She was so thankful to staff for help with the computer and printing.

JANE

“After Jane had her driver’s license revoked, Jane frequented the library, using the internet and computers, almost daily, to study the Wisconsin Commercial Driver’s Manual. Jane came in many times and after completing required steps, staff was able to assist her in sending an email to insurance (and helping her attach files to the email) as well as helping her submit her documentation to the DMV in hopes to reinstate her license.
