ROSS TOWNSHIP POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2022



The year 2022 was a challenging year for the Ross Township Police Department. This was the first full year since the COVID-19 pandemic. The Ross Township Police Department, like all police departments nationwide, struggled to keep and find quality candidates. We lost an officer to the Butler and Hamilton County Sheriff's Office and another who did not make probation. We were awarded \$235,244 through the Office of Criminal Justice Services. This funding will be used for the hiring and retention of officers. In December, we hired a full-time officer and laid the groundwork to hire additional full-time officers. Currently, we have one full-time officer to cover thirty-six square miles. Our goal for 2023 is always to have two full-time officers on the road to handle the increase in calls and for officer safety.

STAFFING

We ended the year with six full-time officers and one part-time officer. Macayla Liddil is my Administrative Assistant and works part-time. Even though our staffing has decreased, our Calls for Service (CFS) have not. Since the inception of the Sundance Record Management System at the end of 2019, it has shown that our CFS has increased. In 2020, we had 4,101. In 2021, we had 7,154; in 2022, we responded to 7,868.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

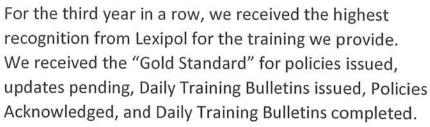
In the school year beginning in August 2022, we signed a new Memorandum of Understanding with the Ross Local School District (RLSD). This will keep Officer David Liddil in the schools to continue his services. The police department and RLSD Safety committee meet quarterly to ensure we are up to date with current trends. Refer to Officer Liddil's End of Year report for additional information about the SRO program.

TRAINING

In July 2022, the Ross Township received our recertification through the Ohio Collaborative. This process is conducted every three years after your initial

certification. To receive certification through the Ohio Collaborative must have certain policies which are mandatory in place. You also must provide documentation proving your department is following these policies.







In 2022, the Ohio Attorney General's Office mandated that officers complete twenty-four hours of Continuing Professional Education training. The mandatory training topics were Legal Update, Cultural Humility, Diversity, Use of Force, Officer Personal Wellness, Responding to Sexual Assaults, and Domestic Violence.

Sgt Rogers also provided monthly training for the officers on search and seizure. The officers would have

to read current case laws and provide a summary of the case law.

Sgt Rogers completed the Police Executive Leadership Course. This course is geared towards first-line supervisors. It teaches them about leadership, budgets, and ethics, and prepares them for the next step in management.

Ross Township is finalizing a deal with Norse Tactical to be the host location for their training in southwest Ohio. They will be building a force-on-force structure in the rear of the police department. The training will provide current building search techniques, and shoot don't shoot scenarios.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

The Ross Township Police Department continues strengthening our partnership with Federal, State, County, and Local Organizations. We participate in the Butler County OVI Task Force, Butler County SWAT team, and Butler County Serious Traffic Accident Response Team.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

The Ross Township Police Department hosted community events to strengthen our relationship with our residents. Some events we participated in were Cones with a Cop, Fish with a Cop, and Shop with a Cop.

The Ross Township Honor Guard presented the Colors and two Cincinnati Reds games this year. Chief Burton Roberts and Officer Art Brickles were recognized at a Cincinnati Reds game for their thirty-plus years of service in law enforcement.



The Honor Guard also participated in the Veteran's Day ceremony at Elda Elementary School and led the annual Ross Township Veteran's Day parade.

Twice a year, the Ross Township Police Department participates in the Drug-Take-Back program. This allows individuals to turn in unused or outdated medications to be destroyed.



