



















### U.S. OLYMPIC TRIALS, HOME IN NEBRASKA



The CHI Health Center in Omaha played host to four consecutive U.S. Olympic Trials (2008, 2012, 2016, 2020). Former Huskers Autumn Haebig and Audrey Coffey earned spots in multiple events to represent Nebraska at the trials during the summer of 2021.

The state of Nebraska played host to the U.S. Olympic Swimming Trials (June 13-20) at the CHI Health Center in Omaha for the fourth consecutive time in 2021. The event, which was a showcase event with sellout crowds of 14,000 for each day of the trials, gave Nebraska a chance to showcase its love and support for swimming. The original 2020 version of the U.S. Olympic Swimming Trials was postponed to 2021 by the world-wide outbreak of the coronavirus.

Nebraska three-time All-American Autumn Haebig advanced to Wave II in three events for the trials, after the Wisconsin native qualified in the 100 back, 200 free and 400 free. In February of 2021, Haebig became Nebraska's first Big Ten swimming champion before claiming All-America honors in both the 200 and 500 freestyles at the 2021 NCAA Championships in March. Haebig set the Nebraska records in the 400-meter free (4:14.96) and 100-meter back (1:01.91), while also establishing NU records in the 100-yard back (52.29), 200-yard free (1:44.39) and 500-yard free (4:41.83) during her time in Lincoln.

Audrey Coffey secured her ticket to Omaha for the U.S. Olympic Trials as she raced to victory in the 1,500-meter free (16:48.76) at the 2019 Speedo Sectionals in Jenks, Okla. Coffey set the school record in the event before adding CSCAA All-America honors in the 1,650-yard free in 2020. The Illinois native also swam to a school-record in the 1,000-yard free (9:48.15) as a junior.

At the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials, the Huskers were represented by Omahans Alexandra Bilunas (50 free) and Erin Oeltjen (100 back, 200 back), and Husker teammates Taryn Collura (Phoenix, Ariz., 50 free, 100 fly), Jordan Ehly (Albuquerque, N.M., 200 breast), Morgan McCafferty (Reynoldsburg, Ohio, 100 back) and Katt Sickle (Grain Valley, Mo., 400 free). The 2016 Huskers tripled the number from the 2012 trials (Bailey Pons, 400 free; Shannon Guy, 100 fly).

The state of Nebraska, the Midwest and the entire swimming community took a monumental step on June 28, 2005, when USA Swimming announced Omaha as the host city for the 2008 U.S. Olympic Swimming Trials. After the 2008



Trials proved to be a resounding success, as well as the subsequent 2012 and 2016 Trials, officials from USA Swimming and the Omaha Sports Commission announced the return of the event to Omaha in 2020

The 2008 Trials drew 160,003 fans over eight days and 15 sessions. The 2016 Trials smashed those numbers, with all 15 sessions sold out and attendance exceeding 200,000 for the first time. In 2004, attendance was just over 100,000.

The CHI Health Center has served as a home away from home for Husker Athletics for many years. In 2015, the Nebraska volleyball team won its fourth NCAA title and its second in Omaha. The 2006 Huskers claimed Nebraska's third NCAA volleyball title in Omaha as well, and the arena played host to the 2012 NCAA Volleyball Championships. Nebraska also hosted the Big 12 Wrestling Championships in the building, while the men's basketball team played a regular-season game against Oregon in 2007.

The 2024 U.S. Olympic Trials moved to Indianapolis, where Huskers Gena Jorgenson and JoJo Randby represented Nebraska. Jorgenson posted career-best times in the 400, 800 and 1,500-meter freestyles, shattering the Husker school record in both the 800 and 1,500.

Randby competed in the 100-meter breaststroke in Indianapolis, while former Husker All-American Abigail Knapton finished fourth in the Synchronized Women's Platform alongside Katerina Hoffman in Knoxville, Tenn.



Autumn Haebig competed in the 200-meter freestyle, 400 free and the 100 backstroke at the 2020 U.S. Olympic Trials in June of 2021 in Omaha. She was joined by teammate Audrey Coffey (1,500-meter free) in advancing to Wave II of the trials at CHI Health Center.

# **JORGENSON, BAXTER HEAD YOUNG TEAM**

After another successful top-40 NCAA Championship run in 2025, the Huskers shoot for more All-American performances in the 2025-26 season with an assortment of veteran and new swimmers.

For her final year, Gena Jorgenson will return after earning back-to-back All-America accolades. After smashing five school records, Jorgenson capped her junior season with a school record in the 1,650 freestyle. At the 2024 NCAA Championships, Jorgenson finished with a time of 15:55.71 and returned a year later, notching a time of 15:49.99. The senior from Aberdeen, S.D., captured a sixth-place finish in the 500 free at the 2025 Big Ten Championships in Columbus, Ohio. Adding another school record time, Jorgenson harnessed a 4:39.31 in the event. Impressively, she added 31 top-five finishes, with 29 being top three.

Alongside Jorgenson, fellow captain Giulia Marchi heads into her final year leading the freestyle swim category. Posting three career-best times last season, Marchi produced 17 top-five finishes last season alongside a school record. At the Hawkeye Invite last November, Marchi set her personal best in the 500 free with a 4:53.43. At the 2025 Big Ten Championships, she grabbed a career time in the 200 free time trials (1:47.69) and contributed to a record-shattering performance in the 800 free relay (7:07.35).

Kelsey Clairmont, a senior from Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada, has made significant contributions to the Huskers in diving throughout her career. Through 13 top-five finishes and 15 zone-qualifying performances last season, Clairmont showed consistency on the one- and three-meter boards. Against Omaha, Clairmont grabbed a pair of first-place finishes on each board, scoring 271.80 and 289.20, respectively. Her platform performance was highlighted by her showing at the Zone D Diving Championships, where she finished with a 10th-place, 259.40.

Frankie Webb closed a strong junior campaign with career-best scores on the one-meter and platform boards. In a win over Illinois in January, she dove to a 255.25 on the one-meter board and later added her personal best against Rutgers and Iowa on the platform (225.30).

Nebraska native Ellee Delcamp joins the Big Red for her final season in the diving well after a top finish last season on the three-meter board. Against Omaha, Delcamp notched a third-place position through her 259.35 dive.

Through 19 top-10 finishes during the season, Beatrix Tanko delivered impressive results in the butterfly and freestyle events. The sophomore from Budapest, Hungary, notched four individual titles in the 100 fly, highlighted by her performance at the Hawkeye Invite, where she cranked a 53.46. She later went on to set a career-best time at the Big Ten Championships with a 52.77. In the freestyle category, Tanko took a 22nd-place finish in the 100 free with a career time of 49.59.

With consistent time improvement throughout the season, Amelia Riggott led a successful sophomore campaign. The conference championships highlighted a career-best time in the 200 breast with her 2:20.00 showing. She delivered continuous improvements in the 100 breast throughout the season, but clocked a personal best at the Hawkeye Invite in November through a 1:01.77 swim.

Abby Baxter headed the diving campaign in her sophomore season as a qualifier on the three-meter board for the 2025 NCAA Championships. In her national debut, Baxter nabbed a 20th-place finish in the three-meter prelims through a score of 299.45. She harnessed 15 zone-qualifying dives during the season and captured six individual titles. Notching a personal best at the Hawkeye Invite in November on the three-meter board (332.45), she went on to capture a top-five finish on the one-meter board with a score of 299.40.

Jordyn Schmucker generated 10 top-five finishes for the Huskers in her second year. At the Hawkeye Invite in November, Schmucker grabbed a personal best on the one-meter board with a 268.30 and ended the season with her performance at the Zone D Diving Championship. She competed on the one-meter board in prelims, scoring 229.15 and finishing 47th.

After recovering from an injury in her freshman year, redshirt sophomore Jenna Brown produced several solid showings in the butterfly and freestyle events. She earned a fourth-place finish in the 200 fly at the Hawkeye Invite by recording a 2:01.94, and achieved a 15th-place finish in the 500 free (4:56.05).

Virginia Consiglio, a late addition to the Huskers in January, added value in the relay efforts as well as the backstroke events. In the 200 and 400 medley relays, Consiglio aided the team at the 2025 Big Ten Championships, pushing the teams to school records in both events. The true freshman from Genova, Italy etched her name into the Nebraska record books early on through the sixth-fastest time in the 200 backstroke (2:00.99). Immediately following her NU debut, she recorded the top time for the team's season in the 100 backstroke (54.09) against Illinois.

In her first season as a Husker, Jenna Gogel added four top-five performances during the 2024-25 season. Her career-best time in the 100 breaststroke came during the conference championship time trials by recording a 1:02.99. Her IM efforts were characterized by her time in the 200 IM against Rutgers and Iowa (2:06.75) as well as at the Hawkeye Invite in the 400 IM (4:20.35).

Swimming in the backstroke and IM events last season, Marissa Laurin, a sophomore from Grand Prairie, Canada, grabbed a pair of titles in the 200 IM. The first came against lowa State, and the second was delivered at the Hawkeye Invite. By the end of the season, she had 21 recorded top-five performances, with over half being top-three caliber.

Jazmyn Lunn, a sophomore from Brookings, S.D., logged three career bests at the conference championship prelims in the 100 fly (54.43), 200 fly (2:00.80) and the 500 free (4:55.92). Throughout the season, Lunn was a notable contributor to the 200 medley and 400 free relays.

In her first year with the Huskers, Riley Miklos amassed 13 top-five finishes in the long freestyle events. Miklos tied for third in the 1,000 free against Illinois with a personal-best time of 10:08.64.

Cutting times in her freshman year, returning sophomore Katy Zboinski worked to her careerbest times in the 100 breast (1:02.99) and the 200 IM (2:03.67) at the conference championships.

Five newcomers will bolster the Huskers in 2025-26. Omaha native Alaira Hadford will

be entered as a freestyle specialist. Hadford highlighted her Omaha Marian career as a member of two Nebraska State Championship teams in 2023 and 2025. Both years she took gold in the 500 free (5:02.52, 2023) and later in 2025, a 4:58.08. Her 200 free relay team captured first in state all four years. Her first win came as a sophomore in the 500 freestyle where she logged a 5:02.52 swim. Hadford went on to producing eight career-best times at the Speedo Sectionals in Columbia, Mo. in the 100, 200, 500, 1,000, and 1,650 freestyles along with the 50 and 200 backstrokes and the 400 IM.

Sophie Kissuk, the newest Canadian addition to the team, will support Nebraska's backstroke and individual medley efforts. The freshman from Etobicoke, Ontario, Canada was a Canadian Olympic Trials Finalist in the 200 back in 2024. She later notched a bronze medal in the event at the Speedo Canadian Championships in 2024. Kissuk also recorded fourth-place finishes in the 50-meter back (29.51), 100 back (1:03.31) and the 200 IM (2:20.64). She added a gold medal at the Ontario Summer Championships in 2024 with a 2:20.64 swim in the 200 IM. Her final individual title in her high school career was claimed in the 200 breaststroke where she also harnessed her SCM career-best time of 2:44.35.

Natalie Dunaway, the true freshman from Kansas City, Mo., helped her high school to two swim and dive state championships in the Class 2 division for the 2024 and 2025 seasons. She collected five individual titles for the state championships, including notable victories in the 50 free (23.23) and 100 free (50.87) during her senior season. Dunaway competed in the Speedo Sectionals in Columbia, Mo. in mid-March, where she added career-best times in the 100 free (50.83), 200 free (1:52.27) and the 50 fly (25.68). Her career best time as a junior in the 50 free where she completed the event in 23.64. As

a sophomore in 2023, Dunaway came in third in the 50 free (54.61) at the state meet. The 200 free relay team she was part of added a runnerup finish during the state tournament through a 1:38.35 swim.

