota in the 2024 class. She was a two-time state champion with the Sioux Falls Swim Team and owns nine state records. At the 2024 State A Championship Meet, Lunn captured six titles.

Riley Miklos (Richmond, Va.) was a state finalist for Deep Run High School in the 200 and 500 freestyles. She swam for Nova of Virginia Aquatics, where she was a 2023 Virginia short-course finalist in the 200, 500 and 1,000 freestyles and the 200 butterfly.

Katy Zboinski (Sparks, Nev.) joins the Huskers out of Spanish Springs High School, where she was the 2023 NIAA Nevada 5A state champion and school record holder in the 100 breaststroke. At the 2024 NIAA Northern Region Championship, Zboinski won the 100 breaststroke and took third in the 200 IM.

Caterina (Cate) Bisiacchi was a key contributor to freestyle and butterfly events in her first season as a Husker. She totaled 24 top-five finishes, including 13 top-three performances. At the Hawkeye Invitational, Bisiacchi earned a third-place finish in the 1,650 freestyle (16:43.29). She set a new career best in the event at the Big Ten Championships with a 20th-place finish (16:37.28). Bisiacchi finished fourth in the 500 freestyle final at the Hawkeye Invite (4:50.19) and seventh in the 200 butterfly (2:03.59). She set a career best in the 200 freestyle with her ninth-place finish (1:50.79). In a dual with Omaha, Bisiacchi won the 500 freestyle (5:05.91) and took third in the 200 butterfly (2:05.47). Against Illinois, she added two runner-up finishes. Bisiacchi set a career best with her second-place finish in the 1,000 freestyle (10:04.76). She added another runner-up finish in the 500 freestyle (4:55.72) and placed third in the 200 butterfly (2:03.05). In a dual with Rutgers (Feb. 2-3), Bisiacchi earned a pair of runner-up finishes in the 500 and 1,650 freestyles, while adding two fourth-place finishes.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Bisiacchi came Nebraska as a junior from Trieste, Italy. Bisiacchi graduated from the University of Trieste in July of 2023. She attended Liceo Scientifico Guglielmo Oberdan and competed for A.s.d. Tergeste Nuoto Altura under Coach Matteo Bianchi. Bisiacchi was crowned the National Category Champion in 2018 for her first-place finish in the 200-meter butterfly. Also in 2018, she qualified for the B Final Italian Championships in the 200-meter

butterfly. Bisiacchi placed second in the 200-meter butterfly at the 2019 Italian Category Championships. She qualified for the B Final in the 200-meter butterfly at two different events in 2019, the Italian Championships and the Internazionali di Nuoto 56°SevenHills Trophy.

Hall continued to achieve and progress throughout her sophomore campaign. At the mid-season Hawkeye Invite, Hall clocked a then-career-best 2:10.76 in the 200 breaststroke to win the event and hit the NCAA B Standard. It was also the third-fastest time in Nebraska history. Hall added a third-place finish in the 100 breaststroke with a 1:01.72 and finished sixth in the 200 IM with a career-best 2:02.26. At the Big Ten Championships, Hall won the 200 breaststroke B Final to finish ninth overall with a time of 2:11.63. In the 100 breaststroke, Hall clocked a career-best 1:00.76 to place 10th and move to fifth on Nebraska's all-time list. Hall collected four-straight mid-season 200 breaststroke victories, including wins in duals against Iowa (2:20.64), Kansas (2:21.25) and Omaha (2:19.70). She also won the 100 breaststroke in 1:07.48 at the season-opening dual against SDSU. Hall tallied six individual wins and 11 top-three finishes during the season.

2021-22 (FRESHMAN)

During her freshman campaign, Hall was a consistent leader in the breaststroke group. She scored the second-most points at the Big Ten Championships for NU after making B-final appearance in both the 100 and 200 breaststroke events. Hall finished 12th in the 200 breaststroke and 13th in the 100 breaststroke. Her 100 breaststroke prelims time of 1:00.98 put her at fourth on Nebraska's all-time list and her 200 breaststroke prelims time of 2:11.72 was the fifth-fastest in Nebraska history. Hall made her collegiate debut at the South Dakota State dual, where she swam to a third-place finish in the 200 IM and 200 medley relay. The freshman put up her first victory of the season in the 100 breaststroke at the Iowa dual (Oct. 23), followed by a fourth-place swim in the 100 fly. Hall swam to two consecutive fourth-place finishes in the 100 breaststroke, against Minnesota and Iowa State, while adding a third-place finish in the 200 breaststroke. Against the Jayhawks, Hall dropped her 200 breaststroke time by almost three seconds to claim a runner-up finish, in addition to finishing third in the 100 breaststroke. Two weeks later, Hall swam five seconds faster in the 200 breast (2:14.62) to place third at the competitive Mizzou Invitational (Nov. 17-19). She nabbed another top-five finish in the 100 breaststroke with a 1:02.64. Hall attacked the opportunity to swim against the best in the country at the U.S. Opens (Dec. 1-4), where she earned a spot in the 200-meter breaststroke A-finals. She went on to finish eighth overall with a 2:38.43. In the 100-meter breaststroke,

Hall added a B-finals appearance and swam to 12th place with a 1:12.98. She closed the dual season with two victories in the 200 breaststroke, including a career-best swim against Rutgers (Jan. 28).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

A breaststroke specialist who was the 2017 British 15U National Champion in the 50-meter race, Hall has won multiple medals at the British National Championships and was the winner of the Junior Final at the British Olympic Trials in 2019. At the 2019 Scottish Short-Course National Championships, Hall finished fourth in the 50 (32.16), 100 (1:09.40) and 200 breaststroke (2:28.21).

The daughter of Michael and Rachel Hall, Maia was born in Scarborough, England, on Oct. 19, 2002. She has one younger sister, Esme, and two younger brothers, Isaac and Luca. A second-team CSCAA Scholar All-American in 2024, Maia is majoring in accounting. She earned Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2023 and 2024. She is a five-time Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. Hall is a two-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team. She has dual citizenship in Great Britain and Australia after living in Queensland for several years.

2023-24 (JUNIOR)

Maia Hall excelled in the 100 and 200 breaststroke events, taking fifth for the Huskers in both events at the 2024 Big Ten Championships. The junior from Whitby, England hit the NCAA B Standard four times in the 100 breaststroke and eight times in the 200. At the Big Ten Championships, Hall clocked a time of 1:01.11 in the 100 breaststroke to earn a spot in the A final. She finished fifth by clocking the second-fastest time in school history (1:00.16) in the final. Hall also grabbed a fifth-place finish in the 200 breaststroke, finishing in 2:10.90. She went on to clock a career-best in the event during a time trial at the Mizzou Last Chance Meet. Her time of 2:09.87 was also the No. 2 time in Husker history. Hall picked up two NCAA B cuts at the Hawkeye Invitational. She qualified for the A final in the 100 breaststroke (1:01.84) before notching her first NCAA B cut of the season and shaved off a few seconds in the finals for a second-place finish, earning her first B cut of the season (1:01.20). 2023-24 (JUNIOR)

Madison Lloyd totaled five top-five finishes for the Huskers early in 2023-24 before battling injuries late in the season. In a dual with Iowa, Lloyd picked up a fourth-place finish in the 200 backstroke (2:06.51) and a fifth-place finish in the 100 back (59.76). She set season-best times in both events at a dual with Kansas (Nov. 3).

2022-23 (SOPHOMORE)

Lloyd cruised to a pair of top-eight finishes at the Hawkeye Invitational with a 2:04.48 in the 200 backstroke and a 4:29.02 in the 400 IM. She added a 15th-place effort in the 100 backstroke with a 58.45. At the Omaha dual, Lloyd posted a 59.66 in the 100 backstroke and a 2:07.78 in the 200 backstroke to place third in both. season-best times in all three of her events at the Big Ten Championships, including a career-best 2:04.14 in the 200 IM to place 38th. In the 400 IM, Lloyd finished 29th with a 4:26.10, and she added a 31st-place finish in the 200 backstroke with a 2:00.98.

2021-22 (FRESHMAN)

In Lloyd's collegiate debut she swam to a 200 IM title, placed fourth in the 100 breaststroke and was a member of the third-place 200 medley relay in Nebraska's season-opening dual win over South Dakota State (Oct. 2). She contributed in a big way again for the Huskers in their Big Ten dual victory over Iowa at the Devaney Natatorium (Oct. 23). Lloyd raced to an individual title in the 200 backstroke after swimming to a runner-up finish in the 100 backstroke against the Hawkeyes. She helped the Huskers to their largest margin of victory against a Big Ten opponent in school history. The Mizzou Invitational was highlighted by Lloyd putting up top-10 finishes in four events. She finished eighth in the 100 backstroke (56.69), ninth in the 200 IM (2:04.43), 10th in the 400 IM (4:28.05) and 10th in the 200 backstroke (1:58.78). Lloyd wrapped up dual season with two career-best times (100 backstroke, 400 IM) against Rutgers, placing

third in the 400 IM (4:24.70) and fourth in the 100 backstroke (56.02). She added a runner-up finish in the 100 backstroke and claimed third in the 200 backstroke at Illinois. At her first conference meet, Lloyd swam in three individual events and notched her top finish in the 400 IM, finishing 32nd with a 4:25.40.

Lloyd was a three-time Texas UIL Class 6A state finalist in the 100 backstroke, finishing fourth in 2020 and 2021 after taking eighth as a sophomore in 2019. 2023-24 (JUNIOR)

Sydney McCracken highlighted her junior season by qualifying for the C final in two events at the Big Ten Championships. She posted a season-best time in the 100 breaststroke prelims to punch her ticket to the C final (1:02.85). McCracken finished 23rd with a time of 1:03.11. She also qualified for the 200 breaststroke C final with a prelim time of 2:15.72 and went on to finish 24th overall (2:17.05). At the Hawkeye Invite, McCracken picked up a fifth-place finish in the 100 breaststroke (1:03.07) and a sixth-place finish in the 200 breaststroke (2:19.13). She also set a career-best in the 400 IM with her 13th-place finish and time of 4:25.57. In an early-season dual with Omaha, McCracken picked up a pair of top-three finishes. She touched the wall in 2:26.37 in the 200 breaststroke for a runner-up finish and took third in the 200 freestyle (1:56.40). McCracken finished the season with 12 top-five finishes.