GOALS

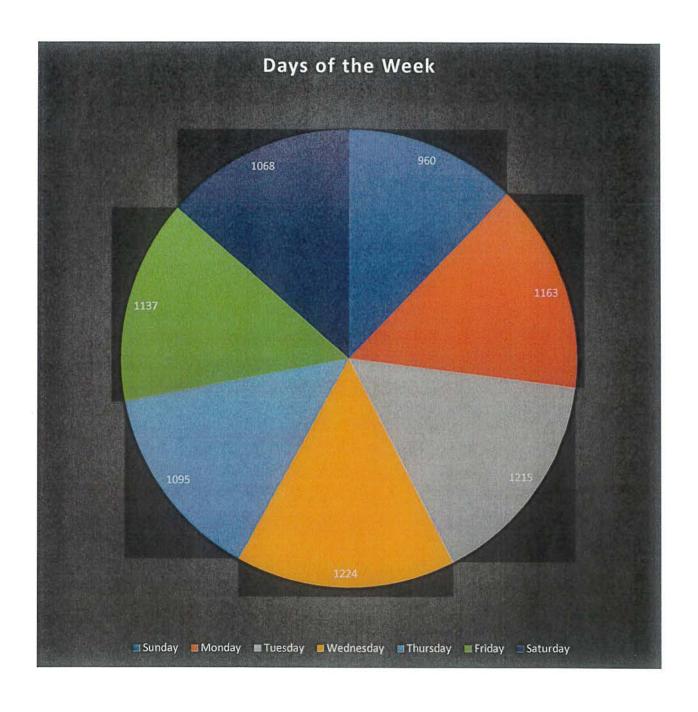
As I mentioned previously, one of our goals for 2023 was to increase the number of officers on the road in Ross Township. Another goal for the department is to automate our property room. The fire department during COVID was able to purchase a system for both the fire and police departments, which scans items. This will expedite the process of checking in and out property out of the property room. It will also expedite the annual audit of the property room. This technology can be used to inventory the equipment in our police cruisers. You point the scanner at the police cruiser, which will inventory the items in the vehicle. This will let us know if an item is missing or needs resupplied.

CORE VALUES

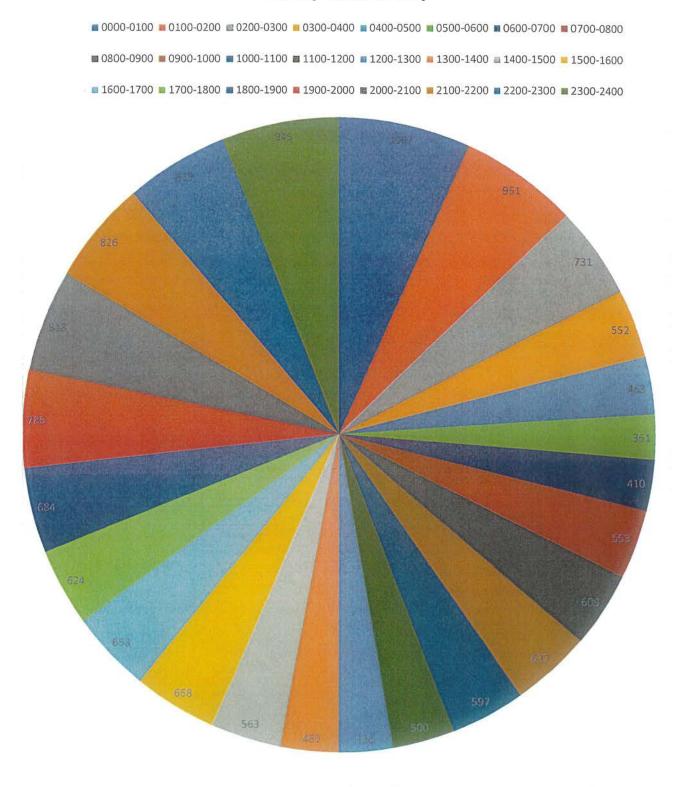

The Ross Township Police Department is a community-oriented department. The department currently consists of 8 officers who are committed to serving an area of approximately 36 square miles. The patrol division is responsible for answering calls for service for crashes, domestic violence, theft, sex offenses, assaults, drug offenses, assistance with medic and fire calls within the community, and many others.

