Gordon Tibbitts gave an interesting overview of e-journal archiving from the view of a commercial publisher. Melinda Kenneway's conference briefing session was so universally acclaimed that she has been persuaded to document it as a formal article. The final paper from the highly successful e-books seminar last year, by Jill Taylor-Roe, is also in this issue.

We are excited to have a profile of Youngsuk ('YS') Chi, Vice Chairman, Elsevier, written by our roving reporter Dan Tonkery in New York recently, which gives a fascinating insight into open access, Google and other topics. To continue the US theme, our mini-profiles are of Amy Brand and Jill Emery who are working with e-resources in very different jobs in very different locations.

The students are sponsored by UKSG and clearly got an enormous amount out of the conference. We are sure we will see them again as delegates in future years – but who knows where?