The final freshman to join the Big Red was diver Addy Farman. The newcomer from Snohomish, Wash., will add depth to the one-meter board with her extensive history in diving. Farman was the Washington Class 4A State Champion on the one-meter in 2023 and 2024 representing Glacier Peak High School. At the 2024 USA Diving Junior Region 10 Championships, Farman totaled 351.30 on the one-meter board after putting up a 358.70 at the Region 9 Championships in 2023. At the 2024 USA Diving Zone E Championships, Farman totaled 330.90 on the three-meter dive after a 359.50 her sophomore year. She captured first-team All-Washington in 2023 and 2024 she was also a three-time first-team Wesco All-Conference honor recipient.

The latest addition to the 2025-26 roster is Aurora Zanin, a sophomore from Vittorio Veneto, Italy. The NJCAA Female Swimmer of the Year, Zanin spent her freshman year at Indian River College, where she collected a variety of NJCAA titles. Individually, she swept the 1,650 free, 1,000 free, 400 IM, and 200 fly. She helped her relay teams to championships in the 400 free and 800 free relays. Her 200 fly time stands as an NJCAA record with a time of 1:59.52. She clocked a lifetime best in the 1,650 free at the championship through a 17:24.73 performance. Zanin will assist the Big Red in distance and individual medley events this season.

#### 2024-25 (JUNIOR)

Two-time first-team All-American Gena Jorgenson continued to rewrite the Husker record book while leading Nebraska to a second straight top-35 team finish at the NCAA Championships. The junior from Aberdeen, S.D., smashed two individual school records and became Nebraska's first two-time first-team individual swim All-American since Elvira Fischer in 2001. Jorgenson qualified for three events at the NCAA Championships in Federal Way, Wash., where she shattered her own school record in the 1,650 freestyle. Her time of 15:49.99 pushed her to a sixth-place finish at nationals, after taking eighth in the event as a sophomore in 2024. Jorgenson added a 22nd-place finish in the 500 free at the NCAA Championships, while adding a 39th-place showing in the 400 IM with a season-best 4:13.76. At the 2025 Big Ten Championships, Jorgenson earned a fourth-place finish in the 1,650 free in a time of 15:56.70, just shy of her previous school mark. She set the school record time in the 500 free with an impressive sixth-place finish with a 4:39.31. She added another school-record-time (7:07.35) as part of Nebraska's 800 freestyle relay team at the conference meet, joining Beatrix Tanko, Maisie Gilford and Giulia Marchi in helping the Husker relay to an eighth-place finish. Jorgenson amassed 31 top-five finishes during the season, including 29 top-three performances. She was named the Big Ten Swimmer of the Week, Oct. 30, 2024. During the summer of 2025, Jorgenson finished sixth in the 800-meter freestyle at the Toyota U.S. National Championships in Indianapolis with a Nebraska school-record 8:33.79. In late July, Jorgenson swam to a Nebraska-record and lifetime best in the 1,500-yard free of 16:15.44 at the World University Games in Germany giving way to a bid for Team USA.

## **2023-24 (SOPHOMORE)**

Jorgenson produced a monumental sophomore season, breaking four school records and qualifying for three events at the NCAA Championships in Athens, Ga. Jorgenson swam a then school-record time of 15:55.71 in the 1,650 freestyle at nationals to capture an eighth-place finish and claim first-team All-America honors. She became the first Husker swimmer to earn first-team honors since 2001. Jorgenson posted a career-best time of 4:41.03 in the

500 freestyle and another career-best time of 4:11.51 in the 400 IM to shatter two more school records at nationals. At the Hawkeye Invitational, Jorgenson logged an NCAA B Standard in the 500 free prelims (4:45.60). She posted a winning time of 4:43.87 in the final and added her second title of the meet in the 1,650 freestyle (16:15.82). At the Big Ten Championships, Jorgenson took fifth in 1,650 free (16:01.72) and 10th in the 500 freestyle (4:41.19) while hitting the NCAA B Standard in both events. She also helped the Huskers to an eighth-place finish in the 800 freestyle relay at the Big Ten Championships with the third-fastest time in school history (7:11.31).

#### 2022-23 (FRESHMAN)

Jorgenson unleashed an historic freshman season, twice breaking the 1,650 freestyle school record while punching her ticket to the NCAA Championships. She cut 20 seconds off her previous career-best mile time (16:13.54) at the Big Ten Championships to set a school record and place sixth overall. At NCAAs, Jorgenson broke the record again with a 16:13.34 to place 28th. She added a 41st-place finish in the 400 IM (4:18.00) and a 56th-place showing in the 500 free (4:46.43) at the Allan Jones Aquatic Center in Knoxville, Tenn. Jorgenson added a 13th-place finish in the 500 freestyle at the Big Ten meet with a then-career-best 4:45.02. She also won the 400 IM C Final with a then-careerbest 4:15.95. She swam to a pair of 500 freestyle titles in the first two meets of the season at South Dakota State (5:04.50) and against Iowa State (4:58.68). She added a 1,000 freestyle win against the Cyclones in 10:13.63. NU hosted Minnesota and South Dakota for a double-dual, where Jorgenson notched a pair of runner-up finishes in the 1,000 freestyle and 200 IM with times of 10:15.03 and 2:09.25, respectively. She added a third-place finish in the 500 freestyle, clocking a 5:03.16. At the Iowa dual, Jorgenson won the 1,000 freestyle with a 10:11.44, finished second in the 500 freestyle with a 5:00.64 and took third in the 200 IM with a 2:08.76. At Kansas, Jorgenson pitched in another 1,000 freestyle victory in 10:14.79 and a pair of runnerup finishes in the 500 freestyle (5:00.74) and the 400 IM (4:29.71). Jorgenson swam in the A Final in four different individual races at the competitive Hawkeye Invite. She went on to cut 20 seconds off her previous career-best 1,650 freestyle time, to finish as runner-up in 16:34.48. Adding a trio of top-five finishes, Jorgenson took third in the 500 freestyle (4:48.19) and the 400 IM (4:18.31), while finishing fourth in the 200 freestyle (1:49.03). She was also a member of Nebraska's winning 800 freestyle relay at the invitational (7:16.24).

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Jorgenson left her mark on swim and dive in the state of South Dakota, setting seven individual state records in long course meters and three in short course yards. She won every individual event at the state championship for five-straight seasons. Jorgenson qualified for the Futures Championship, held in July of 2022. It was her third appearance and her best showing at the esteemed event. To qualify, swimmers must record a time that is in the top 3 percent of swimmers in the United States. Jorgenson

swam to titles in the 800-meter and 1,500-meter freestyle events, while placing third in the 400-meter freestyle and fourth in the 400 IM.

#### **PERSONAL**

The daughter of Jason and Lisa Jorgenson, Gena was born in Fairmont, Minn. She has two younger brothers, Andrew and Benjamin. A biological sciences major, Gena earned third-team CSC Academic All-District selection in 2024 and 2025. She was also a Big Ten Distinguished

Scholar and earned Academic All-Big Ten accolades in 2024 and 2025. A three-time first-team CSCAA Scholar All-American, Jorgenson is a six-time Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll selection. A three-time member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team, Jorgenson is a Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Committee representative for the 2025-26 year and also served during the 2024-25 year.

#### 2024-25 (JUNIOR)

Giulia Marchi was a key contributor in the Husker freestyle and relay events in 2024-25. The junior from Italy produced 17 top-five finishes with three career bests and a school record. At the Hawkeye Invitational, Marchi collected a pair of season bests in the 100 (50.86) and 200 freestyles (1:48.41) along with a career best in the 500 free (4:53.43). She also contributed to Nebraska's winning 800 free relay (7:14.79), and NU's second-place finish in the 400 free relay (3:18.25). In the dual with Illinois, Marchi racked up three top-five finishes to give the Huskers a win on senior day. In the 200 free, Marchi clocked a second-place finish with a time of 1:49.77, while taking third in the 500 free (4:58.88) and fourth in the 100 free (51.48). Marchi assisted in the firstplace 400 free relay alongside Beatrix Tanko, JoJo Randby and Maisie Gilford (3:21.15). Marchi finished out her third season with the Huskers at the Big Ten Championships. She notched a season best in the 100 free prelims (50.72) and a career best in the 200 free time trials (1:47.69). Marchi contributed to the second-fastest 400 free relay time (3:18.25) in school history, while teaming with Tanko, Gena Jorgenson and Gilford for a school-record 7:07.35 in the 800 free relay to place eighth.

## **2023-24 (SOPHOMORE)**

Marchi was a key contributor for the Huskers both individually and in relay events. She highlighted her sophomore season with a second-place finish in the 200 freestyle final at the Hawkeye Invitational, swimming a career-best time of 1:49.06. Marchi earned her second career-best time of the meet with her 17th-place finish in the 500 freestyle (4:58.77) and added a sixthplace finish in the 100 freestyle (50.99). Early in the season, at a dual with South Dakota State, Marchi picked up a pair of top-two finishes. She set a career best in the 1,000 freestyle and placed second (10:28.19), while picking up a firstplace finish in the 100 freestyle (52.84). Against Kansas, Marchi logged a runner-up finish in the 100 freestyle with a time of 52.21. She placed first in the 200 freestyle after finishing in 1:51.52. In a dual with Rutgers (Feb. 2-3), Marchi took first in the 100 freestyle with a season-best time of 50.67. She followed that up with a runnerup finish in the 200 freestyle (1:50.98). Marchi helped the 800 freestyle relay team to an eighthplace finish at conference. Their time of 7:11.31 was good for third all-time at NU.

#### 2022-23 (FRESHMAN)

Marchi had a strong start to her first season as a Husker, bringing in a victory and a pair of runner-up finishes in her first two meets. At South Dakota State, Marchi clocked a 25.49 to take second in the 50 freestyle. Marchi swam to a 200 freestyle victory with a 1:52.21 and a second-place finish in the 100 freestyle with a 52.14 when NU hosted Iowa State. The next day, Marchi brought in a pair of top-five finishes in the 100 and 200 freestyle events during the doubledual against Minnesota and South Dakota. She added a pair of third-place efforts against the Hawkeyes, with a 52.57 in the 100 freestyle and a 1:52.93 in the 200 freestyle. Against the Jayhawks, Marchi swam a 1:53.74 in the 200 freestyle to place third, while taking fourth in the 100 freestyle in 53.36. She continued to rack up top finishes at the Omaha dual, where Marchi won the 100 freestyle (52.49) and finished as runner-up in the 50 freestyle (24.47). At the Hawkeye Invite, Marchi continued to cut time off her previous bests and put up a pair of A-final appearances, finishing fourth in the 100 freestyle (50.67) and sixth in the 200 freestyle (1:49.63). In the final duals of the season, Marchi put up four top-five placements in the 100 and 200 freestyle events against Illinois and Rutgers. At the Big Ten Championships, Marchi was a member of the 800 freestyle relay and the 400 freestyle relay. She capped off her freshman campaign at the CSCAA National Invitational Championships, contributing to four top-25 relays.

#### **BEFORE NEBRASKA**

Marchi proved to be a top freestyler for Asola Nuoto, clocking times in the 100 and 200 freestyle events that ranked within the top 10 in the country. She was also named a regional champion.

