As a result of major restructuring of the top tier of management at in the British Library and interviews for the new posts, several existing managers will be leaving the Library. David Russon, Deputy CEO leaves in June. David Bradbury, Director General Collections and Services, Stuart Ede, Director of Collection Management, and Malcolm Smith, Director of Public Services, all leave towards the end of July. The newly created posts are: Director for Scholarship and Collections to be filled by Dr Clive Field, who for the past six years has been Librarian and Director of Information Services Directorate at the University of Birmingham and has also been Chairman and Director of the Consortium of University Research Libraries (CURL); Director of Operations and Services to which the Library has appointed Natalie Ceeney, who is currently a Manager at McKinsey & Company, Management Consultants, and has had a wide variety of experience in both commercial and not-for-profit environments; Director of Strategic Marketing and

Communication to which the Library has appointed Jill Finney who is currently National Marketing Director at Ernst & Young and a member of its Global Marketing Council; Director of 'E' Programmes, for which the selection process is continuing. It is expected that the new directors will take up their posts in July or early August.

Dr Alice Prochaska, has been appointed as University Librarian of Yale University, Connecticut and will begin her five-year term in this highly prestigious post in August. Dr Prochaska has pursued a distinguished career as Director of Special Collections at the British Library.

In the Government library sector: at ACAS (the Advisory Conciliation and Arbitration Service) Richard Wilsher has been Librarian on temporary promotion since August last year, when David Taylor moved to work for the ACAS Secretariat.

From the Department of Health(DoH) Pek Lan Bower, Head of Library and Information Services reports a number of changes. In Leeds, Jenny Goodfellow is now on temporary promotion as Librarian in charge of the Services Information Unit. Jenny replaces Julia Velacott who has taken medical retirement. Tony Albrow, formerly Senior Librarian at the DoH in Leeds, was appointed Chief Librarian to the Health & Safety Executive earlier in the year. Kerry Hanson takes Tony's post on temporary promotion. Harry Barrett, DoH Database Librarian and Chief Cataloguer took early retirement at the end of March. Philip Defriez is overseeing the implementation of the new DoH thesaurus.

There are a number of changes too at the Home Office library where Peter Griffith, Assistant Director Communications Directorate, has set up a new Library Resources Training Team. Lynda Cooper, now promoted to Senior Librarian, has headed the new team since May. Jane Whelehan has joined the team as Librarian, having previously worked in the library's web development project. Gareth Hazzelby has been promoted to Librarian and has taken over from Lynda as Librarian at the Home Office Prison Service H.Q. library. Gareth worked in cataloguing at the main Home Office Library. Sue Carter joined the Home Office library as Web Development Officer at the end of May. Sue was previously Assistant Librarian at ACAS responsible for periodicals.

At H M Treasury and
Cabinet Office Library, Anna
Bozic took over from Helen
Kent as Serials Librarian in
May. Anna was previously at
the Institute of Advanced Legal
Studies Library where she
worked in serials and
cataloguing. Helen is now in
Reader Services, where she
deals with enquiries and
manages the Statistics and
Working Papers collection.

At the MOD Whitehall Library, Louise Gauci moved at the beginning of June to the Court Service where she is Central Services Librarian. Louise was with MOD for two years, first as Purchasing Librarian and, for the past year, as Information Acquisitions Librarian.

There is very sad news from the Army Library Service of the sudden death from cancer of **Howard Mitchell**. Howard was Head of Library Services (3 & 5 Divisions) based at Bulford. He was previously Command Librarian Northern Ireland and before that, Librarian at SATIC (Small Arms Technical Information Centre). Howard was 34, married to Anne and leaves a son, Alex, four and half years old.

The former DERA is now divided into QinetiQ and Dstl (Defence Science and Technology Laboratory). In due course there will be a number of personnel changes but these have yet to be announced.

At Horticulture Research International, Wellesbourne, Rhona Floate left in April. Rhona was with what was called the Institute of Horticultural Research for 12 years, first as Librarian at Littlehampton, before overseeing the merger of the two sites at Wellesbourne, where she was Librarian for 5 years. Rhona is hoping to train for ordained ministry in the Church of England and will be attending her selection conference at the end of July. The Librarian at Wellesbourne is now Clare Singleton, who joined the library in September 1999 as Assistant Librarian. Silvie Elliott was appointed Library Assistant in March, having spent the previous four years as a Library Assistant at Stafford College. Silvie replaces Chris Barker who retired in November 2000.

Elsewhere in the BBSRC (Biotechnology and Biological Science Research Council), at the John Innes Centre in Norwich, **Ingrid Walton** left at the end of April after nearly 10 years as Librarian. Ingrid is especially interested in the history of science and is

currently involved in translating Greek and Latin scientific texts for special libraries in London – on such arcane subjects as ground woodlice. **Ken Dick** is now Acting Librarian. Ken joined the library 3 years ago and had been Assistant Librarian for 18 months.

There are a number of changes at the Distributed National Electronic Resource(DNER). Lorcan **Dempsey**, the Director has been appointed Vice President, OCLC Office of Research, and will be leaving to take up his post in mid July. Lorcan has been Director of DNER, the United Kingdom's national initiative to provide a coherent information environment for UK higher education communities, since June 2000. Existing collections and services will be evaluated for their usefulness to FE. New licences will be purchased to fill in any identified gaps in current JISC provision.

At Glasgow Caledonian,

Deputy Site Librarian at the
Park Campus which was closed
in January. Catherine
Nicholson, previously Serials
Librarian at Glasgow
Caledonian, was made

At the end of July, **Andrew Wale**, Director of Library
Services at Glasgow University, will be taking early retirement after more than 20 years at the library.

At the University of Northumbria. Jane Core has been appointed Director of Learning Resources with effect from the beginning of August. Jane is currently Deputy Librarian and Professor of Life Long Learning at the University of Abertay. Jane replaces Ian Winkworth who started with the library as Deputy Librarian more than 25 years ago. Ian has taken early retirement.

Liz is the first librarian to be Proctor and takes up her appointment in March 2002.

Licensing Executive. Her main tasks include negotiating consortium agreements for the UK, North Western and Eastern Europe. Dagmar gained




