We're writing THE NEXT CHAPTER of our story here in Benton, and YOU have a starring role!

Our story revolves around the building of a new 7,500 sq. foot, multi-use facility—a facility that has essentially been designed **by** the community, **for** the community.

It's a story that in 1911 saw Benton's first library being opened in the parlor of the Benton Methodist Church. Twelve years later it moved a few doors down the street and up twenty-one steep steps to the top floor of the Municipal Building. Decades after that, it moved back down those same steps to its current main-floor location.

The final chapter of our story will take the library across the street to Benton's new Community Building—a building that will consolidate the Library, two museums, and a community center under one roof in the heart of Benton's Main Street.

Libraries Redefined

Today's libraries have ceased to be mere storehouses of books and materials—they aren't your mama's libraries anymore!

- Provide co-worker spaces where workers can merge their areas of expertise.
- Be designed to adapt as the needs of the community continue to change.

Our New MUSEUM Will . . .

- Combine the collections of Swindler's Ridge and the 1851 School House Museum.
- Provide climate-controlled storage for our historic artifacts.
- Use standardized museum software to catalog and manage the collection.
- Promote the cultural heritage of Benton and its surrounding communities.
- Present rotating exhibits, art displays, and presentations.
- Bring people together through a variety of programming and cultural events.
- Allow for increased partnerships with the school district, its students, and its teachers—helping to educate future generations.

The Village recognizes there is a significant need for a public meeting and gathering space in Benton. It has addressed that need in the new Community Center portion of the building.

Planning Highlights

Extensive, thoughtful planning has gone into the new Benton Library, Museum, Community Center building project. A number of public meetings have taken place over the past four years, and various committees have been formed to investigate ideas, make recommendations, and come to consensus agreements that have moved the project forward in positive ways. This truly has been a community-driven initiative, one that—when completed—will be a source of pride for Benton, the surrounding townships, and those people who have a certain nostalgia for their hometown.

COVID-19 puts project on hold. Property acquisition moves forward during shutdown.

DEC 2020

Main St properties are all secured. Benton State Bank and American Legion donate property; the third property is purchased.

