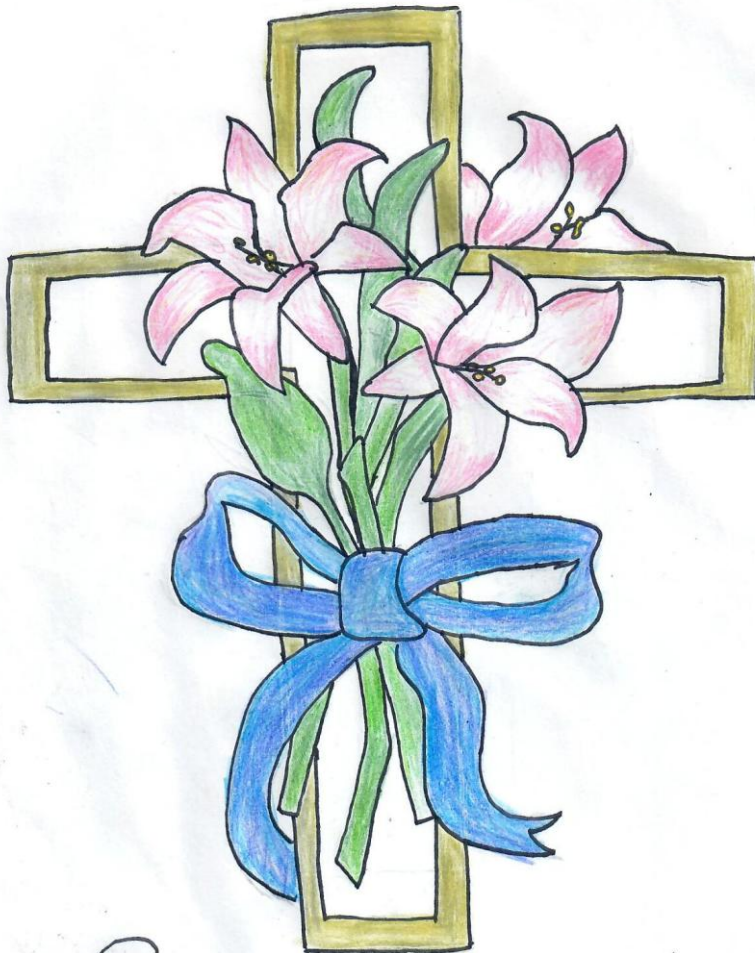

3. What did he receive for his acts of courage and bravery?

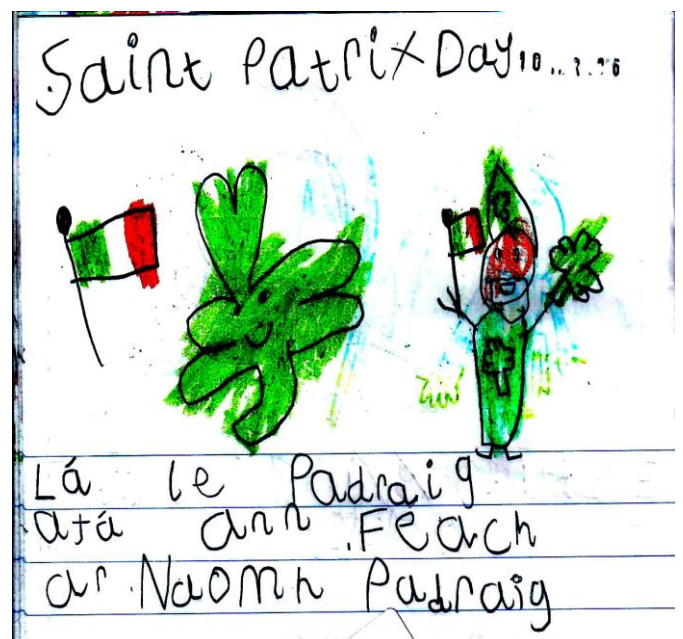
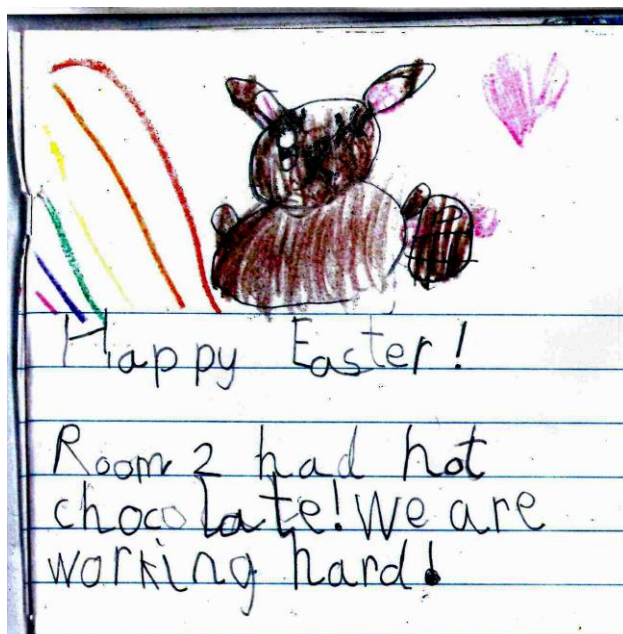

