The Reuben Waite Barn is at 430 West Street, Middletown Springs.



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

#### Dana Carpenter Was a Man for All Seasons

This year's museum exhibit, opening at the Strawberry Festival on June 23, explores the career and life of Dana Stedman Carpenter (1863-1940), business entrepreneur and popular resident of Middletown Springs from 1888 until his death in 1940. The Middletown Springs Historical Society museum collection includes a wealth of historical artifacts, photographs, books, documents, and paper records related to Carpenter, acquired over the past 50 years, including recent important acquisitions.


Dana Carpenter was a pharmacist, a well-known avocational botanist, the local photographer and printer, and the Middletown Springs Telephone Company's first manager and lineman. An active town citizen, he represented Middletown Springs in the State Legislature in 1902-1903 and 1929-1930. In local affairs, he served as Town Moderator for 20 years, Justice of the Peace, school board member, Town Auditor, Health Officer and trustee of the Public Library. He was a deacon of the Congregational Church and was active at the county and state levels in Christian Endeavor, an interdenominational Christian youth society.

Born in Westminster West and raised in Weston, Carpenter married Clara Curtis of Ira, whom he met in pharmacy training at Castleton Normal School, and in 1888, they moved to Middletown Springs. Dana and Clara opened the pharmacy in one of the shops at the Valley Hotel on East St., where they had a soda fountain with homemade ice cream. The town's first telephone exchange with its local operator was set up in the back room of the drug store around 1903.

When, c. 1905, the Carpenters were bequeathed the Horace Clark house on West St., they moved there from their previous home on West St. next to St. Anne's Catholic Church. Later Dana moved the pharmacy to a building next door to the Clark house, now known as Sissy's Kitchen. Upstairs, above the expanded pharmacy and general store, "Carp" had his printing shop and photography studio. Clara died in 1917, and Carpenter later married Aurora Stewart of Rutland. Together they raised two foster daughters, Harriet Kenyon and Thelma Day.

#### **Pleasant View Cemetery News**

The entrance gate of the Pleasant View Cemetery has been officially open to the public since the first of May.

The trustees are pleased to report that we were once again able to connect with the Middletown Springs Elementary School students and enlist their help with our annual spring cleanup efforts. Special thanks to Mr. John Carlson and especially the fifth and sixth grade classes this year for their interest and participation in raking and building piles of tree limbs and other debris for subsequent pickup and disposal.

At the end of April, the students spent a portion of an afternoon on this effort, and they really did a fantastic job cleaning up the many hundreds of small broken off tree limbs so mowing could begin. We greatly appreciate their assistance and cooperative effort in getting the cemetery back up to snuff. They did a wonderful job.

Special thanks to Art Castle for his assistance with raking and hauling away many pickup loads of debris. Thank you Art!

As you visit the grounds and take in the sight and sound of American flags flapping in the breeze, offer a 'thank you' to April Blair and Rich Baptie. They have completed the task of marking the gravesites of our military veterans for the last several years, and have donated a new large flag to fly at the cemetery entrance when needed. Thank you Rich and April!

The grounds are scheduled to be mowed every two weeks. Weed-whacking is scheduled with every other mowing, and we try to build the mowing schedule to coincide with the major memorial remembrances of Memorial Day and July 4 as best we can. It is a big job, and a challenging one, as there are obstacles galore! Green Mountain Boys Landscaping from Wells have done a wonderful job for us, and the end result is certainly worthy and deserving of the effort involved.

Lot holders are reminded to clean up and remove any old, damaged, or unwanted decorations from their plots as soon as possible. We try to pick up the leftover Christmas wreaths, old plants, and broken decorations as best we can, and lot holders can and certainly should help out in this regard. We welcome and encourage public utilization and enjoyment of this beautiful and peaceful setting. It is also a safe haven for pets to enjoy as well; we ask any and all responsible pet owners to be vigilant and to clean up any 'deposits' that may be left behind. ### Strawberry Festival Continues Classic Summer Tradition at Middletown Springs Historical Society

The 49th Annual Strawberry Festival continues a long summer tradition at the Middletown Springs Historical Society on Sunday, June 23, from 2 pm- 4 pm. The festival includes a craft fair, live music, a new exhibit about Dana S. Carpenter (1863-1940) business entrepreneur and popular citizen of Middletown Springs, and a related children's program.

