

CANDIDATES NIGHT

Preparing for the Candidates Night for the Town of Brooklyn, Peter Hardin invited all of the names listed on the spring ballot except the constable, Gerald Richardson, who is unopposed on the ticket.

Three of the candidates didn't appear this past Tuesday. Allen Myhre was on the disabled list; David Tourdot told Hardin he preferred not to attend; Dan Kinney's reply was he couldn't make it.

After the candidates spoke, Hardin asked the people if they had any questions for them.

Steve Miller asked for their ideas of getting the town more involved and informed. James Scrivner (running for chairman) offered not to take a salary and use that money towards a newsletter. The suggestion of a newsletter brought a lively discussion. Herb Hanson (seeking his second term for 1st Supervisor) made the comment, "When you see the notice in the *Leader* about the monthly meeting, you should attend and talk with the board." When Robin Patterson (outgoing chairman) said "I wonder if anyone would read the newsletter," Shirley Hardy (candidate for clerk) told of the monthly newsletter in the village. She said, "Some do and some don't." Although time consuming, she expressed, "It should be looked into."

Another question from Miller was, "How would you perform on the board of review?" Scrivner

admitted not serving on the board before but emphasized, "anytime I take on a new challenge, I educate myself. I would sort out the facts and base my judgment on the letter of the law and the guidelines of the DOR." Hanson said, "I would like to see more people in that town process." He invited the people to come and ask questions. Bob McNeely (pursuing the 2nd Supervisor slot) wanted to have time to acquaint himself. The present clerk, Gil Hohenberger (rerunning for clerk), told the people, "I don't have a vote, but I understand the process." He explained the taxes are determined by the mill rate. If necessary, taxes have to be raised to meet the town's expenses.

On the issue of raising taxes, Hanson said, "We came very close to not having a budget for the roads. The money set aside for the roads went to pay for the second assessment. Allowing money for the roads, taxes had to be raised." Commenting on only seven to eight townspeople at the budget meeting, Hanson scolded the people, "The people have a voice on how the town spends; but you have to be there, talk with us."

Gary Splitter pointed out that the town's children attend five different school districts. He asked, "What can be done about this and other tax burdens." Recently attending the Towns Association, Hanson believes working with them would be helpful. Words and ideas

exchanged with the other 1,253 towns could be very effective steps leading to the State Legislature. Paying more attention to school board meetings and the referendums was Patterson's suggestion. He added, "That money is not always well spent."

The last question was from Marvin Eith. He asked if an assessor had been hired. Hanson answered, "A written contract with certain language was drawn up with Jerry Coplein. The board ordered the clerk to call the other towns he worked for and asked the DOR if there were any complaints filed against him. He was found clean."

Just before stretching our legs, Scrivner mentioned being proud of owning the historical Liberty Hill Park. He said, "It's a treasure the town can be proud of." Hanson added, "I contacted Police Chief Doug Pettit when I learned of the Hill being a recruiting place during the Civil War. Pettit is a Civil war buff and is interested in using the Hill and sharing maintenance expenses with the town."

Adjourning for the night, Hardin thanked all of the candidates who participated. Turning to the people, Hardin said, "There has been so much educational information offered tonight, everyone will go home a little smarter."

TOWN CANDIDATE FORUM

Brooklyn Township is hosting a candidate forum on March 4 at their hall. On that Tuesday night at 8, Peter Hardin will moderate the informal meeting.

Hardin will introduce the candidates and their selected office on the spring ballot. They will be asked about their qualifications and to share their concerns about township issues. Afterward the presentations, questions will be taken from the audience.

There is competition in all of the positions, except for town constable. The town chairman post is being sought by Jim Scrivner and Dan Kinney. Allen Myhre and Herb Hanson are running for First Supervisor. The Second Supervisor is being sought by David Tourdot and Bob McNeely. For the treasurer's position there is Marie Ross and Rebecca Haak. Shirley Hardy is opposing Gil Hohenberger for town clerk. Gerald Richardson will be on the ticket for town constable, uncontested.

TOWN HAS CAUCUS

There was 62 people present to witness the 1997 Town Caucus on January 14. Choosing not to run again, Robin Patterson, the present town chairman, presided over the proceedings. Acting as secretary for the evening was Jim Kramer. The town clerk had another pressing commitment that night. The town's attorney, John Kisiel, was present to oversee the process.

All of the positions were open to the Town. Each position received two nominations except the constable's slot. There was no need for the ballot tellers, Lucille Brown, Eunice Grunnet and Sharon George, to distribute slips of paper to eliminate a third candidate.

A chairman in the late 80's, Dan Kinney has chosen to run again. Kinney commented on the high assessments in the town. He says, "There is a need to change some things in the town."

didn't have those problems when I was the chairman. Having been a successful farmer for 30 years qualifies me to understand the town's needs."

Challenging Kinney is Jim Scrivner. Scrivner is the chairman of the planning commission working with the people and their land divisions.

Employed as a senior executive at Rural Mutual Insurance in Madison, Scrivner believe he can bring some vision and leadership to the town. Previously Scrivner was the president of the board of a technical school near La Crosse, before moving to the town. Serving 12-1/2 years as a police officer in the city of Madison, he is often referred to as "a problem solver."

A native of the town, Allen Myhre, was nominated for the first supervisor slot. Myhre has farmed all of his life in the town. He is unhappy with the changing

would like to see the town operate like it used to.

Seeking his second term, Herb Hanson will be competing against Myhre for the first supervisor position. Hanson spoke of the process of growth and development occurring in the town. "Solutions of addressing these problems have not been completed and shouldn't be abandoned. I know there are many people who believe as I do," stressed Hanson. Hanson will be completing 32 years of public service in law enforcement. Presently working with the UW Police, Hanson is in the process of retiring. A specialty of Hanson's is "crisis instruction," which he teaches at MATC and the UW. His expertise has proven useful at former town situations.

The second supervisor candidates are David Tourdot and Bob McNeely. They are both farmers in the town, but

anything specific, Tourdot explained. "Some of the things aren't being addressed in the town and too much money is being spent." McNeely moved to the town in February of 1973. Taking an interest in the government of the town, McNeely has served on the safety committee and attends the monthly meetings. McNeely continued to comment, "There has been a lot of good done in the town lately and I'll do my best to keep it going that way."

The present town treasurer, Marie Ross, was re-nominated again this year. Finishing out Beth King's term in 1986, Marie has been the choice of the voters. Ross attends the regular meetings and enjoys meeting with the people. She would like to stay involved with the town's progress. On the ticket opposing Ross is Rebecca Haak. Working as a transcription manager at the

Haak believes her 10-year employment experience will benefit the town. Haak expresses a desire to be more involved in the town's government body.

The village's deputy clerk, Shirley Hardy, is pursuing the clerk's position in the town. Currently employed by the village for almost two years, Hardy doesn't agree with the present progress and wants more voice in the town to bring back former policies.

Opposing Hardy is the present clerk, Gil Hohnberger. Hohnberger has held the position since 1983, except for the partial 1-1/2-year term held by Cathy Anderson in 1992-93. Hohnberger finished her term and was elected back in the following election. Pursuing the clerk's position again, he believes the town has finally made progress from the "horse and buggy days." Breaking away from the county's loose restrictions, the town has

developed stronger ordinances of their own. Hohnberger says, "I'm afraid all of our accomplishments will be erased by the opposition. There is 'so much' more to be done." Keeping up the county's activities, Hohnberger is the current 29th District Supervisor and serves on the law enforcement, zoning and judicial committees of Green County.

Gerald Richardson will appear on the spring ballot by himself. There was no one else nominated

for the constable's position. Richardson has been the constable in the town for 14 years. He lost out to Paul Hollis in the preceding election. Following Hollis' death, Richardson was assigned to finish his term. Richardson has held the position since.

The outcome of these contests will be known the night of April 1 after the votes have been counted.

THE BROOKLYN TOWN BOARD MET IN OPEN SESSION ON MONDAY, FEBRUARY 10, 1997 AT THE TOWN HALL FOR THEIR REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING. CHAIRMAN ROBIN PATTERSON CALLED THE MEETING TO ORDER AT 7:45 PM WITH THE WITH THE FULL BOARD, CLERK, TREASURER AND FIVE TOWN'S PEOPLE PRESENT. PATTERSON ASKED THE CLERK TO READ THE NOTICE OF OPEN MEETING, WHICH WAS READ.

PATTERSON ASKED THE PEOPLE TO JOIN HIM WITH THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG.

MOTION BY HANSON TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 20, 1997 MEETING WITH THREE CORRECTIONS AND ONE CLARIFICATION, MOTION SECOND BY PATTERSON; MOTION CARRIED.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT OF \$1,886.74 IN THE CHECKING ACCOUNT, TAXES COLLECTED OF \$503,095.40 and \$73,211.35 IN THE STATE POOL, FOR A TOTAL OF \$574,420.01. MOTION WAS MADE BY PATTERSON TO ACCEPT THE TREASURER'S REPORT, MOTION MADE BY HANSON TO ACCEPT THE TREASURER'S REPORT, MOTION CARRIED. THE CLERK'S RECONCILIATION (SHOWING USABEL CASH OF \$91,371.88 AFTER PAYMENT OF FEBRUARY'S BILLS) WAS PRESENTED AND ACCEPTED.

THE BILLS WERE AUDITED. QUESTIONS CONCERNING THE BILLS WERE POSED BY THE BOARD AND ANSWERED BY THE CLERK. THE CLERK REQUESTED AN ADDITION OF \$1,645.68 TO THE BILLS TO INCLUDE THE FIRE DEPARTMENT PURCHASE OF THE BELLEVILLE FIRE DEPARTMENT AND \$167.37 FOR TAX OVERPAYMENT. MOTION MADE BY HANSON TO ADD ITEM #22 TO THE BILLS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,645.68 TO COVER THE FIRE TRUCK PURCHASE. MOTION WAS SECONDED BY PATTERSON, MOTION CARRIED. MOTION BY HANSON TO ADD ITEM #23 TO THE BILLS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$164.37 TO COVER THE TAX OVERPAYMENT. MOTION WAS SECONDED BY PATTERSON, MOTION WAS CARRIED. MOTION WAS MADE BY HANSON TO PAY THE BILLS AS AMENDED IN THE AMOUNT OF \$30,497.38. MOTION WAS SECONDED BY PATTERSON, MOTION CARRIED.

THE CLERK PRESENTED THE BUDGET AND YEAR TO DATE REPORTS.

THE EVANSVILLE FIRE DISTRICT REPORT WAS GIVEN BY McNEELY. DISPUTES EXIST BETWEEN THE DEPARTMENT AND CITY ON THE FIRE DEPARTMENT BUILDING.

THE CLERK REPORTED THAT THE DNR HAS APPROVED THE 1997 GRANT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$8,056.95.

HAY REPORTED THAT THE FEBRUARY PRIMARY WILL BE HELD IN THE CLERK'S OFFICE.

THE PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT WAS GIVEN BY JIM SCRIVNER. HE, ALSO, REPORTED ON THE LAND USE MEETING, HELD IN NEW GLARUS.

PATTERSON REPORTED THAT MIKE POWERS WAS APPOINTED AS CHAIRMAN OF THE LAND USE COMMITTEE AND SITS ON OTHER COMMITTEES. THE LIST OF APPOINTMENTS WERE POSTED ON THE BOARD.

HOHNBERGER REPORTED THAT THE COUNTY DID NOT HAVE A FEBRUARY MEETING. THE ZONING ADMINISTRATOR HAS BEEN CHARGED WITH MISAPPROPRIATION OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY.

PATTERSON REPORTED THAT THE DOR HAS ORDERED A REASSESSMENT OF BROOKLYN TOWNSHIP FOR THE 1996 TAX YEAR. THE CLERK EXPLAINED THAT HE RECEIVED A CALL FROM RADER OF THE DOR EXPLAINING THERE WILL BE ADJUSTMENTS SHOWN ON THE 1997 TAX BILLS. RADER SAID THAT JERRY COPLIEN COULD BE USED AS THE ASSESSOR FOR THE REASSESSMENT IF HE SUBMITS A PROPOSAL. THE CLERK REPORTED THAT HE HAD CHECKED REFERENCES OF COPLIEN AND THEY WERE ALL GOOD. HE REPORTED THE DOR REFUSES TO INVOLVE ITSELF IN THE HIRING OF AN ASSESSOR FOR MAINTENANCE CONTRACTS FOR MUNICIPALITIES AND THERE ARE NO COMPLAINTS ON RECORD CONCERNING COPLIEN.

HANSON REPORTED THAT JERRY COPLIEN WAS CONDITIONALLY HIRED, BEING THAT IF THE BACKGROUND, CHECKED BY THE CLERK COMES BACK SATISFACTORILY AND THE DOR APPROVES OF THE CONTRACT, THE CLERK AS THE AUTHORITY TO HIRE COPLIEN. HE STATED THAT HE IS DISAPPOINTED BY THE DOR NOT WANTING TO GET INVOLVED IN A MAINTENANCE CONTRACT. HANSON DIRECTED TO SENT A COPY OF THE CONTRACT FURNISHED BY JERRY COPLIEN AND HAVE IT REVIEWED BY MR. KISIEL TO SEE IF IT PROTECTS US FROM FUTURE ERRORS AND RUN THIS PASS THE TOWN'S ASSOCIATION ATTORNEY. HANSON PRESENTED THAT AS AN AMENDMENT TO THE MOTION OF FEBRUARY 6, 1997. PATTERSON SECONDED THE MOTION, MOTION WAS CARRIED.

THE CLERK REPORTED THAT THE STATUTES ARE CLEAR ABOUT TOWNS HAVING AUTHORITY TO PLACE A SPECIAL TAX ON PROPERTY FOR NON-PAYMENT OF SERVICES.

HANSON REPORTED THAT KISIEL WANTS TO KNOW WHAT KIND OF CONTRACT THE BOARD HAD WITH DAMROW. THE CLERK WAS DIRECTED TO LOOK UP THE RECORD (MINUTES) WHEN DAMROW WAS HIRED AND GET INFORMATION TO KISIEL.

HANSON ORDERD THE CLERK TO REQUEST INFORMATION ON DAMROW FROM THE DOK UNDER THE OPEN RECORDS ACT.

HAY REPORTED THAT PETER HARDEN WILL MODERATE THE CANDIDATES NIGHT TO HELD ON MARCH 4, 1997. HAY WILL PROVIDE REFRESHMENTS.

MOTION WAS MADE BY HANSON TO ADJOURN THE FEBRUARY MEETING. MOTION WAS SECONDED BY PATTERSON, MOTION CARRIED. PATTERSON ADJOURNED THE MEETING AT 9:35 PM..

THE BROOKLYN TOWN BOARD MET IN OPEN SESSION ON MONDAY, MARCH 10, 1997 AT THE TOWN HALL FOR THEIR REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING.

CHAIRMAN ROBIN PATTERSON, CALLED THE MEETING TO ORDER AT 7:35 PM WITH THE FULL BOARD, CLERK, TREASURER, AND 9 TOWN'S PEOPLE PRESENT. PATTERSON ASKED THE CLERK TO READ THE NOTICE OF OPEN MEETING , WHICH WAS READ.

PATTERSON ASKED THE PEOPLE TO JOIN HIM WITH THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG.

MOTION BY HANSON TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE FEBRUARY 10, 1997 MEETING WITH ONE CORRECTION AND ONE CLARIFICATION. THE CLARIFICATION BEING; THERE WAS NO RECORDING OF THE MEETING HELD TO HIRE WAYNE DAMROW AS TOWN ASSESSOR ON NOVEMBER 1992. THERE IS ONLY A WRITTEN REPORT, STATING THAT DAMROW WAS INTERVIEWED IN THE PRESENCE OF THE TOWN BOARD AND MORRIS MARTY, (PREVIOUS ASSESSOR), WITH NO SPECIFICS OF A CONTRACT. MOTION SECOND BY PATTERSON, MOTION CARRIED. HANSON DIRECTED THE CLERK TO OBTAIN RECORDS FROM THE D.O.R. UNDER THE OPEN RECORDS ACT. SPECIFICALLY; MEMOS AND CORRESPONDENCE SENT TO DAMROW CONCERNING THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT OF \$47,008.66 IN THE CHECKING ACCOUNT, AND \$123,527.21 IN THE STATE POOL, FOR A TOTAL OF \$170,535.87. MOTION BY PATTERSON TO ACCEPT THE TREASURERS REPORT. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED. THE CLERKS RECONCILIATION OF \$149,840.48 IN THE GENERAL FUND AFTER PAYMENT OF MARCH BILLS WAS PRESENTED AND ACCEPTED.

THE BILLS WERE AUDITED. QUESTIONS CONCERNING THE BILLS, WERE POSED MCI CARD CHARGE, (MCI IS CHARGING \$5.00 PER MO. THE CARD IS NOT BEING USED, THEREFORE HAS BEEN CANCELED). HANSON ASKED; WHERE DOES THE TOWNSHIP STAND AS FAR AS GETTING INSURANCE FROM WAUSAU? THE CLERK EXPLAINED, WAUSAU CALLED TODAY AND SAID THEY DO NOT HAVE ENOUGH TIME TO SUBMIT A BID THIS YEAR BECAUSE THE BOARD MOVED THE MEETING UP A WEEK. (DISCUSSION OF INSURANCE, SEE TAPE 3-10-97) MOTION TO PAY THE BILLS AS PRESENTED, HOLDING BACK ITEM #18 UNTIL THE CLERK CAN PROVIDE COPIES OF OUR PRESENT POLICY TO WAUSAU INS, AND STATE INS. POOL SO THAT THEY CAN PROVIDE A BID TO THE BOARD (BY HANSON). MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. (DISCUSSION) MOTION CARRIED.

HAY GAVE THE RECYCLING REPORT, THERE IS A HAZARDOUS WASTE SEMINAR IN WAUSAU. HAY WILL NOT ATTEND. HAY REPORTED THAT THE TOWN HAD 50 VOTERS FOR THE SPRING PRIMARY. THE APRIL ELECTION WILL BE HELD IN THE HALL.

McNEELY REPORTED THAT EVANSVILLE IS STILL IN DISCUSSION STAGE ON THE PURCHASE AND ADDITION OF THE FIRE HOUSE.

PATTERSON READ A LETTER OF COMMENDATION TO THE BROOKLYN FIRE DISTRICT STATING OUTSTANDING PERFORMANCE.

CINDY LAWINGER OF RURAL INSURANCE DISTRIBUTED A BRAKE-DOWN OF COVERAGE TO EACH BOARD MEMBER, AND EXPLAINED THE FULL COVERAGE. THE PREMIUM OF \$4,834.00 WHICH INCLUDES THE ADDED UMBRELLA COVERAGE. THE BOARD COMPARED COVERAGE OF RURAL WITH THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT INSURANCE POOL FROM THE STATE AND Mc CARDEL INSURANCE. SPLITTER ASKED IF RURAL IS WILLING TO MEET THE QUOTE OF Mc CARDEL. CINDY LAWINGER AGREED TO MEET THE QUOTE AT \$4,237.00 TO INCLUDE THE EXTRA \$1,000,000.00 UMBRELLA COVERAGE. MOTION TO ACCEPT THE BID OF RURAL MUTUAL FOR \$4,237.00 TO INCLUDE THE UMBRELLA BY SPLITTER. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED. MOTION BY HANSON TO RESCIND THE PREVIOUS MOTION TO REMOVE ITEM #18 FROM THE BILLS AND TO ADD ITEM #18 BEING THE CURRENT PROPOSED RURAL MUTUAL PREMIUM. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. MOTION CARRIED. SPLITTER ASKED THAT THE NOTES OF THE MARCH 10, 1997 MEETING REFLECT THAT THE TOWN BOARD HAS SAVED THE TOWN TAX-PAYERS \$682.00.

