Nebraska kicks off its season Thursday night against Cincinnati in the Battle Sports Kansas City Classic at GEHA Field at Arrowhead Stadium. Kickoff is set for 8 p.m., and the game will be televised by ESPN.

Nebraska is coming off a 7-6 record in Matt Rhule's second season in 2024. Rhule guided the Huskers to the program's first winning record in eight years, which culminated with Nebraska's first bowl win in nine seasons. The Huskers improved by two wins from the 2023 to 2024 season, continuing a trend that has seen Rhule-coached teams either match or improve their previous season's win total every year of his college coaching career. Five of Nebraska's six losses in 2024 were one-score defeats, but the Huskers also showed improvement in winning close games as two of their final three victories were one-score wins.

Nebraska returns a total of 10 starters from last year's team. The Husker offensive line features seven players who have started at least nine career games. Dylan Raiola is back for his second year as Nebraska's starting quarterback after he ranked 13th nationally in completion percentage in 2024 (67.1) and set the NU freshman passing record (2,819). Jacory Barney Jr. returns after he had a Nebraska freshman-record 55 receptions in 2024, and he will be aided by the addition of Dane Key, who caught 126 passes for 1,870 yards and 14 touchdowns over three seasons at Kentucky. In the backfield, Emmett Johnson returns after he led Nebraska with 908 all-purpose yards and 884 yards from scrimmage in 2024.

Defensively, the Huskers return four starters in the secondary who have combined for 97 career starts. NU returns five other defenders who started at least one game in 2025. The defense is bolstered by the additions of several transfers, including linebacker Marques Watson-Trent, who was the 2024 Sun Belt Defensive Player of the Year and ranks second among all active FBS players with 365 career tackles.

Nebraska is one of only four teams that ranked in the top 20 nationally in rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense in both 2023 and 2024. The other members of that group are Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State.

Matt Rhule led his team to double-digit victories in his third season at each of his two previous college head coaching stops. Temple went 10-4 in his third season in 2015, while Baylor finished 11-3 in Rhule's third season in 2019.

Nebraska has an impressive history in season openers. The Huskers have won 98 of their 135 season openers, winning their first game 75 percent of the time while posting a 98-32-5 record.

## HUSKER HISTORY IN KANSAS CITY

Thursday will mark Nebraska's 11th all-time game in Kansas City and the third played at Arrowhead Stadium. The Huskers played in Kansas City eight times from 1893 to 1904 against Missouri (twice), KC Medics (four times), William Jewell and Haskell. The only two games played in Kansas City in the last 120 years are No. 2 Nebraska's 24-17 defeat of Oklahoma State in 1998, and the 19th-ranked Huskers' 2006 Big 12 Championship Game loss to No. 8 Oklahoma (21-7).

## HUSKER HISTORY IN THURSDAY GAMES

Nebraska has played on Thursday a total of 61 times, including the first game in program history - a 10-0 shutout of the Omaha YMCA on Nov. 27, 1890. Nebraska owns a 40-18-3 all-time record on Thursday, including a 38-16-3 mark in regular-season contests.

- Nebraska played on Thursday 45 times from 1890 to 1938. Since World War II, the Huskers have played only 16 Thursday games, including four bowl games.
- In the modern era, Nebraska is 9-3 in regular-season Thursday games. The Huskers had won seven straight regular-season Thursday matchups before losing the 2023 season opener at Minnesota, which is the Huskers' most recent Thursday contest.
- In the modern era, 14 of the 16 Thursday games have been played on the road or at a neutral site.

## HUSKERS POSSESS VETERAN OFFENSIVE LINE

The most experienced unit on the Nebraska team is the offensive line. Husker offensive linemen have combined to play in 227 career games with 123 career starts entering this season. Seven Husker offensive linemen have started at least nine games in their career, all at Power Four schools.

