Said transmission line shall be constructed so as to conform to the Safety Code prescribed by the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin, and shall be located so as not to interfere with travel upon said highways, as near the outer limits of said highways as is practicable, and shall, if necessary, be altered so as to permit such modification or improvements in said highways as may hereafter be ordered by duly authorized officers. In the construction of said transmission line, care shall be taken to avoid undue or unnecessary cutting of trees or shrubbery along the roadside. Whenever such power line is constructed along a county highway, the County Highway Commission shall be notified at the time the construction force is about to begin operations. When the construction is along a state trunk highway, the State Highway Commission shall be notified. Such instructions with regard to construction as may be given on the ground by an authorized representative of the county or state with reference to construction along a road over which either may have jurisdiction as provided by law shall be obeyed implicitly.

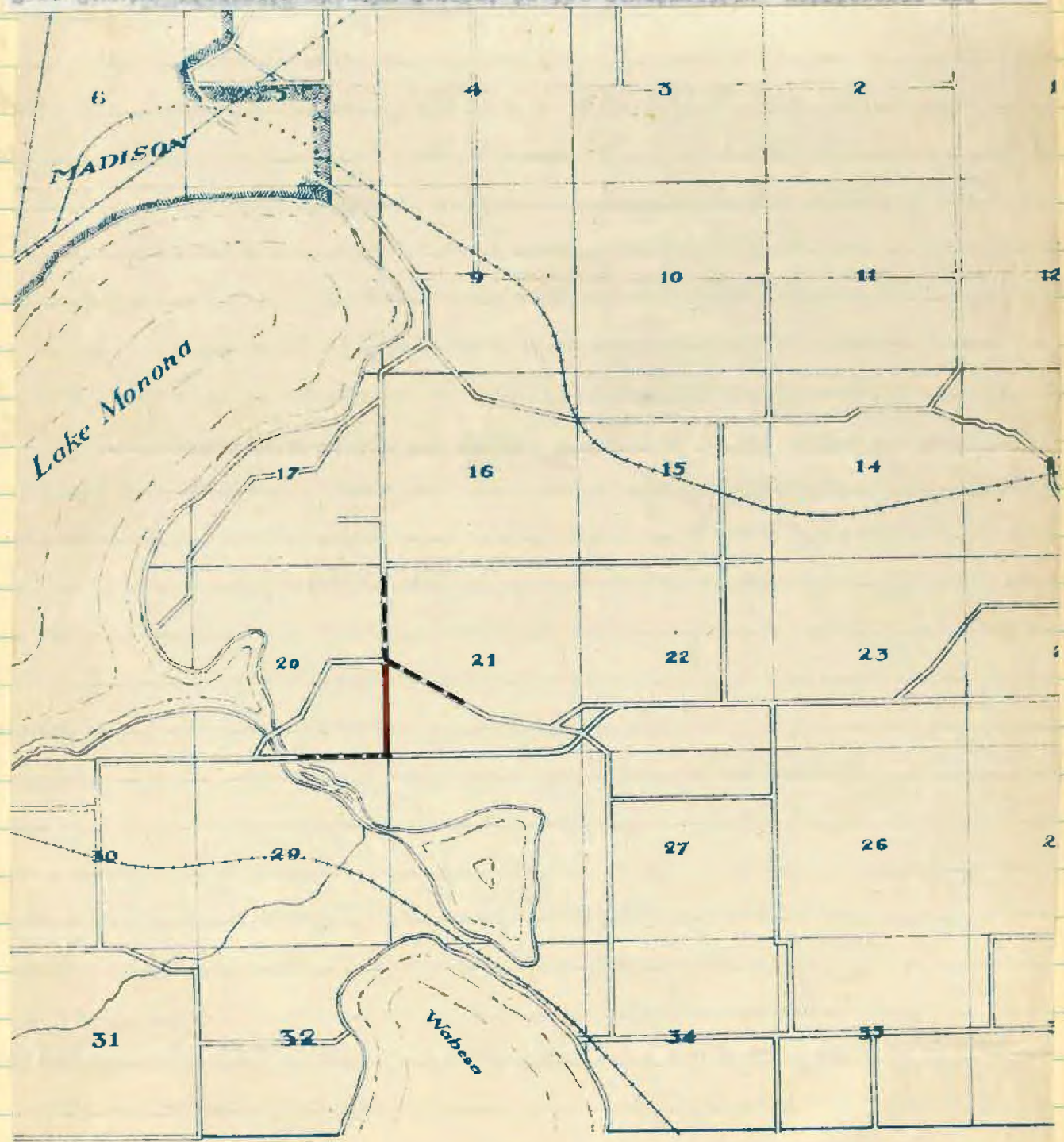

Found that over half of the culverts were stopped with either dirt or ice. Also, many driveways, etc. need culverts.

Due to the fact that residents & others have an investment of several thousand dollars in culverts & the town has a very large investment in black top roads, it was agreed & recommended that the highway patrolmen give the entire road drainage system a thorough going over, cleaning culverts, relocating improperly placed culverts & making a list of all new culverts where needed. This is to be done as soon as weather conditions permit.