THE PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT WAS GIVEN BY SCRIVNER. JOAN SCHMIDT IS IN THE PROCESS OF DISCUSSING DIVISIONS OF THEIR PROPERTY WITH THE COMMISSION. HE REPORTED ON THE MEETING OF THE GREEN COUNTY LAND USE TASK FORCE. THERE IS ONGOING DISCUSSION WITH HANK WEGWITZ ON HIS QUESTIONABLE DIVISIONS. THIS DIVISION PRE-DATES THE FEE ORDINANCE.

THE CLERK GAVE THE BOARD A REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS CONCERNING THE ROAD REPAIR OF SMITH ROAD. THIS WAS DETERMINED BY THE BOARD THAT THE COST SHOULD BE BORN BY LARSEN CONSTRUCTION COMPANY. THERE WAS QUESTIONS AS TO THE ACTUAL DAMAGE OF THE ROAD AS OPPOSED TO GENERAL WARE OF THE ROAD. THE BOARD DISCUSSED THIS IN DEPTH WITH MR. MARX (PROPERTY OWNER ABUTTING THE ROAD IN QUESTION). MARX AGREED THAT SOME DAMAGE WAS DONE BY THE CONSTRUCTION VEHICLES BUT WAS NOT ALL THAT WAS REPAIRED. HE ALSO FEELS THAT THE BULK OF THE PROBLEM WAS A DITCHING PROBLEM AND NOT TRUCK DAMAGE. MOTION BY SPLITTER TO AUTHORIZE THE TOWN'S ATTORNEY TO TAKE THIS MATTER TO COURT AND SEEK RETRIBUTION FROM THE CONTRACTOR. MOTION SECOND BY PATTERSON. DISCUSSION. MOTION FAILED WITH 3 NAY'S. MOTION BY SPLITTER TO HAVE THE TOWNSHIP ASSUME THE BILL AND THE OWNER NOT BE HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR THIS DAMAGE. MOTION FAILED DUE TO A LACK OF A SECOND. MOTION BY PATTERSON TO HAVE THE LAND-OWNER RESPONSIBLE FOR THE 15' X 60' PATCH IN FRONT OF THE DRIVEWAY. MOTION SECOND BY SPLITTER. DISCUSSION. SPLITTER OFFERED AN AMENDMENT TO REDUCE THE \$900.00 COST TO \$530.00. AMENDMENT SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED WITH 2 AYE AND ONE NO BEING PATTERSON. THE AMENDED MOTION PASSED WITH TWO AYE AND ONE NO BEING PATTERSON.

SPLITTER WAS GONE FOR A MONTH AND ASKED WHAT TRANSPIRED ABOUT THE D.O.R. ALTERED LETTER WHILE HE WAS GONE.

HANSON REPORTED THAT JOHN KISIEL CALLED HIM TODAY AND SAID THAT IT WOULD BE APPROPRIATE AFTER POLLING THE BOARD THAT WE HAD TO GO FORTH WITH A JUDICIAL REVIEW. KISIEL ASKED THAT HANSON GET INTO CONTACT WITH THE GREEN COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY. HANSON DID SO AND THE D.A. WILL TURN IT OVER TO THE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT FOR REVIEW OF ANY POTENTIAL CRIMINAL CHARGES. SO, BASED ON THAT, THE INFORMATION

WAS TAKEN DOWN TO THE D.A. AND NO RESPONSE TO THIS DATE.

THEY FELT THAT IT WAS TO BE DONE THAT WAY BECAUSE A STATE AGENCY WAS INVOLVED AND THE COUNTY WOULD HAVE A CONFLICT OF INTEREST. SPLITTER SAID SINCE HE WAS NOT GOING TO BE ON THIS BOARD NEXT MONTH, WE NEED TO NOTIFY THE INCOMING BOARD OF THE CIRCUMSTANCE. SPLITTER ASKED PATTERSON FOR HIS COMMENTS. PATTERSON SAID HE CONTACTED THE TOWN'S ATTORNEY. THE ATTORNEY SAID, YOU HAVE NO CHOICE BUT TO PURSUE THIS. HANSON SAID, I SUSPECT THAT AN ANSWER WILL BE COMING QUICKLY, SINCE THE LETTER WAS SENT AND HE IS THE TOWN CONTACT PERSON. HANSON SAID AS A TOWN BOARD, WE HAVE BEEN ACCUSED OF MANY THINGS BUT TO MY KNOWLEDGE, WE HAVE NOT BEEN ACCUSED OF A COVER-UP. "IT HAS BEEN BROUGHT TO MY ATTENTION THAT I WAS OUT TO GET SOMEONE". "I WANT YOU TO KNOW, THAT WAS THE FURTHEST THING FROM MY MIND".

PATTERSON READ A LETTER FROM THE D.O.R. INFORMING THE COUNTY TREASURER THAT ALL INFORMATION FROM THE 1996 TAXES MUST BE RETAINED, SO THE D.O.R., COUNTY, AND TOWN CLERK CAN PROPERLY CALCULATE THE ADJUSTMENTS TO THE 1996 AND 1997 TAX ROLLS.

HANSON SAID THAT THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL CONTRACT IS NOT FOR BROOKLYN. IT ONLY MENTIONS MT. PLEASANT. PATTERSON SAID THAT WE HAVE NO VOTE ON THE ALBANY EMS.

SPLITTER NOTED THE LETTER SENT TO WAYNE DAMROW FROM THE CLERK. PATTERSON EXPLAINED THAT WAYNE REQUESTED PAYMENT FOR WORK PERFORMED DURING 1996. HE GAVE THE LETTER TO THE CLERK AND DIRECTED THE CLERK TO SEND A LETTER EXPLAINING THAT THE MATTER IS WITH THE TOWN'S ATTORNEY FOR REVIEW.

JIM KRAMER SUGGESTED THE BOARD REVISIT THE DRIVEWAY ORDINANCE TO PROTECT THE TOWNSHIP FROM DAMAGE DONE BY BUILDING CONTRACTORS.

SPLITTER READ THAT TOWNSHIPS WILL NEED TO HAVE BUILDING INSPECTORS AND ISSUE BUILDING PERMITS. HANSON SAID THAT TOWNS WILL BE REQUIRED TO SUPPLY THE DEPT OF COMMERCE WITH BUILDING INFORMATION.

MOTION BY SPLITTER TO ADJOURN THE MARCH MEETING. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED. PATTERSON ADJOURNED THE MEETING AT 11:05 PM.

APRIL 9, 1996

THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN MET IN OPEN SESSION TO HOLD THEIR 1996 ANNUAL MEETING ON TUESDAY, APRIL 9, 1996 AT THE TOWN HALL.

CHAIRMAN ROBIN PATTERSON, CALLED THE MEETING TO ORDER AT 7:40 PM WITH THE FULL BOARD, CLERK, AND 18 TOWN'S PEOPLE PRESENT. PATTERSON ASKED THE CLERK TO READ THE NOTICE, WHICH WAS READ. PATTERSON ASKED THE PEOPLE TO JOIN IN THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG.

MOTION BY JULIE SMITH TO DISPENSE WITH THE READING OF THE 1995 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES AND TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE 1995 ANNUAL MEETING AS WRITTEN. MOTION SECOND BY STEVE GRUNNET. MOTION CARRIED.

THE CLERK GAVE THE TREASURER'S REPORT OF \$1,008,845 IN RECEIPTS FOR THE 1995 YEAR, \$959,954 IN EXPENDITURES, WITH A DESIGNATED GENERAL FUND FOR 1996 OF \$48,891. PATTERSON MENTIONED THAT THE TOWN HAS \$20,000.00 CARRIED OVER FOR CAPITOL EQUIPMENT. THIS WILL GIVE \$30,000.00 BUDGETED FOR THAT CATEGORY, PLUS THE REBATE OF \$7,250.00 FROM THE INSURANCE COMPANY FOR THE 1980 "IH" TRUCK.

MOTION BY JEROME GRUNNET TO APPROVE THE TREASURERS REPORT AND THE ANNUAL REPORT. MOTION SECOND BY GERALD TILLEY. MOTION CARRIED.

PATTERSON REQUESTED WAYNE DAMROW EXPLAIN THE NEW PROPERTY TAX STRUCTURE. DAMROW EXPLAINED, HE WILL START REASSESSMENT OF ALL BUILDINGS IN THE TOWNSHIP BEGINNING IN JUNE THIS YEAR. ALL FARM LAND WILL BE FROZEN IN EVALUATION UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE, THIS IS ANY LAND LISTED AS AG. AS OF JANUARY 1995. ANY LAND IN "CRP" WILL STAY IN AG. AS LONG AS IT IS IN "CRP". IF PEOPLE ARE NOT HOME WHEN WAYNE REASSESSSES, HE WILL JUST MEASURE THE BUILDINGS AND THEN CALL BACK TO MAKE AN APPOINTMENT TO GO THROUGH THE HOUSE. IF PEOPLE DO NOT WANT WAYNE IN THEIR HOME, OR IF THERE ARE TEENAGERS THAT DO NOT WANT HIM IN THE HOUSE, HE WILL USE THE STATE EQUALIZER FIGURE. WAYNE WILL BE USING HIS 1993 BLACK SONOMA PICK-UP, WITH LICENSE #BD-17-200.

JIM SCRIVNER GAVE A REPORT OF THE ACTIVITIES OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION FOR THE 1995 FISCAL YEAR TO APRIL 1996.

SCRIVNER GAVE A LIST OF THE NON-PAID COMMISSION MEMBERS, BEING; HARRIET TOLLY, BURDELL TROW, JIM KRAMER, BARNEY EASTERDAY, PAT McNEELY, ROSEANN MEIXELSPERGER, AND HIMSELF. IN FEBRUARY OF 1995 A REVISED LAND DIVISION ORDINANCE WAS ADOPTED. THROUGHOUT THE REMAINDER OF THE YEAR THERE WAS INTERACTION WITH OTHER COMMUNITIES,

CONCERNING LAND DIVISIONS WERE ATTENDED, JIM TESTIFIED AT THE PUBLIC HEARING CONCERNING COUNTY ZONING CHANGES, INFORMATION WAS SENT TO A SURVEYOR ADDRESSING HIS PRACTICES, AND A DRIVEWAY ORDINANCE WAS ESTABLISHED. A FEE STRUCTURE ORDINANCE WAS DEVELOPED AND IS TO BE ADOPTED SHORTLY.

THE RECYCLING REPORT WAS GIVEN BY GWEN HAY. READ BY THE CLERK. OTHER COMMUNITIES HAVE A MUCH STRICTER WASTE MANAGEMENT LAW THAN DOES BROOKLYN. HAY SUGGESTS THE TOWN DISCONTINUE CLEAN-UP DAYS, ELIMINATING THE \$5.00 PER TRUCK LOAD OF REFUSE. WE ALSO NEED TO DISCONTINUE ACCEPTING CONSTRUCTION MATERIAL. A GRANT CAN BE RECEIVED FOR DISPOSAL OF THE TIRES ON THE SIGHT. HANSON SUGGESTED CONTACTING THE GREEN COUNTY LAND FILL TO FIND OUT WHAT THE BASIS WILL BE FOR DISPOSAL OF THE TIRES AT THE CENTER. HAY SUGGESTED AN ADDITION TO THE TOWN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT ACCEPTING CONSTRUCTION WASTE AT THE RECYCLING CENTER. EASTERDAY ASKED IF THE CENTER ACCEPTS USED OIL. THE CLERK EXPLAINED THAT WE DO NOT, BUT BY THE YEAR 1998 THERE WILL BE A LAW TO DO SO. MORE QUESTIONS AND DISCUSSION TOOK PLACE ABOUT RECYCLING AND REFUSE DROP-OFF.

MOTION BY PHILL BROWN TO DIRECT THE BOARD TO RESEARCH WHAT GOES INTO THE RECYCLING CENTER AND HOW WE CAN COVER THE COST. MOTION SECOND BY JEROME GRUNNET. AMENDMENT BY DICK GREGG TO HAVE EVERY PERSON USING THE CENTER BE HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR THEIR OWN REFUSE AND THE BOARD BE DIRECTED TO ADJUST THE CHARGES TO COVER THE COST TO OPERATE THE CENTER. AMENDMENT SECOND BY GERALD TILLEY. THE AMENDMENT PASSED BY 12 AYE AND 0 NO. THE MOTION AS AMENDED PASSED BY 18 AYE AND 0 NO. MOTION BY SCRIVNER THAT THE BOARD ADJUST THE FEES AS THEY FEEL APPROPRIATE UNTIL THE STUDY IS COMPLETED. MOTION SECOND BY TOLLY. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

GWEN HAY GAVE THE BOARD A LIST OF PROPOSED CHARGES.

HAY SUGGESTED REPLACING THE FURNACE FILTERS DURING THE HEATING SEASON FOR THE SAKE OF THE ELECTION OFFICIALS.

THERE WILL BE A REFERENDUM BY OREGON SCHOOL BOARD REQUESTING \$20,750,000.00 FOR RENOVATIONS OF THREE SCHOOLS.

THE PEOPLE CALLED A SHORT RECESS FOR REFRESHMENTS, WHICH WERE PROVIDED BY GWEN HAY AND THE ELECTION COMMITTEE.

THE SAFETY REPORT WAS GIVEN BY BARNEY EASTERDAY. EASTERDAY EXPLAINED AT THE 1995 ANNUAL MEETING THE BOARD WAS DIRECTED TO APPOINT A SAFETY COMMITTEE, TO REVIEW THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE BROOKLYN EMS, AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING THE EMS AND FIRE COVERAGE IN THE TOWNSHIP. THE MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE ARE STEVE MILLER, BOB McNEELY, BOB MUSHELL, JEFF PRICE, GLEN CLARK, BARNEY EASTERDAY, AND SUPERVISOR HANSON AS LIAISON. THE COMMITTEE INTERACTED WITH CHIEF MORTENSEN TO FIND OUT HOW THE FIRE DISTRICTS FUNCTIONED. THEY RESEARCHED THE TELEPHONE AND 911 SYSTEMS COVERING THE TOWNSHIP. THE COMMITTEE MET WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF THE FIRE AND EMS DISTRICTS AND DISCUSSED THEIR CHARGE BY THE BOARD. THEY DETERMINED THERE WAS ROOM FOR ADDITIONAL COVERAGE BY ALL. THEY MET WITH SHERIFF CONLIN TO GET INFORMATION ON THE MONROE 911 SYSTEM. THE RECOMMENDATIONS BY THE COMMITTEE TO THE TOWN BOARD WERE; 1. SUPPORT THE BROOKLYN EMS UNIT DEVELOPMENT, 2. THE TOWN BE COVERED BY THE BROOKLYN AND ALBANY FIRE DISTRICTS AND THAT THE BOUNDARIES BE REDRAWN BY MUTUAL AGREEMENT, AND WITHDRAWAL FROM THE BELLEVILLE AND EVANSVILLE FIRE DISTRICTS. 3. THE BROOKLYN AND ALBANY FIRE AND EMS DISTRICTS HAVE THE SAME BOUNDARIES, 4. A VIGOROUS PUBLIC INFORMATION PROGRAM ABOUT EMERGENCY SERVICES BE INITIATED, 5. THE

TOWN REQUEST THE GREEN COUNTY SHERIFF, WITH THE SUPPORT OF ALL TOWNS IN GREEN COUNTY, PURSUE UPDATING THE 911 AND DISPATCH SYSTEM, 6. FORMAL MUTUAL AID AGREEMENTS BE SIGNED WITH APPROPRIATE ADJACENT FIRE AND EMS DISTRICTS, 7. THAT IT BE THE POLICY OF THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN THAT TOWN EMS AND FIRE DISTRICT REPRESENTATIVES MAY NOT

SERVE ON MORE THAN ONE DISTRICT BOARD. A COUNTER PROPOSAL WAS PRESENTED BY A GROUP CALLED THE BROOKLYN EMERGENCY SERVICES AGREEING WITH FIVE OF THE SEVEN DIRECTIVES. THEY DREW NEW DISTRICT LINES AND PRESENTED THEM TO THE BOARD. IN THE SPIRIT OF EXPEDIENCY, THE COMMITTEE AGREED TO THE RESTRUCTURING AS PRESENTED BY THE EMERGENCY SERVICES, BUT STILL MAINTAINS THAT TWO DISTRICTS WOULD BETTER SERVE THE TOWNSHIP. THE PRESENTED TO THE BOARD NAMES OF THE POSSIBLE REPRESENTATIVES TO FIRE AND EMS DISTRICTS BUT HAS NOT CONTACTED THEM. THEY ARE; ALBANY / JEROME GRUNNET, BELLEVILLE / JIM KRAMER, BROOKLYN / JERRY RICHARDSON, EVANSVILLE / KAREN TWAY.

PHILL MORTENSEN GAVE A REPORT ON THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE BROOKLYN EMS. PHILL EXPLAINED THAT HE IS NOW GETTING WRITING MUTUAL AGREEMENTS WITH SURROUNDING COUNTIES. HE EXPLAINED WHY THE EMS IS NOT IN SERVICE AT PRESENT. THE SYSTEM WAS NOT UP TO SPEED TO PROVIDE THE KIND OF SERVICE THE PEOPLE NEED. THE DISTRICT BOARD HIRED GARY ZIEGLER TO COMPLETE THE CONTRACTS AND GET THE TRAINING DONE SO SERVICE CAN BE PROVIDED BY MAY 15, 1996. IN THE MEAN TIME, THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN IS COVERED BY ALBANY FOR EMS THROUGH SEPTEMBER 1ST.

HANSON ASKED JEROME GRUNNET IF HE WOULD BE WILLING TO SERVE AS THE CONTACT PERSON ON BOTH THE FIRE AND EMS BOARDS OF ALBANY.

GRUNNET AGREED, HE WOULD DO SO. HANSON ASKED, WHAT THE CHAIRMAN WOULD LIKE SAFETY COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE DOING. THE ISSUE IS THE SAFETY AND SECURITY OF THE RESIDENTS OF THE TOWNSHIP.

PATTERSON SUGGESTED APPLY PRESSURE TO THE COUNTY THROUGH THE COUNTY TOWN'S ASSOCIATION. THE COMMITTEE SHOULD CONTINUE WITH PRESSURE ON THE COUNTY BOARD TO UP-GRADE THE 911 SYSTEM, SHOULD EDUCATE THE PUBLIC OF THE TOWNSHIP ON EMERGENCY SERVICES, AND CONTACT THE PROPOSED PERSONS FOR VOTING MEMBERS OF THE DISTRICTS. MOTION BY GWEN HAY, IF THE SAFETY COMMITTEE DESIRES TO CONTINUE THEY SHOULD DO SO. MOTION SECOND BY DICK GREGG. MOTION CARRIED WITH 9 AYE AND 0 NO. EASTERDAY SAID, IT WOULD NOT BE IN THE BEST INTEREST OF THE COMMITTEE TO HAVE THE CURRENT MEMBERS SERVE ON THE DISTRICT BOARDS. MOTION BY SPLITTER TO TABLE THIS ITEM UNTIL THE NEXT BOARD MEETING. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON & CARRIED.

