2019 ANNUAL REPORT

MINUTES FROM ANNUAL MEETING APRIL 16, 2019

Donald Sitte called the Annual Meeting to order at 7:00PM in the auditorium of the Town Hall. Present were Donald Sitte, Roberta Thelen, Peter Jacobs, Barbara Anschutz, Robert Schultz, Haley Adams, Lois Pluff and Katie Virlee. There were also 56 visitors.

Pledge of Allegiance.

Don Sitte introduced the new Deputy Clerk Katie Virlee. She reported she is excited to be working with the Town and welcomes residents to come introduce themselves.

Accept minutes from 2018 Annual Meeting - Motion made/second Bill Becker/Terry McArdle. Carried.

Accept financial reports per auditors –Room tax has increased to \$111,298.00 for 2018. The breakdown of use of these funds were as follows: Baileys Harbor Community Association \$42,318.00, Fireworks \$4,615.00, Toft House \$20,000.00, Marina \$13,000.00, Capital Improvements (new dock) at Anclaim Park \$20,000.00, and \$11,387.00 to assigned funds for common tax. Interest on investments has increased dramatically to \$31,960.00 in 2018. The Town worked with Nicolet Bank to place monies into a pooled fund account, to place savings into a pooled account that includes funds of the county and ther municipalities in door county. The Town is making 1.95% interest on this pooled account. Outstanding general obgation debt as of 12/31/2018 was \$1,326,136.00. No new debt was issued for 2018, but one loan was renewed for another years, the remaining term of 10-year note. Public works – sale of Town property- \$14,942.00. Public Works final budget as \$24,911.00, these funds are assigned for Public Work use for 2019. \$106,248 was added to the general fund balance, ith end of year balance of \$1,690,567.00. Of that \$1,690,567.00, \$335,000.00 is assigned for specific projects that are icomplete or still in process. For wastewater operations, after removing non-cash depreciation from operating expenses, here was a positive cash flow of \$63,527.00. Capital contributions that are not included in this report are incomplete sewer ne extensions from 2017 & 2018. For the marina, gas and diesel sales had a profit of \$11,209.00. Wages were higher due to ck of help; the Harbormaster would appreciate any applications. Transient slips and launch fee revenue was down due to ind weather on key weekends.

Il Becker inquired about implementing a generator in the Town Hall. Don reported the Town is getting estimates. Barb entioned the building is three phase, Synergy Heating and Cooling will be providing estimates. Bill Becker also inquired out the status of the kitchen remodel. Barb has made a few updates already including locks and appliances. Barb menned she compared years of revenue; the average is about \$1,000.00. With this revenue it does not seem appropriate to rehase items to utilize the kitchen as commercial. Jane Pluff asked if Barb is aware of the cracked concrete pad near the trance to the Library. Barb reported after receiving estimates, this may need to be budgeted for 2020. Miller and Sam Perlman mentioned the 150th anniversary for the range lights at the Ridges Sanctuary. On Aug 7th, tional Lighthouse Day, we will be celebrating the Cana Island lighthouse. Kris Schorer gave an update on the Coastal ways and introduced the interactive coloring book which is available multiple places within the County.

In Matke gave a big "thank you" to the Public Works Department for all their continued hard work. Bob Bultman made commendation to use some room tax monies for a generator.

ate on sidewalks on CTH F- Don Sitte announced this is proposed to promote safety. It is a County Road; therefore, County will have to permit this project. Don Sitte and Steve Parent attended the County Highway Committee to sose the plan. The County reported they agree it is a safety issue but had some concerns over the crosswalk placement. County's concern is more from a liability standpoint for crosswalks. They inspected the roadway yesterday and re-

