An Approach to Advance Care Planning Discussions with Chinese-Immigrant Oncology Outpatients

PUBLISHED ABSTRACT

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Purpose: To examine Chinese-immigrant cancer patients' openness to advance care planning in an outpatient oncology setting.

Design: Retrospective review of social work assessment and follow up data.

Sample: 150 Chinese-immigrant patient charts were reviewed (55% Cantonese, 45% Mandarin). All patients required an interpreter to receive medical care.

Methods: Data were collected from structured data fields and summarized descriptively.

Findings: Sixteen percent of patients had completed advance care plans prior to meeting with the oncology social worker. Twenty percent of patients agreed to complete a health care proxy after receiving culturally tailored education in their language of origin from the oncology social worker, while 75% remained open to ongoing consideration of advance care planning and healthcare proxy completion.

Conclusions and Implications for Practice: Oncology social workers can play an integral role in providing advocacy, education, and documentation around advance care plans for Chinese-immigrant patients with cancer, even if the social worker does not speak the patient's primary language.
