Third European Serials Conference and Exhibition


Trinity College, Dublin, Ireland 25-27 September 1996

We are delighted to confirm that this conference is attracting considerable interest throughout Europe and beyond. The full and varied programme is in advanced stages of preparation and should be available in April. The main topics and themes to be addressed are:

- Intellectual property and copyright law in the EU environment
- IRIS: a study in cooperation, collaboration and funding in the information field
- A case study in e-journal developments: the Scandinavian experience
- Concurrent sessions:
 The serials archive and continuing of knowledge (perspectives from Germany, Hungary and the UK);
 Exploiting national serials resources (France, The Netherlands and Spain)
- Security and censorship of the Net: two views
- EU policy on serials: strategy and implementation
- Reinventing the subscription agent: a research study
- The process of scholarly communications: the view from Eastern Europe; the move from paper to electronic publishing: pros and cons
- The promise of Multimedia

An exhibition of the latest products and services available from publishers, agents and software suppliers will be held directly outside the lecture theatre and many major exhibitors have indicated their intention to participate. Ample time for viewing the exhibition will be included in the programme, as well as opportunities for product reviews.

The venue is Trinity College, Dublin, a tranquil setting with historical buildings forming quadrangles around cobbled areas and lawns,

situated in the heart of the city. We have arranged a reception in the famed Long Library, home of the 8th century Book of Kells, an illuminated text of the four Gospels generally regarded as the finest work of Christian art of its kind. There will be an international quiz, and the conference dinner will be followed by an evening of Irish music and dancing.