- According to research compiled by Clemson, Nebraska's 227 combined games played by offensive linemen ranks as the 10th-most in the country entering the 2025 season. Husker offensive linemen have combined for 123 career starts, a total that ranks 13th nationally.
- **Turner Corcoran** has started 35 games for the Huskers with 30 starts at left tackle, three starts at left guard and two starts at right tackle. Corcoran had started 30 consecutive games at one point before suffering season-ending injuries during both the 2023 and 2024 seasons.
- Notre Dame transfer **Rocco Spindler** played in 40 games with 23 starts at right guard in his Irish career. He has played in more games than any other Husker offensive lineman.
- **Justin Evans** has started 18 games at Nebraska, including 16 starts at left guard, one start at center and one start as a sixth offensive lineman.
- **Henry Lutovsky** has made 15 starts in his Husker career, all at right guard.
- **Teddy Prochazka** has started 11 games for Nebraska, including 10 at left tackle. Prochazka returns after missing the entire 2024 season due to injury.
- Alabama transfer **Elijah Pritchett** started 12 games with the Crimson Tide. He started 11 games at right tackle in 2024 and one at left tackle.
- **Gunnar Gottula** started nine games at left tackle as a redshirt freshman in 2024.

## RAIOLA READY FOR YEAR TWO AS STARTING QUARTERBACK

**Dylan Raiola** started all 13 games for Nebraska as a true freshman in 2024. He guided the Huskers to a 7-6 record while becoming the first true freshman quarterback in school history to win a bowl game.

- Raiola threw for 2,819 yards and 13 touchdowns in 2024 with a 67.1 completion percentage. His completion percentage and passing yardage were both NU freshman records. Overall, Raiola ranked third in school history in season completion percentage and seventh in passing yards.
- Nationally, Raiola ranked 13th in completion percentage among all FBS quarterbacks in 2024, and he led all FBS freshmen in completion percentage. Raiola also led all true freshmen and ranked third overall among all freshmen in passing yards.
- Raiola's 2,819 passing yards were the most by a true freshman Big Ten quarterback since 2013 and marked the second-best passing season by a Big Ten true freshman this century.

## TRANSFERS ADD EXPERIENCE & PRODUCTION TO HUSKER ROSTER

During the offseason, Nebraska added 36 newcomers to its roster. That number includes a freshman class of 21, but adding experience to the roster are 15 first-year transfers.

- Ten transfers came from FBS programs while five came from FCS schools. Of the 10 FBS transfers, eight came from Power Four programs: Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi State, Missouri, Notre Dame, Oklahoma and Purdue.
- **Marques Watson-Trent** spent five seasons at Georgia Southern before transferring to Nebraska. He has played in 49 career games with 37 starts, making Watson-Trent the most experienced player on the Husker roster in terms of starts and games played. The 2024 Sun Belt Conference Defensive Player of the Year, Watson-Trent ranks second among all active FBS players with 365 career tackles.

- **Dane Key** is the most experienced member of Nebraska's wide receiver room after he started 35 games at Kentucky the past three seasons. Key caught 126 passes for 1,870 yards and 14 touchdowns as a Wildcat. His production exceeds that of all other Nebraska wide receivers, who have combined for 109 catches, 1,112 receiving yards and six touchdowns in their careers.
- **Nyziah Hunter** adds further depth to the wide receiver position as he caught 40 passes for 578 yards and five touchdowns for Cal in 2024.
- Together, Key and Hunter enter the season with a combined 166 career receptions for 2,448 yards and 19 touchdowns. The other 11 receivers on Nebraska's roster have a combined 69 career receptions for 534 yards and one touchdown.
- **Rocco Spindler** and **Elijah Pritchett** join Nebraska's offensive line after each was a starter for a top-25 program. Spindler started 23 games over four seasons at Notre Dame, including 13 starts in 2024 when the Irish played in the national championship game. Pritchett started 11 games at Alabama in 2024 and played in 29 games over his three seasons with the Crimson Tide.
- **Dasan McCullough** joins Nebraska after playing in 12 games with four starts as a freshman at Indiana in 2022 and then appearing in 17 games with eight starts as an Oklahoma Sooner in 2023 and 2024. McCullough has 96 career tackles with 12.5 tackles for loss and 4.0 sacks.
- Nebraska added two FCS transfers to the secondary in **Jamir Conn** and **Andrew Marshall**. Conn played in 23 games with 11 starts over two seasons at Southern Illinois, registering 68 tackles with nine pass breakups and 4.5 TFLs. Marshall was a first-team All-Big Sky cornerback at Idaho in 2024. He started 14 games in two seasons with the Vandals, recording 72 tackles with eight pass breakups.
- On the defensive line, **Jaylen George** spent three seasons at East Tennessee State, starting 23 games and totaling 54 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss and 3.0 sacks.
- Nebraska also went to the FCS level to bolster its special teams units. **Kevin Gallic** joins the Big Red after handling the long-snapping duties for New Hampshire the past three seasons. Place-kicker **Kyle Cunanan** made 14-of-20 field goals over two seasons at Charlotte.