#### **2024-25 (SOPHOMORE)**

Abby Baxter capped her season with many notable achievements in the diving well. The sophomore from Coppell, Texas, grabbed 15 zone-qualifying dives, 15 top-five finishes, six of which were individual titles as well as a personal-best and her first NCAA Championship appearance. Tanko also helped contribute to a third-place finish in the 200 free relay (1:30.71) and a fourth-place finish in the 200 medley relay (1:39.86). Tanko closed out her

She raced to a career-best 52.77 in the 100 fly prelims, while clocking a career-best 22.47 in the 50 free. In the 100 free, Tanko secured a careerbest 49.53 on her way to a 22nd-place finish. She also contributed to a pair of school-record relays at the Big Ten meet, including the 800 free relay (7:07.35) and the 200 free relay (1:29.97). Tanko claimed two silver medals at the Hungarian National Championships in the 100 fly and the 50 free. She also earned a gold medal in the 50-meter fly with her finals time of 27.04. At the FISU World University Games of 2025, Tanko grabbed a second-place finish with a 58.55 in the 100-meter freestyle.

#### 2023-24 (FRESHMAN)

Tanko was a key contributor for the Huskers in her freshman season. She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week on Oct. 25 after a stellar performance against South Dakota State (Oct. 20) when she won two individual titles and helped two relay teams to first-place finishes. Tanko excelled in the 100 butterfly, hitting her first NCAA B Standard at the Hawkeye Invite. She touched the wall in 53.26 to finish runner-up in the event. Tanko went on to set a new career-best and broke the school record at the Big Ten Championships with a 10th-place finish and a time of 53.16. She added a pair of top-10 finishes in the 50 freestyle and the 100 freestyle at the Hawkeye Invite with final times of 23.43

and 51.29. Tanko earned 14 top-three finishes and six titles on the season, while contributing to 10 winning relays, including four against Rutgers (Feb. 2-3). She helped three relay teams at the Big Ten Championships move to second and third all-time for NU.

Earlier in the summer, she captured gold in the 200 IM (2:21.38 LCM) at the Ontario Summer Championships and competed at the Canadian Olympic Trials.

She led Indian River State College to the NJCAA national title by winning four individual events, including a record-breaking 200 butterfly (1:59.52), the 1,000 free (10:29.10), the 1,650 free (17:24.73 PB), and the 400 IM (4:24.09). Zanin also helped secure relay golds in the 400 and 800 freestyle as Indian River swept all 25 events to win its 43rd consecutive NJCAA championship.

Pablo Morales continues to see the Nebraska swimming and diving program climb in national prominence in and out of the water in his 25th season leading the Husker program.

Coach Morales led a highly successful campaign in 2024-25, with the Big Red placing 34th with 13 points at the 2025 NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships. Gena Jorgenson highlighted Nebraska's effort in the pool by capturing firstteam All-America honors in the 1,650 freestyle for the second straight season. Her sixth-place NCAA finish came in a school-record 15:49.99. She added a school-record swim in the 500 free (4:39.31) and the 1,000 free (9:35.69) during the season. She added to her outstanding season by claiming third-team College Sports Communicators Academic All-America honors to become the first Husker swimmer in history to claim All-America awards in the pool and the classroom in the same season. Abby Baxter added to Nebraska's success at the NCAA Championships by competing in the three-meter diving competition.

Nebraska's success in 2024-25 followed a 2023-24 campaign that featured a top-30 NCAA finish behind Jorgenson's eighth-place finish in the 1,650 free. Jorgenson became the first Husker swimmer to claim first-team All-America honors at the NCAA Championships since 2001. Jorgenson and JoJo Randby also competed at the U.S. Olympic Team Trials during the summer of 2024,

highlighted by Jorgenson breaking two school records and finishing 12th in the 1,500-meter freestyle. Randby added a 39th-place finish in the 100-meter breaststroke.

Morales coached the Huskers to an eighthplace finish at the Big Ten Championships, with Maia Hall qualifying for a pair of A finals. She grabbed fifth-place finishes in the 100 and 200 breaststroke, while Jorgenson placed fifth in the mile and 10th in the 500 freestyle.

In 2023, Jorgenson and diver Kelsey Clairmont made NCAA Championship appearances. The Huskers set five school records during the season.

In 2022, Autumn Haebig led the charge in the pool, making her fourth trip to the NCAA Championships and earning a spot on the podium at the Big Ten Championships in the 200 freestyle with a sixth-place finish. The season was marked by breakout performances across the board, with underclassmen stepping up as leaders in the pool.

In 2021, Nebraska earned its best team finish since 2001, placing 26th at the NCAA Championships. Diver Abigail Knapton recorded a pair of first-team All-America performances, while Haebig produced a pair of All-America awards of her own to propel the Huskers.

Knapton became the first diver or swimmer in school history to earn first-team All-America honors four times in the same event (platform). The six-time All-American was also the Big Ten Diver of the Championships after winning gold in both the platform and one-meter dives, while taking second on the three-meter board. A CSC first-team Academic All-American as well, Knapton was chosen as Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year and Best Female Athlete across all sports. An NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship award winner, Knapton was also one of 30 finalists for NCAA Woman of the Year honors. She also went on to be the only diver at the Olympic Trials to finish among the top eight in all three competitive dives.

Haebig added nearly as impressive of a season in the pool. Nebraska's first Big Ten champion after winning the 200 freestyle, Haebig added a top-eight finish in the 500 free. She took ninth in the 200 free at the NCAA Championships before adding a 14th-place finish in the 500 free. She became the first Husker swimmer to earn a pair of All-America awards at the same championship since 2001. She went on to advance to Wave II at the U.S. Olympic Trials in the summer of 2021.

Three Husker swimmers (Haebig, Coffey, Madison Coughlen) and one diver (Sara Troyer) qualified for the 2020 NCAA Championships. The national meet was ultimately canceled due to the world-wide outbreak of the coronavirus, but the four Huskers combined for five CSCAA All-America awards.

In 2019, Nebraska captured its fourth consecutive top-40 finish at the NCAA Championships by taking 33rd. Knapton captured her third consecutive First-Team All-America honor on the platform, while adding an honorablemention accolade in the three-meter dive.

In 2018, Nebraska finished 35th at the NCAA Championships, as Knapton captured First-Team All-America honors on the platform for the second straight season. She was joined at the NCAA Championships by Haebig.


The Big Red took 33rd at nationals in 2017, when Knapton finished fourth on platform to capture her first All-America award.

In 2016, the Huskers finished 39th at the NCAA Championships, which included a 10th-place finish on the one-meter board by Anna Filipcic. The Huskers have sent at least one diver to the NCAA Championships in seven consecutive seasons.

Nebraska posted a program-record 3.747 GPA in the spring of 2020 to earn CSCAA Scholar All-America recognition as a team. Nebraska has been honored for 24 straight semesters by the CSCAA and the team has posted better than a 3.2 GPA for 24 consecutive semesters. In fact, the swimming and diving program owned the best GPA of any Nebraska team for three consecutive seasons (2015, 2016, 2017) to win the school's Herman Team GPA Award.

Nebraska's increased competitiveness in the pool and impressive success in the classroom and community are a far cry from the starting point of the Husker program when Morales took over the job in 2001. In his first season at NU, the Huskers went winless in 2001-02 (0-3) with a depleted roster.

Three years later, NU raced to an 8-1 dual record in 2004-05 and became the first Husker swimming and diving team in school history to win eight consecutive meets. Most importantly, Morales led the Huskers out of the bottom of the Big 12 with a fourth-place finish in 2004

Gold 1984 Los Angeles 4x100m Medley Gold 1992 Barcelona 100m Butterfly Gold 1992 Barcelona 4x100m Butterfly Silver 1984 Los Angeles 100m Butterfly Silver 1984 Los Angeles 200m Medley and a third-place showing in 2005. Nebraska has continued to pursue a climb in conference prominence as it has transitioned to the Big Ten.

The Huskers are working to regain the national prowess they enjoyed in the 1990s, when they captured five Big Eight and Big 12 titles from 1994 to 1999.

A 1987 graduate of Stanford University, Morales is one of the greatest male swimmers in U.S. history, winning an NCAA-record 11 individual titles. He also helped lead the Cardinal to three consecutive NCAA titles and four Pac-10 titles, while twice earning Pac-10 Swimmer-of-the-Year honors and garnering six Pac-10 titles himself.

Morales remains the all-time leading scorer at the NCAA Championships, amassing 235 points. Morales was also the recipient of the 1987 Al Masters Award, which is Stanford's highest award for athletic performance, leadership and academic performance. He was the first male swimmer to win the award, and remains one of two to have accomplished that feat. Morales holds the Stanford record in the 200-yard butterfly (1:42.60) and held the school record in the 100-yard fly (46.25) until it was broken in 1998 by Sabir Muhammad (46.18).

While at Stanford, Morales was awarded the J.E. Sterling Award, which is presented to a student-athlete based on scholarship, leadership and community service. In addition, he served as the director of the Stanford Volunteers for Youth Program. Morales also found time to become a mainstay on the campus newspaper as the beat writer for the women's basketball team.

A CSC (formerly CoSIDA) Academic All-America selection in 1987, Morales earned a law degree from Cornell in June of 1994, despite taking two years off from law school to train and compete at the Olympics.

An Olympic swimmer, Morales won three gold and two silver medals in the 1984 and 1992 Games, serving as a team captain for the 1992 squad. Following the 1992 Games, in which he returned to the pool after a three-year layoff to capture a gold medal in the 100-meter butterfly, Morales was named the U.S. Olympic Committee's Sportsman of the Year. He held the U.S. Open and NCAA record in the 100-yard fly with a time of 46.26, which stood for 13 years before being broken at the 1999 NCAA Championships.

Among Morales' greatest swimming accomplishments in the pool is holding the world record in the 100-meter butterfly with a time of 52.84 from 1986 until 1995.

Morales' legend in the Olympic Games lives on today, as the Nebraska coach served on the bid committee for the 2008 U.S. Olympic swimming trials that took place in Omaha. Morales had the chance to see the selection process and serve a role in the decision that gave Nebraska its first Olympic event in state history.

The Swimming Trials were a resounding success, and Omaha proved to be a worthy host for the event. More than 160,000 fans attended the event, shattering the previous mark by more than 50,000. In 2016, the U.S. Olympic Trials made their third consecutive appearance in Omaha, and more than 200,000 fans sold out every session of the event.

The 2020 Trials returned to Omaha in the summer of 2021, after a one-year delay caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

Before coming to Nebraska, Morales served as the head women's swimming coach at San Jose State University. He held the reins as head coach from 1998 until being named coach at Nebraska in July of 2001. Morales rejuvenated a Spartan program that was near the bottom of the Western Athletic Conference. He was named the 2000 WAC Coach of the Year for his efforts.

While at San Jose State, Morales rebuilt a program and took the Spartans to the NCAA Championships after a 14-year absence. During his tenure, Morales produced six academic All-WAC swimmers. At the 2001 WAC Championships, five Spartans set school records under Morales' supervision, and three met NCAA qualification times. Seven others swam times that placed among the top three in school history.

Before his stint at SJSU, Morales was an assistant at his alma mater, Stanford, in 1997-98, helping lead the squad to the NCAA team title.

Morales also served as a graduate assistant at Cornell while pursuing his law degree. While at Cornell, Morales prepared and coached daily workouts for swimmers and assisted in recruiting. Morales has assisted in coaching with the San Jose Aquatics club group, as well as serving as head coach of the Stanford Masters Swim Team.

A powerful motivator, Morales hopes to keep his swimmers on the top of their games in and out of the pool, as Nebraska has established itself among the nation's best in academic support and athletics. Over the past 10 seasons, nearly 80 percent of Morales' student-athletes have been named to the conference or Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll each semester.

"I want our swimmers to achieve their goals of faster times and lifetime bests," Morales said. "I want them to have the best season that they have ever had, and I also want us to establish a team atmosphere and build an excitement toward Husker swimming and diving."

Former Stanford Head Coach Skip Kenny, who coached Morales at Stanford and also with Team USA, spoke highly of his former pupil.

"He's one of the most honest people that you will meet," Kenny said. "You will always get the truth out of him. He's very dedicated to the sport of swimming and to his athletes.

