

The Nebraska women's basketball team returns for its 13th season at Pinnacle Bank Arena in the Haymarket District of downtown Lincoln.

Since the opening of Pinnacle Bank Arena on Nov. 8, 2013, the Huskers have averaged well over 5,000 fans per game at PBA, including 5,638 fans per game in 2024-25 to rank 16th nationally. Overall, the Big Red have ranked among the top 25 teams in NCAA Division I women's basketball in average home attendance for 15 consecutive seasons.

Nebraska celebrated its first sellout of PBA for women's basketball with 15,042 fans witnessing an 82-79 win over No. 2 lowa (Feb. 11, 2024).

Nebraska tips off its 2025-26 regular season against Northwestern State on Monday, Nov. 3 at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Last season, more than 3,800 middle grades students and accompanying adults from 75 schools around the state of Nebraska experienced a field trip to Pinnacle Bank Arena for the annual program promoting leadership and sportsmanship. The program will begin at 9:30 a.m. and will feature current and former Husker studentathletes. The event, which is co-sponsored by Nebraska Athletics and the Nebraska High School Sports Hall of Fame, attracted 8,106 fans for a win over Omaha a year ago.

FRED **Hoiberg**

HEAD COACH I SEVENTH SEASON

ALMA MATER (YEAR): IOWA STATE (1995)
NCAA RECORD: 199-164 (11 SEASONS)

Fred Hoiberg's career has revolved around the sport of basketball. The grandson of a professional basketball player and collegiate coach, Hoiberg has followed a similar path, spending three decades as a player, coach or executive in Division I basketball and the National Basketball Association.

Hoiberg is in his seventh season as Nebraska's men's basketball coach in 2024-25. Hoiberg, who was born in Lincoln, is the 28th coach in program history, a fraternity that includes his grandfather, Jerry Bush, who guided the Husker program for nine seasons from 1955 to 1963. Hoiberg's ties run deep to Nebraska as his other grandfather, Otto Hoiberg, was a history professor at the University, while his father, Eric, received his doctorate degree from Nebraska.

Hoiberg has experienced immense success at the collegiate level. He won more games than any other player during his time as a Cyclone guard and then returned to post the top winning percentage of any coach in Iowa State history. He won four NCAA Tournament games at Iowa State – a program record – and developed four players who eventually became NBA Draft picks and four All-Americans in his five seasons. At Nebraska, he has steadily built the Husker program, guiding the Huskers to an NCAA Tournament berth in 2023-24 and the first-ever College Basketball Crown title last season. Over the last two years, NU has won 44 games, the second-best two-year win total in program history.

Nebraska enjoyed a successful season in 2024-25, matching a school record with four wins over ranked opponents before culminating the year with 21 wins and the first-ever

College Basketball Crown title. The CBC championship marked the second trophy of the season, as the Huskers won the 2024 Diamond Head Invitational, picking up its first neutral-site MTE title in nearly a quarter century. Brice Williams put together one of the best seasons in school history, setting a single-season school record with 713 points on his way to becoming the first Husker since 2018 to earn first-team All-Big Ten honors.

In 2023-24 Nebraska went 23-11, the second-highest win total in school history, and reached the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2014. The Huskers tied for third in the Big Ten, marking the program's best conference finish in more than 30 years. Nebraska averaged 77.7 points per game, a total which was the program's highest average since 1995-96, while leading the Big Ten with 9.5 3-pointers per game. NU's season was highlighted by a pair of top-10 wins, including an 88-72 win over No. 1 Purdue, which was NU's first win over a No. 1 team since 1982. That was another full circle moment for Hoiberg, as his grandfather, Jerry Bush was the architect behind the Huskers' first-ever win over a No. 1 team back in 1958.

