First Tee of the Sandhills wins Rezoning Approval

Sandhills Youth Development, Inc., will be able to proceed with a planned facility, First Tee of the Sandhills, that integrates STEM education and golf on a 35-acre property at the intersection of Read Road, Atkins Road and US Highway 1. Following a March 25 public hearing, the Cameron Board of Commissioners voted to approve rezoning of the tract from Rural Agricultural (RA) to RA-CZ (Rural Agricultural-Conditional Zoned. Conditions stipulated were installation of a fire hydrant extension from US Highway 1 and town approval of planned special events.



Sandhills Youth Development, Inc. is a nonprofit youth golf organization. First Tee of the Sandhills will be the organization's headquarters in Moore County. Plans for the Cameron tract include golfing facilities, an open field for events, office and storage buildings, and several acres left natural, for STEM learning. In order to minimize the development's impact on adjacent properties, a 50-foot natural buffer is part of the layout. The term for project completion is five years.

Olde North Subdivision Taking Shape

A residential subdivision whose homes will occupy lots of about 6 acres each is materializing on the eastern edge of Cameron. Deed restrictions designed to preserve the rural flavor of Olde North include a prohibition on further subdividing the lots. No mobile or modular homes will be permitted. Boats or recreational vehicles stored on a lot

must be screened by fencing or shrubbery. Primary residences must be a minimum of 2500 square feet of heated space, and any outbuildings must match the home aesthetically. Landscaping plans must be approved. No discharging of firearms or shooting ranges will be permitted. Deeds also include wetland protection.

The Town has welcomed Marcia Korver to the Board as a Town Commissioner to fill the vacant seat left by Michael Williamson. Commissioners thank Michael for his service to the Town.



Yard Debris Pickup Reminder

Yard debris that meets these requirements is still being picked up on Tuesdays and Thursdays:

- —Limbs no more than 6 feet long and 3 inches in diameter
- —All leaves (including pine cones) to be bagged or in a container...loose leaves will NOT be picked up. Trash cans are available for loan through Town Hall for collection of loose yard debris items.
- —There can be one pile (no larger than 6 feet long, 3 feet wide and 3 feet high) per pickup per week for each residence.

Please note that no burying of yard debris or garbage is allowed.

Time slips up on you? Contact Town Hall to have water bill set up on automatic draft to avoid late fees.