## MATT RHULE SET FOR THIRD SEASON

**Matt Rhule** is in his third season at Nebraska in 2025. He owns a 59-56 record in his nine seasons as a college head coach. He took on a rebuilding project in each of his three college stops and excluding his first year at each school, Rhule boasts a 51-28 record.

- Year three has proven to be a breakthrough year for Rhule. At both of his previous college stops (Temple and Baylor), Rhule led his team to the conference championship game in his third season.
- In his third season at Temple in 2016, the Owls went 10-4 and played for the American Athletic Conference championship.
- In his third season at Baylor in 2019, the Bears were 11-3 and played for the Big 12 title.
- In his second season at Nebraska in 2024, Rhule guided the Huskers to their first winning record in eight years and first bowl win in nine years.
- Rhule posted an 8-28 combined record in his first seasons at Temple, Baylor and Nebraska. In year two at those three schools, that record improved to 20-18. In his third season at Temple and Baylor, Rhule's teams posted a combined 21-7 record.
- Rhule has matched or improved his previous season's win total every year of his college coaching career. Temple went from two wins in his first season to six wins in his second season and 10 wins in both his third and fourth seasons. Baylor went from one win in Rhule's first season to seven wins in year two and 11 wins in year three. Rhule led Nebraska to a five-win season in 2023 and a seven-win campaign in 2024.

## HOLGORSSEN SET TO COORDINATE HUSKER OFFENSE

**Dana Holgorsen** is in his first full season as Nebraska's offensive coordinator in 2025 after he coordinated the offense and called the plays for the final four games last season.

- Holgorsen boasts full seasons of experience as an offensive coordinator at Texas Tech, Houston and Oklahoma State. In six seasons as a coordinator, Holgorsen's offenses have averaged 402.2 passing yards per game, 524.9 total yards per game and 40.7 points per game.
- The offenses Holgorsen has coordinated have an average national finish of second in passing, third in total offense and sixth in scoring. He was the coordinator for two of the top four passing seasons in FBS history (2007 at Texas Tech and 2009 at Houston).
- Quarterbacks have thrived in Holgorsen-coached offenses. Holgorsen coached the all-time FBS leader in touchdown passes and total offense (Houston's Case Keenum) along with the FBS season record holder in completions (Texas Tech's Graham Harrell).
- In addition to his experience as an offensive coordinator, Holgorsen has also been a successful head coach. He won 92 games in 13 seasons at West Virginia and Houston. Holgorsen is second in coaching victories at West Virginia and fifth at Houston.

## BUTLER TAKES OVER AS DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

**John Butler** is in his first season as Nebraska's defensive coordinator in 2025 after he served as the Huskers' defensive backs coach in his first year on staff in 2024.

- Butler served as Nebraska's defensive coordinator for the 2024 Pinstripe Bowl. NU limited Boston College to 15 points, allowing only one scoring drive longer than two yards.
- Butler helped Nebraska rank in the top 20 nationally in rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense in 2024. His defensive backs helped the Huskers to their most interceptions (11) in eight seasons.
- Butler, who was Penn State's defensive coordinator in 2013, boasts a decade of experience in the National Football League. In his 10 years in the NFL, he helped his teams win six division titles.
- Butler coached the Buffalo Bills defensive backs for five seasons from 2018 to 2023. In those five seasons, the Bills allowed the fewest passing yards in the NFL.
- Previously he spent four seasons coaching the secondary for the Houston Texans, and the Texans ranked in the top three in the NFL in pass defense twice in his four seasons.

## EKELER SET TO LEAD HUSKER SPECIAL TEAMS

**Mike Ekeler** is in his first season as Nebraska's special teams coordinator in 2025. Ekeler, who coached the Husker linebackers from 2008 to 2010, served as Tennessee's special teams coordinator from 2021 to 2024.