2022-23 (SOPHOMORE)

McCracken continued to improve and provide top finishes in the individual medley and breaststroke events during her sophomore season. At the mid-season Hawkeye Invite, McCracken had three A Final swims and went on to finish fourth in the 200 breaststroke (2:15.43), fifth in the 200 IM (2:01.54) and sixth in the 100

breaststroke (1:02.58). Earlier in the season, McCracken chipped in a pair of runner-up finishes in the Iowa dual in the 200 breaststroke (2:21.49) and the 200 IM (2:07.95), while adding a fourth-place finish in the 100 breaststroke (1:05.10). 2021-22 (FRESHMAN)

McCracken kicked off her career at Nebraska at the South Dakota State dual, where she swam to a fourth-place finish in the 200 IM. At the Iowa dual, the freshman finished third in the 200 breaststroke and fifth in the 100 backstroke. Gena Jorgenson produced a monumental sophomore season, breaking four school records and qualifying for three events at the NCAA Championships in Athens, Ga. Jorgenson swam a school-record time of 15:55.71 in the 1,650 freestyle at nationals to capture an eighth-place finish and claim first-team All-America honors. She became the first Husker swimmer to earn

2022-23 (FRESHMAN)

Jorgenson unleashed an historic freshman season, twice breaking the 1,650 freestyle school record while punching her ticket to the NCAA Championships. She cut 20 seconds off her previous career-best mile time (16:13.54) at the Big Ten Championships to set a school record and place sixth overall. At NCAAs, Jorgenson broke the record again with a 16:13.34 to place 28th. She added a 41st-place finish in the 400 IM (4:18.00) and a 56th-place showing in the 500 free (4:46.43) at the Allan Jones Aquatic Center in Knoxville, Tenn. Jorgenson added a 13th-place finish in the 500 freestyle at the Big Ten meet with a then-career-best 4:45.02. She also won the 400 IM C Final with a then-career-best 4:15.95. She swam to a pair of 500 freestyle titles in the first two meets of the season at South Dakota State (5:04.50) and against Iowa State (4:58.68). She added a 1,000 freestyle win against the Cyclones in 10:13.63. NU hosted Minnesota and South Dakota for a double-dual, where Jorgenson notched a pair of runner-up finishes in the 1,000 freestyle and 200 IM with times of 10:15.03 and 2:09.25, respectively. She added a third-place finish in the 500 freestyle, clocking a 5:03.16. At the Iowa dual, Jorgenson won the 1,000 freestyle with a 10:11.44, finished second in the 500 freestyle with a 5:00.64 and took third in the 200 IM with a 2:08.76. At Kansas, Jorgenson pitched in another 1,000 freestyle victory in 10:14.79 and a pair of runner-up finishes in the 500 freestyle (5:00.74) and the 400 IM (4:29.71). Jorgenson swam in the A Final in four different individual races at the competitive Hawkeye Invite. She went on to cut 20 seconds off her previous career-best 1,650 freestyle time, to finish as runner-up in 16:34.48. Adding a trio of top-five finishes, Jorgenson took third in the 500 freestyle (4:48.19) and the

The Omaha Marian graduate could provide an immediate boost on platform for the Huskers, while adding strong scoring potential on the one- and three-meter boards. Knapton, whose sister Abi was a six-time All-America diver for the Huskers, will be a junior for the Huskers in 2024-25. As a sophomore at Wyoming, Knapton posted a fifth-place finish on the platform at the 2024 Mountain West Championships with a career-best 255.90, which was the fourth-best platform performance in school history. She added a ninth-place conference finish on the one-meter (267.85) and a 20th-place finish on the three-meter (211.00). Pablo Morales continues to see the Nebraska swimming and diving program climb in national prominence in and out of the water in his 23rd season leading the Husker program.

Nebraska experienced a successful 2024 season, marked by sophomores Gena Jorgenson and Kelsey Clairmont qualifying for their second consecutive NCAA Championships. Additionally, five school records were shattered throughout the season.

Jorgenson broke three school records at the NCAA Championships in the 500 freestyle (4:41.03), 1,650 freestyle (15:55.71) and 400 IM (4:11.51). She set her fourth at a dual with Illinois where she posted a time of 9:41.68 in the 1000 freestyle.

Freshman Beatrix Tanko added a record of her own in the 100 butterfly at the Big Ten Championships (53.16).

With her eighth-place finish in the 1,650 freestyle at the NCAA Championships, Jorgenson became the first Husker swimmer to be named a first-team All-American since 2001.

In 2023, Jorgenson set the 1,650-yard freestyle record, previously held by Audrey Coffey, with a time of 16:13.34. JoJo Randby added her name to the top of the list in the 100 breaststroke with a time of 1:00.07, which surpassed previous record holder Penny Heyns. Shannon Stott added a trio of records in 2023 in the 500 freestyle, 400-meter freestyle and 200-meter butterfly.

In 2022, Autumn Haebig took her fourth trip to the NCAA Championships and notched a 23rd-place finish in the 200 freestyle. As a team, Nebraska finished 7-1 in duals and placed ninth at Big Tens.

In 2021, Nebraska earned its best team finish since 2001, placing 26th at the NCAA Championships. Led by a pair of first-team All-America performances by diver Abigail Knpton and two more All-America efforts by Haebig in the pool, the Huskers just missed a top-25 team finish.

Knpton became the first diver or swimmer in school history to earn first-team All-America honors four times in the same event (platform). The six-time All-American was also the Big Ten Diver of the Championships after winning gold in both the platform and one-meter dives, while taking second on the three-meter board. A first-team College Sports Communicators Academic All-American as well, Knpton was chosen as Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year and Best Female Athlete across all sports. An NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship award winner, Knpton was also one of 30 finalists for NCAA Woman of the Year honors. She also went on to be the only diver at the Olympic Trials to finish among the top eight in all three competitive dives.

In 2020, three Husker swimmers (Haebig, Coffey, Sara Troyer, Madison Coughlen) qualified for the NCAA Championships. The national meet was ultimately canceled due to the world-wide outbreak of the coronavirus, but the four Huskers combined for five CSCAA All-America awards.

In 2019, Nebraska captured its fourth consecutive top-40 finish at the NCAA Championships by taking 33rd. Knpton captured her third consecutive first-team All-America honor on the platform, while adding an honorable-mention accolade in the three-meter dive.

In 2018, Nebraska finished 35th at the NCAA Championships, as Knpton captured first-team All-America honors on the platform for the second straight season. She was joined at the NCAA Championships by Haebig.

The Big Red took 33rd at nationals in 2017, when Knpton finished fourth on platform to capture her first All-America award.

In 2016, the Huskers finished 39th at the NCAA Championships, which included a 10th-place finish on the one-meter board by Anna Filipic. The Huskers have sent at least one diver to the NCAA Championships in seven consecutive seasons.

Nebraska's rise in the pool and the diving well has occurred while maintaining elite performances in the classroom. In addition to Knpton's first-team CSC Academic All-America award in 2021, Lindsay Helferich captured second-team CSC Academic All-America honors after closing her career with a perfect 4.0 GPA as a civil engineering major in 2019. As a whole, Nebraska leads all of NCAA Division I with 351 CSC Academic All-Americans all time across all sports.

Nebraska posted a program-record 3.747 GPA in the spring of 2020 to earn CSCAA Scholar All-America recognition as a team. The swimming and diving program owned the best GPA of any Nebraska team for three consecutive seasons (2015, 2016, 2017) to win the school's Herman Team GPA Award.

Nebraska's increased competitiveness in the pool and impressive success in the classroom

and community are a far cry from the starting point of the Husker program when Morales took over the job in 2001. In his first season at NU, the Huskers went winless in 2001-02 (0-3) with a depleted roster.

Three years later, NU raced to an 8-1 dual record in 2004-05 and became the first Husker swimming and diving team in school history to win eight consecutive meets. Most importantly, Morales led the Huskers out of the bottom of the Big 12 with a fourth-place finish in 2004 and a third-place showing in 2005. Nebraska has continued to pursue a climb in conference prominence as it has transitioned to the Big Ten.

The Huskers are working to regain the national prowess they enjoyed in the 1990s, when they captured five Big Eight and Big 12 titles from 1994 to 1999.

A 1987 graduate of Stanford University, Morales is one of the greatest male swimmers in U.S. history, winning an NCAA-record 11 individual titles. He also helped lead the Cardinal to three consecutive NCAA titles and four Pac-10 titles, while twice earning Pac-10 Swimmer-of-the-Year honors and garnering six Pac-10 titles himself.

Morales remains the all-time leading scorer at the NCAA Championships, amassing 235 points. Morales was also the recipient of the 1987 Al Masters Award, which is Stanford's highest award for athletic performance, leadership and academic performance. He was the first male swimmer to win the award, and remains one of

two to have accomplished that feat. Morales holds the Stanford record in the 200-yard butterfly (1:42.60) and held the school record in the 100-yard fly (46.25) until it was broken in 1998 by Sabir Muhammad (46.18).

While at Stanford, Morales was awarded the J.E. Sterling Award, which is presented to a student-athlete based on scholarship, leadership and community service. In addition, he served as the director of the Stanford Volunteers for Youth Program. Morales also found time to become a mainstay on the campus newspaper as the beat writer for the women's basketball team.

A CSC Academic All-America selection in 1987, Morales earned a law degree from Cornell in June of 1994, despite taking two years off from law school to train and compete at the Olympics.

An Olympic swimmer, Morales won three gold and two silver medals in the 1984 and 1992 Games, serving as a team captain for the 1992 squad. Following the 1992 Games, in which he returned to the pool after a three-year layoff to capture a gold medal in the 100-meter butterfly, Morales was named the U.S. Olympic Committee's Sportsman of the Year. He held the U.S. Open and NCAA record in the 100-yard fly with a time of 46.26, which stood for 13 years before being broken at the 1999 NCAA Championships.

Among Morales' greatest swimming accomplishments in the pool is holding the world record in the 100-meter butterfly with a time of 52.84 from 1986 until 1995.

Morales' legend in the Olympic Games lives on today, as the Nebraska coach served on the bid committee for the 2008 U.S. Olympic swimming trials that took place in Omaha. Morales had the chance to see the selection process and serve a role in the decision that gave Nebraska its first Olympic event in state history.

The Swimming Trials were a resounding success, and Omaha proved to be a worthy host for the event. More than 160,000 fans attended the event, shattering the previous mark by more than 50,000. In 2016, the U.S. Olympic Trials made their third consecutive appearance in Omaha, and more than 200,000 fans sold out every session of the event. The 2020 Trials returned to Omaha in the summer of 2021, after a one-year delay caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

Before coming to Nebraska, Morales served as the head women's swimming coach at San Jose State University. He held the reins as head coach from 1998 until being named coach at Nebraska in July of 2001. Morales rejuvenated a Spartan program that was near the bottom of the Western Athletic Conference. He was named the 2000 WAC Coach of the Year for his efforts.