SPLITTER GAVE THE ROAD REPORT FOR LAST YEAR. THOSE ROADS WORKED ON WERE ALPINE (SEAL COAT), LEGLER (WEDGE), KING (NEW CULVERT), KING (SEAL COAT), FREIDIG (SEAL COAT), KELLY (SEAL COAT) ELMER (DITCHING). THE COST WAS ABOUT \$35,000.00 AND THE COST CONTINUES TO ESCALATE. PATTERSON SAID THIS YEAR WE PLAN SEALING ALPINE, LEGLER AND YARWOOD WHICH IS 5-1/2 MILES. OTHER ROADS NEEDING MAJOR REPAIR ARE BEHNKE, FREIDIG, AND BROOKLYN-ALBANY.

MOTION BY STEVE MILLER TO ALLOW THE BOARD TO CONTINUE ROAD WORK AS BUDGETED. MOTION SECOND BY HANSON. MOTION CARRIED. PATTERSON REPORTED THAT THE TOWN BOUGHT 327.29 TON OF SALT.

PATTERSON REPORTED THAT THE TOWN HAS BEEN RENTING A TRUCK FROM THE COUNTY BECAUSE THE 1980 "IH" WAS TOTALED. WE HAVE PAID \$2,500.00 FOR THE RENTAL. THE BOARD RESEARCHED THE COST OF A NEW TRUCK, WHICH RANGED FROM \$53,000.00 TO \$61,000.00 WITH THE APPROPRIATE GEAR ON THE TRUCK FOR TOWN USE. THIS FIGURE WOULD NOT INCLUDE TAX. JEROME GRUNNET SUGGESTED LEASING. IT WOULD BE ABOUT \$20,000.00 FOR A THREE YEAR LEASE. CONSIDERABLE DISCUSSION TOOK PLACE ABOUT THE VARIOUS TYPES OF TRUCKS AND EQUIPMENT.

NEW AS OPPOSED TO USED WAS DISCUSSED. SPLITTER SAID SINCE WE HAVE TO CONSIDER THE PEOPLE GETTING OUT OF THE TOWNSHIP FOR WORK, SCHOOL, OR EMERGENCY SERVICES, IT BECOMES IMPORTANT TO PLOW AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. WE PRESENTLY HAVE \$30,000.00 IN CAPITAL EQUIPMENT. MOTION BY SCRIVNER TO PURCHASE A NEW TRUCK AND HAVE IT FINANCED IN THE MOST REASONABLE WAY FOR THE TOWNSHIP. MOTION SECOND BY MILLER. MOTION CARRIED WITH 11 AYE, 2 NO.

PATTERSON ASKED IF THE PEOPLE FEEL THAT THE TOWN BOARD IS GETTING PAID SUFFICIENTLY? MOTION BY EASTERDAY THAT THERE BE NO CHANGES IN THE SALARIES OF THE TOWN OFFICIALS. MOTION SECOND BY JULIE SMITH. AFTER DISCUSSION OF OTHER TOWN'S PAY STRUCTURE, SCRIVNER EXPLAINED, THE CLERK'S JOB IS MORE THAN JUST OUT OF POCKET EXPENSE. THE JOB ENTAILS A LOT OF CLERICAL, SUPERVISION, BOOK-WORK AND OTHER TIME CONSUMING PAPER WORK. SPLITTER SAID HISTORICALLY, THE CLERK HAS HAD A TOUGH GO OF IT. PHIL BROWN SAID WE SHOULD CONSIDER GIVING THE CLERK A RAISE. EASTERDAY SUGGESTED THE TOWN HIRE A CLERICAL. PATTERSON EXPLAINED THAT OTHER TOWNS ARE APPOINTING A CLERK WITH FULL TIME WAGES.

AFTER DISCUSSION, AMENDMENT BY STEVE GRUNNET TO LEAVE THE WAGES OF THE TOWN OFFICIALS THE SAME EXCEPT THE TOWN CLERK'S. AMENDMENT SECOND BY GWEN HAY. AMENDMENT CARRIED WITH 16 AYE, AND 0 NO. THE MOTION AS AMENDED CARRIED WITH 16 AYE AND 0 NO.

STEVE MILLER MADE THE MOTION TO INCREASE THE CLERKS SALARY BY 4% IN 1997 AND 3% IN 1998. MOTION FAILED DUE TO A LACK OF A SECOND.

MOTION BY JULIE SMITH TO ESTABLISH THE CLERKS SALARY AT \$12,500.00 PER YEAR. MOTION SECOND BY STEVE GRUNNET. DICK GREGG SUGGESTED AN AMENDMENT TO ALLOW A \$2.00 OR \$3.00 PER HOUR AS A CLERICAL FEE PRIOR TO 1997. AMMENDMENT DIED DUE TO A LACK OF A SECOND. MOTION CARRIED BY 16 AYE AND 0 NO.

PATTERSON ASKED IF THE PEOPLE WANT LIBERTY-POLE-HILL PARK OR LET THE COUNTY LET IT GO TO PRAIRIE? JEROME GRUNNET ASKED WHAT THE LIABILITY WAS ON IT. JIM SCRIVNER SAID THERE IS NO LIABILITY DUE TO A NEW LAW UNLESS THERE ARE SWINGS OR OTHER EQUIPMENT INSTALLED. JEROME ASKED WHAT IT WILL COST. THE CLERK SAID NO COST TO TRANSFER THE DEED, BUT ABOUT \$1,200.00 PER YEAR FOR UP-KEEP. MOTION BY JEROME GRUNNET TO GET TITLE TO THE PARK. MOTION SECOND BY DICK GREGG. SCRIVNER SUGGESTED A DEED RATHER THAN A QUIT CLAIM. THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF BROOKLYN DIRECTED THE CLERK TO OBTAIN INFORMATION AND, OR DEED TO THE PARK.

THE MOTION CARRIED BY 11 AYE AND 0 NO. SCRIVNER NOTED THAT IT WAS 30 YEARS AND 10 DAYS AGO WHEN THE PARK WAS ESTABLISHED.

MOTION BY SCRIVNER TO ADJOURN THE 1996 ANNUAL MEETING. MOTION SECOND BY GWEN HAY. MOTION CARRIED. PATTERSON ADJOURNED THE 1996 ANNUAL MEETING AT 11:30 PM.

THE FOLLOWING IS A NARRATIVE OF EXPENDITURES IN 1997.

TOTAL GENERAL GOVERNMENT EXPANSES, INCREASE OF 11%

E10 THE TOWN BOARD EXPENSE HAS INCREASED BY \$500 BECAUSE THE 1996 TOTAL WILL COME CLOSE TO THE BUDGETED AMOUNT.

E11 THE ATTORNEY FEES WILL DECREASE BY \$3000 BECAUSE THERE IS ANTICIPATED LESS USE FOR A MEDIATOR IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

E12 THE CLERK'S EXPENSES WILL INCREASE BY \$3000 BECAUSE THE TOWN'S PEOPLE VOTED TO INCREASE THE CLERK'S WAGES TO \$12,500. THIS IS SHOWN BY \$2250 THE FIRST QUARTER AND \$9375 THE REMAINING THREE QUARTERS, PLUS \$2375 FOR EXTRA MEETINGS AND EXPENSES.

E13 ELECTION COSTS WILL INCREASE BY \$700, ONLY IF THE BOARD AGREES TO PURCHASE VOTING BOOTHS AT A COST TO THE TOWNSHIP OF \$792.

E14 THE TREASURER USED \$5016 IN 1995, AND THE USAGE WILL BE CLOSE TO, IF NOT SLIGHTLY OVER THE 1996 BUDGET. THEREFORE A \$200 INCREASE

E15 THE ASSESSOR COSTS HAVE INCREASED BY \$2800 FOR ANTICIPATED REVALUATION COSTS IN THE FUTURE, BUT ON TOP OF THIS INCREASE IS THE COST OF REASSESSMENT OF THE ENTIRE TOWNSHIP WILL BE CONDUCTED BY THE D.O.R. E17 OFFICER FICA IS LOWER THAN ANTICIPATED BUT WILL INCREASE SLIGHTLY DUE TO INCREASES. THEREFORE WILL REMAIN THE SAME.

E18 TOWN PROPERTY INSURANCE WAS LOWER THAN BUDGETED BUT EXPECT AN INCREASE IN 1997. THEREFORE NO CHANGE PROPOSED.

E19 TOWN LIABILITY INSURANCE WAS LOWER THAN BUDGETED IN 1996 BECAUSE OF CATEGORY BRAKE-DOWN, DECREASING THIS BY \$1000.

PUBLIC SAFETY DECREASE OF 11%

E20 LAW ENFORCEMENT WILL REMAIN THE SAME

E21 FIRE PROTECTION WILL DECREASE BY \$3417 BECAUSE THE ACTUAL COST WAS LESS LAST YEAR THAN ANTICIPATED. THE 1997 BUDGET IS ACTUAL.

E22 THE EMS HAS DECREASED BY \$1750 BECAUSE ACTUAL COSTS WERE LESS THAN BUDGETED. THE 1997 BUDGET IS ACTUAL

E23 2% FIRE DUES WILL REMAIN THE SAME. THIS IS AN IN AND OUT.

HIGHWAY WILL INCREASE BY 6%

E30 HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE WILL REMAIN THE SAME AS DECREASED DURING 1996, WITH THE HOPE THERE WILL NOT BE AN INCREASE IN SNOW & ICE.

E31 SEAL-COATING AND WEDGING WILL DECREASE BY \$2000 WITH THE HOPES OF SEALING SEVEN (7) MILES OF ROADS, WEDGING WILL NOT BE DONE.

E32 HIGHWAY INSURANCE WILL INCREASE BY \$1000. THIS MAY BE LOW BECAUSE INCLUDED IN THIS CATEGORY IS, BRIAN'S HMO, AND IRA, WORKMAN'S COMP, FICA FOR ALL LABOR, AND HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT. I INCREASED ONLY BY \$1000 BECAUSE THE TRUCK WILL HAVE DEPRECIATED.

E33 HIGHWAY LABOR WILL REMAIN THE SAME EVEN THOUGH THE ENDING BALANCE SHOWS ABOUT \$5000 LOWER. THERE WILL NOT BE AN INSURANCE TRANSFER. IT IS RECOMMENDED TO INCREASE BRIAN'S HOURLY WAGE BY .50 PER HOUR. THIS WILL COST THE TOWNSHIP \$1,119.56 PER YEAR AND NOT INCREASE E33

E34 EQUIPMENT MAINTENANCE WILL DECREASE BY \$2000 DUE TO THE PURCHASE OF A NEW AND HOPEFULLY MAINTENANCE FREE TRUCK

E35 CAPITAL EQUIPMENT INCREASE OF \$15500 TO BE ADDED TO THE \$28000 CARRY-OVER TO COVER THE ANNUAL PAYMENT OF THE NEW TRUCK.

E36 PAYMENT TO THE COUNTY FOR PRIVATE CULVERTS WILL INCREASE \$1,200 BECAUSE THERE MAY BE A SLOW INCREASE IN BUILDING.

SANITATION WILL INCREASE BY 17%

E40 THE RECYCLING INCREASE OF \$500 WILL BE FROM NORMAL ANNUAL INCREASE FROM WASTE MANAGEMENT.

E84 THE PLANNING COMMISSION WILL REMAIN THE SAME. THE 96 INCREASE IS A ONE TIME PAYMENT OF PAST INCURRED EXPENSES.

E90 SUNDRY EXPENSES WILL INCREASE FOR 1997 DUE TO A REQUIRED AUDIT BEING DONE BY THE D.O.R. TO BALANCE THE 1995 FORM "C" REPORT.

E91 NORMAL TAX OVERPAYMENTS ARE ABOUT \$1500, PAID BY MORTGAGE HOLDERS. IN 1997 THERE WILL POSSIBLY BE THE SAME. THIS IS A PASS-THROUGH

THE TOTAL INCREASE IN EXPENDITURES OF \$77,389 WILL BE EQUAL TO A 26% INCREASE OVER THE 1996 BUDGET.

THE FOLLOWING IS A NARRATIVE OF RECEIPTS IN THE 1997 BUDGET YEAR.

THE TAX LEVY TO THE TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS WILL BE INCREASED BY 33%

R10 THE GENERAL PROPERTY TAX WILL INCREASE. THE INCREASE WAS EARMARKED FOR MAJOR ROAD REPAIR BUT WILL BE USED FOR A TOTAL REASSESSMENT OF THE TOWNSHIP TO BE ORDERED BY THE D.O.R., WITH THE EXCEPTION OF FARM LAND. THEREFORE THE TOWN TAX ASSESSMENT WILL BE \$200,000 FOR GENERAL PROPERTY TAXES

R11 THE TRUST FUND TAX LEVY WILL REMAIN THE SAME FOR THREE MORE YEARS, AT WHICH TIME IT WILL HAVE BEEN PAID.

THE TOTAL INTERGOVERNMENTAL REVENUES WILL DECREASE BY 6%

R20 THE STATE SHARED REVENUE HAS DECREASED BY \$1322

R21 THE 2% FIRE DUES WILL INCREASE BY 5% BUT THIS IS A PASS-THROUGH

R22 HIGHWAY AIDS WILL INCREASE BY \$1778 OVER 1996

R23 RECYCLING GRANTS WILL DECREASE BY \$2500 OVER THE 1996 BUDGET BUT BY \$1361 OVER ACTUAL RECEIPTS.

R24 THERE WAS NO RECEIPT FOR THIS CATEGORY BUT THAT IS PREDICATED UPON D.N.R. PURCHASES. THERE IS NO CHANGE TO THE RECEIPTS.

R25 THIS IS A DECREASING CATEGORY, TO LEVEL OFF IN 10 YEARS FROM THE DATE OF PURCHASE OF THE REFUGE ON BROOKLYN-ALBANY ROAD. THEREFORE, A DECREASE OF \$500 FROM 1996.

R27, OTHER PREVENUES FROM THE D.N.R. ARE MANUFACTURED FOREST CROP. THE TOWNSHIP KEEPS 80% OF \$64.

R29 THE FUNDS FROM THE COUNTY WILL DECREASE BY \$4000 BECAUSE THE THIS CATEGORY HAD BEEN ACCUMULATED SINCE 1994. DRAWN OUT IN 1996. NORMAL MATCHING FUNDS ARE \$4000.

TOTAL PUBLIC CHARGES WILL INCREASE BY 26%

R30 LIQUOR LICENSES WILL REMAIN THE SAME, UNLESS BY BOARD PROCLAMATION THEY CHANGE.

R31 DOG LICENSES LOOKS LIKE AN INCREASE BUT THIS IS A PASS-THROUGH

R32 PERMITS AND FEES WILL CHANGE. ALTHOUGH WE SEE AN ALMOST DOUBLE IN RECEIPTS, WE CAN EXPECT TO SEE THIS REMAIN THE SAME AS 1996.

R40 WE SEE AN INCREASE OF \$12,109 LARGELY DUE TO A CARRY-OVER OF A SIZEABLE AMOUNT OF THE CAPITAL EQUIPMENT FUND.

R42 PRIVATE CULVERTS OF \$2,400 IS INDICATED DUE TO INCREASED BUILDING AND HAVING BRIAN PROVIDE THE CULVERT. THIS IS A PASS-THROUGH

R43 WE CAN EXPECT AN INCREASE OF ABOUT 40% OVER THE BUDGETED AMOUNT OF 1996 DUE TO THE INCREASE BY BOARD ACTION.

TOTAL MISCELLANEOUS WILL SHOW A DECREASE OF ABOUT 63%

R80 WE HAVE INCREASED OUR INTEREST INCOME BY \$1000 OVER THE 1996 BUDGET BECAUSE THE RECEIPTS IN 1996 SHOW A HIGHER RETURN IN THE STATE TREASURERS POOL, WHERE MOST OF THE TOWN'S FINANCES WILL BE PLACED IN 1997.

R81 THERE WILL BE NO CHANGE IN THIS CATEGORY BECAUSE IT IS DIFFICULT TO ANTICIPATE THE REQUESTS TO RENT THE HALL.

R83 TAX REFUNDS HAVE INCREASED OVER 1995 OF ABOUT \$550 BECAUSE MORE RESIDENTS ARE USING MORTGAGE COMPANIES TO PAY THEIR TAXES BUT THIS IS A PASS-THROUGH.

R84 INSURANCE RECOVERY WAS HIGH IN 1996 ONLY DUE TO THE TOTALED TRUCK. NORMAL RECOVERY IS ABOUT \$175 FROM WORKMAN'S COMP.

R86 THIS RECEIPT WILL DECREASE BY \$500 BECAUSE DIESEL DISTRIBUTORS CAN NO LONGER CHARGE MUNICIPALITIES FEDERAL EXCISE TAX PER GALLON.

ALTHOUGH THE 1997 BUDGET BALANCES, THE BROOKLYN TOWNSHIP HAS INCURRED A GREATER EXPENSE IN THE 1997 BUDGET DUE TO A POSSIBLE REASSESSMENT OF THE TOTAL TOWNSHIP. THE ANTICIPATED RECEIPTS IN 1996 WERE \$7,447 HIGHER THAN PROJECTED, AND THE ESTIMATED EXPENSES WILL BE \$23,155 LESS THAN PROJECTED.

WE WILL SEE A CONTINGENT FUND AT THE END OF 1997 OF \$3,283. ALTHOUGH THIS IS LESS THAN THE 10% WORKING CAPITAL SUGGESTED FOR MUNICIPALITIES, IT WILL BE RECOVERED WITH THE DECEMBER TAX COLLECTIONS IN 1997.

TOWN'S ANNUAL MEETING
 Tuesday, April 8, the people of the Town of Brooklyn had their annual meeting at the town hall. Seventeen townspeople, three EMS representatives were present. Past Chairman Robin Patterson presided over the meeting with Herb Hansen and Gary Spitzer and now clerk Shirley Hardy.

After the Pledge of Allegiance was said by all, the 1996 annual minutes were read and approved. The guests that evening were the Brooklyn EMS representatives Dave Sullivan, Mark Jozefowicz

and Leanne Hart. Sullivan said the EMS has performed 145 runs altogether from July of 1996 (its official starting date) to date. 77 of them are recorded in 1997. He expressed appreciation for the assistance and support of the fire department. Sullivan told of CPR classes scheduled for the week of May 18. If interested, contact a Fire/EMS department member. Hart told of the upcoming "Spring Fling Dance" on May 10. "Summer Haze" will be playing.

The board talked of last year's accomplishments and expensive

concerns for the coming year: acquiring the Liberty Pole Park, posting the roads to Class B, developing a land division ordinance by the Planning Committee, the cooperation of Safety Committee agreements and the hiring of a new assessor.

Its biggest blow was the error in assessing in 1996. This will bring lots of expense for the taxpayers in 1997. Correcting this mistake, the 1996 assessments will have to be redone by the DOR and our own will be done in 1997. An added expense will possibly be a purchase of a Case IH MX 100 tractor.

The Brooklyn Township Board held a special organizational meeting on Monday, April 14, 1997 at the Brooklyn Town Hall. Attending the meeting were Town Chairman Jim Scrivner, 1st Supervisor Herb Hansen, 2nd Supervisor Bob McNeely, Treasurer Marie Ross and Clerk Shirley Hardy.