In 2022, Ross Township Police Department responded to a total of 7,868 calls for service. Examples of calls for service that were handled in 2022 are:

Vacation checks - 722 calls for service

911 hang-ups/transfers - 435 calls for service

School Resource Officer



The School Resource Officer (SRO) program has become a vital collaborative effort between the Ross Township Police Department and the Ross Local School District educators. Not only does the School Resource Officer work very closely with administration and educators, but they also work closely with the students and parents. The position, with its general-sounding name, is an unusual hybrid of counselor, educator, disciplinarian, and police officer. Perhaps no other job better personifies America's shifting ideas about schools, policing, and safety.

The 2022-2023 school year safety staff comprised one full-time School Resource Officer and three School Safety Officers. Officer Liddil is stationed full-time at Ross Middle School. He continues to strengthen the relationships with students, staff, and parents. He is responsible for responding, investigating, and following up on all calls from the schools located in Ross Township. During the school day, he helps maintain a safe environment for the students and staff. In addition, he aggressively enforces the school zones and directs traffic during student drop-offs and pick-ups, helping to provide safety for the students.

Officer Liddil strives to be a positive role model and mentor while performing his duties. With the relationships he builds, students feel comfortable coming to him with problems at home or school. He is often asked to be a special guest speaker at the elementary, middle, and high school classes throughout the year. In addition, he has helped the FCCLA members research and prepare for their Distracted Driver presentation, Seat Belt Awareness, and Bicycle Safety.