While at San Jose State, Morales rebuilt a program and took the Spartans to the NCAA Championships after a 14-year absence. During his tenure, Morales produced six academic All-WAC swimmers. At the 2001 WAC Championships, five Spartans set school records under Morales' supervision, and three met NCAA qualification times. Seven others swam times that placed among the top three in school history.

Before his stint at SJSU, Morales was an assistant at his alma mater, Stanford, in 1997-98, helping lead the squad to the NCAA team title.

Morales also served as a graduate assistant at Cornell while pursuing his law degree. While at Cornell, Morales prepared and coached daily workouts for swimmers and assisted in recruiting. Morales has assisted in coaching with the San Jose Aquatics club group, as well as serving as head coach of the Stanford Masters Swim Team.

For Morales, the opportunity to coach at Nebraska was a welcome challenge.

"As a coach, taking over the responsibilities at Nebraska represents a great opportunity to take a program with success and use the resources that only Nebraska can offer, the support from the athletic department, the University, the Lincoln area and the state, to take the program to a higher level," Morales said after he was hired. "Our goal is to take this program to the elite national level."

A powerful motivator, Morales hopes to keep his swimmers on the top of their games in and out of the pool, as Nebraska has established itself among the nation's best in academic support and athletics.

"I want our swimmers to achieve their goals of faster times and lifetime bests," Morales said. "I want them to have the best season that they have ever had, and I also want us to establish a team atmosphere and build an excitement toward Husker swimming and diving."

Former Stanford Head Coach Skip Kenny, who coached Morales at Stanford and also with Team USA, spoke highly of his former pupil.

"He's one of the most honest people that you will meet," Kenny said. "You will always get the truth out of him. He's very dedicated to the sport of swimming and to his athletes."

"As soon as the swimmers spend a few days or weeks with him, they will see how much he cares about them and the sport of swimming."

Kenny said Morales may have greater potential as a coach than swimmer.

"I honestly believe that he is a better coach than he was a swimmer, and that is saying a lot since he was one of the best swimmers in the world. He has done things with kids that I thought I would never see. If there is a female swimmer out there that wants to be the best in the world, I'd send her to swim for Pablo."

Morales' experiences as an NCAA and international swimmer, and a club and collegiate coach helps him in coaching and recruiting.

"In my experiences, I have been fortunate to have had a long career as a competitor. I was

able to train with coaches who I think are some of the best in the world," Morales said. "I have learned from them, and I have learned from myself. I believe that all of my experiences have prepared me for coaching. I have a good feel for the contours of teams that are successful. I know how they practice, train and compete."

A gifted and noted public speaker and lecturer, Morales was a contributing author to The Swim Coaching Bible, published in 2001. In April of 2007, he was chosen as the U.S. Swimming Diversity Select Camp Head Coach, a four-day camp at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo. Aside from in-pool training, Morales also led motivational and educational sessions and team-building activities for boys and girls from all over the nation. These children were a part of an ethnically under-represented population that is less than 20 percent of the current USA Swimming membership.

Pablo is the son of Pedro and the late Blanca Morales, who came to the United States from Cuba in 1956. Pablo and his wife, Viviana, have four boys, Sam, Benjamin, Eli and Gustavo.

Morales was born in Chicago and grew up in Santa Clara, Calif. He enjoys golfing in his spare time.

Patrick Rowan is in his 11th season as Nebraska's associate head coach, helping the Huskers continue to build a nationally competitive women's swimming and diving program.

Rowan coached Gena Jorgenson to reach new heights her sophomore season. She shattered four school records and earned three career-bests at the 2024 NCAA Championships.

With her eighth-place finish in the 1650 freestyle at the NCAA Championships, Jorgenson became the Huskers' first swimmer to earn First-Team All-American honors since 2001.

During the 2022-2023 season, Rowan coached Jorgenson to an NCAA qualification, while posting a school record time in the mile during the season.

In 2021-22, Autumn Haebig took her fourth trip to nationals, competing in the 100 freestyle, the 200 freestyle and the 500 freestyle. She notched a top-25 finish in the 200 freestyle, after swimming to sixth in the event at the conference meet.

In 2020-21, Rowan helped guide Nebraska to its best finish since 2001, placing 26th at the NCAA Championships. NU also sent five swimmers to the 2022 CSCAA National Invitational Championships, where the team placed 14th out of over 50 teams.

Haebig put herself in the Husker record books by capturing All-America honors in both the 200 free (9th) and 500 free (14th) at the NCAA Championships. She became the first Husker swimmer to earn more than one All-America award at nationals since 2001.

Audrey Coffey joined Haebig at the NCAA Championships and just missed All-America honors after finishing 19th in the 1,650-yard freestyle in a school-record time of 16:14.19.

In 2019-20, Rowan helped three Husker swimmers earn CSCAA All-America honors with school-record-setting performances by Haebig (200 free), Coffey (1,000 free) and Madison Coughlen (200 fly).

Rowan, who returned to Nebraska after spending five years as an assistant coach at Missouri, helped the Tigers become one of the nation's top-15 programs during his time in Columbia (2008-12).

The graduate of Lincoln Southeast High School and former Husker volunteer assistant coach returned to the Big Red for the 2012-13 season and has helped the Huskers produce five consecutive top-40 team finishes at the NCAA Championships.

"Patrick brings extensive and successful coaching and recruiting experience at the collegiate level," Nebraska Coach Pablo Morales said. "Patrick has a tremendous work ethic and an unmatched passion for Nebraska. He has made a major impact on our program and plays a key role in helping us achieve our Big Ten Conference and NCAA goals."

An excellent recruiter, Rowan has helped the Huskers raise their talent level in recent years.

Nebraska's 2023-24 class includes six swimmers and four divers who are expected to bolster NU's team. Five countries are represented in the class, along with competitors from Texas, Minnesota, Kentucky and Florida. Antonina Harned, Abby Baxter, Jordyn Schmucker, Jenna Brown, Anna Vlachou, Amelia Riggott, Caterina Bisiacchi, Beatrix Tanko, Anastasia Tichy and Frankie Webb are the 10 newcomers who will make up nearly half of the 23-member team. Bisiacchi enters as a junior from the University of Trieste and Webb started her college career at North Carolina State. The other eight will be in their first year of college eligibility.

In Rowan's most recent season at Nebraska, Husker swimmers set five school records across all events.

In 2017-18, Rowan helped Haebig, a 14-time Wisconsin high school state champion, earn her first trip to the NCAA Championships as a true freshman. Haebig, who finished 10th in the 100 backstroke and 12th in the 200 freestyle at the 2018 Big Ten Championships, closed her season with a 40th-place NCAA finish in the 100 back. She added a 43rd-place showing in the 500 free at the NCAA meet. Haebig set career bests in all three of those events late in the season at either the Big Ten Championships or the NCAA Last Chance meet.

In 2018, SwimSwam.com ranked the Nebraska swimming and diving program No. 1 in the nation for recruiting, retention and improvement among all NCAA Division I women's programs.

In 2017-18, the Husker swimmers produced 26 NCAA B qualifying standards, which represented an increase in that total for the sixth consecutive season for Nebraska.

In 2016, six Huskers qualified for the U.S. Olympic Trials, while two more international swimmers qualified for their trials.

In 2016-17, Erin Oeltjen set a school record in the 100 and 200-yard backstroke, while Dana Posthuma notched the second-best time in school

history in the 200-yard butterfly (1:58.16).

In 2014-15, Rowan guided the 200-yard freestyle relay to the second-best time in school history at the Big Ten Championships.

In Rowan's second season at NU (2013-14), he helped 14 swimmers to personal bests in the sprint freestyle events.

Rowan served as Nebraska's primary sprint freestyle coach in 2012-13. He saw the 200- and 400-yard freestyle relay teams swim school-record times at the 2013 Big Ten Championships. Taryn Collura swam a school record in the 50-yard freestyle and became the first Husker to qualify for the NCAA Championships in six years.

A Nebraska native, Rowan helped orchestrate a steady rise into national prominence at Missouri. In his first season at MU, Rowan helped the Tiger women's team finish 38th at the 2008 NCAA Championships. After a 28th-place showing in 2009, the Tigers climbed to 23rd in 2011 before finishing 14th at the 2012 NCAA meet.

Rowan served as the power sprints coach while also working with the middle distance group at Missouri. He was the recruiting coordinator for the Tiger men's program while assisting with recruiting on the women's side. The Tiger men's 2011 recruiting class was ranked seventh nationally by collegeswimming.com, while the women's class was ranked 18th. He served as the director of the Mizzou Swim Camp and coached the Mizzou Swim Team (USA Swimming Club).

In addition to serving as a volunteer assistant at Nebraska in 2006-07, Rowan was a long-time coach in the Nebraska Aquatics program.

From 2002 until 2007, Rowan served as the head coach and general manager of the Nebraska Aquatics swim team, where he was the primary coach of the high school and collegiate swimmers. He also served as an age group coach for swimmers from ages 6 to 24 for Nebraska Aquatics from 2000 to 2002.

From 2003 to 2007, he served as the age group chairman for the Midwestern Swimming Executive Board. He was named Midwestern Swimming Coach of the Year in 2006-07, after being named its Age Group Coach of the Year in 2004-05.

A competitive swimmer from 1985 to 2001, Rowan swam collegiately at Eastern Michigan, helping EMU to a pair of Mid-American Conference championships. Individually, he was a 12-time finalist at the MAC Championships for the Eagles.

As a prep swimmer at Lincoln Southeast, Rowan was a two-time Nebraska Class A state champion and a member of a state championship team for the Knights. He was also a team captain and a seven-time Junior National qualifier.

Rowan, who earned his bachelor's degree in psychology from Eastern Michigan in 2000, received his master's degree in education with an emphasis in school and counseling psychology/sport psychology from Missouri in 2009. He is currently pursuing a Ph.D. with a similar emphasis in sport psychology.

He and his wife, Miranda, have a two daughters, Reese and Quinn, and a son, Luke.

A 10-time All-American and the 2019 Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year, Landon Marzullo was named the Head Diving Coach at the University of Nebraska by Pablo Morales on June 24, 2021.

"Landon brings an outstanding coaching skill set to this position, derived from a high-level competitive career, his own coaching experiences, and being around some of the best coaches in the business," Morales said. "He has made an immediate positive impact at each of his coaching stops. With his skill, energy and positive approach, he has gotten the best out of his divers, supported high achievement in the classroom, and successfully recruited both domestically and internationally. He will do the same here at Nebraska. Husker diving is in great hands."