- Ekeler brings a wealth of experience to the Husker sideline, as he has coached in every power conference (ACC, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-12 and SEC) while serving on staffs at six of the 12 winning programs in college football history (Oklahoma, Nebraska, Georgia, Tennessee, USC and LSU).
- Tennessee led the nation in punt return yards and percentage of punts downed inside the opponent's 10-yard line over the course of Ekeler's four-year tenure.
- Ekeler's special teams units were routinely ranked in the top 25 during his time in Knoxville. In Ekeler's four seasons, Tennessee finished in the top 25 nationally in punt returns (2021, 2022, 2023, 2024), punt return defense (2021, 2022, 2023), net punting (2021, 2023), kickoff returns (2021), blocked punts (2021, 2023, 2024) and blocked kicks (2023).
- Ekeler has been a winner in his college coaching career. He has won 10 bowl games in his 20 years at a Power Four program. His teams have played for the national title three times, and he was a member of LSU's 2007 national championship team. In his first stint at Nebraska, Ekeler helped the Huskers to a pair of appearances in the Big 12 Championship Game in three seasons.

## NOTES FROM NEBRASKA'S 2024 SEASON

Nebraska finished with a 7-6 record under Matt Rhule in 2024. Five of the six losses came in one-possession games, including a four-point road loss at eventual national champion Ohio State.

- Nebraska posted the program's most wins (7) and first winning record in eight seasons.
- The Huskers made a bowl game for the first time in eight seasons and won a bowl game for the first time in nine seasons.
- Nebraska went undefeated (4-0) against non-conference opponents for the first time in 19 seasons (since the 2005 season).
- The Huskers ranked in the top 20 nationally in rushing defense, scoring defense and total defense.
- Nebraska held seven of its 13 opponents to 15 or fewer points.
- Offensively, NU had the third-most improved passing offense in the country from the 2023 to the 2024 season, passing for 1,338 more yards in 2024 compared to 2023.
- Quarterback **Dylan Raiola** set Nebraska freshman records for passing yards and completion percentage, while **Jacory Barney Jr.** had the most catches by a freshman in school history (55).

## HUSKERS REPRESENTED ON PRESEASON WATCH LISTS

Several Huskers were named to preseason watch lists. The offensive side of the ball was particularly well represented with five players earning preseason recognition.

- **Jacory Barney Jr.** was named to the Paul Hornung Award watch list, which is presented annually to the most versatile player in major college football. Barney led Nebraska with 55 catches in 2024, tying the Nebraska freshman receptions record, while totaling 447 receiving yards. He also led Nebraska in kickoff return yards and ranked second on the team in punt return yards, all-purpose yards and rushing touchdowns.
- **Emmett Johnson** was named to the Doak Walker Award watch list, an annual award presented to the nation's most outstanding college running back. Johnson led Nebraska with 884 scrimmage yards last season, including ranking second on the team with 598 rushing yards. He also caught 39 passes for 286 yards. Over the final four games of the season when Dana Holgorsen took over as offensive coordinator, Johnson averaged 121.0 scrimmage yards per game.
- **Dylan Raiola** was named to the Maxwell Award watch list, an award presented annually to the College Player of the Year, and was on the Polynesian Player of the Year watch list. Raiola was a semifinalist for the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year award in 2024, when he set Nebraska freshman records in passing yards (2,819) and completion percentage (67.1).
- **Teddy Prochazka** was named to the Allstate Wuerffel Trophy watch list and was a nominee for the Allstate Good Works team. The Wuerffel trophy honors student-athletes who are inspired to serve others and make positive impacts on society. The Good Works Team recognizes players for their commitment to community service and leadership beyond the gridiron. Prochazka is one of the most active Huskers in the community, as he participated in more than 45 community events during the 2024-25 academic year.
- **Dane Key**, a first-year transfer from Kentucky, was named to the 2026 Senior Bowl Top 300 list. Key caught 126 passes for 1,870 yards and 14 touchdowns as a Wildcat from 2022 to 2024.
- **Kevin Gallic**, a first-year transfer from FCS New Hampshire, was named to the watch list for the Patrick Mannelly Long Snapper Award, presented annually to the nation's top long snapper.

## SINGLE-DIGIT NUMBERS AWARDED THROUGH TEAM VOTE

For the third straight season, single-digit jersey numbers were awarded to the players who best represent what it means to be a Husker. The single-digit honorees were chosen through a players-only vote and the players then got to choose which single-digit number they wanted.