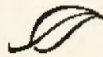

AN ORDINANCE BY THE TOWN BOARD OF THE TOWN OF BLOOMING GROVE,

Pursuant to the provisions of sections 61.35, 62.23, and 60.29 (13) of the Wisconsin Statutes and by virtue of the powers conferred upon it by a resolution adopted by the annual town meeting of the Town of Blooming Grove on April 6, 1937, pursuant to subsection twelve (12) of section 60.18 of the Wisconsin Statutes; the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove do ordain as follows:

1. Plan Commission

a. That there shall be organized immediately upon the passage and posting of this ordinance a Village Plan Commission for the Village of Waunona an unincorporated village existing in and being part of the Town of Blooming Grove, said commission to consist of the town chairman, who shall be its presiding officer, one town supervisor in addition to the town chairman, and three (3) citizen members, who shall serve without compensation.

b. That the town supervisor member of the commission, who shall serve in addition to the town chairman, shall be elected by a two-thirds vote of the town board immediately upon this ordinance taking effect, and during each April thereafter.

c. Three citizen members shall be appointed by the town chairman, immediately upon passage of this ordinance, to hold office for a period ending one, two, and three years, respectively, from the succeeding first day of May, and thereafter annually during April one such member shall be appointed for a term of three years. They shall receive no compensation for their services.

d. Until such future time when a Park Board shall have been created, and the office of the Town of Village Engineer shall have been established, there shall be appointed annually additional citizen members of said commission, as follows: Immediately after passage of this ordinance the town chairman shall appoint two citizen members to serve one year from the succeeding first day of May, and thereafter for one year each until such time as there shall be established a Park Board or the office of Town or Village Engineer, when the president of such Park Board and the Town or Village Engineer, as the case may be, shall take office in the place of such citizen members respectively.

2. Meetings, Officers, and Quorum - - The Plan Commission for said unincorporated village of Waunona shall choose such officers as it shall deem desirable not inconsistent with the provisions of the statutes, and shall adopt a program of regular meetings at stated intervals, which meetings shall be open to the public. Four members present shall constitute a quorum competent to transact business. Complete minutes of the meetings, regular or special, shall be kept by the secretary of the Commission, who shall keep the same conveniently open to the inspection of any citizen of the said unincorporated village.

3. Functions --

a. The village plan commission, shall upon request of the town board, recommend to the said board a zoning plan to regulate the location of industries, and of buildings designed for specific uses, in the unincorporated village of Waunona. Tentative recommendations shall be



first formulated and public hearings held thereon. After submission of the final recommendations, the town board may from time to time change the districts and regulations, as recommended or as adopted, upon giving at least ten day's notice, by posting of such notice in three places within the unincorporated village, of the proposed changes and of hearing thereon, and opportunity to any person interested to be heard.

b. The town board shall refer any question concerning the location and architectural design of any public building, the location of any statue or other memorial, the location, extension, widening, enlargement, ornamentation, and parking on any street, parking way, boulevard, park, or other public grounds within the village of Waunona to such commission for its consideration and report before final action is taken thereon by the town board. All plats or replats of any lands within the village of Waunona shall be submitted to the plan commission for its recommendation to the board before the same are approved by the board.

4. Consultants -- The Plan Commission may, with the approval of the Town Board, employ such expert advisers as it shall deem necessary in carrying on its work.

5. Recommendations of the Plan Commission -- The Plan Commission shall be merely an advisory body and its recommendations and decisions shall become effective only by the formal action of the town board by ordinance or resolution.

6. Ordinance, When Effective -- This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval, posting, and recording according to law.

#### AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE establishing a zoning plan, regulating and restricting the location of trades and industries, and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, in the unincorporated village of Waunona existing in and being part of the Town of Blooming Grove, Dane County, Wisconsin, pursuant to sections 60.18 (12), 61.35, and 62.23 of the Wisconsin Statutes;

WHEREAS, It is the desire of the citizens of said unincorporated village, and the Town Board, to prevent congestion, and to promote and provide for the health, safety, convenience, comfort, prosperity, and general welfare of the citizens of said unincorporated village;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it ordained by the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove;

#### Section 1. Zoning-Definitions:

Certain words in this ordinance are defined for the purposes hereof as follows:

a. Words used in the present tense include the future; words in the singular number include the plural, and words in the plural number include the singular; the word "building" includes the word "structure"; the word "shall" is mandatory and not directory.



b. **Accessory Building:** A subordinate building or portion of main building, the use of which is incidental to that of the main building.

c. **Boarding House:** A building, other than a hotel, where lodging and meals, for five or more persons, are furnished for compensation.

d. **Building:** Any form of construction for the shelter, support, or enclosure of persons, animals, or chattels; and when separated by division walls from the ground up, and without opening, each portion of such building shall be deemed a separate building.

e. **Dwelling, One-Family:** A detached building, having accommodations for and occupied by only one family.

f. **Dwelling, Two-Family:** A detached or semi-detached building having accommodations for and occupied as a dwelling by not more than two families.

g. **Hotel:** A building occupied as the more or less temporary abiding place of individuals who are lodged with or without meals, in which as a rule the rooms are occupied singly for hire, in which provision is not made for cooking in an individual apartment, and in which there are more than fifteen sleeping rooms, a public dining room for the accommodation of more than fifteen guests and a general kitchen.

h. **Lodging House:** A building other than a hotel, where lodging for five or more persons is provided for compensation.

i. **Lot lines:** The lines bounding a lot as defined herein.

j. **Non-conforming Use:** A building or premises occupied by a use that does not conform with the regulations of the use district in which it is situated.

k. **Setback:** The minimum horizontal distance between the front line of the building, including enclosed and unenclosed porches, and the street line.

l. **Street:** A public thoroughfare more than twenty feet wide.

m. **Tourist Camp:** The term "tourist camp" as used in this ordinance shall mean any lot, piece or parcel of ground, municipally or privately owned or operated, where two or more cabins, camp cottages, tents, tent houses, trailer coaches or similar structures, used as living, eating or sleeping quarters, are or are intended to be located; such camps being



open and designated to the public as tourist camps and operated for longer without compensation. Tourist cabins and trailer coaches (with or without wheels) shall not, for the purposes of this ordinance, be considered as one-family dwellings, two-family dwellings, lodging houses, or boarding houses.