During his third season at Nebraska, Marzullo coached Clairmont to her second consecutive appearance at the NCAA Championships. She posted a score of 242.70 to finish 20th in the nation on the platform. The Huskers return every diver for the 2024-25 season.

In his second season with the Cornhuskers, Marzullo coached diver Kelsey Clairmont to the NCAA Championships on the platform. Clairmont notched a 34th-place finish with a score of 214.00 as a freshman. She finished the season with five first-place finishes and 17 top-five showings. Clairmont returns for the Huskers in 2023-24, along with sophomore Ellee Delcamp, who finished the season with six top-five finishes. Along with Clairmont, junior Reagan Hinze also qualified for the NCAA Zone Championships in the one meter and three meter.

In his first season at Nebraska, Marzullo coached all three of his divers to Zones, where Sara Troyer earned a spot in the three-meter finals and placed 18th. Troyer collected 11 victories on the 2021-22 season, managed a top-25 three-meter finish at Winter Nationals and notched a 13th-place one-meter finish at the 2022 Big Ten Championships. Hallie Roman finished right behind Troyer on one meter at conference to score more team points with a 14th-place finish. Both Roman and Hinze produced career-best dives throughout the year and recorded multiple top-five finishes.

Marzullo led the men's and women's divers at Wisconsin in 2019-20 after building strong men's and women's diving programs in three seasons at UNLV. He coached Rebel divers to three individual conference titles in his three seasons in Las Vegas, and helped his divers set five school records. In 2019, he was named the WAC Coach of the Year after leading freshman Tazman Abramowicz WAC titles on the three-meter and platform events. Abramowicz also became the first Rebel men's diver to qualify for the NCAA Diving Championships in more than 30 years. In 2018, he coached the first Rebel women's diver (Myka Fielding) to the NCAA Championships for the first time in more than 20 seasons. Marzullo was also the head coach of the Rebel Diving Club from 2015 to 2019.

Marzullo got his first taste of collegiate coaching as a volunteer assistant at Ohio State in 2012-13. He left OSU to work as a high diver for Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines from 2013 to 2015, performing multiple times per day on the three-meter, 10-meter and 17-meter platforms.

Marzullo, who was the Big Ten Diver of the

Year at Indiana as a freshman in 2008, spent his first two collegiate seasons with the Hoosiers. He was also the Big Ten Freshman of the Year and the 2008 Big Ten Diver of the Championships after winning conference titles on the one-meter and three-meter springboards and adding a fourth-place finish on platform. He also took fourth on the platform at the 2008 NCAA Championships to claim first-team All-America honors for the first time in his career, while adding top-16 national finishes on both the one- and three-meter boards. Marzullo took fifth on platform for the Hoosiers at the 2009 NCAA Championships.

He transferred to Florida State following his sophomore season in Bloomington. He was an All-ACC Diver for the Seminoles in both 2010 and 2011. As a senior, he was the runner-up in all three diving events at the ACC Championships, before taking seventh on the three-meter board at the NCAA Championships to claim first-team All-America honors. He closed his career as a 10-time All-American overall, including four first-team All-America awards. He was also named to the 2011 World University Games Diving Team, earning his best finish (4th) on the three-meter synchronized event. He earned his bachelor's degree in criminology from FSU in May of 2012.

Prior to his collegiate career, Marzullo was a six-time junior national champion and captured gold on platform at the 2005 Pan Am Junior Championships. He was a five-time U.S. National Team choice, and he twice qualified for the U.S. Olympic Diving Team Trials. He also finished second on the one-meter board at the 2011 U.S. National Championships.

Former Husker diver Hallie Roman joined the Nebraska staff as a graduate assistant in January of 2024, after spending three months as a volunteer assistant.

A four-year letterwinner for the Big Red, Roman qualified for the NCAA Zone D Championships on the one-meter board in 2022 after finishing 14th on the event at the 2022 Big Ten Championships. She also competed in the three-meter and platform dives at the conference meet as a senior.

A tremendous representative of Husker swim and dive in the classroom and the community, Roman earned second-team CSCAA Scholar All-America honors following her senior season. A three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection, she was also a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar in 2021.

As Nebraska's coordinator of student-athlete development, he provides academic, athletic, personal and career counseling to all Husker student-athletes. As an academic counselor, he works primarily with the Nebraska women's swimming and diving team, the men's and women's golf teams, and the wrestling team, while also assisting the football team.

Before joining the Academic Performance Team, Banks served six years as a law enforcement officer for the City of Lincoln. He is currently a member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics.

Banks, who lettered in football at Nebraska during the 1991 season, earned his master's degree in vocational education in 1998 after receiving a bachelor's degree in business management in 1992 from Nebraska. Banks and his wife, Lisa, have two children, Kaylie and Darius.



Troy Dannen, a leading voice in collegiate athletics with extensive experience as an athletic director and deep ties to the Midwest, is in his first year as Nebraska's Director of Athletics. Dannen was hired on March 20, 2024, and has hit the ground running in Lincoln.

Nebraska Athletics enjoyed success during Dannen's first championship season, as the Husker baseball program won its first Big Ten Tournament title and reached the 40-win plateau for the first time since 2014 while the Husker track teams put together impressive showings. The Husker men won the Big Ten Outdoor title and earned their best NCAA Championship finish since 2016 with a 13th-place finish, while the Husker women posted their second straight top-10 NCAA finish and placed ninth at the national meet. Nebraska finished 22nd in the final 2023-24 Learfield Director's Cup, the program's highest finish since 2010.

Dannen has been a leader in charting the course for a new era of collegiate athletics, serving from 2021 to 2023 as a member of the NCAA Constitution Committee and the Division I Transformation Committee. Dannen also previously served as the chair of the NCAA Football Competition Committee and was an Executive Committee member of the Football Oversight Committee. In total, Dannen has served on seven NCAA committees.

In 2022, Dannen was a finalist for Sports Business Journal's Athletic Director of the Year award, and he received the Distinguished American Award from the Sugar Bowl Chapter of the National Football Foundation.

Dannen came to Lincoln after serving as Director of Athletics at the University of Washington. He helped guide the Huskies' transition to the Big Ten Conference and oversaw a football program that reached the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in January of 2024.

TROY DANNEN

Athletic Director First Season

He arrived at Washington in the fall of 2023 after serving as Director of Athletics at Tulane University since 2015. While at Tulane, Green Wave student-athletes earned 49 All-America honors, a national championship, 21 conference championships and 41 postseason appearances.

In 2022-23, Tulane football won its first American Athletic Conference football championship and won the Cotton Bowl over USC, which was ranked ninth in the nation at that time. The men's basketball program won 20 regular-season games for the first time in two decades. Additionally, men's tennis advanced to its sixth NCAA Tournament in seven years, both bowling and beach volleyball finished ranked in the top 20, and baseball won the conference championship.

Tulane's football program participated in an unprecedented three consecutive bowl games from 2018 to 2020, winning back-to-back bowl games for the first time in 128 years of football at the University.

In the classroom, Tulane student-athletes excelled at a high-level. At the end of the 2022-23 academic year, over 68 percent of Green Wave student-athletes earned a 3.0 GPA or better, with a 93 percent Graduation Success Rate and a record-setting department Academic Progress Report of 992, with seven teams earning a perfect 1000 APR score.

Dannen spearheaded fundraising efforts and numerous capital projects at Tulane. He helped secure the largest unrestricted gift in Tulane Athletics history, an endowment gift that funded the operation of a new sport (sailing), and a \$10 million lead gift

gift in department history. In addition, marketing and licensing revenue grew four-fold, and in 2022-23, Tulane football, basketball and volleyball set ticket sales and revenue records. Under Dannen's leadership, the Green Wave Club Annual Fund grew by 40 percent in terms of donors, and 45 percent in terms of dollars.

Increases in fundraising and major gift donors positively impacted capital project development and completion. A \$13 million renovation to the Reilly Natatorium, home of the swimming and diving program, as well as \$8 million in renovations to locker rooms and the sports medicine area inside the Wilson Center were completed in 2023. Dannen also oversaw construction of a new dining facility, weight room, basketball and volleyball locker rooms. Tulane also completed a \$2.4 million academic center renovation and a \$5 million television and digital production center.

Dannen came to Tulane after serving eight years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Northern Iowa (UNI) from 2008 to 2015. During his tenure, the Panthers enjoyed success at both the conference and national levels, highlighted by an NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in 2010 by the UNI men's basketball team. During his eight-year tenure, UNI was recognized with 39 All-Americans, 13 Coaches of the Year and nine Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) Players of the Year. UNI football, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball and softball combined to reach 15 NCAA tournaments and 20 postseason berths during that stretch. For his efforts, Dannen was recognized as NACDA's FCS Athletic Director of the Year in 2014.

Prior to his time at UNI, Dannen served as the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union's Executive Director for seven years, overseeing 400 high schools and 10 sports.

Dannen grew up on a farm just outside Marshalltown, Iowa, and graduated from UNI in 1989 with a degree in communications. He is married to Amy, and has four children: Elle, Emily, Holly and William.





Kristen Brown joined Nebraska Athletics in July of 2024. She will serve as Deputy Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator, with sport administrator duties for several Husker sports including volleyball and women's basketball.

Brown joins the Huskers after serving as the Deputy Athletics Director for Administration and Leadership at Texas A&M (2020-24).

At Texas A&M, Brown directed a newly created Engagement unit that worked to ensure the talents

of all coaches and administrators are supported at the highest level, and she oversaw the compliance department on a permanent basis. She spent her first two years at Texas A&M as Deputy Athletics Director for Student-Athlete Experience, during which she provided executive leadership for the department on all matters related to student-athlete engagement including academics, life skills and career development served as sports administrator for seven sports, and led the department's Diversity & Inclusion efforts.

Prior to serving the Aggies, Brown worked as the Associate Athletic Director of Administration at the University of Maryland (2014-20). In addition to her administrative duties at Maryland, Brown served as the department's Diversity & Inclusion

Officer and was a member of the university's Diversity & Inclusion Cabinet. Within the department, she played a key role in the development of a professional development program for department's staff, served on the Big Ten sports management committee, and chaired numerous committees related to head coach hiring searches. Externally, Brown led the department's Championships and Community Engagement units, which included the Share the Shell program, the winner of the 2017 NACDA Community Service Award presented by the Fiesta Bowl.