Strawberry lovers are invited to the Historical Society building on the green in Middletown Springs for delicious strawberry shortcake made with fresh Vermont berries, homemade biscuits, vanilla ice cream and whipped cream, with a choice of iced tea, lemonade, or hot coffee. Berries will also be available for sale by the quart.

Local artists and craftspeople will display and sell their work, including maple products, jewelry, photography, knitted items, honey and beeswax products. There will be live music during the event, and a variety of items will be raffled off.

The festival marks the opening of a new exhibit in the Historical Society's museum, "Dana Carpenter, A Man for All Seasons, featuring photographs, artifacts, and written accounts of Carpenter's career as a botanist, pharmacist, photographer, and active citizen. A special program for children attending the festival will be creating botanical prints by pressing flowers and plant materials. Admission to the museum and the children's program are free.



The MSHS collection documents Carpenter's business, professional, and avocational pursuits, as well as his community and family life. Many of these collection items will be on exhibit, including Carpenter's framed pharmaceutical degree certificate, shelving and apothecary bottles from his drugstore, botanical specimens and notebooks, glass plate photography prints and equipment, printing blocks and printed material from his shop, and personal photo albums and scrapbooks.

The exhibit will also include excerpts from newspapers and other publications, some written after personal interviews, that reveal more about Carpenter's personality and character. For example, the Autumn 1962 issue of Vermont Life featured an article by George Haig, son of the Congregational Church pastor, who remembered his Middletown Springs boyhood in the early 1900s. In 1962, Haig wrote:

"...the real point of interest for small fry was Dana Carpenter's drug store and ice cream emporium, and Dana Carpenter himself. The ice cream dispensary would have been popular in its own right, but its interest... was greatly enhanced by the presence of the village telephone switchboard, in full view and hearing of anybody who entered the store." Haig recalled that the village boys were always on the lookout for "Carp" on his bicycle as he rode around town to repair telephone lines strung from house to tree to barn to pole. "Carp had to be prepared to climb trees, scale barn roofs, or, if everything else failed, install a rickety pole to keep the system in operating order".

The exhibit, which runs through March 2025, will be augmented by public programs about botany and glass plate photography. The exhibit opening at the Strawberry Festival will feature a children's activity, creating botanical prints from the natural dyes of flowers, and plant parts.



# A Note from the Town Treasurer

Property Tax payments for the 4th and FINAL Quarter of Fiscal Year 23/24 are due on or before Monday, June 17, 2024 – we have two extra days this year to remit, since the 15th falls on a Saturday. Remit tax payments either via Mail (6/17/24 or earlier postmark,) to PO Box 1022, OR deposit them into the black Drop Box on the OUTSIDE of the Town Office by end of day 6/17/24.

PLEASE, do not remit taxes to the Town Clerk, as she is not authorized to accept them.

If you require a receipt, please include a self addressed, stamped envelope with your remittance.

Tax payments postmarked after 6/17/24 or received in the drop box after 6/17/24 are considered late and DELINQUENT and a penalty and late fee will be assessed as follows:

Penalty: 8 % on all FY 23/24 outstanding amounts, and Late fee: 1% interest for the 1 st 3 months of delinquency, and 1.5% interest per month thereafter on 4th quarter amount due. DELINQUENT taxes from FY 23/24 will be forwarded to our Delinquent Tax Collector, Debra House, for collection.

FYI – new tax bills will be mailed directly to all property owners in mid-August for FY24/25. Please save them as you will need them for tax payment, mortgage escrow, refinance, and annual homestead declaration. It is your responsibility to ensure that your mortgage company has a copy. If you have an update to your mailing address, please advise prior to August 1st.