ported on their input. They prefer that there are no crosswalks implemented in this project. They suggest where the sidewalk starts at CTH F/Park Rd implement a crosswalk and the sidewalk would be on the West side of CTH F and remain on the South side for the entirety of the project. This would incur many additional costs and additional work with relocating culverts, drainage issues, tree cutting. This will probably take place later this summer. Don Sitte was contacted by one of the Highway Committee members and they will be inspecting this past Monday. The cost estimate will now be in the 300 thousand range for 2/3 of mile. This can be justified due to the safety concerns; however, Steve highly recommends the Plan Commission and Town Board met regarding the new information from the inspection. Steve would like to see a public meeting held to see if the project is even worth pursuing or if it can be done in portions. Suzie Bauldry inquired if the roadway can just be widened about three feet. The highway Commissioner reported it would have to be widened at least 6 feet of asphalt with 2-feet of gravel shoulder. This would be locked into the road rate by the time you are at the new road, it is the ditch. This cannot be proven for safety seeing as it is on the same surface. For the cost, this would be more difficult to justify. Don Sitte reported because it is a Town project the Town Board could approve this without Town Elector approval, however Don felt it was important to discuss this project at a public meeting. Lois discussed 2 loans that may drop off to alleviate some debt in the next 2-4 years. Paul Kordon, Wastewater Committee Chair, mentioned the request of extending the sewer to the campground. Doug Smith reiterated the importance of timing before having to rip up the road twice for sidewalks. This project is 100% preliminary and will need to account for the extending sewer as well as added costs. Future Fire Station- Don Sitte explained an Ad-Hoc Fire Committee was created to research and create a preliminary configuration of a new station. Tim Tishler, Ad-Hoc Fire Committee Chair, explained Keller Builders Inc was contracted for \$1,500.00 to complete a needs assessment for the current station. This would normally cost around \$15,000.00. The preliminary design is hanging in the Town Hall and is also available in the Town Office. It was built in 1963 has been added onto multiple times. There are many issues as it currently sits including, heating, garage doors, insulation, remediation for exhaust, no storage, no meeting space, washing PPE gear, no hose drying rack. Tim reported we have the most antiquated fire station in the County. The way the County is progressing, we may need a full-time firefighter within the next 10 to 20 years. Tim reiterated the Committee's main goal is to build for the future in the most cost-effective scenario. The Committee toured the Sister Bay and BUG stations to compare pros and cons. The Committee is looking at two locations including Summit Rd and Park Rd. The process would include the Committee making a recommendation to the Town Board then the Town Board bringing it to the electors. Suzie Bauldry inquired if the Summit Rd property is suitably sized for a station and any additions. This is on the 40 Acres. Brian Zak reported on the ISO review, this was completed this year. The ISO rating is how your insurance premium is based. It is based on a 5-mile radius of the location of the station. Brian stressed Summit would greatly raise insurance premiums. The Summit location would also cause concerns with the ingress and egress. Bob Bultman inquired if the Station can be built next to the current station? Tim reported it is more feasible to place the new station where the old one sits.

Francha Barnard requests to have the guardrail cut for walking traffic safety. Mariah Goode reported it is not up to the Town. The answer she received from the State is the "right of way" for the State Hwy has an easement that stretches well into Frogtown. The walking easement that could be used is a straight drop off which is not safe either. Mariah said she can contact the State again, but this is the current status of the guardrail.

Iane Pluff reported electronic recycling is scheduled at the Fire Station on June 1st from 9AM-1PM and is open to all County residents.

Viotion made/second Suzie Bauldry/Jane Pluff requests the Town buy a new sound system for the Town Hall. Barb will research this for the 2020 budget. Carried.

Don Sitte welcomed new Chairman Doug Smith.

ane Pluff thanked Don Sitte for his years of service.

2019 TOWN CLERK REPORT

The Town has a new Deputy Clerk, Katie Virlee. Katie will oversee sanitary the Town's sanitary billing accounts. She will schedule and conduct all Wastewater and Marina Committee meetings moving forward. Town Hall user fees and scheduling has been updated by Supervisor Barb Anschutz. Please contact Katie with any scheduling questions.

Voter ID is still required at the polls and for absentee (sometimes called "early") voting (certain limited exemptions do apply). In person absentee voting currently begins on the third Monday preceding an election and ends on the Friday preceding an election. In person absentee voting can occurs between the hours of 9:00AM and 3:00PM Monday through Thursday, 9:00AM until noon on the second Friday preceding an election and 9:00AM until 5:00PM on the Friday immediately preceding an election. This schedule is subject to change for each election, so it's always best to call ahead.

We continue to test your well water at the Baileys Harbor Wastewater Treatment Plant. Sample bottles and paperwork can be picked up either at the Baileys Harbor Wastewater Treatment Plant on Summit Road, or at the Town Office. Complete instructions are on the form and there is a \$25.00 fee.

Recycling continues to be available at the Baileys Harbor Green Site located on Green Site Road which connects to the east side of State Highway 57 north of the downtown area between Ahrens Road and West Meadow Road. Also available is a scrap metal bin. This service is for Baileys Harbor residents only. The Town has continued improvements to the site including more signage and accommodations. As a reminder please be sure to follow all instructions as to what is/isn't allowed for both the recycling bins and the scrap metal bins.

