SAFETY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

At the request of Supervisor Hanson, the Town of Brooklyn Safety Committee met on 16 January 1996 to review the actions of the Town Board regarding fire and emergency medical service and to offer suggestions/recommendations/assistance for the implementation of the items acted upon by the Town Board at its meeting on 18 December 1995. Furthermore, the Town Board requested, via committee member Bob McNeely, that the Safety Committee offer advice on the selection of individuals to serve on the four fire district boards that serve the Town.

The committee recommends that the Town of Brooklyn solicit names of individuals interested in serving on the respective fire district boards (Albany, Belleville, Brooklyn, Evansville). To be eligible, the individual would have to reside in the Town and reside in the district served by the board of which he or she would be a member. The committee recommends that the Town Clerk make appropriate public announcements, for example the Leader and recycle center postings requesting that interested individuals notify the Clerk of their interest not later than 29 February 1996. On receipt of those names, the Safety Committee would select four, one from each of the districts, as a recommendation to the Town Board and to the respective fire districts.

It is further recommended that the four district representatives become the town safety committee, effective 1 April 1996. (While it was not discussed by the committee, upon thinking about the process, I would support having the committee expanded to six individuals, to include two members who are not members of any fire district board, in order to provide a broader perspective to the safety committee). At that time (1 April 1996) the currently existing committee would become a sub-committee to work with the Green County Sheriff and appropriate county supervisors for the improvement of the county 911 and dispatch equipment and operation. From the present and continuing in the sub-committee mode the current safety committee would work on the implementation of the emergency services public information for the Town.

Suggestion for a posting/Leader announcement.

The Town of Brooklyn Board has taken the position that it is in the best interest of the Town that members of the town board should not serve on a fire district board and in the event that might happen, no individual should serve on more than one fire district board that serves the Town of Brooklyn. Therefore, the Town of Brooklyn solicits individuals who are interested in being recommended to serve on a fire district board. Requirements are that the individual reside in the Town of Brooklyn and that they reside in the fire district being served by the fire district board on which they are interested to serve. Respond to the Brooklyn Town Clerk in writing not later than 29 February.

TOWN OF BROOKLYN REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING FEBRUARY 19, 1996

The Brooklyn Town Board met in open session on Monday, February 19 at the Town Hall. Chairman Robin Patterson called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. with the full board, clerk and the 9 town's people present. Patterson asked the people to join in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Motion by Gary Splitter to change the agenda to moved the closed session to the first item of the agenda, motion second by Herb Hanson; motion carried. Motion by Splitter to convene into closed session as per state statutes 19.85 employee review, motion second by Hanson; motion carried.

Motion by Hanson to reconvene into open session, motion second by Splitter; motion carried. Open session at 8 p.m.

Motion by Patterson to approve the minutes of the January 15, 1996 meeting with one correction, motion second by Hanson; motion carried.

The treasurer's report of \$1,365.69 in the checking account and tax collection of \$447,416.07, \$28,523.93 in the state pool, for a total with tax collection of \$474,574.31. After schools, county and state we will have \$88,720.54 in the checking account. The report with the reconciliation report was accepted.

The bills were audited. Hanson requested clarification of the county highway bill. The cost of renting the county truck for the month of December was \$1.064.76. The remainder of \$5,242.98 was for salt. Hanson requested a written report of what took place at the extra meetings attended by the chairman.

Hanson made the motion to pay the bills, motion second by Splitter; motion carried. The total of bills is \$39,001.69.

The Planning Commission report was given by Jim Scrivner. A letter was sent to Mr. Karns. A public hearing will be set for March 11, 1996 for the driveway ordinance. The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. and moderated by Jim Scrivner.

The recycling report was given by Gwen Hay. She reported that paper recycling is not the worth the effort unless we have a semi load.

The April Primary will be held on March 19, 1996.

The Safety Committee was given by Barney Easterday. He wanted some direction from the board. Splitter said the Safety Committee should be presenting the map and costs to the Township for Fire and EMS coverage. Hanson explained that if a person is in a specific fire district, that person should also have the same EMS. Motion by Splitter to provide the Safety Committee with the newly drawn maps of the Fire and EMS Districts, along with the cost, and other information that can be provided, and be directed to go to the Emergency Services of Brooklyn and ask for this to be re-examined because the final map is not the same as that which was presented to the Town Board in December. Then report back to the Town Board with a recommendation by March 18, 1996 and that the Town Chair be present at these meetings to help with the smooth transition. Also the Safety Committee is to determine what information should be given to the people of the Township and how that information is to be disseminated. Motion seconded by Hanson. After discussion as to how to coordinate these efforts, motion carried.

Easterday explained that if no responses are received by the clerk for Fire and EMS Representatives, the Safety Committee will provide some recommendations. Motion was made by Hanson to change the language of the motion "To have one person serve on, only one board of the Fire and EMS District" to read as "One person to serve only one District, meaning both Fire and EMS of that District." Motion seconded, motion carried. Patterson presented a request for a Driveway Permit from Roger Golemb. Patterson suggest a 30-foot culvert rather that a 24-foot. The permit says the permit is for a new residence. Golemb said, "It is for a Field Entrance." The permit does not require board

action but does require the chairman's signature. Golemb agreed to the 30-foot culvert and initialed the change.

Motion by Splitter to rearrange the agenda to allow the Rep. from Rural Mutual as next order of business, motion seconded by Hanson; motion carried. Cindy Lawringer presented the Board with a complete description of coverage to the township. Proposed changes by the Board were; increase the clerk residence coverage from 3,000 to 5,000, decrease the coverage on the 90 IH from 50,000 to 35,000, put a rider on Brian Smith's personal tools in the shop of about 15,000, and prior to April renewal consider an additional 1,000,000 umbrella. It was suggested, obtaining a certificate of insurance "Home or Farm" for hall rental.

Splitter asked if the policy covers temporary equipment loss and rent of such. The agent will research this. Current premium prior to above change is \$4,250.

Patterson introduced Don Loeder, Building Inspector of Town and Village of Oregon. Loeder is soliciting to become inspector of the Village and would like to cover the Town of Brooklyn. He presented a resume and list of costs for his services. For more in-depth, see Tape 2-19-96.

Patterson explained the research done on the 1980 Truck Replacement. There has been much response from various truck providers. Steve Grunnet explained, "No matter how much you spend for a truck, you will have to add an additional \$11,000 for Hydraulics, so an older truck, lasting 5-years, would not be a wise investment. New-used vehicles run from 58,000 to 110,000."

Splitter asked is we need to replace the 80? Patterson said, "We can not operate the Town properly without one." Splitter asked, "How we could pay for a truck." Patterson explained, "The Bank is willing to give the Town a 3-year lease for \$50,000." Splitter asked how to justify a second truck to the Town's people. This is to only open roads; safety is also a factor, having another person to call in the event of a problem. An older truck would cost more for maintenance than the whole cost of purchase. The extra truck would be used for hauling asphalt, ditching, gravel, etc, in the summer. Splitter asked how firm and how long will the price last? Patterson suggested hold off for the Annual Meeting to make a decision. The Annual Meeting is April 9, 1996. The clerk announced the County was meeting on Feb. 28, 1996. March 8, 1996 is the Annual Meeting in Dodgeville. The clerk and the chairman will try to attend since it is now on Friday. Motion to adjust the bills to allow \$40 to cover this attendance by Patterson, second by Splitter; motion carried.

Motion by Splitter to adjourn the February 19, 1996 meeting, motion second by Hanson; motion carried. Chairman Patterson adjourned the February 19, 1996 meeting at 11.35 p.m.

TOWN OF BROOKLYN PUBLIC HEARING & PLANNING COMMISSION MARCH 11, 1996

The Brooklyn Town Board met in open session on Monday, March 11, 1996 with the Planning Commission at the Town Hall to hold a Public Hearing on the new Driveway Ordinance #3-18-96.

Chairman Robin Patterson called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with the full Board, Clerk, four members of the Planning Commission and two town's people present. Vice-Chair Harriet Tolly called the meeting of the Planning Commission to order. Tolly asked the clerk to read the notice of Meeting and Public Hearing, which was read.

Chairman Patterson announced the purpose of the Meeting concerning the Driveway Ordinance #3-18-96. Motion by Herb Hanson to recess to the Committee of the Whole, motion seconded by Splitter; motion carried.

Motion by Easterday to recess as a Committee of the Whole to conduct the Public

Hearing, motion by Kramer; motion carried.

Tolly exclaimed the reason for the Driveway Ordinance and gave a brief history of the process to complete the Ordinance.

Tolly read the new Ordinance changes as related them to the old Ordinance #6-3-93-B. One point being; all driveways off town roads, county and state highways will still require a town driveway permit. Other changes are: field access roads are included with residential driveways, 6 ft. height changed to 3 1/2 ft. at 300 ft. distance, run-off control added, maximum grade added, 24 ft. culvert changed to 30 ft. length, 100 ft from intersection of public highway. The portion of the driveway beyond the public right-ofway was all added. Conditions of existing driveways and field roads were added. Permit lapse of one year was added. The penalty clause was added.

Roger Krueger asked if the owner needs to get a permit from the state and the town if building a driveway off Hwy. 92. Tolly said, "Yes." Krueger felt that 18 inches of height clearance is too much. The Board and Commission agreed to compromise to 16 ft. Joint driveway clause was included, requiring a written agreement. After more discussion, the Joint Committee agreed to submit the Redraft to the Town Attorney.

Motion by Hanson to reconvene as a Town Board, motion seconded by Splitter; motion carried. Motion by Patterson to adjourn the special meeting, motion second by Hanson; motion carried. Chairman Patterson adjourned the meeting at 9:05 p.m.

Motion by McNeely to reconvene as a Commission, motion second by Kramer; motion carried.

Motion by Easterday to have the Vice-Chair submit the Redraft of the Driveway Ordinance to the Town's Attorney, motion second by McNeely; motion carried. Motion by Easterday to adjourn the Regular Planning Commission Meeting, motion second by Trow; motion carried.

Vice-Chair Harriet Tolly adjourned the Regular Commission Meeting at 9:15 p.m. Gil Hohnberger, Clerk

Belleville, Exeter and Montrose Fire Association Building

DATE: Tuesday, Feb. 20, 1996

Fire Services Request to purchase a new Engine/Pumper RE:

Fire Chief Tom Adams explained that the unit they are proposing to replace is a 1967 FWD; is in need of repairs and parts are no longer being made available from the manufacturer. direction of the Belleville, Exeter and Montrose Fire Association (BEMFA) a task force was assembled to explore the purchase of a new unit, the cost of which was not to exceed \$260,000. For the unit the fire service wanted, the preliminary estimates came in slightly over this figure at \$263,000. The committee modified its specifications and put the project out to bid to four companies. Only 3D and Pierce responded with bids. 3D's bid came in at \$223,150 and Pierce's bid was \$229,325. Chief Adam's recommended that the Pierce bid be accepted.

Financing of the proposal was presented as four options.

