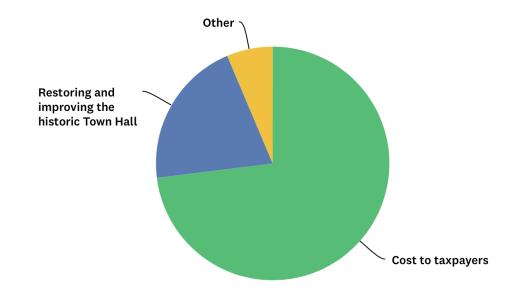

What is your main concern about making Wheelock Town Hall accessible? (Choose one)

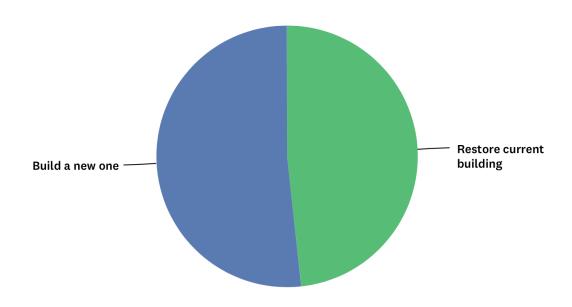

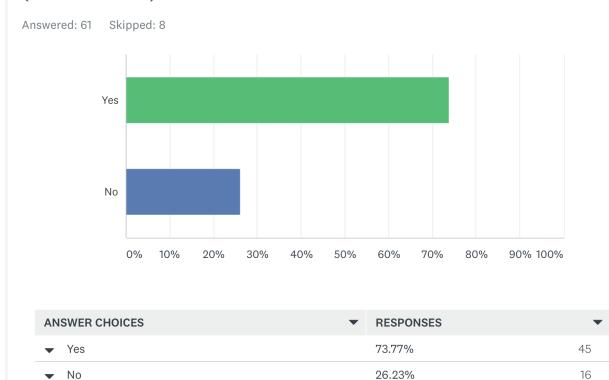
If the costs were equal between restoring the current Town Hall and building a new one, which do you prefer?

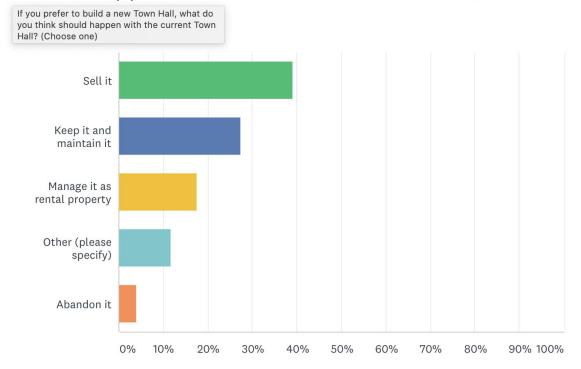

If you prefer to build a new Town Hall, what do you think should happen with the current Town Hall? (Choose one)



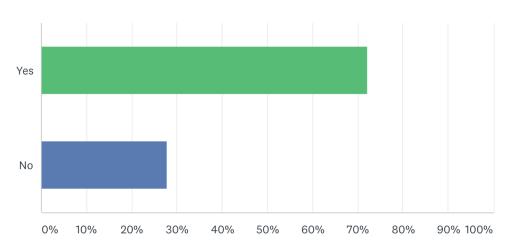