With regard to Brown's leadership and involvement outside the university, AD Ross Bjork added, "With Kristen's experience at several collegiate athletic conferences and her sport oversight experience at Maryland, she brings a national perspective about college athletics and she will also help our entire athletic program flourish at the highest level. We believe Texas A&M should be a leader nationally and in the SEC and Kristen is just the right person to help propel our collective vision."

transition to the Big Ten with oversight of the Broadcast Operations that will produce a plethora of video productions.

Fields was the Football Sport Administrator for the 2024 College Football Playoff National Runner-Up and 2023 Pac-12 Champions. During his time at UW, Fields assisted in the hiring of new Head Football Coach Jedd Fisch and Head Men's Basketball Coach Danny Sprinkle.

Before his appointment at Washington, Fields was the Deputy Athletics Director at Ball State University as the number two administrator in the department. He assisted in supervising the Cardinals' 19 teams and 450-plus student-athletes. Fields oversaw several external areas (Athletics Communications, Marketing & Fan Engagement, Development, Ticketing Sales & Operations, and was the liaison to Learfield-IMG/Ball State Sports Properties).

Several of the team's Fields worked with experienced record success from a revenue generation standpoint. Specifically, he worked as the sport administrator for the football and basketball programs. He administered the football program's first bowl game win in school history in 2020, beating two top-25 opponents in that season. Ball State finished the year ranked in the AP Top 25 and made back-to-back bowl appearances for only the third time in the school's history.

Fields led Ball State's COVID-19 plan for return to campus, testing protocols that successfully allowed all programs to compete and finish their seasons. During his time at Ball State, he assisted in raising private support of more than \$15 million and oversaw the athletic department's most notable capital project to

date--The Scheumann Family Indoor Practice Facility, which was fully funded through private support.

Prior to his time at Ball State, Fields worked at the University of Illinois as the Associate Athletic Director of Development. In his six years with the Illini, Fields assisted with the university's \$2.25 billion "With Illinois" campaign, \$300 million of which was earmarked for athletics. The university campaign exceeded \$2.7 billion, and the athletics portion raised \$321 million.

Before his stint at Illinois, Fields worked at the University of South Alabama for over five years, where he assisted in the facilitation of the overall football operation for a start-up, Division I program, and transition to Football Bowl Subdivision. Fields began his time in collegiate athletics at Auburn, working for four years at his alma mater.

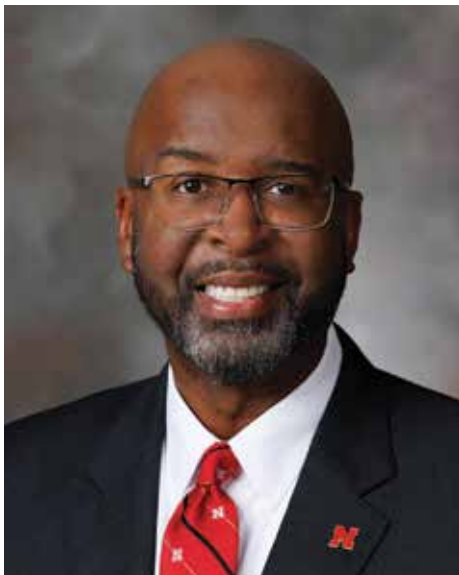

With the Huskies, Fields led several external units including Marketing and Fan Engagement, Strategic Communications, Creative and Digital Services, Multimedia, and served as the Liaison for Learfield/Husky Sports Properties. Fields also played a role in assisting with the Huskies'



Dr. Rodney D. Bennett began his work as the 21st chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on July 1, 2023. He is a 30-year veteran of higher education with a track record of growing research, increasing student success and building impactful partnerships.

In his first year at Nebraska, the University experienced rising retention and graduation rates, demonstrated positive signs related to enrollment, and expanded its research and creative activity efforts. In the fall of 2023, almost 4,700 first-time freshmen enrolled at UNL—an increase of 1.3 percent from 2022.

Spring 2024 overall enrollment reversed a trend of five straight years of spring enrollment declines.

Over the last five years, UNL retention from first to second year has increased 2.3 percent and the four-year graduation rate has increased more than 8.5 percent.

RODNEY BENNETT

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Chancellor Second Season

In 2023, the university's total research expenditures grew to \$366 million, a 37 percent increase over the past decade. UNL has also experienced tremendous growth in externally sponsored federal funding, increasing to a record \$163 million in 2023.

Chancellor Bennett came to Nebraska after nine years of successful leadership at the University of Southern Mississippi. During his tenure as president, USM was reclassified from a Carnegie R2 to an R1 university, signaling growth in research prestige and funding. Dr. Bennett also invested in programs to support student recruitment, retention and outcomes, including for the 30 percent of USM students who were first-generation. His efforts led to an improvement in the university's six-year graduation rate.

Prior to his role at the University of Southern Mississippi, Dr. Bennett served at the University of Georgia for more than a decade. He was the senior administrator for student programs and services for Georgia's 34,000-plus students; oversaw \$150 million in capital projects; and made key staff and programmatic investments in extracurriculars, mental health programs and other areas to better support students.

Dr. Bennett has also been the dean of students at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina, and associate dean of student life at Middle Tennessee State University.

Chancellor Bennett values community leadership and service. He has served on numerous boards, including the Mississippi Aquarium, Northeast Georgia Girl Scouts of America, Catholic Health East (Philadelphia), and St. Mary's Health Care System in Athens, Georgia. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and Past Sire Archon for Sigma Pi Phi fraternity, The Boulé.

spokesman and chief executive officer for the system, which operates on a \$3 billion annual budget and includes a flagship Big Ten institution, a world-renowned academic health sciences center, Division I athletics programs, and preeminent institutes focused on water and agriculture, national security and defense, infectious disease and early childhood education.

He is a nationally recognized higher education and health care leader and advocate. He was the chancellor of the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) and board chair for the Nebraska Medicine Health System from 2014 to 2024. As UNMC's chief operating officer, Dr. Gold was responsible for all aspects of campus leadership, program quality and operation—including 7 colleges, 37 institutes and centers, 5,429 faculty and staff and 4,700 health professions students.

In July 2021, Dr. Gold was named the Provost and Executive Vice President of the University of Nebraska System in addition to his ongoing UNMC/Nebraska Medicine responsibilities. In this role, he served as the chief academic officer of the University of Nebraska System and liaison to the Board of Regents for academic affairs. From May 2017 through June 2021, Dr. Gold served as the chancellor of the University of Nebraska

Jeffrey P. Gold, M.D., became the ninth president of the University of Nebraska System on July 1, 2024, following a national search by the Board of Regents.

at Omaha, the state's only public metropolitan university—a role he held concurrently with being UNMC's chancellor.

He holds tenured faculty appointments in UNMC's College of Medicine and in the College of Public Health, where his research interests in health care policy, population health and epidemiology are concentrated. He has authored over 200 peer-reviewed manuscripts, 350 national presentations, 40 books and chapters and engaged in over 300 invited professorships and keynote presentations.

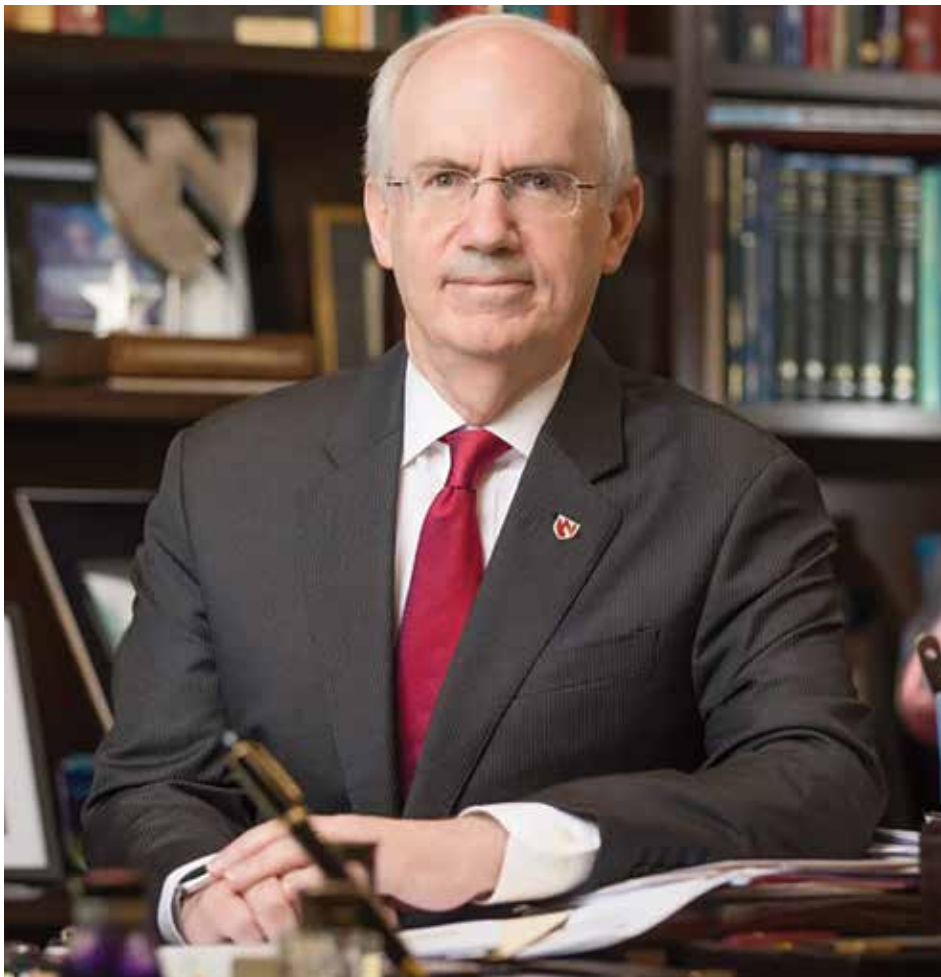
Dr. Gold is a first-generation student; he graduated from the Cornell University College of Engineering with a bachelor's degree in Theoretical and Applied Mechanics. He earned his M.D. from the Weill Cornell College of Medicine and completed his general surgery residency at The New York–Presbyterian Hospital and Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center. He completed his cardiothoracic surgical fellowship training at the Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, with additional training in pediatric cardiac surgery at the Boston Children's Hospital, both of the Harvard Medical School.

He has been certified by the American Board of Surgery and by the American Board of Thoracic Surgery, specializing in adult and pediatric cardiac surgery. Dr. Gold is licensed in Nebraska, Ohio, New York and New Jersey.

