Three-time Missouri Valley Conference Coach-of-the-Year Breanne Hall was named the head coach of the Nebraska women's golf program on May 15, 2025.

"We are thrilled to have Breanne Hall join us as the head coach of our women's golf program," Nebraska Director of Athletics Troy Dannen said. "Breanne has built an impressive resume, first starting a program from the ground up at UNC Asheville, before raising the profile of Illinois State women's golf to the top of the Missouri Valley Conference. She has

great connections at all levels of the game and has a record of success recruiting student-athletes both throughout the United States and internationally. We look forward to Breanne's leadership and exciting times ahead for Nebraska Women's Golf!"

Hall, who won back-to-back MVC Coach-of-the-Year honors at Illinois State the past two seasons, led the Redbirds to three NCAA Tournament appearances over the past four seasons at ISU. She was also the 2022 Missouri Valley Conference Coach of the Year.

"I am incredibly honored and grateful to accept the position as head women's golf coach at the University of Nebraska. I want to sincerely thank Director of Athletics Troy Dannen, Deputy AD/Senior Woman Administrator Kristen Brown, and Associate Director of Compliance Jena Johnson for their belief in me and the vision we share for this program," Hall said. "Nebraska is a place with deep tradition and pride, and I'm beyond excited for the opportunity to lead these student-athletes and build on the foundation of excellence that defines Husker Athletics. While I'm incredibly excited for this next chapter at Nebraska, I also want to take a moment to thank Illinois State and UNC Asheville. I'm deeply grateful for the opportunities I had to grow as a coach and to lead so many outstanding student-athletes at both programs."

Hall's 2025 Illinois State team won the Missouri Valley Conference title by 31 strokes before finishing 11th at the NCAA Columbus Regional. Redbird Jinyoung Yun was named the MVC Golfer of the Year for the second straight season, while Morgan Jones was named MVC Newcomer of the Year and Elise Fennell was honored as the MVC Freshman of the Year. All three Redbirds were also named All-MVC and to the MVC All-Tournament Team, while teammate Jessica Jolly added All-MVC honors for the season.

In 2024, Illinois State won the Missouri Valley Conference title by 12 strokes with Ali Schrock sharing the tournament title. Yun was named MVC Golfer of the Year and joined Schrock on the all-tournament team. Avalon Woodward also captured All-MVC honors. The Redbirds went on to finish 12th at the NCAA East Lansing Regional. Schrock also capped her career as a three-time CSC Academic All-American with first-team

honors in 2024.

The Redbirds earned their first conference title under Hall's direction in 2022 and their first MVC title in a decade, edging Missouri State by one stroke. Schrock was named the MVC Golfer of the Year while taking runner-up honors in the tournament. Woodward and Kehler Koss joined Schrock on the All-MVC team. Illinois State capped the year with a 12th-place finish at the NCAA Stillwater Regional.

During her time at Illinois State, Hall coached three MVC Golfers of the Year and 15 all-conference selections. Her teams produced the five best single-season scoring averages in school history over the past five years, while also putting up 15 of the top 16 three-round tournament scores in the ISU record book. Her teams also delivered 14 of the top 15 single-round scores in Redbird history.

Prior to taking over the top spot at Illinois State, Hall spent a season recruiting a roster before serving as the head coach for two seasons at UNC Asheville (2016-18). As the first head coach in history of the fledgling program, Hall led UNC Asheville to a pair of tournament titles in the first two seasons of the program's existence. Her team posted a nine-stroke improvement in scoring average from year one to year two. In 2018, the Bulldogs finished fifth at the Big South Championship.

Hall was a three-time All-MAC selection as a golfer at Toledo, after beginning her career at Northern Kentucky. The winner of the Michigan Women's Open in 2003, Hall competed in the Futures Tour Q-School after earning her bachelor's degree in organizational management from Toledo in 2004. Hall, who began her instructional career as an assistant professional at Manasquan River Golf Club in Brielle, N.J. (2005-06), served as an assistant professional at Grove Park Inn Resort & Spa in Asheville, N.C. (2007-08), before spending four years as the head professional at the resort (2008-12) and one year as the club manager (2012-13). She became a PGA Class A member in 2012.

She served as the director of golf instruction at Mountain Air Country Club in Burnsville, N.C. (2013-16) prior to embarking on her collegiate coaching career.





ALLYSSA FERRELL

Assistant Coach (First Season) Michigan State (2014)

Allyssa Ferrell joined the Nebraska women's golf program as an assistant coach for her first season in July of 2025. Ferrell, who golfed collegiately at Michigan State before enjoying a successful professional career on the Epson, Symetra and LPGA Tours, brings a wealth of experience to the Husker program.

"Her vision, teaching expertise and genuine passion for the game align perfectly with our goals," Nebraska Head Coach Breanne Hall said. "I'm confident she'll play a key role in elevating the Nebraska women's golf program."

Ferrell, who was a two-time second-team All-Big Ten golfer at Michigan State (2013, 2014) was a member of the 2014 Big Ten All-Championship Team after sinking a nine-foot putt on the final hole to give the Spartans their third title in four years. She was later named the 2014 Michigan State Female Athlete of the Year. She helped MSU to four straight NCAA Regional appearances and three trips to the NCAA Championship. As a senior in 2014, she tied for 10th individually at the NCAA Championship with a then-school-record four-round score of 283 (+3). An elementary education major at Michigan State, Ferrell was a three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection as a Spartan.

She made the move to the Epson Tour in 2015 and earned a season-best tie for 13th at the Tullymore Classic. In 2016, she played in 20 events and made 14 cuts, before earning a spot on the LPGA Tour. Ferrell played in seven LPGA events in 2017. On the Symetra Tour in 2018, Ferrell won the Garden City Charity Classic at Buffalo Dunes, which included a career-low round of 65. She closed her pro career on the Symetra Tour in 2019, when she won the Symetra Tour Legacy Award,

which is presented to an individual who demonstrates passion for the community and giving back.

"I am beyond excited to start my coaching career under the leadership of Coach Hall at the University of Nebraska," Ferrell said. "I am honored for the belief and trust that Coach Hall has in me and the opportunity to coach at a University that has strong community support for their student-athletes. I would like to thank my former college head coach, Stacy Slobodnik-Stoll, and assistant coach, Lorne Don, for the amazing examples of the impact coaches can have on student-athletes. I hope to have the lasting impact on my student-athletes that my coaches had on me."

A native of Edgerton, Wis., Ferrell was the Wisconsin High School Golf Coaches Association Player of the Year in 2009, after being named the Wisconsin PGA Junior Player of the Year in 2008. She began building her coaching resume in 2017 by serving as a volunteer assistant coach at Edgerton High School in 2017. From 2019 to 2023, she served as an instructor at Vitense Golf and Academy in Madison, Wis. She was also the director of programming for the First Tee of South Central Wisconsin in 2020 and 2021. She was a golf professional and teaching pro at Coachman's Golf Resort in Edgerton in 2023, before serving as the Director of Golf at Prairie Woods Golf Course in Avalon, Wis., in 2024. She has been an assistant golf pro at Destination Geneva National in Lake Geneva, Wis., since March.

CRAIG SAGER

Director of Operations (Second Season) Central Missouri (2004)

Craig Sager enters his second season as the director of men's and women's golf operations at Nebraska after spending the previous four seasons as the head coach of the men's and women's programs at William Jewell in Liberty, Mo.

In 2024, he led the William Jewell men to their best finish in history at the GLVC Tournament. He also guided Bryson Oots to the first individual NCAA Division II national tournament appearance in program history.

In 2022, Sager helped Frida Hammarlund to an individual NCAA Tournament berth as well.

Sager took over the top job at William Jewell in January of 2020, and was selected to the NCAA Division II Men's Golf Midwest Regional Advisory Committee in July of 2021, serving on the committee from 2022 through 2024.

Prior to his time at William Jewell, Sager spent three seasons leading the North Central Missouri College men's

golf program. He led the Pirates to back-to-back NJCAA Region XVI Championships. Nine of his golfers earned trips to the national tournament, while also claiming six all-region and three all-district awards. His 2018 squad was the NJCAA Academic Team of the Year after producing the best GPA in the country. Ten of his golfers earned NJCAA All-Academic honors.

Sager was the course superintendent at the Riverside Country Club from 2010 to 2013, before serving as the general manager at the Green Hills Golf Course in Chillicothe, Mo., from 2013 to 2023. He was also the head professional at the Cameron Golf Club from 2010 to 2024.

A TPI Certified instructor, Sager is a native of Trenton, Mo. He earned his bachelor's degree in business management from Central Missouri in 2004.



ERIC JOHNSON

Women's Golf Strength Coach (Eighth Season) Nebraska (2013)

Eric Johnson was hired as a full-time assistant strength and conditioning coach in September of 2018 after serving as a strength and conditioning intern since July of 2016.

Johnson works with Nebraska's men's and women's golf, cross country, rifle and men's and women's tennis teams.

Prior to his time at Nebraska, Johnson was a strength and conditioning intern at the US Performance Center

in Charlotte, N.C. from January through April in 2016. He worked with all age groups from elementary to professional athletes.

A Wallace, Neb., native, Johnson graduated from UNL with a degree in nutrition, exercise and health science. During his time as a student, Johnson was a student manager for Nebraska track and field team from 2007 to 2011.



ZACH SMITH

Assistant Equipment Manager (Second Season) Iowa State (2006)

Zach Smith is in his second season with the Nebraska equipment staff in 2025-26, bringing extensive experience in the industry.

He spent 10 years at the University of Northern Iowa, serving the last five as an athletic equipment manager. In that role, Smith oversaw equipment operations for all 17 university-sponsored sports, managed inventory, was the primary point of contact on the school's Nike contract and trained other staff in the department. Smith transitioned into that role after five years as an assistant equipment manager at UNI.

Before his time at UNI, Smith was the Iowa Barnstormers' head equipment manager for eight months in 2014.

From 2016 to 2024, Smith was also the assistant director of equipment operations for the East-West Shrine Bowl. In that role, Smith worked with game officials to contact invitees and equipment managers, ensured practices were staffed, coordinated locker room setup and installed coach-to-player radio communication in the helmets of both teams.

The Fremont, Neb., native has over 20 years of experience, including time with the Detroit Lions, Miami Dolphins and San Francisco 49ers. He obtained a sports management degree from Iowa State in 2006, where he was a student manager with the football team for four years.



ALVIN BANKS

Coordinator of Student-Athlete Development (23rd Season) Nebraska (1991)

Alvin Banks serves as an academic counselor and the coordinator of student-athlete development for Nebraska's Academic Performance Team. Banks began working as an academic counselor at Nebraska in 2003, after serving two years as an assistant academic counselor.

As Nebraska's coordinator of student-athlete development, he provides academic, athletic, personal and career counseling to all Husker student-athletes. As an academic counselor, he works primarily with the Nebraska men's and women's golf teams, the women's swimming and diving team and the wrestling team, while also assisting with the football team.

Before joining the Academic Performance Team, Banks served six years as a law enforcement officer for the City of Lincoln. He is currently a member of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics.

Banks, who lettered in football at Nebraska during the 1991 season, earned his master's degree in vocational education in 1998, after receiving a bachelor's degree in business management in 1992 from Nebraska. Banks and his wife, Lisa, have two children, Kaylie and Darius.



JAKE BLATTNER

Performance Nutrition (Eighth Season) Viterbo (2015)

Jake Blattner is in his eighth season as performance nutrition coordinator for the Husker program and has worked extensively with the Nebraska men's basketball, women's basketball and track and field programs.