## Section 2--Districts

In order to regulate and restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings erected or altered for specified purposes, and to limit the bulk of buildings hereafter erected or altered, to regulate and limit the maximum building area of the lot, and to regulate and determine the area of yards and other open spaces surrounding such buildings, the unincorporated village of Waunona is hereby divided into three (3) districts as follows:

a. Residential district-- This district shall include all areas within the said unincorporated village not hereinafter designated as commercial or industrial.

b. Commercial districts-- The commercial districts within the said unincorporated village shall be as follows:

(1) Three hundred feet along the east side of U. S. Highway No. 51 on either side of its intersection with State Trunk Highway No. 30 and eastward along both sides of State Trunk Highway No. 30 three hundred (300) feet from said intersection, said area not to extend back from the highway on which it fronts more than 120 feet.

(2) Four hundred (400) feet north on both sides of U. S. Highway No. 51 from its intersection with Winnequah Road, also known as Pennsylvania Avenue, said area not to extend back from the highway on which it fronts more than 120 feet.

(3) Five hundred feet west and five hundred feet east along both sides of U. S. Highway 12 from its intersection with U. S. Highway No. 51 and five hundred feet northerly along both sides of U. S. Highway No. 51 from said intersection, said area not to extend back more than five hundred feet from the highway on which it fronts.

c. Industrial Districts-- The industrial districts within said unincorporated village shall be as follows:



(1) Five hundred feet on each side of the right of way of the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad.

(2) A strip of land five hundred feet in width on the north side of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul, and Pacific Ry. Co. right of way, commencing 600 feet east of Fair Oaks Avenue and continuing east to the town line.

(3) A strip of land five hundred feet in width on the south side of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul, and Pacific Ry. Co., right of way, commencing at Fair Oaks Avenue and continuing east to the section line between sections five (5) and four (4).

(4) A strip of land five hundred feet in width along the north side of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul, and Pacific Ry. Co., right of way, commencing at U. S. Highway No. 12 and extending eastward along said right of way to the east line of said unincorporated village.

### Section 3--Use Regulations

a. In Residence Districts no building or structure shall be erected, constructed, altered or maintained which shall be used, or intended to be used, for any purpose other than that of a one or two family dwelling, boarding or lodging house for not more than ten boarders or roomers, religious, public or educational institutions and accessory buildings, as defined in section 1 (b) hereof. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as permitting the construction or maintenance of tourist camps or tourist cabins in residential districts. A billboard, signboard, or advertising sign shall in no case be permitted as an accessory use in residential districts. The placing of a "for sale" or "for rent" sign shall, however, be permitted as an accessory use. Nothing contained herein shall prevent the use by a physician, surgeon, dentist, or other persons practicing the art of healing, artist, or musician or other profession of his or her residence as an office or studio.

b. In commercial districts no building, structure, or premises shall be erected, or maintained which shall be used, or intended to be used for boiler shop, coal, lumber, wood, brick, stone, cement, or junk yards, or storage scrap iron or scrap paper, oil or gasoline, factory employing more



than five people, any industry prohibited in Industrial Districts and any business or industry noxious or offensive by reason of the omission of odor, dust, gas, vapor, smoke, or noise.

c. In Industrial Districts no building, structures, or premises shall be erected, constructed, altered or maintained which shall be used or designed, or intended to be used for the manufacture of explosives, reduction, collection or incineration of offal carcasses, garbage, or refuse, making soap, candles, glue, tallow, oil, bone or fat boiling, or any other purpose so inherently dangerous to persons or to property so noxious or offensive by reason of the emission of odor, dust, gas, vapor, smoke, or noise.

#### Section 4--Non-Conforming Uses

a. The lawful use of land existing April 27, 1937, at the time of the adoption of the regulations/in this chapter, may be continued, although such use does not conform to the provisions hereof, but if such non-conforming use is discontinued, any future use of said premises shall be in conformity with the provisions of this chapter.

b. The lawful use of a building existing April 27, 1937, at the time of the adoption of the regulations herein contained, may be continued although such use does not conform with the provisions hereof, and such use may be extended throughout the building, provided no structural alterations, except those required by law or ordinance, are made therein. Whenever a non-conforming use of a building has been changed to a more restricted use or to a conforming use, such use shall not thereafter be changed to a less restricted use.

c. The structural alterations made in a building devoted in whole or in part to a non-conforming use shall not during its life exceed fifty per cent of its assessed value, nor shall the building be enlarged unless the use therein is changed to a conforming use.

d. Where a building located in a district restricted against its use has been destroyed by fire or other calamity to the extent of not more than one-half of its assessed value a permit may be granted for its reconstruction within a period not to exceed twelve months, from the date of such fire or other calamity.



### Section 5--Area Regulations

a. No building shall hereafter be erected in the Residence District whose area exceeds 40% of the area of the lot or plot upon which they are erected, nor shall they be built so as to extend within fifteen feet of the street line, or within eight feet of any side line or within ten feet from the rear line, excepting that a garage or other accessory building not more than fourteen feet in height, may be built up to three feet of the rear or side line, but must be at least fifty feet from the street line.

b. But in such district where at least one-half of the buildings on either side of the street between two intersections conform to a greater set back line than above required, or where the recorded plat provides for a greater set back line, no new buildings and no alterations of an existing building shall project beyond such greater set back line.

c. In a residential district no dwelling shall be erected or altered to accommodate or make provision for more than one family for each five thousand (5000) square feet of the area of the lot.

### Section 6--Inspector of Buildings

a. Creation of office-- The office of Inspector of buildings is hereby established. The inspector of buildings shall be appointed by the town board and shall hold office for one year from date of appointment.

b. Duties-- It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Buildings to enforce the provisions of this ordinance, and to issue building permits for a fee to be set by the town board upon recommendation of the plan commission.