1. Financing the full amount; In of Brooklyn's amount=\$2,104.53. \$20,000. down payment from existing BEMFA's funds; In of

Brooklyn's amount= \$1920.99. \$40,000 down payment from BEMFA's funds (\$20,000 + \$20,000

1996 budgeted amount); Tn of Brooklyn's amount= \$1,737.45. 4. \$50,000 down payment from BEMFA's funds (\$20,000 + \$20,000 \$10,000 from association's \$32,000 checking account balance); Tn of Brooklyn's amount= \$1,645.68.

An open question and answer period was held. Questions relating to quality; What are the long range plans for other trucks; What do other fire departments have; financing issues, etc. were asked and answered. A copy of the minutes of this meeting have been requested and are to be sent to each municipality. The BEMFA Board motioned and unanimously passed the recommendation to purchase the Pierce Engine/Pumper for less than \$230,000, using \$50,000 of existing/budgeted BEMFA's funds with the balance of the cost to be financed.

At 9:05PM, Chairman Patterson called the Special Meeting of the Brooklyn Town Board to order. Present were Chairman Patterson and Sup. Hanson. Chairman Patterson motioned, Hanson seconded, to accept and agree to the BEMFA request to purchase the Pierce Engine Pumper under the terms described in their motion. The roll call vote was: Chairman Patterson-Yes 1st Supervisor Hanson-Yes motion passed.

SUBJECT: Emergency Services Coverage for the Township

DATE: 2 March 1996

The Town Safety Committee has reviewed the revised proposal made by the various emergency service providers for the Township. This is a revision of the emergency services coverage/district lines presented by "The Emergency Services of the Brooklyn Township" presented to the Township on 1 December 1995. The list of those individuals is attached. The Town Board accepted the coverage as presented on 1 December 1995.

The committee has identified the revised map and the coverage by address table as "Revised - o/a 1 February 1996 -Recommended by Town of Brooklyn Safety Committee 2 March 1996". The Safety Committee was not provided a record of the date of the revision or of the individuals who participated in the revision. Chief Mortensen may have a record of the date and the individuals who participated in the revision. The Chair of the Safety Committee (Easterday) reviewed the "Revised" proposal with Chief Mortensen in person at the Brooklyn Fire Station on 27 February 1996. Included in the revision are a reconfiguration of the Belleville coverage (all of section 18 and the southern half of section 7), an additional half section to the west (the east half of section 34) for Evansville coverage, and two special requests of Brooklyn district residents to be covered by Evansville.

The Safety Committee remains persuaded that its recommendation to the Town Board on 15 November 1995 is in the best interest of the safety of the township. However, in the spirit of cooperation and for expediency, it recommends that the Town Board proceed to contract for emergency services on the basis of the "Revised" proposal (map and table) identified above. It should be noted that where district lines follow a road the districts have agreed for one district to cover both sides of the road (see table of addresses). There are two addresses that are shown in the Brooklyn district, County T N7993 and N8009, that the committee was advised would be covered by the Evansville services on request of the residents at those addresses. The committee believes that such individual requests and negotiations are not in the best interest of responsible public palicy of sovernment.

The committee reminds the Town Board that the contract for emergency services should include verification and the nature of written mutual aid agreements. Further, the committee recommends that the Town Board require each district to provide an annual report to the Town Board. The report should include the number and nature of responses in the Town, the provision of or need for mutual aid, and the results of an annual assessment by the collective districts regarding the district lines and the need for any revision of the district lines.

The Committee will wait for direction from the Town Board regarding development of the emergency services public information material and the development of improved 911/dispatch capability for the Town and County. Chief Mortensen indicated to the Chair of the committee that the table of addresses for coverage would be adequate public information material for the townspeople and if the Town believed that more information was needed it would be the responsibility of the Town. The committee believes that the public information provided to the residents of the Town needs to be more extensive than the table of addresses.

With regard to representatives for the four emergency services districts the committee nominates the following individuals; Albany, Jerome Grunnet; Belleville, James Kramer; Brooklyn, Jerry Richardson; Evansville, Karen Tway. For the two members "at large", all of the present members of the Safety Committee have indicated that they would be willing to serve.

REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING

MARCH 18, 1996

THE BROOKLYN TOWN BOARD MET IN OPEN SESSION ON MONDAY, MARCH 18 AT THE TOWN HALL.

CHAIRMAN ROBIN PATTERSON, CALLED THE MEETING TO ORDER AT 7:30 PM WITH THE FULL BOARD, CLERK, AND 6 TOWN'S PEOPLE PRESENT. PATTERSON ASKED THE CLERK TO READ THE NOTICE, WHICH WAS READ. PATTERSON ASKED THE PEOPLE TO JOIN IN THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG.

MOTION BY SPLITTER TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE FEBRUARY 19, 1996 MEETING WITH ONE CORRECTION. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON MOTION CARRIED. MOTION BY SPLITTER TO APPROVE THE BELLEVILLE FIRE MEETING OF FEBRUARY 20, 1996. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED.

PATTERSON PRESENTED MINUTES OF 2 EVANSVILLE MEETINGS FOR REVIEW BY THE BOARD.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT OF \$63,314.50 IN THE CHECKING ACCOUNT AND \$28,650.66 IN THE STATE POOL, FOR A TOTAL OF \$91,965.06. MOTION BY HANSON TO ACCEPT THE TREASURERS REPORT WITH THE RECONCILIATION REPORT. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED.

THE BILLS WERE AUDITED. A QUESTION OF EVANSVILLE FIRE DISTRICT BILL WAS POSED BY HANSON. THE CLERK EXPLAINED HE DID SEND LETTER REQUESTING COVERAGE OF THE NEW ESTABLISHED DISTRICT, AND NOW BILLED FOR THE FULL YEAR, BEING JAN. 1 TO MARCH 31, THEN APRIL 1 THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 1996 WITH THE NEW BOUNDARIES. A DISCUSSION CONCERNING THE BOUNDARIES FOR ALL THE FIRE AND EMS DISTRICTS TOOK PLACE. THE SAFETY COMMITTEE RESIGNED IT'S SELF THAT IT WILL ALLOW THE BROOKLYN EMERGENCY SERVICES CONSIDER AND CONTROL THE BOUNDARIES OF COVERAGE IN THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN. A PROBLEM WITH EXCEPTIONS BEING MADE FOR EMERGENCY COVERAGE TO THOSE PEOPLE OUTSIDE OF THE DESIGNATED DISTRICTS, THE CONTRACTS HAVE BEEN SIGNED. SPLITTER POSED QUESTION IF WE ARE FAIRLY REPRESENTING OUR CITIZENS BY ALLOWING THEM TO MAKE THEIR OWN EXCEPTIONS. BY HANSON TO APPROVE THE BILLS. MOTION SECOND SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED. PLANNING COMMISSION HAD ON REPORT.

GWEN HAY GAVE THE RECYCLING REPORT. BY 1998 THE RECYCLING GRANTS WILL DECLINE. BY 20000 THEY WILL BE ELIMINATED. THEREFORE SHE SUGGESTED RAISING THE PRICE OF REFUSE BAGS, AND TRUCK LOADS.

GWEN HAY REPORTED A SPRING ELECTION WILL BE HELD MARCH 19, 1996.

SPRING CLEAN-UP DAYS WILL BE APRIL 27, AND MAY 4, 1996.

HANSON ASKED FOR A RECOMMENDATION OF COSTS PER BAG. HAY FELT THIS SHOULD BE A RESPONSIBILITY OF THE BOARD. HANSON ASKED HAY TO RESEARCH THE COSTS WITH SURROUNDING TOWNSHIPS. THE CLERK GAVE A REPORT OF RECYCLING GRANTS SINCE 1991 WHEN WE FIRST APPLIED.

THE COST PER BAC WAS DISCUSSED; \$2.00 PER BAG, 2 FOR \$3.00 ETC. \$8.00 PER TRUCK, THIS WILL BE DECIDED UPON AT THE APRIL MEETING.

THE SAFETY COMMITTEE REPORT WAS GIVEN BY STEVE MILLER. HANSON READ THE RECOMMENDATIONS BY THE COMMITTEE AS TO THE PERSONS TO REPRESENT THE TOWNSHIP TO THE FIRE AND EMS DISTRICTS. (ALBANY-JEROME GRUNNET), (BELLEVILLE JIM KRAMER), (BROOKLYN- GERALD RICHARDSON), (EVANSVILLE-KAREN TWAY), OR ALL OF THE MEMBERS OF THE SAFETY COMMITTEE ARE WILLING TO SERVE.

THE PEOPLE SUGGESTED HAD NOT BEEN CONTACTED. THEY WILL BE. PATTERSON SUGGESTED ASK FOR VOLUNTEERS FROM THE ANNUAL MEETING.

THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN MET IN OPEN SESSION TO HOLD THEIR 1996 ANNUAL MEETING ON TUESDAY, APRIL 9, 1996 AT THE TOWN HALL.

CHAIRMAN ROBIN PATTERSON, CALLED THE MEETING TO ORDER AT 7:40 PM WITH THE FULL BOARD, CLERK, AND 18 TOWN'S PEOPLE PRESENT.

PATTERSON ASKED THE CLERK TO READ THE NOTICE, WHICH WAS READ. THE FLAG.

MOTION BY JULIE SMITH TO DISPENSE WITH THE READING OF THE 1995 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES AND TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE 1995 ANNUAL MEETING AS WRITTEN. MOTION SECOND BY STEVE GRUNNET. MOTION CARRIED.

BROOKLYN TOWNSHIP ANNUAL MEETING

April 11, 19985

Chairman Robin Patterson called the Annual Meeting to order at 8:05 PM with the Full Board, 40 Town People, 2 Brooklyn Fire District Reps, the Green County Sheriff and 1 Oregon Observer Reporter present.

Patterson asked, "All who want to address the Board to sign a list." Patterson asked the clerk to read to read the Notice of the Annual Meeting, which was not read, due to being misplaced. With no agenda, Chairman Patterson read the Proposed Items to be addressed. Patterson asked All to join him in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Patterson asked for a motion to the Minutes of the 1994 Annual Meeting, motion Peter Hardin to dispense with the reading of the Minutes, motion second by Gwen Hay, motion carried. Motion by Ms. Sanflippo to Approve the 1994 Minutes as published, motion seconded by Hay; motion carried.

Patterson introduced the Fire Chief of Brooklyn, Phil Mortensen. Mortensen explained a Feasibility Study was made to determine if an EMS System was required in the Brooklyn area. This would include the Towns of Rutland, Union, Brooklyn, Oregon and the Village of Brooklyn. He explained the Cost Factor, the area of Coverage and Response Time to these areas. It was determined that the Response Time in the Town of Brooklyn would be about half of the time as Albany Response. He explained the EMS and Fire District would be combined as One. This District would service 2,600 people in the Full District. The cost to the Township would be about \$5,190 annually. This figure is 65% of the population coverage with 65% less coverage of the Albany EMS, the Township would be assessed \$6,415 annually for EMS Coverage from the original \$3,500 from Albany; or a \$2,915 increase for better response time.

Questions posed were concerning the 911 Calls.

The Projected Time Schedule is set for January 1, 1996.

The EMS System will not work with out all participants. So, all five entities must enter into the Agreement.

The user fee for each Ambulance Call will be \$150.

