# **Tax Collection**

The Green County Treasurer's office collects Real Estate & Personal Property taxes for the Town of Brooklyn. You may mail your payment or stop by the Green County Courthouse during business hours. Also accepting payments are the following banks: Associated Bank - Monroe; Sugar River Bank - Monroe, Belleville, Brodhead and Juda; The Bank of New Glarus - New Glarus; State Bank of Cross Plains - Brooklyn & New Glarus; Monona Bank - Belleville and Brooklyn; and Greenwoods State Bank - Monticello. Online payments can be made at www.co.green.wi.gov with debit or credit card with a 2.35% surcharge.

# **Brooklyn Fire & EMS Update**

The Brooklyn Fire & EMS District has proposed a management restructuring plan designed to improve daytime staffing. A full-time fire chief would be hired and available to staff both fire and EMS vehicles during weekdays, along with existing paid part-time EMTs. Fire and EMS volunteers would continue to staff equipment evenings and weekends. As of this writing, the proposal is opposed by the Village of Brooklyn, one of the five municipalities that fund the district. The village has requested the adoption of a strategic plan prior to considering management changes. The four townships, which provide the majority of funding, support the management restructuring. Negotiations are continuing.

The District is replacing a 27-year old fire engine. The new engine is scheduled to be in service by the end of 2020. The engine is one of two operated by the fire district, along with water tankers and trucks designed to fight off-road incidents. The new engine was designed to service both fire and medical calls. Medical calls are 63 percent of the district's work.

## The Road Report

To maintain the Town's 43 miles of road, the Board, upon recommendations by the Highway Committee, authorized the following projects in 2020: sealcoating on Amidon Rd., patching and sealcoating on Behnke Rd., and the replacement of six culverts and complete reconstruction of Smith Rd (between Amidon and Yarwood) and King Rd (between Highway E and Smith).

The main goal for all activities is to maintain the highest quality roads, while keeping the cost reasonable. Defects such as potholes are filled as soon as possible. Every few years, a sealcoat will be applied to fill minor cracks and to add a wear layer. Roads with higher traffic counts (such as Amidon Rd.) will see more frequent sealcoating than lower traffic count roads. At times, such maintenance activities are not sufficient and complete reconstruction is necessary. This was the case for Smith Rd. and the short section of King Rd., with very old, deteriorating road surfaces and failing culverts. Replacement of culverts alone has a major impact on a road, as each site has to be excavated, refilled, and repaved. Such patches seldom result in a good road bed. Complete reconstruction, immediately following the replacement of the culverts, makes the most sense.

Plans for next year include further maintenance activities (patching and sealcoating) and likely reconstructing approximately one mile of road. Final decisions will be made next spring after winter damage can be assessed and reviewed by the Highway Committee and Town Board.

## **Snow Pushed onto Town Roads**

This not only applies to you, the homeowner/landowner, but also to contractors hired under your direction. Please do not plow your snow onto Town Right-of-Way. Thank you for doing your part in keeping our roads safe.

# **Dog Licenses**

Wisconsin State Law requires all dogs over 5 months of age to be licensed by April 1st of each year or when they turn 5 months old, if later in the year. Noncompliance can result in assessment of late fees collected through fees and penalties being placed on your property tax bill and/or other charges. You must provide:

- a completed application together
- a current rabies vaccination certificate (or copy)
- a self-addressed stamped envelope (for your license and rabies certificate to be mailed back to you)

Send payment to: Town of Brooklyn, Russ Cichy – Treasurer, 400 W. Main Street, Brooklyn, WI 53521. If you prefer, you can drop off the completed application with your check at the Recycle Center or the Town Hall during normal hours. Dog license fees: Spayed/Neutered \$8 ea., Unspayed/Unneutered \$13 ea., Multiple Dogs \$35 (up to 12 dogs, \$3 extra for each dog over 12).

# Internet Options in the Town of Brooklyn

Bug Tussel, the wireless internet provider leasing land from the town for the 300-foot communications tower at the town recycling center, is operational. Town residents are eligible for a discount on Bug Tussel's monthly service rate. Their 25 Mbps service is \$50 plus taxes and fees for town residents.

Frontier Communications completed installation of new fiber optic lines in the 455 telephone exchange. Frontier offers 25 Mbps service in most of the exchange area; it may not be available in areas on the fringe.