"As soon as the swimmers spend a few days or weeks with him, they will see how much he cares about them and the sport of swimming."

Kenny said Morales may have greater potential as a coach than swimmer.

"I honestly believe that he is a better coach than he was a swimmer, and that is saying a lot since he was one of the best swimmers in the world. He has done things with kids that I thought I would "My job is to instill confidence in a swimmer and teach her to expect a higher level of performance from herself. I want each swimmer to open her mind to what is possible. I want her to strive to exceed what she has done in the past each and every day. I want her to expect that more is possible."

never see. If there is a female swimmer out there that wants to be the best in the world, I'd send her to swim for Pablo."

Morales' experiences as an NCAA and international swimmer, and a club and collegiate coach helps him in coaching and recruiting.

"In my experiences, I have been fortunate to have had a long career as a competitor. I was able to train with coaches who I think are some of the best in the world," Morales said. "I have learned from them, and I have learned from myself. I believe that all of my experiences have prepared me for coaching. I have a good feel for the contours of teams that are successful. I know how they practice, train and compete."

A gifted and noted public speaker and lecturer, Morales was a contributing author to The Swim Coaching Bible, published in 2001. In April of 2007, he was chosen as the U.S. Swimming Diversity Select Camp Head Coach, a four-day camp at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo. Aside from in-pool training, Morales also led motivational and educational sessions and team-building activities for boys and girls from all over the nation. These children were a part of an ethnically under-represented population that is less than 20 percent of the current USA Swimming membership.

Pablo is the son of Pedro and the late Blanca Morales, who came to the United States from Cuba in 1956. Pablo and his wife, Viviana, have four boys, Sam, Benjamin, Eli and Gustavo.

Morales was born in Chicago and grew up in Santa Clara, Calif. He enjoys golfing in his spare time.

Patrick Rowan enters his 14th season as Nebraska's associate head coach in 2025-26, helping the Huskers continue to build a nationally competitive women's swimming and diving program. The 2024-25 season featured Gena Jorgenson capturing first-team All-America honors for the second consecutive season in the 1,650 freestyle to power the Huskers to a 34th-place team finish at the NCAA Championships. Jorgenson's sixth-place NCAA finish came in a school-record 15:49.99, as she has continued to slash Husker records in the 1,650, 1,000 and 500 freestyles each of the last three seasons.

Nebraska added school-record swims in the 100 butterfly and the 100 breaststroke in 2025, while Husker 200 free, 200 medley and 800 free relay teams all smashed school records at the Big Ten Championships. In fact, over the past two seasons, the Huskers have set school records in nine different events.

In 2023-24, Nebraska claimed a top-30 finish at the NCAA Championships with Jorgenson becoming the first Husker swimmer to be named a first-team All-American since 2001. Jorgenson placed eighth at the NCAA Championships and joined teammate JoJo Randby at the 2024 U.S. Olympic Team Trials.

During the 2022-23 season, Rowan coached Jorgenson to an NCAA qualification, as she set the school record in the mile during the season.

In 2021-22, Autumn Haebig took her fourth trip to nationals, competing in the 100 freestyle, the 200 freestyle and the 500 freestyle. She notched a top-25 finish in the 200 freestyle, after swimming to sixth in the event at the conference meet.

# PATRICK ROWAN

Associate Head Coach, 14th Season

Rowan helped Nebraska to its best NCAA finish since 2001 with a 26th-place showing at the 2021 NCAA Championships. Haebig put herself in the Husker record books by capturing All-America honors in both the 200 free (9th) and 500 free (14th) at the NCAA Championships. She became the first Husker swimmer to earn more than one All-America award at nationals since 2001. Audrey Coffey joined Haebig at the NCAA Championships and just missed All-America honors after finishing 19th in the 1,650-yard freestyle in a then-school-record time of 16:14.19.

Haebig and Coffey also helped lead a strong performance by the Big Red at the 2021 Big Ten Championships. The Huskers produced their best Big Ten finish since joining the conference in 2011-12, while Haebig captured Nebraska's first-ever Big Ten individual gold medal with her win in the 200 freestyle. She also became the first Husker swimmer to win All-Big Ten honors.

In 2019-20, Rowan helped three Husker swimmers earn CSCAA All-America honors with school-record-setting performances by Haebig (200 free), Coffey (1,000 free) and Madison Coughlen (200 fly).

In 2017-18, Rowan helped Haebig, a 14-time Wisconsin high school state champion, earn her first trip to the NCAA Championships as a true freshman. Haebig, who finished 10th in the 100 backstroke and 12th in the 200 freestyle at the 2018 Big Ten Championships, closed her season with a 40th-place NCAA finish in the 100 back. She added a 43rd-place showing in the 500 free at the NCAA meet. Haebig set career bests in all three of those events late in the season at either the Big Ten Championships or the NCAA Last Chance meet.

In 2018, SwimSwam.com ranked the Nebraska swimming and diving program No. 1 in the nation for recruiting, retention and improvement among all NCAA Division I women's programs. In 2017-18, the Husker swimmers produced 26 NCAA B qualifying standards, which represented an increase in that total for the sixth consecutive season for Nebraska.

In 2016, six Huskers qualified for the U.S. Olympic Trials, while two more international swimmers qualified for their trials. In 2016-17, Erin Oeltjen set a school record in the 100 and 200-yard backstroke, while Dana Posthuma notched the second-best time in school history in the 200-yard butterfly (1:58.16). In 2014-15, Rowan guided the 200-yard freestyle relay to the second-best time in school history at the Big Ten Championships.

In Rowan's second season at NU (2013-14), he helped 14 swimmers to personal bests in the sprint freestyle events. Rowan served as Nebraska's primary sprint freestyle coach in 2012-13. He saw the 200- and 400-yard freestyle relay teams swim school-record times at the 2013 Big Ten Championships. Taryn Collura swam a school record in the 50-yard freestyle and became the first Husker to qualify for the NCAA Championships in six years.

Rowan, who returned to Nebraska after spending five years as an assistant coach at Missouri, helped the Tigers become one of

the nation's top-15 programs during his time in Columbia (2008-12).

The graduate of Lincoln Southeast High School and former Husker volunteer assistant coach returned to the Big Red for the 2012-13 season and has helped the Huskers produce seven top-40 team finishes at the NCAA Championships.

"Patrick brings extensive and successful coaching and recruiting experience at the collegiate level," Nebraska Coach Pablo Morales said. "Patrick has a tremendous work ethic and an unmatched passion for Nebraska. He has made a major impact on our program and plays a key role in helping us achieve our Big Ten Conference and NCAA goals."

A Nebraska native, Rowan helped orchestrate a steady rise into national prominence at Missouri. In his first season at MU, Rowan helped the Tiger women's team finish 38th at the 2008 NCAA Championships. After a 28th-place showing in 2009, the Tigers climbed to 23rd in 2011 before finishing 14th at the 2012 NCAA meet.

Rowan served as the power sprints coach while also working with the middle distance group at Missouri. He was the recruiting coordinator for the Tiger men's program while assisting with recruiting on the women's side. The Tiger men's 2011 recruiting class was ranked seventh nationally by collegeswimming.com, while the women's class was ranked 18th. He served as the director of the Mizzou Swim Camp and coached the Mizzou Swim Team (USA Swimming Club).

In addition to serving as a volunteer assistant at Nebraska in 2006-07, Rowan was a long-time coach in the Nebraska Aquatics program.

From 2002 until 2007, Rowan served as the head coach and general manager of the Nebraska Aquatics swim team, where he was the primary coach of the high school and collegiate swimmers. He also served as an age group coach for swimmers from ages 6 to 24 for Nebraska Aquatics from 2000 to 2002.

From 2003 to 2007, he served as the age group chairman for the Midwestern Swimming Executive Board. He was named Midwestern Swimming Coach of the Year in 2006-07, after being named its Age Group Coach of the Year in 2004-05.

A competitive swimmer from 1985 to 2001, Rowan swam collegiately at Eastern Michigan, helping EMU to a pair of Mid-American Conference championships. Individually, he was a 12-time finalist at the MAC Championships for the Eagles.

As a prep swimmer at Lincoln Southeast, Rowan was a two-time Nebraska Class A state champion and a member of a state championship team for the Knights. He was also a team captain and a seven-time Junior National qualifier.

Rowan, who earned his bachelor's degree in psychology from Eastern Michigan in 2000, received his master's degree in education with an emphasis in school and counseling psychology/sport psychology from Missouri in 2009. He is currently pursuing a Ph.D. with a similar emphasis in sport psychology.

He and his wife, Miranda, have a two daughters, Reese and Quinn, and a son, Luke.

A 10-time All-American and the 2019 Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year, Landon Marzullo enters his fifth season as Nebraska's Head Diving Coach in 2025-26. Marzullo was hired by Pablo Morales to lead the program on June 24, 2021.

"Landon brings an outstanding coaching skill-set to this position, derived from a high-level competitive career, his own coaching experiences, and being around some of the best coaches in the business," Morales said. "He has made an immediate positive impact at each of his coaching stops. With his skill, energy and positive approach, he has gotten the best out of his divers, supported high achievement in the classroom, and successfully recruited both domestically and internationally. He will do the same here at Nebraska. Husker diving is in great hands."

In 2025-26, Marzullo returns a pair of Husker divers with experience at the NCAA Championships, including Abby Baxter and Kelsey Clairmont. Baxter finished 20th on three meter as a sophomore at the 2025 NCAA Championships after taking ninth at the NCAA Zone D Diving Championships. She added a 15th-place finish on the one-meter board at the Zone D meet.

Clairmont, who will be a senior for the Huskers in 2025-26, took 20th on platform at the 2024 NCAA Championships. Clairmont opened her Husker career by finishing 34th on the platform as a freshman at the 2023 NCAA Championships.

In his first season at Nebraska, Marzullo coached all three of his divers to the NCAA Zone qualifications, with Sara Troyer earning a

spot in the three-meter finals. Troyer collected 11 victories in 2021-22, while also collecting a top-25 three-meter finish at Winter Nationals. She also finished 13th on the one-meter board at the 2022 Big Ten Championships. Hallie Roman finished right behind Troyer on one-meter at conference to score more team points with a 14th-place finish.

Marzullo led the men's and women's divers at Wisconsin in 2019-20 and went to Madison after building strong men's and women's diving programs in three seasons at UNLV. He coached Rebel divers to three individual conference titles in his three seasons in Las Vegas, and helped his divers set five school records. In 2019, he was named the WAC Coach of the Year after leading freshman Tazman Abramowicz WAC titles on the three-meter and platform events. Abramowicz also became the first Rebel men's diver to qualify for the NCAA Diving Championships in more than 30 years. In 2018, he coached the first Rebel women's diver (Myka Fielding) to the NCAA Championships for the first time in more than 20 seasons. Marzullo was also the head coach of the Rebel Diving Club from 2015 to 2019.

Marzullo got his first taste of collegiate coaching as a volunteer assistant at Ohio State in 2012-13. He left OSU to work as a high diver for Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines from 2013 to 2015, performing multiple times per day on the three-meter, 10-meter and 17-meter platforms.

Marzullo, who was the Big Ten Diver of the Year at Indiana as a freshman in 2008, spent his first two collegiate seasons with the Hoosiers. He was also the Big Ten Freshman of the Year and the

2008 Big Ten Diver of the Championships after winning conference titles on the one-meter and three-meter springboards and adding a fourth-place finish on platform. He also took fourth on the platform at the 2008 NCAA Championships to claim first-team All-America honors for the first time in his career, while adding top-16 national finishes on both the one and three meter boards. Marzullo took fifth on platform for the Hoosiers at the 2009 NCAA Championships.

