A flying visit to the Frankfurt Book Fair once again confirmed that this annual marathon is only for those with stamina. With nine thousand publishers in a series of gigantic halls, it has to be seen to be believed.

The overall impression was of a publishing world in good shape and prospering, and if the size and opulence of the 'big league' stands are a yardstick, they must be exceedingly prosperous.

Primarily a bookish occasion, there is nonetheless much of interest for serials people, as all the major journal publishers are present.

Where two or more were gathered together the burning topic of conversation was the final purchase agreement between Dawson and Faxon US, thus bringing to an end months of uncertainty and speculation, not least for the Faxon staff.

While the printed word still 'rules OK', down in the basement something stirred in the form of a large hall devoted to electronic media. This was impressive and aroused great interest. How long before the change of name to the Frankfurt Online Fair?

Returning to the mundane problems of everyday life, one old perennial problem amongst

serial librarians is what to do with unwanted journals - single issues, volumes and back sets. CD-ROM, document delivery and lack of funds must have increased the difficulties of finding a home for hard copy journals.

Some will have a market value, while many others are welcomed as gifts by libraries in the developing countries. The great problem is getting the right journal to the right end user.

We are grateful to Keith Nockels, Serials Librarian, Royal Society of Medicine, whose article on pages 253 outlines the problems and suggests solutions.