Building permits are issued by Brett Guilette of Inspection Specialists, LLC. He is in the lower level of the Town Hall on Wednesdays from 8:30AM to 9:30AM or he can be reached at (920) 495-3232. Zoning permits are issued by Jeff Kussow of the Door County Planning Department. That number is (920) 746-2323.

2019 BAILEYS HARBOR FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Baileys Harbor Fire Department has had a safe and successful year. Here are a few of the interesting facts from 2019:

- We responded to a total of 58 calls.
- Of those, 54 were from our Mid-Door group. (Baileys Harbor, Ephraim, & Gibraltar)
- We had 42 calls in Baileys Harbor, 2 in Ephraim, and 8 in Gibraltar along with 6 Mutual Aid.
- . We had a total of 5 Water Rescue calls this past year with our boat that is kept in the Town Marina.
- · Our Department has 28 members presently on the roster.
- We continue to put an emphasis on training so that we can have the most qualified crew possible to serve the town. The lepartment has logged 824.5 hours in calls, 894.25 hours for meetings/training, 271 hours in maintenance and 276 hours n classes.
- We had (1) Firefighter complete State Certified Officer and State Certified Fire Inspector as well as the whole department ompleted the Active Shooter training.

The Fire Department is continuing the use of the Knox Box program. Knox Box is a small key vault used to secure your ouse keys in and is mounted to your house/business. If the Department is called to your house/business for an alarm and nere is not anyone on-site, we can have the County's Communication Center release our master key from the fire truck nox Box safe and gain access to your Knox Box and obtain the keys for access to the premises, thus no forceable entry. his is highly recommended for residents with alarm systems, seasonal residents and businesses without 24 hour personnel 1-site. If you have a key holder, many times we are unaware of who it is or they may not be available. The EMR group also is access to the truck and key for medical responses. Please contact Brian Zak (Fire Chief) if interested in this program at 20/421-5421 or email info@baileysharborwifireandrescue.org. The approximate cost is around \$150.00.

The Fire Department continues applying for State and Federal Grants when possible. We also actively participate with her local and county fire departments in applying for regional grants.

The department along with all of the other departments in the county now belong to the statewide system of MABAS. ABAS is a statewide tool where we can pull resources and personnel from other department at no cost to the municipal-

The Fire department continues to have success with our Pancake Breakfast on the 4th of July and we see growth every

Ve continue to look at growing our department, so if you are interested in joining, we are interested in you. or those of you on Facebook we can be followed at Baileys Harbor Fire and Rescue. We post occasional pictures and at the Department has been doing.

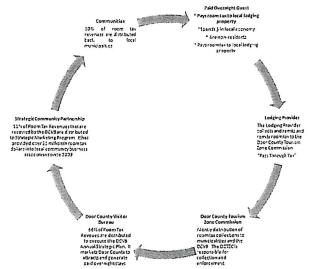

In 2009, the Baileys Harbor Historical Society (BHHS) was organized, with the help and encouragement of the Town Board, for the purpose of exploring and disseminating the history of Baileys Harbor. In 2010, its first year of operation, the Society affiliated itself with the Wisconsin Historical Society and established itself as a non-profit [501 (c) (3) organization. We mark our tenth anniversary this year.

Each summer the society presents a series of well-attended, free, public events about the interesting and lively history of Baileys Harbor. A newsletter published in the spring and fall details society activities and also presents articles on Baileys Harbor history. BHHS reaches out to the world with our website, www.baileysharborhistoricalsoiety.org> which received 44,000 visits in 2019. All of our newsletters and public programs can be accessed on the site. We maintain a Facebook page, and our public programs are available on You Tube, and have amassed over 7,000 views. DVDs of the rograms are available for purchase, and DVDs of all programs may be borrowed from the Baileys Harbor Library.

The Society has well over 100 memberships, representing interested individuals and families across the United States, and also local businesses. o support local history and join in the fun at the BHHS, visit our website, print a membership form, and send it to the indicated address. Our Annual feeting and Members Brunch is held each September and has been a great way to end the summer season.

Our 2019 public presentations included a history of our 106-year-old Womens Club, learned about the Fons family roots as personified in a ioneer cabin, and explored the beautiful log homes of Chapel Lane. The Society mounts displays in the cases outside the library as well as displays in the isitor Center during the summer. BHHS also answers historical questions about Baileys Harbor that are generated from our website and from individus calling at the Visitor Center. 2019 activities ended with ornament making at the community tree lighting party. The Baileys Harbor Historical Society looking forward to continuing our activities through 2020.