He transferred to Florida State following his sophomore season in Bloomington. He was an All-ACC Diver for the Seminoles in both 2010 and 2011. As a senior, he was the runner-up in all three diving events at the ACC Championships, before taking seventh on the three-meter board at the NCAA Championships to claim first-team All-America honors. He closed his career as a 10-time All-American overall, including four first-team All-America awards. He was also named to the 2011 World University Games Diving Team, earning his best finish (4th) on the three-meter synchronized event. He earned his bachelor's degree in criminology from FSU in May of 2012.

Prior to his collegiate career, Marzullo was a six-time junior national champion and captured gold on platform at the 2005 Pan Am Junior Championships. He was a five-time U.S. National Team choice, and he twice qualified for the U.S. Olympic Diving Team Trials. He also finished second on the one-meter board at the 2011 U.S. National Championships.



"As a student-athlete, Jordan had a great impact on our program. She was outstanding in all areas and an excellent leader," Morales said. "As the director of operations, she brings tremendous logistics and operational experience to the job. She also has tremendous familiarity with our program, and the ability to make a positive impact on the lives of our Husker swimmers and divers."

A Husker swimmer who specialized in the breaststroke and IM events from 2014 to 2018, Ehly posted notable times and amassed 25 top-five finishes, including eight victories in individual events and relays. Her 2:11.17 in the 200 breaststroke stands among the top five times in school history.

Ehly added a top-10 time in school history in the 100 breaststroke (1:01.62) at USA Winter Nationals in 2017 by notching a 1:01.62. Ehly took 16th in the 200 breast at the 2015 Big Ten Championships, before taking 20th in the event at the 2016 Big Ten meet. In 2017, Ehly finished 19th before improving to a 17th at the 2018 conference championship with a time of 2:12.37.

Alongside five other Husker swimmers, Ehly competed in the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials in Omaha in the 200-meter breaststroke.

Ehly was a model student and citizen. A four-time letter winner, Ehly was an eight-time member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. She was a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar in 2016 and a three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection. A Sam Foltz Hero 27 Leadership Award recipient in 2017, Ehly was a member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team from 2015 to 2018.

A December 2018 Nebraska graduate, Ehly earned her bachelor's degree as an advertising and public relations major.



# EMILY HAIMES

Graduate Assistant

Emily Haimes enters her first season as Nebraska's graduate assistant in 2025-26. The former freestyle and butterfly specialist swam for NU for three years (2021-24).

Haimes was part of Nebraska's 200 medley relay alongside Caitlin Cairns, JoJo Randby and Beatrix Tanko at the 2024 Big Ten Championships that posted the third-fastest time in school history (1:39.42). Earlier in her NU career, Haimes was a lead contributor in the 400-meter freestyle relay with Lexi Kucera, JoJo Randby and Autumn Haebig, which posted the fifth-best time in Husker history (3:19.36, 2021-22).

Individually, she excelled in the 50 free, 100 free and 100 butterfly. As a senior in 2022-23, Haimes took third in the 100 fly (56.73) and fourth in the 50 free (24.30) against Minnesota and South Dakota. At the Hawkeye Invitational, Haimes added a 10th-place standing in the 100 freestyle (51.35).

Haimes was also a model student and community member. She was a two-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and Academic All-Big Ten choice, along with being a six-time member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. In 2024, Haimes was one of Nebraska's Outstanding Scholar Award winners across all sports. She also earned a prestigious Sam Foltz 27 Hero Leadership Award for her commitment to the community. She added a pair of selections to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

Before coming to Nebraska, Haimes swam for West Virginia, where she was a two-time first-team All-Big 12 honoree. She took third in the 100 fly (54.13) and sixth in the 100 free (50.18) in her second year at WVU, after earning a spot in the 100 fly B final at the 2020 Big 12 meet as a freshman (55.33).

Originally from Enfield, London, England, Haimes swam at Mount Kelly High School, where she won a silver and two bronze medals at the 2019 British Summer Championships.

Haimes earned her bachelor's degree in psychology and history in May 2024.



# RUSTY RUFFCORN

**Strength & Conditioning Coach** 

Rusty Ruffcorn has served Nebraska as a strength and conditioning coach since 2006, and he currently works primarily with the swimming and diving program.

Ruffcorn assists swimming and diving with strength and conditioning programs in the weight room at the Hendricks Training Complex, which is just steps away from the Devaney Natatorium.

Ruffcorn began his association with Nebraska as a volunteer intern in 2004. He moved into a full-time intern role in 2005 and worked with the baseball and football squads before taking over for the men's and women's basketball teams (2006-11). While working with the Husker baseball team, Nebraska won a Big 12 title and a game in the College World Series.

During his time as NU's women's basketball strength coach, Ruffcorn helped the Huskers to the most successful stretch in school history, including seven trips to the NCAA Tournament, a pair of NCAA Sweet 16 bids in 2010 and 2013, and two conference titles in 2010 and 2014.

A native of Omaha, Ruffcorn was a student assistant strength coach at Nebraska-Omaha before graduating with a bachelor's degree in exercise science in 2004. During his time at UNO, Ruffcorn served as the primary strength coach for the Maverick football and softball teams. The football team won a pair of conference titles, including an undefeated season, while the softball team added two league titles and a national championship during Ruffcorn's time with the Mavs.

With a significant background in strength training, power lifting and Olympic weightlifting, Ruffcorn has earned USAW Level I club coach certification and is a certified strength and conditioning specialist (C.S.C.S.).

Banks, who lettered in football at Nebraska during the 1991 season, earned his master's degree in vocational education in 1998 after receiving a bachelor's degree in business management in 1992 from Nebraska. Banks and his wife, Lisa, have two children, Kaylie and Darius.





# An experienced leader in collegiate athletics with a strong Midwestern background, Troy Dannen is in his second year as Nebraska's Director of Athletics. Dannen guides Nebraska's 24-sport athletic department that ranks among the nation's most successful programs both athletically and academically.

Nebraska Athletics has enjoyed success since Dannen arrived in Lincoln in March of 2024. During the 2024-25 athletic year, five Husker teams finished in the top four nationally, including volleyball, wrestling, men's gymnastics and bowling. The volleyball program reached the Final Four, while the wrestling team posted its highest finish in school history with a national runner-up showing and had multiple national champions for the first time since 1984. The softball program won its first NCAA regional since 2014 while baseball repeated as Big Ten Tournament champions. Overall, Nebraska finished 21st in the final 2024-25 Learfield Director's Cup, the program's highest finish since 2010.

In the spring of 2024, the Husker baseball team won its first Big Ten tournament title, and the men's track team won the Big Ten Outdoor Championships. The

men also had their best NCAA Championship showing since 2016 with a 13th-place finish. The women's track team posted their second straight top-10 NCAA finish and placed ninth at the national meet.

Dannen has long been a leader in charting the course for the future of college athletics and that continues at Nebraska. In May of 2025, Dannen was appointed to the College Football Playoff Selection Committee, continuing his impact on the national level. He served from 2021 to 2023 as a member of the NCAA Constitution Committee and the Division I Transformation Committee. He also previously served as chair of the NCAA Football Competition Committee and was an Executive Committee member of the Football Oversight Committee. In total, Dannen has served on seven NCAA committees. In 2022, Dannen was a finalist for Sports Business Journal's Athletic Director of the Year award, and he received the Distinguished American Award from the Sugar Bowl Chapter of the National Football Foundation.

Dannen came to Lincoln after serving as Director of Athletics at the University of Washington. He helped guide the Huskies' transition to the Big Ten Conference and oversaw a football program that reached the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in January of 2024.

He arrived at Washington in the fall of 2023 after serving as Director of Athletics at Tulane University since 2015. While at Tulane, Green Wave student-athletes earned 49 All-America honors, a national championship, 21 conference championships and 41 postseason appearances.

In 2022-23, Tulane football won its first American Athletic Conference football championship and won the Cotton Bowl over USC, which was ranked ninth in the nation at that time. The men's basketball program won 20 regular-season games for the first time in two decades. Additionally, men's tennis advanced to its sixth NCAA Tournament in seven years, both bowling and beach volleyball finished ranked in the top 20, and baseball won the conference championship.

unprecedented three consecutive bowl games from 2018 to 2020, winning back-to-back bowl games for the first time in 128 years of football at the University. In the classroom, Tulane student-athletes excelled at a high-level. At the end of the 2022-23 academic year, over 68 percent of Green Wave student-athletes earned a 3.0 GPA or better, with a 93 percent Graduation Success Rate and a record-setting department Academic Progress Report of 992, with seven teams earning a perfect 1000 APR score.

Dannen spearheaded fundraising efforts and numerous capital projects at Tulane. He helped secure the largest unrestricted gift in Tulane Athletics history, an endowment gift that funded the operation of a new sport (sailing), and a \$10 million lead gift for capital renovations, which was the second-largest gift in department history. In addition, marketing and licensing revenue grew four-fold, and in 2022-23, Tulane football, basketball and volleyball set ticket sales and revenue records. Under Dannen's leadership, the Green Wave Club Annual Fund grew by 40 percent in terms of donors, and 45 percent in terms of dollars.

Increases in fundraising and major gift donors positively impacted capital project development and completion. A \$13 million renovation to the Reilly Natatorium, home of the swimming and diving program, as well as \$8 million in renovations to locker rooms and the sports medicine area inside the Wilson Center were completed in 2023. Dannen also oversaw construction of a new dining facility, weight room, basketball and volleyball locker rooms. Tulane also completed a \$2.4 million academic center renovation and a \$5 million television and digital production center.


Dannen came to Tulane after serving eight years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Northern lowa (UNI) from 2008 to 2015. During his tenure, the Panthers enjoyed success at both the conference and national levels, highlighted by an NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in 2010 by the UNI men's basketball team. During his eight-year tenure, UNI was recognized with 39 All-Americans, 13 Coaches of the Year and nine Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) Players of the Year. UNI football, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball and softball combined to reach 15 NCAA tournaments and 20 postseason berths during that stretch. For his efforts, Dannen was recognized as NACDA's FCS Athletic Director of the Year in 2014.

Prior to his time at UNI, Dannen served as the lowa Girls High School Athletic Union's Executive Director for seven years, overseeing 400 high schools and 10 sports.

Dannen grew up on a farm just outside Marshalltown, lowa, and graduated from UNI in 1989 with a degree in communications. He is married to Amy and has four children: Elizabeth, William, Emily and Holly.

Kristen Brown joined Nebraska Athletics in July of 2024. She serves as Deputy Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator, with sport administrator duties for several Husker sports including volleyball and women's basketball.

In August 2025, Brown earned a five-year appointment to the NCAA Women's Basketball Committee. Brown joined the Huskers after serving as the Deputy Athletics Director for Administration and Leadership at Texas A&M (2020-24).



Haven Fields joined Nebraska Athletics as the Deputy Athletic Director/Chief Operating Officer in April of 2024.

Fields serves as the day-to-day football administrator, assisting Head Coach Matt Rhule and his football staff. In addition to his role with the football program, Fields oversees the Huskers Athletic Fund team and assists Dannen in managing the day-to-day operations of the athletic department.

Fields comes to Lincoln after joining Dannen's Washington staff in January 2024. With the Huskies, Fields led several external units including Marketing and Fan Engagement, Strategic Communications, Creative and Digital Services, Multimedia, and served as the Liaison for Learfield/Husky Sports Properties. Fields also played a role in assisting with the Huskies'

At Texas A&M, Brown directed a newly created Engagement unit that worked to ensure the talents of all coaches and administrators are supported at the highest level, and she oversaw the compliance department on a permanent basis. Working closely with Athletic Director Ross Bjork and serving as the department's Senior Woman Administrator, Brown was the sports administrator for women's basketball, volleyball, soccer, men's and women's tennis and men's and women's swimming and diving.