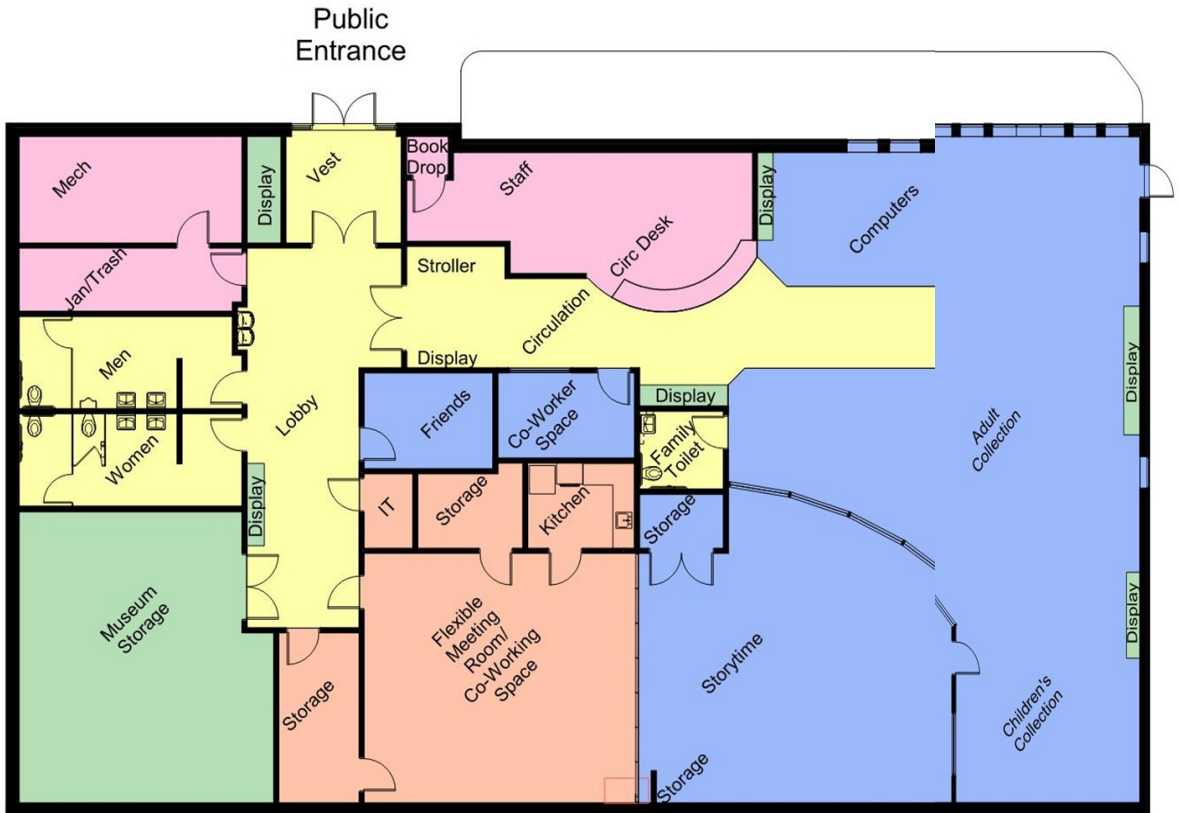
OCT 2021

What are the reasons for building a new Public Library, Museum, and Community Center?

For many decades the Public Library has leased space from the Benton State Bank—a partnership that has been fundamental to our continued success. That success has resulted in a Library that is literally busting at the seams! We are now faced with the need for additional space to grow our current collection and to provide adequate spaces for important Library programming and other patron services. In addition, Swindler's Ridge and the 1851 School House Museums have experienced a number of issues with deteriorating buildings. Those problems—coupled with the increased need to have a convenient public space to come together for meetings, programs, events, and family gatherings—prompted the Village to pursue the current building project.

What is the cost of the building?

The cost, including contingencies, is \$2,645,000. This includes land acquisition; building demolition; and the purchase of furniture, fixtures, equipment, and technology items.

How will the building be funded?

- The Village of Benton will submit an application to the USDA for a Community Facilities Direct Loan. The loan period will be 40 years, with a low-interest rate (currently 2.15%) that is fixed for the entire term of the loan. The length of the loan, coupled with the low interest rate, enables the Village to make manageable payments through its regular budgeting process. USDA loan approval does not obligate the Village to take the loan; that decision will be dependent upon the success of the Capital Campaign.
- \$250,000 will be requested through a WEDC grant. If funded, the grant does not have to be repaid.
- \$69,000 has been awarded from Lafayette County's federal ARPA funds.
- \$1,500,000 is the goal of **Our Next Chapter** campaign. This is a goal that will require community involvement. Giving-level options and naming rights are available and are included in this packet. Gifts of every size are welcomed.

Frequently Asked Questions

Will the building project raise my taxes?

The USDA loan term and low interest rate enables the Village to make manageable payments through its regular budgeting process and will have a very minimal effect on the Village levy and taxes.

Has the Village made a financial contribution to the project?

Yes; the Village and the Library currently have a combined contribution of \$145,000.

When will construction begin?

If all goes as planned, and we have a successful capital campaign, we can break ground in late fall of 2023. The Benton Library, Museum and Community Center could enjoy its Grand Opening in the late fall/early winter of 2024.

Who is handling campaign donations? How will campaign donors be recognized?

The Community Foundation of Southern Wisconsin is serving as the campaign's fiscal agent. *All donations are tax deductible.*

Every gift to the building project is an important step toward making the vision of our new Library, Museum, and Community Center a reality. There are many ways to support the project, including a number of important naming opportunities for spaces that are particularly meaningful to the donor. All gifts will be recognized on an artistically designed donor wall and by way of special acknowledgments for donors choosing naming opportunities.

