Dear Students, Staff, Parents and Guardians,

As we approach the end of another busy and rewarding calendar year at Coláiste Eoin, I want to take a moment to reflect on all that we have achieved together as a school community, and to offer my thanks — to our students, our staff, and to the families, for your continued support.

The students of the school are working hard and applying themselves to all class work, homework assignments and revision. Assessments have been completed for all year groups and parent teacher meetings will have taken place for 2nd, 4th, 5th and 6th year students by the end of term. Our 1:1 devices are working extremely well in the year groups of 2nd and 5th year as part of a blended learning approach using textbooks and digital devices. This has been a significant development for our school and we look forward to the roll-out of this initiative for next years 2nd and 5th year cohorts as well again for 2026-2027.

This term has been marked by tremendous energy, creativity and community spirit. Our annual Lip-Sync Show, held in November, was a shining example of this across multiple nights, students from all year groups showcased their talents — on stage, behind the scenes, and in support roles — helping to turn the event into a celebration of inclusion, joy and shared pride in our school. The enthusiasm and dedication of all involved — performers, technicians, teachers and volunteers — reminded us what it means to belong to the Coláiste Eoin family.