Prior to joining the Nebraska staff, he served as a sports dietitian at Florida State University for three years. At the school, he provided personalized medical and performance nutritional therapy and managed individual athlete cases. Blattner also developed individual nutritional performance plans, which educated athletes and optimized performance

based on specific goals. He oversaw daily operations in FSU's Sports Nutrition unit and designed a recovery card system allowing athletes to interact directly with sports nutritionists.

Previously, Blattner served internships at BiPro-Agropur Ingredients and Princeton University and worked with the La Crosse Loggers in the Summer Collegiate Baseball League. Blattner earned his bachelor's degree in community and medical dietetics from Viterbo (Wis.) University in 2015 and his master's degree in exercise physiology in 2018.

He married Natalie Delamater in July 2025.



JEFF GRIESCH

Assistant A.D./Communications (28th Season) Nebraska (1998)

Griesch is in his first season as an Assistant Athletic Director for Communications in 2025-26 and his 28th season as a full-time employee with Nebraska Athletics. He coordinates all aspects of media relations for the women's basketball and men's and women's golf programs while also coordinating student assignments for many other Husker sports.

In addition to his supervisory roles, Griesch helps Senior Associate Athletic Director Keith Mann in promoting the Nebraska football program, along with other office duties assigned by Mann. Griesch is also entering his 28th season as a radio color commentator for Nebraska women's basketball in 2025-26. He also spent 11 seasons as the host of the Nebraska Women's Basketball TV Show.

He has served as Nebraska women's basketball contact at 14 NCAA Tournaments, including the first two NCAA Sweet 16 bids in school history (2010, 2013). He also helped promote three first-round WNBA Draft picks (Lindsey Moore, Kelsey Griffin, Nicole Kubik) and two first-team WBCA All-Americans (Griffin, Jordan Hooper). He also worked with current LPGA Tour member Kate Smith-Stroh and LET member Vanessa Bouvet during their times as Huskers.

Griesch spent six years as an assistant director and two years as a graduate intern in the Media Relations Office, after starting his sports information career as a student in October of 1995.

In 2007-08, Griesch's Nebraska's women's basketball media and recruiting guide was voted the third-best guide in the nation. His women's golf guide also finished third in the national contest, the highest rankings in history for both of those publications.

Griesch earned a bachelor's of journalism degree in news-editorial from Nebraska in 1996. He was the first two-time recipient of the Wylie Smith Postgraduate Scholarship and was a Regents Scholar as both an undergraduate and graduate student. He served a three-year term as the chair of the College Sports Communicators prestigious graduate and undergraduate scholarship committee, which has awarded hundreds of thousands of dollars to exceptional candidates in the media relations field since its inception.

Griesch and his wife, Emily, are originally from Wayne, Neb., and have a daughter, Hollan, and three sons, Jackson, Brennan and Isaac.

Jeff Griesch is in his 23rd season as media relations contact for the Nebraska women's golf program and his 31st season overall with Nebraska Athletics.



TROY DANNEN

Athletic Director (Second Season)

Northern Iowa (1989)

NCAA Championship showing since 2016 with a 13th-place finish. The women's track team posted their second straight top-10 NCAA finish and placed ninth at the national meet.

Dannen has long been a leader in charting the course for the future of college athletics and that continues at Nebraska. In May of 2025, Dannen was appointed to the College Football Playoff Selection Committee, continuing his impact on the national level. He served from 2021 to 2023 as a member of the NCAA Constitution Committee and the Division I Transformation Committee. He also previously served as chair of the NCAA Football Competition Committee and was an Executive Committee member of the Football Oversight Committee. In total, Dannen has served on seven NCAA committees. In 2022, Dannen was a finalist for Sports Business Journal's Athletic Director of the Year award, and he received the Distinguished American Award from the Sugar Bowl Chapter of the National Football Foundation.

Dannen came to Lincoln after serving as Director of Athletics at the University of Washington. He helped guide the Huskies' transition to the Big Ten Conference and oversaw a football program that reached the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in January of 2024.

He arrived at Washington in the fall of 2023 after serving as Director of Athletics at Tulane University since 2015. While at Tulane, Green Wave student-athletes earned 49 All-America honors, a national championship, 21 conference championships and 41 postseason appearances.

In 2022-23, Tulane football won its first American Athletic Conference football championship and won the Cotton Bowl over USC, which was ranked ninth in the nation at that time. The men's basketball program won 20 regular-season games for the first time in two decades. Additionally, men's tennis advanced to its sixth NCAA Tournament in seven years, both bowling and beach volleyball finished ranked in the top 20, and baseball won the conference championship.

Tulane's football program participated in an unprecedented three consecutive bowl games from 2018 to 2020, winning back-to-back bowl games for the first time in 128 years of football at the University. In the classroom, Tulane student-athletes

An experienced leader in collegiate athletics with a strong Midwestern background, Troy Dannen is in his second year as Nebraska's Director of Athletics. Dannen guides Nebraska's 24-sport athletic department that ranks among the nation's most successful programs both athletically and academically.

Nebraska Athletics has enjoyed success since Dannen arrived in Lincoln in March of 2024. During the 2024-25 athletic year, five Husker teams finished in the top four nationally, including volleyball, wrestling, men's gymnastics and bowling. The volleyball program reached the Final Four, while the wrestling team posted its highest finish in school history with a national runner-up showing and had multiple national champions for the first time since 1984. The softball program won its first NCAA regional since 2014 while baseball repeated as Big Ten Tournament champions. Overall, Nebraska finished 21st in the final 2024-25 NACDA Director's Cup, the program's highest finish since 2010.

In the spring of 2024, the Husker baseball team won its first Big Ten tournament title, and the men's track team won the Big Ten Outdoor Championships. The men also had their best

excelled at a high-level. At the end of the 2022-23 academic year, over 68 percent of Green Wave student-athletes earned a 3.0 GPA or better, with a 93 percent Graduation Success Rate and a record-setting department Academic Progress Report of 992, with seven teams earning a perfect 1000 APR score.

Dannen spearheaded fundraising efforts and numerous capital projects at Tulane. He helped secure the largest unrestricted gift in Tulane Athletics history, an endowment gift that funded the operation of a new sport (sailing), and a \$10 million lead gift for capital renovations, which was the second-largest gift in department history. In addition, marketing and licensing revenue grew four-fold, and in 2022-23, Tulane football, basketball and volleyball set ticket sales and revenue records. Under Dannen's leadership, the Green Wave Club Annual Fund grew by 40 percent in terms of donors, and 45 percent in terms of dollars.

Increases in fundraising and major gift donors positively impacted capital project development and completion. A \$13 million renovation to the Reilly Natatorium, home of the swimming and diving program, as well as \$8 million in renovations to locker rooms and the sports medicine area inside the Wilson Center were completed in 2023. Dannen also oversaw construction of a new dining facility, weight room, basketball and volleyball locker rooms. Tulane also completed a \$2.4 million academic center renovation and a \$5 million television and digital production center.

Dannen came to Tulane after serving eight years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Northern Iowa (UNI) from 2008 to 2015. During his tenure, the Panthers enjoyed success at both the conference and national levels, highlighted by an NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in 2010 by the UNI men's basketball team. During his eight-year tenure, UNI was recognized with 39 All-Americans, 13 Coaches of the Year and nine Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) Players of the Year. UNI football, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball and softball combined to reach 15 NCAA tournaments and 20 postseason berths during that stretch. For his efforts, Dannen was recognized as NACDA's FCS Athletic Director of the Year in 2014.

Prior to his time at UNI, Dannen served as the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union's Executive Director for seven years, overseeing 400 high schools and 10 sports.

Dannen grew up on a farm just outside Marshalltown, Iowa, and graduated from UNI in 1989 with a degree in communications. He is married to Amy and has four children: Elizabeth, William, Emily and Holly.





KRISTEN BROWN

Deputy A.D./SWA (Second Season)

Northern Illinois (2003)

Kristen Brown joined Nebraska Athletics in July of 2024. She serves as Deputy Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator, with sport administrator duties for several Husker sports including volleyball and women's basketball.

Brown joined the Huskers after serving as the Deputy Athletics Director for Administration and Leadership at Texas A&M (2020-24).

At Texas A&M, Brown directed a newly created Engagement unit that worked to ensure the talents of all coaches and administrators are supported at the highest level, and she oversaw the compliance department on a permanent basis. Working closely with Athletic Director Ross Bjork and serving as the department's Senior Woman Administrator, Brown was the sports administrator for women's basketball, volleyball, soccer, men's and women's tennis and men's and women's swimming and diving.

She spent her first two years at Texas A&M as Deputy Athletics Director for Student-Athlete Experience, during which she provided executive leadership for the department on all matters related to student-athlete engagement including academics, life skills and career development served as sports administrator for seven sports, and led the department's Diversity & Inclusion efforts.

Prior to serving the Aggies, Brown worked as the Associate Athletic Director of Administration at the University

of Maryland (2014-20). At Maryland, programs under Brown's direct supervision produced two national championships, six Big Ten regular-season championships, three Big Ten Tournament championships, and advanced to seven Final Fours. Prior to her tenure at Maryland, Brown served as a conference administrator for the American Athletic Conference, the Big East and the Big Ten Conference.

In addition to her administrative duties at Maryland, Brown served as the department's Diversity & Inclusion Officer and was a member of the university's Diversity & Inclusion Cabinet. Within the department, she played a key role in the development of a professional development program for department's staff, served on the Big Ten sports management committee, and chaired numerous committees related to head coach hiring searches. Externally, Brown led the department's Championships and Community Engagement units, which included the Share the Shell program, the winner of the 2017 NACDA Community Service Award presented by the Fiesta Bowl.

A graduate of Northern Illinois University, Brown was a two-time letter winner in women's basketball. The Rockford, Ill., native also holds a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University.

Jena Johnson enters her third season as the sport administrator for Nebraska's women's golf.

An associate director of compliance at Nebraska since 2017, Johnson began her full-time work in the Nebraska Athletic Department as an assistant compliance director in 2005.

Johnson helps ensure that all 24 of Nebraska's varsity sports adhere to the rules and regulations set forth by the NCAA and the Big Ten Conference. Johnson focuses her attention on athletic scholarships, the NCAA Student Assistance Fund and student athlete education.

Prior to her full-time employment with Nebraska Athletics, Johnson worked as a student-assistant in the compliance office throughout her time as a student in Lincoln from 2001 to 2005.

A native of Exeter, Neb., Johnson graduated from Nebraska in 2005 with a degree in marketing. She and her husband, Jose, were married in 2004, and the couple has three children, Isabel, and twin daughters, Elena and Alexis.



Dr. Rodney D. Bennett serves as the 21st Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL), a comprehensive public flagship, land-grant, Research 1 institution of approximately 24,000 students, with robust research and extension services throughout the state. UNL is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission, and its student-athletes compete at the NCAA Division I level in the Big Ten Conference.

Since his arrival on campus in July 2023, Dr. Bennett has led UNL in achieving increases in student enrollment and retention; ongoing growth in sponsored research awards; advancements in national rankings for academic excellence and student success; innovative research and academic program development; enhancements to shared governance processes; significant progress in fundraising and external outreach; investments to improve the quality of student life and the workplace environment for faculty and staff; and the implementation of changes to eliminate a historic budget deficit.

RODNEY BENNETT

Prior to his tenure at UNL, Dr. Bennett served nearly ten years as President of The University of Southern Mississippi (USM), a comprehensive public research institution of approximately 14,000 students with campuses in South Mississippi and along the Mississippi Gulf Coast. Under his leadership, USM achieved R1 status; reached significant fundraising milestones; increased its annual economic impact; expanded operations along the Mississippi Gulf Coast; supported innovations in healthcare; invested in new faculty positions, student success programming, and capital improvements; and increased access to quality education and research programs. USM became one of only fourteen R1 institutions in the nation that compete at the NCAA Division I level and maintain accreditation in all four major areas of the Arts.