Scrivner called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Hardy read the Notice of Meeting and all joined in the Pledge of Allegiance. Scrivner presented a list of organizational matters for discussion. The general outline of this list included such items as Board Member training and specialization, meetings, committees, image, communications/education and general functions.

Hansen made a motion to move the Regular Board Meetings to the second Monday of each month, rather than the third, beginning with the May meeting. McNeely seconded. Motion carried.

Scrivner read the resignation submitted by Clerk Shirley Hardy to be effective on April 22, 1997. Hardy gave a brief explanation involving the conflict the township position presented to her employment with the Village. Hansen made a motion to accept Hardy's resignation. Seconded by McNeely. Motion carried. A subsequent motion followed by Hansen to post openings in The Leader for the Clerk position as well as two positions on the Safety Committee and the Planning Commission. The notice of positions to be filled are to be included in an upcoming newsletter to the town residents as well. Applications are to be filed with Chairman Scrivner by May 5, 1997. McNeely seconded. Motion carried.

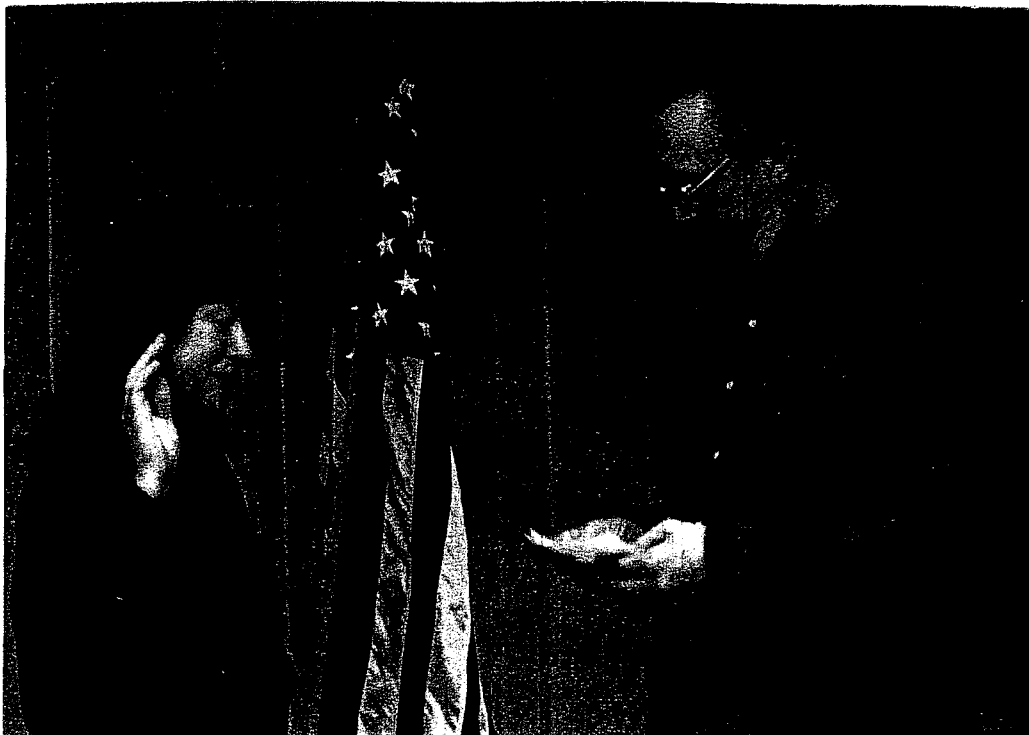
Scrivner made a motion to the board to appoint Harriet Tolley as Planning Commission Chairperson. Second by McNeely. Motion carried.

NEW TOWN OF BROOKLYN OFFICIALS

On the morning of Saturday April 5, Brooklyn town officials were sworn in at the town hall. After being sworn in by the former town clerk, Gil Hohnberger, the newly elected chairman, Jim Scrivner completed the swearing in oath of the 1997-98 supervisors and clerk.

The candidates were chosen by the 315 voters from the town within the five school districts at the April 1 election. Scrivner won the chairman position by one vote over Dan Kinney. Actually, it was two votes. A late absentee vote arrived the following day in favor of Scrivner. Absentee ballots are allowed to be counted within five days after the polls are closed.

Herb Hanson received 76 votes more than Alan Myhre for 1st supervisor (187 over 111). The 2nd supervisor position was filled by Bob McNeely who received 75 votes more than Dave Tourdot (189 over 116). Shirley Hardy became the new town clerk with 22 more votes than former clerk Gil Hohnberger (161 over 139).

Marie Ross kept her treasurer's position with 240 votes over Rebecca Haak's count of 59. Gerald Richardson ran unopposed for the constable's position, receiving 240 votes.

This was the second time the town's new voting booths were put to use. They were delivered by United Parcel Service on January 27 and set up for the primary on February 18, to decide on the school superintendent's position. The individual booths take less space and can be folded up for storage.

Back in August of 1934 the Brooklyn Town Board (chairman N. C. Jensen, supervisors Fred Hoesly and Leslie Baumgartner) asked the clerk, Alton Sprecher to order two three-stall booths for election purposes. They were ordered from Eau Claire Book and Stationary Company and delivered by the Central and Northwestern

Railroad. The town voters used them at the 1935 Spring Election held at the Opera House in the village of Brooklyn.

Curtains gave the voters privacy. Earlier, wooden stalls were used and also steel partitions. After each election the wooden booths had to be taken apart and nailed together. The town had to pay rent for storing these wooden booths somewhere in the village before and after each election.

Elections were always held in the village. Woodman's Hall, Samuel McComb's Hotel, Hansen's Hall and the Community Hall were some of the locations where the townspeople voted. The question of having their own meeting place was

the ballot in 1896. It was voted down 121 against and 96 for. It wasn't until the fall of 1975 that the town of Brooklyn set up their voting booths at their own town hall. The board that was elected were Sheldon Yarwood, chairman; Orrie Krause and Charles Freidig, supervisors, and Lucille Brown, clerk.

All the voting equipment was purchased from the Douglas Election Equipment of Crete, Nebraska. Founded in 1910, the fourth generation of the Douglas family still operates the company today. The majority of their booths are made from aluminum

rather than of steel. The cloth curtains have been changed to vinyl with velcro attachments.

Regular Monthly Meeting

April 21, 1997

The Brooklyn Township Board met in open session on Monday, April 21, 1997 at the Town Hall for their regular monthly meeting. Attending the meeting were Town Chairman Jim Scrivner, 1st Supervisor Herb Hanson, 2nd Supervisor Bob McNeely, Treasurer Marie Ross and Clerk Shirley Hardy.

Scrivner called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Hardy read the Notice of Meeting and all joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Hanson made a motion to accept the Treasurer's report except for the cash summary. Seconded by McNeely. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Hanson to approve the monthly bills with the exception of item #13 to the Green County Highway Department. Brian Smith stated that the County had confirmed an error in the charges for salt and would submit a corrected statement in May. The amount to be paid currently should be the charges totaling \$1,728.40 for equipment / supplies only. Seconded by McNeely. Motion carried.

Chairperson Harriet Maybeck Tolly proceeded with the report from the Planning Commission. The Commission recommended that the Board give final approval for a land division CSM submitted by Frank and Stephanie Raemisich upon receipt of the \$200.00 fee. It was also recommended that a second fee following a minor change on the CSM be waived. Scrivner made the motion to approve the CSM. Second by Hanson. Carried. Scrivner made the subsequent motion to waive the second fee. Hanson seconded. Motion carried.

Hanson then made the motion, upon the recommendation of the Planning Commission to approve the land division CSM submitted by Kendall and Kristi Flood providing they are aware of the conditions that will need to be met if a driveway permit is needed in the future. Kristi Flood stated the purchaser will be responsible for the driveway permit. Motion seconded by McNeely. Carried.

Tolly presented to the Board a detailed account of the course of events following a land division request submitted by Hank Wegwitz on Smith Rd. Tolly requested guidance from the Board in handling this due to the complexity of the situation. The Board agreed that no decision can be made unless Mr. Wegwitz appears before the Board to provide clarification of his intentions.

Tolly also discussed with the Board attendance at Green County Zoning public hearings. The Board felt that if a representative from the Planning Commission chose to attend, it should be to state the Brooklyn Township's zoning guidelines, but not to represent opinions/ views of the Township Board.

A letter was presented by Scrivner from Barney Easterday regarding the Safety Committee. The Board will discuss at the regular monthly meeting in May his request for direction on the purpose and standard operating procedures of the Committee.

Two permits were considered by the Board. The first was submitted by Carl and Patricia Schultz. The request was for a "field road" off of Legler Road. McNeely made a motion to approve the "field road"; no culvert needed, with the understanding that this approval is strictly for a "field road" and if the use is to change in the future a new permit request would need to be submitted.

The second permit request was submitted by John and Pamela Medenwald / Connery Construction. Due to the recent receipt of this request, it was tabled until the May meeting pending further Board review.

Brian Smith presented to the Board the dollar figures he obtained from Carter & Gruenewald on the tractor purchase. Questions regarding the agreement were discussed and it was decided that McNeely would accompany Brian to the implement dealer to iron out the details of the purchase agreement and would report back to the Board.

Hanson made the motion, seconded by Scrivner to have Brian Smith and Bob McNeely inspect and purchase a 1986 GMC 6000 truck at the Wisconsin Division of Federal Property in Waunakee as soon as possible. Motion carried.

Hanson stated he will extend an invitation to the Green County Sheriff's Department and the State Patrol Inspector to the May board meeting to explain the impact of posting weight limits on the Town roads and possibly offer some direction to the Board.

Hanson made a motion to approve the minutes of the May 10, 1997 regular board meeting with a correction on page 2, paragraph 2, regarding the Wegwitz land division. The final sentence should be as follows: This issue is the contention that the division pre-dates the fee ordinance. Motion seconded by McNeely. Motion carried.

Scrivner presented a draft of the newsletter. The Board members previewed the draft and offered additions and corrections. The informational newsletter will be mailed to town residents as soon as it is finalized.

Hanson made a motion to accept the bid submitted by Julie Smith for mowing the Township Hall / Garage grounds and Liberty Pole Hill of \$6.00 per hour. McNeely seconded. Motion Carried.

Hanson made a motion to sell a 1000 gallon diesel fuel tank to Gerald Richardson for \$300.00. The pump could be included for an additional \$150.00. Seconded by McNeely. Motion carried.

Hanson made the motion to accept the offer of Frank Raernisch to attempt the repairs needed on the towns diesel truck for time and materials and with the assistance of Brian Smith. Seconded by Bob McNeely. Motion carried.

Motion by Scrivner to adjourn the meeting at 10:35 p.m. Hanson seconded. Carried.

SPECIAL OPEN MEETING

OF TUESDAY, MAY 6 AND FRIDAY, MAY 9, 1997

Tuesday, May 6:

The Brooklyn Town Board met in open session at the Town Hall for a special meeting to learn of the clerk's role and its responsibilities. Chairman Jim Scrivner called the meeting to order at 8 p.m. Besides the two supervisors, Herb Hansen and Bob McNeely, there was 7 towns' people and one guest present. Sharon George was asked to act as temporary clerk. Following the reading of the notice of the meeting and leading the traditional pledge of allegiance; Scrivner introduced the guest.

Audrey Rue, a certified clerk, has been the Town of Brigham's clerk for 14 years. She was asked to exclaim the duties, procedures and obligations expected of the clerk's office. She listed the many jobs through out the year to the five clerk applicants and the board. During Rue's job description, the applicants were allowed to ask questions. One of the

questions to the Board was, "Does the Town issue scholarships to attend clerk's training school?" "No, that's the clerk's personal expense" was their reply.

The applicants, all from the Town, were Judith Follett, Stephanie Raemisch, Forrest Ross, Cynthia Swain and Claire Culbertson.

Rue's told of her salary, which led into discussion of our Town's clerk salary. Hansen made a motion to for the board to dissolve into a committee to further discuss about the clerk's salary. The motion was seconded by McNeely and passed by the board; unanimously.

Accepting the raise of the clerk's salary at the last annual meeting; they would have to abide by that ruling, legally.

At 9:45 p.m., Hansen made a motion to reconvene with this meeting on Friday to hear interviews from the applicants. This was seconded by McNeely and passed by the whole board. Scrivner told the applicants to think about what they have heard tonight and come back on Friday night at 7 for half/hour interviews in front of the board and people.

Hansen made a motion to recess until Friday night at seven o'clock. This was seconded by McNeely and passed by board; unanimously.

Friday, May 9:

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Scrivner at 7 p.m. The format of this meeting was explained to the applicants. The interviews were being done publicly instead of privately, because the office of an elective official job has to be held in a public manner; according to the statutes.

There were only two applicants that returned; Follett and Raemisch. They were given a list of 9 questions and 15 minutes to look them over. Each applicant was asked to respond to a possible scenario happening in the Town. (these questions are attached)

Interviewed first, Raemisch told of being in the Town; almost 6 years. She said, "I've learned a lot attending meetings and want to be more involved." Working in Verona as a pharmacy technician; she has dealt with all kinds of people, using the computer and phone. Raemisch told the board, "I like people and I'm willing to learn."

Follett talked about her 18 years of employment at Nicolet. Living in the Town for 9 and 1/2 years, her parents have lived here since 1965. Telling of her computer and book-keeping experience; she told of working under CPA's and managers as teams and using different software. She expressed concern of upcoming crisis of the Town. (Concerning question No. 5).

Hearing both candidates, the board chose Follett; because of her broader array of skills.

Hansen made a motion to hire Judith Follett for the position of the clerk. McNeely seconded the motion. The motion passed, unanimously by the whole board.

Accepting the position, Follett was sworn into office by Scrivner.

The motion to adjourn was made by Hansen. This was seconded by McNeely. The whole board voted favorably at 8:53 p.m.

QUESTIONS ASKED OF THE CLERK APPLICANTS

1. What do you consider your positive attributes for becoming a clerk?
2. What positive skills and abilities do you bring to the position of the clerk?
3. Not knowing what the learning curve for the clerk's position will be, are you willing to commit the time it will take? What do you see as being the most difficult portion of the transition?
4. Based on the position and duty description presented on Tuesday night, what problems do you envision?

5. What are some of your weaknesses? Assuming there are some.
6. How assertive are you?
7. The township and town government have changed dramatically in the past several years. It will change even more as time passes. How do you deal with change?
8. You will be contacted at home for permits, informative gatherings, etc. How do you feel about this?
9. The position is compensated at \$12,500 annually. If you needed outside help, would you be willing to defer some to cover those costs?

HYPOTHETICAL SCENARIOS

A "hot potato" issue is confronting the township. A reporter contacts you and asks what the town's position is on the topic. How do you respond?

A landowner and resident call your home and complain that the Town's Land Division Ordinance is unfair because it denies the right to sell as many parcels as the owner wishes. How would you deal with this person?

May 12, 1997 Regular Monthly Meeting Minutes

The May monthly meeting was held on Monday, May 12, 1997 at 7:30PM at the Town Hall in Brooklyn. In attendance were Chairman Jim Scrivner, Supervisors Herb Hanson and Bob McNeely, Treasurer Marie Ross and Clerk Judy Follett. About 12 residents were also present.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Scrivner. The Public Notice was read by the clerk. The Public Notice was accepted as read. The new clerk was introduced and J. Scrivner described the hiring process. The minutes of the April 14, 1997 meeting were approved. The minutes of the April 21, 1997 meeting were approved after the correction was made concerning the Schultz field access. Correction being:

The minutes for the May 6 & May 9, 1997 meetings were also approved. All minutes were approved unanimously.

Road Posting: Introduction of Deputy Randy Teutschmann of the Green Co. Sheriff's Dept. He came to the meeting to discuss the impact of the road postings as Class B Highways. Feeling were that there should be a formal plan to go with the road postings as it can create problems with enforcement. Teutschmann explained that the basic reason for road posting is to keep road maintenance costs down. There is also a safety issue; the roads are getting busy, the roads are narrow, and the trucks go fast. As the roads have already been posted this is the problem:

- At this point all large deliveries/pickups may be illegal. i.e.: farm deliveries of feed, lime, supplies, etc.
- Alternatives:

1. Add a sign below this that states: **Local Delivery / Pickup Exempt**

This would allow trucks to a Class A maximum. You are only restricting large trucks that have no business (delivery/pickup) on the road they are traveling on.

2. Add a sign below this that states: **Permit Required**

This would mean a permit in writing. The town would need to keep track of the permits. Each truck would need to carry a permit (for enforcement). Officer Teutschmann will send copies of road permits we could use.

It was noted that more and more townships are posting roads. The possibility was brought up that the Safety Committee take on the issue of the road posting and that Brian Smith be their main contact. One concern that was discussed was that of trucks using roads as shortcuts - no deliveries or pickups on the roads they travel. Examples are Amidon Road and Sandy Hook Road. Teutschmann gave examples of enforcement: At 14 & Amidon - all trucks have been empty!

Teutschmann is looking for more systematized and controlled system for enforcement. Verbal permission is allowable but does not work as far as enforcement is concerned. With the permit system, the burden of proof is on the trucker. If you use the 'Local Delivery' route, then truckers will be more likely to sneak through than if a permit is required. For new subdivisions - with permit system, it is easier to control the roads getting beat up. Note about permits - you may restrict what you want as far as truck length, weight, & width. Advice from deputy: Never permit 'over' length trucks.

Teutschmann noted that if there is a plan, then compliance is usually high. He also said that throughout the state there are no good plans, just many complaints.

It was then made known that the Town Board never passed a resolution to post the roads. The signs are still legal. Stickers are now on the signs also (Stating by authority of Green Co. Highway Comm or Brooklyn Town Board).

Further discussion:

To use Brooklyn as a test model & possibly get some grant money.

Political ramifications to consider - Brooklyn's relationship with Green Co. Board.

Use permit system on certain roads only - those that are breaking down.

Limited funds and resources.

Theft of expensive signs.

Deputy's suggestion: If 'Local Delivery / Pickup' not restrictive enough, go further at a later date.

Town stated how they appreciate working with sheriff's office as they start this process.

Glenway Road and Highway 92 Safety Issue Discussed safety problems of this intersection with deputy. Many speeders & stop sign runners. Sheriff's dept. can hide on first farm North on left side of the road (on Glenway).

Discussion of more dangerous intersections followed.

Sheriff's dept. may change time of 'shift changes' so that they don't coincide with the high traffic times.

Bills Motion to pay Bills as listed #1 - 14. Motion seconded. Carried unanimously.

Discussion: New truck needs hitch welded by a certified welder. No motion needed. Question about physical damage insurance for the new truck. Motion was made for J. Scrivner to compare costs for Comp. & Collision insurance. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Treasurer's Report Report read by M. Ross. H. Hanson made motion to accept report. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Road and Bridge Work Postponed till next meeting. Brian Smith will look at bids that came in.

Ditching on the Brooklyn-Albany Road Water sits on the road. The Town of Albany will be ditching and raising the road five inches to correct this. After finding out that the Town of Brooklyn had no funds for this work, they will do the work in the town of Brooklyn also. This will affect four field roads owned by town of Brooklyn residents. The owners will need to buy the culverts to be installed. The town will waive the driveway fees as the work is town mandated. H. Hanson made a motion to have the clerk send letters to Terry Brewer, Dan Kinney, & Richard Horn to inform them of the work that will be performed, the necessity for the culverts (or loss of access to field roads) and to invite them to the June meeting. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously. June date to be finalized as H. Hanson will not be in town on second Monday of June.