For Nebraska's efforts, Hoiberg shared Big Ten Coach of the Year honors by both the coaches and media, while Keisei Tominaga (second team) and Rienk Mast (third team) were all-conference honorees. Hoiberg also was honored as the Jim Phalen National Coach of the Year and was tabbed as the NABC District VII Coach of the Year.

The 2022-23 season saw Nebraska make significant steps by winning 16 games and posting a 9-11 mark in Big Ten play. The nine conference wins were NU's highest total since 2017-18, despite having a pair of starters suffer season-ending injuries. Behind All-Big Ten performers Derrick Walker and Keisei Tominaga, the Huskers won six of their last eight regular-season games. NU also posted its second top-10 road win in as many years with a victory at No. 7 Creighton in non-conference action, the first top-10 non-conference road win in school history.

In 2021-22, Nebraska averaged 73.3 points per game, a total which was fourth in the Big Ten. Freshman Bryce McGowens was named Big Ten Newcomer of the Year by the Associated Press and a third-team all-conference pick, while Alonzo Verge Jr. led the Big Ten with 5.5 assists per game. The Huskers had an NBA Draft pick for the second straight year, as Bryce McGowens was the No. 40 pick in the 2022 NBA Draft, the highest drafted Nebraska player since 1998. McGowens became the 12th Hoiberg-coached player to reach the NBA.

The 2020-21 season saw the Huskers climb to 40th nationally in defensive efficiency, despite a lineup which featured four new starters. NU ranked second in school history with 8.44 3-pointers per game while facing a top-10 schedule for the second straight season. Dalano Banton was a second-round pick by the Toronto Raptors in the 2021 NBA Draft after leading the Huskers in both assists and rebounds.

In his first season, the Huskers began to adapt to Hoiberg's system, ranking in the top three of the Big Ten in both 3-pointers per game (third) and turnover margin (second). NU which had one returning letterwinner, posted wins over Purdue and Iowa.

CHICAGO BULLS HEAD COACH

Hoiberg was named an NBA head coach just five years into his coaching career. He led Chicago to immediate success, as the Bulls finished with a 42-40 record in his first year in 2015-16, when Hoiberg became just the fifth coach in franchise history to have

a winning record in his debut season. The next season, Hoiberg took Chicago to the Eastern Conference Playoffs. The No. 8 seed Bulls went on the road and won the first two games of a firstround series against the top-seed Boston Celtics, becoming the first No. 8 seed to take a 2-0 lead against a No. 1 seed since 1993. Hoiberg became the fifth coach in NBA history to have each of his first two career playoff victories come on the road. The 2017 playoffs also marked the first time Chicago had won the first two games of a playoff series on the road since the 1993 NBA Finals. Overall, Chicago won more than 40 games in two of Hoiberg's three full seasons.

IOWA STATE HEAD COACH

Hoiberg led a resurgence at his alma mater, leaving a lasting legacy in five seasons. He guided lowa State to a 115-56 record – including a 99-40 mark in his final four seasons – to post the

final four seasons – to post the top winning percentage (.673) in Cyclone history. Hoiberg led Iowa State to a program-record four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, while tying the school record with four NCAA Tournament coaching victories. Hoiberg also posted the top conference winning percentage (.557) in ISU history and guided Iowa State to back-to-back Big 12

Hoiberg inherited a Cyclone program that had not made the NCAA Tournament or had a winning conference record in five years. But after just one rebuilding year, Hoiberg guided the Cyclones to four consecutive NCAA Tournaments before leaving for the NBA. His 115 wins were the most by any coach in a five-year span in lowa State history.

After a 16-16 debut season, Hoiberg led the Cyclones to a 23-11 record and the third round of the 2012 NCAA Tournament. ISU went 12-6 in Big 12 play in Hoiberg's second season, winning nine more conference games than the previous season to post the biggest one-year turnaround in Big 12 history. Hoiberg was named the Big 12 Co-Coach of the Year for his efforts.