Dr. Gold leads several key economic development boards for the State and the University System, including the Greater Omaha Chamber, University Tech Development Corp, the University Tech Transfer Corp, and UNeTech Corp.

His national leadership roles have included more than 50 national professional committees and more than 100 national organizations, volunteer boards, government and public health councils. He has worked extensively with national- and state-level elected and appointed governing and administrative bodies as an advisor and trusted resource in the areas of higher education, research and clinical care.

Dr. Gold has been married for more than forty years to a medical school classmate. He has two adult children and two grandchildren.





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BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten Conference is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders. Even in its infancy, the conference established itself as the preeminent collection of institutions in the nation, where the pursuit of academic excellence prevailed as the definitive goal.

The history of the Big Ten traces back more than 125 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago where, on Jan. 11, 1895, Purdue President James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Northwestern and Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bona fide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On Feb. 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the fundamentals of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905.

Indiana and the State University of Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State joined the conference, bringing the membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, a name that was eventually incorporated in 1987.

As the 1900s dawned, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were conducted at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women. Big Ten schools compete in a total of 42 different sports, furthering the conference's commitment to broad-based programming and providing more participation opportunities than any conference in the country.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations. But Michigan's appearance in 1902 cultivated a relationship that has endured for more than a century.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915, the first award to demonstrate support for the educational emphasis placed on intercollegiate athletics. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to one male and one female student of the graduating class who have attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a Big Ten student-athlete can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of seven men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971, Jim Delany in 1989, Kevin Warren in 2020, and current commissioner Tony Petitti in 2023.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produce over \$10 billion in funded research, doubling any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of the pioneering technology, where it approved country-wide testing in 2005. In 2006, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

In 2006, Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with FOX Networks to create the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 2,200 live events across all platforms each year. The 24/7 network is the ultimate destination for Big Ten fans and alumni across the country and around the world, allowing them to see their favorite teams, regardless of where they live.

On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011.

The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from Maryland and Rutgers on Nov. 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams.

In recent years the Big Ten has worked to meet the educational needs of modern student-athletes to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. In May of 2020, the conference announced the formation of the Big Ten Mental Health and Wellness Cabinet, featuring representation from all 14 member institutions, as well as sport affiliate members. The goal of the cabinet is to promote optimal mental health for Big Ten student-athletes through a comprehensive, systemic and interdisciplinary approach to establishing mental health programs, while also providing counsel, advice and expertise to the conference office.

In June of 2020 the conference launched the Big Ten Equality Coalition. This group, which features student-athletes, coaches, athletic directors, chancellors, presidents and other members of the Big Ten family from all 14 member institutions, has a stated goal of seeking tangible ways to actively and constructively combat racism and hate around the world, while also empowering student-athletes to express their rights to free speech and peaceful protest. One product of conversations emerging from the coalition was the creation of the Big Ten Voter Registration Initiative. This non-partisan, conference-wide collaboration encourages student-athletes to take part in the electoral process and is led by a Voter Registration Committee that includes representatives from all 14 Big Ten institutions. The Voter Registration Committee has partnered with the National Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law to develop educational programming and outreach tools, and to collaborate with other established civic platforms.

On June 30, 2022, the Big Ten Conference furthered its legacy of transformation when the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) voted unanimously to admit UCLA and USC to the conference effective Aug. 2, 2024. Competition will begin for all conference sports in the 2024-25 academic year.

In July of 2022, the Big Ten traveled a delegation of student-athletes and administrators from its member institutions to Selma and Montgomery, Alabama, for an immersive experience entitled: "Big Life Series: Selma to Montgomery." The pilgrimage to one of the key centers of the civil rights movement was highlighted by a march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, which is the site of the 1965 Bloody Sunday attack. The delegation also visited the Montgomery Interpretive Center on the campus of Alabama State University to learn more about the profound impact that students had on the civil rights movement, and the significance of the Knight vs. Alabama landmark trial which ended the segregation of funding in higher education across the State of Alabama.

In April of 2023, the Big Ten announced that Petitti was selected as the conference's seventh commissioner. With nearly four decades of sports, business and media industry acumen, he served as deputy commissioner and chief operating officer of Major League Baseball and president and chief executive officer of MLB Network. A 14-time National Sports Emmy Award winner, Petitti also held senior executive roles at CBS Sports and ABC Sports overseeing rights acquisition deals for a variety of sports leagues and collegiate and professional sports events, including the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, regular season men's basketball, college football, NFL, PGA Tour, the Masters, U.S. Open Tennis Championships, and the Little League World Series, as well as leading in the creation of the Bowl Championship Series to determine college football's national champion.

On Aug. 4, 2023, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors voted unanimously to admit the University of Oregon and the University of Washington to the conference effective Aug. 2, 2024, with competition to begin in all sports for the 2024-25 academic year. With the schools' admission, Oregon and Washington would also join the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), a consortium of world-class research institutions dedicated to advancing their academic missions.

More than 125 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.

HUSKERS BREAK SEVEN RECORDS DURING 2023-24



Gena Jorgenson captured first-team All-America honors by racing to an eighth-place finish in the 1,650 freestyle in a school-record 15:55.71 at the 2024 NCAA Championships.

Nebraska produced a first-team NCAA All-American for the first time in 23 years and swam to a top-30 team finish at the NCAA Championships to highlight an impressive 2023-24 season.

Gena Jorgenson headlined the year with a monumental season for the Huskers. The sophomore from Aberdeen, S.D., broke four school records and qualified for three events at the NCAA Championships in Athens, Ga. Jorgenson raced to a school-record time of 15:55.71 in the 1,650 freestyle at nationals to capture an eighth-place finish and claim first-team All-America honors. She became the first Husker swimmer to earn the honor since 2001.

Jorgenson posted a career-best time of 4:41.03 in the 500 freestyle and another career-best time of 4:11.51 in the 400 IM to shatter two more school records at the NCAA Championships. She holds six school records for the Huskers.

At the Hawkeye Invitational, Jorgenson posted a time of 4:43.87 in the 500 freestyle final for a

victory and later added her second title of the meet in the 1,650 freestyle (16:15.82).

At the Big Ten Championships, Jorgenson placed 10th in the 500 freestyle (4:41.19) and fifth in the 1,650 freestyle (16:01.72). She was a key contributor for the Huskers both individually and in relay events, helping Nebraska's 800 freestyle relay to an eighth-place finish at the Big Ten Championships with the third-fastest time in school history (7:11.31).

Kelsey Clairmont joined Jorgenson at the NCAA Championships for the second straight year, capping a stellar sophomore campaign of her own. Clairmont finished 20th on the platform at nationals with a score of 242.70.

At the Zone D Diving Championships in Houston, Texas, Clairmont placed eighth with a score of 502.75 in the platform finals to punch her ticket to the NCAA Championships. She amassed 18 zone-qualifying scores throughout the season and added 15 top-five finishes.

She set a career best on the one meter in a dual with Kansas, where she posted a zone-qualifying 284.03 en route to a third-place finish. The next weekend against Iowa, Clairmont added a career best on three meter with a 339.20 to earn another zone-qualifying score while winning an individual title. At the Mizzou Invite, Clairmont earned a score of 233.80 in the platform prelims and went on to win the event with a score of 250.85. She added ninth-place finishes on the one- and three-meter boards.

As a team, the Huskers finished eighth at the Big Ten Championships before earning 11 team points to take 30th at the NCAA Championships to close the 2023-24 season.

Jorgenson and junior JoJo Randby went on to represent the Huskers at the U.S. Olympic Team Trials in June. Jorgenson continued to set records in Indianapolis, posting career-best times in the 400, 800 and 1,500-meter freestyles. She shattered the Nebraska record by eight seconds in the 800-meter free (8:36.72) to finish 11th, before smashing her own school record in the 1,500 (16:30.67) to take 12th at the trials.

Randby added a 1:10.38 in the 100-meter breaststroke to finish third in her heat and 39th overall. During the season, Randby picked up six NCAA B Standards and captured 15 top-three finishes on the year. After breaking the 100 breaststroke school record during the 2022-23 season (1:00.07), Randby totaled five first-place finishes in the event as a junior.

At the Hawkeye Invitational, Randby qualified for the 100 breaststroke finals with a time of 1:00.63 in the prelims. She swam to victory in 1:00.54 with an NCAA B cut. At the Big Ten Championships, Randby qualified for the 100 breaststroke B final with a time of 1:01.40. She clocked a 1:01.65 in the final to finish 13th. She also helped the Husker 200 medley relay to the second-fastest time in school history (1:39.42), and contributed to the third-fastest 400 medley relay time (3:37.60) in the Husker record book at the conference championships.

Sarah Barton, Caitlin Cairns, Gabby Donahue, Lexi Kucera and Emily Haimes led the Huskers in and out of the pool during their senior seasons. Barton logged career bests in three events, while adding nine first-place finishes and 24 top-three finishes. At the Hawkeye Invitational, Barton took first in the 200 backstroke, swimming a career-best 1:57.28 in the final. Barton also picked up a runner-up finish in the 200 IM (2:02.07), a third-place finish in the 200 butterfly (2:00.98) and a fourth-place finish in the 400 IM (4:17.40). At the Big Ten Championships, Barton swam a 1:58.41 to finish 17th in the 200 butterfly and took 21st in the 200 IM (2:00.23).

Cairns set career bests in four events and claimed 15 top-five finishes during the season. In a dual with Iowa, Cairns picked up a pair of top-three finishes. She swam in two relays for the Huskers at the Big Ten Championships. In the 200 medley relay, Cairns helped the Big Red to the second-fastest time in school history (1:39.42). Along with Cairns, Haimes served as a team captain and was a significant contributor to Nebraska's success in the relay events. Haimes

was a part of eight winning relays and was a key in the Huskers swimming the second-fastest 200 medley relay time in school history at the Big Ten Championships. She helped the group to an eighth-place finish with a time of 1:39.42. At the Hawkeye Invitational, Haimes competed in the finals of four individual events. She had her best finish of the meet in the 50 freestyle, posting a season-best 23.29 to place sixth.

Kucera had strong performances in the freestyle and butterfly events, while contributing to numerous relay victories. She swam in the 100 and 200 butterfly finals at the Big Ten Championships, taking 22nd and 23rd, respectively. Kucera was a key contributor to an eighth-place 800 freestyle relay finish at the Big Ten Championships. She helped the Huskers to a 7:11.31, the No. 3 time on Nebraska's all-time list.

Donahue tallied two career bests on the year and swam a season-best 100 backstroke time at the Big Ten Championships with a 56.79. She finished second in the 100 freestyle against South Dakota State and added two third-place finishes in the 100 backstroke against Kansas and Rutgers.

