At the beginning of September, Baroness Tessa Blackstone took up her appointment as Chair of



Maurice Line



Former Director General of the British Library, **Dr Maurice Line**, died during the weekend of 18/19 September. Beginning his career as a trainee at the Bodleian Library in 1950, Maurice worked as an Assistant Librarian at the University of Glasgow, then Deputy Librarian at the University of Newcastle before becoming University Librarian at Bath in 1968. From 1971–1973 he was Director of the National Central Library (NCL) and a member of the British Library Organizing Committee. Maurice joined the British Library in 1973 as Deputy Director of the Lending Division when the NCL was incorporated into the BL. He became Director General of the Lending Division the following year and then Director General of the BL's Science, Technology and Industry Directorate in 1985 until his retirement in 1988. In retirement Maurice enjoyed a 12-year career as an international consultant as well as serving as Professor Associate at the University of Sheffield's Department of Information Science, and as External Professor at Loughborough University's Department of Information and Library Studies. Maurice was a major figure in the library and information profession. His papers were challenging and thought provoking and he was great fun at conferences.

At the beginning of October, Annie Mauger took up post as Chief



Executive at CILIP, the Chartered Institute for Library and Information Professionals. Annie has worked in a variety of management roles in England and Scotland, most recently as Acting Chief Executive for Bradford Action for Refugees. Previously she has worked as a consultant to charities and public sector bodies on governance, change management, organizational development and libraries. She held the post of Chief Executive of the Museums, Libraries and Archives (MLA)

Yorkshire until its closure and was Head of Libraries and Heritage for the City of York Council.

Robert Felgate retired at the end of October from BIS, the UK Department for Business, Innovation and Skills, after 31 years in the BIS Information Service. Robert recently received the 2010 GLIG (Government Libraries and Information Group) Lifetime Achievement award in recognition of his work on joint procurement of electronic information resources across government.

At the Department of Work and Pensions, **Elaine Varty** returned to the Legal Library at the Adelphi as Assistant Legal Librarian in April. For the previous 17 months, Elaine had been Directories Manager looking after the staff directory for the whole of the DWP.

After 23 years at the Centre for Radiation, Chemical and Environmental Hazards (CRCE), Health Protection Agency at Chilton, the Librarian David Perry took early retirement at the end of August. David joined what was then called the National Radiological Protection Board which became part of the Health Protection Agency in 2005. One of the most notable events to occur during his time at CRCE Chilton was the 2006 radioactive polonium-210 poisoning incident which resulted in the death of Alexander Litvinenko, and in which the centre was heavily involved. David spent many hours of overtime tracking down urgent articles and references for the staff involved in the investigation.

Bob McKee, CILIP's previous Chief Executive, died suddenly in August while attending the International Federation of Library Associations Congress in Gothenburg, Sweden. Bob had been a prominent member of the UK library and information community for many years. He served on the Association of Assistant Librarians (former CDG) for several years, becoming its President in 1985 while he was working at Solihull College of Technology. Bob was planning to retire as Chief Executive of CILIP at the end of October, and was looking forward to remaining active within the profession, including working as an IFLA expert trainer for the 'Building Strong Library Associations' programme.