Dr. Bennett previously served more than a decade in senior level positions at the University of Georgia in Athens, where he chaired the institution's NCAA certification review and self-study process; completed more than \$150 million in facilities projects; re-established the Dean of Students office after more than two decades; enhanced on-campus student health and counseling services; and managed oversight of robust student programs and support services for an enrollment of more than 34,000.

Throughout his career, Dr. Bennett has demonstrated a strong commitment to community leadership and service, including board membership for the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce; Nebraska Innovation Campus; Mississippi Aquarium; The First Bank (Hattiesburg); the Classic Center Cultural Foundation and Authority Board (Athens); the Northeast Georgia Girl Scouts of America; Catholic Health East (Philadelphia); and St. Mary's Health Care System (Athens). As USM President, Dr. Bennett chaired the athletic conference board and served as a founding member of the Board of Managers for the College Football Playoff national championship. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., and Past Sire Archon for Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity, The Boulé.

Dr. Bennett holds a Doctor of Education in Educational Administration from Tennessee State University and specialist, master's, and bachelor's degrees from Middle Tennessee State University.

He serves as chief spokesman and chief executive officer for the system, which operates on a \$3 billion annual budget and includes a flagship Big Ten institution, a world-renowned academic health sciences center, Division I athletics programs, and preeminent institutes focused on water and agriculture, national security and defense, infectious disease and early childhood education.

He is a nationally recognized higher education and health care leader and advocate. He was the chancellor of the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) and board chair for the Nebraska Medicine Health System from 2014 to 2024. As UNMC's chief operating officer, Dr. Gold was responsible for all aspects of campus leadership, program quality and operation – including 7 colleges, 37 institutes and centers, 5,429 faculty and staff and 4,700 health professions students.

In July 2021, Dr. Gold was named the Provost and Executive Vice President of the University of Nebraska System in addition to his ongoing UNMC/Nebraska Medicine responsibilities. In this role, he served as the chief academic officer of the University of Nebraska System and liaison to the Board of Regents for academic affairs. From May 2017 through June 2021, Dr. Gold served as the chancellor of the University of Nebraska at Omaha,

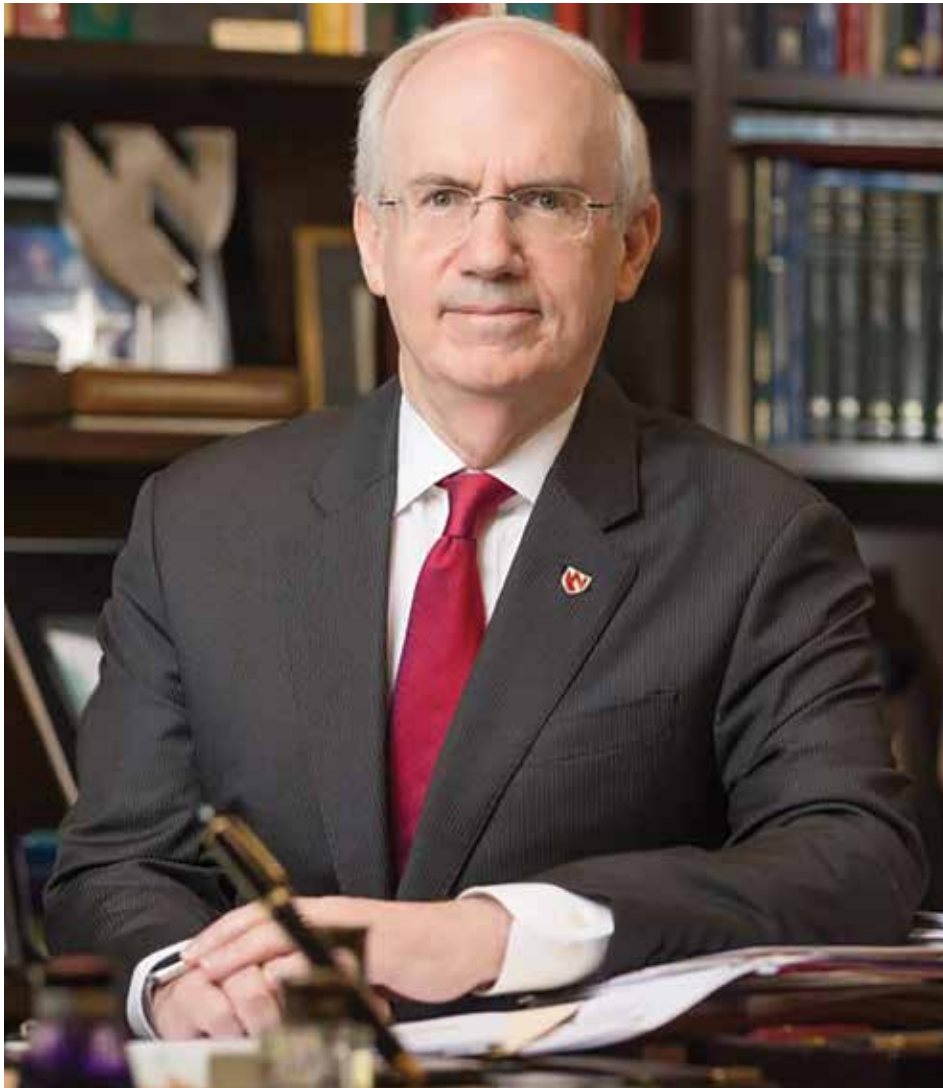

Dr. Gold leads several key economic development boards for the State and the University System, including the Greater Omaha Chamber, University Tech Development Corp, the University Tech Transfer Corp, and UNeTech Corp.

His national leadership roles have included more than 50 national professional committees and more than 100 national organizations, volunteer boards, government and public health councils. He has worked extensively with national- and state-level elected and appointed governing and administrative bodies as an advisor and trusted resource in the areas of higher education, research and clinical care.

Dr. Gold has been married for more than 50 years to a medical school classmate. They have two adult children and two grandchildren.

HALL EAGER TO HELP TALENTED YOUNG HUSKERS



Edén Lohrbach hopes to help solidify Nebraska's lineup as a sophomore in 2025-26. The four-time Iowa high school player of the year was Nebraska's top finisher at the 2025 Big Ten Championship. She closed the season with a 75.85 stroke average over 27 rounds in her first year as a collegian in 2024-25.

The Nebraska women's golf team enters a new era in 2025-26, as first-year Coach Breanne Hall leads the Huskers into the season.

Although Hall is new to the Nebraska program, she has an extensive record of success leading championship teams at the NCAA Division I level.

A three-time Missouri Valley Conference Coach-of-the-Year, Hall won back-to-back MVC Coach-of-the-Year honors at Illinois State in 2024 and 2025. She also led the Redbirds to three NCAA Tournament appearances over the past four seasons. She was also the 2022 Missouri Valley Conference Coach of the Year.

"Nebraska is a place with deep tradition and pride, and I'm beyond excited for the opportunity to lead these student-athletes and build on the foundation of excellence that defines Husker Athletics," Hall said.

Hall's 2025 Illinois State team won the Missouri Valley Conference title by 31 strokes before finishing 11th at the NCAA Columbus Regional. In 2024, Illinois State won the Missouri Valley Conference title by 12 strokes with Ali Schrock sharing the tournament title. The Redbirds went on to finish 12th at the NCAA East Lansing Regional.

The Redbirds earned their first conference title under Hall's direction in 2022 and their first MVC title in a decade, edging Missouri State by one stroke and capping the year with a 12th-place finish at the NCAA Stillwater Regional.

During her time at Illinois State, Hall coached three MVC Golfers of the Year and 15 all-conference selections. Her teams produced the five best single-season scoring averages in school history over the past five years.

Prior to taking over the top spot at Illinois State, Hall spent a season recruiting a roster before serving as the head coach for two seasons at UNC Asheville (2016-18). As the first head coach in history of the fledgling program, Hall led UNC Asheville to a pair of tournament titles in the first two seasons of the program's existence. Her team posted a nine-stroke improvement in scoring average from year one to year two.

With a proven record of helping aspiring young golfers drastically improve their games, Hall inherits a Nebraska roster filled with nine returning players and one transfer who followed her from Illinois State. However, among the 12 golfers on Nebraska's roster, nine will be in either their first or second seasons as Huskers.

The lone senior on the roster is fifth-year Husker Brooke Bream, who has not played a round in Nebraska's tournament lineup through her first four seasons. Bream, who earned her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in just three years, is a second-year graduate student pursuing her MBA.

Junior Arden Louchheim has played more rounds in the Big Red lineup than any other current Husker. The third-year collegian from Park City, Utah, has played 54 rounds and owns a 75.91 stroke average through her first two seasons. She will be looking to improve her game and solidify a spot in the Husker lineup as will fellow juniors Hannah Kono, Symran Shah and Lauren Thiele.

Kono, who produced Nebraska's No. 2 stroke average (74.93) in her first year as a Husker in 2024-25, managed four top-25 finishes a year ago. As a freshman, she finished sixth at the Horizon League Championships and helped Oakland University to the NCAA East Lansing Regional.

Thiele (21 rounds) and Shah (17 rounds) were both contributors in Nebraska's lineup as redshirt sophomores and first-year Huskers in 2024-25. Both players shaved strokes off their games in their first season in Lincoln, but both will be looking for more significant improvement in 2025-26.

Thiele continues a remarkable family tradition at Nebraska as the fourth sister to letter as a Husker women's golfer. The 2025 Nebraska Women's Match Play Champion, Lauren gave the Thiele sisters a letter in Husker women's golf for the 11th consecutive year, following Haley, Hannah and Lindsey.

A five-player sophomore class should make qualifying for each tournament extraordinarily competitive.

Four-time Iowa high school player of the year Edén Lohrbach was a regular in Nebraska's lineup as a true freshman in 2024-25, finishing with a 75.85 stroke average over 27 rounds. She was also NU's top finisher at the Big Ten Championship.

Lincoln Christian High School graduate and 2022 Nebraska state champion Olivia Lovegrove came on strong late in the season and finished with a 75.64 stroke average over 11 rounds. She contributed a pair of rounds for the Big Red at the Big Ten Championship.

Another 2025 true freshman, Danica Lundgren posted a solid 75.70 stroke average over 23 rounds. Lundgren's first collegiate season included a Husker season-best 207 (-9) at the PDI Intercollegiate hosted by UCF early in the spring.

Third-year Husker Mackenzie Bream adds a fourth returning sophomore to Nebraska's class, while Illinois State transfer Jessica Jolly hopes to make an immediate impact on the Husker lineup.

2025-26 NEBRASKA ROSTER & SEASON SCHEDULE

Jolly earned All-Missouri Valley Conference honors in her first college season under Coach Breanne Hall at ISU, after tying for 17th individually at the MVC Championship. Jolly went on to tie for 62nd individually at the NCAA Columbus Regional before making the decision to follow Hall to Nebraska.

The four-time all-state performer from Rockford, Mich., posted four top-10 individual tournament finishes on her way to a 75.00 stroke average over 30 rounds at Illinois State last season.

Ailis Tribolet and Kayleigh Babineaux round out the Husker roster as a pair of highly touted true freshmen looking to push for immediate lineup time. Tribolet, the 2024 Arizona Interscholastic Association Division III Boys state individual champion, fired a 63 (-9) in the final round of the state tournament to claim the title with a 36-hole score of 132 (-12). Perhaps even more impressively, Tribolet qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship following her freshman season of high school in 2022.

The No. 73 recruit in the nation according to Junior Golf Scoreboard, Tribolet bypassed a chance to repeat as an Arizona state champion as a senior when she chose to compete in the U.S. Women's Amateur Four-Ball Championship. She advanced to the quarterfinals of the national event.

