At the beginning of October, the Centre for Research Libraries (CRL) engaged Ann



Okerson as Senior Adviser on Electronic Strategies. Ann has been Associate University Librarian for Collections and International Programs at Yale University, and is currently on the Governing Board and Chair of the Professional Committee of IFLA. Ann has also been executive director of NERL and founder and moderator of LibLicense, as well as being active in a number of other international projects and initiatives. CRL will draw upon Ann's knowledge and experience in its efforts to ensure persistent and affordable access for CRL libraries to electronic resources in the humanities and social sciences.

At the British Library, Lynne Brindley, Chief Executive