Maia Hall excelled in the 100 and 200 breaststroke events for the Huskers. The junior from Whitby, England hit the NCAA B Standard four times in the 100 breaststroke and eight times in the 200.

At the Big Ten Championships, Hall clocked a time of 1:01.11 in the 100 breaststroke to earn a spot in the A final. She finished fifth overall and climbed to No. 2 on NU's all-time list with a career-best 1:00.16. Hall also claimed a fifth-place finish in the 200 breaststroke, finishing in 2:10.90.

She went on to clock a career-best 2:09.87 in the event during a time trial at the Mizzou Last Chance Meet, which ranks as the second-fastest time in Nebraska history. Hall qualified for the A final in the 100 breaststroke at the Hawkeye Invite, racing to a runner-up finish. Hall also punched her ticket to the A final of the 200 breaststroke where she finished second in the finals with a time of 2:13.18. Hall finished the season with 15 top-three finishes, including six first-place finishes.

Sydney McCracken highlighted her junior season by qualifying for the C final in two events at the Big Ten Championships. She posted a season-best time in the 100 breaststroke prelims to punch her ticket to the C final (1:02.85), where she finished 23rd with a time of 1:03.11. She also qualified for the 200 breaststroke C final and went on to finish 24th overall (2:17.05). At the Hawkeye Invite, McCracken picked up a fifth-place finish in the 100 breaststroke (1:03.07) and a sixth-place finish in the 200 breast (2:19.13). She also set a career best in the 400 IM with her 13th-place finish in a time of 4:25.57.

Giulia Marchi placed second in the 200 freestyle final at the Hawkeye Invitational, swimming a career-best time of 1:49.06. She earned her second career-best time of the meet with her 17th-place finish in the 500 freestyle (4:58.77) and added a sixth-place finish in the 100 freestyle (50.99). A consistent relay member, Marchi helped the 800 freestyle relay team to an eighth-place finish at conference.

Beatrix Tanko led the freshmen, breaking the 100 butterfly school record with a 53.16 at the Big Ten Championships to take 10th. She earned 14 top-three finishes and six titles on the season,

while contributing to 10 winning relays, including four against Rutgers. Tanko also helped three relay teams at the Big Ten Championships move to second and third all-time for NU.

Amelia Riggott clocked a 1:02.45 in the 100 breaststroke final to place 21st. She added season bests in the 50 freestyle prelims (24.20) and the 200 breaststroke prelims (2:21.51) at the conference meet. At the Hawkeye Invite, she placed fifth overall in the 100 breaststroke with a time of 1:03.07 and added a 20th-place finish in the 200 breaststroke (2:23.70). Anastasia Tichy qualified for the 200 butterfly B final, placing 15th with a time of 1:59.85. She added a 24th-place finish in the 100 butterfly C final (54.38). She closed the season with nine top-three finishes, including four titles. Anna Vlachou swam in the 100 butterfly C final at the Big Ten Championships, placing 21st. Vlachou logged her career-best time in the event in a time trial at the Mizzou Last Chance Meet (53.90). She was also a consistent contributor to NU's relay success and was a part of four winning relays. She helped the 400 medley relay to an eighth-place finish at the Big Ten Championships. The group finished in 3:37.60 for the third-fastest time in NU history. Caterina Bisiacchi was a key contributor to freestyle and butterfly events in her first season as a Husker. She totaled 24 top-five finishes, including 13 top-three showings. At the mid-season Hawkeye Invitational, Bisiacchi earned a third-place finish in the 1,650 freestyle (16:43.29). She set a career best in the event at the Big Ten Championships with a 20th-place finish (16:37.28).

Behind Clairmont's NCAA Championship run, NU divers added depth during the 2023-24 season. Abby Baxter scored at the Big Ten Championships and earned a spot in the NCAA Zone D Championships final during her freshman campaign. With a 295.70, Baxter was in seventh after the prelims at zones. She finished 12th on the one meter at the conference meet with a 263.05. Adding to her list of top finishes, Baxter picked up two top-five finishes at the Mizzou Invite, logged two titles against Iowa State and two more victories against Illinois.

Antonina Harned competed on one meter and three meter at the NCAA Zone D Championships, finishing 38th on the one meter and 23rd on the three meter. She completed her freshman season with 13 zone-qualifying scores and 10 top-three finishes. Harned brought in three-meter titles against South Dakota State and Kansas.

Ellee Delcamp set a pair of career bests, while earning two zone-qualifying scores on three meter during her sophomore season. Frankie Webb hit her three-meter career best at the Illinois dual, where she posted a zone-qualifying score of 295.73 for a runner-up finish. At the NCAA Zone D Championships, Webb finished 42nd (244.80).

Madison Lloyd and Jordyn Schmucker both began the season as contributors for the Huskers, but battled injuries during the second half of the season. Lloyd totaled five top-five finishes during the first half and Schmucker posted season bests at the South Dakota State dual with a 253.43 on the one meter and 268.20 on the three meter.

Jenna Brown redshirted her first season and will look to return to NU's butterfly and freestyle groups in 2024-25.

NEBRASKA'S ALL-AMERICANS

A total of 64 student-athletes from around the world have earned swimming and diving NCAA All-America honors as Huskers. The 64 Husker All-Americans have come to Nebraska from nine countries, including Americans from 18 states.

In all, Huskers have combined for 254 All-America awards, while 32 Huskers have been multi-time All-Americans.

Julia Russell owns the distinction of earning the most All-America certificates as a Husker swimmer with 18 awards from 1994 to 1997. Russell is one of seven Huskers to earn 10 or more All-America awards, including NCAA Champion Penny Heyns (15), Melanie Dodd (15), Helene Muller (15), Therese Alshammar (13), Dana Powers (10) and Shandra Johnson (10).

Alshammar, who captured her 13 All-America awards in just two seasons at Nebraska, went on to become the first female swimmer in history to appear in six Olympic Games, including the 2016 Rio Olympics for her native Sweden.

ABI KNAPTON
2021

Abi Knapton was the first Husker women's swimmer or diver to capture All-America honors in both competition and in the classroom. A six-time All-American, Knapton claimed first-team CSC Academic All-America accolades in the at-large category in 2021. She posted a 3.93 GPA as a psychology major over her five-year career and was a four-time first-time All-American on platform. She was the first Husker swimmer or diver to earn first-team All-America honors four times in the same event.

As a senior in 2021, Knapton was named the Big Ten Diver of the Meet after winning conference titles in both the platform and the one meter. She added first-team All-America honors on the platform and three-meter events at the 2021 NCAA Championships, before becoming the only female diver to finish in the top eight in both platform and three meter at the U.S. Diving Team Olympic Trials in Indianapolis. Knapton was also the 2021 Big Ten runner-up on three meter and an honorable-mention All-American in the event in 2019.

Knapton was voted Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year and Nebraska's Best Female Athlete across all sports in 2021. She was also an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipient following her Nebraska graduation in May 2021.

The Omaha Marian High School grad was a four-time CSCAA Scholastic All-American (2017, 2018, 2019, 2021), a four-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and a four-time Academic All-Big Ten selection (2018, 2019, 2020, 2021). She was a 10-time Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll selection and a five-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.



LINDSAY HELFERICH
2019

Lindsay Helferich etched her name in Husker history by becoming Nebraska's third swimming and diving CSC Academic All-American in 2019. Helferich claimed second-team honors in the at-large category following her senior season by posting a perfect 4.0 GPA during her career.

Helferich, a freestyle and backstroke specialist, was one of nine Huskers to be named a Nebraska Outstanding Scholar. She added a 1A FAR Academic Excellence Award and was recognized for the third time as a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar.

She also excelled in competition, finishing 26th in the 50-yard freestyle at the 2019 Big Ten Championships. Helferich posted her top career Big Ten finish by taking 21st in the 100 backstroke in 2018, while adding 27th-place showings in the 50 and 100 freestyles the same year. As a freshman in 2016, she took 24th in the 200 back at the conference meet.

Before coming to Nebraska, Helferich was a top-16 finalist in the 200 back and a top-24 finalist in the 200 free at the Southern Zone Sectional Championships. She was also the valedictorian of her class at Odessa High School in Texas.

She earned her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in May of 2019 as a civil engineering major. She was a three-time academic All-Big Ten choice and earned eight spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. She was also a four-time Tom Osborne Citizenship Team member.



KAITLIN ARNTZ
2010

Kaitlin Arntz earned third-team CSC Academic All-America honors in the at-large category following her senior season for the Huskers in 2010.

Arntz was one of Nebraska's top breaststroke and individual medley swimmers during her time in Lincoln. She capped her outstanding career by becoming the first CSC Academic All-America women's swimmer in school history.

Arntz capped her competitive career with a fourth-place finish in the 200-yard breaststroke at the 2010 Big 12 Championships. She added a fourth-place performance in the 100 breast and a sixth-place showing in the 200 IM.

She finished fifth in the 200-yard breaststroke and 11th in the 200 IM at the 2009 Big 12 Championships. She was Nebraska's team MVP as a junior.

As both a freshman and sophomore, Arntz finished eighth in the 200 breast and 10th in the 100 breast at the Big 12 Championships.

Arntz joined the Huskers after a stellar high school career at Millard West in Omaha. She was a 16-time All-American at Millard West and a five-Nebraska state champion. She closed her high school career holding seven school records.

An advertising major at Nebraska, Arntz was nominated with a 3.94 cumulative GPA. She also earned first-team CSC All-District VII honors. An honorable-mention CSCAA Scholar-All-America selection in 2010, Arntz was also a three-time academic All-Big 12 Conference selection for the Big Red from 2008 to 2010.



COURTNEY JENSEN
2000

Courtney Jensen capped an outstanding academic and athletic career as a first-team CSC Academic All-America selection in the at-large category as a senior in 2000.

Jensen, a Husker co-captain and four-year letterwinner from Sheridan, Wyo., was a leader for Nebraska in the diving well throughout her career.

As a senior, Jensen produced a career-best 11th-place finish on the three-meter board at the 2000 Big 12 Conference Championships. She added a 17th-place performance in the one-meter dive.

As a junior, Jensen took 13th on the three-meter board at the 1999 Big 12 Championships, while adding a 23rd-place finish in the one-meter event.

Those performances followed a sophomore season in which she placed 21st on the three-meter and 22nd on the one-meter at the 1998 Big 12 Championships.

She opened her Husker career with 13th-place finishes on both the one- and three-meter boards as a freshman at the 1997 Big 12 meet.