Hoiberg guided the Cyclones to another 23-win season in his third year, when Iowa State advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year. In his fourth season, the Cyclones finished 28-8, won the 2014 Big 12 Tournament and advanced to the Sweet 16. In Hoiberg's final season, Iowa State defended its Big 12 Tournament title and earned a No. 3 seed for the NCAA Tournament.

Hoiberg oversaw one of the nation's top offenses during his tenure at Iowa State. The Cyclones led the Big 12 with an average of 77.9 points per game in Hoiberg's final four seasons, ranking in the top 10 nationally in scoring twice in those four seasons. His Cyclones led the Big 12 in 3-pointers in four of his five seasons and in his final season at ISU, his team led the conference in scoring offense (77.8), field goal percentage (.476) assists per game (16.1), turnovers per game (11.0) and 3-pointers per game (7.7).

Hoiberg also excelled at player development at Iowa State, producing four players who were selected in the NBA Draft. He also coached four All-Americans and 12 All-Big 12 players, including 2014 Big 12 Player of the Year Melvin Ejim, in his Iowa State tenure.

MINNESOTA TIMBERWOLVES FRONT OFFICE

After spending the final two seasons of his 10-year NBA career in Minnesota, Hoiberg transitioned into the Timberwolves' front office. Hoiberg served as the team's vice president of basketball operations in his final season, overseeing the day-to-day operations of basketball programs including college and pro scouting, salary cap management and NBA Draft preparations. He served as the Timberwolves' assistant

general manager in his first three seasons in the front office, where he helped Minnesota orchestrate a draft-day trade for five-time all-star Kevin Love in 2008.

NBA PLAYING CAREER

Hoiberg was a 10-year NBA veteran, playing for the Indiana Pacers (four seasons), Chicago Bulls (four seasons) and Minnesota Timberwolves (two seasons). Hoiberg played in 541 games in his NBA career and was a member of three playoff teams, including a Timberwolves team that reached the 2004 Western Conference Finals. Hoiberg scored 2,944 points in his NBA career, and he was a 40 percent career 3-point shooter. Hoiberg led the NBA in 3-point shooting percentage in his final season in 2004-05 (48.3 percent) and was fourth in 2003-04 (44.2 percent).

His pro career ended abruptly at the age of 33 after undergoing open-heart surgery to repair an aneurysm in his aortic root. Hoiberg was a second-round pick in the 1995 NBA Draft, when the Indiana Pacers chose him with the 54th overall selection.

IOWA STATE AND HIGH SCHOOL PLAYING CAREER

Hoiberg was a four-year starter at lowa State from 1991 to 1995. He is a member of the ISU Hall of Fame and his No. 32 jersey was retired in 1997. Hoiberg is also a member of the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame. Hoiberg was a two-time academic All-America selection as a player, including a first-team honoree as a senior. On the court, Hoiberg was recognized as a two-time All-Big Eight selection in addition to being named the 1992 Associated Press Big Eight Freshman of the Year and the 1995 Co-Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year. Hoiberg was also named a third-team All-American as a senior, averaging 19.9 points per game to help the Cyclones win a then-school-record 23 games.

Hoiberg started 123 of his 126 games as a Cyclone with career averages of 15.8 points, 6.9 rebounds, 2.8 assists and 1.6 steals per game. The Iowa State record holder for consecutive made free throws (34) and steals in a game (7), Hoiberg currently ranks fourth on the Cyclones' all-time scoring chart (1,993 points) and is in the top 10 in five other categories. He made 183 3-pointers in his career and won 78 games, both of which were the most in school history at the time of his graduation.

Hoiberg was a standout athlete for Ames High School before remaining in his hometown to attend Iowa State. As a senior, Hoiberg was Iowa's Mr. Basketball and he was also the Iowa Gatorade Player of the Year in football. On the basketball court, Hoiberg averaged 38.1 points per game in six tournament games while leading Ames to a state championship as a senior. On the gridiron, Hoiberg turned down a football scholarship offer from Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne to play basketball at Iowa State.

