RULES AND CONTEST INFORMATION

1. Judges' decisions are final.
2. No traction compound allowed.
3. All weights certified on house scales.
4. First puller in each class has the option to take that pull or drop to third pulling position.
5. If not ready by your pull number, you may drop to last pull in class.
6. Steering is prohibited.
7. If alterations do not conform to the intention of rules, judges may disqualify.
8. All power supplies must be in D.C. only.
9. Truck has to complete the pull in 20 seconds.
10. Ribbons will be awarded as prizes.
11. The Southeast Iowa Stomper Pulling Association and volunteers are not responsible for any accidents that may occur during any of the pulls.

RULES AND CONTEST INFORMATION

1. Contestants bag identical grocery orders consisting of approximately 35 commonly purchased items into three reusable grocery bags
2. Contestants are scored and ranked primarily on weight distribution among bags, speed and proper item arrangement.

DESCRIPTION: Local talent advances to the State Fair to show off their talents. A panel of judges names a champion of the senior division and several Sprout Champions.

Rules and Contest Information:

1. Show is open to legal residents of the state of Iowa only. Acts must appear in a locally sponsored/Iowa State Fair sanctioned show somewhere in the state of Iowa and be the show qualifier to be eligible to compete at the Iowa State Fair. Judges' decisions are final.

2. Sprouts: Ages 2 through 12 Seniors: Ages 13 through 21

Seniors and Sprouts must qualify within the age requirement at local shows. For example, if you are 21 and don't qualify before you are 22, you are ineligible. All Sprout acts must qualify for the State Fair at the age of 12 or under.

The following applies only to the competition at the Iowa State Fair, NOT local shows:

A person's age for the Iowa State Fair competition is determined at the time they win a local show. A 12 year old who wins a local show (or 21 year old) could turn 13 (or 22) by the State Fair and still be eligible in the Sprout (or Senior) division, as they met age requirements at the time of qualification at a local show.

This applies to individuals or anyone in a group who qualifies at a local show at age 12 but turns 13 before the State Fair. If more than one performer in a group turns 13 before the State Fair, thus making the Sprout act have two or more 13 year olds, that act will automatically become a Senior act.

3. Professionals are NOT permitted to compete. This includes Union musicians and anyone whose principal source of income is from their talent. Compensation for performing at weddings, etc. does not constitute principle source of income.

4. Acts must keep the performance to three minutes. Acts timed past three minutes are subject to possible disqualification or point deduction. Five seconds over would be a starting point to begin deductions, ten seconds over or longer can be considered for disqualification. This is at the judges' discretion and should be monitored closely. At the local level this would be a great opportunity for show coordinators to let an act know that they were over the time limit. We have two different timers at the state level so we are very serious about the three minute rule. Set up time is not included. Limit set up time to one minute.

5. No more than five persons are allowed in an act. Piano accompanist is NOT included in an act and may be any age. No more than three accompanists permitted per act. Drums, amps, etc. are discouraged due to the one-minute set-up time. No combos, rock bands or similar musical groups permitted.
6. Acts will be required to meet with the show coordinator or emcee a minimum of 45 minutes to an hour prior to the show to get checked in.
7. Acts will need name, complete address, birth date, age, phone number (include area code), email and type of talent. Multiple acts need one member to act as a contact person with all information going through them. Additional members of the act need only birth date, age and town. DO NOT PROVIDE SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS TO LOCAL SHOW COORDINATORS.
8. Acts are asked to not dance onto or off the stage. After introductions, you may take any position you wish to begin your performance.
9. Vocalists can perform with an accompanist or CD/Ipod/USB flashdrive. Prerecorded tracks should be instrumental only. Any prerecorded track with backing vocals is not allowed, and the act will be disqualified.
10. Looping (typically seen in vocal or instrumental performances) is allowed as part of an act as long as each loop is performed live on stage. Previously recorded loops will not be allowed. Looping equipment must be provided by the contestant.
11. Foul language is not allowed in the Bill Riley Talent Search. Acts performing to or singing pieces with inappropriate lyrics will be disqualified and the show coordinator should encourage performers to compete with a different song.
12. Contestants may only appear once in any given show. This applies to qualifying shows as well as the competition at the Iowa State Fair. They may not perform "solo" and then return in the same show in a duet or trio. Contestants are allowed to perform in different acts in different shows, but they may only qualify for the State Fair Show with one act. Once a performer has qualified for the State Fair they are not allowed to perform in local shows as part of another act. They may keep competing in local shows with the qualifying performance.
13. Only one qualifier from each division (Sprout and Senior) of a local show is permitted to advance to the Iowa State Fair. NO TIES are permitted in all placing.
14. Exceptions may be made at the discretion of Iowa State Fair staff or Bill Riley Jr.

