
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STATEMENT OF THE MAYOR

- City Park



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
INTRODUCTION

OVERVIEW

Gholson is a city in McLennan County, Texas, United States. The population was 1,250 at the 2020 census. It is part of the Waco Metropolitan Statistical Area.

The area was settled in the 1840s and was early known as Sardis. The name Gholson, after early settlers, brothers Benjamin and Samuel Gholson, came into gradual use, and became the official name of the post office in 1887.


Gholson is located at 31°43′47″N 97°13′43″W (31.729736, –97.228737).[4] It is at the intersection of FMs 933 and 1858, twelve miles northwest of Waco.

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Gholson has no stoplights, city water or city sewer services.

STATE OF THE CITY

CITY OF GHOLSON OVERVIEW

The city of Gholson has just come off a particularly grueling dis-annexation vote that divided the community. 1 out of every 4 voters wanted to leave the city to become unincorporated county land. Fortunately, the city survived with 75% of the voters coming out and voting overwhelmingly in favor of keeping the city intact. McLenna County election officials said that it was the highest turnout for any vote that they had had at the polling station in Gholson.

With that level of support, we have a mandate as the city governing officials. Also, as with any mandate, there also comes a great level of responsibility. We must strike a balance of continuing to move forward as a city all the while keeping the door open to the people that voted in favor of dis-annexation. We cannot squander the support we have.

Currently, the city of Gholson faces some series economic headwinds. The majority of these are external factors that are being on the cities control. The number one issue that the city is going to be forced to deal with is run. Currently, as it sits, compounded inflation is running approximately 30%. In some cases, it's even higher at 50 or 60%. Construction costs and road maintenance have skyrocketed. Many road and construction projects entered into by other cities have seen their bottom-line expenditures projections double or in some cases triple in only the last two years.

The city of Gholson has lost a lot of its purchasing power, approximately 30%, by not moving forward with some of the city projects that we should've done last year or the year before. The city stopped find itself in an interesting dilemma. On one hand we have a tremendous amount of surplus dollars from previous years that were never spent on the other the purchasing power of those dollars has been severely degraded.

It is going to be critical that we strike the proper balancing act of spending the right amount of money to get projects off the ground without bankrupting the city, all while facing the economic headwinds of the diminishing purchasing power of the U.S. dollar.


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FINANCIAL CHALLENGES (EROSION OF THE DOLLAR)

OVERVIEW

The number one issue facing the City of Gholson for the next five years is going to be the erosion of the US dollar. Three years ago, Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen during congressional testimony that inflation was only transitory however it shows no sign of letting up. Prices have not gone back down nor are they realistically projected to for 4 main reasons

- Increasing the M2 Money Supply (Printing Money)
- Increasing National Debt
- Decline of the Petrodollar
- BRICS

If the country prints its own money to buy itself out of debt, inflation will be the result. That's pretty much always the cause of inflation: more money in circulation without rise of productivity.

The counter-case for "USD is reserve currency" is not "Yuan will be reserve currency", but "more and more countries use a variety of currencies for their international trades and hold a basket of currencies and other assets in reserve". Which is what we are seeing with the formation of BRICS and Countries like Russian demanding oil be bought in their own currency. These are all market forces coalescing to weaken the dollar long term.

INCREASE OF THE M2 MONEY SUPPLY


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
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NATIONAL DEBT


The Federal Reserve's fight against inflation is adding fuel to the national debt as the central bank prepares to keep interest rates higher for longer. While inflation has eased since the Fed hiked rates to a two-decade high last year, fed officials are still not comfortable with how quickly prices are rising. Rate cuts at the beginning of the year never materialized and currently Fed officials expect to cut rates once before the end of the year, which would set the baseline borrowing range at 5 percent to 5.25 percent.



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

Those higher Fed interest rates will also force the federal government to borrow money at a higher cost. As government spending is projected to climb over the next decade, the amount of interest the nation pays on its multitrillion-dollar debt is on track to surpass defense spending.



With only 5 months to go, we will exceed \$36 trillion for the national debt before 2025.

Interest on the national debt was \$140 billion in June. So we are likely on pace for \$1.5 trillion per year or more. That is about 30% of all govt revenue.

It's not the only factor, M2 money printing previously mentioned being another, but it is a factor contributing to our deficits. These large deficits themselves are helping to force the Fed to keep interest rates high, because there is still too much spending at the Federal level.

Recent figures from the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) project the debt held by the public, which stands at more than \$35 trillion, soaring over the next decade, relative to the size of the nation's economy, going from 99 percent of the gross domestic product (GDP) in fiscal 2024 to 122 percent in 10 years. Experts generally agree much of the projected increase to spending is adding to the Fed's inflation fight.