The above grid was written out and described by B. McNeely. Bob likes the Case IH. All tractors are front wheel assist. Bob has concerns over 85 horsepower tractors-thinks it is too much horsepower. Many townships are going with 62 HP. All above have quick attach buckets and loaders. Case IH has a municipality discount (reflected above) and advantage of local dealer. H. Hanson made motion for 72HP Case IH with cash payment deferred till next year (1998). J. Scrivner seconded. Discussion: Motion amended to state: To purchase the 62HP Case IH if the 72HP was not available but that an essential level of options be maintained. Cost up to 10% higher okay. Motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

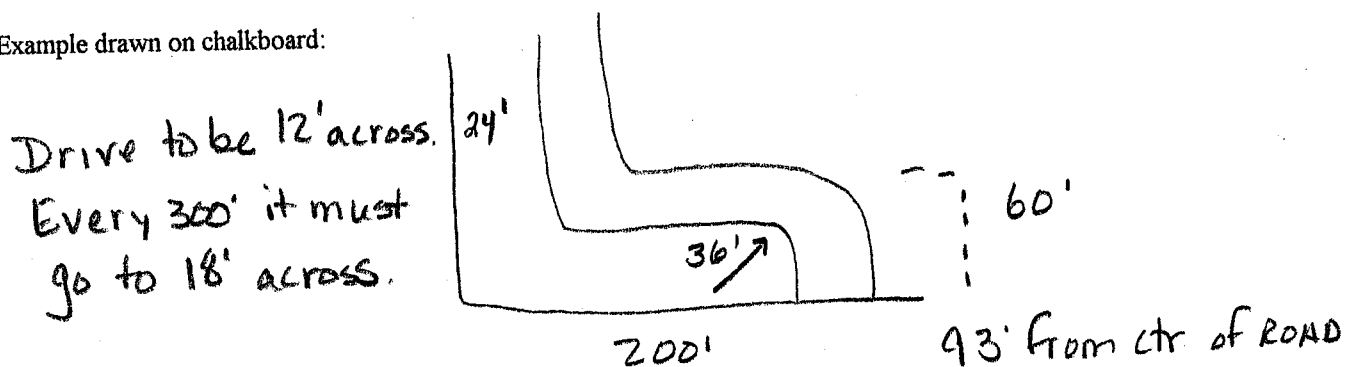
Bridge letter read by Scrivner. From Green Co. Highway Commission. Received sufficiency #'s of bridges inspected. List of bridges that could be replaced - None in Brooklyn township. Rehab for bridges - Brooklyn on list but the letter was dated April 30, received a few days ago, and the deadline is May 15. Brian Smith stated that the bridges are in good condition.

Truck purchase. A 1986 one & one-half ton GMC truck was purchased for \$2500 from the Federal Property Program. The truck has less than 6,000 miles on it. We will put our own dump box and tool box on it. We will sell off the utility box once we receive the necessary permission to sell it. Jim Scrivner has filled out the paperwork for this.

Reassessment. Scrivner spoke with John Rader. He is the person who issued the order & findings of Town situation. Last week they had the bid openings. There were three bids. They chose the middle bid, The Gardiner Appraisal Service. (The low bid was not chosen as they are too slow and the DOR has an unsatisfactory working relationship with them.) The Gardiner Firm charge will be \$37,000. The DOR expenses for supervision will be approximately \$5,000 to \$6,000. That brings the total to \$42,000 to \$43,000. When the bid process ends, the DOR and the Gardiner Firm will be in contact with the Town to set up a special meeting to talk about how the reassessment process will work. After that the Town Board will notify town residents of how process will work. The time frame will probably be late summer to early fall. After the new assessment (which affects every town parcel), there will be an Open Book and Board of Review for 1996 based on new reassessment. Tax bills will be amended where necessary.

Planning Commission Report. Report by Harriet Tolly. Commission met with Mr. Konopacki which led to discussion of the definition of a legal driveway in the Town. Town ordinance says it is 200' of road frontage. Town ordinance does not define how deep the frontage needs to be and it does not state the needed clearance on the sides of the driveway. Town attorneys position is for a public hearing before an amendment is passed. Till then the Town Board should pass a resolution to clarify the Board's position. The Planning Comm. was asked to prepare something specific in writing. There was also a question about a possible 'typing error' on the ordinance that needed clarification: 200' of frontage is needed on all lots, not just on those under 35 acres. The Planning Comm. will prepare a clarified statement for a resolution at a public hearing.

A surveyor from Verona (Mr. Grenlie) was questioning the ordinance as concerns the Nellis parcels. All parcels must have 200' of frontage, even those over 35 acres. Parcel F will need to get a full 200' of frontage from another parcel (probably parcel E). Mr. Grenlie agreed. Mr. Grenlie asked for a hand written approval for parcel G tonight.

A motion was made by J. Scrivner to approve the inquiry made by Steve & Sharon Nellis involving 6 divisions

of land in Section 17 contingent on parcel F being reconfigured to include 200' of frontage, a CSM for Parcel E, and an assignment of the remaining division. H. Hanson seconded. Motion carried unanimously. J. Scrivner hand wrote a note of approval for parcel G for Mr. Grenlie.

Planning Commission elections were held. Results: Harriet Tolly - Chairman; Pat McNeely - Vice Chairman, and Jim Kramer - Secretary.

Tolly wrote letters to two local Realtors: Eric Grover & Duane Miller. RE: Land use ordinances.

Report made on Planning Commission letter read at the Green County Board of Adjustments meeting concerning an Air Conditioning business in an area zoned for agriculture. The letter basically stated that this was not in our land use plan and that we recommend disapproval. Tolly spoke of personal verbal attacks on her and the land use plan by people at the meeting. She noted that no one attacked the statement that she read. Commission voted this evening to prepare a statement of summary of events that occurred at the hearing. They will request the board use this in their newsletter and for permission to send the statement to the zoning administrator who was chairing the meeting and who took no steps to stop the personal attacks on Tolly.

There are two vacancies on the Planning Comm. and three applications: Patti Green Schulthess, David Batker, and Robert Strous. J. Scrivner recommended Schulthess. B. McNeely noted Monroe comments, i.e.: "Madison people telling you how to do Brooklyn business, so McNeely thought Batker a good choice as he is a farmer. J. Scrivner made a motion to appoint Schulthess and Batker to the Planning Commission. B. McNeely seconded. Discussion: H. Hanson would like to see Strous on the safety committee. (Strous not interested at this time.) Motion carried unanimously.

Driveway permits

John & Pamela Medenwald: Approved, no culvert needed.

P. Elmer: Field road, Approved, 30' culvert needed.

Carl & Patti Schultz: Field road Approved. Letter to be sent by J. Scrivner stating this is a field road access only; if later to be a residence, a new driveway permit would be needed.

Lancaster: Approved. Discussion: Grade of driveway may be a problem for the Lancaster's. They must meet grade on permit. If not met, recourse is in ordinance.

Chuluprik & VanBogaert: Parcel 'G' of Nellis farm Approved. Contingent on receipt of fee.

Frank & Stephanie Raemisch: Approved with variance to 300' sight distance. Also will need two 24" culverts. (Questioned by Mrs. Raemisch about needing 2 culverts. She was told they were needed to avoid re-doing driveway.)

H. Hanson made a motion to extend meeting to finish business on the agenda. Seconded. Carried unanimously.

Safety Committee No Report from the Safety committee tonight. A letter was submitted for approval. Last note of Standard Operating Procedures - language question. "It should be clear to the town district board members, by their vote/actions, they are not acting on behalf of the town board or committing the town board to expenditures."

Members who serve on the first EMS Board should be informed of problems and issues of the Town. Questioned: Who would be responsible for making them aware? Answer: Safety committee Liaison person would be responsible.

The Safety Committee's Standard Operating Procedures were approved unanimously.

B. McNeely stated that if the safety committee took over the road posting issue, then Brian Smith should become an 'exofficio' member of the safety committee.

Safety Committee Vacancy: Town board had received letter of interest from John Marx to be on the Safety Committee. H. Hanson made motion to put Marx on the Safety Committee. Seconded. Carried unanimously.

Deputy Teutschmann called on the phone: He would like a Letter of Intent of 'Delivery/Exempt' to get to Inspector. Motion by H. Hanson for clerk to send letter to Green Co. Sheriff's dept. Seconded. Carried unanimously.

Recycling. Gwen Hay had a letter from State Rep. Spencer Black about other states dumping their unrecycled garbage in Wisc.

Summer hours: Received 24 responses from a mailing of 300. 22 yes & 2 no. Tuesday or Wednesday??

Tuesday is the favored day for town.

only: Tuesday 6 PM to 8 PM and Saturday 9 am to 2 PM. Scrivner seconded. Carried unanimously.

Note: The next newsletter will probably be after the DOR meeting.

H. Hanson made a motion to adjourn the meeting at approximately 11:30 PM. Seconded by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

WEIGHT LIMITS ON TOWN ROADS

submitted by Jim Scrivner, Town Chairman

At the direction of the citizens at the 1997 Annual Town meeting the Town of Brooklyn Board of Supervisors has been working to implement measures to preserve the Town's single most valuable (and costly) asset--the 43+ miles of town roads.

The system of town roads was designed, built and has been maintained to bear traffic at a volume and individual vehicle weight typical of the past. Recent increases in both traffic volume and vehicle weight have put increasing pressure on the roads resulting in premature deterioration and break up. At a recent Towns Association meeting, members of the Board learned that an 80,000-pound truck (a full quad axle dump or milk truck or semi, for example) inflicts the same amount of wear and tear as 4,000 cars.

As a preservation measure while other or additional measures are being considered, the Board has chosen to designate all town roads as "CLASS B HIGHWAYS" consistent with definitions in the Wisconsin law. The Board has also chosen to allow an exemption for vehicles making LOCAL PICKUPS AND DELIVERIES to sites within the Town, but only when they are using a route that involves the least amount of travel on Town of Brooklyn roads.

In simple terms, the Class B designation limits the weight of vehicles to 60% of their licensed Class A weight. The exemption for local pickup and delivery allows vehicles to travel at their full Class A licensed weight when they are making local pickups or deliveries. Thus, local pickups and deliveries at Class A weights are allowed for such activities as hauling milk, produce, livestock, feed, seed, fertilizer, machinery and construction materials (examples not intended to be an all inclusive list).

The exemption reflects the Board's desire to not interfere with normal commerce and development by residents and landowners (that is, taxpayers) in the Town while at the same time limiting the use of Town roads as "short-cuts" for those large trucks traveling through, but not having specific business in, the Town.

All Town roads have been properly posted to notify truckers of the Class B designation. It is the driver's responsibility to understand and comply with the Class B requirements. Officers from the Green County Sheriff's Department and from the Wisconsin State Patrol will be enforcing the limitations on behalf of the Town.

The Board believes that this approach is a balanced one that will help to preserve the roads without inflicting undue limitations on users of the road. Citizens or truckers wishing further

TOWN ENFORCES CLASS B ROADS

At the May 12 meeting of Brooklyn Township, the board implemented action toward preserving the town's roads. In previous years, the town has always posted their roads as Class B to keep heavy traffic off because of surface thawing in the spring. Previously the posting has always been lifted after the weather settles; this year, the posting will stay!

With the help of Deputy Randy Teutschmann of the Green County Sheriff's Department and approval of the board, the intent of the enforcement began on the 28 Class B town roads. Deputy Teutschmann and Green Co. has been and is now patrolling the town's roads. He has already fined a trucker traveling on Amidon Road. A driver of a loaded milk truck was fined \$2,800. This sounds "pretty stiff," but he failed to obey the posted sign. There was no sympathy given. It's understood, every trucker knows what a Class B sign means.

The town roads are not made as strong as county and state roads, nor are they as wide; wear on the edges occurs. A Class A road can tolerate up to 73,000 pounds, while Class B can only hold up to 49,000. A fully loaded mixing

truck can weigh up to 73,000 pounds. Did you know one loaded semi can weigh up to 80,000 pounds versus 4,000 cars?

This action is necessary to keep the roads from getting worse. There is very little money for road repair; the town is facing two assessments this year. It's the town's taxpayers who have to pay the bills for repairs. The roads are not designed to hold up under heavy traffic. If there is not a delivery on that road, the trucks are required to stay off! No short-cuts are going to be allowed as in the past! If they have to make deliveries, a permit has to be obtained from the town.

It was promised that Amidon Road would be redone after it was used as a detour a few years ago when the bridge was put in on Highway 92. That was never realized! Now it is being abused again! Amidon is not the only road used as a shortcut and heavy traffic; Sandy Hook Road gets more than its share of overload traffic too.

The "Class B" posting is already active in Clarno Township.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that there be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the Town, if one has not already been established, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the Town may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund. Within the debt service fund, there be and there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Account for Promissory Note dated

_____", which account shall be used solely for the purpose of paying principal of and interest on said note. There shall be deposited in said account any accrued interest paid on said note at the time it is delivered to the Lender, all money raised by taxation or appropriated pursuant hereto, and such other sums as may be necessary to pay principal and interest on said note when the same shall become due.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the proceeds of said note shall be used solely for the purposes for which it is issued, but may be temporarily invested until needed in legal investments, provided that no such investment shall be in such a manner as would cause said note to be an "arbitrage bond" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or the Regulations of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue thereunder; and an officer of the Town, charged with the responsibility for issuing the note, shall certify by use of an arbitrage certificate that, on the basis of the facts, estimates and circumstances in existence on the date of the delivery of the note, it is not expected that the proceeds will be used in a manner that would cause said note to be an "arbitrage bond."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the projects financed by the note and their ownership, management and use will not cause the note to be a "private activity bond" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and that the Town shall comply with the provisions of the Code to the extent necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the interest on the note.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Clerk shall keep records for the registration and for the transfer of the note. The person in whose name the note shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on the note shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid. The note may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by presentation of the note at the office of the Town Clerk, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his legal representative duly authorized in writing. Upon such presentation the note shall be transferred by appropriate entry in the registration records and a similar notation, including date of registration, name of new registered owner and signature of the Town Clerk, shall be made on such note.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the note is hereby designated as a "qualified tax-exempt obligation" for purposes of Section 265 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, relating to the ability of financial institutions to deduct from income for federal income tax purposes, interest expense that is allocable to carrying and acquiring tax-exempt obligations.³

- (b) Work on the Project will proceed with due diligence to completion and the allocation of the proceeds of the Obligation to expenditures on the Project will proceed with due diligence.
- (c) 100% of the proceeds of the Obligation will be expended for Project costs within 3 years from the date hereof.
- (d) The Project will not be sold or otherwise disposed of in whole or in part, prior to the last maturity of the Obligation.
- (e) The Municipality has general taxing powers, all of the net proceeds of the Obligation are to be used for local government activities of the Municipality and the aggregate face amount of all tax-exempt obligations issued by the Municipality and all subordinate entities (1) of the Municipality in the current calendar year will not exceed \$5,000,000 (2). Therefore, the rebate requirements of federal arbitrage law are not applicable to the Municipality and the Obligation. (3)
- (f) None of the proceeds of the Obligation are being invested in investments having a substantially guaranteed yield for a period of four years or more.

2. In the case of a refunding:

- (a) The obligations being refunded will be discharged within 30 days of the date hereof;
- (b) There are no remaining original or investment proceeds of the obligations being refunded, so that there are no "transferred proceeds" with respect to the Obligation.

No payment of the principal or interest on the Obligations will be made (directly or indirectly, to the Municipality or any other party) from trade or business use of the proceeds or will be otherwise secured by or derived from property used in a trade or business or payments in respect of such property. No part of the projects financed by the Obligations (the "Projects") is or will be owned by persons other than the Municipality. There are and will be no leases, management or incentive payment contracts, take-or-pay or other output contracts or similar arrangements between the Municipality and any nongovernmental person with respect to the Projects. 2. The Municipality has designated the Obligations as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" for purposes of Section 265 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 relating to the ability of financial institutions to deduct, for federal income tax purposes, interest expense allocable to carrying or acquiring municipal obligations. The aggregate principal amount of tax-exempt governmental obligations issued by the Municipality and all subordinate entities in the current calendar year (including obligations issued on behalf of 501(c)(3) corporations) will not exceed \$10,000,000. (2) (3) (4)

3. The payment of principal or interest with respect to the Obligations will not be guaranteed, either directly or indirectly, in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency or instrumentality thereof. None of the proceeds of the Obligations will be (i) used in making loans the payment of principal or interest with respect to which are to be guaranteed, in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency or instrumentality thereof, or (ii) invested directly or indirectly in federally insured deposits or accounts, except for proceeds invested during permitted temporary periods or in the debt service fund for the Obligations or as otherwise permitted under Section 149(b)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

4. Any expenditures already paid by the Municipality for which the Municipality is to be reimbursed with proceeds of the Obligations (a) were paid no more than 60 days before the date on which the Municipality adopted the resolution authorizing the issuance of Obligations to finance the Projects or stating its intention to reimburse itself from the proceeds of the Obligations for any expenditures relating to the Projects which it paid from other funds of the Municipality prior to receipt of the proceeds of the Obligations, or (b) are preliminary expenditures relating to the Projects (such as architectural, engineering, surveying, soil test and similar costs but not including land acquisition, site preparation and similar costs incident to the commencement of construction) which are in an amount which is less than 20% of the issue price of the portion of the Obligations which relates to those Projects. 

REGISTRATION PROVISIONS

This note shall be registered in registration records kept by the Town Clerk of the Town of BROOKLYN, Wisconsin, such registration to be noted in the registration blank below and upon said registration records, and this note may thereafter be transferred only upon presentation of a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Town Clerk duly executed by the Registered Owner or his attorney, such transfer to be made on such records and endorsed hereon.

- (1) The purpose of this certification is to demonstrate that the Obligations are not "private activity bonds". If they are, they are subject to additional requirements and restrictions if they can be issued on a tax-exempt basis at all. Banks are advised to obtain legal assistance before proceeding with a loan in such case. Common examples of arrangements which can result in private activity bond status are the sale or lease of property to private parties, reserved capacity arrangements or other special arrangements regarding sewage treatment facilities, leases or management contracts with respect to hospitals, airports or similar enterprises, or development agreements in tax increment projects.
- (2) Subordinate entities include entities deriving their issuing authority from the Municipality or subject to substantial control by the Municipality (e.g., a municipal water or sewerage commission or housing authority).

- (3) Private activity bonds (such as "industrial development bonds") do not count toward the \$10,000,000 limitation; however, obligations issued on behalf of 501(c)(3) corporations (commonly hospitals or nursing homes) do count toward the \$10,000,000 limit.
- (4) If this certification cannot be made, banks will not be entitled to deduct, for federal income tax purposes, interest expense that is allocable to carrying or acquiring the Obligations.
- (5) The purpose of this certification is to demonstrate that the Municipality has complied with the federal reimbursement regulations. These regulations limit the ability of a municipality to use the proceeds of a tax-exempt borrowing to reimburse itself for expenditures previously made on a project. In general, proceeds of a tax-exempt borrowing cannot be used to reimburse expenditures made more than 60 days before adoption of a resolution indicating intent to reimburse those expenditures or issue tax-exempt obligations for the project, unless the expenditures fit into the "preliminary expenditure" exception.
- (6) This certificate should be dated the date that payment for the Obligations is actually received.