She spent her first two years at Texas A&M as Deputy Athletics Director for Student-Athlete Experience, during which she provided executive leadership for the department on all matters related to student-athlete engagement including academics, life skills and career development served as sports administrator for seven sports, and led the department's Diversity & Inclusion efforts.

Prior to serving the Aggies, Brown worked as the Associate Athletic Director of Administration at the University of Maryland (2014-20). In addition to her administrative duties at Maryland, Brown served as the department's Diversity & Inclusion Officer and was a member of the university's Diversity & Inclusion Cabinet. Within the department, she played a key role in the development of a professional development program for department's staff, served on the Big Ten sports management committee, and chaired numerous committees related to head coach hiring searches. Externally, Brown led the department's Championships and Community Engagement units, which included the Share the Shell program, the winner of the 2017 NACDA Community Service Award presented by the Fiesta Bowl.

With regard to Brown's leadership and involvement outside the university, AD Ross Bjork added, "With Kristen's experience at several collegiate athletic conferences and her sport oversight experience at Maryland, she brings a national perspective about college athletics and she will also help our entire athletic program flourish at the highest level. We believe Texas A&M should be a leader nationally and in the SEC and Kristen is just the right person to help propel our collective vision."

A graduate of Northern Illinois University, Brown was a two-time letter winner in women's basketball. The Rockford, Ill, native also holds a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University.

transition to the Big Ten with oversight of the Broadcast Operations that will produce a plethora of video productions.

Fields was the Football Sport Administrator for the 2024 College Football Playoff National Runner-Up and 2023 Pac-12 Champions. During his time at UW, Fields assisted in the hiring of new Head Football Coach Jedd Fisch and Head Men's Basketball Coach Danny Sprinkle.

Before his appointment at Washington, Fields was the Deputy Athletics Director at Ball State University as the number two administrator in the department. He assisted in supervising the Cardinals' 19 teams and 450-plus student-athletes. Fields oversaw several external areas (Athletics Communications, Marketing & Fan Engagement, Development, Ticketing Sales & Operations, and was the liaison to Learfield-IMG/Ball State Sports Properties).

Several of the team's Fields worked with experienced record success from a revenue generation standpoint. Specifically, he worked as the sport administrator for the football and basketball programs. He administered the football program's first bowl game win in school history in 2020, beating two top-25 opponents in that season. Ball State finished the year ranked in the AP Top 25 and made back-to-back bowl appearances for only the third time in the school's history.

Fields led Ball State's COVID-19 plan for return to campus, testing protocols that successfully allowed all programs to compete and finish their seasons. During his time at Ball State, he assisted in raising private support of more than \$15 million and oversaw the athletic department's most notable capital project to

date--The Scheumann Family Indoor Practice Facility, which was fully funded through private support.


Prior to his time at Ball State, Fields worked at the University of Illinois as the Associate Athletic Director of Development. In his six years with the Illini, Fields assisted with the university's \$2.25 billion "With Illinois" campaign, \$300 million of which was earmarked for athletics. The university campaign exceeded \$2.7 billion, and the athletics portion raised \$321 million.

Before his stint at Illinois, Fields worked at the University of South Alabama for over five years, where he assisted in the facilitation of the overall football operation for a start-up, Division I program, and transition to Football Bowl Subdivision. Fields began his time in collegiate athletics at Auburn, working for four years at his alma mater.

Fields played collegiate football for Auburn, earning the Zeke Smith Award (Auburn's Defensive Player of the Year). He was an honorable mention All-SEC pick as a linebacker and earned a spot on the All-SEC Football Allstate "Good Works" Team. After college, Fields played two seasons of professional football in the Canadian Football League for the Hamilton Tigercats and British Columbia Lions.

Fields earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Auburn in 2001 and later earned a master's in higher education administration/sports management. He and his wife, Dr. Mya, who's an Assistant Dean for Purdue University's School of Multidisciplinary and Professional Studies have two sons, Haven Jr. (8) and Hendrix (6).





Dr. Rodney D. Bennett serves as the 21st Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL), a comprehensive public flagship, land-grant, Research 1 institution of approximately 24,000 students, with robust research and extension services throughout the state. UNL is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission, and its student-athletes compete at the NCAA Division I level in the Big Ten Conference.

(USM), a comprehensive public research institution of approximately 14,000 students with campuses in South Mississippi and along the Mississippi Gulf Coast. Under his leadership, USM achieved R1 status; reached significant fundraising milestones; increased its annual economic impact; expanded operations along the Mississippi Gulf Coast; supported innovations in healthcare; invested in new faculty positions, student success programming, and capital improvements; and increased access to quality education and research programs. USM became one of only fourteen R1 institutions in the nation that compete at the NCAA Division I level and maintain accreditation in all four major areas of the Arts.

Dr. Bennett previously served more than a decade in senior level positions at the University of Georgia in Athens, where he chaired the institution's NCAA certification review and self-study process; completed more than \$150 million in facilities projects; re-established the Dean of Students office after more than two decades; enhanced on-campus student health and counseling services; and managed oversight of robust student programs and support services for an enrollment of more than 34,000.

As USM President, Dr. Bennett chaired the athletic conference board and served as a founding member of the Board of Managers for the College Football Playoff national championship. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., and Past Sire Archon for Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity, The Boulé.

Dr. Bennett holds a Doctor of Education in Educational Administration from Tennessee State University and specialist, master's, and bachelor's degrees from Middle Tennessee State University.





# **BIG TEN CONFERENCE**

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten Conference is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders. Even in its infancy, the conference established itself as the preeminent collection of institutions in the nation, where the pursuit of academic excellence prevailed as the definitive goal.

The history of the Big Ten traces back more than 125 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago where, on Jan. 11, 1895, Purdue President James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Northwestern and Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bona fide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On Feb. 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the fundamentals of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905.

Indiana and the State University of Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State joined the conference, bringing the membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, a name that was eventually incorporated in 1987.

As the 1900s dawned, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were conducted at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women. Big Ten schools compete in a total of 42 different sports, furthering the conference's commitment to broad-based programming and providing more participation opportunities than any conference in the country.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations. But Michigan's appearance in 1902 cultivated a relationship that has endured for more than a century.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915, the first award to demonstrate support for the educational emphasis placed on intercollegiate athletics. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to one male and one female student of the graduating class who have attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a Big Ten student-athlete can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of seven men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971, Jim Delany in 1989, Kevin Warren in 2020, and current commissioner Tony Petitti in 2023.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produce over \$10 billion in funded research, doubling any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of the pioneering technology, where it approved country-wide testing in 2005. In 2006, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

In 2006, Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with FOX Networks to create the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 2,200 live events across all platforms each year. The 24/7 network is the ultimate destination for Big Ten fans and alumni across the country and around the world, allowing them to see their favorite teams, regardless of where they live.

On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011.

The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/Capproved formal membership applications from Maryland and Rutgersy on Nov. 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams.

In recent years the Big Ten has worked to meet the educational needs of modern student-athletes to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. In May of 2020, the conference announced the formation of the Big Ten Mental Health and Wellness Cabinet, featuring representation from all 14 member institutions, as well as sport affiliate members. The goal of the cabinet is to promote optimal mental health for Big Ten student-athletes through a comprehensive, systemic and interdisciplinary approach to establishing mental health programs, while also providing counsel, advice and expertise to the conference office.

In June of 2020 the conference launched the Big Ten Equality Coalition. This group, which features student-athletes, coaches, athletic directors, chancellors, presidents and other members of the Big Ten family from all 14 member institutions, has a stated goal of seeking tangible ways to actively and constructively combat racism and hate around the world, while also empowering student-athletes to express their rights to free speech and peaceful protest. One product of conversations emerging from the coalition was the creation of the Big Ten Voter Registration Initiative. This non-partisan, conference-wide collaboration encourages student-athletes to take part in the electoral process and is led by a Voter Registration Committee that includes representatives from all 14 Big Ten institutions. The Voter Registration Committee has partnered with the National Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law to develop educational programming and outreach tools, and to collaborate with other established civic platforms.

On June 30, 2022, the Big Ten Conference furthered its legacy of transformation when the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) voted unanimously to admit UCLA and USC to the conference effective Aug. 2, 2024. Competition will begin for all conference sports in the 2024-25 academic year.

In July of 2022, the Big Ten traveled a delegation of student-athletes and administrators from its member institutions to Selma and Montgomery, Alabama, for an immersive experience entitled: "Big Life Series: Selma to Montgomery." The pilgrimage to one of the key centers of the civil rights movement was highlighted by a march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, which is the site of the 1965 Bloody Sunday attack. The delegation also visited the Montgomery Interpretive Center on the campus of Alabama State University to learn more about the profound impact that students had on the civil rights movement, and the significance of the Knight vs. Alabama landmark trial which ended the segregation of funding in higher education across the State of Alabama.

In April of 2023, the Big Ten announced that Petitti was selected as the conference's seventh commissioner. With nearly four decades of sports, business and media industry acumen, he served as deputy commissioner and chief operating officer of Major League Baseball and president and chief executive officer of MLB Network. A 14-time National Sports Emmy Award winner, Petitti also held senior executive roles at CBS Sports and ABC Sports overseeing rights acquisition deals for a variety of sports leagues and collegiate and professional sports events, including the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, regular season men's basketball, college football, NFL, PGA Tour, the Masters, U.S. Open Tennis Championships, and the Little League World Series, as well as leading in the creation of the Bowl Championship Series to determine college football's national champion.

On Aug., 4, 2023, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors voted unanimously to admit the University of Oregon and the University of Washington to the conference effective Aug. 2, 2024, with competition to begin in all sports for the 2024-25 academic year. With the schools' admission, Oregon and Washington would also join the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), a consortium of world-class research institutions dedicated to advancing their academic missions.

More than 125 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.



## **HUSKERS BREAK SEVEN RECORDS DURING 2024-25**



Gena Jorgenson captured first-team All-America honors for the second time by racing to a sixthplace finish in the 1,650 freestyle in a school-record 15:49.99 at the 2025 NCAA Championships.

Nebraska generated the first back-to-back first-team NCAA All-American since 2001 and swam to a top-35 finish at the NCAA Championships to highlight a noteworthy 2024-25 season.

Gena Jorgenson led the Huskers with impressive accomplishments. The junior from Aberdeen, S.D., shattered two of her own school records and qualified for three events at the NCAA Championships in Federal Way, Wash. Capturing a sixth-place finish in the 1,650 free, Jorgenson crushed her previous school record by nearly seven seconds. Her previous mark from the 2024 NCAA Championships was 15:55.71, but she replaced it with an impressive 15:49.99 performance. The swim earned her a second straight first-team All-America award.

Jorgenson also posted a career-best and school record in the 500 free at the conference championships in Columbus, Ohio. She notched a 4:39.31 to finish sixth.

Earlier in the season, Jorgenson claimed gold in the 500 free at the Hawkeye Invitational with a 4:41.89. She added another victory in the 1,650

Jorgenson notched the sixth-fastest time in the 200 backstroke for the Huskers at the Hawkeye Invite. She swam 1:57.38 to earn second in the event's prelims, before finishing third in finals (1:58.60).

Between her nine events, Jorgenson amassed 11 NCAA B standard times.

Abby Baxter, a sophomore from Coppell, Texas joined Jorgenson at the NCAA Championships to compete in the three-meter diving competition.

Baxter performed well at nationals with a 20thplace finish and 299.45 points to complete her sophomore season as a Husker.

At the Zone D Championships in Iowa City, Iowa, Baxter flipped to a ninth-place finish in the three-meter competition with 306.95 points to earn her spot at the NCAA Championships. She

racked up 14 zone-qualifying scores throughout the season and added seven top-five finishes.