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
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
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\$585 billion was added to the US National Debt in just the first 3 months of this year. Since the debt ceiling was suspended last June the US government has borrowed over \$3 trillion.



"The government is spending a lot of money and it's not taking taxes away from people. So they're still spending too, and it's too much for the economy" Gagnon said.

The Fed first hiked rates in 2022 after setting them close to zero during the coronavirus pandemic — when government spending also climbed as the government passed a significant amount of coronavirus relief — to help keep the economy afloat.

Congress last suspended the debt ceiling in 2023, but not until after a high-stakes, partisan months-long fight over spending. The national debt had sat at roughly \$31 trillion then, and it since has risen to more than \$35 trillion.

DECLINE OF THE PETRODOLLAR

In 1974 shortly after Nixon took us off of the gold standard United States entered into an agreement with Saudi Arabia that all oil purchases would be made in U.S. dollars thus giving a commodity to back the currency. The petrodollar system is essentially the global practice of exchanging oil for US dollars, rather than any other currency. This means that no matter what country is buying the oil, they pay the oil-producing country in petrodollars, which are denominated in US dollars.


The recycling of petrodollars is one of the main factors that makes the United States the global currency reserve. Oil-exporting countries often invest their excess U.S. dollars in U.S. Treasury securities and other dollar-denominated assets in order to keep them safe while earning a return. This process, known as petrodollar recycling, helps finance the U.S. government's budget and trade deficits.



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


Recently, Saudi Arabia did not renew that agreement. They are now accepting Chinese Yaun in addition to US Dollars. Moreover, after U.S. sanctions on Russia over the Ukraine invasion, russia has demanded that all oil sales take place in rubles. These two events are going to erode the purchasing power of the dollar.

BRICS

BRICS is an acronym for an association of five major emerging national economies – Brazil, Russia, India, China, and South Africa. These countries have come together to discuss various issues that are relevant to their economies, including the creation of a common currency.


After the US put sanction on Russia over the invasion of Ukraine and froze Russians assets the global south has been racing to adopt a BRICS currency and, in some cases, mandating the use of local currencies until a final BRICS currency is settled.



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Why counties are shifting to a BRICS Currency:

Reduced Currency Risk: A common currency would reduce currency risk for businesses and investors operating within the BRICS nations. This would make trade and investment within the region more efficient and stable.

Greater Economic Integration: A common currency would promote greater economic integration among the BRICS nations, which could lead to increased trade, investment, and economic growth.

Increased International Influence: A BRICS currency would increase the international influence of these emerging economies, which could lead to greater geopolitical power and influence in international organisations like the United Nations.

Improved Balance of Power: The creation of a BRICS currency could help to shift the balance of economic power away from traditional economic powerhouses like the US and Europe, and towards emerging economies.

Conclusion

While the creation of a BRICS currency has the potential to offer significant benefits for the economies of these emerging nations, it also poses significant challenges to the US Dollar hegemony. For example, Russia has mandated all transactions take place in rubles, China and Japan are dumping US treasury bonds, and the projected outcome are higher interest rates. In the end BRICS does pose a threat to US Dollar Dominance and will cause diminishing purchasing power and erosion of the overall usage of it.

ECONOMIC EFFECTS ON THE CITY

OVERVIEW

These are unprecedented times when it comes to fiscal policy. There has never been an economic storm all coalescing to attack the US dollar at one time. The city of Gholson is not in any position to affect any of these factors, but we must be ready to react to them.

The city of Gholson has a good share of its money in CD's at the bank, however, the interest they are earning is nowhere near what is needed to keep up with inflation. Construction projects, parks and recreation, roads, can no longer be put on the back burner. In the last two years we have seen a 30% decline of the purchasing power of the United States dollar. In some



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
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cases, construction projects have doubled or tripled in cost from their projections five years ago.

RECOMMENDED STRATEGY

The city is going to employ multiple strategies to stave off the economic headwinds including:

- City officials are engaging with elected officials at the county, state, and federal level to get assistance with grants and money for public works.
- The city is also looking for land to invest in wherever possible
- the city is no longer delaying the implementation of a City Park





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
CITY PARK

The city has an opportunity to convert 4 acres of donated land (pictured blow) to a city park.






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


JUSTIFICATION







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Moreover, a healthy majority of the city's population, over 80%, are children, young adults, or young parents that would all benefit from a city Park.