Semi-Finalists: Semi-finalists from the 2025 Iowa State Fair Bill Riley Talent Search are automatically qualified for the 2026 State Fair competition. You do not have to re-qualify by winning at the local level show, but you are encouraged to compete at local shows. If you win at the local level show, you are entitled to the prize money, but you must inform the emcee that you have already qualified for the State Fair. The second place winner will then be able to advance to the State Fair competition.

Birthdays and Semi-Finalists: 2025 semi-finalists returning in 2026 will perform in the division for their current age as of the 2026 Iowa State Fair.

Iowa State Fair Championship Show:

Sprout Division Champions: There will be 6 Sprout Champions showcased in the Championship Show. Sprout Champions in the Sprout division must sit out one year of competition. They also must re-qualify when returning after the one-year absence, and be 12 years old or less to compete in the Sprout division.

Senior Division Championship: There will be 9 finalists in competition. All finalists in the Senior division must sit out one year - they cannot perform as an individual or in a group during the next year. They also must re-qualify when returning after the one-year absence, and be 21 years old or less. The "Grand Champion" of the Senior division is no longer allowed to compete in the Bill Riley Talent Search at the local or State Fair level.

Entry fee: \$2 per division; Scholastic divisions include entry fee into Speed Chess tournament.

1. You are encouraged (but not required) to pre-register.

DESCRIPTION: Cribbage is a card game with two to four players with the task of reaching card counts of exactly 15 or 31.

RULES AND CONTEST INFORMATION

Entry fee: \$1 for singles

1. You **MUST** bring cards, boards and ink pens. These items will **NOT** be furnished.
2. Boards all face same direction during play.
3. Cut for deal at the start of each game. Low card wins. Cards will be cut before each deal.
4. If your opponent misses points in counting, you cannot take their points. After a hand is counted and the peg set, you cannot take points missed; if you take too many, you must move back.
5. If a Jack is cut and the Dealer needs only two points to go out, the Dealer wins the game.
6. Eight games will be played. One side of the table moves four times to the right. Then, the opposite side moves four times to its right.
7. Any mistakes in writing down scores or misunderstandings in hand counting must be checked by the judges for a final decision.
8. No helping another player count points, unless you are personally playing that game.
9. Two points for a win; three points for a win with a skunk; zero points for a loss.
10. No alcohol is permitted at this event.
11. Registration money will be pro-rated back in prizes. Ribbons will be awarded to first through 10th place. Trophies awarded for the first five places.
12. A special Iowa State Fair plaque will be awarded to anyone who holds a 29 hand.

DESCRIPTION: This contest involves decorating a diaper in one of three categories. The Diaper Derby is a race of babies under 24 months.

RULES AND CONTEST INFORMATION: DECORATED DIAPER CONTEST

1. Three categories will be judged: Celebrating America-250 years! Diaper, Iowa State Fair Diaper and Group Theme Diaper.
2. Contestants will be assigned a number during registration, which must be clearly in view of the judges at all times during the competition.
3. All babies must be under the age of 24 months.
4. All babies must be in decorated diaper attire, disposable or cloth. Contestants may design a costume to coordinate with the diaper, but the diaper must be visible for judges.
5. Judging for all categories will be based on originality, creativity, public appeal and overall effect. (The Iowa State Fair diaper can be anything that reminds you of the Fair.)
6. First and Second place winners in each category will receive a trophy. Third through Fifth place winners will receive a ribbon. All other contestants will be awarded participation ribbons.
7. Judges' decisions are final.