Baxter earned her career-best score at the Hawkeye Invite in mid-November on the threemeter board racking up 332.45 points and a fourth-place finish.

The 2025 Big Ten Championships hosted in Columbus, Ohio resulted in a tenth-place for the Huskers. Nebraska closed the season in Federal Way, Wash., with a 34th-place finish after earning 13 points.

Caterina Bisiacchi, a senior from Trieste, Italy, highlighted the team's freestyle events. She was a strong leader in the 200 free, where she accomplished a career best at the Hawkeye Invite in the preliminaries with a 1:50.07. Impressively, she recorded a second-place finish a day later in the 500 free, where she earned her career best time of 4:47.90.

Bisiacchi added a pair of top finishes in the 200 fly against Iowa State in late October as well as the Illinois Fighting Illini. She logged 2:04.79 and 2:01.50, respectively.

Maia Hall led the team in the breaststroke events recording five first-place finishes in the 100 breast and seven in the 200 breast. At the conference championships, Hall registered her career best and school record in the 100 breast with a 59.94. Over the course of the season, the senior from Whitby, England notched 24 top-five finishes.

Hall etched her name in the Nebraska history books through a 2:00.33 performance in the 200 IM at the 2025 Big Ten Championships prelims.

JoJo Randby posted consistently impressive finishes for the Huskers in the breaststroke events as well. At the Mizzou Last Chance meet in Columbia, Mo., Randby logged a career-best performance in the 200 breaststroke at 2:12.53.

Throughout the season, Randby amassed eight podium places in the 100 breast with notable performances against Minnesota and South Dakota, Illinois and at the Hawkeye Invite. The homegrown Husker completed her final year with the ninth-fastest 200 breast time in school history, while still remaining the second-fastest in the 100 breast from a 2023 swim.

Maisie Gilford, a junior from Newcastle-Under-Lyme, England logged career bests in four events in 2024-25. She landed three career times at the Hawkeye Invite in the 100 free, 200 free and 100 fly. She owns the sixth-fastest time for a Husker in the 100 free with her 49.51. She recorded the No.4 all-time performance at the Big Ten Championships in the 50 free by swimming a 22.61.

Returning from injury late in 2023-24, Madison Lloyd continued in her backstroke and IM endeavors. She clocked career bests in the 200 and 400 IM events at the Big Ten prelims where she swam a 2:02.66 and 4:21.38.

Redshirt freshman Jenna Brown led a strong campaign in her freestyle and butterfly events. At the Hawkeye Invite, the Louisville, Ky. native placed fourth in the 200 fly with a 2:01.94. She earned 11 top-five finishes during the season.

Jazmyn Lunn, a freshman from Brookings, S.D., recorded a top performance in the

200 butterfly with her time at the conference championships in late February. She clocked a 2:00.80 to help propel her to a 30th-place finish.

Jenna Gogel swam in breaststroke and IM events in her inaugural season at Nebraska. In the 200 IM, Gogel picked up a second-place finish against Omaha (2:09.03) and in the following meet against Rutgers and Iowa, she swam a career-best 2:06.75 in an exhibition.

Riley Miklos and Katy Zboinski both completed successful freshman campaigns. Miklos collected 13 top-five performances throughout the season, and Zboinski added six of her own. Zboinski demonstrated a promising future in the 100 and 200 breast events. Against South Dakota State, she swam a 1:07.83 to earn a second-place finish, but swam a career best in the 2025 Big Ten Championship prelims (1:02.99). Miklos was a strong force in the freestyle events. She claimed the second-fastest time among the Husker squad in 2024-25 in the 1,000 free against the Kansas Jayhawks by swimming the event in 10:10.01.

To highlight her senior year, Sydney McCracken earned Nebraska's Big Ten's Women's Swim and Dive Sportsmanship Award at the conference championships. McCracken posted exceptional performances and logged five career-best times.

At the Hawkeye Invite, McCracken notched a career-best 1:01.72 in the 100 breast. She later went on to log her best in the 200 IM at the Big Ten Championships with a 2:01.06. Throughout the season, she captured 15 top-five performances.

Marissa Laurin opened a strong Husker career with 20 top-five finishes including 13 top-three performances. Becoming a force in the backstroke and IM events, Laurin took third against Kansas in early November with a careerbest 56.44. She later clocked a time of 1:58.50 in the 200 back in the conference championships. She added career bests at the Big Ten meet in the 200 and 400 IM races.

Sophomores Anna Vlachou and Amelia Riggott both posted strong second seasons. Vlachou accomplished a B standard cut in the 100 fly and earned the school record time in the event in the Big Ten prelims by touching the wall at 52.63. Riggott swam in the 100 breaststroke against the Omaha Mavs where she reached a title in the event with a 1:04.80.

Giulia Marchi earned a spot in the Nebraska record book in the 200 freestyle at the 2025 Big Ten Championships in her junior year push. She owns the ninth-fastest time from her swim in the trials with a 1:47.69.

Virginia Consiglio, a newcomer from Genova, Italy, highlighted strong performances in backstroke events in the tail end of the season. In a dual against Illinois, Consiglio grabbed a season-best time for the Huskers and earned herself the sixth-fastest time in Nebraska history. She clocked a 54.09 to win the event. She also put up impressive times in the 100 and 200 backstroke at the conference championships.

Beatrix Tanko earned numerous career bests in her sophomore season. The Hungarian swimmer had an impressive conference showing with three career bests and school records. She swam a 22.47 50 free to earn the second-fastest time in school history, while in the 100 free Tanko holds the seventh-fastest time with a 49.53. In the

100 butterfly, she finished in 18th to achieve the second-fastest time for the school with a 52.77.

Relay teams shattered several school records. At the conference championships, the 200 medley relay, 200 free relay and 800 free relay records were crushed by the Huskers. The 200 medley team of Consiglio, Randby, Vlachou and Gilford posted a 1:38.50 replacing the 2013 record of 1:39.13. Randby, Gilford, Tanko and Vlachou swam 1:29.97 in the 200 free. In the 800 free relay, Tanko, Jorgenson, Marchi and Gilford swam to a 7:07.35.

Baxter led the team in one- and threemeter diving, while Kelsey Clairmont claimed superiority in the platform diving well.

On the one-meter board, Baxter recorded a season-leading effort against Iowa State with 308.25 points.

Clairmont, a junior from Canada, logged 15 NCAA B qualifying scores. She accumulated 12 top-five scores throughout the season. Against Omaha, Clairmont collected a pair of first-place finishes on the one- and three-meter boards She earned 271.80 and 289.20 points.

Her season-leading performance on the platform came against Rutgers and Iowa in early February when she grabbed a second-place finish and 242.35 points.

Behind Baxter and Clairmont, six divers earned qualifications to compete at the Zone D Championships. Antonina Harned had nine top-five performances with Nettie Knapton following closely with eight. Knapton picked up career high scores across the full range of diving boards. Beginning with the one-meter board, Knapton notched 257.78 points to secure a fifth-place spot. At the Hawkeye Invite, the platform board prelims resulted in a 238.00 point-performance. She also collected a third-place finish on the three-meter board with 296.33 points.

She collected Zone D qualifications on the three-meter and platform board where she placed 15th on platform (489.29) and 46th on three-meter (249.00).

Junior diver Frankie Webb picked up qualifying scores on the three-meter and platform boards for the Zone D Championships. She added a second-place outcome against Omaha on the one-meter board scoring 250.56 points. She used her Rutgers diving final and Illinois performances on the three-meter board to propel her to the zone diving championships where she finished in 38th with 260.05 points. She finished in 26th on the platform with 204.35 points.

Harned collected 10 zone-qualifying scores throughout the season. She recorded eight top-three performances with distinguished displays against lowa State. Harned grabbed a pair of second-place performances on the one- and three-meter boards.

Jordyn Schmucker gathered one zonequalifying performance at the Hawkeye Invite, where she grabbed 268.30 points to secure an 11th-place finish. Ellee Delcamp logged a thirdplace spot against Omaha by scoring 259.35, which also landed her a season high on the three-meter board.

A total of 64 student-athletes from around the world have earned swimming and diving NCAA All-America honors as Huskers. The 64 Husker All-Americans have come to Nebraska from nine countries, including Americans from 18 states.

In all, Huskers have combined for 255 All-America awards, while 33 Huskers have been multi-time All-Americans.

Julia Russell owns the distinction of earning the most All-America certificates as a Husker swimmer with 18 awards from 1994 to 1997. Russell is one of seven Huskers to earn 10 or more All-America awards, including NCAA Champion Penny Heyns (15), Melanie Dodd (15), Helene Muller (15), Therese Alshammar (13), Dana Powers (10) and Shandra Johnson (10).

Alshammar, who captured her 13 All-America awards in just two seasons at Nebraska, went on to become the first female swimmer in history to appear in six Olympic Games, including the 2016 Rio Olympics for her native Sweden.



## **INDIVIDUAL ACADEMIC AWARDS**

### **COLLEGE SPORTS COMMUNICATORS (CSC) ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA AWARD WINNERS**



GENA JORGENSON 2025

In her third year as a Husker, Gena Jorgenson excelled both in competition and academics. She became the first swimmer in Husker history to earn All-America honors in the pool and the classroom. CSC Academic All-America, Jorgenson achieved a 4.0 GPA being a biological sciences major. She has earned two All-America awards for her performances in the 1,650 free.

During her time at Nebraska, Jorgenson has qualified for the NCAA Championships in the 1,650 free, 500 free and the 400 IM. She currently holds the school record in eight events between short and long course races. Specializing in long freestyle swims, she smashed through her previous record time in the 1,650 free by clocking a 15:49.99 and capturing a eighth-place finish.

Racking up several academic awards, Jorgenson was also a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and Academic All-Big Ten choice twice (2024, 2025).

Before her career at Nebraska, Jorgenson won every individual event in the South Dakota state championships for five-straight seasons. Through placing in the top 3 percent of swimmers in the United States, Jorgenson competed in the Futures Championship in July 2022. She captured titles in the 800-meter and 1,500-meter freestyle events.



ABI KNAPTON 2021

Abi Knapton was the first Husker women's swimmer or diver to capture All-America honors in both competition and in the classroom. A six-time All-American, Knapton claimed first-team CSC Academic All-America accolades in the at-large category in 2021. She posted a 3.93 GPA as a psychology major over her five-year career and was a four-time first-time All-American on platform. She was the first Husker swimmer or diver to earn first-team All-America honors four times in the same event.

As a senior in 2021. Knapton was named the Big Ten Diver of the Meet after winning conference titles in both the platform and the one meter. She added firstteam All-America honors on the platform and threemeter events at the 2021 NCAA Championships, before becoming the only female diver to finish in the top eight in both platform and three meter at the U.S. Diving Team Olympic Trials in Indianapolis.

KnaptonwasvotedNebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year and Nebraska's Best Female Athlete across all sports in 2021. She was also an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipient following her Nebraska graduation in May 2021.

The Omaha Marian High School grad was a four-time CSCAA Scholastic All-American (2017, 2018, 2019, 2021), a four-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and a four-time Academic All-Big Ten selection (2018, 2019, 2020, 2021).



LINDSAY HELFERICH 2019

Lindsay Helferich etched her name in Husker history by becoming Nebraska's third swimming and diving CSC Academic All-American in 2019. Helferich claimed secondteam honors in the at-large category following her senior season by posting a perfect 4.0 GPA during her

Helferich, a freestyle and backstroke specialist, was one of nine Huskers to be named a Nebraska Outstanding Scholar. She added a 1A FAR Academic Excellence Award and was recognized for the third time as a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar.