Babineaux won the Foresight Sports Long Drive Challenge as part of the Notah Begay III Junior Golf National Championships in 2024. The Austin Lake Travis High School graduate spent her first two prep seasons at Cherokee Trail High School in Colorado before moving to Texas. She finished eighth at the Colorado Class 5A state tournament as a sophomore in 2023.

The makeup of Nebraska's roster certainly provides the ingredients for a quality team on the course in Hall's first season. The Huskers should also be hungry both individually and as a team after settling for an 18th-place finish in the first 18-team Big Ten Championship last season.

The Huskers open the year at the Sam Golden Invitational at Oakmont Country Club in Corinth, Texas (Sept. 8-9), before traveling to Colorado for the Col. Wollenberg Ptarmigan Ram Invitational at the Ptarmigan Golf Club in Fort Collins (Sept. 22-23). Nebraska then heads to one of the Midwest's top courses to compete at the University of Oklahoma Intercollegiate Presented by PDI at Prairie Dunes in Hutchinson, Kan. (Oct. 6-7), before closing the fall campaign at the Clash at Boulder Creek in Boulder City, Nev. (Oct. 27-28).

Nebraska jumps into a busy spring by traveling to Florida to compete in the UCF Challenge at Eagle Creek Golf Club in Orlando (Jan. 25-27). The tournament represents the earliest start to a spring season in Nebraska women's golf history.

After opening the fall season in Texas, the Big Red returns to the Lone Star state in the spring at the Texas Golf Throwdown at the Woodlands Country Club (Feb. 16-17). Nebraska makes its annual trip to Peoria, Ariz., for the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 22-23), before traveling to the SoCal Spring Invitational at the Sterling Hills Golf Club in Camarillo, Calif. (March 8-10).

The Huskers close out March at the MountainView Collegiate at the Preserve Golf Club in Tucson, Ariz. (March 20-22), before ending the regular season at the Chevron Silverado Showdown in Napa, Calif. (April 6-8).

Nebraska returns to California for the third time in a four-tournament stretch to compete at the 2026 Big Ten Championship at the Oakmont Country Club in Glendale (April 24-26).

The Huskers will learn their 2026 NCAA Regional fate during the NCAA Selection Show on Wednesday, April 29, before NCAA competition is held May 11-13 at four regional sites around the country (North Carolina, Florida State, Baylor, Stanford).

BROOKE BREAM

Redshirt Senior

Phoenix, Arizona (Xavier College Prep)

REDSHIRT JUNIOR (2024-25)

A multi-sport athlete in high school, Brooke Bream was a high school and club soccer player and a middle distance runner as a track athlete in Arizona. She began to focus on golf at the Arizona Country Club when the COVID-19 pandemic forced the cancellation of her junior track and field season and club soccer competitions.

Bream, who did not play high school golf, was a 2021 Junior Golf Association of Arizona Player of the Year finalist after winning three tournament titles and adding a pair of runner-up finishes.

She made her only appearance of the 2024-25 season by competing as an individual outside the Husker lineup at the Spring Break Shootout in Dade City, Fla. (March 17-18). Bream matched her career best with a 54-hole score of 238 (+25) that included an opening-round 77 (+6) on the 6,049-yard layout of the Lake Jovita Golf Club-South Course.

During the summer of 2025, Bream was the Nebraska Women's Match Play runner-up, battling teammate Lauren Thiele in the final. Husker teammates Arden Louchheim and Olivia Lovegrove also advanced to the semifinals.

An outstanding student, Bream is a three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection who earned her bachelor's degree as an economics major in just three years from Nebraska. She is pursuing a master's degree in business administration.

REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE (2023-24)

Bream posted a 79.33 stroke average over three rounds in her third season as a Husker. She traveled with the Huskers to the Briar's Creek Invitational in Johns Island, S.C. (March

11-12). Competing as an individual, Bream produced a 238 (85-76-77) that included a career-best four-over-par 76 in the second round. She tied for 95th individually.

REDSHIRT FRESHMAN (2022-23)

Bream made her collegiate golf debut at the Big O Classic at Oak Hills Country Club in Omaha (Oct. 3-4). Playing as an individual, Bream finished 57th in her first outing as a Husker with a score of 259. That included a best round of 79 in the second round. Bream finished with an 86.33 stroke average.

Bream performed at a high level off the course, claiming Academic All-Big Ten honors while capturing spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the fall and spring semesters of 2022-23. She was also a member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

REDSHIRT (2021-22)

Bream redshirted in her first season as a walk-on at Nebraska in 2021-22. She earned two spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll and was a member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Bream began her competitive golf career on the Junior Golf Association of Arizona Tour in March of 2020, tying for 18th at the Desert Mashie Championship at Cave Creek. She added a tie for 16th at the Tucson Conquistadores Spring Classic at the El Rio Golf Course (April 24-25) before finishing eighth at Tucson City (June 2-3) with a 161 (78-83). Her scores continued to fall the next week by tying for fifth at the Antigua Milt Coggins Arizona Junior Stroke Play (June 8-9), finishing at 155 (75-80).

Her performance set up her win at the Thunderbird Junior Classic (June 21-22), and she added a tie for second at the Mesa City Junior/Junior World Qualifier (June 30-31).

She added another runner-up finish with a 147 (75-72) over two rounds at the Prescott City Junior Championship (July 7-8), before winning the PING Invitational (July 19-20) at Grand Canyon University Golf Course with a 155 (75-80).

Bream added another victory at the Phoenix City Junior Championship (July 22-23) with a single round of 75. She managed a fourth-place showing at the Maricopa Junior Championship (Aug. 2-3), her seventh consecutive top-five tournament finish.

The daughter of Scott and Shelly Bream, Brooke has a younger sister, Mackenzie, who is a redshirt sophomore on the Husker women's golf team in 2025-26. Brooke's mother is a Nebraska graduate. Brooke's father is the vice president for player personnel for the Detroit Tigers. A three-sport athlete at Millard South High School, Scott Bream advanced to the Triple A level after playing in the San Diego Padres (1989-1995), Chicago Cubs (1995) and Detroit Tiger organizations (1996-98) after being chosen in the second round by San Diego in the 1989 MLB Draft. He continued in the Tigers organization as an advance scout in 1999, and has spent all but two (2011-12, Padres) of the last 25 seasons in the Tigers organization.

An economics major, Brooke earned her bachelor's degree in just three years, claiming her diploma in August of 2024. A 2025 Big Ten Distinguished Scholar, she is a three-time Academic All-Big Ten choice and an eight-time Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll member. Bream is pursuing a master's degree in business administration.

A four-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team, Bream earned a prestigious Sam Foltz 27 Hero Leadership Award in 2025. She and Mackenzie were the women's golf team's representatives on the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Committee in 2024-25.





SYMRAN SHAH

Redshirt Junior (One Letter) Carrollton, Texas (Hebron/Virginia Tech)

REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE (2024-25)

A transfer who spent her first two collegiate seasons at Virginia Tech, Symran Shah signed with the Huskers on May 31, 2024. She took a redshirt season in 2023-24 with the Hokies.

Shah opened her Husker career by competing as an individual outside the Nebraska lineup at the season-opening Badger Invitational (Sept. 8-10). She tied for 54th with a then-career-best 235 (+19) that included a then-career-best 75 (+3) in the second round on the 6,306-yard layout of the University Ridge Golf Club in Verona, Wis. She was Nebraska's No. 4 individual finisher at the event.

She competed as an individual again among three Huskers at the Big O Classic in Omaha (Sept. 30-Oct. 1). Shah performed well with a then-career-best three-round total of 234 (+18) to tie for 11th place in a 50-golfer field on the par-72, 6,019-yard layout at the Oak Hills Country Club. Her effort included a career-best 73 (+1) in the opening round.

Shah competed as an individual outside Nebraska's lineup to open the spring at the PDI Intercollegiate - hosted by UCF (Feb. 2-4). She finished 88th with a then-career-best three-round total of 229 (+13) on the 6,357-yard layout of the Eagle Creek Golf Club in Orlando.

She continued to slash her career-best tournament score with a 223 (+10) on her way to a tie for 15th while competing in the Husker lineup to help Nebraska to a fifth-place team finish at the Spring Break Shootout in Dade City, Fla. (March 17-18). Shah's performance included a career-best-tying 73 (+2) in the final round on the 6,049-yard layout of the Lake Jovita Golf Club-South Course. She opened with rounds of 74 and 76.

Shah was back in the Husker lineup for the Clemson Invitational (March 28-30), tying for 79th with a 231 (+15) in a loaded 84-player field. She managed a 75 (+3) in the final round on the 6,489-yard layout of The Reserve at Lake Keowee in Sunset City, S.C., after opening with rounds of 77 and 79.

Shah competed for the Huskers in the first two rounds of the 2025 Big Ten Championship in Havre de Grace, Md. (April 18-20). She produced rounds of 77 and 79 on the par-72,

6,187-yard layout of the Bulle Rock Golf Course.

She finished with a 76.94 stroke average over 17 rounds on the season.

REDSHIRT (VIRGINIA TECH, 2023-24)

Shah redshirted in her second season at Virginia Tech.

FRESHMAN (VIRGINIA TECH, 2022-23)

Shah competed as an individual at the Valspar Augusta Invitational as a true freshman for the Hokies. She carded rounds of 79 and 86 to finish 76th with a 165 (+21) over two rounds in the rain-shortened event at Forest Hills Golf Club (March 12-13, 2023).

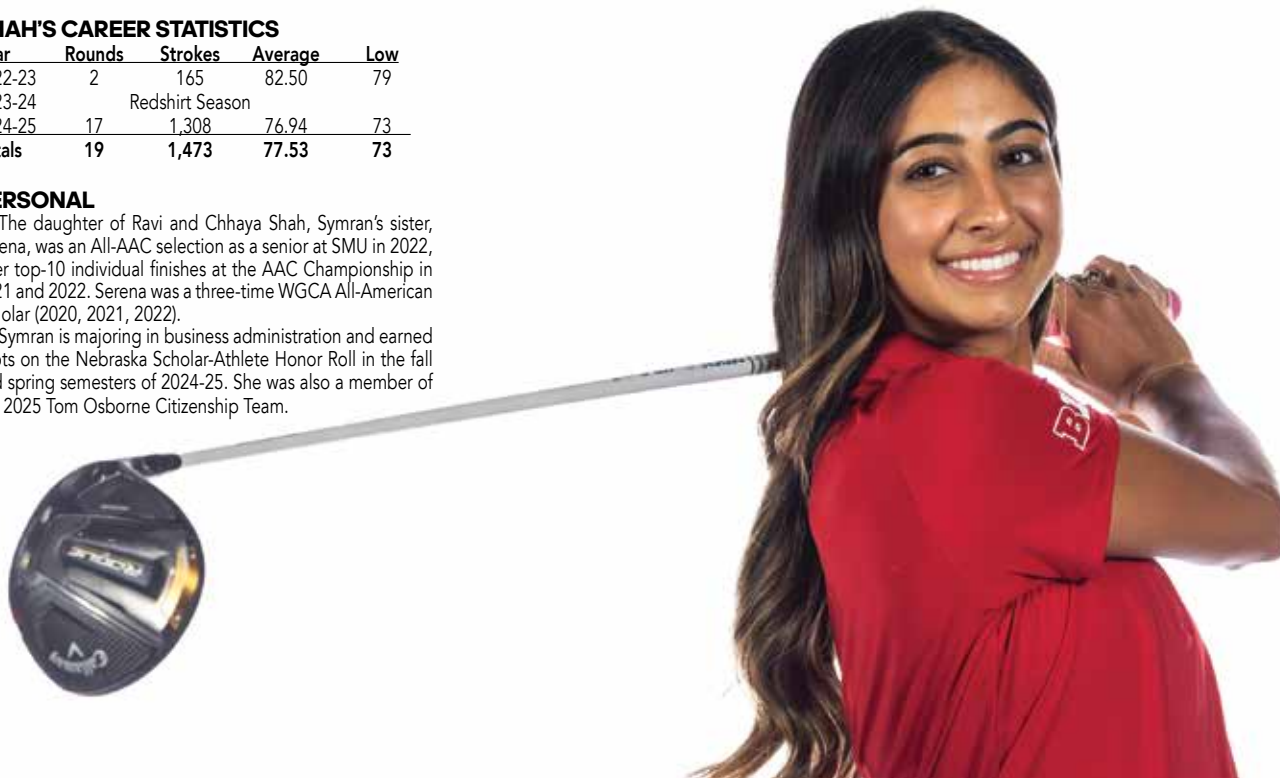

Wahoo, Nebraska (Bishop Neumann/Wichita State)

REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE (2024-25)

Lauren Thiele continues a family tradition at Nebraska by joining the Huskers as a transfer after spending her first two college seasons at Wichita State. Thiele (pronounced TEEL), who has two seasons of eligibility remaining, follows her three older sisters - Haley, Hannah and Lindsey - to the Husker women's golf program.