Rules and Contest Information: Diaper Derby

1. Each "racer" must be accompanied by two adult "coaches."
2. "Racers" participating in the Diaper Derby are required to independently crawl from one end of the mat to the other without any assistance. "Racers" cannot walk.
3. The "coaches" can be behind the start and finish lines and can use toys, dolls, baby bottles, keys, etc., as incentives to finish.
4. No "coaches" can assist the "racer" or cross the starting line or finish line during the race, or the "racer" will be disqualified.
5. The winning "racers" must cross the finish line on their own.

DESCRIPTION: This contest involves a fast-paced, partner-style card competition where teams go through multiple quick matches to rack up points and advance.

RULES AND CONTEST INFORMATION

1. Each game consists of 8 hands and uses a total of 24 cards: nines through aces from a standard deck.
2. Table numbers and partner numbers are issued on individual scorecards in order of tournament registration. Scorecards designate each player's starting table, and partner assignments are determined by number: the two lowest numbers are partners, the two highest numbers are partners, and so on. Players may be paired with the same partner later in the tournament, but not in consecutive games.
3. The dealer is determined by dealing cards face up until the first jack appears. The dealer shuffles the cards and then offers a cut to the opponent sitting on the dealer's right. The dealer deals five cards to each player and the card is turned face-up from the four cards remaining.
4. The player to the dealer's left starts the bidding and can order the dealer to pick up the face-up card by calling trump (suit) or pass. If the face-up card is ordered up, that card becomes trump. The dealer may add the card to their hand and discard another card. Bidding continues clockwise until trump is determined. If all players pass during the first round of bidding, the top card is turned face down, and that suit may not be called as trump. If no suit is chosen during the second round of bidding, the dealer must call trump. After the hand is completed, the player to the dealer's left deals. This repeats until each player deals twice in each game.
5. Refer to the scoring scenarios below based on the number of tricks each team wins.
6. If a player declares that they are going alone, their partner does not play that hand. If the declarer wins three or four tricks, they receive one point (no set occurs). Refer to the scoring section below.
7. Each couple shall pay a quarter when set. A set occurs when the defenders (the opposing team of the bidders) win three or more tricks.
8. One person at each table will volunteer to keep score. The scorer writes down the score in cumulative format after each hand. All players at the table are responsible for reviewing the scorekeeper's math after each hand to ensure accuracy.
9. At the end of each game (8 hands), the individual player's scorecard shall be completed and signed by their teammate. Individual scorecards include a column for each game, as well as a cumulative total for all eight games.

10. If a game ends in a tie, the team that won the hand shall move to the next table in the direction of the lower-numbered tables (for example, winners at Table 10 move to Table 9). There is no head table (i.e., players must switch partners each consecutive game).
11. Table talk is prohibited. Partners are forbidden from giving any indication or clues as to what they hold in their hand or what should be played.
12. A farmer's hand (also known as "no ace, no face") is not permitted. Players are required to play the cards they are dealt.
13. Players are not required to pick up a turned-up jack.

SCORING

1. If bidding team wins 3 or 4 tricks, 1 point goes to the bidding team.
2. If bidding team wins all 5 tricks, 2 points go to the bidding team.
3. If bidding team wins 2 tricks a set occurs, 2 points for the defenders. Both bidding partners are now required to pay a quarter.
4. If bidding team goes alone and wins all 5 tricks, 4 points go to the bidding team.
5. If bidding team goes alone and wins 3 or 4 tricks, 1 point goes to the bidding team.
6. If bidding team goes alone and wins 2 tricks a set occurs, defenders receive 2 points. Both bidding partners are required to pay a quarter.
7. Failure to follow suit without player immediately correcting error results in an automatic set, 2 points.

