Recycling

Property Taxes

Information regarding tax collection is printed on the tax bill.

Building Permits

Construction or razing of any type of building including residential and farm buildings are required to get a building permit before work begins. Contact Building Inspector Paul Hermes at 920-858-0102 to be issued a permit.

Culvert Permit

When a culvert needs to be installed, replaced or added onto a permit must be obtained from the Town prior to installation. It is the landowner's responsibility to check with the county and or DNR if any other permits are required.

Fireworks Permit

Anyone wishing to possess or use fireworks is required pursuant Wisconsin State Statute 167.10 to obtain a permit. Contact the Town Chairman, Michael Barclay at 833-7447 for a permit.

Driveways

It is illegal to leave snow pushed from driveways on the road. Snow which is pushed into ditches should be distributed so no undue drifting will result from high piles.

Dog Licenses

Dog licenses cost \$3 for a neutered male or spayed female, \$8 for unfixed animals. Proof of rabies vaccination must accompany payment to the Town Treasurer, along with a self-addressed, stamped return envelope. Please mail to the Treasurer, Ginny Rottier, at W1866 Linsmeyer Rd. Or call 920-833-7488 for an appointment.

TOWN ROAD DITCHES

The town right of way is 33 feet from the center of the road. This area cannot be cultivated or cropped in accordance with state statue 86.021 and does carry a fine. This practice is occurring in the town, and with the cropping season coming, we would like this practice to discontinue so that further action does not need to occur.

The other issue that has been noticed in the town right of way is yard waste being dumped. This causes issues with the ditch not being properly drained. Please find an alternate place to compost your yard waste or any other material that may being placed in the road right of way. A fine can also be administered for this practice. The town is not looking to be a policing board but wanted to make aware of issues that need to resolved.

NOXIOUS WEEDS

Each person is required by law to destroy the following noxious weeds growing on land in the Town of Seymour, owned, operated or controlled by that person:

- 1. Canada Thistle
- 2. Leafy Spurge
- 3. Field Bindweed (Creeping Jenny)

Street/Traffic Signs

At least 45 posts, street signs and traffic signs have been vandalized and/or stolen in the past several years. This costs YOU, as a taxpayer money! If you know of, or see anyone doing this, PLEASE discourage this, and/or report it to the authorities or our Town Chairman. Thank you for your help!

Town of Seymour Annual Meeting April 18th, 2023 7:00 pm – 8:00 pm

The Seymour Annual meeting was called to order at 8:00 pm by Chairman, Michael Barclay. There were 11 residents, 3 guests and 5 board members present.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited and then a moment of silence to honor our troops that continue to protect our freedom.

Chairman, Michael Barclay introduced the Town Board. He presented Pete Wachtendonk and Tracy Gagnow a plaque for their time served on the board.

Annual Report: MOTION (Siedl, seconded) to dispense reading of the Annual Report. Carried.

Approval of Minutes: MOTION (Gagnow, Thiel) to accept the 2022 annual meeting minutes as read. Carried.

Financial Report: MOTION (Thiel, Rettman) Approved the report as printed. Carried.

2022 Completed Road Projects:

Chip Sealed Lawn Road to Cicero to Townline. Chip Sealed French Road from Cicero and ¼ mile south of VV. Chip sealed some of Pearl Street. Wedging on west end of Linsmeyer Road. Crack filled VandenHeuvel from VV to G. Isaar Road from Pearl to G.

Fire Department:

Chief, Greg Brown announced Harlan Volkman retired from the Fire Department. They have 2 new members this year that are taking classes.

The department has 144 emergency calls in 2022, mostly due to the June tornado.

A reminder to look at the dates on your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. They should be replaced after 10 years, or by the expiration date shown.

President Dennis Hoffman stated that the department is looking at truck maintenance, new boots, accepting maybe 3 or 4 new members. They are also looking into a radio grant.

Natural Disasters:

Dennis Laskowski stated Outagamie County Emergency Maintenance plan has many resources available throughout the county. There is a list of qualified manpower and equipment available for the town and public to use.

Plan Commission:

The Plan Commission has 2 new members: Dean Thiel and Claude Court.

Plan Commission Members are: Dean Thiel (chair), Harvey Albert III, Michael Barclay, Claude Court, Kurt Gagnow, Timm Gomm and Howard Rettman.