Lauren opened her Husker career by earning a lineup spot at the season-opening Badger Invitational in Verona, Wis. (Sept. 8-10). She tied for 59th in a 75-golfer field with a three-round total of 238 (+22) that included a second-round 78 (+6) on the par-72, 6,306-yard layout at the University Ridge Golf Club.

She made her second appearance as a Husker by playing as an individual among three Huskers at the Big O Classic (Sept. 30-Oct. 1). Thiele made the most of her trip to Omaha by winning the individual title with a career-best-tying 223 (+7) on a par-72, 6,019-yard layout at Oak Hills Country Club. Thiele won the title by a stroke over Husker teammate Danica Lundgren.

Thiele led the Huskers with her tie for 49th at 226 (+10) at the Jim West Challenge (Oct. 20-21). She produced rounds of 73, 76 and 77 on the par-72, 6,111-yard layout of the Kissing Tree Golf Course in San Marcos, Texas.

She continued her solid play with a three-round total of 224 (+8) to tie for 34th with rounds of 73, 76 and 75 at the Hurricane Invitational (Oct. 28-29).

Thiele closed the fall season ranked third among the Huskers with a 75.92 stroke average over 12 rounds.

She opened the spring season by competing in the Husker lineup at the PDI Intercollegiate - hosted by UCF. She managed a 230 (+14) over three rounds in Orlando to finish 89th individually.

Thiele returned to the course at the Spring Break Shootout in Dade City, Fla. (March 17-18). Competing as an individual outside the Husker lineup, Thiele took 26th with a 226 (+13) after recording rounds of 74, 76 and 76 on the 6,049-yard, par-71 layout of the Lake Jovita Golf Club-South Course.

She was Nebraska's No. 5 finisher after earning a lineup spot for the Clemson Invitational (March 28-30). Thiele totaled 233 (+17), including a 73 (+1) to match a season best in the second round on the 6,489-yard layout of The Reserve at Lake Keowee in Sunset City, S.C. She finished 83rd in a loaded 84-golfer field.

During the summer of 2025, Thiele captured the Nebraska Women's Match Play title, defeating Husker teammate Brooke Bream in the final. Fellow Huskers Arden Louchheim and Olivia Lovegrove also advanced to the semifinals.

REDSHIRT FRESHMAN (WICHITA STATE, 2023-24)

Thiele competed in seven tournaments for the Shockers in her second season in Wichita, including all five events during the spring. She fired a career-best 71 (-1) in the second round of the AAC Championship. It followed on the heels of a then-

career-best-tying 73 in the opening round. She struggled to an 83 in the final round to finish in a tie for 38th at 227 (+11), tying for WSU's No. 2 individual finish at the conference tournament. She entered the final round in a tie for 15th at even-par 144.

She opened the spring with a career-best 223 (+7) to tie for 35th as Wichita State's No. 2 finisher at the Rio Verde Invitational (Feb. 23-25), which included a then-career-best 73 (+1) in the final round. Her performance in Arizona helped her become a fixture in the lineup the rest of the spring.

After a 236 (78-79-79) to tie for 68th at the Tulane Classic (March 10-12), Thiele bounced back with a 226 (75-78-73) to tie for 44th as Wichita State's No. 2 finisher at the Red Rocks Invitational in Sedona, Ariz. (March 16-17). She tied for 31st with a 229 (75-78-76) as WSU's No. 2 finisher at the ORU Spring Invitational in Broken Arrow, Okla. (April 8-9), before her effort at the AAC Championship in Brooksville, Fla. Prior to her final round at the conference tournament, Thiele notched 15 consecutive rounds of 79 or better. Her spring season stroke average was 76.07 over 15 rounds, after posting a 79.00 stroke average over five fall rounds.

She produced a career-best tie for 15th with a 156 (+10) with rounds of 80 and 76 (+3) at the rain-shortened Big O Classic at the Oak Hills Country Club in Omaha (Oct. 2-3), after opening her season in a tie for 70th with a 239 (+23) at the season-opening Payne Stewart Memorial in Springfield, Mo. (Sept. 11-12).

REDSHIRT (WICHITA STATE, 2022-23)

Thiele redshirted as a true freshman in 2022-23. Off the course, she earned spots on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in both the fall and spring semesters.

BEFORE COLLEGE

A four-year letter winner and two-time captain of the boys' golf team at Bishop Neumann High School in Wahoo, Thiele was the only girl to be a member of a Nebraska team championship in boys golf. She finished seventh individually to help Neumann to the state title in 2021. During the 2021 season, Thiele captured a pair of individual tournament titles among a trio of top-five finishes. She also finished among the top 10 individually in seven tournaments. She finished with a 72.8 scoring average, which included a personal-best five-under 66. During the summer of 2021, she was the Nebraska Girls Match Play champion and added a runner-up finish at the Nebraska Girls Amateur Championship. She also qualified for the Girls Junior PGA Championship. In the summer of 2020, she was a semifinalist at the Nebraska Women's Match Play Championship.

An outstanding all-around athlete, Thiele was an all-state selection in both basketball and volleyball, while setting the school game and season record for three-pointers made. She was also an Academic All-State pick in volleyball, basketball and golf.

She is also a two-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team and is one of three women's golf representatives on the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Committee in 2025-26, joining Mackenzie Bream and Lauren Thiele.

ARDEN LOUCHHEIM

Junior (Two Letters)

Park City, Utah (Rowland Hall)

SOPHOMORE (2024-25)

Arden Louchheim (pronounced LOCK-hime) enters her junior season at Nebraska with more rounds as a Husker (54) than any other active Nebraska golfer.

Louchheim opened the spring of 2025 with a season-best 220 (+6) at the PDI Intercollegiate - hosted by UCF (Feb. 2-4). Her performance included rounds of 73 in the first and third rounds on her way to a tie for 63rd individually on the 6,357-yard layout of the Eagle Creek Golf Course in Orlando.

She produced another solid performance with a 223 (+7) with rounds of 74, 74 and 75 at the Westbrook Spring Invitational in Peoria, Ariz. (Feb. 23-24). She tied for 55th with teammates Danica Lundgren and Olivia Lovegrove in the 78-player field at Westbrook.

Louchheim put together a solid 228 (+12) to tie for 42nd at the MountainView Collegiate (March 2-4). Her performance on the 6,345-yard layout of The Preserve Golf Club at Saddlebrooke in Tucson, Ariz., included an even-par opening-round 72, before closing with rounds of 77 and 79.

She added a tie for 40th with a 230 (+17) at the Spring Break Shootout in Dade City, Fla. (March 17-18). Louchheim closed the 54-hole tournament with a 73 (+2) on the 6,049-yard layout of the Lake Jovita Golf Club-South, after recording scores of 79 (+8) and 78 (+7) on the tournament's first day.

Louchheim finished 67th with a 236 (+20) at the Terps Invitational (April 6-7). She managed rounds of 78, 75 and 83 on the par-72, 6,326-yard layout at the University of Maryland.

Louchheim got her second season off to a solid start as Nebraska's top qualifier and No. 2 finisher at the Badger Invitational (Sept. 8-10). Louchheim put together a 54-hole score of 229 (+13), including a final-round 73 (+1), to tie for 35th in a 75-player field on the 6,306-yard layout at University Ridge in Verona, Wis.

She was Nebraska's No. 4 finisher at the Red Raider Invitational (Sept. 24-25). She managed a 234 (+18) on the longest course a Nebraska women's golf team has ever faced with a 6,894-yard, par-72 layout at The Rawls Course in Lubbock, Texas. She matched her season best with a second-round 73 (+1), while tying for 71st.

She closed the fall season with a tie for 41st in a 63-player field at the Hurricane Invitational in Coral Gables, Fla. (Oct. 28-29). Competing as an individual outside the Husker lineup, Louchheim fired a season-best 72 in the opening round on the par-72, 6,175-yard layout of the Biltmore Golf Club, before adding rounds of 78 and 77 to close with a 227.

Louchheim finished with a 76.13 stroke average over 24 rounds in 2024-25. She played 21 rounds in the Husker lineup.

She was one of four Husker semifinalists at the Nebraska Women's Match Play in the summer of 2025, joining Lauren Thiele, Brooke Bream and Olivia Lovegrove.



FRESHMAN (2023-24)

Louchheim kicked off her college career by earning a lineup spot at the season-opening Sam Golden Invitational (Sept. 11-12). She was Nebraska's No. 4 individual finisher with a three-round total of 218 (+2) on the par-72, 6,413-yard layout at the Oakmont Country Club in Corinth, Texas. She began the tournament with a career-best 70 (-2), before adding rounds of 73 and 75 to help Nebraska to a tie for fifth in a 12-team field that included seven 2023 NCAA Regional-qualifying teams.

She added a tie for 65th in a strong 84-player field at the Mary Fossum Invitational (Sept. 17-18). Louchheim counted her first round (73) and third round (74) for Nebraska to help the Huskers tie for sixth in a 15-team field that featured nine 2023 NCAA Regional-qualifying teams. She finished with a three-round score of 233 on the par-72, 6,370-yard layout at Forest Akers West Golf Course in East Lansing, Mich.

Louchheim was back in the Nebraska lineup at the Dale McNamara Invitational (Oct. 9-10), tying for 60th with a 228 (81-76-71). Her final-round 71 (-1) on the par-72, 6,246-yard layout of the Golf Club of Oklahoma in Broken Arrow was her second round better than par of the season and counted toward Nebraska's team score. She helped the Huskers to a fifth-place finish in a 14-team field that featured 10 top-100 teams.

She closed the fall with her fourth consecutive lineup appearance, tying for 64th with a 224 (+8) in an NCAA-caliber 96-player field at the Landfall Tradition in Wilmington, N.C. (Oct. 27-29). Louchheim produced steady rounds of 75, 73 and 76 on the 6,194-yard layout at the Country Club of Landfall.

Louchheim capped her first fall season at Nebraska with a 75.25 stroke average over 12 rounds, before opening the spring in the Husker lineup at the UCF Challenge (Feb. 3-5). She finished with a three-round total of 228 (+12) in a tie for 80th in a strong 96-player field at the Eagle Creek Golf Club in Orlando.