PERSONAL

The son of an Iowa State professor, Hoiberg earned his degree in finance from Iowa State in 1995. He was born in Lincoln on Oct. 15, 1972, and his grandfather, Jerry Bush, was Nebraska's men's basketball head coach for nine seasons from 1955 to 1963. Fred and his wife, Carol, have four children: one daughter, Paige; and three sons, Jack and twins Sam and Charlie.



Hoiberg spent 10 years in the NBA and ranked in the top five of the NBA in 3-point shooting in his final two seasons in the league. In 2004-05, he shot 48.3 percent from 3-point range to lead the NBA.

AMY WILLIAMS

Head Coach 10th Season Nebraska (1998)

A proven program builder, Amy Williams enters her 10th season as Nebraska's head coach in 2025-26, after guiding the Huskers to their second straight NCAA Tournament appearance and third in the last four years, while making their fifth consecutive postseason appearance.

The 2024-25 Huskers closed their second straight 20-win season with a 21-12 record and a 10-8 Big Ten mark. The Big Red added a pair of Big Ten Tournament wins on its way to an NCAA Tournament first-round game with Louisville in Fort Worth, Texas. Lincoln native Alexis Markowski wrapped up her Nebraska career as the first Husker to be a four-time first- or second-team all-conference selection. NU's career double-doubles leader (53), Markowski earned first-team All-Big Ten honors for the second straight season and finished No. 2 at Nebraska in career rebounds (1,220) and No. 7 in career points (1,902).

Britt Prince also emerged as one of the nation's best young point guards. The Omaha native earned Big Ten All-Freshman recognition while adding honorable-mention all-conference accolades. She averaged 13.4 points, 4.0 rebounds and team bests of 3.8 assists and 1.7 steals. Prince, who earned USBWA National Freshman-of-the-Week honors after leading the Huskers to a road win at lowa (Jan. 16), was Nebraska's Female Freshman Athlete of the Year across all sports.

Nebraska's 2024-25 success came despite an early season injury to 2024 Big Ten Freshman of the Year Natalie Potts, who played in just five games before suffering the injury in a win over North Alabama (Nov. 16). Through the Big Red's first four games, Potts was Nebraska's leading scorer (17.0 ppg) and rebounder (8.0 rpg).

The Huskers suffered a second major setback with the loss of Allison Weidner to injury in early January, just days after she led the Big Red to an 85-80 home win over No. 20 Michigan State (Jan. 8).

Despite the challenges, the Huskers notched five wins over 2025 NCAA Tournament teams during the season, including a resounding 91-71 road win at No. 17 Maryland (Feb. 13). Nebraska also continued to be one of the top attractions in women's college basketball, averaging 5,638 fans per game to rank 16th nationally in home attendance at Pinnacle Bank Arena. It was the 15th straight season NU ranked in the top 25 in average home attendance.

Nebraska also continued to feature a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate in women's basketball.

Nebraska's accomplishments in 2024-25 followed its best season in a decade in 2023-24. The Big Red claimed a first-round NCAA Tournament win over Texas A&M after earning a No. 6 seed in March Madness. The victory followed NU's run to its first Big Ten Championship Game appearance since 2014.

The tough Huskers secured a win over Purdue before notching double-digit wins over NCAA Tournament-bound Michigan State and Maryland to set up a third showdown with No. 3 lowa in the title game. The Huskers controlled the action in much of the contest and took the Hawkeyes to overtime before falling 94-89 in the championship.

Nebraska finished with a 23-12 record that included an 11-7 Big Ten mark to take fifth in the conference standings. NU's season featured an 82-79 win over then-No. 2 lowa in front of a sellout crowd of more than 15,000 at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Feb. 11). The victory over the Hawkeyes matched the highest-ranked team the Huskers had ever defeated. It was one of five wins over NCAA Tournament teams the Huskers notched from Feb. 6 through the end of the season, as Nebraska went 9-4 down the stretch with road losses to No. 2 Ohio State and No. 12 Oregon State, along with a loss to No. 3 lowa in Minneapolis.