Easterday asked if there was a number where there are too many calls for an EMS System. Mortensen said there is but he is not sure what it is, although Oregon may be approaching it. He explained the time element is of the essence, five years form now, it will be impossible for Oregon and Rutland Townships and the Village to pull out of the Oregon EMS coverage.

As it stands now, the System will not work without 100% Participation.

The Clerk explained that the People need to make a decision to either vote for the Coverage or have the Board make the Decision for them, but it needs to be done at a Town Meeting.

Motion by Barney Easterday to have the People authorize the Town Board consider the Issues and make the Decision as to whether or not.

The Town Board will enter into an agreement with the Fire District to provide EMS Coverage, the motion was seconded by Peter Harden.

After Discussion, Jim Scrivner proposed an amendment to the motion of a cap of \$7,700 and not to proceed if it exceeds. Easterday agreed to the Amendment as part of the motion. The motion carried by 35 Aye and 4 No.

Patterson asked for a Show of Hands for agreement with the Chief against the count, 35 Aye and 4 No.

Patterson presented the Proposal of the Village of Brooklyn to allow their Police to patrol

week. Patterson introduced Pat Conlin, the County Sheriff.

Conlin mentioned he is reducing the typing of reports, eliminating time in the squad room and increasing road time. He commended the Town of Brooklyn for allowing the Sheriff's Department the use of the Town Hall for interviews, rest calls, calling in Monroe, typing of reports, etc.

The bottom line is that there will be more coverage in the Township. Conlin feels if the Town still wants more coverage, he would use part-time deputies for extra coverage at a cost of \$20 per hour and the County will pick up the insurance and mileage. Roger Golemb asked for a break-down of what is going on in the Township. We know the service calls but not the reasons.

Conlin feels this could be done with some work on the computer. Conlin said about 90% of the calls are for assistance not for crimes committed.

After more discussion, it was determined that with the proposed changes in the Sheriff's Department, the Town will be covered.

Patterson presented the problem of the 1980 Truck. The cost in the last two years to maintain it was over \$10,000. Brian researched the cost of a new truck and found it would be about \$67,337. This is something we need to consider in the next couple of years. Roger Golemb asked how many miles are on the 1980.

Patterson responded, it's not the mileage that concerns me. This truck was in two accidents and it's costing more to keep in running order. The rear end was replaced twice. We had the rear axel snap twice. The main axel snapped. The steeel is getting crystallized. Phil Brown asked if we have some money in reserve to pay for a truck. The clerk exclaimed we had \$20,000 of which \$4,280 was used for a gravel spreader. Hanson questioned if the County would supply a truck for the town. The Clerk said they would not.

Patterson said we have to have our fuel containment system in place by January 1, 1996, cost wise it would be \$8,000 to put in ourselves. That includes two 575-gallon tanks. The clerk, "Where the money will come from?" There is a public facilities restricted fund of \$15,000. It will take a vote of the people to use this fund. Peter Harden asked, "How extensive has the discussion with the Village been." Patterson said, "Very." The Fire Department has money in the budget to provide for this. The cost will be split three ways. Motion by Peter Harden that the Board proceed with this project to construct the fuel tanks in conformity with the new regulations taking effect next January 1st with a maximum cost to the township of \$8,000 and all efforts be made to co-op this project with the village and the fire department and the cost of the project to be extracted from the restricted fund, motion second by Jim Scrivner. The motion passed with 34 Aye and 0 No.

Patterson explained the pull-out of Center Township from the Evansville Fire District. This costs the Town extra money which was not anticipated. The Evansville Fire Dept. will go to a Fire District. The question was posed to having the whole Township covered by the Brooklyn Fire Department.

Motion by Barney Easterday to have the Town's people consider the feasibility to redrawing the Fire District lines and the Town Board consider a Citizen's Group to study this determination, motion second by Bob McNeely; the motion carried by 34 Aye and 0 No.

Motion by Roseanne Meixelsperger to allow the Board to withdraw the money from the Restricted Fund to pay off the part the debt of the Bridges, the motion second by Jerome Grunnet; the motion carried by 33 Ayes and 1 No.

Gwen Hay brought up the issue of Liberty Pole Park. Motion by Hay to have the clerk send a letter to the County Parks Committee informing them that the Town's People do not want the responsibility of the park and they wish to maintain the original agreement of cost sharing of the up-keep of the park, the motion was second by Sharon George. The motion carried by a vote of 22 Aye and 6 No.

Sharon George asked if the people will be informed as to the County's response. The Clerk will publish the results.

the Board did not view the roads yet. The Board is aware of Behnke Road. Patterson asked the clerk to call Farhner to inform them we will be taking bids.

Mildred Davis addressed the issue of the Oregon Senior Center. A Town's person needed some help and was turned down because she lived in Brooklyn Township. No motion was presented.

The question of the State Pool Fund was brought up. Did we loose any money? Marie Ross exclaimed we did not loose any principal. We did not get much interest.

Motion by Phil Brown to have the new Board set a policy as to who will be contacting the attorney to avoid un-authorized people from calling the attorney; the motion was second by Gilman Harry. The motion carried by 19 Aye and 0 No.

Jim Byrnes asked if the weight limit will be lifted from Yarwood Road. Patterson said he was in contact with Madison Metro Grow. He will make a decision on this at the next Board Meeting. He said the Board will work with him.

Motion to accept the Treasurer's Report as written by Jim Kramer, motion second by Easterday; motion carried.

Motion to adjourn by Easterday, second by Scrivner and carried. Patterson adjourned the 1995 Annual Meeting at 11:40 PM.

SUGGESTED AN ADDITION TO THE TOWN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT ACCEPTING CONSTRUCTION WASTE AT THE RECYCLING CENTER. EASTERDAY ASKED IF THE CENTER ACCEPTS USED OIL. THE CLERK EXPLAINED THAT WE DO NOT, BUT BY THE YEAR 1998 IT WILL BE A LAW TO DO SO. MORE QUESTIONS AND DISCUSSION TOOK PLACE ABOUT RECYCLING AND REFUSE DROP-OFF. MOTION BY PHILL BROWN TO DIRECT THE BOARD TO RESEARCH WHAT GOES INTO THE RECYCLING CENTER AND HOW WE CAN COVER THE COST. MOTION SECOND BY JEROME GRUNNET. AMENDMENT BY DICK GREGG TO HAVE EVERY PERSON USING THE CENTER RESPONSIBLE FOR THEIR OWN REFUSE AND THE DIRECTED TO ADJUST THE CHARGES TO COVER THE COST TO BOARD OPERATE THE CENTER. AMENDMENT SECOND BY GERALD TILLEY. THE AMENDMENT PASSED BY 12 AYE AND 0 NO. THE MOTION AS AMENDED 18 AYE AND 0 NO. MOTION BY SCRIVNER THAT THE BOARD PASSED BY ADJUST THE FEES AS THEY FEEL APPROPRIATE UNTIL THE STUDY IS MOTION SECOND BY TOLLY. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY. COMPLETED. GWEN HAY GAVE THE BOARD A LIST OF PROPOSED CHARGES. HAY SUGGESTED REPLACING THE FURNACE FILTERS DURING THE HEATING SEASON FOR THE SAKE OF THE ELECTION OFFICIALS. THERE WILL BE A REFERENDUM BY OREGON SCHOOL BOARD REQUESTING \$20,750,000.00 FOR RENOVATIONS OF THREE SCHOOLS.

THE PEOPLE CALLED A SHORT RECESS FOR REFRESHMENTS, WHICH WERE PROVIDED BY GWEN HAY AND THE ELECTION COMMITTEE.

THE SAFETY REPORT WAS GIVEN BY BARNEY EASTERDAY. EASTERDAY EXPLAINED AT THE 1995 ANNUAL MEETING THE BOARD WAS DIRECTED TO APPOINT A SAFETY COMMITTEE, TO REVIEW THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE BROOKLYN EMS, AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING THE EMS AND FIRE COVERAGE IN THE TOWNSHIP. THE MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE ARE STEVE MILLER, BOB McNEELY, BOB MUSHELL, JEFF PRICE, GLEN CLARK, BARNEY EASTERDAY, AND SUPERVISOR HANSON AS LIAISON. THE COMMITTEE INTERACTED WITH CHIEF MORTENSEN TO FIND OUT HOW THE FIRE DISTRICTS FUNCTIONED. THEY RESEARCHED THE TELEPHONE AND THE TOWNSHIP. THE COMMITTEE SYSTEMS COVERING REPRESENTATIVES OF THE FIRE AND EMS DISTRICTS AND DISCUSSED THEIR BY THE BOARD. THEY DETERMINED THERE WAS ROOM FOR ADDITIONAL COVERAGE BY ALL. THE MET WITH SHERIFF CONLIN TO GET INFORMATION ON THE MONROE 911 SYSTEM. THE RECOMMENDATIONS BY THE COMMITTEE TO THE TOWN BOARD WERE; 1. SUPPORT THE BROOKLYN EMS DEVELOPMENT, 2. THE TOWN BE COVERED BY THE BROOKLYN AND FIRE DISTRICTS AND THAT THE BOUNDARIES BE REDRAWN BY ALBANY AGREEMENT, AND WITHDRAWAL FROM THE BELLEVILLE AND MUTUAL EVANSVILLE FIRE DISTRICTS. 3. THE BROOKLYN AND ALBANY FIRE AND DISTRICTS HAVE THE SAME BOUNDARIES, 4. A VIGOROUS PUBLIC INFORMATION PROGRAM ABOUT EMERGENCY SERVICES BE INITIATED, 5. THE REQUEST THE GREEN COUNTY SHERIFF, WITH THE SUPPORT OF ALL TOWNS IN GREEN COUNTY, PURSUE UPDATING THE 911 AND DISPATCH SYSTEM, 6. IN EXPEDIENCY, THE COMMITTEE AGREED SPIRIT OF RESTRUCTURING AS PRESENTED BY THE EMERGENCY SERVICES, BUT STILL MAINTAINS THAT TWO DISTRICTS WOULD BETTER SERVE THE TOWNSHIP. HANSON ASKED JEROME GRUNNET IF HE WOULD BE WILLING TO SERVE AS THE CONTACT PERSON ON BOTH THE FIRE AND EMS BOARDS OF ALBANY. AGREED, HE WOULD DO SO. HANSON ASKED, WHAT THE CHAIRMAN WOULD LIKE SAFETY COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE DOING. THE ISSUE IS THE SAFETY AND SECURITY OF THE RESIDENTS OF THE TOWNSHIP.

THE COST WAS ABOUT \$35,000.00 AND THE COST CONTINUES ESCALATE. PATTERSON SAID THIS YEAR WE PLAN SEALING ALPINE, LEGLER AND YARWOOD WHICH IS 5-1/2 MILES. THE BROOKLYN TOWN BOARD MET IN OPEN SESSION ON MONDAY, APRIL 22, 1996 AT THE TOWN HALL.

CHAIRMAN ROBIN PATTERSON, CALLED THE MEETING TO ORDER AT 7:10 PM WITH THE FULL BOARD, CLERK, AND 6 TOWN'S PEOPLE PRESENT. PATTERSON ASKED THE CLERK TO READ THE NOTICE, WHICH WAS READ. PATTERSON ASKED THE PEOPLE TO JOIN IN THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG.

