Steering Committee Work Continues

The committee whose findings will ultimately guide revisions to Cameron's Land Use Plan and town zoning worked to absorb a fire hose of information on July 15. Members heard presentations from Alisa Davis of North Carolina Wildlife and Conservation, Brian Patnode of Moore County Public Utilities, Nick Levy from the Historic Preservation Commission, and Ken Orie and Tucker McKenzie of the civil and environmental engineering firm Withers & Rayenel.

Committee members learned about the current water and sewer resources of Moore County from Mr. Patnode.



Ms. Davis recommended integrating a conservation plan with the Land Use Plan. Mr. Levy explained the challenges of enforcing historic preservation ordinances, while Mr. Orie laid out the timelines and resources for choosing— and paying for—infrastructure improvements.