RULES AND CONTEST INFORMATION

1. Individuals competing in the State Fair Spelling Bee must qualify under the following basic requirements:

- a. They must have completed school in the grade level of competition they enter;
- b. They must NOT have reached ON OR BEFORE January 1, 2026 their ninth (9) birthday for First and Second grade competition; their eleventh (11) birthday for Third and Fourth grade competition; and thirteenth (13) birthday for Fifth and Sixth grade competition.

2. Words used in the State Fair Spelling Bee shall be selected from the Scripps National Spelling Bee Word list. (Practice lists will be mailed out in July).

3. Words shall be pronounced according to the diacritical markings Scripps National Spelling Bee Word list rules. With the approval of the judges, he/she may give a fuller explanation of the meaning of the words to supplement the dictionary definition or definitions quoted. 4. In competition, after the pronouncer gives the contestant a word, the contestant will be encouraged to pronounce the word before spelling it and after spelling it. However, no contestant will be eliminated for failing to pronounce a word.

5. The contestant may request the pronouncer to pronounce the word again, define it or use it in a sentence. If the contestant has a specific root word in mind, the contestant may ask if the dictionary lists that word as the root of the word to be spelled. The pronouncer shall grant all such requests until the judges agree that the word has been made reasonably clear to the contestant. **THE JUDGES MAY DISQUALIFY ANY CONTESTANT WHO IGNORES A REQUEST TO START SPELLING.**

6. Having started to spell a word, a contestant may stop and start over, retracing the spelling from the beginning, but in retracing there can be NO change of letters or their sequence from those first pronounced. If letters or their sequence is changed in the respelling, the speller will be eliminated.

7. The State Fair Spelling Bee shall be conducted in rounds. Each contestant remaining in the Bee at the start of a round shall spell one word in the round and each subsequent round, except as provided in rules 9, 10, and 11. Upon missing the spelling of a word, a contestant immediately drops out of the contest, except as provided in rules 10 and 11.

8. The State Fair Spelling Bee shall be conducted in rounds. Each contestant remaining in the Bee at the start of a round shall spell one word in the round and each subsequent round, except as provided in rules 9, 10, and 11.

9. If none of the contestants remaining in the Bee at the start of a round spells a word correctly during the round, all shall remain in the competition.

10. If only one of the contestants remaining in the Bee at the start of a round spells a word correctly during that round, the contestant shall be given an opportunity to spell the next word on the list. If the contestant succeeds in correctly spelling the new word, the contestant shall be declared the champion. Otherwise, all the contestants remaining in the Bee at the start of the round shall remain in the competition. A new round will begin, with all of the contestants spelling in their original order.

11. When there are only five contestants left in the competition and one of the contestants misspells a word, the next contestant must spell the next two words correctly in order to eliminate the speller who misspelled his/her word. We continue in this fashion until we have only one person remaining.

12. Scripps National Spelling Bee shall serve as the final authority for the spellings of words in the State Fair Spelling Bee. If more than one spelling is listed for a word, any of these spellings will be accepted as correct if the word either matches the pronunciation and definition provided by the pronouncer, or if it is clearly identified as being a standard variant of the word that the contestant has been asked to spell. Spelling at other locations having archaic, obsolete or regional labels (such as North, Midland, South, British, Irish) that are different from those at the main entry will NOT be accepted as correct.

13. If a word has one or more homonyms, the pronouncer will indicate which word is to be spelled. If the listed word is not properly identified, either by defining it or by distinguishing the homonyms, any correct spelling of any homonym of the word will be accepted.

14. Any questions relating to the spelling of a word should be referred to the designated official immediately in writing on a grievance form. The deadline for filing a grievance is before the contestant affected would have received his/her next word had he/she stayed in the contest. No grievance will be entertained after that word has been given to another speller. When only two spellers remain, an oral grievance must be made immediately, that is, before the second speller has started to spell the word given to him/her, or, if both have missed the same word, before the corrected spelling is given to the audience.

15. The judges are in complete control of the Bee. Their decision shall be final on all questions. Previous winners in each Bee may not compete again in the age group they have won.