MOTION BY HANSON TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE MARCH 18,1996 MEETING WITH ONE CORRECTION. MOTION SECOND BY PATTERSON MOTION CARRIED. THE BOARD AGREED TO THE B.O.R. BEING MAY 25, 1996.

MOTION TO ADJUST THE AGENDA TO ALLOW RICK WAGGLE OF THE DNR TO MAKE HIS PRESENTATION. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. RICK EXPLAINED THE VOLUME BASED GARBAGE COST. CARRIED. IT IS LAW TO SET RATES TO COVER AT LEAST THE OF COST OF HAULING GARBAGE UNLESS A RESPONSIBLE UNIT CAN PROVE THEY RECYCLE AT LEAST 25% OF THE LAST REPORT BY THE CLERK INDICATED THAT THE TOTAL VOLUME. TOWN RECYCLES AT LEAST 44%, WHICH IS WELL WITH-IN THE GUIDE LINES BY THE DNR. RICK ADDRESSED THE PROBABILITY OF A PERSON ALL THEIR GARBAGE FOR 6 MONTHS, THEN BRINGING ALL OF STORING THEIR GARBAGE ON CLEAN-UP DAYS. THE BOARD AGREED THIS COULD THE CASE. THE BOARD WILL RE-THINK THE IDEA OF CLEAN-UP DAYS. HANSON EXPLAINED, THE TOWNSHIP RECAPTURES ABOUT 25% OF THE TOTAL COST OF THE RECYCLING CENTER SINCE THE TOTAL COST IS CLOSE TO \$9,000.00 AND WE COLLECT \$2,500.00. RICK WOULD NOT RECOMMEND TRYING TO RECOUP 100% OF THE COST, BECAUSE WE MAY BE SEEING MUCH OF THE GARBAGE IN THE DITCHES. GWEN HAY SUGGESTED RAISING THE BAG CHARGE TO \$2.00. PATTERSON SUGGESTED \$.25, OR \$.50 BUT NOT \$1.00. RICK WOULD BE AGAINST TO RECOVER THE TOTAL COST, BUT WOULD SUGGEST A INCREASE BUT NOT A WHOLE DOLLAR. HANSON READ THE MOTION PRESENTED BY THE ANNUAL MEETING TO RESEARCH THE COSTS AND ADJUST THE CHARGE TO INSTITUTE A USER FEE THAT IS REASONABLE.

MOTION BY PATTERSON TO CONVENE AS A COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE, PURPOSE OF CONDUCTING A PUBLIC HEARING CONCERNING FOR FEE STRUCTURE OF LAND DIVISIONS, AND DRIVEWAY COSTS. THE MOTION WAS SECOND BY SUPERVISOR HANSON. MOTION CARRIED. THE CLERK READ ORDINANCE #4-22-96 "AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE #6-7-93 AND #2-20-95 CONCERNING FEES FOR LAND DIVISIONS" IN ESSENCE, THERE WILL BE NO FEE FOR A REVIEW BY THE PLANNING COMMISSION, BUT THE COST TO A LAND DIVIDER WILL BE \$200.00 TO BE CONSIDERED BY THE TOWN BOARD AND \$100.00 FOR AN EXPEDITED HEARING TOWN BOARD OR THE PLANNING COMMISSION. THE FEE FOR AN APPEAL TO THE TOWN BOARD WILL BE \$200.00. MULTIPLE SUBMISSIONS WAS DISCUSSED. THE INTENT OF THE ORDINANCE WAS TO BE TO DEFRAY THE COST THE MEETING PROCESS. THEREFORE THE

COST OF \$200 WOULD BE ASSESSED ON THE FIRST PARCEL. OTHER PARCELS MAY BE INCLUDED IN THE SINGLE FEE BECAUSE THERE IS STILL ONLY ONE MEETING AND OR BOARD ACTION.

SPLITTER SUGGESTED THE ASSESSMENT SHOULD BE PER APPLICANT. HANSON SUGGESTED THE ASSESSMENT SHOULD BE IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE DEFINITION IN THE LAND DIVISION ORDINANCE #2-20-95. HANSON INTRODUCED A MOTION TO BE CONSIDERED AS TO THE DEFINITION OF A PARCEL AS DESCRIBED IN ORD #2-20-95 SECTION 5 (G). THE OTHER MOTION WOULD BE, THE FEE ASSESSED PER EXISTING PARCEL REGARDLESS OF THE NUMBER OF DIVISIONS PER PARCEL. WITH NO FURTHER DISCUSSION, SPLITTER SUGGESTED MOVE ON TO ORDINANCE #4-23-96

THE CLERK READ THE ORDINANCE #4-23-96 "AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE #3-4-92-B CONCERNING FEES FOR DRIVEWAY PERMITS"

SCRIVNER SUGGESTED, TO BE CONSISTENT, THE FEE FOR THE DRIVEWAY PERMIT SHOULD BE \$200.00, NOT \$25.00. THE EXPEDITED MEETING AGAIN SHOULD BE \$100.00. PATTERSON SUGGESTED, WITH THE NEW DRIVEWAY ORDINANCE, THE \$200.00 FEE IS CONSISTENT.

SPLITTER SUGGESTED THE FEE SHOULD INCLUDE A FIELD ACCESS.

KRAMER SAID, ALL THE FARMERS HE KNOWS, ALREADY HAVE AN ACCESS.
HANSON INTRODUCED A MOTION TO BE CONSIDERED WOULD BE, TO REMAIN CONSISTENT, WE WOULD SET THE FEE FOR DRIVEWAY PERMITS AT \$200.00 SPLITTER SUGGESTED REWORDING THE ORDINANCE TO COMPLY WITH THE NEW FEE STRUCTURE.

WITH NO FURTHER DISCUSSION; MOTION BY SPLITTER TO RECONVENE AS A BOARD. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED.

MOTION BY SPLITTER TO APPROVE AND ENACT ORDINANCE #4-22-96 WITH THE ADDITIONS OF THE MENTIONED MOTIONS OF 1. "THE FEE ASSESSED PER EXISTING PARCEL AND 2. THE DEFINITION OF A PARCEL AS DESCRIBED IN ORDINANCE #2-20-95 SECTION 5 (G). THE MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. THE MOTION CARRIED AS FOLLOWS; PATTERSON "AYE" HANSON "AYE", SPLITTER "AYE".

MOTION BY SPLITTER TO APPROVE AND ENACT ORDINANCE #4-23-96 WITH THE CLARIFICATION OF 1. THE PURPOSE OF THIS ORDINANCE IS TO ASSESS FREES FROM THE APPLICANT OF DRIVEWAY PERMITS UNDER THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN ORDINANCE #3-18-96, 2. UNDER ITEM #4 OF THIS ORDINANCE, THE STANDARD FEE FOR A DRIVEWAY PERMIT SHALL BE \$200.00, AND FURTHER UNDER #4-B, THERE WILL BE AN ADDITIONAL FEE OF \$100.00 FOR AN EXPEDITED HEARING. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED BY VOICE VOTE OF; PATTERSON "AYE", HANSON "AYE", SPLITTER "AYE".

THE TREASURER'S REPORT OF \$20,849.98 IN THE CHECKING ACCOUNT, AND \$80,764.15 IN THE STATE POOL, FOR A TOTAL OF \$101,614.13. MOTION BY HANSON TO ACCEPT THE TREASURERS REPORT. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED.

THE BILLS WERE AUDITED. A QUESTION OF THE CONSTABLE EXPENSE WAS SATISFIED. THE ADDITION OF \$42.17 CLERK EXPANSES WAS INCLUDED, FOR A RECONCILIATION OF \$83,145.53 AFTER THE BILLS ARE PAID. MOTION BY SPLITTER TO PAY THE BILLS AS CORRECTED. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED. MOTION BY HANSON TO ACCEPT THE AMENDED CLERK'S RECONCILIATION. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED. THE PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT WAS GIVEN BY JIM SCRIVNER. SCRIVNER PRESENTED A LAND TRANSACTION REQUEST FROM KENNETH AND

ELIZABETH FLOOD, REPRESENTED BY THEIR REAL ESTATE BROKER.
TEN (10) ACRES ARE TO BE DIVIDED FROM AN ORIGINAL FORTY (40) ACRE
PARCEL. THE RECOMMENDATION WAS FOR APPROVAL

MOTION BY SPLITTER TO APPROVE THE DIVISION. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED.

SCRIVNER PRESENTED THE REQUEST TO REAPPOINT TWO MEMBERS TO COMMISSION, WHO'S TERMS ARE EXPIRING. PLANNING THEY KRAMER AND BURDELL TROW. THE TWO MEMBERS WOULD BE WILLING TO SERVE UNLESS THERE ARE ANY OTHER PERSONS WILLING TO SERVE ON THE COMMISSION. THE BOARD HAD NOT HAD ANY REQUESTS.

MOTION BY SPLITTER TO REAPPOINT BURDELL TROW AND JIM KRAMER TO PLANNING COMMISSION TO SERVE FOR A THREE YEAR TERM BEGINNING THE THIRD MONDAY IN MAY 1996. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED.

THE RECYCLING REPORT INCLUDED A DISCUSSION OF NEW FEES FOR REFUSE FOR SPRING CLEAN-UP THERE WILL BE NO CHANGE DISPOSAL. THE CENTER WILL NO LONGER ACCEPT TIRES, CONSTRUCTION OR DEMOLITION DEBRIS. SPLITTER MADE THE MOTION TO INSTRUCT RECYCLING MANAGER AS TO WHAT IS OR IS NOT ACCEPTED AT THE SIGHT AND THIS TO BE AT THE DISCRETION OF THE RECYCLING MANAGER. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED.

REPORTED THAT A REFERENDUM WILL BE HELD BY THE OREGON SCHOOL DISTRICT REQUESTING \$20,700,000.00 FOR SCHOOL RENOVATION. SHE EXPLAINED THERE ARE NEW ELECTION BOOTHS ON THE MARKET FOR \$700.00 TO REPLACE OUR OLD BOOTHS, TO BE PLACED ON THE BUDGET FOR THE YEAR OF 1997.

MOTION BY PATTERSON TO HAVE THE CLERK AND OFFICIAL RESEARCH THIS AND REPORT AT THE NEXT MEETING. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED.

THE SAFETY COMMITTEE REPORT WAS GIVEN BY BARNEY EASTERDAY. EASTERDAY DRAFTED A PUBLIC INFORMATION FLYER FOR ALL THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWNSHIP. MORE INFORMATION WILL BE ADDED AT SUCH TIME THAT THE EMERGENCY SERVICES ARE ALL ACTIVELY FUNCTIONING. HANSON ASKED IF THERE IS ANY WAY OF IRONING OUT ANY SPEED BUMPS, PRESENT OR IN THE FUTURE. SPLITTER SUGGESTED THAT THE SUPPORT OF GREEN COUNTY TOWN'S ASSOCIATION WOULD BE A GOOD SOURCE FOR THE SOME POSITIVE PRESSURE PLACED ON THE COUNTY DISPATCH SYSTEM. HANSON SUGGESTED, PATTERSON PRESENT THE NEW REPRESENTATIVE TO THE RESPECTIVE FIRE AND EMS DISTRICTS. THIS WILL HELP WITH THE ACCEPTANCE OF THE NEW PEOPLE.