- The tradition of single-digit numbers being reserved for the chosen few dates back to Rhule's time at Temple.  
 "I got really tired of having a guy in my program who was there for three years, four years, really busted his tail and represented the program the right way, and he finally gets to be a senior and wants to wear a single digit, he's earned it...and invariably coaches give [a recruit] a single digit to get him to come there. It never felt right to me. It should be something earned. It's really just who do we want our players to say 'this is a guy who represents everything it means to be a Husker. He's tough, he's hard working, he's competitive'. It's not a popularity contest, it's an opportunity for our team to say these are the guys that embody everything it means to be a Husker."
- The 10 players listed below were selected by their teammates to be worthy of having a single-digit number this season. **Marques Buford Jr.**, **Malcolm Hartzog Jr.** and **DeShon Singleton** are wearing a single-digit number for the second straight season while the other seven players earned a single-digit for the first time.

## A LOOK AT NEBRASKA'S 2025 SCHEDULE

Nebraska will play three non-conference games and nine Big Ten contests in 2025. The Huskers face three Big Ten teams they also played in 2024 in UCLA, USC and Iowa. Nebraska went 0-3 against that group last November, and the Huskers will play all three again this November.

- In Big Ten Conference play, the Huskers will play Iowa, Maryland, Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Northwestern, Penn State, UCLA and USC. Nebraska will not play Illinois, Indiana, Ohio State, Oregon, Purdue, Rutgers, Washington or Wisconsin.
- Nebraska has three non-Saturday games this season, playing once on Thursday and twice on Friday. NU is one of seven Power Conference programs with three weekday games this season along with Cal, Houston, Minnesota, North Carolina, North Carolina State and Rutgers.
- The 2025 season begins on Thursday when the Huskers take on Cincinnati in Kansas City. Nebraska is opening its season away from home for the fifth time in six seasons.
- The Huskers then play four consecutive home games, hosting Akron (Sept. 6), Houston Christian (Sept. 13), Michigan (Sept. 20) and Michigan State (Oct. 4) at Memorial Stadium.
- After playing its first two Big Ten games at home, four of Nebraska's next six Big Ten games are on the road. NU travels to Maryland (Oct. 11) and Minnesota (Oct. 17) in a span of six days in October, before hosting Northwestern (Oct. 25) and USC (Nov. 1) in consecutive weeks. The Huskers then have back-to-back road games at UCLA (Nov. 8) and Penn State (Nov. 22) with a bye in between.
- Nebraska wraps up the regular season at home against Iowa the day after Thanksgiving (Nov. 28), the 36th straight year the Huskers will play on Black Friday.
- The Huskers will appear on multiple national television networks this season. Television designations are set for six of Nebraska's 12 games, and in those six games the Huskers will appear on the Big Ten Network, CBS, ESPN, FOX and FS1.

## NEBRASKA AMONG TOP ALL-TIME PROGRAMS

Nebraska is playing its 136th football season this fall, and the Huskers have historically been one of the top programs in college football history.

- NU ranks eighth in NCAA history with 924 wins and ninth with 54 all-time bowl game appearances.
- The Huskers have won five national titles. Nebraska's four Associated Press national championships (1970, 1971, 1994, 1995) rank seventh all-time and NU's four coaches poll titles (1971, 1994, 1995, 1997) rank fifth.
- Nebraska's 46 conference titles rank second in NCAA history.

## HUSKERS ALSO EXCEL IN THE CLASSROOM

In addition to being one of the winningest and most successful program in NCAA history, the Nebraska football program has also led the way in the classroom.

- Nebraska football has produced more Academic All-Americans (108) and more NCAA Impact Award (formerly Top Ten) winners (9) than any other team in any sport in NCAA history.
- Nebraska led the Big Ten with 73 Academic All-Big Ten selections for the 2024 season.
- Following the 2025 spring semester, the cumulative grade-point average for all members of the Nebraska football team was 3.304, the highest in recorded history.

## HOME OF THE HUSKERS



Memorial Stadium celebrated its 100th year in 2023. In the fall of 1922, a drive for \$430,000 in stadium construction funds was undertaken by faculty, students, alumni and friends of the University.

The stadium was named Memorial Stadium to honor all Nebraskans who served in the Civil and Spanish-American Wars; the 751 Nebraskans who died in World War I; the 3,839 in World War II; the 225 in Korea; the 422 in Vietnam; and those in Iraq.

Construction was completed in a few more than 90 working days and Memorial Stadium was dedicated on Oct. 20, 1923, at the Homecoming game in which Nebraska was held to a scoreless tie by Kansas.

