UNIT 6: SUMMARIZING MULTIPLE REFERENCES

Source Text A

A Magnificent Monument

Pentre Ifan, a monument of seven giant stones, stands on the lush green hills of the Welsh countryside. From a distance the historic stone monument appears to be simply a pile of stones. However, as one nears the site, it becomes clear that the stones are not carelessly piled but carefully placed. Most archaeologists believe Pentre Ifan, which means Ivan's Village, was built over five thousand years ago as a dolmen (an ancient tomb composed of massive stones covered by the earth). However, how men in 3500 BC manipulated large stones in order to build this massive structure that has withstood centuries of natural disasters remains a mystery. Perfectly positioned to frame the towering hills in the distance, three eight-foot stones stand on end, balancing a sixteen-ton, nearly seventeen-foot long capstone. It is suggested that these four stones formed the frame of a communal burial chamber. Two nearby stones likely served as the frame for the tomb entrance while a seventh stone sealed the entrance. Because excavations in the 1930s and 1950s revealed bits of pottery but no bones, some question if the structure



functioned as a dolmen or if it were built merely for show. Regardless of its purpose, today this magnificent monument serves as a shadow of the past.







Source Text B

The Mysterious Pentre Ifan

All over the world mysterious structures composed of giant rocks stand as silent reminders of forgotten historic civilizations. One such megalith is Pentre Ifan in Wales. This seven-stone structure consists of one enormous flat stone held eight feet above the ground by three other giant stones. The raised stone is 16 1/2 feet long, about 8 feet wide, and weighs 16 tons. That is enormous! How could ancient men have placed it there? Nearby three more stones stand. Together these stones are believed to have framed a kind of ancient tomb called a dolmen. Because of its size, it likely would have been a tomb for many people. Oddly, though, no evidence of burials at the site has ever been discovered. Adding to the mystery surrounding Pentre Ifan are the many theories regarding megaliths. For example, some people are convinced that ancient civilizations had far-advanced technology that we still would not understand. Others tell of giants arranging the stones because the Bible and other ancient writings and pictures depict giants on the earth long ago. Pentre Ifan in particular has intriguing folklore surrounding it. Welsh stories tell of friendly fairies from the nearby hills placing the stones. Supposedly, they tend to the site when people leave them gifts of bread, butter, or honey. They play music and dance there at night. During a full moon, people who get too near and hear the music cannot stop dancing, and the fairies carry them away to their world. Such folklore adds to the intrigue of the mysterious Pentre Ifan.