### Section 7--Board of Zoning Appeals

a. Creation and Membership--A Board of Appeals is hereby established. The word "Board" when used in this section shall be construed to mean the Board of Appeals. The board shall consist of five members appointed by the chairman of the town board for terms respectively in the first instance of two for one year, two for two years, and one for three years; appointments thereafter to be for three years each. One of the members of the board shall be an architect or structural engineer of not less than ten (10) years practical experience.



The chairmand of the board shall be designated by the town chairman.

All members of the board shall serve without compensation.

b. Meetings--Meetings of the board shall be held at least once every sixty (60) days and at each such other times as the board may determine. There shall be a fixed place of meeting and all meetings shall be open to the public. The board shall keep minutes of its proceedings, showing the vote of each member upon every question. The board shall adopt, from time to time, such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this ordinance.

c. Appeal--Appeal from the ruling of the inspector of buildings concerning the enforcement of the provisions of this ordinance may be made to the Board of Appeals within such time as shall be proscribed by the Board by general rule. Appellant shall file with the inspector of buildings and with the Board of Appeals a notice of appeal specifying the grounds thereof. The inspector of buildings shall forthwith transmit to the board all the papers constituting the record upon which the action appealed from was taken. The final disposition of any such appeal shall be in the form of a resolution, either reversing, modifying or affirming, wholly or partly, the decision or determination appealed from. The concurring vote of four (4) members of such board shall be necessary to pass resolution.

d. Stay--An appeal stays all proceedings in furtherance of the action appealed from unless the inspector of buildings, from whom the appeal is taken, certifies to the Board of Appeals, after the notice of appeal shall have been filed with him, that by reason of facts stated in the certificate, a stay would in his opinion cause imminent peril to life or property, in which case proceedings shall not be stayed otherwise than by restraining order which shall be granted by the Board of Appeals or the Circuit Court, on application, on notice to the inspector of buildings from whom the appeal is taken and on due cause shown.

e. Jurisdiction--In specific cases the Board of Appeals may, after public notice and hearing, authorize by permitting a variation of the application of the use, and area regulations, herein established in harmony with their purpose and intent as follows:



(1) A temporary building for commerce or industry, in a residence district, which is incidental to the residential development, such permit to be issued for a period of not more than one (1) year.

(2) The extension of a use district for a distance of not more than twenty-five (25) feet where the boundary line of a district divides a lot in a single ownership at the time of the adoption of this ordinance.

(3) The alterations or enlargement of an existing building located in a district restricted against its use, where such alteration or enlargement is a necessary incident to the business existing at the time of the adoption of this ordinance, provided, however, that such alteration shall not unduly prolong the life of the building.

(4) The erection and use of a building of the use of a premises in any location to a public service corporation or for a public utility purpose which the board admits reasonably necessary for the public convenience or welfare.

(5) A building or use in an industrial district otherwise excluded from such district, provided such building or use is distinctly incidental and essential to a use permitted in an industrial district, provided such incidental building or use occupies not more than ten (10) per cent of the lot, provided that not more than ten (10) per cent of the employees of the building or plant are engaged therein and provided that such building or use is not located within fifty (50) feet of any street or lot line.

(6) The interpretation of the provisions of this ordinance in such a way as to carry out the intent and purpose of the plan, as shown upon the maps fixing the several districts accompanying and made a part of this ordinance where the street layout actually on the ground varies from the street layout as shown on the maps aforesaid.

(7) Where there are practical difficulties or unnecessary hardships in the way of carrying out the strict letter of this ordinance, the Board of Appeals shall have the power in a specific case to vary or modify any of the these rules, regulations relating to the location or area,



the construction, structural changes in, equipment or alteration of building or structures, in harmony with their fundamental purpose and intent so that the public health safety and general welfare may be secured and substantial justice done.

#### Section 8--Building Permits--Certificate of Occupancy and Compliance

No premises shall be occupied or used and no building now or hereafter erected or altered shall be occupied, used or changed in use until a certificate of occupancy and compliance shall have been issued by the Inspector of Buildings, stating that the building or proposed use of a building, or premises complies with all the building and health laws and ordinances and with the provisions of these regulations.

Certificates of occupancy and compliance shall be applied for coincident with the application for a building permit and shall be issued within ten (10) days after the erection or alteration of such buildings shall have been completed in conformity with the provisions of these regulations. A record of all certificates shall be kept on file in the office of the Inspector of Buildings and copies be furnished on request, to any person having a proprietary or tenancy interest in the building affected.

No permit for excavation for any building shall be issued before application has been made for certificate of occupancy and compliance.

#### Section 9--Interpretation Purpose

a. In interpreting and applying the provisions of this Ordinance, provisions thereof shall be held to be the minimum requirements adopted for the promotion of the public health, safety, comfort, convenience and general welfare. The lot or yard areas required by this Ordinance for a particular building, shall not be diminished and shall not be included as a part of the required lot or yard areas of any other building.

b. The lot or yard areas of buildings existing at the time of the passage of this Ordinance shall not be diminished below the requirements herein provided for buildings hereafter erected and such required areas shall not be included as a part of the required areas of any building hereafter erected.



c. This ordinance shall not interfere with, or abrogate or annul any easements, covenants, or other agreements between parties, provided, however, that where this Ordinance imposes a greater restriction upon the use of buildings or premises, or upon the height or size of buildings or requires larger yards than are imposed or required by such existing provisions of law or ordinance or by such rules, regulations or by such easements, covenants or agreements, the provisions of this Ordinance shall control.