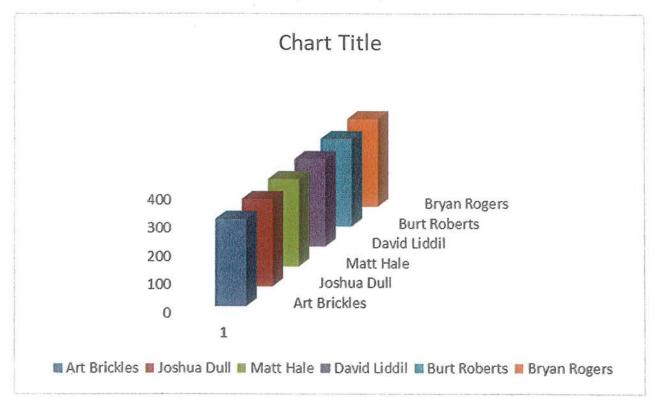

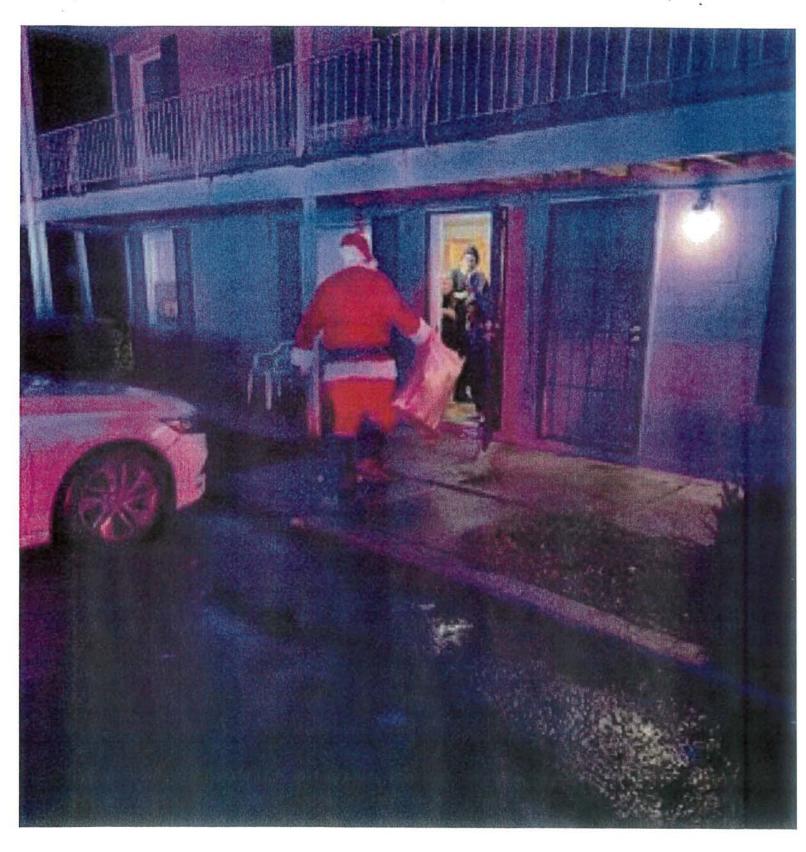