During Nebraska's late-season surge, the Huskers completed a sweep of NCAA Tournament-bound Michigan (Feb. 6) and their first-ever sweep of NCAA-bound Maryland (March 9) in the Big Ten Tournament. The Huskers also locked up a season sweep of NCAA qualifier Michigan State (March 8), and a three-game season sweep of WNIT Great Eight participant Purdue (Feb. 17, March 7). The Big Red added a 19-point home win over WNIT semifinalist Minnesota (Feb. 24).

The Huskers finished No. 25 in the NET rankings with 17 of their 23 wins coming against postseason qualifiers (8 NCAA, 3 WBIT, 6 WNIT).

Nebraska's success in 2023-24 came despite losing projected starting guard Allison Weidner to a season-ending injury in mid-October, and an injury to returning starter and graduate guard Maddie Krull prior to the start of the season. Krull's injury not only kept her out of the first three games, it limited her contributions throughout the season.

Nebraska continued to improve throughout the season behind the consistency of first-team All-Big Ten center Alexis Markowski and the leadership of second-team All-Big Ten guard Jaz Shelley. Two of the top players in the nation, Markowski and Shelley both claimed All-Big Ten honors for the third consecutive seasons before earning spots on the Big Ten All-Tournament Team. Shelley went on to be the No. 29 pick in the WNBA Draft by the Phoenix Mercury.

Nebraska's most experienced players also got help from a pair of award-winning freshmen. Natalie Potts emerged as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year while being joined on the Big Ten All-Freshman Team by Logan Nissley.

In addition to the individual awards won by the Huskers, Nebraska's success showed in the record book, including a school-record 292 made threes while ranking second in NU history with a plus-7.8 rebound margin. The 2023-24 Huskers also ranked fifth in school history with 2,533 points, fourth in rebounds (1,431) and third in assists (580).

Nebraska ranked 15th nationally with 6,088 fans per game. Every game in the 2024 Big Ten Tournament drew more than 18,000 fans at the Target Center in Minneapolis, while NU's Big Ten Tournament Championship Game appearance attracted 4.77 million viewers on CBS - the highest ratings for a women's basketball game on CBS in two decades.

Williams, who earned a contract extension through the 2028-29 season, also led Nebraska to the Big Dance in 2022, after the Huskers ran to a 24-9 record that included a final No. 23 NET ranking and a trip to the 2022 Big Ten Tournament semifinals. In 2022-23, the Huskers overcame multiple season-ending injuries to starting guards to advance to the WNIT Super 16 and finish with an 18-15 overall record.

Shelley earned first-team All-Big Ten honors, while Markowski captured second-team All-Big Ten accolades for the second straight year in 2023. Three-time honorable-mention All-Big Ten forward Isabelle Bourne also helped Nebraska meet its challenges head on before embarking on her professional career in Australia.

In 2021-22, the Huskers put one of their most complete teams on the floor, ranking 10th nationally in scoring (77.8 ppg), 13th in assists (17.4 apg), 18th in scoring margin (+13.5 ppg), while leading the Big Ten, setting a school record and ranking 21st nationally in three-pointers made per game (8.5). NU also led the Big Ten and ranked 23rd in the nation in rebounding (41.8 rpg), while leading the Big Ten in field goal percentage defense (.385).

Nebraska fans showed up in droves to watch their beloved Big Red despite continued challenges caused by the COVID pandemic. The Huskers ranked 14th nationally in total attendance (76,317) and 18th in average home attendance (4,489) in 2021-22.