Town of Brooklyn: May 28, 1997 Meeting Minutes

Present were Chairman Jim Scrivner, Supervisors Herb Hanson and Bob McNeely, and Treasurer Marie Ross. Town employee Brian Smith and three other town residents were also present.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Scrivner at 8:02 p.m. and the Public Notice was accepted as read by him. A motion was made and seconded to appoint Eileen Scrivner as temporary clerk to take the minutes of this meeting.

Bills: Presented bills were reviewed and discussed. It was decided that Marie will review Mobil Fleet payments to ascertain the Town is current in payments, and to add item #19 to the list--reimbursement to Bob McNeely, New Officers' Seminar, \$40. A motion was made by H. Hanson to pay the bills as amended. Motion seconded by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

Tractor Purchase: Discussion centered around the purchase price and trade-in, interest rates, free finance vs. municipality discount and whether the tractor can be purchased within the 10% override decided upon at a previous meeting. It was decided that B McNeely will check on a finalized purchase price and J. Scrivner will contact Union Bank, Brooklyn for a short-term note interest rate for the Town. After discussion, the following motion was made by H. Hanson: To amend the approved action taken by the Board at the 5/12 meeting so that the 10 percent flexibility in the purchase of the 72HP Case IH for \$16,109 will include finance costs and any additional costs in the purchase of that tractor, and that the Town Chairman be authorized to obtain the best financing from lending institutions. Motion seconded by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

During further discussion it was recommended that the new tractor bucket be reinforced on the sides and underneath to increase its strength before use, which may be possible within approved budgetary allocations.

Weight Limits: Discussion centered around posted Class B weight limits on all town roads and the best possible way to notify the public what those signs mean. After discussion it was decided that Brian will check on prices to add "Local pick-up and delivery exempt" signs to the 28 Class B signs now posted. It was also decided that a press release will be written up and provided to various local newspapers so the public will be aware of what the signs mean and a write-up included in the next town newsletter. Chairman Scrivner will also speak with the officer who issued a citation for a weight limit violation.

Ditching: Brooklyn-Albany Road: The Board received an update on the progress of the ditching plans. The Town of Albany Board will be invited to attend the Town of Brooklyn Board Meeting on June 9 to discuss plans for smooth completion of the project. A public notice on the meeting will be posted.

Town Attorney: J. Scrivner read a letter from Attorney Dan Floeter in which he stated that he is leaving private practice effective May 31, 1997 for an appointment as a Dane County Family Court Commissioner. Attorney John Kisiel will remain in private practice. After discussion J. Scrivner made a motion that John Kisiel remain as our Town Attorney, seconded by H. Hanson. Carried unanimously.

Miscellaneous: The Town's regular monthly meeting will be held on June 16 and will be posted. Treasurer Marie Ross requested that she receive copies of handouts also.

A motion was made by B. McNeely to adjourn the meeting at 9:32 p.m., seconded by H. Hanson. Carried unanimously.

RE: WEIGHT LIMITS ON TOWN OF BROOKLYN, GREEN COUNTY, ROADS

At the direction of the citizens at the 1997 Annual Town meeting the Town of Brooklyn Board of Supervisors has been working to implement measures to preserve the Town's single most valuable (and costly) asset - the 43+ miles of town roads in the Town.

The system of town roads was designed, built and has been maintained to bear traffic at a volume and individual vehicle weight typical of the past. Recent increases in both traffic volume and vehicle weight have put increasing pressure on the roads resulting in premature deterioration and breakup. At a recent Towns' Association meeting, members of the Board learned that an 80,000 pound truck (a full quad axle dump or milk truck or semi, for example) inflicts the same amount of wear and tear as 4,000 cars.

As a preservation measure while other or additional measures are being considered , the Board has chosen to designate all town roads as "**CLASS B HIGHWAYS**" consistent with definitions in the Wisconsin law. The Board has also chosen to allow an **exemption** for vehicles making **LOCAL PICK-UPS AND DELIVERIES** to sites within the Town, *but only when they are using a route that involves the least amount of travel on Town of Brooklyn roads.*

In simple terms, the Class B designation limits the weight of vehicles to 60% of their licensed Class A weight. The exemption for local pickup and delivery allows vehicles to travel at their full Class A licensed weight when they are making local pickups or deliveries.. Thus, local pickups and deliveries at Class A weights are allowed for such activities as hauling milk, produce, livestock, feed, seed, fertilizer, machinery and construction materials (examples - not intended to be an all-inclusive list).

The exemption reflects the Board's desire to not interfere with normal commerce and development by residents and landowners (that is - taxpayers) in the Town while at the same time limiting the use of town roads as "shortcuts" for those large trucks traveling through, but not having specific business in, the town.

All Town roads have been properly posted to notify truckers of the Class B designation. It is the driver's responsibility to understand and comply with the Class B requirements. Officers from the Green County Sheriff's Department and from the Wisconsin State Patrol will be enforcing the limitations on behalf of the Town.

The Board believes that this approach is a balanced one that will help to preserve the roads without inflicting undue limitations on users of the road. June 9, 1997 Regular Monthly Meeting Minutes

The June monthly meeting was held on Monday, June 12, 1997 at 7:30 PM at the Town Hall in Brooklyn. In attendance were Chairman Jim Scrivner, Supervisor Bob McNeely, Treasurer Marie Ross, and Clerk Judy Follett. Town employee Brian Smith was also present.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Scrivner. The Public Notice was read by the clerk. The notice was accepted as read.

Brooklyn-Albany Road Ditching

As the only item on the agenda was the Brooklyn-Albany Road ditching, the Town of Albany board had been invited to attend along with the residents of that road. Chairman Scrivner asked all those people to introduce themselves: Albany Chairman Wesley Krepke, Supervisors Fred Baertschi and Bob Bump; Road residents Terry & Darlene Brewer, Lyman Fusion, and Burdell Trow. Two other residents were also present.

Bob McNeely began the discussion telling of the joint road between the townships - it is just over 4 miles long. Albany Chairman Krepke was asked to describe the work to be done: Blacktop 1 to 1.10 mile on the west end of the road - wedge / full overlay over it. Ditching where necessary. Roads will be shouldered with gravel.

There is a water problem at the T. Brewer home, east of their buildings - the water goes over the road. Do ditch work there to alleviate that problem. Krepke wanted to bury a 10 foot culvert upright in the ground, to be capped except when the frost is still on the ground, to drain water faster. Scrivner was concerned about the upright culvert - will it be acceptable to the regulatory authorities? Darlene Brewer then said the water point is only 20 feet deep. (House water) Terry Brewer suggested a berm to control the water. A plow can be used to build the berm. There will be two berms - along road and along the house. There is corn planted in the field - at least one row of corn will be lost. This is okay with the Brewers but let them know ahead of time when the work will be done. A 12" by 30' culvert will be needed.

Trow Road - Water also goes over the road here. Dig ditch and go east with the water there. That is close to Attica Road where the water comes out. The driveways there will need a culvert or the water will go into the field. One home has a culvert, if it can be cleaned out then a new one need not be purchased. West of Trow Road (on North side) a ditch will be dug.

Dan Kinney property - 2 gateways to be lowered, Kinney told Krepke to do the necessary work, but it was unsure if he will put a culvert in.

Lyman Fusion - Front yard ditch will be dug. Mr. Fusion noted that the snowplow throws rocks into the ditch as it comes around the corner. Please notify him if a new culvert will be necessary.

Where Attica Road comes out (Horn east fence line & Trow west fence line) - If water is drained to the East, culverts will be needed or water will drain into the fields. This affects 2 driveways. Land owners will need culverts or lose access to land. Size needed: 15" to 18".

Seeding: Per Brian Smith, the town has been responsible for seeding in the past. Lawn seed is used as it takes hold better.

A motion was made by B. McNeely: Commitments from the Town of Brooklyn in regard to the work to be done on the Brooklyn-Albany Road:

1. Brian Smith will use the truck to help haul dirt away.
 2. Seed the ditch and roadside berm on the Brooklyn side.
- J. Scrivner seconded. Carried unanimously.

Culverts: The Township will contact residents and give them the prices for the culverts. The \$25 truck charge will be prorated among the residents for the number of culverts on the truck.

Culvert prices quoted at the meeting: 12" \$5.27/foot; 15" \$6.13/foot; 18" \$7.08/foot; 24" \$9.16/ft.

If problems come up, residents were told to call Bob McNeely.

B. McNeely made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 8:20 PM. J. Scrivner seconded. Carried unanimously.

This special meeting was held on Monday, June 16, 1997 at 7:30 PM at the Town Hall in Brooklyn. In attendance were Chairman Jim Scrivner, Supervisors Herb Hanson and Bob McNeely, Treasurer Marie Ross, and Clerk Judy Follett. Town employee Brian Smith and 6 town residents were also present.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Scrivner. The Public Notice was accepted as read by the clerk. All joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes of meetings 5/12/97 & 5/28/97 were reviewed and approved on a motion by H. Hanson and seconded by J. Scrivner. Carried unanimously.

Bills. Added June 1st payment of truck for \$28,663.01. H. Hanson made a motion to pay bills as amended. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Treasurer's Report. M. Ross read the Treasurer's report. (Clerk will update budget for next meeting & reconcile Treasurer's report. H. Hanson made motion to approve Report. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Dept. of Revenue:

Michael Couillard introduced himself, a Supervisor of Equalization, and William Kranzusch, a Property Assessment Specialist (Senior Appraiser). He noted the assessors present: Gregory Gardiner of the reassessment firm and Jerry Coplien, the town's 1997 assessor and also the fill-in for 1996 (to sign the assessment roll). Green Co. Treasurer Mavis Robertson was also present. Her presence being to keep the county informed.

The direct participants in the reassessment, W. Kranzusch, J. Coplien, and G. Gardiner took an oath of office from the Clerk.

Mr. Couillard: Outline presented tonight: 1. DOR Supervision, 2. Procedures to be followed, and 3. Communication to be provided to the Town.

A 'Procedures for Supervising Assessments' handout was given to the Board. A copy of the DOR contract with the Gardiner Assessment Firm was also given to the Board. There are specific steps for the Gardiner Firm to follow. Mr. Kranzusch will periodically prepare a report for the town to keep the Board updated on the progress of the reassessment. All work should be completed by Nov. 1, 1997.

There will be a Board of Corrections instead of a Board of Review. DOR appointed personnel will be sitting on the board along with the Clerk Judy Follett. Judy will perform normal clerk duties but will be a non-voting member.

Jerry Coplien turned over the assessment records to the Gardiner Firm. The DOR gave them confidential tax documents including Transfer returns of the last three year's sales of property, 1994, 95, & 96 (for market studies) and the last two years of Equity reports which show the relationship of current assessments to those sale prices.

W. Kranzusch will schedule regular meeting times with the Gardiner Firm so that the DOR will be satisfied that the work is being done to their satisfaction. This will happen one time or more per month. Mr. Kranzusch will start the process with the assessor to be sure the procedures / materials / and methods are up to the quality expected.

The DOR asks the Town to provide:

1. Office space for assessor staff
2. Telephones and desks
3. Access to records
4. Individual Identification of property, legal descriptions, labels of assessment roll (CSM maps / aerial photo maps if necessary)
5. 2 sets of maps
6. Provide notices of assessments
7. Provide names and addresses where notices must be sent.
8. Schedule the Town Hall (so there will be no conflicts)

The Gardiner Firm will contact the Green Co. Sheriff's Dept. regarding the personnel performing the reassessments and the vehicles they will be driving.

DOR concerns:

Review first for Classification. Once classified, then need key determinant of how property valued.

Looking Back to 1996 - status of property at that time. Will need to rely on town board for information about changes, also rely on property owners.

When the assessment is complete, the tax will be determined after the Board of Corrections is complete. The 1996 tax reconciliation will be completed by the town clerk. It was unsure at the meeting, but the 96 charge or credit may be a 'special charge' on the 1997 tax bill to the current owner.

The DOR recommends the following when a specific question is asked:

1. Call the assessor's office.
2. See publication: Guide to Property Owners
3. See publication: Appeal Guide

These guides may be ordered for distribution to the general public.

At 8:55 H. Hanson made a motion to adjourn the meeting. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

June 17, 1997 Meeting Minutes

This special meeting held in conjunction with the Dept. of Revenue was held on Tuesday, June 17, 1997 at 7:30 PM at the Town Hall in Brooklyn. In attendance were Chairman Jim Scrivner, Supervisors Herb Hanson and Bob McNeely, Treasurer Marie Ross, and Clerk Judy Follett. In addition to several town residents, also attending were DOR representatives: Michael Couillard, William Kranzusch, and Gene Miller, Green Co. Treasurer Mavis Robertson, Brooklyn assessor Jerry Coplien, and the reassessment assessor Gregory Gardiner.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Scrivner. The Public Notice was accepted as read by the clerk. Chairman Scrivner stated that the notice had been posted in the official public buildings, it had been published in the Leader, and he had also sent a letter about the meeting to Don Luchsinger, the first signature on the petition. All joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Chairman Scrivner explained:

John Rader, Administrator, Division of State and Local Finance, had issued a Supplemental Order for a reassessment for the Town of Brooklyn for the year 1996 and the Dept. of Revenue representatives are here tonight to begin that process.

97 Roadwork Per Brian Smith

1. Crack filling on Alpine Road
2. Crack filling on Legler Road
3. Seal coating on Krause Road (1.2 miles)
4. 200' on Brooklyn-Albany Road are bad
5. Wedging on Amidon Road is bad; Benson to T is the worst part.

We are by passing work on Freidig Road and Behnke Road. These roads can't be repaired, they must be replaced.

It was noted that crack filling should be done when the weather is between 45 - 65 degrees. (They are closed up in the hot weather.)

Bids. Bids were received from 2 companies and also Green County.

1. Albany Materials (Alpine & Legler Roads crack filling only.)
2. B.R. Amon
3. Green County (Estimate only) (See bids for details.)

If we are spending over \$30,000 on this project, the contractor must pay prevailing wage rates. J. Scrivner will look into this wage rate condition. Bids were discussed. Question was raised about cost differences between B.R. Amon and the County. B. McNeely will look into the comparisons of these two bids.

Motion was made by H. Hanson to accept the B.R. Amon Bid for:

1. Crack filling on Alpine and Legler Roads.
2. Seal coating on Krause Road.
3. Seal coating on Brooklyn-Albany Road.

Second by McNeely. Discussion: These are the first four priorities. The Brooklyn Albany Road will take a lot of hot mix to fix (per Brian). The Green Co. bid shows too little mix. The crack filling should be done in 45 to 65 degree weather. Question whether Amon will be back in the fall. Also, prevailing rate must be met. The motion was amended that the crack filling be done in 45 to 65 degree weather. Carried unanimously.

The wedging on Amidon Road will be decided when the Board has a budget update.

GTE notice to bury telephone cables. H. Hanson made a motion to let GTE bury the cables contingent upon their restoring the roads. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Tractor purchase. B. McNeely described the new tractor we have purchased. The Bank of Brooklyn will give the Town a short term loan. Also, the old White tractor has been picked up.

Weight Limit Update. A press release was given to the following newspapers: Oregon, Evansville, Belleville, and Brodhead. It will be included in the next newsletter. The cost of additional signs: not to exceed \$7 per sign. H. Hanson made a motion to pick up signs for 'Local Pick up and Delivery'. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Ditching - Brooklyn-Albany Road. B. McNeely gave a review of the June 9, 1997 meeting.

Official Newspaper. Suggestions: Evansville, Brodhead, Monroe Times. J. Scrivner will get rate cards and analyze the costs.

Driveway Permits.

1. Carl Ihm. County Hwy. E. Motion by Hanson to approve with 24" x 30' culvert. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.
2. Gordon & Susan Goodspeed Miller. County Hwy. E. This is a joint driveway - all is in compliance with ordinance. Motion by McNeely to approve with a 18" x 30' culvert. Scrivner seconded. Carried unanimously.
3. Richard Gullick. 280' west on Elmer Road. 30' by 18" culvert required. Motion by McNeely to approve. Hanson seconded. Carried unanimously.

Brian Smith was asked to pick up the culverts.

Planning Commission. No report. They are educating the new members at this time.

Alcohol / Cigarette Licenses.

1. Brooklyn Sportsman Club. Class B Beer License. Motion made by Hanson to approve. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.
2. River Bends Tavern. Cigarette License, Class B Beer & Class B Liquor License. Motion made by Hanson to approve. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Attached is a letter from our assessor. I have followed up with him as to the meaning of this. I have also talked with Attorney Kisiel who confirms that this is work that must be done. Mr. Coplien explains as follows:

Item 1 is work that must be done by 1/1/98 (thus during 1997). This involves correcting all legal descriptions for all parcels to put land with town roads on that parcel in a separate category. The actual clerical work can't be done until the 1996 and 1997 rolls are done which means in a very short time frame after November 1, 1997. This is in part due to the fact that all parcel cards will be in the care, custody and control of the Gardiner firm until after the Board of Corrections. This was not anticipated in his initial pricing since he was of the understanding it would be done as part of the reassessment. Because of the tight time frame, he will have to hire extra staff to get the job done.

- Item 2 is work to bring the 1996 assessment up to date for the year. As you will recall, the reassessment is as of 1/1/96. This involves factoring in all building permits, splits, calculations, and a final report for things occurring after 1/1/96 but before the books are officially closed for 1996. As with item 1, much of this can't be done until the reassessment is completed (target - 11/1/97).

Since there is no Town Clerk for the Township I am taking this opportunity to write this letter to you regarding the Supplementary Order from the Wisconsin Department of Revenue. I assume that you have received your copy which states that the Gardiner Appraisal Service firm will be doing the real property and that I must do the personal property.

The State contacted me on this and advised that I would need to sign the tax roll as of January 96 as Assessor and also attend the open book and board of review sessions. July 14, 1997 Meeting Minutes

The July monthly meeting was held on Monday, July 14, 1997 at 7:30 PM at the Town Hall in Brooklyn. In attendance were Chairman Jim Scrivner, Supervisors Herb Hanson and Bob McNeely, and Clerk Judy Follett. Treasurer Marie Ross was absent. There were 3 town residents also present.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Scrivner. The Public Notice was accepted as read by the clerk. All joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes of meetings 6/9/97, 6/16/97, 6/17/97 were reviewed and approved on a motion by H. Hanson and seconded by B. McNeely. Discussion: J. Scrivner corrected cost of signs & culvert requirements on driveway permits. Everyone in agreement. Carried unanimously.

Assessor Contract Amendment. Assessor Jerry Coplien was present to answer questions about the increase of his fees for the year 1996. This is due to the DOR reassessment date set at 1/1/96. J. Scrivner read the informational memo he wrote to the board explaining Mr. Coplien's request. (Mr. Coplien's letter and J. Scrivner's memo are attached.) **Item 1:** No longer applicable as the Gardiner Firm doing the reassessment will be correcting the legal descriptions for all parcels to put land with town roads on that parcel in a separate category. **Item 2:** To bring the 1996 assessment up to date, including an open book and a board of review for a fee of \$6,000. Mr. Coplien explained the fee would be for actual services up to \$6,000. When asked to explain how he came up with the fee of \$6,000, Mr. Coplien stated that this work will not fall within his normal work flow as property cards won't be available until after Nov. 1st. The time frame to complete the work will be very tight. (The current year's contract with Mr. Coplien will not change.) Motion by J. Scrivner to approve actual billing for maintenance, open book, and board of review for 1996, not to exceed \$6,000, to Coplien Appraisal Service - to be paid in 1998. Seconded by H. Hanson. Carried unanimously.