#### Section 10--Amendments

The Town Board may, from time to time, amend, supplement, or change by ordinance, the boundaries of districts or regulations herein established. Any proposed amendment or supplement or change shall first be submitted to the Planning Commission for its recommendation and report.

A public hearing shall be held by the Town Board before adoption of any proposed amendment, supplement or change, notice of which hearing shall be given by placing said notice in three (3) conspicuous places within the village, stating the time and place of such hearing, not earlier than ten (10) days from the date of such posting.

If a protest against any proposed amendment, supplement or change be presented in writing to the town clerk, within ten days from date of posting duly signed and acknowledged by the owners of twenty per cent (20%) of the frontage immediately in the rear thereof, or by the owners of twenty per cent of the frontage directly opposite the frontage proposed to be altered, such amendment, supplement, or change shall not be passed except by a unanimous vote of the Town Board.

#### Section 11 Penalty for Violation

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects or refuses to comply with or who resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars or more than One Hundred (\$100.00) dollars, for each offense. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.



### Section 12--Invalidity of a Part

The sections, subsections, districts and building line forming parts of or established by this ordinance and the several parts, provisions and regulations thereof are hereby declared to be independant sections, subsections, districts, building lines, areas, parts, provisions and regulations and the holding of any such section, subsection, district, building line, part provision or regulations thereof to be unconstitutional, void or ineffective for any cause shall not effect nor render invalid any other such sections, subsections, districts, building line, part, provision or regulation thereof or hereof.

### Section 13--Appeal of Present Ordinance

The zoning order of the town board dated March 31, 1931, is hereby repealed.

### Section 14--Emergency When Effective

This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate perservation of the public health, safety and general welfare of the unincorporated village of Waunona for the reason that various uses of property inconsistent with the proposed plan of the unincorporated village of Waunona development herein provided, are believed to be imminent and that such uses would permanently injure or partially nullify such orderly plan of development, and impair such necessary public health, safety and general welfare.

This ordinance shall go into immediate effect upon its passage.

#### AN ORDINANCE

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Street Numbers All lots and parts of lots in the unincorporated village of Waunona existing in and being part of the Town of Blooming Grove shall be numbered in accordance with a certain map now on file in the office of the Inspector of Buildings in the Blooming Grove Town Hall, which is designated "A Street/Numbering Map." All lots and parts of lots hereafter platted shall be numbered



to conform as nearly as possible to the general scheme of numbering as outlined on said map.

**Section 2. Assignment of Numbers** It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Buildings to assign a number in conformance with the said map at the time a building permit is granted for the erection of any new building on any lot within the boundaries of the unincorporated village of Waunona.

**Section 3. New Buildings** It shall be the duty of each owner or occupant of any building fronting upon any street, within twenty (20) days after the completion of such building to attach securely, or apply to the front of same, in a conspicuous position, and not higher than the first or ground story of said building, so that the same can be plainly seen from the street, the proper number of such building as inscribed upon said map, in figures not less than two (2") inches and a half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) inch in height; and said owner or occupant shall at all times keep such numbers so attached or applied. In event that the building is remote from the road or street on which it fronts, the number may be placed on the mail box or upon some suitable post or standard to be approved by the Inspector of Buildings.

**Section 4. Existing Buildings** It shall be the duty of each owner or occupant of any building already completed or in existence on the <sup>15th</sup> ~~18th~~ day of <sup>June</sup> ~~May~~, 1937, the date of passage of this ordinance, to comply with the provisions of section three (3) of this ordinance within one (1) year after he has been duly notified of the passage of this ordinance and a number has been assigned to him.

**Section 5 Penalty** If the owner or occupant of any building required by this ordinance to be numbered shall neglect to number said building within the time prescribed in sections three (3) and four (4), the Town Constable shall serve on him a notice requiring such owner to properly number the same, and if he neglects to do so for ten (10) days after the service of such notice he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be subject to a fine of One Dollar (\$1.00), and for every subsequent period of ten (10) days for which he shall neglect to properly number his said premises as required, he shall be subject to a fine of like amount.



**Section 6. Street Names** The different streets in the unincorporated village of Waunona shall bear the names given on the map referred to in section 1 hereof.

**Section 7. Repeal of Present Ordinance** The street numbering ordinance adopted by the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove on the 21st day of July, 1933, is hereby repealed.

**Section 8. Ordinance, When Effective** This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon its passage and posting as prescribed by law.

An Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance of the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove, enacted on the 27th day of April, 1937.

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove, Dane County, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 2 b of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove, enacted on the 27th day of April, 1937, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following provision, to-wit:

An area extending eastward along the south side of State Trunk Highway 30 from the Northeast corner of Lot twelve (12), Block sixteen (16), Lake Edge Park Plat to the intersection of said highway 30 and the Dempsey Road, said area extending southward from said highway 30 for a distance of 150 feet; also beginning at a point on the North side of said highway 30 at a point opposite the Northeast corner of said Lot 12, Block 16, Lake Edge Park Plat and thence extending eastward to the intersection of said highway 30 and the Dempsey road, said area extending back from the highway to the industrial area bordering the C. & N. AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE establishing a zoning plan, regulating and restricting the location of trades and industries, and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, in the unincorporated village of Waunona existing in and being part of the Town of Blooming Grove, Dane County, Wisconsin, pursuant to sections 60.18 (12), 61.35, and 62.23 of the Wisconsin Statutes;

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the citizens of said unincorporated village, and the Town Board, to prevent congestion, and to promote and provide for the health, safety, convenience, comfort, prosperity, and general welfare of the citizens of said unincorporated village;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove:

Section 1. Zoning-Definitions:

Certain words in this ordinance are defined for the purpose hereof as follows:

a. Words used in the present tense include the future; words in the singular number include the plural, and words in the plural number include the singular; the word "building" includes the word "structure"; the word "shall" is mandatory and not directory.