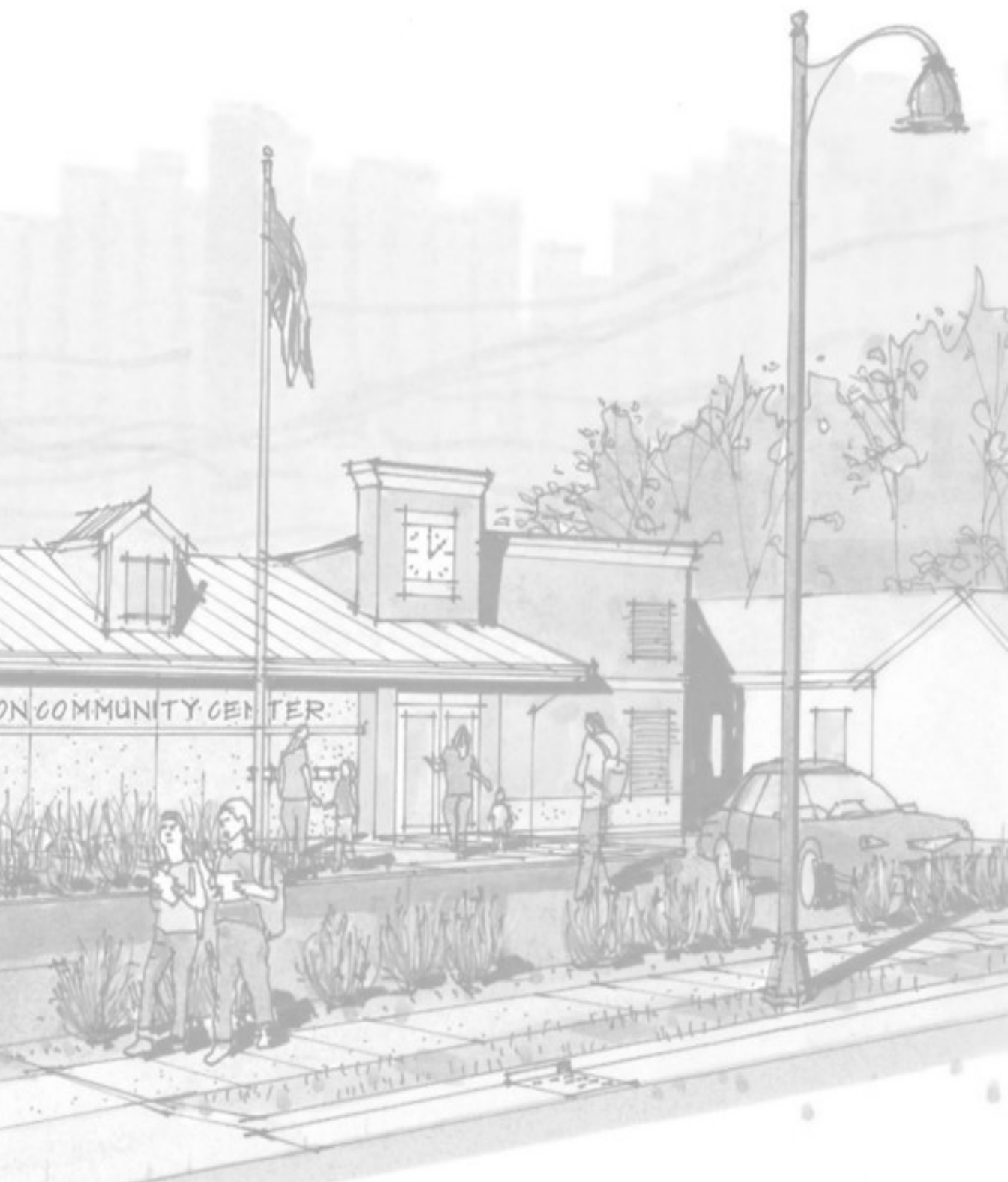