She produced her best performance of the season with a career-best three-round total of 214 (-4) at the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 25-26) in Peoria, Ariz. Louchheim fired rounds of 70-73-71 to tie for 40th on the par-72, 6,248-yard layout at the Westbrook Village Golf Club. She added a 231 (78-75-78) to tie for 80th at the Briar's Creek Invitational in Johns Island, S.C. (March 11-12), before taking 65th with a 232 (76-79-77) at the Florida State Match Up in Tallahassee (March 15-16).

Louchheim produced a career-best tie for 29th on a challenging par-72, 6,319-yard layout at the Scarlet Course in Columbus, Ohio at the Therese Hession Buckeye Invitational (April 13-14). She tied for Nebraska's second-best individual finish in Ohio, matching teammates Miu Takahashi and Michaela Vavrova with a 228 (+12), just one shot back of Lindsey Thiele's 227.

Louchheim capped her freshman season by tying for 72nd with a 236 (+20) at the Big Ten Championship (April 19-21). She opened her first conference championship with a 75 at the Bulle Rock Golf Course in Havre de Grace, Md., to provide Nebraska with its No. 2 individual score, before closing with rounds of 81 and 80.

Louchheim ended the year with a 75.73 stroke average through 30 rounds on the season, including four rounds better than par. Her 30 rounds were the second most by a Husker, trailing only Miu Takahashi's 32.

She enjoyed a strong summer of 2024 that included a runner-up finish at the Nebraska Women's Amateur.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

A four-time IMG Junior World Championship participant, Louchheim was a two-time Girls Junior Americas Cup team member. She was also an AJGA Rolex Scholastic All-American.

Louchheim won the 18th hole for a 1 up match play victory to claim the title at the 40th Utah Junior Amateur event in June of 2023 at Park City Golf Club. The three-time Utah Class 2A high school state champion added an individual state runner-up finish to her list of honors in the spring of 2023, while helping Rowland Hall to a second-place team finish during the spring.

In addition to her success on the course and in the classroom, Louchheim was also a two-time high school letterwinner in alpine ski racing and was a competitive skier for 11 years, qualifying for U.S. Nationals in 2020.



HANNAH KONO

Junior (One Letter)

Enköping, Sweden (Oakland University)

SOPHOMORE (NEBRASKA, 2024-25)

NCAA Division I transfer Hannah Kono joined the Nebraska women's golf team in early June and made an immediate impact for the Huskers to open the 2024-25 season. Kono led Nebraska individually with her tie for 18th at the Badger Invitational (Sept. 8-10). Kono produced a three-round total of 224 (+8) that included an even-par 72 in the second round on the 6,306-yard layout at the University Ridge Golf Club in Verona, Wis.

Kono produced her fourth top-25 finish of the season with a season-best tie for 15th while playing as an individual outside the Husker lineup at the Spring Break Shootout in Dade City, Fla. (March 17-18). Kono posted rounds of 74, 78 and even-par 71 on the 6,049-yard layout of the Lake Jovita Golf Club-South to finish at 223 (+10).

She closed her first fall at NU on a high note with a then-career-best 218 (+2) to take 16th at the Hurricane Invitational (Oct. 28-29). Kono covered the par-72, 6,175-yard layout at the Biltmore Golf Club in Coral Gables, Fla., with consistent rounds of 73, 72 and 73. She came up just one stroke short of claiming her first top-10 individual finish as a Husker.

Kono did not compete at the PDI Intercollegiate - hosted by UCF to open the spring, but she was back in the lineup at the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 23-24). She led Nebraska in Arizona with a career-best 54-hole score of 213 (-3) that included career-best scores of 70 (-2) in both the first and second rounds on the 6,248-yard layout of the Vistas Course at the Westbrook Village Golf Club in Peoria. She closed with a solid round of 73 to tie for 21st in a 78-player field.

She added a tie for 28th with a 225 (+9) a week later back in Arizona to lead Nebraska's lineup at the MountainView Collegiate in Tucson (March 2-4). Kono opened with a 70 (-2) on the 6,345-yard layout of The Preserve Golf Club at Saddlebrooke in Tucson, before closing with a 75 (+3).

Kono tied for 60th with a 223 (+7) in a loaded 84-player field at the Clemson Invitational (March 28-30). Her performance included a career-best 69 (-3) on a 6,489-yard layout at The Reserve at Lake Keowee in Sunset City, S.C. She opened with back-to-back rounds of 77 (+5).

She added a tie for 40th at 229 (+13) as NU's No. 3 finisher at the Terps Invitational (April 6-7). Kono managed rounds of 78, 75 and 76 on the par-72, 6,326-yard layout.

During the fall, Kono registered Nebraska's No. 2 finish at the Red Raider Invitational (Sept. 24-25). She managed a three-round total of 230 (+14) on the longest course the Huskers have ever played with a 6,894-yard, par-72 layout at The Rawls Course in Lubbock, Texas. She tied for 55th overall with rounds of 76, 76 and 78.

Kono added three consecutive rounds of 77 (+5) to finish at 231 (+15) in a tie for 56th at the Jim West Challenge at the Kissing Tree Golf Course in San Marcos, Texas (Oct. 20-21).

She closed her sophomore season with a tie for 74th with a 232 (+16) at the Big Ten Championship (April 18-20). Kono carded Nebraska's best individual round of the tournament with an even-par 72 in the second round on the 6,187-yard layout of the Bulle Rock Golf Course in Havre de Grace, Md.

Kono finished with a 74.93 stroke average over 30 rounds in 2024-25.

FRESHMAN (OAKLAND, 2023-24)

Kono helped Oakland to the Horizon League Tournament championship and an automatic berth to the NCAA East Lansing Regional. She tied for 41st individually as Oakland's No. 2 finisher at the Forest Akers Golf Course at Michigan State with a three-round total of 225 (75-76-74).

Her NCAA Regional performance followed her sixth-place finish at the Horizon League Championship in Howey in the Hills, Fla. She managed rounds of 76, 79 and 79 to finish at 234 (+18) over three rounds at the El Campeon Golf Course.

Kono produced the best individual finish of her freshman season by tying for second at the Nevel Meade Collegiate hosted by Cleveland State in Prospect, Ky. (March 19-20). She posted a two-round total of 151 (+7), including an opening-round 73 to help the Golden Grizzlies share the team title with Illinois-Chicago. She was named the Horizon League Golfer of the Week (March 21) following her performance.

Kono, who notched seven top-20 finishes in 10 tournaments on the year, opened her college career with a tie for 20th at the A-Ga-Ming Invitational (Sept. 3-4). Her three-round total of 226 (+10) included a career-best second-round 71 (-1) in between rounds of 79 and 76.

She did not compete at the Mary Fossum Invitational in East Lansing (Sept. 17-18) in a tournament that Nebraska defeated Oakland by 55 strokes in the team standings. Kono returned to the lineup with her tie for 11th with a career-best 223 (+7) at the Shirley Spork EMU Invitational (Oct. 2-3). Her effort in Ypsilanti included a career-best-tying 71 (-1) in the second round and an even-par 72 in the final round.

Kono closed the fall with a third consecutive top-20 finish with a two-round total of 157 (+13) at the Chippewa Invitational in Birmingham, Mich. (Oct. 16-17). Her rounds of 80 and 77 were good enough for a tie for 20th, as she ended the fall campaign with a 75.75 stroke average over eight rounds.

She got the spring season off to a strong start with an 11th-place finish at the Texas State Invitational in New Braunfels (Feb. 5-6), where she carded three solid rounds of 74, 73 and 77 on a par-71 course to finish at 224 (+11). For her effort, Kono earned her first Horizon League Golfer of the Week award (Feb. 8).

Kono, who closed her lone season at Oakland with 20 consecutive rounds better than 80, added a 226 (77-75-74) to tie for 50th at the Rio Verde Invitational in Arizona (Feb. 23-25), before tying for 26th (77-77-78) at the Huntsville Invitational in Alabama (March 4-6).

She continued to play consistent golf with a career-best tie for second (78-73=151) at the Nevel Meade Collegiate, before adding a tie for 15th at 150 (74-76) at the Dolores Black Falcon Invitational in Bowling Green, Ohio (April 6-7).

In early June of 2024, Kono notched a runner-up finish on the Swedish Junior Tour (Division 1) with an impressive three-round total of 205 at the Karsta Golf Club in Sweden.

BEFORE COLLEGE

Prior to coming to the United States, Kono won the Swedish Junior Classics at Golf Uppsala with a three-round total of 214 (-2), including an opening-round 67 (-5) and a second-round 71 (-1) in late July of 2023. She also notched a tournament win at the Huvudstadens Junior Open in mid-June of 2023 with a two-round total of 150.

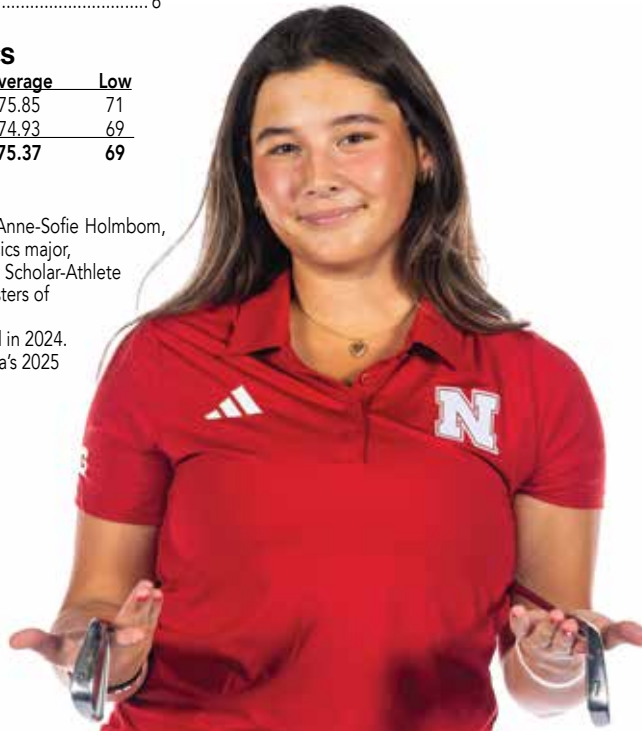

Lohrbach was Nebraska's top finisher at the 2025 Big Ten Championship (April 18-20), tying for 61st with a 54-hole total of 228 (+12). Her performance on a par-72, 6,187-yard layout at the Bulle Rock Golf Course in Havre de Grace, Md., included rounds of 75, 77 and 76.

She made her collegiate debut in Nebraska's second tournament of the season by producing the top individual finish by a Husker at the Red Raider Invitational (Sept. 24-25). Lohrbach closed with a 54-hole score of 229 (+13) to tie for 50th overall on the longest course a Nebraska women's golf team has ever played with a 6,894-yard, par-72 layout at The Rawls Course in Lubbock, Texas. She closed the fall season with a collegiate career-best 72 in the final round of the Hurricane Invitational in Coral Gables, Fla. Lohrbach finished with a career-best 223 (+7) in a tie for 29th in a 63-player field on the par-72, 6,175-yard layout at the Biltmore Golf Club. She was Nebraska's No. 2 finisher at the event.

Lohrbach opened the spring with a three-round total of 225 (+9) to tie for 80th while competing as an individual outside Nebraska's lineup at the PDI Intercollegiate - hosted by UCF (Feb. 2-4). Her effort in Orlando included a career-best-tying even-par 72 in the second round on the 6,357-yard layout of the Eagle Creek Golf Club.

She added a 228 (+12) to tie for 66th in a 78-player field at the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 23-24). She produced

rounds of 77, 75 and 76 at the par-72, 6,248-yard layout of the Vistas Course at the Westbrook Village Golf Club in Peoria, Ariz.