The Husker faithful went home happy, as Nebraska tied a school record with 16 home victories, including a trio of home wins over 2022 NCAA Sweet Sixteen qualifiers (Indiana, Michigan, Creighton). Overall, Nebraska notched four wins against Sweet Sixteen teams, including a victory over Michigan in the Big Ten Tournament quarterfinals.

Nebraska's three wins over top-10 teams (No. 8 Michigan, 79-58, Jan. 4; No. 5 Indiana, 72-55, Feb. 14; No. 10 Michigan, 76-73, March 4) marked the second time in school history the Big Red posted multiple wins over top-10 teams in a season. NU's 21-point home win over the Wolverines matched the largest margin in NU history over a top-10 foe, while the 17-point win over the Hoosiers was Nebraska's largest margin ever against a top-five opponent.

Four Huskers earned All-Big Ten honors in 2021-22, led by newcomers Shelley (Second Team/All-Defensive) and Markowski (Second Team/Big Ten Freshman of the Year) and captains Sam Haiby and Isabelle Bourne, who were both honorable mention.

Williams, who proved herself as a winner and a program builder in her first nine seasons as a collegiate head coach, returned to her alma mater to lead a new stage in the Husker program when she was hired as Nebraska's head coach on April 11, 2016.

In her second season with the Big Red, Williams showed she could get a program moving in a hurry, leading the nation's top turnaround on her way to 2018 Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year honors. The Huskers earned a bid to the 2018 NCAA Tournament and finished with a 21-11 record - a nation-leading 14-game turnaround in the win column over 2016-17. Nebraska was plus-eight in the win column in Big Ten play, finishing with an 11-5 mark and claiming the No. 3 seed in the Big Ten Tournament. The Huskers added a win over No. 24 Michigan in the Big Ten quarterfinals to advance to the semifinals for the first time since 2014.

Defensively, Nebraska led the Big Ten with a school-record field goal percentage defense (.371) while also leading the conference in three-point field goal percentage defense (.299). The Huskers improved 12.7 points per game defensively over the 2016-17 campaign and were six points per game better on the offensive end.

In 2019-20, Williams led the Huskers back to postseason eligibility with a 17-13 record before the season was ended by COVID-19.

Nebraska, which revamped its roster in 2020-21, was anchored by 6-5 center Kate Cain who earned honorable-mention All-Big Ten recognition. Nebraska's career leader in blocked shots (352), Cain



claimed her third spot on the Big Ten All-Defensive Team. She was a three-time Lisa Leslie Award candidate and one of 15 finalists for Naismith National Defensive Player of the Year.

Cain, who completed her fourth season on the court at Nebraska following her early graduation in the summer of 2020, signed a free agent training camp contract with the WNBA's Las Vegas Aces in 2021 before playing professionally overseas.

Sam Haiby and Isabelle Bourne added All-Big Ten

Sam Haiby and Isabelle Bourne added All-Big Ten honors in 2020-21. NU's MVP, Haiby earned secondteam recognition as the only player to rank among the Big Ten's top 15 in scoring (11th, 16.8 ppg), rebounding (15th, 6.8 rpg) and assists (8th, 4.4 apg).

Bourne, a 6-2 forward from Canberra, Australia, added honorable-mention All-Big Ten recognition by averaging 13.6 points, 7.5 rebounds and 2.5 assists as one of the Big Ten's most versatile players. Bourne, Haiby and Cain powered Nebraska to five wins over top-25 Big Ten teams during the season.

Williams was a four-year letterwinner (Amy Gusso, 1995-96-97-98) at Nebraska, playing for coaches Angela Beck and Paul Sanderford before embarking on a career in coaching. The academic All-Big 12 honoree earned her bachelor's degree from Nebraska as a biology and mathematics major in 1998, before earning her master's degree in sports administration from Nebraska-Kearney in 2002.

Williams spent four successful seasons (2013-16) as the head coach at South Dakota, where she led the Coyotes to four straight postseason appearances. She led USD to a 32-6 record that culminated with a WNIT Championship in 2015-16. The Coyotes won the Summit League regular-season title with a 15-1 mark, and she was named the Summit League Coach of the Year for the second consecutive season.