b. Accessory Building: A subordinate building or portion of main building, the use of which is incidental to that of the main building.

c. Boarding House: A building, other than a hotel, where lodging and meals, for five or more persons, are furnished for compensation.

d. Building: Any form of construction for the shelter, support, or enclosure of persons, animals, or chattels; and when separated by division walls from the ground up, and without opening, each portion of such building shall be deemed a separate building.

e. Dwelling, one family: A detached building, having accommodations for and occupied by only one family.



f. Dwelling, two family: A detached or semi-detached building having accommodations for and occupied as a dwelling by not more than two families.

g. Hotel: A building occupied as the more or less temporary abiding place of individuals who are lodged with or without meals, in which as a rule the rooms are occupied singly for hire, in which provision is not made for cooking in any individual apartment, and in which there are more than fifteen sleeping rooms, a public dining room for the accommodation of more than fifteen guests and a general kitchen.

h. Lodging House: A building other than a hotel, where lodging for five or more persons is provided for compensation.

i. Lot lines: The lines bounding a lot as defined herein.

j. Non-conforming use: A building or premises occupied by a use that does not conform with the regulations of the use district in which it is situated.

k. Setback: The minimum horizontal distance between the front line of the building, including enclosed and un-enclosed porches, and the street line.

l. Street: A public thoroughfare more than twenty feet wide.

m. Tourist Camp: The term "tourist camp" as used in this section shall mean any lot, piece or parcel of ground, municipally or privately owned or operated, where two or more cabins, camp cottages, tents, tent houses, trailer coaches or similar structures, used as living, eating or sleeping quarters, are or are intended to be located; such camps being open and designated to the public as tourist camps and operated for or without compensation. Tourist cabins and trailer coaches, with or without wheels shall not, for the purpose of this ordinance, be considered as one family dwellings, two family dwellings, lodging houses, or boarding houses.

## Section 2 - Use Districts

In order to regulate and restrict the location of trades and



industries and the location of buildings erected or altered for specified purposes, and to limit the bulk of buildings hereafter erected or altered, to regulate and limit the maximum building area of the lot, and to regulate and determine the area of yards and other open spaces surrounding such buildings, the unincorporated village of Waunona is hereby divided into three districts as follows:

a. Residential district-- This district shall include all areas within the said unincorporated village not hereinafter designated as commercial or industrial.

b. Commercial districts

(1.) Class "A" Commercial District-- The following area within the said unincorporated village shall be designated as Class "A" commercial district.

(a) The Northwest Quarter ( $NW\frac{1}{4}$ ) of Section 28 and all that part of the Northeast Quarter ( $NE\frac{1}{4}$ ) of Section 29 north of the Yahara River in the Town of Blooming Grove.

(2.) Class "B" Commercial District-- The following areas within the said unincorporated village shall be designated as Class "B" commercial district.

(a) An area three hundred (300) feet north and three hundred (300) feet south along the east of U. S. Highway 51, also known as Monona Drive, from its intersection with State Trunk Highway 30, and eastward along both sides of State Trunk Highway 30, three hundred (300) feet from said intersection, said area not to extend back from the highway on which it fronts more than 120 feet.

(b) An area five hundred (500) feet north and five hundred (500) feet south along the west side of U. S. Highway 51, also known as Monona Drive, from the intersection of said U. S. Highway 51, and Dean Avenue, said area not to extend back from the highway on which it fronts more than one hundred twenty (120) feet.

(c) An area extending westward along the north side of U. S. Highway 12 and 18 from the intersection of said highway and Fayette Street to the intersection of said highway and Frazier Avenue; thence westward along the north side of Frazier Avenue



intersection along the west side of Raywood Road to its intersection with U. S. Highway 12 and 18; thence westward along the north side of Highway 12 and 18 to its intersection with Esther Beach Road, said area not to extend back more than 150 feet from the street or highway on which it fronts.

(d) An area five hundred (500) feet east and three hundred (300) feet west along both sides of State Trunk Highway 30, from its intersection with Dempsey Road and six hundred (600) feet north along both sides of Dempsey Road from said intersection, said area not to extend back from the street or highway on which it fronts more than one hundred fifty (150) feet.

c. Industrial Districts-- The following areas within the said unincorporated village shall be designated as industrial districts.

(1) Five hundred (500) feet on each side of the right of way of the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad.

(2) A strip of land five hundred (500) feet in width on the north side of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Ry. Co. right of way, commencing six hundred (600) feet east of Fair Oaks Avenue and continuing east to the Town line.

(3) A strip of land five hundred (500) feet in width on the south side of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Ry. Co. right of way, commencing at Fair Oaks Avenue and continuing east to the section line between sections five (5) and four (4).

(4) A strip of land five hundred (500) feet in width along the north side of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Ry. Co. right of way, commencing at U. S. Highway 12 and extending eastward along said right of way to the east line of said unincorporated village.

### Section 3--Use Regulations

a. Residential Districts-- In residence districts no building or structure shall be erected, constructed, altered or maintained which shall be used, or intended to be used, for any purpose other than that of a one or two family dwelling, boarding or lodging house, for not more than ten (10) boarders or roomers, religious,



In section 1 b.

Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as permitting the erection or maintenance of tourist camps or tourist cabins in residential districts. A billboard, signboard, or advertising sign shall in no case be permitted as an accessory use in residential districts. The placing of a "for sale" or "for rent" sign shall, however, be permitted as an accessory use. Nothing contained herein shall prevent the use by a physician, surgeon, dentist, or other persons practicing the art of healing, artist, or musician or other professions of his or her residence as an office or studio.

b. Commercial Districts:

(1) In Class "A" Commercial Districts no building or premises shall be used and no building shall hereafter be erected or altered, except for one or more of the following uses:

- (a) Any use permitted in Residential Districts.
- (b) Hotels
- (c) Trailer camps
- (d) Tourist camps and/or tourist cabins
- (e) Boat liveries
- (f) Filling stations
- (g) Grocery stores and meat markets
- (h) Drug stores
- (i) Dry goods stores
- (j) Hardware stores
- (k) Garages
- (l) Sporting goods stores
- (m) Bakeries (employing less than five people)
- (n) Restaurants

(2) In Class "B" Commercial Districts all premises and buildings may be used for any use premises and buildings may be used for any use permitted in Residential Districts and any other use except the following:

- (a) Bakery (employing more than five persons)
- (b) Blacksmith or horse shoeing shop



- (d) Building material storage yard
- (e) Carrying, express, hauling, or storage yard
- (f) Contractor's plant or storage yard
- (g) Coal, coke or wood yard
- (h) Cooperage works
- (i) Dyeing and cleaning works (employing more than five (5) persons)
- (j) Ice plant or storage of more than five ton capacity
- (k) Laundry (employing more than five persons)
- (l) Livery stable
- (m) Lumber yard
- (n) Machine shop
- (o) Milk distributing station
- (p) Planing mill
- (q) Stone yard or monument works
- (r) Storage warehouse
- (s) Trailer camp
- (t) Tourist cabins and tourist camp
- (u) Any uses excluded from the Industrial district
- (v) Any kind of manufacture or treatment other than the manufacture or treatment of products clearly incidental to the conduct of a retail business conducted on the premises

(3) In Industrial Districts no building, structures or premises shall be erected, constructed, altered or maintained which shall be used or designed, or intended to be used for the manufacture of explosives, reduction, collection or incineration of offal carcasses, garbage, or refuse, making soap, candles, glue, tallow, oil, bone or fat boiling, or any other purpose so inherently dangerous to persons or to property or so noxious or offensive by reason of the emission of odor, dust, gas, vapor, smoke or noise.

#### Section 4- Non Conforming Uses

The lawful use of land existing November 2, 1937, at the time



or the adoption of the regulations contained in this chapter, may be continued, although such use does not conform to the provisions hereof, but if such non-conforming use is discontinued, any future use of said premises shall be in conformity with the provisions of this chapter.

The lawful use of a building existing November 2, 1937, at the time of the adoption of the regulations herein contained, may be continued although such use does not conform with the provision hereof, and such use may be extended throughout the building, provided no structural alterations, except those required by law or ordinance, are made therein.

The structural alterations made in a building devoted in whole or in part to a non-conforming use shall not during its life exceed fifty per cent of its assessed value, nor shall the building be enlarged unless the use therein is changed to a conforming use.

Where a building located in a district restricted against its use has been destroyed by fire or other calamity to the extent of not more than one-half of its assessed value a permit may be granted for its reconstruction within a period not to exceed twelve months, from the date of such fire or other calamity.

#### Section 5--Area Regulations

(1) Residential Districts-- The height of buildings, the minimum dimensions of yards and other open spaces surrounding buildings, and the maximum building area of lots in Residential Districts shall be as follows:

(a) Building Area--No building with its accessory buildings shall occupy in excess of forty (40) per cent of the lot or plot upon which they are erected or altered to accommodate or make provision for more than one family for each five thousand (5000) square feet of the area of the lot.

(b) Height--No building shall exceed thirty-five (35) feet or two and one-half stories.

(c) Rear Yard--There shall be a rear yard having a minimum depth of twenty (20) feet, excepting that a garage or other accessory building not more than fourteen (14) feet in height, may be built up to three (3) feet of the rear or side line.



On both sides of all buildings for each seven and one-half ( $7\frac{1}{2}$ ) feet of lot frontage with a minimum side yard, however, of four feet on both sides of all buildings.

(e) Setback--No building shall extend closer than twenty (20) feet of the street line in residential districts excepting that in residential districts fronting on State or Federal Highways, a minimum set-back of forty (40) feet from the street line shall be observed. But in such district where at least one-half of the buildings on either side of the street between two intersections conform to a greater set back line than above required, or where the recorded plat provides for a greater set back line, no new buildings and no alterations of an existing building shall project beyond such greater set back line.

(2) Commercial Districts--In both Class A and B Commercial Districts the following building area, height, rear yard, side yard, and set back regulations shall be observed.

(a) Building area--No building with its accessory buildings shall occupy in excess of seventy (70) per cent of the lot or plot upon which they are erected.

(b) Height--No building shall exceed thirty-five feet or two and one-half stories.

(c) Rear Yard--There shall be a rear yard having a minimum depth of ten (10) feet, excepting that garage or accessory buildings may be built up to three feet of the rear or side line.

(d) Side yard--There shall be a minimum side yard of five (5) feet on either side of all buildings.

(e) Setback--No building shall extend closer than forty feet of the street line in commercial districts.

(f) Billboard and Advertising Sign Area and Setback--In commercial areas all billboards and advertising signs having a surface area greater than thirty (30) square feet shall be set back at least eighty-five (85) feet from the public highway, and no billboard or advertising sign shall be placed closer to the public highway than the minimum building set-back line established for commercial districts.



Hanging signs attached to commercial structures and having a surface area of not more than fifteen (15) square feet may, however, project a maximum distance of five feet beyond the building line.

(3) Industrial Districts--The same building area, height, rear yard, side yard, and set back regulations shall be observed in industrial areas as are observed in commercial districts.