Bills. After discussion of the bills, H. Hanson made a motion to pay bills as presented, including the hand written items. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Treasurer's Report. J. Follett read the Treasurer's report. H. Hanson made motion to approve Report. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Updated budget numbers were given to the board. The clerk was asked to detail the Highway labor by month through the current month.

97 Road Work. Repair work on Amidon Road: B. McNeely and Brian Smith did not get the comparison of the bids between B. R. Amon and Green County cleared up. J. Scrivner asked that Brian and B. McNeely or H. Hanson get together with Amon to get the complete information. (i.e. Fix entire road or just the worst part.) Use top figure of \$20,000. B. McNeely suggested to use the \$20,000 from County T to where the money is used up and then complete the rest of the repair next year. When he has the necessary information, Brian Smith will call J. Follett. J. Follett will relate the information to the board. Motion by B. McNeely that H. Hanson and Brian Smith meet with Amon; take the \$20,000 allotted and start repairs at County T and go as far as the \$20,000 will allow. J. Scrivner seconded. Discussion: H. Hanson concerned about what to do if Amon has problems with this. Motion carried unanimously.

Misc. Road Repair. B. McNeely concerned about:

1. Hot patch repairs done by B. Smith. RE: Rent expense and time.
2. Side of road break-up. How are we fixing?
3. Chipping
4. Spraying - What is legal?

These items will be brought up as agenda items in a future meeting.

Road Sign at Davis residence on Mortensen Road. The home is just over the crest of a hill. Eastbound visibility is okay, but visibility for westbound traffic is not okay. The question is whether a sign should be posted for safety. Two sign suggestions are 1. School bus stop ahead; and/or 2. Limited sight distance. H. Hanson felt the Davis' should come to a town meeting before the town commits to spending funds for a sign. Further discussion followed on the pros and cons of erecting a sign. B. McNeely made a motion to put sign(s) up. J. Scrivner seconded. Motion passed with two yes (McNeely & Scrivner) & one no (Hanson).

Equipment Repair - Truck. The truck may possibly need a complete overhaul. This work was originally to be done by Frank Raemisch. As Raemisch will not have time for the repair till October, B. McNeely will ask Tom Martinson for an estimate of time and money to fix the truck. He will also find out if the truck is covered under any warranty. McNeely will also get information from Brian Smith for fees that F. Raemisch was going to charge so that a comparison between the two may be made. This information will be communicated to the clerk who will then call Scrivner and Hanson

Damrow Lawsuit. Trial is set for Thursday 7/17/97 at 9 AM in Monroe. Town Attorney J. Kisiel believes the trial may be postponed till after Sept. 1st but he will not know for sure until Tuesday 7/15/97.

Reassessment Update. The reassessment firm, Gardiner Appraisal Service, met with interested residents on Tuesday, July 8th. The assessing process was explained and a question and answer session followed. J. Scrivner commented that the firm appeared professional and accommodating. Steve Miller said he gave them his phone number so an appointment could be set up, but the assessor never called. J. Scrivner will call the Gardiner firm to get an explanation.

New Driveway Application Form/Process. J Scrivner is working on a new form. It will be an agenda item for the August meeting.

Driveway and Field Road Access Applications.

1. Gene Meyer. Mortensen Road. Motion by H. Hanson to approve with 18"x 30' culvert contingent on land division approval and payment of fees. B. McNeely seconded. Carried Unanimously.
2. Vicki & Tom Mertens. King Road. Field Road Access. Motion by B. McNeely to reject as the access road does not meet criteria for a standard driveway/access road. H. Hanson seconded. Carried unanimously. J. Scrivner will send a letter of rejection to the Mertens along with a copy of the driveway ordinance.
3. Dahlman Street in Attica. Unknown if this is a town road. The board must get further details.

Misc.: Driveway permits go with the land, not the person obtaining the permit.

Planning Commission Report by Harriet Tolly. Land division: Preliminary approval has been given for: G. Meyer: 'B', with contingencies. Preliminary approval has also been given to Flood: 'A'. The Land Division ordinance "Order / Editing" revision is almost complete. Under discussion: Property frontage must be 200'; What should be the depth requirement? Commission members are getting information from other townships.

Safety Committee Report by Steve Miller. New appointments: Chairman: Steve Miller; Secretary: John Marx. Reported on Evansville preliminary ordinance to charge residents when the fire department is called. Discussion of ramifications of a charge like this when Town is supported by four different fire departments. Steve Miller stated that Brooklyn township needs an ordinance for future use. The committee will do the ground work in obtaining information from other districts.

Recycling Report by Gwen Hay. Information needed for DNR.

1. Need approximate weight per yardage from Waste Management.
2. H. Hanson will ask Brian Smith and Jerry Tilley to get receipts for weight for the recycled material.

Misc. Tuesday nights are getting busier at the recycling center.

Other information. J. Scrivner has loan papers from the Bank for the tractor. Interest charge is 6 1/4 %.

H. Hanson will talk to Brian Smith about removing the containment tanks from the Town Hall/Garage area. Thanks to Bob Abella for transcribing 13 hours of tape for town attorney John Kisiel.

H. Hanson made a motion to adjourn at 10:21 PM. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

August 11, 1997 Meeting Minutes

The August monthly meeting was held on Monday, August 11, 1997 at 7:30 PM at the Town Hall in Brooklyn. In attendance were Chairman Jim Scrivner, Supervisors Herb Hanson and Bob McNeely, Treasurer Marie Ross and Clerk Judy Follett.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Scrivner. The Public Notice was accepted as read by the clerk. All joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes of meeting 7/14/97 were reviewed - B. McNeely stated that a correction needs to be made to state that the town is covered by four fire departments. Approved on a motion by H. Hanson and seconded by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

Bills. After discussion of the bills, H. Hanson made a motion to pay bills as presented. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Treasurer's Report & Clerk's Reconciliation. H. Hanson made motion to accept Report. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously. H. Hanson made motion to accept Reconciliation. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Updated budget numbers were given to the board.

97 Road Work. Amidon Road bid: Green Co. bid was lower than Amon's bid because their repair was 'one inch to one & one-half inch' before compaction and the Amon bid was one & one-half inch after compaction.

Amon completed the repair work on Amidon Road (\$20,000.) The work was started at County Hwy. T and they worked westward till the \$20,000 was used up.

The crack filling repairs for Alpine Road and Legler Road has not yet been done. Amon will try to complete it this fall.

The Board discussed that in the future, bids sent out for road repairs should contain stated specifications so that they may more easily compare the bids that are received. The bids received would also be more accurate. It was noted that Green County would still be an estimate.

The Board would like to come up with the 1998 road repair specifications for the 1998 budget. In the fall we will call a special meeting and the Board members will go out and view town roads. May possibly go out with the County expert and then use this information to set priorities.

GTE repair work on Mortensen Road. Repair lightening damage. Motion by H. Hanson to allow repairs. Seconded by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

Hidden driveway signs on Mortensen Road: 'School Bus Stop Ahead' sign is installed - 'Hidden Driveway' sign is on order.

Loss of Street signs & other Criminal activity. We are losing many street signs in the Township. We lost four over the past weekend. Some are being pulled out and others are being broken off. The signs most often taken are Stop signs and Stop Ahead signs. This is creating a very dangerous situation at some intersections. H. Hanson has stated that he would be willing to visit area High Schools to talk to the students.

Gas was stolen from a resident over a two week period.

Two vehicles on Amidon Road have been stolen.

In the next newsletter residents will be asked to report all criminal incidents that they see to the Green Co. Sheriff's department.

Brooklyn-Albany Road Work. Not much ditching has been done yet. Mr. Bump of the Albany Town Bd. has said that he didn't know when more would get done. Amon is paving the road. The only culvert needed will be for the Brewer's. Also, Brian Smith will open an existing culvert.

Spraying of Township Roads. Discussion of spraying weeds on the roadsides. We do not spray at this time. Brooklyn may have a problem with weeds in a few years. Milk haulers say their tanks are getting scratched now. We need to find someone to educate the Board on the legalities of weed spraying.

Equipment Repair - Truck. B. McNeely contacted Tom Martinson. Tom recommended an in-frame overhaul. He suggested that we take the truck back to Trucks Inc. where the prior work has been done. His reasoning for this is that if, during snow months, the truck's rear goes out, Trucks Inc. may not make the repair a priority if they had not done the engine work. As this repair may be expensive, there was a lengthy discussion - RE: Where to get the repair done; Cost; Warranty; Extent of repair to authorize.

J. Scrivner made a motion to repair the truck at a factory authorized dealer with the appropriate level of warranty. B. McNeely seconded. Discussion: Have dealer use best judgment to fix. Motion was amended by Scrivner to state: Repair up to and including an In-frame overhaul. Motion carried unanimously.

Planning Commission Report by Harriet Tolly. Presented land division on County Hwy. E for Kenneth Flood, a five acre parcel with 200' of frontage. Motion by J. Scrivner to approve as proposed. H. Hanson seconded. Carried unanimously.

Green Co. Land Use Task Force. J. Scrivner attended a meeting of the task force. This group, facilitated by Mike Jones, the County Extension Agent, includes the Green Co. Board chairman, some town board chairs, and some citizens from across the county. They were given one year to look at land use issues in Green County. They have been meeting for about 10 months. Their concerns are: Land Use and Farm Land Preservation. At this point, the task force is getting ready to present their findings in a report to the County. At the meeting, a

representative of each town gave a short presentation of their current land use situation (i.e. ordinances, committee status etc., concerns about annexation). J. Scrivner also stated that the Village of Brooklyn at one time only viewed land north of the village as an option for annexation, they now are more open to land in the Town of Brooklyn. Scrivner feels we should be aware of annexation issues. We need to be open to talking with the Village of Brooklyn. There is a statute called the '66/30 agreement' that permits government agencies to form cooperative ventures and share costs and liabilities.

A discussion of our land use followed. Our land use ordinance has two main jobs: 1) Preserving good farmland and 2) Limiting Density. We are better at limiting density than we are at preserving good farmland.

There is a Land Use meeting on 9/3 in Waukesha. There will be a whole coalition of groups attending to include villages, towns, and the farm bureau. Scrivner suggested that someone attend.

Buildings and Grounds. RE: Containment tanks. We have contacted Olin Oil but they have not yet removed the tanks. H. Hanson gave a history of the tanks and why we have them. Discussion of options to take to get rid of the tanks. H. Hanson made a motion to have the clerk send a letter to Olin Oil requiring the removal of the two storage tanks from the Town of Brooklyn hall property in thirty days. After thirty days, there will be a storage charge of \$20 per day. At the end of sixty days, if the tanks have not been removed, the township will have the tanks removed with the charge directly billed to Olin Oil. J. Scrivner seconded. Discussion: We will need to find someone to move the tanks. Where will we move them to? We could take them to the capped land fill that the town owns. What are the legal issues, get guidance from town attorney?

The motion then came up for a vote: Motion passed with two yes (Hanson and McNeely) and one no (Scrivner).

2nd issue: Olin Oil (Inserta-Kard Gas) statement shows a credit owed to town of \$841.91. Discussion followed as to confusion of where to send the checks - to Brodhead or to Indiana office. H. Hanson made a motion that he will go to Brodhead and talk to Ken Olin. Seconded by B. McNeely. Passed unanimously. The Clerk will contact the Brodhead office to get an accounting of all payments made to them. Marie Ross will go through her records and inform H. Hanson of all payments made to Olin.

The above motion concerning the letter to be sent to Olin Oil was amended by H. Hanson: Send letter to Olin Oil after H. Hanson meets with Ken Olin. Send letter by certified mail. Seconded by R. McNeely. Carried Unanimously.

Also, H. Hanson will contact the corporate Mobil Fleet office concerning the fleet charges.

Road Weight Updates. The Belleville Recorder has run the Town's Press Release.

B. McNeely brought to the attention of the board a situation concerning a local businessman, Roger Bergen. Mr. Bergen sells (and hauls) lime to farmers and he feels that not being able to use our class B roads to cross over into Rock County is causing him to go out of business. Mr. Bergen stated to McNeely that the condition of his truck makes him vulnerable to tickets if he travels on the class A highways. B. McNeely noted that Bergen's lime is of excellent quality. After discussion of the route that he takes, it was realized that it is only approximately two and one-half miles farther to stay on class A highways to reach his destinations. On his return, when his truck is empty, he may legally travel the class B roads. The Board recognizes that they are in a balancing act of working on behalf of the public good vs. the individual.

B. McNeely also informed the Board that the ticket received by milk hauler, Mark Arneson, was reduced to less than \$500. Mr. Arneson has changed his travel route.

Reassessment Update. Nothing new at this time. J. Scrivner has tried to reach assessors, but line has been busy.

Damrow Lawsuit. Have not heard anything new. Assume the trial was postponed till later date.

Driveway Applications.

1. Leo Long. Co. Hwy. E (1400' No. of Co. C). Motion by Hanson to approve with 18"x30' culvert and contingent on payment of fee. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

2. Vicki & Tom Mertens. Application was denied at July meeting. Scrivner has since gone out with county speed charts and with someone from the County. He feels there are two alternatives:

1. Put drive in where first requested as there is a 40 mile/hour curve and visibility of 265' should be okay.

2. Put driveway on the curve of the road where there will be 300' of visibility.

Motion by Hanson to put driveway on the curve of the road that will give the 300' of visibility needed to be in compliance with our ordinance. An 18" x 30' culvert is required. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

New Driveway Application Form/Process. J. Scrivner showed to the Board a draft of the new application form. He will go over the form with Attorney Kisiel. He asked for comments/suggestions from the Board.

Safety Committee Report by Bob McNeely.

Reported on Evansville preliminary ordinance to put unpaid fire call charges on the tax bill.

This is a very big issue with Evansville. Per Bob, Brooklyn township is the only town not taking action. The Evansville fire district has had 74 fire calls and only 21 have been paid. 1.7% is Brooklyn's share of the fire district. Per Hanson, we are in compliance with the existing contract. Evansville is not taking into consideration the rest of our township. He stated that our Board is responsible to all citizens. Scrivner stated that fees are different for each fire district. Also, he doesn't like being a bill collector for Evansville.

At this time, Hanson made a motion to suspend meeting time limit for this meeting. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

The Board needs to know what the other Fire Districts are planning to do. What are other townships with multiple fire districts doing?

B. McNeely made a motion to have town attorney Kisiel clean up the draft of the Evansville fire district user charge to put on the tax bill. Scrivner seconded. Discussion: If taxpayer doesn't pay, will town of Brooklyn have to pay? Appeal process? Scrivner would like to see an appeal process if we pass an ordinance. Evansville has an appeal process that could lower the bill to just a labor charge. Scrivner asked if we would end up with something like this sooner or later anyway? No answer at this time. Scrivner stated that we should get the process started as a show of good faith. Vote: Motion passed with two yes (Scrivner & McNeely) and one no (Hanson).

Recycling Report by Gwen Hay. The contract with Waste Management terminates Jan. 1, 1998. Gwen sought bids from Green Valley and BFI Waste Systems. Costs were compared. Gwen recommends Green Valley. Also presented was the State of WI recycling political news. See attached letter. J. Scrivner will work on looking at the cost comparisons for the next monthly meeting.

H. Hanson made a motion to appoint Sharon George to the Recycling Committee. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

B. McNeely made a motion to adjourn at 11:35 PM. J. Scrivner seconded. Carried unanimously.

RECYCLING REPORT: AUGUST 11, 1997

Question: In the year of 1997, what may prove more lucrative than a gold mine in South Africa? The answer is a trash company in the State of Wisconsin. My search of truth in trash took me down many dark alleys this past month. Foremost, I found Waste Management, Global and B.F.I. on the New York Stock Exchange. Waste has assets of 10 billion. According to Waste News and Forbes Magazine, Waste hopes to have 20 billion assets by the year, 2000. With headquarters in Houston, Texas, B.F.I. (Browning-Ferris) is growing with approximately 6 billion assets.

I found their competition in Superio Services (a holding company) and Green Valley (a local and family owned company). Superio takes trash in Minnesota, Michigan and Wisconsin.

Upon the birth of recycling in 1989 and the state ordered closure of 1995, we chose to close our excellently maintained land fill early. We had to find a hauler for our waste. Then, I investigated the Green County Landfill and was told we would have to pay back several years cost and share the expense of several law suits leaning towards them at the time. The town chose not to be a partner of these expenses.

The decision was made to go with Ruefs, a local company. Ruefs sold out to Waste Management. At that time, I had preferred to go with Green Valley but found we could not because we did not belong to Green County Landfill.

Times and conditions do change, so, now, I decided to check with Green Valley again. They no longer have the restriction of belonging to the Green County Landfill as a requirement. They are not limited just to Green County, but now, have several other sources. Green Valley takes plastic 1 through 7. The other companies only take 1 through 2. Recyclables do not have to be separated at our center. They are dumped at their sources on conveyer belts and separated. I asked about broken glass and mixing colors of glass, which we have been told not to do. Green Valley says, "no problem", they have a market for broken glass!

Browning-Ferris (B.F.I.) and Waste Management ^{have} fought hard in the beginning to kill our recycling law, which Senator Spencer Black has worked so diligently to pass in the Wisconsin Legislator. They ^{have} have waiting in the wings. Waste Management filed in Federal Court in Chicago against Black's law to

keep out-of-state trash from coming to Wisconsin. Waste claimed, it interfered with state commerce (Inneerate) laws. Since then, Illinois has closed all of their land fills. Black worked to fill that loop hole. The appellate court ruling was not a total loss. The judges said Wisconsin could pass a constitutional ban on unrecycled out-of-state trash. Then along comes Senator Mary Panzer of West Bend, a member of the Joint Finance Committee. She sponsored the proposed change in the law. They want to take away the state's control and give it to individual communities. The land fill lobby finally got their way. Panzer's proposal passed the Joint Finance Committee on a vote of 14 to 2. All eight republicans voted for it; as did six democrats. Voting against were Senators Russ Decker and Brian Barke. (Please read accompanying article.)

Waste Management and B.F.I. have worked against those and myself, who believe in recycling and keeping out-of-state trash out of Wisconsin. I, whole heartily, recommend Green Valley, a local and independent company, to receive our recyclables and trash. (Please see insert)

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Scrivner. The Public Notice was accepted as read by the clerk. All joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.

J. Scrivner made motion to change the order of business so that the last agenda item would be the Damrow lawsuit. This was done so that the Board could go into a closed session at that time. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Minutes of meeting 8/11/97 were reviewed. Approved on a motion by H. Hanson and seconded by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

Bills. After discussion of the bills, H. Hanson made a motion to pay bills as presented. B. McNeely seconded. Discussion: Mobil Fleet invoice: Bill back to Don Olin in Brodhead: 1. Interest on late payments and 2. The administration fee. Keep paying the tax exempt overhead fee. Get an account analysis from Mobil Fleet for all months that we have been charged by them. When purchasing fuel, each vehicle has it's own credit card (the lawn mower also). Authorized users are: Brian Smith, Gerry Tilley, Robin Patterson, Steve Grunnet, and Curt Golz.