Her gritty pack of Coyotes posted a Division I school-record 32 wins (32-3), surpassing the 26 her Yotes totaled in 2014-15, when she won her first Summit League Coach-of-the-Year award. Over Williams' final two seasons at USD, her teams went 58-14 (.806), including 28-4 in the Summit League with a pair of regular-season conference crowns.

She led USD to a school-record 16 straight wins before falling to South Dakota State in the Summit League title game. The Coyotes defeated the same SDSU team that advanced to the NCAA Tournament second round twice during the season. Five of USD's six losses in 2015-16 came to teams that advanced to postseason play, including a loss to NCAA Women's Final Four qualifier Washington.

Williams' team rolled to a WNIT title with six straight wins, including wins over Creighton, Minnesota, Northern Iowa, Western Kentucky and a whopping 34-point victory over Oregon before beating Florida Gulf Coast.

She finished her four-year stint in Vermillion by averaging 24 victories per year in her first stop as an NCAA Division I head coach. She led the Coyotes to four straight Summit League championship games.

In 2014-15, Williams guided USD to a 26-8 mark that included a trip to the second round of the WNIT. The Coyotes went 13-3 on their way to a Summit League regular-season title. Their 2014-15 success represented a seven-game improvement in the win column over 2013-14 (19-14), when they won the Summit League Tournament title. That team earned an automatic bid to the 2014 NCAA Tournament before falling to Stanford in the first round.

In her first season at South Dakota, Williams finished with a 19-16 record and earned a trip to the Women's Basketball Invitational semifinals.

Williams, began her head coaching career with a unique opportunity at Rogers State in Oklahoma. She was named the first-ever head women's basketball coach for the fledgling program in 2007-08 and built the program from the ground up. Her stay at the Claremore, Okla., school culminated with a trip to the NAIA Elite Eight in 2011-12. In five years with the Hillcats, Williams went 97-65, including the school's first trip to the NAIA Tournament in 2010-11.

Williams started her coaching career as a graduate assistant at Nebraska-Kearney (1998-99 to 1999-2000), before earning a full-time assistant role at the University of Texas San Antonio (2000-01). She spent four seasons as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Oklahoma State (2001-02 to 2004-05), before serving a similar role at Tulsa (2005-06 to 2006-07). Williams helped the Golden Hurricane claim its first Conference USA regular-season and tournament championships in 2006. The Hurricane also earned its first trip to the NCAA Tournament and won its first tournament game on its way to a 26-6 record.

Williams was the top assistant and recruiting coordinator at Oklahoma State, and brought the 2003 Big 12 Newcomer of the Year to Stillwater in a class that was ranked No. 19 by All-Star Girls Report. A native of Spearfish, S.D., Williams and her husband, Lloyd, have two daughters Kennadi and Bentli. Kennadi is a redshirt freshman women's basketball player and sophomore softball player at Nebraska in 2025-26.

since 2016 with a 13th-place finish. The women's track team posted their second straight top-10 NCAA finish and placed ninth at the national meet.

Dannen has long been a leader in charting the course for the future of college athletics and that continues at Nebraska. In May of 2025, Dannen was appointed to the College Football Playoff Selection Committee, continuing his impact on the national level. He served from 2021 to 2023 as a member of the NCAA Constitution Committee and the Division I Transformation Committee. He also previously served as chair of the NCAA Football Competition Committee and was an Executive Committee member of the Football Oversight Committee. In total, Dannen has served on seven NCAA committees. In 2022, Dannen was a finalist for Sports Business Journal's Athletic Director of the Year award, and he received the Distinguished American Award from the Sugar Bowl Chapter of the National Football Foundation.