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EMERGENCY RESPONSE

OVERVIEW


Cities have many duties and responsibilities when dealing with emergencies and disasters. These include emergency management plans, training, and the authority to take care of situations that arise. Also, while most decisions by a city council must be made according to very specific rules that may take extended amounts of time, city officials often have authority during emergency situations to make decisions quickly when necessary for the health and safety of their citizens.

There will always be a role and responsibility for states and the federal government to intervene before, during, and after disasters. But local communities are always the first responders—responsible for managing local conditions and ultimately suffering the most from localized disasters

Most relevant to cities is Chapter 418 of the Texas Government Code, which governs emergency management, and allows a mayor to: (1) declare a local state of disaster; (2) order evacuation of the city or an area; and (3) control the ingress and egress of individuals in a disaster area.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY FOR MAYORS


The mayor, as the emergency management director for a city, has statutory powers and duties during an emergency. TEX. GOV'T CODE § 418.1015. The mayor has the same powers, on a local level, as the governor under Chapter 418 of the Government Code. Id. The mayor is the official responsible for declaring a state of disaster or requesting that the governor declare a state of emergency. See id. §§418.108; 433.001. Also, if local resources are exhausted and assistance is needed outside a mutual aid agreement, then the mayor is the official who must request it from other political subdivisions or the state. 37 TEX. ADMIN. CODE § 7.25. The mayor also has the authority to order and enforce evacuation and other restrictions on movement during an emergency. TEX. GOV'T CODE ch. 418. The mayor can designate an emergency management coordinator to be his assistant for emergency management purposes. Id. § 418.1015. The mayor must notify the Division of Emergency Management of who the emergency management coordinator is (if any) and the city's plan for emergency management using a form provided by the Division of Emergency Management. 37 TEX. ADMIN. CODE § 7.3.



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FIVE ROLES OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Prevention, mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery are the five steps of Emergency Management.



EMERGENCY MANAGERS RESPONSIBILITIES

The local emergency manager has the responsibility for coordinating all components of the emergency management programs and activities for the community, including:

Managing resources before, during, and after a major emergency or disaster.


Conducting activities related to the key components of emergency management.

Emergency Operations Center Roles and Responsibilities

- Overall management of the incident.
- Manages response by coordinating all members of the EOC, EPG and field units.
- Assesses incident priorities.
- Assesses resources needs and orders.
- Coordinates with outside agencies.
- Approves demobilization of resources.

DUTIES OF A CITY IN AN EMERGENCY

A city: (1) must have some officials who are trained in emergency management, usually the emergency management coordinator or fire chief; (2) must develop a local emergency management plan or join with another city or county to develop a joint emergency management plan; (3) must appoint a director of emergency management--either the mayor or other appointed official; and (4) must adopt the National Incident Management System (NIMS) to be eligible for many of the available emergency management grants and other resources.



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EMERGENCY FINANCE AUTHORITY

Normally, a city budget may be increased only when there is an emergency. According to Section 102.009 of the Local Government Code, a city may make an emergency expenditure outside strict compliance with its budget only:

in a case of grave public necessity to meet an unusual and unforeseen condition that could not have been included in the original budget using reasonably diligent thought and attention.

This standard is strict, and few amendments will meet it, but in cases of severe weather damage, as is a real threat the City of Gholson may face, or another unforeseeable event (grid collapse), a city council could invoke this authority. (Note that a city may always make a budget amendment for city purposes so long as the total expenditures under the budget are not increased.) TEX. LOC. GOV'T CODE § 102.010.

Another tool is a city's emergency purchasing power. Usually, a city must go through certain procedures before purchasing an item or service that costs more than \$50,000. TEX. LOC. GOV'T CODE § 252.021. However, there is an exemption for purchases that are "made because of a public calamity that requires the immediate appropriation of money to relieve the necessity of the municipality's residents or to preserve the property of the municipality" or "a procurement necessary to preserve or protect the public health or safety of the municipality's residents." Id. §252.022.

EXPENSE JUSTIFICATION


Aa stated before, according to Texas statue one of the primary responsibilities of the city is to be a first responder in emergency situations. The city of Gholson has a first response plan, but it has not been executed. The City Hall building, the area that would function as a headquarters during any emergency, is woefully under equipped for any kind of emergency situation that may arise. The building regularly loses power during heavy rain. It is for this reason that it's time for the city to invest in some basic emergency response expenditures like, solar, food, and back-up generators.

Moreover, the city of Gholson has an aging demographic many of them need life-saving equipment that runs on power. Many residents have informed the city they are on insulin that would need to be refridgerated in the case of a long term power outage. Reading an emergency the City Hall could function as a triage center and people would be able to bring any medical equipment power during an outage.