Herb Hanson talked to Don Olin about the containment tanks still on town property. Clerk should now send letter about storage fee; have attorney okay the letter. J. Scrivner would like to see the letter before it is sent out.

Motion to pay bills - Carried unanimously.

Treasurer's Report & Clerk's Reconciliation. H. Hanson made motion to accept Report. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously. H. Hanson made motion to accept Reconciliation. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Updated budget numbers were given to the board.

Wis. Town's Assoc. Annual Convention is Oct. 5-8. The Town will reimburse Registration fee, Meals, & Hotel expenses for Board members.

98 Road Work. H. Hanson said roads are in good overall shape compared to other townships. He explained that repair costs were kept down for 97 due to reassessment costs. Discussion took place regarding the best way to assess the condition of the town roads as we will be starting the 1998 budget process. It was decided that Brian Smith would prioritize the roads for the Board and then a special meeting will be called to travel every road in the township to assess the condition of the road and determine what it will take to fix it. The Board would like to have Dallas Cecil (The Road Commissioner of Green Co. Hwy Dept.) along with them for this meeting. The Clerk does not need to attend the meeting.

GTE permit #159 to trench through blacktop on Mortensen Road. B. McNeely made a motion to approve the permit. H. Hanson seconded. Carried unanimously.

Equipment Repair. The truck was taken to Monroe Trucks Inc. For an in-frame overhaul. The radiator also must be fixed.

Weight Limits. Local Delivery & Exempt signs are up. Brian Smith has also put a sign up on Legler Road at Alpine Road as you are coming into the Town.

Reassessment is going smoothly. There was one reported incident where the assessor entered a residence without invitation. The residences are about complete. The Gardiner firm is now starting on the farms.

Driveway Permits. There were no driveway permits to approve.

J. Scrivner has discussed the new application form with Attorney Kisiel. Board discussed new form - no action needed.

Planning Commission Report by Harriet Tolly. Planning Commission gave final approval of Tolly's 'moving acreage'. Five acre parcel and a 35 acre parcel will become approximately 22.198 acres and 17.543 acres. There will be no new parcel and this is not a division of land so fee was waived. No Board action is required as the Ordinance does not apply to this. (Noted precedent: Carl Schultz). Harriet Tolly is resigning from the Planning Commission because as of 10/1/97 she will no longer be a resident of the Town of Brooklyn.

Safety Committee Report by Steve Miller. Reported on upcoming Belleville Fire Assoc. annual budget meeting on Sept. 29. Belleville would like to buy three new furnaces and 16 new coats in 1998. He noted that the firemen are giving \$5,000 in matching funds for the new coats. The Board must be present at this meeting as the budget will be voted on at that time.

Evansville Fire District has had 84 calls and \$9,320 in collected fees. Brooklyn has asked for an extension on our ordinance. No commitments were made by the safety committee. The Evansville Fire District will be voting on their 1998 budget on Oct. 7. Board action must be taken tonight to approve/disapprove the budget. Bob McNeely presented the Evansville budget to the Board. After discussion, B. McNeely made a motion to approve the Evansville Fire District budget as presented for \$156,825 with a variance of plus or minus \$6,000. H. Hanson seconded. Carried unanimously.

Fire fee collection ordinance: J. Scrivner discussed the Evansville ordinance with Attorney Kisiel. Scrivner stressed that the Brooklyn ordinance will be written for Brooklyn with it's four fire districts - we will not copy the Evansville ordinance. At this time Kisiel will advise against the ordinance. One reason he stated is that people need a reasonable idea in writing of what to expect as far as an appeal is concerned. H. Hanson suggested that the Evansville Fire District get in touch with Kisiel.

Allen Ferguson sent a letter stating that he would like to be on the Safety Committee. H. Hanson made a motion that Allen Ferguson be appointed to the Safety Committee. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Discussion of Direction the Safety Committee should take: Communication - How can Brooklyn help the County improve the 911 system for areas having problems. Steve Miller can call Sheriff Pat Conlin or our County Rep. Gil Hohnberger.

Recycling Report by Gwen Hay. Gwen reported on the results of the bids for picking up our garbage waste and recyclables. Monthly costs:

Misc. Tractor should have loader mounted in Sept. To be ready for October.

Misc. Schedule of future meetings / postings / and timetable of when to get items to the clerk was handed out by J. Scrivner.

At this time J. Scrivner made a motion to move to Closed Session to discuss pending litigation. ROLL: J. Scrivner- yes; H. Hanson-yes; and B. McNeely-yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Board adjourned from Closed Session at 10:40 PM on a motion by B. McNeely. H. Hanson seconded. Carried unanimously.

Motion by Hanson, Second by McNeely, passed unanimously to approve the driveway permit for Steve and Sharon Nellis on Freidig Road contingent on:

- the bank being cut open wide enough for waterways on each side of the driveway
- the road ditch being cut down to allow for an 18" X 30' culvert while maintaining grade requirements of the ordinance at the road
- the bank and field being cut back enough to meet the grade requirement of the ordinance
- the ditch being cut enough to allow free flow of water away from the culvert in both directions

Motion by Hanson, second by McNeely to adjourn. Passed unanimously.

Minutes of Brooklyn Town Board Meeting, Monday, September 29, 1997

In attendance were Jim Scrivner, Herb Hanson and Bob McNeely from the Brooklyn Board and Steve Miller from the Brooklyn Safety Committee.

Town of BR. designated safety committee rep to Belleville

This joint meeting with the Belleville, Exeter and Montrose Fire Association and Belleville Fire District was called to order at 8:30PM. Notice of the meeting was acknowledged by Chairman Scrivner.


After presentation of the proposed budget by Chief Adams, the following actions were taken by the Brooklyn Board:

Motion by Hanson, second by McNeely, carried unanimously to vote in favor of the basic operating budget as proposed - total amount \$85,000. Upon call of the roll, the Brooklyn "yes" vote was cast. The roll call recorded unanimous support.

Minutes of Brooklyn Town Board Meeting, Monday, October 20, 1997

In attendance were Jim Scrivner, Herb Hanson and Bob McNeely from the Brooklyn Town Board and Steve Miller, the Chair of the Brooklyn Safety Committee and the designated representative from the Town of Brooklyn for the Belleville Fire and EMS.

This joint meeting with the Belleville, Exeter and Montrose Fire Association and Fire District and the Belleville, Exeter, and Montrose EMS Association and District was called to order at 8:45PM at the Sugar River Lanes in Belleville. Notice of the meeting was acknowledged by Chairman Scrivner. The meeting site was then moved to the Belleville EMS building in Belleville. Notice of the change of location was conspicuously posted at the Sugar River Lanes.

Additional information was presented by Chief Adams and several heating contractors

about the furnaces for the fire station and the need for new turn-out gear. Subsequently, there was a motion by Hanson, second by McNeely to approve the proposed "one time" budget item for the above in an amount not to exceed \$21,993. The motion carried unanimously. Upon a call of the roll, the Brooklyn "yes" vote was cast. The roll call recorded unanimous support. It is understood that the \$21,993 may be reduced by a donation from the Belleville Community Club.

The Belleville EMS budget was presented by Gary Ziegler. Discussion followed. Of particular note was a line item for \$10,000 for purchase of land for possible use for a new EMS facility in the future.

Motion by Scrivner, second by Hanson, carried unanimously to vote in favor of the proposed budget including the line item for purchase of land. Upon the call of the roll, the Brooklyn "yes" vote was cast. The roll call recorded unanimous support.

Motion by Scrivner, second by Hanson to approve purchase of lot #2 from Herb Blaser in the Greenway Cross Court subdivision for \$37,495 by means of a land contract with Blaser. All three Brooklyn supervisors voted "no". The meeting was called to order by Chairman Scrivner. The Public Notice was accepted as read by the clerk. All joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes of meetings from 9/8/97 & 9/29/97 were approved as amended on a motion by H. Hanson and seconded by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously. Minutes of meeting from 9/22/97 were approved on a motion by H. Hanson and seconded by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

Bills. H. Hanson made a motion to pay bills as presented. B. McNeely seconded.

Treasurer's Report & Clerk's Reconciliation. H. Hanson made motion to accept Report. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously. H. Hanson made motion to accept Reconciliation. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

Updated budget numbers were given to the board.

Possible expenses for next year: New tires, New mower, Air jack, Sign replacement (& posts), Paint truck & fix window, Hydraulic lift for Recycle Center (to lift drums). Capital Equipment: \$5,000 toward future purchases. We must be careful to not increase the budget over the % limit where we lose state aids.

98 Road Work. On Sept. 22, the Board drove on all town roads to examine their condition. J. Scrivner then described the "Paser" manual (and computer spreadsheets) from the county to plan the fixing, maintenance, and upkeep for our roads. We have 42.3 miles of town road. (Only a small portion is gravel road). This is a six year plan. Discussion of repairs needed. Per Green County, Town of Brooklyn roads, when compared to other

Green County roads rank in the "Bottom of the middle".

J. Scrivner will write the grant for Trip funds (11/1/97 deadline.) The Trip grant must be for major road work, not seal coating or wedging.

On a motion by H. Hanson, Chairman should complete the Trip grant application for \$69,200 for repairs on Amidon Road, Hwy 92 to Benson Road (1.23 MI) and from Benson Road east to new pavement (.5 MI).

Second by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

WTA Convention. J. Scrivner attended the Wis. Towns Assoc. Convention. He related information learned there: Class B liquor licenses are 1 per 500 people; if you don't use one, you lose it. The town clerk/treasurer does not need to be a resident. Possible Board of Review changes-Board stays only one hour unless people show up. Recycling laws will stay through the year 2000. Waste water treatment (septic tanks) are now under the Dept. Of Commerce (no longer DILHR).

Damrow Lawsuit. The Board met in closed session at the end of the regular Sept. Meeting. In the session, J. Scrivner informed the Board that the town attorney, J. Kisiel heard from Wayne Damrow's attorney. Mr. Damrow's attorney informed Kisiel that if the Town dropped it's counter-lawsuit for \$4999 against Mr. Damrow, then Mr. Damrow would drop his suit against the Town for \$4999. The Board disagreed with this in principal, but felt that pursuing the suit would bring on negative publicity etc. to the Town. The Board discussed that there must be full release from the suit. Motion by H. Hanson for the Town of Brooklyn to withdraw it's countersuit against Wayne Damrow with the terms to be the same as Wayne Damrow agrees to and that the report of this meeting to be made in general terms during the regular Oct. 13 board meeting. Second by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

Reassessment Update. The Newsletter will be going out shortly. The Open Book will be held on October 23 and October 25. The Board of Corrections will be on October 28, 1997. After this is completed, the 1997 work will be completed with the Open Book and Board of Review in November.

Buildings, Grounds, & Equipment. A letter was sent to Olin Oil Co. informing them of a charge if the containment tanks are not removed - the tanks are still here.

Discussion took place about the Hall furniture and the policy of loaning it out to residents. The furniture is getting old. On a motion by H. Hanson, equipment and furniture in the Town Hall will not be taken from the property. Second by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

Green Co. Land Use Task Force Update. J. Scrivner gave update, he stated that the Growth Management Plan will be presented to the Green County Board. Copies of the plan are available.

Planning Commission Report by Jim Kramer. Jim Kramer is the new Chairman of the Planning Commission. One land division by Herbert Harvey. He is allowed 2 divisions. This is the first division. The division is on Hwy. 92, east of the Bowhunters Club. Joint driveway agreement was reviewed by town attorney and found acceptable. Planning Comm. has approved. On a motion by H. Hanson, based on the Planning Commission, the land division to Robert and Brenda Lane be approved. Second by J. Scrivner. Carried unanimously.

Driveway Permits.

Robert & Brenda Lane. Joint driveway with H. Harvey. Harvey driveway will have to come up to code standards. Mr. Harvey's lawyer has a copy of the ordinance. Discussion was over the fact that Mr. Harvey may not be aware of his responsibility to bring his driveway up to code. Only one application needed, but entire drive must meet code. Motion by B. McNeely to approve permit, but entire drive must be brought up to code. Second by H. Hanson. Failed unanimously. Motion by B. McNeely to empower H. Hanson to contact Mr. Harvey, inform him of the ordinance and that his driveway must be brought up to code. If he agrees by written approval, then the driveway permit will be approved contingent on payment of fees. Second by H. Hanson. Discussion: Sign new application (application in both names). Carried unanimously.

Safety Committee Report. The Brooklyn EMS & Fire District budgets were presented. H. Hanson made a motion to approve the Brooklyn EMS & Fire District budgets with the understanding that we can't put final assessment dollars in at this time due to the reassessment. Second by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

B. McNeely stated that the Evansville budget was passed as presented last month.

He will also have the Town attorney, John Kisiel call the attorney representing the Evansville Fire District. B. McNeely stated that he is resigning as Town representative to the Evansville Fire District. He will not go to the next fire district meeting to present the Brooklyn ordinance.

Recycling Report by Gwen Hay. G. Hay reported on the Recycle Pledge. We will include this with the Town newsletter. The Green Valley contract begins January 1, 1998. This is a three year agreement.

Official newspaper. Monroe paper: \$6.75/col. inch. Brodhead paper: \$4.71/col. inch. No decision made.

H. Hanson made a motion to adjourn at 11:13 PM. Second by B. McNeely. Carried unanimously.

Treasurer's Report & Clerk's Reconciliation. H. Hanson made motion to accept Report. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously. H. Hanson made motion to accept Reconciliation. B. McNeely seconded. Carried unanimously.

98 Road Work. J. Scrivner reported that he submitted the TRIP grant(Town roads improvement program). The amount submitted was \$69,200 to fix Amidon Road. One half of this would be eligible - But this amount is about half of the amount available for the entire county, so we will be receiving only a portion of this amount. We should hear from the county in January.

Updated budget numbers were given to the board. There will be a 'Working budget meeting' on Monday, November 17, at 7:00 PM. The Budget Hearing will be on Dec. 1, at 7:30 PM. (Due to posting requirements, this was changed to Dec. 5.) Jeff Wunschel from the Green County Highway Dept. Has been invited to come to the Budget Hearing to explain the passer system and to answer questions.

1998 Equipment needed: Mower, Air Jack, and Hydraulic lift -

\$8,300 Woods mower (two five foot mowers): less mowing time, designed for municipal use.

Rino mower - no dollar figure available yet.

Air Jack - To lift the trucks to put chains on. No dollar figure available.

Recycling equipment needed: \$300 Hydraulic lift to put onto tractor. Freight and customizing must be added to the \$300, this could add up to \$150.

1998 Repairs:

Truck repair - \$500 to repair window & \$75 for paint. (Brian will do the painting.)

New clutch for the Oshkosh. Brian will find out the cost of a new clutch.

Other 1998 purchases:

Stop signs at \$24.00 (We always have two on hand, we should increase this number.)

Weight limit signs at approx. \$18.00 each.

Sign posts (Wood are \$24 each & Steel are \$12 each)

Reassessment Update. 100 Parcel owners registered at the Open Book. Per the Assessor, this was a very high turn out. There were a number of changes made before and during the Open Book Session. There were eight appeals to the Board of Corrections. The assessments were sustained in all cases.

The clerk informed the Board that the Statement of Assessment sent to the state contained the manufacturing assessment from the original 1996 assessment (County Treasurer had informed the clerk). The clerk has sent in a corrected statement.

The Dept. of Revenue has stated that the Reassessment charge/credit may be paid (credited) in the two regular installments, Jan. and July. Jim Scrivner stated that he hoped this would not cause a cash shortfall in the first few months of 1998- (Due to more credits taken than payments made.)

BOARD OF REVIEW. NO date set. H. Hanson made recommendation that the current Board and Clerk should be on the Board of Review. (J. Scrivner, H. Hanson, B. McNeely, & J. Follett). He felt it would be unfair to ask other residents to sit on the Board this year as it will possibly be a difficult Review.

Newsletter. The next newsletter may include: Outcome of Reassessment, Driveway ordinance revision, Budget, Open Book, Board of Review, Recycling changes. J. Scrivner is updating the mailing list to include residents and non-resident owners.

Facilities Work Plan. Possible 1998 repairs may include:

Repair soffit on North side of salt shed

Replace cracked window glass south side, west end of hall

Repair or replace sign on the building

Repair or replace double doors into hall

Repair or replace service door into garage

Install bulb into spotlight for flag pole

Budget items for above would include: Sign and service doors. Brian will get estimated costs.

Containment tanks. The tanks were removed by Olin Oil Co. On October 28, 1997.

H. Hanson made a motion to waive the penalty storage charges to Olin Oil as they were only a few days late. Second by B. McNeely. Passed unanimously.

Planning Commission Report by Jim Kramer. One application for a 10.86 acre split located on the corners of Counties E & C by Ken & Beth Flood. This is the third of 5 splits. Division meets all criteria of ordinance. Commission recommends passage. H. Hanson made a motion that the request for the land division on Counties C & E for Kenneth Flood be approved as stated by the Planning Commission Chair. Second by J. Scrivner. Discussion: Access to adjacent fields. Board was informed that this is not a problem for tonight's meeting. Motion carried unanimously. Payment made tonight.

Roads. Jim Kramer said he was very impressed with the way Brian Smith is taking care of the town roads.

Planning Commission Report by Jim Kramer. No parcel divisions. By January or February the commission will present their recommended changes to the Land Use Ordinance. There will be a public hearing on the changes.

Driveway Permit Applications. No applications for approval.

Safety Committee Report. Evansville Fire response fee ordinance: A Board of Appeals will be set up. There will be 3 members for 3 years.

The Evansville Fire District will draft a letter of explanation to give to people.

Town Attorney. We must start looking for a new attorney to represent the town. J. Scrivner has started this process.

Newsletter. The next newsletter will include information about the Fire Response Fee Ordinance and the Amended Driveway Ordinance.

Recycling Report by Gwen Hay. Discussion of how recycling will change. We will continue to bale large plastic containers. J. Scrivner will talk to Jerry Schulz about this. B. McNeely will let Jerry know if he can't use newspapers.

Jerry Schulz & Brian Smith will coordinate the transition of haulers (Waste Mgt. to Green Valley). J. Follett will get a copy of the letter of termination to Waste Mgt. to J. Scrivner.

H. Hanson will check out tire recycling.

Revision of Resolution 5-16-92B. Reimbursement of expenses. J. Scrivner presented first draft. He will continue to work on this and will also ask the advice of J. Kisiel.

Special meeting payments. Should there be a separate resolution for special meeting payments? H. Hanson believes this may be very difficult to draft. What is the statutory authority for this type of payment? J. Scrivner will check out.

Draft of Driveway Ordinance Fee & Reapplication Fees. J. Scrivner working on this.

Other Business. Gwen Hay reported that per the County Clerk Mike Doyle, there will be no primary election in February.

Brian Smith will get another cost estimate on the 'bat-wing' mower.

J. Scrivner will bring a 'calendar of events' to January's meeting. It will include equipment purchases etc.

Brian Smith will attend a seminar on highway safety, highway maintenance, and traffic control devices.
Brian will have a performance review in February (in a closed session). Jim will try to update the job description.

B. McNeely made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 9:30 PM. Second by H. Hanson. Carried unanimously.

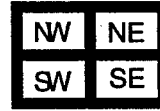