Dannen came to Lincoln after serving as Director of Athletics at the University of Washington. He helped guide the Huskies' transition to the Big Ten Conference and oversaw a football program that reached the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in January of 2024.

He arrived at Washington in the fall of 2023 after serving as Director of Athletics at Tulane University since 2015. While at Tulane, Green Wave student-athletes earned 49 All-America honors, a national championship, 21 conference championships and 41 postseason appearances.

In 2022-23, Tulane football won its first American Athletic Conference football championship and won the Cotton Bowl over USC, which was ranked ninth in the nation at that time. The men's basketball program won 20 regular-season games for the first time in two decades. Additionally, men's tennis advanced to its sixth NCAA Tournament in seven years, both bowling and beach volleyball finished ranked in the top 20, and baseball won the conference championship.

Tulane's football program participated in an unprecedented three consecutive bowl games from

2018 to 2020, winning back-to-back bowl games for the first time in 128 years of football at the University. In the classroom, Tulane student-athletes excelled at a high-level. At the end of the 2022-23 academic year, over 68 percent of Green Wave student-athletes earned a 3.0 GPA or better, with a 93 percent Graduation Success Rate and a record-setting department Academic Progress Report of 992, with seven teams earning a perfect 1000 APR score.

Dannen spearheaded fundraising efforts and numerous capital projects at Tulane. He helped secure the largest unrestricted gift in Tulane Athletics history, an endowment gift that funded the operation of a new sport (sailing), and a \$10 million lead gift for capital renovations, which was the second-largest gift in department history. In addition, marketing and licensing revenue grewfour-fold, and in 2022-23, Tulane football, beat took to the control of the control of

Increases in fundraising and major gift donors positively impacted capital project development and completion. A \$13 million renovation to the Reilly Natatorium, home of the swimming and diving program, as well as \$8 million in renovations to locker rooms and the sports medicine area inside the Wilson Center were completed in 2023. Dannen also oversaw construction of a new dining facility, weight room, basketball and volleyball locker rooms. Tulane also completed a \$2.4 million academic center renovation and a \$5 million television and digital production center.

Dannen came to Tulane after serving eight years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Northern lowa (UNI) from 2008 to 2015. During his tenure, the Panthers enjoyed success at both the conference and national levels, highlighted by an NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in 2010 by the UNI men's basketball team. During his eight-year tenure, UNI was recognized with 39 All-Americans, 13 Coaches of the Year and nine Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) Players of the Year. UNI football, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball and softball combined to reach 15 NCAA tournaments and 20 postseason berths during that stretch. For his efforts, Dannen was recognized as NACDA's FCS Athletic Director of the Year in 2014.

Prior to his time at UNI, Dannen served as the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union's Executive Director for seven years, overseeing 400 high schools and 10 sports.

Dannen grew up on a farm just outside Marshalltown, lowa, and graduated from UNI in 1989 with a degree in communications. He is married to Amy and has four children: Elizabeth, William, Emily and Holly.

An experienced leader in collegiate athletics with a strong Midwestern background, Troy Dannen is in his second year as Nebraska's Director of Athletics. Dannen guides Nebraska's 24-sport athletic department that ranks among the nation's most successful programs both athletically and academically.

Nebraska Åthletics has enjoyed success since Dannen arrived in Lincoln in March of 2024. During the 2024-25 athletic year, five Husker teams finished in the top four nationally, including volleyball, wrestling, men's gymnastics and bowling. The volleyball program reached the Final Four, while the wrestling team posted its highest finish in school history with a national runnerup showing and had multiple national champions for the first time since 1984. The softball program won its first NCAA regional since 2014 while baseball repeated as Big Ten Tournament champions. Overall, Nebraska finished 21st in the final 2024-25 NACDA Director's Cup, the program's highest finish since 2010.

In the spring of 2024, the Husker baseball team won its first Big Ten tournament title, and the men's track team won the Big Ten Outdoor Championships. The men also had their best NCAA Championship showing