Lohrbach matched teammate Arden Louchheim in a tie for 40th at 230 (+17) at the Spring Break Shootout in Dade City, Fla. (March 17-18). Lohrbach closed the tournament strong with a 73 (+2) to help the Huskers to a fifth-place finish in a 13-team field. She managed rounds of 78 and 79 on the opening day of the event on a 6,049-yard, par-71 layout at the Lake Jovita Golf Club-South.

She tied for 66th with a 225 (+9) in a loaded 84-player field at the Clemson Invitational (March 28-30). Lohrbach closed with a 74 (+2) in the final round on a 6,489-yard layout at The Reserve at Lake Keowee, following rounds of 76 and 75 to open the tournament.

Lohrbach was Nebraska's No. 4 finisher with a 231 (+15) while playing as an individual outside the Husker lineup at the Terps Invitational (April 6-7). She produced rounds of 78, 77 and 76 on the par-72, 6,326-yard layout of the University of Maryland Golf Course to tie for 51st overall.

Lohrbach produced a 75.85 stroke average over 27 rounds, including 21 rounds in the Husker lineup as a true freshman.

She got her summer off to a strong start by capturing the 51st Nebraska Women's Amateur Championship at the Beatrice Country Club (June 3-5).

Lovegrove closed with a three-round total of 223 (+7) that included a career-best 70 (-2) in the second round on the 6,248-yard layout of the Vistas Course at Westbrook Village Golf Club. She tied teammates Arden Louchheim and Danica Lundgren for 55th in the 78-player field.

Lovegrove traveled with the Huskers again to compete as an individual outside the lineup at the MountainView Collegiate (March 2-4). She produced Nebraska's best individual finish by taking 19th with a 223 (+7), including an opening-round 71 (-1) and a final-round 73 (+1) on the 6,345-yard layout of The Preserve Golf Club at Saddlebrooke in Tucson, Ariz.

One of the top golfers in the state of Texas coming out of high school, Danica Lundgren got her collegiate career off to a strong start with a runner-up finish while competing as an individual at the Big O Classic (Sept. 30-Oct. 1). Lundgren played solid golf for 54 holes on a par-72, 6,019-yard layout at the Oak Hills Country Club in Omaha, posting a 224 (+8) that included one-over-par rounds of 73 in the first and third rounds. She finished just one shot back of teammate Lauren Thiele for the individual title.

Her performance in Omaha earned her the first lineup appearance of her career at the Jim West Challenge in San Marcos, Texas (Oct. 20-21). After struggling in the first two rounds, she contributed to Nebraska's best team round of the season with her final-round 74 (+2). She finished in a tie for 65th at 239 (+23).

Lundgren opened the spring by leading the Huskers with a career-best 207 (-9) to tie for the third at the PDI Intercollegiate - hosted by UCF (Feb. 2-4). Her effort in Orlando included a career-best 67 (-5) in the third round on the 6,367-yard layout of the Eagle Creek Golf Club. She opened the tournament with a 68 (-4), before adding an even-par 72 in the second round.

She played out of the top spot in Nebraska's lineup for the first time at the Westbrook Spring Invitational (Feb. 23-24). Lundgren closed with a three-round total of 223 (+7) on the 6,248-yard layout of the Vistas Course at the Westbrook Village Golf Club in Peoria, Ariz. Lundgren, who produced steady rounds of 76-73-74, tied for 55th individually along with teammates Arden Louchheim and Olivia Lovegrove in a 78-player field.

Lundgren was Nebraska's No. 2 finisher in the lineup at the MountainView Collegiate (March 2-4). She tied for 30th with a 226 (+10) that included consistent scores of 74, 76 and 76 on the 6,345-yard layout of The Preserve Golf Club at Saddlebrooke in Tucson, Ariz.

She added a tie for 34th with a 229 (+16) at the Spring Break Shootout in Dade City, Fla. (March 17-18). Lundgren opened with a solid 72 (+1) on the 6,049-yard layout of the

Lake Jovita Golf Club-South, before struggling to an 83 (+12) in the second round. She bounced back with a 74 (+3) in the final round to help the Huskers to a top-five team finish in the 13-team tournament.

Lundgren returned to the Husker lineup for the Terps Invitational (April 6-7). She was Nebraska's No. 2 finisher with a 54-hole total of 227 (+11) on a par-72, 6,326-yard at the University of Maryland Golf Course. Her effort in College Park included a second-round 69 (-3) in between rounds of 79.

She competed in the first and third rounds for the Big Red at the 2025 Big Ten Championship in Havre de Grace, Md. (April 18-20), but her rounds did not count toward Nebraska's team total.

Lundgren ranked fourth among the Huskers with a 75.70 stroke average over 23 rounds in 2024-25.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Lundgren was a first-team Class 6A all-state selection as a junior in 2023, helping the Vipers to their first-ever Texas UIL 6A Championship. She also helped Vandegrift repeat as state champions as a senior in 2024, after assisting Vandegrift to state runner-up finishes in 2021 and 2022.

Lundgren finished fifth individually at the 2023 Texas UIL 6A state championship with rounds of 71 and 72 to finish at 143 (-1) on the 5,876-yard layout at Legacy Hills Golf Course in Georgetown. It followed her sixth-place finish at the Region IV Championship, which included an opening-round 67 (-5) on a 5,881-yard layout at the Golf Club of Texas in San Antonio.

Lundgren was named the Southern Texas PGA Junior Golfer of the Year in November of 2023. She compiled 55 victories with the STPGA since 2015, including a victory at the STPGA Prestige Tour Alamo City Shootout with rounds of 70 and 66 to finish at 136 (-8) at Brackenridge Park Golf Course in San Antonio in April of 2023.

As a young golfer, Lundgren tied for fourth in the Girls 10-11 Division at the 2018 Drive, Chip and Putt National Finals at Augusta National Golf Club in Georgia.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten Conference is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders. Even in its infancy, the conference established itself as the preeminent collection of institutions in the nation, where the pursuit of academic excellence prevailed as the definitive goal.

The history of the Big Ten traces back more than 125 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago where, on Jan. 11, 1895, Purdue President James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Northwestern and Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bona fide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On Feb. 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the fundamentals of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905.

Indiana and the State University of Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State joined the conference, bringing the membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, a name that was eventually incorporated in 1987.

As the 1900s dawned, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were conducted at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women. Big Ten schools compete in a total of 42 different sports, furthering the conference's commitment to broad-based programming and providing more participation opportunities than any conference in the country.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations. But Michigan's appearance in 1902 cultivated a relationship that has endured for more than a century.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915, the first award to demonstrate support for the educational emphasis placed on intercollegiate athletics. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to one male and one female student of the graduating class who have attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a Big Ten student-athlete can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of seven men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971, Jim Delany in 1989, Kevin Warren in 2020, and current commissioner Tony Petitti in 2023.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produce over \$10 billion in funded research, doubling any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of the pioneering technology, where it approved country-wide testing in 2005. In 2006, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

In 2006, Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with FOX Networks to create the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 2,200 live events across all platforms each year. The 24/7 network is the ultimate destination for Big Ten fans and alumni across the country and around the world, allowing them to see their favorite teams, regardless of where they live.

On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011.

The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from Maryland and Rutgers on Nov. 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams.

In recent years the Big Ten has worked to meet the educational needs of modern student-athletes to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. In May of 2020, the conference announced the formation of the Big Ten Mental Health and Wellness Cabinet, featuring representation from all 14 member institutions, as well as sport affiliate members. The goal of the cabinet is to promote optimal mental health for Big Ten student-athletes through a comprehensive, systemic and interdisciplinary approach to establishing mental health programs, while also providing counsel, advice and expertise to the conference office.

In June of 2020 the conference launched the Big Ten Equality Coalition. This group, which features student-athletes, coaches, athletic directors, chancellors, presidents and other members of the Big Ten family from all 14 member institutions, has a stated goal of seeking tangible ways to actively and constructively combat racism and hate around the world, while also empowering student-athletes to express their rights to free speech and peaceful protest. One product of conversations emerging from the coalition was the creation of the Big Ten Voter Registration Initiative. This non-partisan, conference-wide collaboration encourages student-athletes to take part in the electoral process and is led by a Voter Registration Committee that includes representatives from all 14 Big Ten institutions. The Voter Registration Committee has partnered with the National Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law to develop educational programming and outreach tools, and to collaborate with other established civic platforms.

On June 30, 2022, the Big Ten Conference furthered its legacy of transformation when the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) voted unanimously to admit UCLA and USC to the conference effective Aug. 2, 2024. Competition will begin for all conference sports in the 2024-25 academic year.

In July of 2022, the Big Ten traveled a delegation of student-athletes and administrators from its member institutions to Selma and Montgomery, Alabama, for an immersive experience entitled: "Big Life Series: Selma to Montgomery." The pilgrimage to one of the key centers of the civil rights movement was highlighted by a march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, which is the site of the 1965 Bloody Sunday attack. The delegation also visited the Montgomery Interpretive Center on the campus of Alabama State University to learn more about the profound impact that students had on the civil rights movement, and the significance of the Knight vs. Alabama landmark trial which ended the segregation of funding in higher education across the State of Alabama.

In April of 2023, the Big Ten announced that Petitti was selected as the conference's seventh commissioner. With nearly four decades of sports, business and media industry acumen, he served as deputy commissioner and chief operating officer of Major League Baseball and president and chief executive officer of MLB Network. A 14-time National Sports Emmy Award winner, Petitti also held senior executive roles at CBS Sports and ABC Sports overseeing rights acquisition deals for a variety of sports leagues and collegiate and professional sports events, including the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, regular season men's basketball, college football, NFL, PGA Tour, the Masters, U.S. Open Tennis Championships, and the Little League World Series, as well as leading in the creation of the Bowl Championship Series to determine college football's national champion.

On Aug. 4, 2023, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors voted unanimously to admit the University of Oregon and the University of Washington to the conference effective Aug. 2, 2024, with competition to begin in all sports for the 2024-25 academic year. With the schools' admission, Oregon and Washington would also join the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), a consortium of world-class research institutions dedicated to advancing their academic missions.

More than 125 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.

YOUNG HUSKERS LAY FOUNDATION FOR FUTURE



Miu Takahashi (Nasu-machi, Japan) closed her four-year Nebraska career ranked No. 3 in school history with a 74.78 stroke average. She also ranked among the top 10 golfers in Husker history with 131.5 career rounds. Takahashi's 74.67 stroke average in 2024-25 tied for 10th among all seniors in the Big Red record book.

A young Nebraska women's golf roster improved throughout the season to lay the foundation for the future of the program.

Head coach Jeanne Sutherland announced her retirement after 28 years as a collegiate coach midway through the season, paving the way for the hiring of three-time Missouri Valley Conference Coach-of-the-Year Breanne Hall as Nebraska's newest head coach on May 15, 2025.

On the course, senior Miu Takahashi completed a solid four-year career by leading the Huskers with a 74.67 stroke average over a team-best 33 rounds in 2024-25. Takahashi, who was a key member of Nebraska's 2023 NCAA Regional team, finished with the No. 3 career stroke average (74.78) in school history while ranking ninth all time at NU with 131.5 career rounds.

Takahashi, who came to Nebraska from Nasu-machi, Japan, was joined in the senior class by fifth-year golfer Andrea Velez. The senior from Colombia competed in 12 rounds for the Big Red and managed a 78.08 stroke average in her final season.

Arden Louchheim continued to provide a reliable presence in the Husker lineup throughout the season. The sophomore from Park City, Utah competed in 24 rounds for the Huskers and produced a 76.13 stroke average on the year.

The rest of Nebraska's primary contributors throughout 2024-25 were first-year golfers in the Husker lineup.

