Tips to Save Water Submitted by the Department of Public Works

Some facts about water consumption:

- The average American uses about 100 gallons of water per day, and the average household uses over 100,000 gallons per year.
- About 50–70% of household water is used outdoors for watering lawns and washing cars.
- A five-minute shower with a standard showerhead uses 26 gallons of water, while a low-flow showerhead uses 9 gallons. A traditional washing machine uses 35-65 gallons of water for a large load.
- A faucet that drips once per second wastes over
 6.5 gallons of water per day, 2,370 gallons a year
- It takes 39,090 gallons of water to make a new car and its tires, 62,600 gallons to make one ton of steel, and 1,500 gallons to process one barrel of beer.
- From 2015–2018, US children and adolescents drank an average of 23 ounces of water per day, while US adults drank an average of 44 ounces.
- Less than 1% of the Earth's water is available for human use. The rest is salt water in the oceans, fresh water in the polar ice caps, or inaccessible for practical use.

Conserving water can save money on water, wastewater, and energy bills. Here are some ways to conserve water:

- Replace old fixtures with low-flow showerheads, taps, and toilets. WaterSense-labeled products use at least 20% less water than standard models.
- Regularly check for leaks in pipes, faucets, toilets, and appliances and repair them promptly.
- Use dishwashers and washing machines only when fully loaded. Use cold water instead of hot or warm water in your washing machine.
- Water your lawn only when needed, and during the cooler parts of the day. You can also use a soaker hose or drip irrigation to water slowly and evenly.
- Consider replacing grass with drought-tolerant plants, mulch, ground cover, or ornamental grasses.
- Collect excess water from your shower in a bucket to use for watering plants or flushing toilets.
- Water conservation reduces wastewater discharges, which can provide community benefits.