She also excelled in competition, finishing 26th in the 50-yard freestyle at the 2019 Big Ten Championships. Helferich posted her top career Big Ten finish by taking 21st in the 100 backstroke in 2018, while adding 27th-place showings in the 50 and 100 freestyles the same year. As a freshman in 2016, she took 24th in the 200 back at the conference meet.

Before coming to Nebraska, Helferich was a top-16 finalist in the 200 back and a top-24 finalist in the 200 free at the Southern Zone Sectional Championships. She was also the valedictorian of her class at Odessa High School in Texas.

She earned her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in May of 2019 as a civil engineering major. She was a threetime academic All-Big Ten choice and earned eight spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll.



KAITLIN ARNTZ 2010

Kaitlin Arntz earned third-team CSC Academic All-America honors in the at-large category following her senior season for the Huskers in 2010.

Arntz was one of Nebraska's top breaststroke and individual medley swimmers during her time in Lincoln. She capped her outstanding career by becoming the first CSC Academic All-America women's swimmer in school history.

Arntz capped her competitive career with a fourth-place finish in the 200-yard breaststroke at the 2010 Big 12 Championships. She added a fourth-place performance in the 100 breast and a sixth-place showing in the 200 IM.

She finished fifth in the 200-yard breaststroke and 11th in the 200 IM at the 2009 Big 12 Championships. She was Nebraska's team MVP as a junior.

As both a freshman and sophomore, Arntz finished eighth in the 200 breast and 10th in the 100 breast at the Big 12 Championships.

Arntz joined the Huskers after a stellar high school career at Millard West in Omaha. She was a 16-time All-American at Millard West and a five-Nebraska state champion. She closed her high school career holding seven school records.

An advertising major at Nebraska, Arntz was nominated with a 3.94 cumulative GPA. She also earned first-team CSC All-District VII honors. An honorable-mention CSCAA Scholar-All-America selection in 2010, Arntz was also a three-time academic All-Big 12 Conference selection for the Big Red from 2008 to 2010.



COURTNEY JENSEN 2000

Courtney Jensen capped an outstanding academic and athletic career as a first-team CSC Academic All-America selection in the at-large category as a senior in 2000

Jensen, a Husker cocaptain and four-year letterwinner from Sheridan, Wyo., was a leader for Nebraska in the diving well throughout her career.

As a senior, Jensen produced a career-best 11th-place finish on the three-meter board at the 2000 Big 12 Conference Championships. She added a 17th-place performance in the one-meter dive.

As a junior, Jensen took 13th on the three-meter board at the 1999 Big 12 Championships, while adding a 23rd-place finish in the one-meter event.

Those performances followed a sophomore season in which she placed 21st on the three-meter and 22nd on the onemeter at the 1998 Big 12 Championships.

She opened her Husker career with 13th-place finishes on both the oneand three-meter boards as a freshman at the 1997 Big 12 meet.

A high school All-American both in competition and in the classroom, Jensen was a two-time Wyoming state champion at Sheridan High School.

elementary An education major at Nebraska, Jensen was nominated for the CSC All-America Academic At-Large team with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average. She claimed firstteam CSC All-District VII honors to advance to the national ballot and become Nebraska's first female swimming and diving CSC Academic All-American.

## **HUSKER OLYMPIANS**



### THERESE ALSHAMMAR (SWEDEN) 1996, 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012, 2016

The first six-time female Olympic swimmer in history, Therese Alshammar lettered for the Huskers in 1998 and 1999. Considered one of the top female freestyle sprinters in the world, Alshammar set two records at the 2000 European Short Course Championships. Alshammar took home three medals from the Sydney Olympics, a pair of silvers and a bronze.



### ELVIRA FISCHER (AUSTRIA) 1996, 2000

A two-time Olympian, Fischer was a three-time All-American while at Nebraska. Fischer's top finish at the 1996 Olympics was 23rd in the 200-meter breaststroke (2:33.87). At the Sydney Olympics in 2000, Fischer's top performance was in the 100-meter breaststroke, where she touched the wall in 1:11.58, placing 24th overall, and winning her heat.



### PENNY HEYNS (SOUTH AFRICA) 1992, 1996, 2000

A three-time Olympian, Penny Heyns became the most successful Olympian for South Africa and Nebraska at the same time. A Husker senior in 1996, Heyns' successful year culminated with two Olympic gold medals. For more on Heyns, please see page 100.



### EMMA JOHNSON (AUSTRALIA) 1996

Emma Johnson competed for the Huskers during the 1998-99 season, earning All-America honors in the 400-yard IM at the 1999 NCAA Championships. She established the Nebraska record in the 400-yard IM at the 1998 Texas Invitational. Johnson finished fifth in the 400-meter IM at the 1996 Olympics, while also earning a bronze medal swimming on the Aussie's third-place 800-meter freestyle relay team.



### WENDY LUCERO (UNITED STATES) 1988

Wendy Lucero competed for Nebraska from 1981 to 1983. Lucero's freshman season was highlighted by a runner-up finish in three-meter diving and a fourth-place finish on the one meter at the 1982 Big Eight Championships. Later that season, Lucero placed eighth at U.S. Nationals. A native of Denver, Colo., Lucero competed for the United States at the 1988 Olympics.



### LENKA MANHALOVA (CZECH REPUBLIC) 1992, 1996

Lenka Manhalova finished 11th in the 200-meter breaststroke and 29th in the 100-meter breaststroke at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta. A Czech National Team member, Manhalova was a two-time All-American at Nebraska, including a fifth-place 200-yard breaststroke finish at the 1997 NCAA Championships. Manhalova was also the 1998 Big 12 200-yard breaststroke champion.



### ANJA MARGETIC (BOSNIA) 1992

Anja Margetic was a member of the Bosnian team for the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona. Margetic finished 27th in the 200-meter butterfly and 44th in the 100-meter butterfly. Margetic earned All-America honors at Nebraska in 1994 as a member of the 400-yard medley relay that notched a 13th-place finish at the NCAA Championships.



## TERRIE MILLER (NORWAY) 1996

A standout breaststroker from 1997 to 1999, Terrie Miller earned All-America honors in each of her three seasons competing for Nebraska. As a freshman, she placed eighth in the 100-yard breaststroke at the NCAA Championships. She earned All-America honors competing on NU's medley relays in both 1998 and 1999. At the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, she placed 20th in the 100-meter breaststroke.



### HELENE MULLER (SOUTH AFRICA) 1996, 2000

Former Husker All-American Helene Muller swam for her native South Africa during the 1996 and 2000 Olympic Games. Muller lettered from 1997 to 2000, garnering All-America honors for the Huskers 13 times, including a bronze medal in the 200-meter freestyle at the 2000 NCAA Championships.



### BEATRIZ PADRON (COSTA RICA) 2020

Beatriz Padron earned an Olympic berth as the lone women's swimmer for Costa Rica at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics in the summer of 2021. Padron competed in the 200-meter freestyle, finishing 25th overall with a lifetime-best 2:04.56 in the preliminary heats. A Costa Rican National Team member since 2015, Padron competed in Tokyo before arriving at Nebraska as a freshman.



### JULIA RUSSELL (SOUTH AFRICA) 1996


Julia Russell took 12th in the 200-meter breaststroke in Atlanta in a career-best time of 2:30.38. She also finished 17th in the 100-meter breast and 26th in the 200 IM. In 1997, the 18-time All-American was the NCAA runner-up in the 200-yard breaststroke and the Big 12 Swimmer of the Year. She won three events at the 1997 Big 12 Championships, while finishing with 108 points at the NCAA Championships.



### ANNA WINDSOR (AUSTRALIA) 1996, 2000

Anna Windsor competed for NU during the 1997 and 1998 seasons. A two-time NCAA finalist in the 200-yard freestyle, Windsor placed seventh in the event in 1997. She swam on NU's runner-up 800 freestyle relay at the 1998 NCAA Championships. A nine-time All-American, Windsor swam for Australia's eighth-place 400-meter free relay team at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta. She also competed at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

## **NEBRASKA'S GOLDEN PENNY**

Amanzimtoti, South Africa

Olympic Gold & Bronze Medalist

World Record Holder

It's not every day you run across a golden penny.

But for South Africans and Nebraskans alike, there was one shining bright at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta.

Penny Heyns, a former University of Nebraska standout, earned two gold medals and became the first female in Olympic history to sweep the breaststroke events.

Heyns' whirlwind year of success began on the collegiate level. In Husker suit and cap at the 1996 Big Eight Championships in mid-February, Heyns set a then-NCAA and U.S. Open record in the 200-yard breaststroke (2:08.90), as well as an NU record in the 100yard event (1:00.18) to help Nebraska win its third consecutive conference crown.

After setting the records, Heyns was forced to travel home for the South African Olympic Trials, which were inconveniently scheduled between the two most important collegiate meets, the conference and national championships.

Nevertheless, it proved to be a trip Heyns would never forget.

During the preliminary heat of the 100-meter breaststroke at the trials, Heyns set a world record with a time of 1:07.46.

The time broke the record held by Australia's Samantha Riley, who had set a mark of 1:07.69 in September, 1994.

Just days after her return from South Africa, Heyns became the first Husker to win a national championship at the NCAA Championships in Ann Arbor, Mich.

Heyns dominated the 100-yard breaststroke with a pool-record 1:00.27 and also earned a silver medal in the 200-yard breaststroke with a 2:09.71 performance.

Heyns then entered the Olympics as the frontrunner in the 100-meter breaststroke event. She proved she had earned that title in the preliminaries, as she blew away the competition and shattered her own world record in a clocking of 1:07.02 in the process.

In the finals, Heyns got off to a quick start, but didn't dominate as she had in the prelims. America's Amanda Beard began her trademark kick at the 50-meter mark and almost caught Heyns at the wall. Heyns held on to finish in 1:07.72 and edged Beard (1:08.09), to claim gold for the first time.

Two days later, Heyns proved she wasn't finished.

After setting an Olympic record of 2:26.63 in the preliminaries of the 200-meter breaststroke, Heyns was timed at 2:25.41 in the finals and again beat out Beard (2:25.75) for the gold. Beard entered the Olympics ranked No. 1 in the 200, but couldn't catch up with the quick pace Heyns set from the start.

"That was one of the hardest races I ever swam," Heyns said following the race. "I'm just glad I had the guts to hang in there."

At a press conference in Lincoln, Neb., the week following her gold medal performances, Heyns admitted she was surprised about the win in the 200.

"In some ways, I sit back, and I really can't believe it," Heyns said. "The

200 (win) was totally unexpected. I don't think it has sunk in yet.'

An extremely successful career at Nebraska fine-tuned Heyns for Olympic success. A 15-time All-American and 14-time conference champion for the Huskers, Heyns left Nebraska as the most decorated swimmer in the program's history. Heyns' accomplishments at Nebraska and on the international level will always be recognized.

Heyns has continually showed her appreciation for the University of Nebraska and its athletic department.

Following her double gold medal performance, Heyns didn't waste any

time in thanking the Nebraska Swimming and Diving Program and its support staff for the role they played in her Olympic success.

"There is no way I would even be swimming today if I didn't come to Nebraska," Heyns said. "Nebraska has done so much for me that I could never express it. It's not just swimming, it's a family to me -- the whole coaching staff and all my friends."

For the next four years Heyns continued to define excellence in the sport of swimming on a world-class level by producing one of the greatest performances in the history of the sport.

At the 1999 Pan Pacific Championships, Heyns established three world records. Winning gold in both the 100- and 200-meter breaststrokes, Heyns touched the wall in 1:06.52 and 2:23.64, respectively, both world bests. In addition, she swam an exhibition 50-meter breaststroke, posting another world record with a time of 30.83.

Heyns took home her third medal at the 2000 Sydney Olympics by earning a bronze medal in the 100-meter breaststroke in a time of 1:07.55.