MOTION BY HANSON TO DIRECT THE SAFETY COMMITTEE TO RECONVENE AND THE 911 SYSTEM PROBLEMS, FOLLOW-UP ON THE INFORMATION TO EXPLORE WITH THE COMMITTEE THE RELUCTANCE TO SERVE ON THE FIRE OR EMS DISTRICT BOARDS WITH THE UNDERSTANDING THAT THE CURRENT REPRESENTATIVE TO THOSE BOARDS WILL BE PRESENT AS OFTEN AS NECESSARY TO FACILITATE THE TRANSFER OF REPRESENTATION,

MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. AFTER DISCUSSION, AND THE REQUEST FOR A LETTER FROM THE BOARD TO INDICATE THE TRANSFER CONCEPT, MOTION CARRIED.

MOTION BY HANSON TO ACCEPT WAGE STRUCTURE AS PRESENTED TO BOARD BY THE CLERK AND A CONTRACT BE SIGNED TO INDEMNIFY THE TOWN THE EVENT THE EMPLOYEE COMES BACK WITH THE REQUEST FOR HEALTH INSURANCE. THE HEALTH INSURANCE WILL BE PROVIDED BUT WILL FROM HIS CURRENT WAGES AND NOT AS AN EXTRA COST TO THE TOWNSHIP. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED.

A DRIVEWAY PERMIT WAS SUBMITTED TO THE BOARD BY THE CLERK. FROM GERALD SCHULZ ON ALPINE ROAD. MOTION TO ACCEPT THE PERMIT BY HANSON WITH THE STIPULATIONS THAT A CULVERT BE INSTALLED TO ALLOW FOR THE NATURAL WATERWAY, AND THE DRIVEWAY COME INTO COMPLIANCE WITH THE EXISTING DRIVEWAY ORDINANCE AND THIS BE CONVEYED TO HIM BY THE CLERK. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED.

EXPLAINED THAT PEACHES INTEND TO PURCHASE THE LOT ON THE CORNER OF KING AND YARWOOD RD'S BUT WOULD NOT PURCHASE UNLESS THEY CAN GET DRIVEWAY ACCESS TO THE PROPERTY AND A WRITTEN

CONFIRMATION. THE BOARD SUGGESTED THEY SUBMIT A WRITTEN REQUEST AS OTHER PURCHASERS DO. HANSON SUGGESTED THEY READ THE ORDINANCE AS TO THE REQUIREMENTS AND MAKE THEIR DECISION BASED ON THAT. THE CLERK REPORTED THAT THE COUNTY CLERK WILL SUBMIT A QUIT CLAIM TO THE BROOKLYN TOWNSHIP FOR THE TRANSFER OF "LIBERTY POLE HILL PARK" TO THE TOWNSHIP, AND WILL PAY HALF THE COST OF TRANSFER. HANSON SAID ONCE THE DATA IS ACCUMULATED WITH THE NUMBERS AND COSTS OF LEASES, HAVE THE CLERK DO A PHONE POLL. MOTION BY PATTERSON TO TRANSFER ALL ACCOUNTING OF BROOKLYN TOWNSHIP INTO THE BROOKLYN BANK AT TIME IT CHANGES OWNERSHIP. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED. MOTION BY SPLITTER THAT AT SUCH TIME THAT THE INFORMATION AS TO THE COSTS AND LEASE INFORMATION IS RECEIVED, THE CLERK DO A PHONE POLL FOR APPROVAL. HANSON FELT THAT HIS VOTE IS NOT NEEDED IF HE IS GONE FROM THE TOWNSHIP. WITH NO FURTHER BUSINESS, MOTION BY HANSON TO ADJOURN THE APRIL MEETING. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED. CHAIRMAN PATTERSON ADJOURNED THE MEETING AT 11:02PM.

PATTERSON SUGGESTED THIS BE PLACE ON THE AGENDA FOR THE 1997 BUDGET IN OCTOBER. HANSON GAVE THE SAFETY REPORT. THE COMMITTEE MET ON APRIL 28. THE COMMITTEE! SUGGESTED THE TOWN BOARD INTRODUCE THE INDIVIDUAL REPRESENTING THE TOWN ON BOTH THE EMS AND FIRE DISTRICT AND THAT ONE MEMBER REPRESENT THE TOWN ON DISTRICTS. IT WAS FURTHER SUGGESTED THAT THE CLERK PUBLISH A NOTICE OF OPEN MEETING PRIOR TO THE BOARD MEETING WITH THE DISTRICTS TO INTRODUCE THE NEW REPRESENTATIVE. A LETTER WAS READ THE CLERK FROM THE BROOKLYN FIRE AND EMS DISTRICT, REQUESTING PATTERSON REMAIN AS REPRESENTATIVE TO THE DISTRICT APPROXIMATELY SEPTEMBER 1, 1996. CATHY ANDERSON REPORTED THAT THE CLUB IS PLANNING TO EXPAND THE FACILITIES TO ANOTHER TRAP, AND 16 ACRES. ANDERSON ASKED THE CLERK IF THERE WILL BE A FOR THIS EXPANSION. MOTION BY HANSON TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE MAY 20,1996 MEETING
WITH ONE CORRECTION. MOTION SECOND BY PATTERSON, MOTION CARRIED.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT OF \$9.141.58 IN THE CHECKING ACCOUNT, AND \$71,409.22 IN THE STATE POOL, FOR A TOTAL OF \$8610.80. MOTION BY PATTERSON TO ACCEPT THE TREASURERS REPORT. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED. THE TREASURERS RECONCILIATION WAS

THE CLERK READ RESOLUTION 6-1-96 GREEN COUNTY TO THE BOARD SELLING LIBERTY POLE HILL PARK TO THE TOWNSHIP FOR THE FEE OF \$1.00 AND CONSIDERATIONS, SUCH AS \$6.00 TRANSFER FEE. THE RESOLUTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. THE BILLS WERE AUDITED. THE CLERKS RECONCILIATION REPORT WAS ACCEPTED WITH THE ADDITION OF THE \$6.00 TRANSFER FEE. THE CLERK EXPLAINED THE CHANGE OF BRIAN SMITH'S CHECK, INDICATING HIS HMO FROM HIS WIFE'S EMPLOYER WILL NOT GO INTO AFFECT UNTIL JANUARY 1, 1997. MOTION BY HANSON TO APPROVE THE BILLS. MOTION SECOND BY PATTERSON. MOTION CARRIED.

THE AFFIDAVIT WAS DATED MAY 25, 1996. THE CLERK RECALLED THE MINUTES OF A PREVIOUS MEETING WHERE THE LAND WAS IN TWO 10 ACRE PARCELS AS OF FEBRUARY 1995. THE BOARD DIRECTED THE COMMISSION TO MEET WITH MR. WEGWITZ, MR. KARNS AND THE TOWN'S ATTORNEY TO DETERMINE WHAT IS PROPER AS TO THE ORDINANCE.

SCRIVNER PRESENTED A CSM FROM ELMER AND DARYL ROSS. THERE WAS NOT A FINAL COMMISSION REVIEW. McDONALD WOULD LIKE THIS TO BE RECORDED AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. THIS ISSUE WILL BE ADDRESSED AT THE NEXT COMMISSION MEETING, THEN BE PLACED ON THE AGENDA OF THE JULY BOARD MEETING, UNLESS THERE IS CALL FOR AN EXPEDITED MEETING. SCRIVNER CAUTIONED THE BOARD TO NOT GIVE INFORMATION ABOUT THE

LAND DIVISION ORDINANCE. IF THE QUESTIONS BECOME THE LEAST COMPLICATED. PLEASE REFER THE INDIVIDUAL TO THE COMMISSION. SCRIVNER REPORTED, THE COMMISSION HAS YET TO RECEIVE ANY INFORMATION FROM DAMROW. THEY WILL CONTINUE TO USE EKUM ABSTRACT FOR THEIR INFORMATION GATHERING.

HAY REPORTED THAT THE VILLAGE OF BELLEVILLE CHARGES EXTRA FOR WHITE GOODS. THE REFUSE AND RECYCLING PICK UP IS PAID ENTIRELY BY THE RESIDENTS. SHE SUGGESTED A FEE FOR WHITE GOODS AND RAISING THE BAG FEE TO \$1.50 EACH.

HANSON READ THE SAFETY REPORT GIVEN TO HIM BY BARNEY EASTERDAY. THE FOLLOWING COMMITTEE MEMBERS HAVE AGREED TO SERVE AS REPRESENTATIVES OF THE TOWNSHIP TO THE FIRE AND EMS DISTRICTS: BROOKLYN FIRE AND EMS, JEFF PRICE HAS AGREED TO SERVE, EVANSVILLE FIRE DISTRICT, BOB MCNEELY HAS AGREED TO SERVE, BELLEVILLE FIRE DISTRICT, STEVE MILLER HAS AGREED TO SERVE, ALBANY FIRE AND EMS, JEROME GRUNNET HAS AGREED TO SERVE. IT WAS FURTHER RECOMMENDED THAT JEROME GRUNNET BE APPOINTED AS A MEMBER OF THE SAFETY COMMITTEE. EACH REPRESENTATIVE WILL REPORT TO THE COMMITTEE, THEN THE COMMITTEE WILL REPORT TO THE BOARD.

THE COMMITTEE PRESENTED A DRAFT OF A LETTER TO GO TO EACH RESIDENT OF THE TOWNSHIP. IT WAS FURTHER REQUESTED THAT EACH REPRESENTATIVE OF THE FIRE DISTRICT BE CONSIDERED AS REP. TO THE EMS OF THAT DISTRICT. HANSON READ THE LETTER INTO THE MINUTES.

MOTION BY HANSON TO HAVE JEFF PRICE SERVE THE BROOKLYN FIRE AND EMS DISTRICT, THAT STEVE MILLER SERVE THE BELLEVILLE FIRE AND EMS DISTRICT, THAT BOB MCNEELY SERVE THE EVANSVILLE FIRE DISTRICT WITH SPECIAL CONSIDERATION THAT HE BE ALLOWED TO PERUSE BEING LIAISON TO THE EVANSVILLE EMS, THAT JEROME GRUNNET SERVE THE ALBANY FIRE DISTRICT AND EMS, AND THAT JEROME GRUNNET BE APPOINTED TO THE SAFETY COMMITTEE. MOTION SECOND BY PATTERSON. HANSON AMENDED HIS OWN MOTION TO SET THE TERM FOR 2 YEARS, THE TERM WILL BE FOR ONE YEAR BEGINNING WITH JULY 1, 1996 AND ENDING WITH JULY 1, 1997.

THEN THE NEXT BOARD CAN REAPPOINT THEM FOR TWO YEARS. THE MOTION AS AMENDED CARRIED.

PATTERSON ANNOUNCED THE ENTIRE EMS AND FIRE BOARD WILL MEET IN MADISON ON JUNE 24. 1996 AT 5:30 PM.