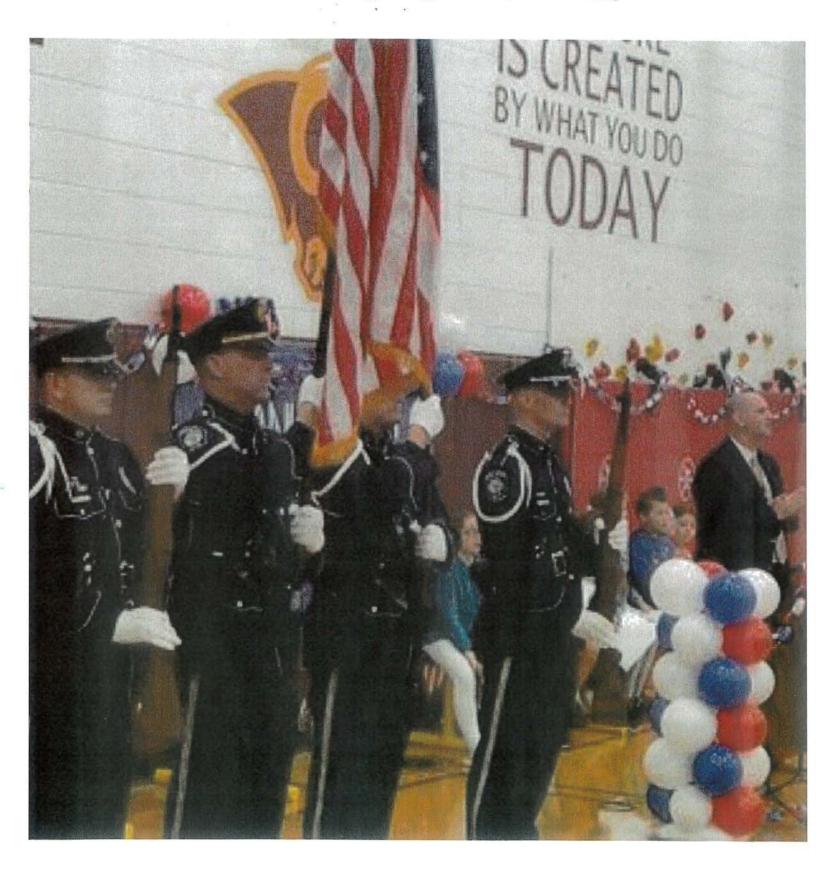

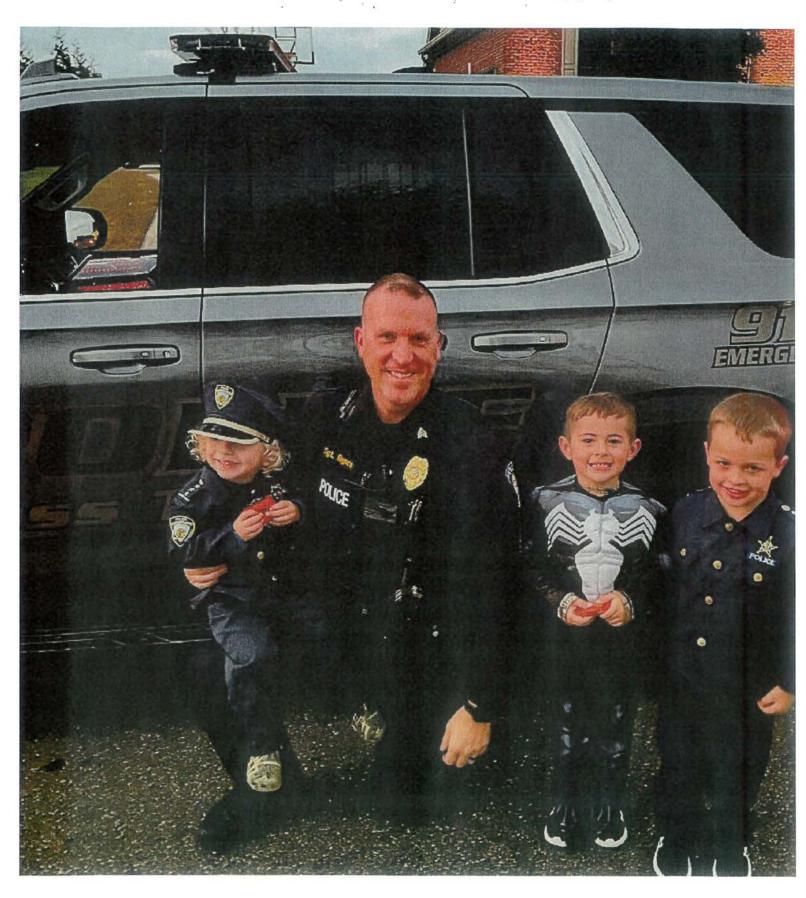

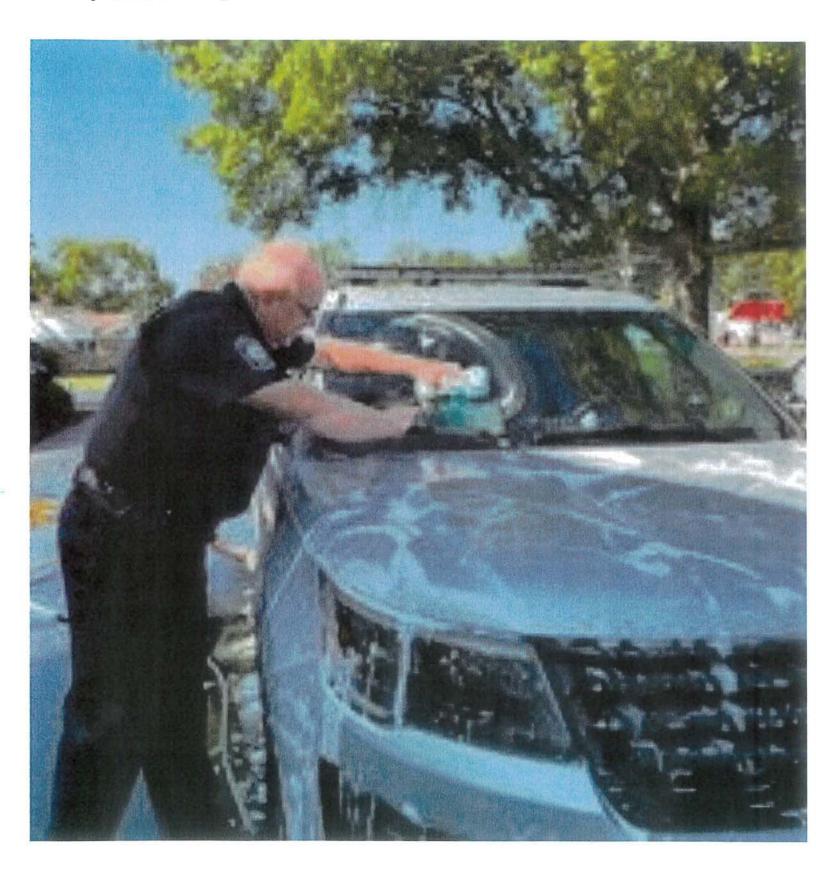