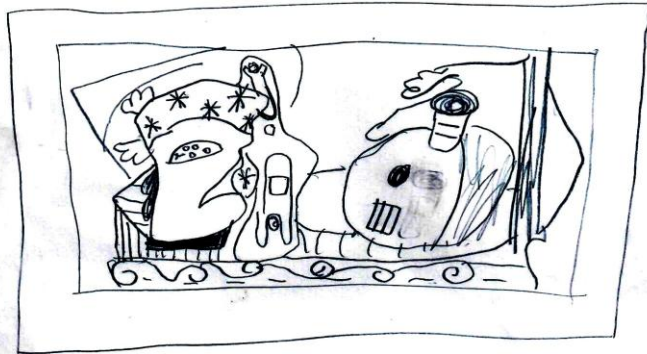
In January, both classes made a trip to see the Picasso exhibition in the National Gallery of Ireland – more about that elsewhere in the Nuacht na Scoile

Rang 3

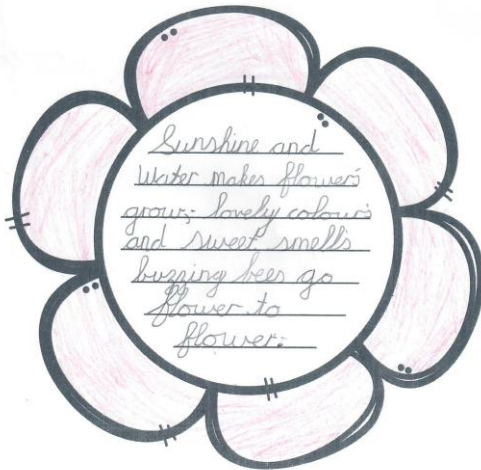

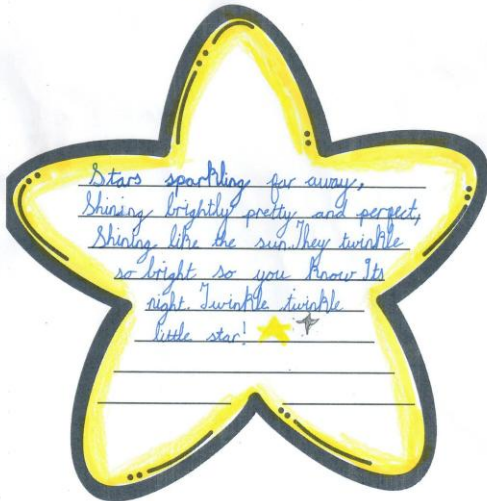
The girls are working in groups to research their Netherlands projects and are also learning about Anne Frank in history.