THE CLERK PRESENTED A DRIVEWAY PERMIT APPLICATION FROM ROGER BERG, REPRESENTING RONALD AND CARRIE PALMER, FOR ACCESS TO LEGLER ROAD. THE APPLICATION WAS VIEWED BY SUPERVISOR SPLITTER. CHAIRMAN ROBIN PATTERSON, CALLED THE MEETING TO ORDER AT 7:35 PM WITH THE FULL BOARD, CLERK, TREASURER AND 6 TOWN'S PEOPLE PRESENT. PATTERSON ASKED THE CLERK TO READ THE NOTICE OF OPEN MEETING, WHICH WAS READ. PATTERSON ASKED THE PEOPLE TO JOIN IN THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO

WITH THE JULY MINUTES CORRECTED, MOTION BY HANSON TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE JULY 15,1996 MEETING WITH FOUR CORRECTIONS. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER, MOTION CARRIED.

IRV KLAPPER JOINED IN AN INFORMAL DISCUSSION AS TO THE STRUCTURE OF THE ALBANY FIRE DEPARTMENT. PATTERSON ASKED IF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT WOULD HAVE A PROBLEM WITH A TOWN MEMBER SITTING IN ON ITS FIRE MEETINGS FOR THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN.

IRV EXPLAINED THAT THEY ARE ACTUALLY OPERATING UNDER THE DIRECTION OF THE VILLAGE. THERE IS NO DISTRICT, IT IS A COMMUNITY FIRE DEPARTMENT. IT IS AN OPEN MEETING AND ANYONE IS WELCOME ON THE SECOND TUESDAY OF EVERY MONTH AT 7:00 PM AT THE FIRE HOUSE. PATTERSON WILL INFORM JEROME GRUNNET OF THE MEETINGS, TIME AND LOCATION.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT OF \$27,128.53 IN THE CHECKING ACCOUNT, AND \$61,756.88 IN THE STATE POOL, FOR A TOTAL OF \$88,885.41. MOTION BY HANSON TO ACCEPT THE TREASURERS REPORT. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED. THE TREASURERS RECONCILIATION WAS ACCEPTED. THE CLERK'S RECONCILIATION REPORT WAS ACCEPTED. COMMENT BY THE TREASURER, THE BROOKLYN BANK HAS NOT YET PAID INTEREST TO THE TOWNSHIP ACCOUNT. (NOTE) PATTERSON WAS INFORMED THAT ON 8-13-96 THE BANK HAS UPDATED THE INTEREST FOR THE 1996.

THE BILLS WERE AUDITED. THE CLERK EXPLAINED, THE MEDICAL ENTRY ON JULIE SMITH'S TIME CARD ENTERED THERE FOR THE CONVENIENCE OF BRIAN SMITH. TOWNSHIP PAYS ALL MEDICINE AFTER THE FIRST \$25.00 EACH YEAR. SPLITTER QUESTIONED THE HIGHWAY CATEGORIES, SHOWING A BALANCE OF \$6,000.00 IN CONSTRUCTION. THIS WILL BE USED THIS YEAR AS A THE ADDITION TO THE BUSINESS-OWNER POLICY WAS DUE TO THE PURCHASE OF THE NEW TRUCK. THIS PREMIUM IS FOR THE TOTAL THE CLERK WILL RESEARCH INSURANCE CARRIERS. PURCHASE PRICE. PATTERSON SUGGESTED PAYING THE WEDGING PORTION OF AMON'S BILL AND, PAY THE SEAL-COATING NEXT MONTH. MOTION BY SPLITTER TO PAY THE BILLS MINUS THE \$16,452.00 TO AMON FOR SEAL COATING AND THIS TO BE PLACED ON SEPTEMBER'S BILLS. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. THE MONTHLY TOTAL OF BILLS AS AMENDED IS \$40,230.47. MOTION CARRIED.

SCRIVNER GAVE THE PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT. THE FIRST ITEM WAS A BRIEF REPORT ON STANDARDS AS TO LAND SURVEY VERIFICATIONS. A LETTER WAS SENT TO MR. WEGWITZ INFORMING HIM THAT HE NEEDS TO PRESENT ORIGINAL DOCUMENTS AND THE SURVEYOR IN ORDER TO SATISFY THE COMMISSION'S NEEDS. NO RESPONSE THUS FAR. THE BROOKLYN SPORTSMAN'S CLUB PRESENTED A SURVEY SHOWING THAT THE PARCEL, NOW OWNED BY THE CLUB, WAS INCREASED BY FOUR (4) ACRES. THIS ADDITION IS EXEMPT FROM THE ORDINANCE BECAUSE THERE IS LAND ADDED TO THE ORIGINAL PARCEL AND NOT CREATING ANOTHER PARCEL. MOTION BY HANSON TO APPROVE BASED UPON THE OLD SURVEY AS BEING IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE OLD ORDINANCE. THE MOTION WAS SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED. THE CHAIRMAN AND CLERK SIGNED THE CSM.

THE RECYCLING REPORT WAS GIVEN BY GWEN HAY. HAY REVIEWED THE HISTORY OF THE RECYCLING GRANT PROCESS AND REPORTED THE RECYCLING ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF OTHER COMMUNITIES. HAY RECOMMENDS THE PER BAG OF REFUSE SHOULD BE INCREASED TO \$1.50. PATTERSON REPORTED THAT IT IS COSTING THE TOWNSHIP MONEY TO GET RID OF THE RECYCLABLE. WITH THE INCREASE COST IN RECYCLING, A DISCUSSION TOOK PLACE AS TO WHO SHOULD BE DOING THE HAULING OF THE RECYCLABLES. (POINT OF ORDER WAS CALLED BY STEVE MILLER) HAY CONTINUED REPORTING ON LIBERTY POLE HILL PARK, THE STATE

HISTORICAL SOCIETY WILL PLACE THE PARK IN THE REGISTER BUT THERE WILL BE NO BENEFIT TO THE TOWNSHIP. PATTERSON AGREED TO DO SO. HAY REPORTED THAT THERE WILL BE A PRIMARY ELECTION ON SEPT 10. (DURING HAY'S REPORT)

(McNEELY SUGGESTED THE RECYCLING MANAGER HAUL THE RECYCLABLE TO MADISON. HE ALSO QUESTIONED IF THE TOWN EMPLOYEE HAS ENOUGH WORK IN THE TOWNSHIP TO KEEP HIMSELF BUSY. PATTERSON EXPLAINED THAT HE DID. McNEELY FEELS THAT WE ARE PAYING MORE FOR EMPLOYEES AND ARE NOT GETTING WHAT WE ARE PAYING FOR. MORE DISCUSSION ABOUT ROADS, HAZARDS OF MOWER DAMAGE, LESS WORK BEING DONE PER LABOR DOLLAR.)

STEVE MILLER REPORTED THE SAFETY COMMITTEE HAD NO FURTHER REPORT. MILLER HAS YET TO ATTEND A BELLEVILLE FIRE DISTRICT MEETING. HE REPORTED THAT WIRES GOT CROSSED, BUT THAT WILL BE CORRECTED.

McNEELY REPORTED THAT THE EVANSVILLE FIRE DISTRICT HAS NEW BY-LAWS AND A COPY WAS GIVEN TO THE CLERK. THE EMS HAS NO MEETINGS. HE ALSO SAID THE BULK OF EMERGENCY CALLS COME FROM THE VILLAGE OF EVANSVILLE. THERE IS NO PER-CAPITA COST TO THE VILLAGE BUT EACH TOWNSHIP PAYS \$8.00 PER PERSON. THERE IS NO ACCOUNTABILITY OF THE EMS TO ANY CONTROLLING GROUP.

PATTERSON REPORTED THAT MORE STOP SIGNS ARE BEING PULLED UP AND DESTROYED.

MILLER REPORTED THAT THE FIRST SOUTH CURVE CAUTION SIGN IN KING ROAD IS GONE. THE NAME SIGN ON KING AND FREIDIG ROAD IS MISSING. THERE ARE TWO MORE CURVE SIGNS EAST ON KING ROAD MISSING.

CLERK PRESENTED A DRIVEWAY PERMIT FROM KATHERYN CURTNER. REQUESTING ACCESS TO ELMER ROAD. SPLITTER THOUGHT THAT THIS PROPERTY WAS SURVEYED AFTER THE ORDINANCE. MCNEELY SAID THAT WAS QUESTIONABLE AT THE TIME OF THE SURVEY. SPLITTER WOULD LIKE TO HAVE MORE INFORMATION. HE ASKED THE CLERK TO RESEARCH THIS FIND THE DATE OF RECORD ON THE LOTS IN QUESTION, BEING #1473. THE CLERK CALLED THE REGISTER OF DEEDS AND FOUND THAT; 1. BROOKLYN TOWNSHIP VOTING AT PRIMARY ELECTION by Sharon George

At the primary election held Tuesday, September 16, voting at the Brooklyn Township polling place was a record breaker. The poll workers reported they tabulated almost 100 (actually 98) votes from concerned voters. Having no referendum listed the good seasonal weather keeping the farmers in the fields, the usual low count of voters was more than expected.

The biggest item on the township agenda was competition on the 80th Assembly District campaign. The town clerk, Gil Hohnberger, was beat out by Mike Powers from Albany. Chris Eager received two times more votes than his opponent, Kathleen Powers, a republican. Eager, a democrat will face Ralph Ovadal, the candidate for the U.S. Taxpayers Party.

Hohnberger criticized the one party restriction in voting, saying, "Granted, Mr. Powers took the county hands down, but he really would have taken the count hands down if all of the votes could have been counted."

Calling the election "unconstitutional", Hohnberger was referring to the nocross over restriction put on the primary election. He continued, "We have a constitutional right to cast a vote for the person of our choice. Most of the people I've talked with tell me they don't vote for the party, they vote for the person. Our voting system does not catch up with the modern day trend of the people."

Using the punch system at the township, poll workers specifically stressed to each voter that they were not able to cast their votes for different candidates in different parties, but had to keep their votes in one party. If they did they would be "crossing over". They were warned if they did so, their vote could not be counted. Whether they misunderstood or were determined to cast their preference regardless, 20 votes could not be counted on the final tally.

Voters at other locations in Green County lost their votes at the polls, also. About 3,800 votes were cat in Green County; however 1,275 votes had to be thrown out. County Clerk Mike Doyle said only 17 % of the legal voting age in Green County voted at the primary.

The ruling was originally made because people would purposely vote for an unknown just to take away from their undesirable candidate. Eliminating the candidates at the primary to one of each party has to be studies further or the voters need to be more informed.

MOTION TO APPROVE THE SPECIAL BROOKLYN FIRE AND EMS MEETING OF OCTOBER 9, 1996 BY HANSON. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED.

MOTION TO APPROVE THE SPECIAL BELLEVILLE EMS MEETING OF OCTOBER 8, 1997 MEETING BY SPLITTER. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED.

