


Cypress Pointe Wants YOU

"The truest thing you can do to help your community is help your neighbor when it really matters," says Mike Cameron, Chief of Cypress Pointe Fire & Rescue. A full-service fire department that deals with medical calls, hazmat spills, swift water rescue and motor vehicle accidents as well as any type of fire, Cypress Pointe responded to 1,252 calls in 2024 "without any major hurricanes or snowstorms," and local growth means that number will only increase for 2025.





Pointe is actively seeking volunteers to bolster its staff of responders. Currently Vass is the only station that is staffed 24/7. Cameron, for instance, has two paid staffers on duty from 9 a.m.-9 p.m. "We get a lot of calls between 9 p.m. and midnight," says Chief Cameron. Increasing the coverage will require more staff. While many volunteer positions involve riding on the fire truck, Chief Cameron says, "there are other support roles and we're looking for a wide range of people." Responders who arrive at the scene on the truck must meet certain standards for physical ability. Less physically demanding-but still important—positions include maintenance of vehicles and other equipment as well as the station buildings, and processing the paperwork generated by every call.



Volunteers receive training two nights a week for four weeks. What comes next depends on the individual. "You may have a pager to which you respond as needed, or you can schedule yourself to particular hours at the station." The critical thing is to complete the training. Once a volunteer is part of the team, Cypress Pointe provides equipment and uniform.

Yard Debris Pickup Reminder

Yard debris that meets these requirements is still being picked up on Tuesdays and Thursdays:

- —Limbs no more than 6 feet long and 3 inches in diameter
- —All leaves (including pinecones) to be bagged or in a container...loose leaves will NOT be picked up. Trash cans are available for loan through Town Hall for collection of loose yard debris items.
- —There can be one pile (no larger than 6 feet long, 3 feet wide and 3 feet high) per