The field at Memorial Stadium was named Tom Osborne Field - after the Huskers' legendary Hall-of-Fame coach - in 1998, one year after Osborne's retirement following 25 years and 255 victories as head coach.

## 2025 NEBRASKA SEASON NOTEBOOK

## SCHEDULE NOTES

- Nebraska's schedule consists of three non-conference games to open the season followed by nine Big Ten contests.
- In Big Ten Conference play, the Huskers will play Iowa, Maryland, Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Northwestern, Penn State, UCLA and USC. Nebraska will not play Illinois, Indiana, Ohio State, Oregon, Purdue, Rutgers, Washington or Wisconsin.
- Nebraska plays on three different days of the week: Thursday, Friday and Saturday.
- Nebraska plays three non-Saturday games, playing once on Thursday and twice on Friday. The Huskers are one of seven teams from a power conference who play three weekday games in 2025 (also Cal, Houston, Minnesota, North Carolina, North Carolina State and Rutgers).
- After beginning conference play with consecutive home games, Nebraska will play four Big Ten road games in a span of six games. That includes back-to-back road games at Maryland and Minnesota just six days apart in October.

## COACHING STAFF NOTES

- Matt Rhule** is in his third season at Nebraska in 2025. Rhule is in his 13th season as a head coach after previously leading programs at Temple (2013-16) and Baylor (2017-19) along with an NFL stint as head coach of the Carolina Panthers (2020-22).
- Rhule owns a career record of 59-56 in his first nine seasons as a college head coach. He has a proven record as a program builder after taking on rebuilding projects at Temple, Baylor and Nebraska. Excluding his first season at each school, that record improves to 51-28.
- Rhule's college teams have taken a major step forward in his third season at each school. Temple improved by four wins in Rhule's third season in 2014 and Baylor also improved by four wins in his third season in 2019. Rhule took both Temple and Baylor to the conference championship game in his third season.

- Nebraska features three new full-time coordinators this season. **Dana Holgorsen** is in his first full season as the Huskers' offensive coordinator after he served in that role for the final four games of the 2024 campaign. **John Butler** is in his first year as Nebraska's defensive coordinator after he coached the cornerbacks and was NU's defensive pass game coordinator in 2024. New to the staff is **Mike Ekel**, who serves as special teams coordinator following a successful four-year run in the same role at Tennessee.

- Other new assistant coaches include: **Phil Snow** (associate head coach); **Terry Braden** (defensive line); **Daikiel Shorts Jr.** (wide receivers); **Phil Simpson** (outside linebackers); and **Addison Williams** (secondary).

## ROSTER NOTES

- Nebraska's roster features 125 players. Nearly three-quarters of the roster is comprised of underclassmen with almost half of the roster classified as freshmen.

- The roster features 89 returning players and 36 newcomers. Nebraska returns a total of 10 starters and 38 letterwinners.
- Nebraska added 15 transfers and 21 true freshmen to its roster in 2025. Among the 15 transfers are 11 FBS transfers and four FCS transfers.
- Nine of Nebraska's FBS 11 transfers came from Power Conference programs (Alabama, Cal, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi State, Missouri, Notre Dame, Oklahoma and Purdue).
- The roster features players from 29 states and three foreign countries (Australia, Germany and New Zealand).
- Nebraska has had a letterwinner from 47 of the 50 states in its history, missing only Idaho, New Hampshire and Rhode Island.
- States with multiple players on the roster include: Nebraska (36), Texas (10), Missouri (7), California (6), Florida (6), Iowa (6), Pennsylvania (5), Arizona (4), Colorado (4), Georgia (4), Kansas (4), Louisiana (3), New Jersey (3), Hawaii (2), Illinois (2), Kentucky (2), Maryland (2), Michigan (2), Minnesota (2), Mississippi (2) and South Dakota (2).
- The states of Indiana, Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, New York, Tennessee, Utah and Wisconsin are each represented with one player on Nebraska's 2025 roster.
- The players who are wearing a single-digit jersey number (0-9) earned the right to wear that number through a team vote.

- A total of 12 Huskers are playing the 2025 season as graduates, including players who earned their degree at another institution before transferring to Nebraska.

# SCOUTING THE CINCINNATI BEARCATS



Cincinnati finished the 2024 campaign with a 5-7 overall record, picking up wins against Towson, Miami (Ohio), Houston, UCF and Arizona State.

