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A LITERARY REVIEW ON THE MEDICINAL IMPORTANCE OF MUSTAKA

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ABSTRACT

Ayurveda is a science which helps a individual to live a healthy life, also it helps in management of diseases. Ayurveda states that every substance on earth can be used as medicine either it is in dry form or fresh form. There are many diseases which can be cure with the use of Mustaka. It is an important herbal drug which can be used in various forms in the treatment of various disorders mainly in Kapha-Pitta. The present study shows the various properties of Mustaka from various Ayurvedic texts books as well as from modern concept of it. It includes the Rasa Panchaka, Guna-Karma, indications, and therapeutic uses, also with latest research on Mustaka.

INTRODUCTION

Ayurveda is an ancient Indian system holistic medicine and plants are the backbone of this science. Mustaka (Cyperus rotundus Linn) is described as "Kyambu" in the Vedic literature, its synonyms like "Gundra & Gangeyam" denotes the hydrophytic nature of this plant. [1] Acharya Charaka mentioned it in Lekhaniya, [2] Trishnanigrahana, [3] Kandughna and Stanyasodhana Mahakashya. Acharya Sushruta and Acharya Vagbhatta mentioned it Mustadi, Vachadi Gana. Almost every Nighantukara talks about Mustaka and its properties. Acharya JLN Shastri quoted that in the western medicine, Romans used it as emmanagogue and

in Combodia this tuber is known as diuretic and antiperodic. He also states that Chinese medicine claims, its small tuber are in liver and Lung Disorders. There are three varieties *Mustaka* explained by *Acharya JLN Shastri* i.e. *Bhahra Mustaka*^[9] (*Cyperus rotundus* Linn) or nut grass, *Nagarmustaka*^[10] (*Cyperus Scariosus* Linn) or Nut hedge and *Kaivarta/Jala Mustaka*^[11] (*Cyperus esculentus* Linn) or earth almond.

Therapeutic uses of Mustaka

- **1.** Antra vikara^[54]:- Its fresh rhizome mixed with Adraraka and given with honey.
- **2.** *Madatya*^[55]:- For *Trishna shamnam* its cold decoction is given.
- 3. Apasmara^[56]:- Its powder is given with Swasta cow Milk
- **4.** Aamatisara^[57]:- Its Kshirpaka is beneficial in Aamatisara.
- 5. Aksivrana^[58]:- It is fried with Ghritta and apply for three to four days.
- **6.** *Vrana*^[59]:- Its fresh root, once crushed and then mix in cow *Ghritta* and apply on *Vrana*.
- 7. *Stanyavridi*^[60]:- It is apply on breast after mixing with water for milk production.
- **8.** Atisara^[61]:- In all types of Atisara its cold decoction is given with honey mixed.
- Pittatisara^[62]:- The powder of *Motha*, *Inderyava*, *Chirayata & Rasanjana* is used in *Pittaatisara*.
 Pakwatisara^[64]:- Its decoction is given with honey
- Pakwatisara^[64]:- Its decoction is given with honey to treat Pakwatisara.

DISCUSSION

Mustaka is drug having properties like Katu-Tikta-Kasaya Rasa, Seeta Virya, Katu Vipaka and Kapha-Pitta-Samaka Doshkarma, also described by almost every ancient Acharya in his texts. It is useful in disorders related with Kapha-Pitta Dosha. It plays an important role in Manas Dosha. It is described by Acharya Charaka in Lekhaniya, Trishnanigrahana, Kandughna Mahakashaya and Acharya Sushruta as well as Acharya Vagbhatta explains it in Mustakadi and Vachadi Gana. Almost all the Nighantu talks about Mustaka and its properties like Dhanwantri Nighantu, Priya Nighantu, Nighantu Adarsha, Bhavprakash Nighantu, Kaidev Nighantu etc. from modern point of view it is also a very important plant as its variety Cyperus esculentus Linn contains many nutrients like energy contents (starch, fat, sugar & protein), dietary minerals, palmitic acid, stearic acid, oleic acid, linoleic acid and fatty acids. Also it's very helpful in the treatment of disorder like Atisara, Aamatisara, Kasa,

Madatya, Vrana etc.

CONCLUSION

After studying in detail about *Mustaka* in various texts it can be concluded Cyperus rotundus Linn is Mustaka and its main property, which is explained by different ancient Acharya's is Kapha-Pitta-Samaka and widely used to treat Atisara mainly Aamatisara because it is Grahi, Deepana and Aamapachana. With the help of Kapha-Pitta- Shamaka property it is used to treat Kapha-Pitta-Kasa. Due to its Lekhanya property it is used to treat Madatya. It is also used to treat Vrana Vikara because this drug has Vrana Ropana property. Due to the property of Yonirognashana it is widely used to treat gynaecological disorders. It contains the property of Stanyashodhana so it is used to treat Stanya Dusti Janya Vikara. In short we can say that Mustaka is very helpful in the treatment of Dysentry, Obesity, Cough, Wound, Vaginal and breast milk related disorders etc.

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