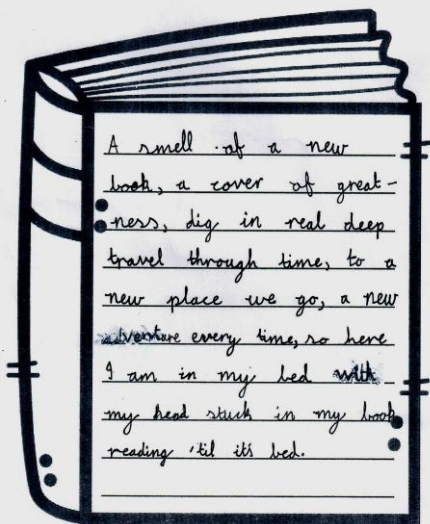

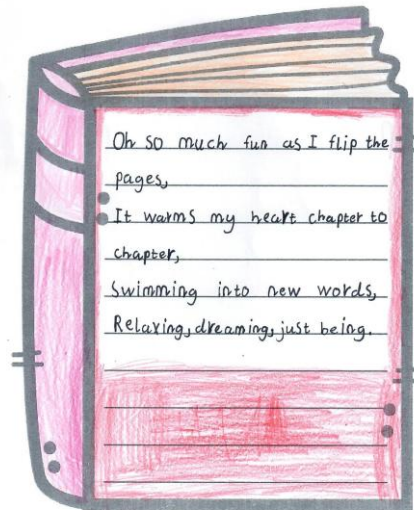

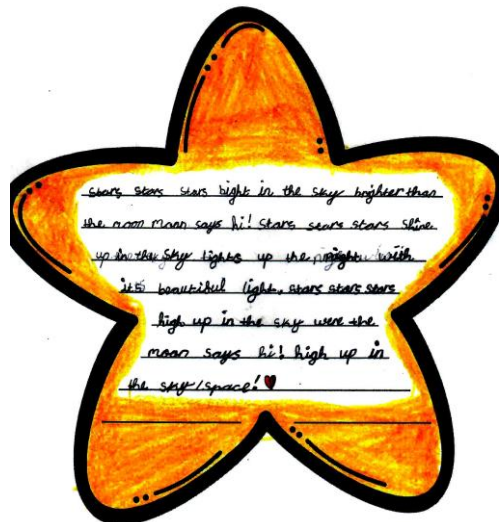


3rd class library trip

How to grow a Sunflower

Equipment: Pot, Compost, trowel and Sunflower Seeds.

How to grow

- Step 1** Scoop some soil into the pot using a trowel. 
- Step 2** Then you flatten down the soil and make a hole in it.
- Step 3** Then add the seed into the middle of the soil.
- Step 4** Cover the seed in soil. 
- Step 5** Next add a drop of water. 
- Step 6** Finally put next to a window and don't forget to water it every day. 

Important tip: make sure not to over water it



How to grow a sunflower

Equipment: trowel, compost, sunflower seed, and a pot

How to grow

- Step 1** First scoop the soil into the pot and put it down. 
- Step 2** Next get your little finger and make a hole about a fingernail deep. 
- Step 3** Then get your seeds and poke them in the hole. make sure the pointy side is facing the bottom. 
- Step 4** Next put a small bit of soil over the hole fill you can't see the seed. 
- Step 5** After that put about 3 small drops of water on the soil. Make sure not to over water it or it will die. 
- Step 6** Finally place the pot in a sunny place I would recommend a window and water daily and it should grow.

School Attendance

If your child is not present at roll call, she will be marked absent and you will get a notification on Aladdin Connect stating this. It is always necessary to let the school know why your child is absent. This is easily done through Aladdin Connect.

If your child has an appointment and arrives late to school, she will be marked absent if she is not present at roll call. You will receive a text stating this. This will happen even if you have notified the school in advance. Her class teacher will record that it was a late arrival, rather than an absence for the full day.

We receive many queries regarding this point. We cannot mark a child present at roll call if she isn't present in the school at that time.

If your child is frequently missing days from school when she is not ill, this will have a negative impact on her overall progress for the year.

The following information is taken from the TESS website:

What is TESS?

TESS is Tusla Education Support Service and operates under the Education (Welfare) Act, 2000, a piece of legislation that emphasises the promotion of school attendance, participation and retention. TESS has three strands namely the Statutory Educational Welfare Service (EWS) and the two school support services the Home School Community Liaison Scheme (HSCL) and the School Completion Programme (SCP). The three strands work together collaboratively with schools, families and other relevant services to achieve the best educational outcomes for children and young people.

What is an Educational Welfare Officer?

Educational Welfare Officers (EWOs) are based throughout the country to offer advice and guidance to parents who need support in ensuring that their child attends schools regularly.

If the school is concerned about the attendance of your child, we can make a referral to TESS. Once this referral is screened and assigned to the local EWO, the EWO will contact the school to get a picture of what's going on and to ensure that efforts have been made by us to help the child. They will then contact the family and meet with them. Home visits are an essential part of an EWO's work and the first meeting with an EWO very often opens up a pathway of solutions for a child and family needing support. Once problems have been identified the EWO will work with those involved to improve the situation for the child/young person.

What should I do if my child is absent from school?

You must tell the school that your child cannot attend and the reason why. This can be done through Aladdin Connect.

Can I take my child on holidays during term time?

Taking a holiday during term time means that children miss important school time. It may be difficult for them to catch up on work later on. As a result, they may fall behind with school work and lose confidence in their abilities. TESS strongly advises parents not to take their children out of school for holidays during term time.
