Ian will take up his new post in March. As Head of Higher Education, he will work as an ambassador for the British Library within the library and HE sectors to develop and strengthen the relationship with key institutions. A major part of Ian's role will be to work with libraries in the HE sector to take

forward the development of a UK Research Reserve, designed to address the issue of acute storage problems in the research library sector. Since 2006 Ian has been Director, Academic Services at the University of London, Research Library Services, where he is responsible for academic liaison and collection development. Ian was President of CILIP in 2007.

In January, Anne Poulson took up the post of Executive Director of CURL. Anne joined CURL from the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS), part of the University of London, which she joined in February 2002 as Head of Library Services.

## Leslie Bryan

Leslie Bryan, who died suddenly on 18 December 2007 at the age of 56, was a familiar figure in Irish librarianship and was well known to many UK colleagues. He joined Trinity College Dublin library in 1975, having graduated from the university, and spent his working life there.

For the greater part of his professional career he was engaged in acquisitions work. His tenacious memory, deep knowledge of the Irish publishing industry, and his skills in his beloved Irish language were put at the service of the library with an extraordinary degree of commitment. His death is a great loss to the profession in Ireland.

Leslie was a traditionalist, but someone who unfolded as a quite different personality from that of first appearances. He had a gift for friendship and he leaves all those of us glad to have been his friend with memories of his courtesy, chivalrous ways, some endearing foibles, and his sense of fun. His brother Earnest, his godchildren, his many friends in Ireland and abroad and his colleagues in Trinity College Dublin, will miss him greatly.