MOTION BY HANSON APPROVE THE BILLS. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED. MOTION BY SPLITTER TO CORRECT THE BILLS. HE REQUESTED ITEM #8 BE STRICKEN FROM THE BILLS (EXTRA MEETINGS AND EXPENSES FOR SPLITTER). MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED. DELETION THE BILLS WERE \$7,249.51 AS CORRECTED. SCRIVNER GAVE THE PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT. THE FIRST ITEM WAS A PROPOSAL TO SPLITTER TO FILL THE 7TH POSITION OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION. SCRIVNER GAVE A COPY OF A LETTER FROM JOHN CONCERNING THE WEGWITZ DIVISIONS. SCRIVNER EXPLAINED THAT THE MEETING IN NOVEMBER WILL BE USED TO LOOK AT THE TOWN'S TO CONSIDER THE COMMERCIAL USE IN THE LAND USE PLAN SCRIVNER PRESENTED A NEW CERTIFIED SURVEY MAP FROM MR. BROOKLYN SPORTSMAN'S CLUB SHOWING EASEMENTS FOR MR. MASS, PLACED ON THE ORIGINAL MAP. MOTION BY SPLITTER TO APPROVE THE AMENDED CSM. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED. THE CHAIRMAN AND CLERK SIGNED THE CSM. COPIES WERE GIVEN TO MR. MAAS. AND THE CLERK.

SCRIVNER SUGGESTED TO CONTINUE WITH EKUM ABSTRACT BECAUSE THE INFORMATION RECEIVED FROM THE ASSESSOR IS NOT SUFFICIENT. THE BOARD AGREED.

GWEN PRESENTED THE BOARD WITH A COPY OF A REPORT FROM THE MONROE EVENING TIMES, STATING THAT THE REPUBLICAN PARTY IS DISTRIBUTING INFORMATION TO REQUEST ABSENTEE BALLOTS AND PLACING THE WRONG INFORMATION ON THE BROCHURE. THE PARTY SENT OUT 350,000 COPIES.

THERE IS NO REPORT FROM THE SAFETY COMMITTEE.

THE CLERK HAS A COPY OF THE LATEST CONTRACT WITH THE ALBANY FIRE DEPARTMENT.

THE CLERK REPORTED THAT THE COUNTY IS WORKING ON THE ANNUAL BUDGET. THE TAX LEVY WILL INCREASE AT ABOUT 5.6%.

THE CLERK PRESENTED A DRIVEWAY PERMIT APPLICATION FROM GREG AND VICKY LANCASTER FOR ACCESS TO THE PROPERTY FROM SMITH ROAD. MOTION TO ACCEPT THE DRIVE PERMIT HANSON. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED.

THE CLERK REPORTED THAT HE RECEIVED A FAX FROM RICK STADELMAN. THE BOARD CAN DECLARE THAT AN OVER-TAXATION WILL OCCUR BUT THIS IN ITSELF WILL NOT STOP ANY ACTION TAKEN BY TOWN RESIDENCES, SUCH AS A PETITION FOR REASSESSMENT. STADELMAN ALSO STATES THAT OTHER RESIDENTS NOT HAVING PROPERTY LISTED IN THE #7 "OTHER" CATEGORY, MAY ALSO PETITION FOR A REASSESSMENT AND IT IS LIKELY THEY WILL BE GRANTED ONE BY THE D.O.R. COUILLARD STATED, IN A CONVERSATION WITH THE CLERK, THAT THE RETURN OF OVERPAYMENT OF TAXES SOUNDS LIKE A GOOD IDEA, BUT IF HE RECEIVES A PETITION EVEN AFTER THE TAX RETURN, HE WILL HAVE TO HONOR IT. THE CLERK PRESENTED A LETTER TO THE BOARD, WHICH CAN BE PLACED IN TAX BILLS TO ALL RESIDENTS OF THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN. BOARD READ THE LETTER. SPLITTER SUGGESTED MODIFICATIONS TO THE LETTER AS FOLLOWS: PLACING THE NUMBER OF THE CATEGORY (#7) PRIOR TO THE NAME OF "OTHER", A REFUND WILL BE GRANTED TO THOSE APPLY UNDER THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS AS WRITTEN UNDER WISCONSIN STATE STATUTES #74.35 AND ALL CONDITIONS SHOULD BE LISTED SUCH AS

1. BE IN WRITING. 2. STATE THE ALLEGED CIRCUMSTANCE GIVING RISE TO THE CLAIM. 3. STATE AS ACCURATELY AS POSSIBLE THE AMOUNT OF THE CLAIM. 4. BE SIGNED BY THE CLAIMANT. 5. BE SERVED ON THE CLERK OF THE DISTRICT.

SPLITTER STATED THAT THE TAXPAYER SHOULD STATE ON THE REQUEST THE STATUTE NUMBER FOR WHICH THE CLAIM IS BEING MADE, AND IF YOU ARE NOT CERTAIN THAT A CLAIM CAN BE MADE YOU MAY CONTACT THE CLERK. ALL CLAIMS MUST BE MADE BY JANUARY 31, 1997.

SPLITTER PROPOSED THAT THE LETTER AS RESTATED BE PLACED INTO THE 1996 TAX STATEMENTS. HANSON EXPLAINED THAT AFTER THE CLOSE OF THE BOARD OF REVIEW, THERE EXISTED A REASSESSMENT OF PART OF THE TOWNSHIP THUS CREATING INEQUITIES IN THE TOWNSHIP'S ASSESSED VALUATION.

MOTION BY HANSON THAT THE TOWN BOARD HAS HAD IT BROUGHT TO THEIR ATTENTION THAT THE ASSESSMENT PROCESS USED FOR THE CURRENT YEAR IS IN ERROR, AND THAT THE CURRENT ASSESSMENT SHOULD HAVE NOT BEEN IMPLEMENTED UNTIL THE ENTIRE TOWNSHIP HAS BEEN COMPLETED. WITH THAT IN MIND AN ERROR EXISTS. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER.

FOR THE RECORD SPLITTER EXPLAINED THAT MIKE POWERS AS A REPRESENTATIVE, KNOWING THE PROBLEM, DID NOT BRING THIS ISSUE TO THE TOWN BOARD. THIS CONCERNS SPLITTER IN THAT THIS ISSUE IS USED FOR POLITICAL GAIN. HANSON PROPOSED AN AMENDMENT TO HIS OWN MOTION AS PART AND PARCEL TO THIS, THE TOWN BOARD BELIEVES THAT THE INACTION OF OUR ASSEMBLYMAN IN KNOWING ABOUT IT IN ADVANCE AND BRINGING IT TO THE BOARD AFTERWARDS, SERVED NO GOOD PURPOSE.

MOTION BY SPLITTER TO INCLUDE THE CORRECTED LETTER IN THE TAX STATEMENTS TO BE SENT OUT TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWNSHIP THAT ARE BEING ISSUED A TAX STATEMENT FOR 1996. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. PATTERSON ENTERED AN AMENDMENT THAT THE LETTER BE ADDRESSED AT THE NOVEMBER MEETING. HANSON SECOND THE AMENDMENT. THE AMENDMENT CARRIED. THE MOTION AS AMENDED CARRIED.

THE CLERK EXPLAINED ISSUES PRESENTED TO HIM BY THE ASSESSOR.

MR. DAMROW HAS NINE MORE HOMES TO REASSESS. HIS NEXT STEP IS TO REVALUE THE RESIDENTIAL LAND BUT HE WILL HAVE TO WAIT UNTIL AFTER JANUARY 1ST, WHEN THE D.O.R. PUBLISHES THE SALES. THE SALES IS THE BASIS FROM WHICH DAMROW MUST ESTABLISH THE NEW ASSESSMENT. DAMROW SAID HE WOULD AGREE TO RESIGN AFTER THE BOARD OF REVIEW OF 1997. HE ALSO WAS HIRED TO REVALUE THE COMPLETE TOWNSHIP FOR A FEE OF \$15,000.00, OF WHICH \$5,000.00 WAS PAID THIS YEAR. ANOTHER \$5,000.00 TO BE PAID IN JANUARY OF 1997 AND THE REMAINDER AFTER THE BOARD OF REVIEW. DAMROW SAID IT IS UP TO THE TOWN BOARD. THE MISTAKE WAS NOT DONE ON PURPOSE AND HE APOLOGIZES.

SPLITTER QUESTIONED, HOW ACCURATE WERE THE PROPERTY RECORDS WHEN DAMROW CAME ON BOARD? SPLITTER SUGGESTED THAT THE RECORDS, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF THE RESIDENTIAL LAND AND 9 HOUSES, ARE VIRTUALLY IN TACT AND COMPLETE. WE COULD THEREFORE ALLOW DAMROW TO COMPLETE THE REASSESSMENT. OR, WE COULD FIRE DAMROW TONIGHT AND TRY TO HIRE AN ASSESSOR. THERE ARE SEVERAL OPTIONS.

THE CLERK MENTIONED THAT THE RECORDS WERE NOT ACCURATE AT ALL WHEN DAMROW TOOK OVER.

PATTERSON SAID HE THINKS DAMROW REALLY TRIED TO DO A GOOD JOB FOR

HANSON EXPLAINED THAT DAMROW HAS BROUGHT US INTO UNIFORMITY, BUT HE HAS MADE A MISTAKE. I DON'T KNOW IF YOU CAN THROW ALL THE GOOD THINGS OUT BECAUSE HE MADE A MISTAKE. HANSON ASKED THE BOARD, WHAT IS THEIR SENSE ON RETAINING DAMROW?

SPLITTER SAID THAT DAMROW SHOWED HIM A FORMULA THAT WAS VERY CONSISTENT. THERE ARE PROBLEMS THAT NOT ONLY THE STRUGGLING WITH BUT ALSO THE D.O.R. IS STRUGGLING WITH. HANSON SAID CONTRARY TO THE INTANGIBLES, WE RETAIN WAYNE, REVIEW PERFORMANCE, AND THE ASSESSMENT MADE FOR HIS CONTRACT IS REVIEWAL SHOULD BE MADE AFTER THE 1997 BOARD OF REVIEW. SPLITTER SAID WAYNE'S PERSONALITY IS NOT THE SMOOTHEST, BUT THAT IS NOT HIS JOB. HE OS HIRED TO DO A JOB. IF HIS PERFORMANCE IS NOT UP TO SNUFF, OUR OPTION IS TO FIRE HIM. THE OTHER OPTION IS TO GIVE A WARNING THAT WE WILL BE MONITORING THAT PERFORMANCE IN THE FUTURE. YOUR CONTRACT EXPIRES AFTER THE BOARD OF REVIEW AND WE WOULD BE MONITORING THE PERFORMANCE UNTIL THEN. HE FEELS THAT THE TOWN BOARD ACTED POSITIVELY BECAUSE OF THIS MISTAKE. SPLITTER FEELS IT WOULD BE DIFFICULT TO HIRE A REPLACEMENT IN THE THIS TIME WE NEED TO LOOK AT OUR OPTIONS, NEAR FUTURE. ATCONSIDERING THE PROWS AND CONS. HE WAS FARE TO EVERYONE.

PATTERSON SAID IF NOTHING ELSE, THE BOARD SHOULD MEET WITH HIM. SPLITTER SUGGESTED THAT AFTER THE REASSESSMENT OF THE REMAINING 9 HOUSES, THE BOARD SHOULD MEET WITH WAYNE AND DISCUSS THE PROCESS. HE ALSO SUGGESTED THAT PRIOR TO AND DURING THE REASSESSMENT OF THE RESIDENTIAL LAND WE HEAR FROM WAYNE. HANSON SAID WHAT HE IS HEARING IS HAVE GIL PUT HIM ON THE AGENDA.

