BACKGROUND HISTORY —— In 1878 Herman Schwantes and his wife Ernestine, homesteaded 40 acres of land northeast of Spencer, Wisconsin. He later added 40 more acres and raised a family of nine children. Herman donated one acre of his land for a country school, which was named Brighton School. When Herman and his wife retired, his youngest son George purchased the farm. George and his wife, Louise, farmed the land until 1942. They had eight sons and two daughters. All of the children attended Brighton School and the youngest five graduated from Spencer High School. When George retired from farming, his oldest son Donald and his wife, Lila, purchased the farm. They raised a family of six children, all attended Brighton School, and all graduated from Spencer High School. Donald remained on the farm until his death. The farm was in the Schwantes family for 125 years.



Only two of George and Louise's children remained in the Spencer area. Don lived on the home farm, and their fourth son Leonard purchased the farm across the road. He and his wife Margaret raised seven

After their retirement, son John and his wife Emily moved back to Spencer. Four of their sons settled in Alaska, one daughter moved

to Illinois, and three others settled in other parts of Wisconsin. George and Louise were married for 67 years. Only two of the ten children are still living. The youngest daughter, Carolyn, is 94 and lives in Colorado, and the youngest son, Bill, is 90 and lives in Port Edwards, Wisconsin.

Summer in Rocketville is a different kind of busy than during the school year. Our summer school is up and running through the month of June. Many of the offerings are enrichment-style classes that are quite engaging for students. We also offer fitness classes for our middle and high school athletes and credit recovery for any high school students who might be a bit behind. We had 161 students sign up for summer school.

The summer is filled with routine cleaning, scheduled maintenance, and a fair amount of upgrades. Derek Evenson has done a great job of leading the charge as our facilities manager. Each classroom, bathroom, and space will be deep cleaned. Door stoppers are being fixed, locker combinations re-set, and small fixes throughout the building are made.

We are renovating the middle/high school office. The entry-ay will be modified to allow for a flow-through entry similar to the elementary office. This will allow for a safer entry into the building overall. The interior of the office area will also be updated and renovated. In mid

July we will be modifying the vast majority of our hallway floors. We are going with an epoxy style floor which will reduce maintenance costs and times, provide a better aesthetic, and address some of the issues we are having with pitting from salt and peeling tiles. Along with flooring, we have plans to update the hallway painting. We are going to see how much we can get done this summer. The school board also approved plans to upgrade the sound system at the football/track area.

Plans are underway for us to make some modifications to our food service

department. A few years back, we had a surplus in Fund 50 money, which is

the fund that all things food service is housed in. We had decided to offer free breakfast for all students. As those funds have been spent down, we will, unfortunately, have to return to charging for breakfast. That being said, we are excited to try some new things with our food service department. We are exploring how we can offer more non-process options for students in an effort to improve the overall nutritional quality and quantity of food served. In our parent and community survey, our stakeholders identified this as a priority. Jody Andrea will be taking over as our food service director. We are excited to see what the future holds.

Planning for the 2025-2026 school year is already underway. Our leadership team is working on a number of initiatives related to the strategic plan including but not limited to streamlined communication, improving intervention systems, offering differentiated options for students who desire a challenge, clear expectations about student behavior and the correlated responses, the use of artificial intelligence, and further learning about trauma informed care and the social and emotional needs of our students just to name a few. We will again start the school year with two "summer school" days on August 27th and 28th. By doing this, we are able to take care of many of the beginning-of-the-year logistics while capturing more state aid for our budget through summer school FTEs.

UWSP finished marking the school forest for the select harvest on April 26th, 2025. Mr. Ikert met with Nick Hovda to walk the forest and discuss next steps. The plan will be put out for bid in August with the potential for harvest in the next two winters. Thank you to Nick and Dr. Demchik, and his students for all of their help with this.


