Rick Anderson has worked in libraries since 1988, and as a professional librarian since 1993, when he received his MLIS from Brigham Young University and went to work as a bibliographer for YBP, Inc. After four years at YBP he took the position of Head Acquisitions Librarian at the University of North Carolina, Greensboro; in 2000 he joined the University of Nevada, Reno Libraries as Electronic Resources and Serials Co-ordinator. Since 2001 his title has been Director of Resource Acquisition, in which capacity he oversees all monographic and serials acquisitions processes as well as document delivery and inter-library loan.

Rick has written articles on copyright, open access, licence negotiation, vendor relations, and the future of librarianship for such publications as *Serials Review*, *Acquisitions Librarian*, and *College & Research Libraries News*. His column entitled 'In My Humble (But Correct) Opinion' is a regular feature in *Against the Grain*. But his greatest claim to fame is probably the article he co-wrote with Steven D Zink for a 2003 issue of *Library Collections*, *Acquisitions and Technical Services*, which was entitled 'Implementing the Unthinkable: The Demise of Periodical Check-in at the University of Nevada,' and caused an international stir. Less shocking to the sensibilities of the library world was his book on vendor

relations, Buying and Contracting for Resources and Services: A How-to-Do-It Manual for Librarians, published in 2004 by Neal-Schuman. Known as a dynamic, provocative and engaging speaker, Rick is invited regularly to present at national and international conferences and meetings on these and other topics. In addition to the Serials editorial board, he also serves on the editorial boards of ACQNET and of Library Collections, Acquisitions and Technical Services, on the publishing advisory board of Scholarly Communications Report and on Blackwell Publishing's Library Advisory Board.

The only thing Rick enjoys talking about more than the scholarly information marketplace is music. He edits the Sound Recording Reviews column for Notes (the quarterly journal of the Music Library Association) and contributes reviews regularly to the All-Music Guide and other publications. He is also the founder and editor of CD HotList: New Releases for Libraries, a monthly online review and recommendation service for librarians. A multi-instrumentalist, he has devoted much of his musical energy in recent years to arranging tunes from Quebec and the British Isles for claw-hammer banjo (an endeavour that poses little risk to his day job). He lives with his "long-suffering" wife and three children in Sparks, Nevada, USA.