THE CLERK EXPLAINED THAT HE GAVE EACH BOARD MEMBER A COPY OF A WRITTEN CONTRACT PROVIDED BY THE D.O.R. THE D.O.R. ALSO

SUGGESTED THAT THE RECORDS OR TAX BLOTTERS BE HELD AT THE CLERKS OFFICE AND PROVIDE THE ASSESSOR WITH THE RECORDS AS NEEDED. PATTERSON SUGGESTED A FIRE PROOF FILE.

SPLITTER SUGGESTED THAT EVERY EMPLOYEE SHOULD HAVE A CONTRACT. HE FEELS THAT WE AS AN EMPLOYER ARE OBLIGATED TO PROVIDE THAT.

DON LUCHSINGER SAID HE LEFT A SHEET OF PAPER ON THE CLERK'S DESK SHOWING ALL THE TAXPAYERS IN EXETER AND THE AMOUNT OF TAXES PAID. SPLITTER SUGGESTED THE BOARD OF REVIEW. PATTERSON SAID WITH JUST THE NAME AND TAXES, HOW WOULD YOU GET ENOUGH INFORMATION. SCRIVNER SAID ALL THE TOWNSHIPS HE HAS HAD PROPERTY IN PROVIDE THIS INFORMATION.

DAVE TOURDOT VOLUNTEERED HIS TIME TO HELP MARIE WITH THIS LIST.

BRIAN MENTIONED THAT THE WHITE TRACTOR HAS BEEN HAVING PROBLEMS WITH HYDRAULICS, BREAKS ETC. PATTERSON SUGGESTED GET RID OF THAT TRACTOR AND THE FRONT END LOADER AND GET A HEAVY FRONT END TRACTOR WHICH WILL DO THE SAME JOB AS BOTH.

HANSON ASKED FOR THE ESTIMATED COST TO TRADE THIS. BRIAN HAS NOT RECEIVED THIS INFORMATION YET. AFTER MORE DISCUSSION, IT WAS DETERMINED THAT BRIAN WAS DIRECTED TO GATHER MORE INFORMATION ON OPTIONS FOR A NEW TRACTOR OR REPAIR OF THE OLD ONE.

THE CLERK PRESENTED THE PRELIMINARY BUDGET TO THE BOARD. WHICH INCLUDED A NARRATIVE FOR EACH CATEGORY OF EXPENDITURES AND RECEIPTS. AFTER AN INTRODUCTION THE CLERK EXPLAINED THAT ITEM "E15" SHOULD BE \$14,500.00. AFTER DISCUSSION OF THE BUDGET, SPLITTER QUESTIONED CONSIDERING MORE MONEY FOR ROAD REPAIR BUT WHERE DO WE GET IT FROM?

SPLITTER ASKED WHAT PERCENTAGE CAN THE TAX BE RAISED WITHOUT RAISING THE MILL RATE? THE CLERK SAID 4% OR \$6,000.00.

SPLITTER ASKED WHAT IS THE INCREASE FOR \$40,000.00. THE CLERK REPORTED, THE LEVY WOULD INCREASE BY 1.14 PER THOUSAND.

SCRIVNER SUGGESTED INCREASE THE PROPOSED INCOME FOR PERMITS. THE BOARD FELT TO DOUBLE THIS FIGURE TO \$2,400.00 WOULD NOT BE UNREASONABLE.

SPLITTER SUGGESTED OPTIONS, SUCH AS INCREASES FOR TOWNSHIP NEEDS. THESE ARE ROAD MAINTENANCE AND EQUIPMENT. OUTSIDE SOURCES ARE NOT AVAILABLE. PERHAPS WE SHOULD PRESENT THIS TO THE PEOPLE WITH OPTIONS.

HANSON SAID THE ROADS ARE NOT GETTING DONE AND WE ARE GETTING FURTHER BEHIND. HE FEELS THAT THE BOARD SHOULD INCREASE THE HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE PROPOSED BUDGET.

THE CLERK PRESENTED A DRIVEWAY PERMIT APPLICATION FROM EMERY & ROSELIE BACKMAN ON N8106 SANDY HOOK ROAD FOR A TURN-AROUND AND ACCESS TO SANDY HOOK ROAD. MR. BACKMAN WANTED THE BOARD TO WAVE THE PERMIT COST. THE BOARD EXPAINED THAT THIS WOULD ESTABLISH A PRECEDENCE AND COULD NOT JUSTIFY THIS. MOTION BY HANSON TO ACCEPT THE DRIVEWAY PERMIT PENDING INSPECTION OF THE CHAIRMAN AND RECEIPT OF THE NORMAL FEE. MOTION SECOND BY

THE CHAIRMAN ANNOUNCED THE PUBLIC HEARING FOR THE 1997 ANNUAL TOWN

MOTION BY HANSON TO DISSOIVE AS A BOARD AND COLOR

THE WHOLE FOR THE PURPOSE OF REVIEWING THE PROPOSED BROOKLYN 1997 ANNUAL BUDGET. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED.
PATTERSON APPOINTED SCRIVNER AS MODERATOR.

SCRIVNER ASKED THE CLERK TO EXPLAIN THE DOCUMENTS.

THE CLERK EXPLAINED THE CODED PAGES AS INCOME AND EXPENSE AND THE SERIES OF NARRATIONS FOR EACH ITEM.

LUCHSINGER REQUESTED A COMPLETE CATEGORY EXPLAINATION. THE CLERK EXPLAINED EACH ITEM PER CATERGORY OF EXPENSES. THE CATEGORY OF "GENERAL GOVERNMENT" WILL BE \$122,700 OR 134% INCREASE.

LUCHSINGER ASKED WHERE THE \$60,000 CAME FROM THE REASSESS THE TOWNSHIP, THE CLERK EXPLAINED THAT GENE MILLER FROM THE D.O.R. EXPLAINED THIS WOULD BE A CLOSE FIGURE. SCRIVNER SAID THAT \$60,000 WOULD COVER 1200 PARCELS AT \$50.00 PER PARCEL.

THEREFORE A TOTAL OF \$176,900 IS NOW ASKED FOR HIGHWAY. SCRIVNER ASKED FOR A MOTION FROM THE FLOOR TO APPROVE THE HIGHWAY BUDGET. MOTION FROM STEVE MILLER TO ACCEPT THE EXPENDITURE OF \$176,900 FOR THE HIGHWAY BUDGET. AFTER THREE CALLS FOR A SECOND, THE MOTION WAS SECOND BY HAY. AFTER DISCUSSION, THE MOTION CARRIED WITH 10 AYE, AND 3 NO.

SANITATION WILL INCREASE BY 17% BECAUSE WASTE MANAGEMENT WILL HAUL THE REFUSE WITH AN INCREASE OF 10%, AND RECYCLING LABOR WILL INCREASE. THE TOTAL FOR SANITATION WILL BE \$10,500 TOTAL DEBT SERVICE COSTS WILL INCREASE BY 3%. THE CLERK EXPLAINED EACH ITEM OF REVENUES, AS FOLLOWS: PROPERTY TAXES WILL INCREASE BY 33% TO ALLOW FOR THE POSSIBLE REASSESSMENT WITH THE EXCEPTION OF FARM LAND. THE TRUST FUND WILL REMAIN THE SAME AT \$16,000 FOR THREE MORE YEARS. THE TOTAL TAX LEVY WILL BE \$200,000. SCRIVNER ASKED FOR A MOTION FROM THE FLOOR TO APPROVE THE 1997 TAX LEVY. MOTION BY SPLITTER TO APPROVE THE TAX LEVY OF \$200,000. MOTION SECOND BY STEVE MILLER. MOTION CARRIED WITH 10 AYE AND 0 NO.

INTER GOVERNMENT REVENUES WILL DECREASE BY 6% BECAUSE D.N.R. WILL DECREASE THE RECYCLING GRANTS AND STATE SHARED REVENUES WILL ALSO DECREASE. THE TOTAL INTERGOVERNMENTAL REVENUES WILL BE \$101,337.

MOTION BY HANSON TO DISSOLVE AS A COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE AND RECONVENE AS A BOARD. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED.

MOTION BY PATTERSON TO ACCEPT THE 1997 BUDGET AS AMENDED. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. DISCUSSION: BY HANSON; IN THE EVENT THAT THE PETITIONERS WITHDRAW THE PETITION AND THE D.O.R. ALLOWS THIS, WHAT HAPPENS TO THE \$50,000 EARMARKED FOR THE REASSESSMENT?

PATTERSON SUGGESTED RE-MAT ONE MILE OF ROAD. HANSON EXPLAINED THAT IT WOULD REQUIRE A SPECIAL TOWN MEETING TO TRANSFER THESE FUNDS FROM E15 INTO E31 HIGHWAY. MOTION CARRIED.

THE CLERK OFFERED THAT THE NEXT ITEM WAS EMPLOYEE REVIEW AND THE EMPLOYEE IS NOT PRESENT. THE CLERK PRESENTED A JOB DESCRIPTION OF THE TOWN EMPLOYEE TO THE BOARD. HANSON SUGGESTED THE CLERK RUN THIS BY RENEE BOOGIE ON AMIDON ROAD, ALONG WITH A COVER LETTER. PATTERSON SAID THE EMPLOYEE READ THIS AND APPROVES.

PATTERSON ASKED IF WE WILL CONSIDER A RAISE FOR THE EMPLOYEE. HANSON SUGGESTED THT WE PICKED UP THAT INCREASE WITH THE HMO INCREASE. PATTERSON SAID THAT WE ARE CONSIDERABLY BELOW BUDGET FOR HIGHWAY LABOR. THE CLERK EXPLAINED THAT THE HMO WILL NOT HELP THE EMPLOYEE KEEP UP WITH THE 3.8% COST OF LIVING.

THE CLERK SUGGESTED A \$.50 PER HOUR RAISE. HANSON SAID WE WILL ADDRESS THAT AT THE NEXT MEETING.

PATTERSON ANNOUNCED THAT OREGON SCHOOLS IS LOOKING FOR A TOWN REPRESENTATIVE IN THE SCHOOL DISTRICT. HANSON SUGGESTED ASKING THE OTT FAMILY.

PATTERSON SUPPLIED GWEN HAY WITH A SURVEY OF THE CEMETERIES WITHIN THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN.

PATTERSON ANNOUNCED THAT THE GREEN COUNTY WTAS WILL BE HELD IN MONROE AT 8:00 PM ON NOVEMBER 19, 1996.

THE TREASURER ANNOUNCED THAT SHE WILL BE ATTENDING A SEMINAR ON THE NEW FORM TAX BILL, TO BE GIVEN BY THE COUNTY TREASURER.

WITH NO FURTHER BUSINESS, HANSON MADE THE MOTION TO ADJOURN MOTION, SECONDED BY SPLITTER, MOTION CARRIED. CHAIRMAN PATTERSON ADJOURNED THE NOVEMBER MEETING AT 10:25 PM.