A high school All-American both in competition and in the classroom, Jensen was a two-time Wyoming state champion at Sheridan High School.

An elementary education major at Nebraska, Jensen was nominated for the CSC Academic All-America At-Large team with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average. She claimed first-team CSC All-District VII honors to advance to the national ballot and become Nebraska's first female swimming and diving CSC Academic All-American.

HUSKER OLYMPIANS



THERESE ALSHAMMAR (SWEDEN)
1996, 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012, 2016

The first six-time female Olympic swimmer in history, Therese Alshammar lettered for the Huskers in 1998 and 1999. Considered one of the top female freestyle sprinters in the world, Alshammar set two records at the 2000 European Short Course Championships. Alshammar took home three medals from the Sydney Olympics, a pair of silvers and a bronze.



ANJA MARGETIC (BOSNIA)
1992

Anja Margetic was a member of the Bosnian team for the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona. Margetic finished 27th in the 200-meter butterfly and 44th in the 100-meter butterfly. Margetic earned All-America honors at Nebraska in 1994 as a member of the 400-yard medley relay that notched a 13th-place finish at the NCAA Championships.



ELVIRA FISCHER (AUSTRIA)
1996, 2000

A two-time Olympian, Fischer was a three-time All-American while at Nebraska. Fischer's top finish at the 1996 Olympics was 23rd in the 200-meter breaststroke (2:33.87). At the Sydney Olympics in 2000, Fischer's top performance was in the 100-meter breaststroke, where she touched the wall in 1:11.58, placing 24th overall, and winning her heat.



TERRIE MILLER (NORWAY)
1996

A standout breastroker from 1997 to 1999, Terrie Miller earned All-America honors in each of her three seasons competing for Nebraska. As a freshman, she placed eighth in the 100-yard breaststroke at the NCAA Championships. She earned All-America honors competing on NU's medley relays in both 1998 and 1999. At the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, she placed 20th in the 100-meter breaststroke.



PENNY HEYNS (SOUTH AFRICA)
1992, 1996, 2000

A three-time Olympian, Penny Heyns became the most successful Olympian for South Africa and Nebraska at the same time. A Husker senior in 1996, Heyns' successful year culminated with two Olympic gold medals. For more on Heyns, please see page 100.



HELENE MULLER (SOUTH AFRICA)
1996, 2000

Former Husker All-American Helene Muller swam for her native South Africa during the 1996 and 2000 Olympic Games. Muller lettered from 1997 to 2000, garnering All-America honors for the Huskers 13 times, including a bronze medal in the 200-meter freestyle at the 2000 NCAA Championships.



EMMA JOHNSON (AUSTRALIA)
1996

Emma Johnson competed for the Huskers during the 1998-99 season, earning All-America honors in the 400-yard IM at the 1999 NCAA Championships. She established the Nebraska record in the 400-yard IM at the 1998 Texas Invitational. Johnson finished fifth in the 400-meter IM at the 1996 Olympics, while also earning a bronze medal swimming on the Aussie's third-place 800-meter freestyle relay team.



BEATRIZ PADRON (COSTA RICA)
2020

Beatriz Padron earned an Olympic berth as the lone women's swimmer for Costa Rica at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics in the summer of 2021. Padron competed in the 200-meter freestyle, finishing 25th overall with a lifetime-best 2:04.56 in the preliminary heats. A Costa Rican National Team member since 2015, Padron competed in Tokyo before arriving at Nebraska as a freshman.



WENDY LUCERO (UNITED STATES)
1988

Wendy Lucero competed for Nebraska from 1981 to 1983. Lucero's freshman season was highlighted by a runner-up finish in three-meter diving and a fourth-place finish on the one meter at the 1982 Big Eight Championships. Later that season, Lucero placed eighth at U.S. Nationals. A native of Denver, Colo., Lucero competed for the United States at the 1988 Olympics.



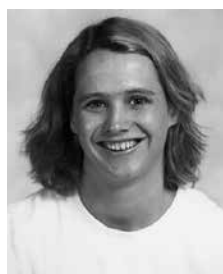
JULIA RUSSELL (SOUTH AFRICA)
1996

Julia Russell took 12th in the 200-meter breaststroke in Atlanta in a career-best time of 2:30.38. She also finished 17th in the 100-meter breast and 26th in the 200 IM. In 1997, the 18-time All-American was the NCAA runner-up in the 200-yard breaststroke and the Big 12 Swimmer of the Year. She won three events at the 1997 Big 12 Championships, while finishing with 108 points at the NCAA Championships.



LENKA MANHALOVA (CZECH REPUBLIC)
1992, 1996

Lenka Manhalova finished 11th in the 200-meter breaststroke and 29th in the 100-meter breaststroke at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta. A Czech National Team member, Manhalova was a two-time All-American at Nebraska, including a fifth-place 200-yard breaststroke finish at the 1997 NCAA Championships. Manhalova was also the 1998 Big 12 200-yard breaststroke champion.



ANNA WINDSOR (AUSTRALIA)
1996, 2000

Anna Windsor competed for NU during the 1997 and 1998 seasons. A two-time NCAA finalist in the 200-yard freestyle, Windsor placed seventh in the event in 1997. She swam on NU's runner-up 800 freestyle relay at the 1998 NCAA Championships. A nine-time All-American, Windsor swam for Australia's eighth-place 400-meter free relay team at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta. She also competed at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

NEBRASKA'S GOLDEN PENNY



PENNY HEYNS
Amanzimtoti, South Africa
Olympic Gold & Bronze Medalist
World Record Holder

It's not every day you run across a golden penny.

But for South Africans and Nebraskans alike, there was one shining bright at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta.

Penny Heyns, a former University of Nebraska standout, earned two gold medals and became the first female in Olympic history to sweep the breaststroke events.

Heyns' whirlwind year of success began on the collegiate level. In Husker suit and cap at the 1996 Big Eight Championships in mid-February, Heyns set a then-NCAA and U.S. Open record in the 200-yard breaststroke (2:08.90), as well as an NU record in the 100-yard event (1:00.18) to help Nebraska win its third consecutive conference crown.

After setting the records, Heyns was forced to travel home for the South African Olympic Trials, which were inconveniently scheduled between the two most important collegiate meets, the conference and national championships.

Nevertheless, it proved to be a trip Heyns would never forget.

During the preliminary heat of the 100-meter breaststroke at the trials, Heyns set a world record with a time of 1:07.46.

The time broke the record held by Australia's Samantha Riley, who had set a mark of 1:07.69 in September, 1994.

Just days after her return from South Africa, Heyns became the first Husker to win a national championship at the NCAA Championships in Ann Arbor, Mich.

Heyns dominated the 100-yard breaststroke with a pool-record 1:00.27 and also earned a silver medal in the 200-yard breaststroke with a 2:09.71 performance.

Heyns then entered the Olympics as the frontrunner in the 100-meter breaststroke event. She proved she had earned that title in the preliminaries, as she blew away the competition and shattered her own world record in a clocking of 1:07.02 in the process.

In the finals, Heyns got off to a quick start, but didn't dominate as she had in the prelims. America's Amanda Beard began her trademark kick at the 50-meter mark and almost caught Heyns at the wall. Heyns held on to finish in 1:07.72 and edged Beard (1:08.09), to claim gold for the first time.

Two days later, Heyns proved she wasn't finished.

After setting an Olympic record of 2:26.63 in the preliminaries of the 200-meter breaststroke, Heyns was timed at 2:25.41 in the finals and again beat out Beard (2:25.75) for the gold. Beard entered the Olympics ranked No. 1 in the 200, but couldn't catch up with the quick pace Heyns set from the start.

"That was one of the hardest races I ever swam," Heyns said following the race. "I'm just glad I had the guts to hang in there."

At a press conference in Lincoln, Neb., the week following her gold medal performances, Heyns admitted she was surprised about the win in the 200.

"In some ways, I sit back, and I really can't believe it," Heyns said. "The 200 (win) was totally unexpected. I don't think it has sunk in yet."

An extremely successful career at Nebraska fine-tuned Heyns for Olympic success. A 15-time All-American and 14-time conference champion for the Huskers, Heyns left Nebraska as the most decorated swimmer in the program's history. Heyns' accomplishments at Nebraska and on the international level will always be recognized.

Heyns has continually showed her appreciation for the University of Nebraska and its athletic department.

Following her double gold medal performance, Heyns didn't waste any

time in thanking the Nebraska Swimming and Diving Program and its support staff for the role they played in her Olympic success.

"There is no way I would even be swimming today if I didn't come to Nebraska," Heyns said. "Nebraska has done so much for me that I could never express it. It's not just swimming, it's a family to me -- the whole coaching staff and all my friends."

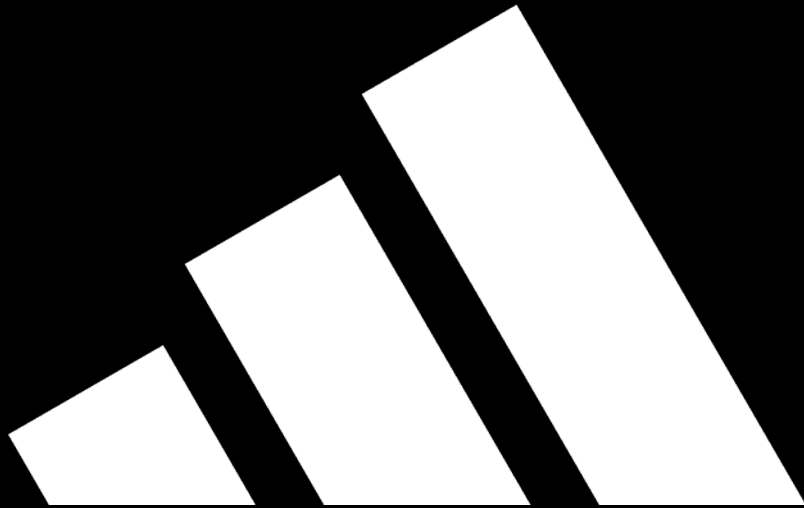
For the next four years Heyns continued to define excellence in the sport of swimming on a world-class level by producing one of the greatest performances in the history of the sport.

At the 1999 Pan Pacific Championships, Heyns established three world records. Winning gold in both the 100- and 200-meter breaststrokes, Heyns touched the wall in 1:06.52 and 2:23.64, respectively, both world bests. In addition, she swam an exhibition 50-meter breaststroke, posting another world record with a time of 30.83.

Heyns took home her third medal at the 2000 Sydney Olympics by earning a bronze medal in the 100-meter breaststroke in a time of 1:07.55.
