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Percy:

Then another, shortly after the trial, another farmer came to me and he definitely, I can't give his name, but he said two of them were approached by Monsanto during the trial to test, testify to say things negative about me. And they were offered \$20,000 worth of chemical, no cash, but chemicals, if they would come and testify against me on certain issues, negative issues or things that were basically not true.

And that was not the only, that was not the only two people that come and told me that. There was another person that worked for a chemical for, a company that sold chemicals. And he said, Monsanto came to him rep because he was selling Monsanto seed. Well, Monsanto came to him and said, well, first of all, they bought them like every Friday night, they'd buy him a dinner. Or so he was a dealer for them, with one of the seed companies, one of the bigger ones in Western Canada. And he said, we want you to give us some seed and say it was Percy Schmeiser's seed. And we'll, we will give you chemicals in return for doing this. And indeed he did do this. He produced seed and I had nothing to do with the seed company, but he said he obtained the seed by getting from a former company, or whatever. So he testified for Monsanto against me that this was my seed and he had

So about a year, in fact, this was in June, the following February or March, there was a function for one of my granddaughters. I think it was a figure skating function. And this person that testified against me came up to me, and he made small talk and he said to me, and I'll give you this person's name even. And he said to me, he said, how are things going? I said, well, I'm still in court. And, and he knew that I didn't want to talk to him because when he said things that were totally false. And then he said to me, I want to talk to you sometime. And he worked for this. He was also a farmer, but he was also the manager of the seed department of this seed company. So indeed I did go out to, I went to the seed company first in the next town. And he was at his farm. So I went out to his farm.

And

He told me, he said, look at these pails here. And they were Monsanto's Roundup, herbicide, spray pails. He said, I, he apologized to me for what he had done.

And

Yeah. And he said he was bought by Monsanto. He was given chemicals to do what he did. And he said, he took seed, Monsanto's seed, give it to Monsanto to have tested and said it was my seed, but he could easily do this because he was a seed dealer for Monsanto.

And then,

And I said, you perjured yourself, you lied on the stand. And he said, yes, I know. And this was like I said, probably April, May in July, the man was dead. I didn't know when he talked to me that he had some kind of a liver ailment or cancer of the liver. I don't know. But but I often, you know, that's the sad part. And I often wondered that he knew, he knew he was dying. And I guess he didn't want to die with that on his, in his mind. But this went and his name was Morris Hoffman.

Jeffrey:

When he showed you the pails at his, at his farm did he tell you what percent... what, how many dollars value that he'd gotten for his testimony?

Percy:

No, he didn't, but I would say it would have been, okay. A pail of Roundup is roughly 80, \$90. I would say...

Jeffrey:

How many pails?

Percy:

I would say at least a thousand dollars worth of the pails I've seen. If they were all of his, that he got all of them, but he just said, here, look, just like that. And along the end of his shed, you know, it's a big shed. These pails were laying.

Jeffrey:

Is he married?

Percy:

Yeah. And that's why I have not said too much. Two, two or three children.

Jeffrey:

What's his...?

Percy:

He was not an older man. You know,

Jeffrey:

What's his wife's name?

Percy:

I don't know. It's in, if you want more stuff more on that story, it's on my website,

Jeffrey:

The story of you going...

Percy:

Yeah. Of Morris, Hoffman. That was a hard thing to do to put it on the website. He's dead. His wife is alive, but, and his kids.