The Bearcats must replace their top rusher from last season after Corey Kiner paced the Cincinnati rushing attack with 1,153 yards and four touchdowns on 204 carries. The Bearcats return Brendan Sorsby and Evan Pryor, who rushed for 447 and 418 yards, respectively.

In the passing game, Sorsby returns after completing 64 percent of his passes for 2,813 yards with 18 touchdowns and seven interceptions in 12 games. Cincinnati lost four of its top five receiving targets from last season, including Xavier Henderson's 59 receptions for 738 yards and four touchdowns in 2024. Joe Royer returns after pulling in 50 catches for 521 yards and three scores in 12 games last season.

Defensively, the Bearcats must replace Jared Bartlett, who led the Cincinnati defense with 69 tackles, 11.5 tackles for loss and 7.5 sacks last season. Jake Golday is the Bearcats' top returning tackler after he made 58 stops with seven tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks in 2024.

Scott Satterfield is in his third season as the head coach at Cincinnati, leading the Bearcats to an 8-16 overall record through two seasons.

Prior to Cincinnati, Satterfield posted a 26-24 record in four seasons as the head coach at Louisville from 2019 to 2022.

Satterfield spent six seasons as the head coach at App State (2013-18) and led the Mountaineers to a 50-24 record. Satterfield's tenure as App State's head coach stands as one of the most successful eras in program history, building a dominant Group of Five program that went to four bowl games and won three consecutive Sun Belt titles.

Satterfield joined the Mountaineers' staff as receivers coach in 1998 before coaching running backs (1999-2002) and quarterbacks (2002-08).

Satterfield's coaching career also includes stints as Toledo's passing game coordinator (2009) and FIU's offensive coordinator (2010-11).

As a player, he started 27 games at quarterback for App State and was a first-team all-conference selection in 1995.

Matt Rhule has a proven track record as a program builder. In his first two collegiate head coaching jobs at Temple (2013-16) and Baylor (2017-19), Rhule led both the Owls and the Bears to their most victories in school history in just his third season. He also took both teams to the conference championship game in year three.

Rhule took Temple from two wins in his first season to a school-record 10 victories in both his third and fourth seasons with an appearance in the conference championship game both seasons. He then took Baylor from one win in his first season to a school-record 11 victories in his third season and an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and the Sugar Bowl.

At Nebraska, Rhule led Nebraska to a 7-6 record and a bowl victory in his second season in 2024, marking the Huskers' first winning record in eight years and first bowl win in nine years.

## TAKING TEMPLE TO NEW HEIGHTS

In his tenure at Temple from 2013 to 2016, Rhule took the Owls to new heights.

- In Rhule's second season in 2014, Temple posted the program's first win over an SEC team since 1938, its first win over a ranked opponent in 16 seasons and the program's largest margin of victory in nearly 50 years.
- Rhule won 10 games in both 2015 and 2016. He is responsible for two of the three 10-win seasons in Temple's 125-year history.
- He also took the Owls to back-to-back bowl games in 2015 and 2016, the first time Temple played in a bowl in consecutive seasons.
- In 2015, Rhule led Temple to the American Athletic Conference Championship Game, the first conference title game in program history.
- The next season, Rhule guided the Owls to their second conference title in program history and the first in nearly 40 years.
- Temple has spent a total of 16 weeks ranked in the 88-year history of the Associated Press top-25 poll. More than half of those top-25 rankings (9) came under Rhule in 2015 and 2016.

## AN ENCORE AT BAYLOR

At Temple, Rhule led the Owls to their highest season win total in program history, their first conference championship game appearance and an impressive run in the national rankings. He produced an encore by repeating each of those same feats in three seasons at Baylor.

- Baylor finished with 11 losses in Rhule's first season in 2017 but two years later, he guided the Bears to 11 wins in 2019. Baylor became the first Power Conference program to go from 11 losses to 11 wins in two or fewer seasons.
- Baylor won its final two games of the 2018 season and its first nine games of the 2019 campaign. The 11 straight victories marked the second-longest winning streak in school history, while Baylor's 9-0 start in 2019 was the best start in program history.
- In his third season in 2019, Rhule led Baylor to its most wins (11) in school history, the Bears advanced to their first Big 12 Championship Game and played in the Sugar Bowl for only the second time in program history.
- Baylor finished with a No. 13 ranking in 2019, its second-highest final ranking since 1951.