Eden Lohrbach, a four-time Iowa player of the year at Ames High School, experienced some growing pains in her first collegiate season but still provided solid scores for the Huskers. Lohrbach competed in 27 rounds, which ranked third on the team, while finishing the year with Nebraska's fifth-best stroke average (75.85). Lohrbach was also Nebraska's top finisher at the Big Ten Championship, tying for 61st at 228 with consistent rounds of 75, 77 and 76 in challenging conditions throughout the tournament at Bulle Rock Golf Club in Havre de Grace (April 18-20).

Fellow freshman Danica Lundgren also made

an instant impact. The talented young golfer from Texas competed in 23 rounds, which ranked fourth on the team, while compiling a 75.70 stroke average. Lundgren's rookie season was highlighted by a tie for third at the PDI Intercollegiate - Hosted by UCF in Orlando, Fla., which included Nebraska's season-best individual score of 207 (-9) that featured rounds of 68, 72 and 67.

Lundgren's performance, which came in her second collegiate lineup appearance, was the best total by any Husker on the 2024-25 in their collegiate careers. She closed her freshman campaign by contributing two rounds for the Big Red at the Big Ten Championship in Maryland.

Olivia Lovegrove, a Lincoln native, added a spark late in the season for the Nebraska lineup. The Lincoln Christian High School graduate made her collegiate debut as an individual at the Westbrook Spring Invitational, before posting a top-20 individual finish at the MountainView Collegiate in early March. Those performances earned her a lineup spot at the Terps Invitational to end the regular season, before she put up second and third-round scores for the Huskers at the Big Ten Championship. Lovegrove finished with a 75.64 stroke average over 11 rounds.

In addition to the major contributions from Nebraska's trio of true freshmen, three sophomore transfers were also major players for the Huskers throughout 2024-25.

Hannah Kono finished second among the Huskers with a 74.93 stroke average over 30 rounds. The sophomore from Enköping, Sweden, led Nebraska with four top-25 individual finishes on the season and matched Takahashi for NU's

No. 2 finish at the Big Ten Championship with a tie for 74th (232).

Lauren Thiele added 21 rounds for the Huskers and finished with a 76.19 stroke average, while fellow redshirt sophomore Symran Shah closed with a 76.94 stroke average over 17 rounds.

As a team, Nebraska ended the year with a 299.88 stroke average, which ranked seventh in school history. The Huskers return 156 of their 201 competitive rounds from a year.

Nebraska continued its tradition of academic success. Louchheim and Thiele were named WGCA Scholastic All-Americans, increasing NU's all-time nation-leading total, while Louchheim and graduate student Brooke Bream were named Big Ten Distinguished Scholars. Both were joined by Mackenzie Bream, Takahashi and Velez in earning Academic All-Big Ten accolades.

As a team, the Huskers produced a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate for the 20th consecutive season. The Huskers also continued a tradition of excellence in the community, as all 12 golfers on the roster earned spots on the annual Tom Osborne Citizenship Team for the third consecutive year.

LISA JOHNSON (2019-22)

Lisa Johnson was named the fourth head coach in program history on June 17, 2019. She came to NU after serving as the head coach at Idaho (2007-19). In her first season at Nebraska, Johnson helped Kate Smith become NU's first All-Big Ten golfer since 2012. Smith also captured Nebraska's first Mary Fossum Award for owning the Big Ten's best stroke average. After the COVID-19 pandemic cut the 2019-20 season short, Johnson guided the Huskers to their best conference tournament finish since 1984 by tying for second at the 2021 Big Ten Championship. Kate Smith became Nebraska's first Big Ten Champion and the Huskers made their first NCAA Regional appearance since 2008. Johnson left NU following the 2021-22 season after her husband, John, was named the Athletic Director at Portland State.

JEANNE SUTHERLAND (2022-25)

Jeanne Sutherland was named the fifth head coach of the Nebraska women's golf program, May 5, 2022, after spending one season as an associate head coach under Lisa Johnson. In 25 seasons as a head coach before coming to Nebraska, Sutherland led 18 teams to NCAA Regional play, including four NCAA Championship bids. She was a two-time NCAA regional/district coach of the year and a four-time conference coach of the year. She coached three individuals to All-America honors and five individual conference champions during her time at Texas A&M (1992-2007) and SMU (2011-21). She guided Nebraska to an NCAA Regional berth in 2023. She retired at the end of the 2024-25 season.

Joanne Brooks

The first NCAA All-American in Nebraska women's golf history, Joanne Brooks was one of the best golfers ever to compete for the Huskers.

When Brooks completed her eligibility after the 1993 season, she held nearly every NU individual school record. She earned All-Big Eight Conference and academic All-Big Eight honors three times. Brooks won the Edith Munson Award given to the nation's top student-athlete, was named an WGCA Scholastic All-American in 1990, 1991 and 1992, and was named to Nebraska's 25 Women of Distinction List in April 2000.

A native of Tauranga, New Zealand, Brooks was the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Committee President.

First Team, 2003

Sarah Sasse became Nebraska's first women's golfer to earn first-team All-America honors in 2003. One of 11 golfers to make the All-America list, Sasse was the only Big 12 golfer selected. Sasse was the 2003 Big 12 Player of the Year, a 2003 Scholastic All-American, the 2003 April Big 12 Golfer of the Month, a three-time All-Big 12 honoree, a four-time academic All-Big 12 pick and a three-time NCAA participant. She also set the school record for best 36- and 54-hole scores with 138 and 209, respectively. The Lincoln native graduated from Nebraska in 2003 with a degree in marketing. She was selected as the first women's golfer inducted into the University of Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2015.

Honorable Mention, 2021

Nebraska's third women's golf All-American, Kate Smith claimed WGCA honorable-mention accolades after capturing the 2021 Big Ten Championship. In a remarkable season, Smith tied the Big Ten tournament record and her own school record with a final-round 64 (-8) to storm to the title. She helped Nebraska to its best conference team finish (tied for second) since 1984. In a history-making season, Smith became the first Husker to compete in the Augusta National Women's Amateur and the first Nebraska men's or women's golfer to play in the Arnold Palmer Cup. Smith represented the United States in the Palmer Cup and went 3-1 to play a key role in a 33-27 U.S. victory. She earned her LPGA Tour card in 2025.

Chartered in Lincoln by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a university system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration. Nebraska is also a land-grant university and a member of the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities. The university is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission.

As a member of the Big Ten, the University of Nebraska–Lincoln is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), which is the academic consortium of the universities in the Big Ten Conference. The BTAA includes all 18 Big Ten Institutions and partners with the University of Chicago. Being in the Big Ten Academic Alliance gives Nebraska several advantages, including: access to library collections across the conference, reduced costs through tech collaborations, lower student costs on course materials through collective purchasing and licensing, and study abroad partnerships and course-sharing agreements — students can take courses across Big Ten institutions.

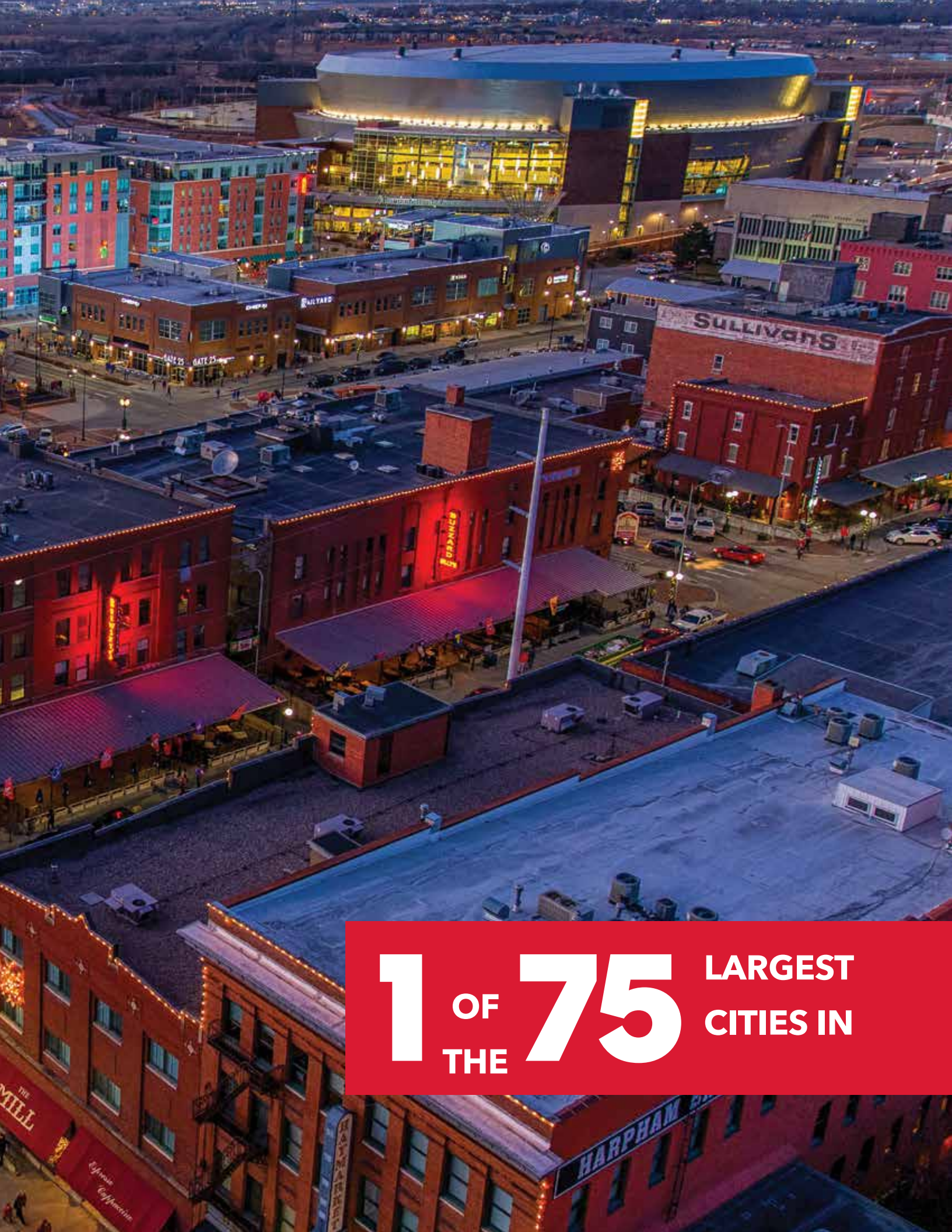

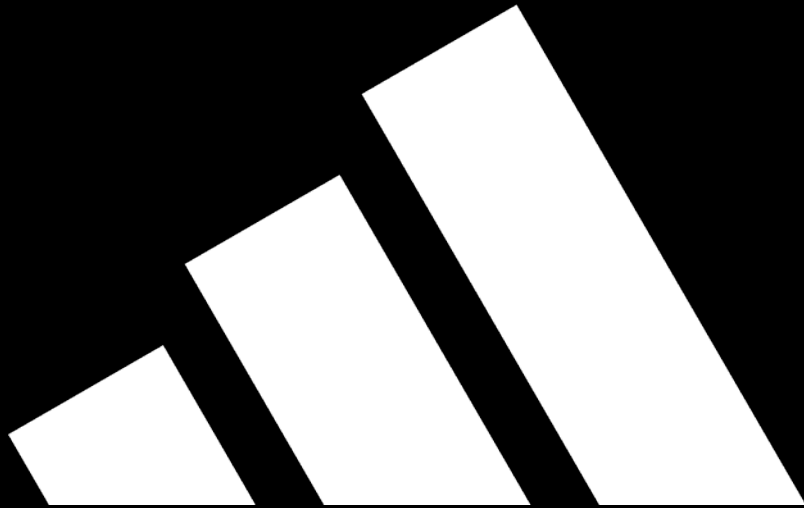