Hwy 54 road project:

Allen Timm (Town of Oshborn), Aaron Melchert and Kurt Gagnow will try to set up a meeting to discuss what will all be done on the Hwy, this may only be a State responsibility. We have had many accidents at 54/Ballard and 54/Ranch/VandenHeuvel. Will there be turn lanes available? Roundabouts at Main/54 and C/Ivory.

Respectively submitted by the Seymour Town Board Audit: Michael Barclay, Chairman; Aaron Melchert, Supervisor 1; Kurt Gagnow, Supervisor 2, Ginny Rottier, Treasurer; and Darlene Schultz, Clerk 2023 was a year of change for Seymour Rural Fire Department. Chief Greg Brown retired in June of 2023 after 5 years of leading the department. Greg saw us through the merger of the Town of Osborn and the Town of Seymour Fire Departments in 2018. Many difficult decisions had to be made to move forward during this transition and Greg led the way while maintaining our readiness for any and all calls we received. Greg was a phenomenal teacher and a wealth of knowledge and he is truly missed. A big thank you to Greg for helping me through this transition and continuing to be available when I need some advice or assistance.

Here are some other highlights from 2023:

- Responded to 121 emergency fire calls in 2023; 2022= 124 calls, 2021= 95 calls, 2020= 94 calls.
- Providing Emergency Medical Responders (Formerly called first responders) to assist Seymour Rescue in providing emergency medical care.
- 933 hours of Fire and EMR training (All staff training hours combined).
- Continue to take our mission seriously: PREVENT, RESPOND TO, and MINIMIZE HARMFUL SITUATIONS WITH RESPECT involving the people we serve.

We wouldn't have been able to accomplish all of this without our volunteer firefighters, emergency medical responders, and elected officials. We thank them all for their unwavering support and dedication.

During the past year, we had a few retirements between the Fire and EMR divisions. I would like to recognize the following individuals for their dedicated service:

Greg Brown retired after serving 5 years as fire chief and 10 years of service on the fire department. Greg also served as an EMR for 7 years.

Al Timm has retired from the EMR squad after serving 20 years and is also a founding member of the squad. Al continues to serve on the fire department.

Terry VanderHeiden has retired after 14 years as an EMR.

If you are interested in becoming a Firefighter or an Emergency Medical Responder, we are always looking for new dedicated members! Please contact any of our members or myself. We provide the training at no cost to our volunteers. If you have the will, we can help find a way to complete the necessary training.

Open Burning:

In 2023 we saw a number of vegetation fires during burning bans throughout the county. This resulted in unnecessary fire call expenses, not to mention volunteer firefighter's time for those who responded. In addition, burning during a ban puts your property and your neighbor's property at unnecessary risk for loss. We ask that you please do your part in helping spend town funds wisely and not burn during burning bans. Burning bans are issued when the fire danger reaches the "Very High or Extreme Danger Levels." When an open burning ban is in place - notices will be placed on Town(s) Website, and the Seymour Rural Fire Departments Facebook page. Burning Bans are lifted when the danger no longer exists.

The main reason for having burning permits is to help promote fire safe burning practices in our community. The permits are free and can be obtained over the phone.

- It is illegal to burn any building or structure without a WI DNR building burning permit. Fire departments are included. This rule applies to the entire State of WI.
- In our area, burning permits are issued by your local Fire Department. Please use responsible burning practices when burning. Small cooking "Campfires" are exempt from burning permits.
- If you intend on burning a wood pile, brush, or even a bonfire of significant size, contact one of the following SRFD members for a burn permit:

- Burning road ditches requires approval from the <u>municipality or person</u> that owns the right of way, <u>AND</u> local FD permission.

Other Fire Safety Information:

- Always keep an up to date charged fire extinguisher that is easily accessible.
- > Smoke detectors and carbon monoxide (CO) detectors have expiration dates. Both have a service life of 10 years. (There are a few exceptions, depending on the manufacturer) Expiration dates go by when the unit was first powered up by end user, not the manufacturing date. When the detector reaches its end life, it will make a chirping sound like low battery but in a different sequence. Digital displays will also read "Err" or "End" along with a chirping sequence.

 Remember once the unit has reached the end of its life span (expired) it will no longer sense for smoke or CO. It must be replaced.

Please feel free to contact any of our members regarding questions or issues with emergency services, even if it's not directly related to SRFD. We keep in contact with all of the neighboring departments through various meetings. If there is an issue affecting one department, likely it could affect ours as well.