#### Section 6--Inspector of Building

a. Creation of office--The office of inspector of building is hereby established. The inspector of buildings shall be appointed by the town board and shall hold office for one year from date of appointment.

b. Duties--It shall be the duty of the inspector of buildings to enforce the provisions of this ordinance, and to issue building permits for a fee to be set by the town board upon recommendation of the plan commission.

#### Section 7--Board of Zoning Appeals

a. Creation and Membership--A Board of Appeals is hereby established. The word "Board" when used in this section shall be construed to mean the Board of Appeals. The board shall consist of five (5) members appointed by the chairman of the town board for terms respectively in the first instance of two for one year, two for two years, and one for three years; appointments thereafter to be for three years each. One of the members of the board shall be an architect or structural engineer of not less than ten (10) years practical experience.

The chairman of the board shall be designated by the town chairman. All members of the board shall serve without compensation.

b. Meetings--Meetings of the board shall be held at least once every sixty (60) days and at such other times as the board may determine. There shall be a fixed place of meeting and all meetings shall be open to the public. The board shall keep minutes of its proceedings, showing the vote of each member upon every question. The board shall adopt, from time to time, such rules and regulations as it may



c. Appeal--Appeal from the ruling of the inspector of buildings concerning the enforcement of the provisions of this ordinance may be made to the Board of Appeals within such time as shall be prescribed by the Board by general rule. Appellant shall file with the inspector of buildings and with the Board of Appeals a notice specifying the grounds thereof. The inspector of buildings shall forthwith transmit to the board all the papers constituting the record upon which the action appealed from was taken. The final disposition of any such appeal shall be in the form of a resolution, either reversing, modifying or affirming, wholly or partly, the decision of determination appealed from. The concurring vote of four (4) members of such board shall be necessary to pass a resolution.

d. Stay--An appeal stays all proceedings in furtherance of the action appealed from unless the inspector of buildings, from whom the appeal is taken, certifies to the Board of Appeals, after the notice of appeals shall have been filed with him, that by reason of facts stated in the certificate, a stay would in his opinion cause imminent peril to life or property, in which case proceedings shall not be stayed otherwise than by a restraining order which shall be granted by the Board of Appeals or by the Circuit Court, on application, on notice to the inspector of buildings from whom the appeal is taken and on due cause shown.

e. Jurisdiction--In specific cases the Board of Appeals may, after public notice and hearings, authorize by permit a variation of the application of the use and area regulations, herein established in harmony with their general purpose and intent as follows:

(1) A temporary building for commerce or industry, in a residence district, which is incidental to the residential development, such permit to be issued for a period of not more than one (1) year.

(2) The extension of a use district for a distance of not more than twenty-five (25) feet where the boundary line of a district divides a lot in a single ownership at the time of the adoption of this ordinance.



(3) The alteration or enlargement of an existing building located in a district restricted against its use, where such alteration or enlargement is a necessary incident to the business existing at the time of the adoption of this ordinance, provided, however that such alteration shall not unduly prolong the life of the building.

(4) The erection and use of a building or the use of a premises in any location to a public service corporation or for public utility purpose which the board admits reasonably necessary for the public convenience or welfare.

(5) A building or use in an industrial district otherwise excluded from such district, provided such building or use is distinctly incidental and essential to a use permitted in an industrial district, provided such incidental building or use occupies not more than ten (10) per cent of the lot, provided that not more than ten (10) per cent of the employees of the building or plant are engaged therein and provided that such building or use is not located within fifty (50) feet of any street or lot line.

(6) Where there are practical difficulties or unnecessary hardships in the way of carrying out the strict letter of this ordinance, the Board of Appeals shall have the power in a specific case to vary or modify any of these rules, regulations, or provisions relating to the location or area, the construction, structural changes in, equipment or alteration of building or structures, in harmony with their fundamental purpose and intent so that the public health safety and general welfare may be secured and substantial justice done.

#### Section 8--Building Permits--Certificate of Occupancy and Compliance

No premises shall be occupied or used and no building now or hereafter erected or altered shall be occupied, used or changed in use until a certificate of occupancy and compliance shall have been issued by the Inspector of Buildings, stating that the building or proposed use of a building, or premises complies with all the building and health laws and ordinances and with the provisions of these regulations.

Certificates of occupancy and compliance shall be applied for coincident with the application for a building permit and shall be issued within ten (10) days after the erection or alteration of such change by ordinance, the boundaries of ~~districts~~ or regulations herein



buildings shall have been completed in conformity with the provisions of these regulations. A record of all certificates shall be kept on file in the office of the Inspector of Buildings, and copies shall be furnished on request, to any person having a proprietary or tenancy interest in the building affected.

No permit for excavation for any building shall be issued before application has been made for certificate of occupancy and compliance.

#### Section 9--Interpretation-Purpose

a. In Interpreting and applying the provisions of this ordinance, provision thereof shall be held to be the minimum requirements adopted for the promotion of the public health, safety, comfort, convenience, and general welfare. The lot or yard areas required by this Ordinance for a particular building, shall not be diminished and shall not be included as a part of the required lot or yard areas of any other building.

b. The lot or yard areas of buildings existing at the time of the passage of this ordinance shall not be diminished below the requirements herein provided for buildings hereafter erected and such required areas shall not be included as a part of the required areas of any building hereafter erected.

c. This ordinance shall not repeal, abrogate, annul or in any way impair or interfere with any existing provisions of law or ordinance or any rules or regulations previously adopted or issued or which shall be adopted or issued pursuant to law relating to the use of buildings or premises; nor shall this ordinance interfere with, or abrogate or annul any easements, covenants, or other agreements between parties; provided, however, that where this ordinance imposes a greater restriction upon the use of buildings or premises, or upon the height or size of buildings or requires larger yards than are imposed or required by such existing provisions of law or ordinances or by such rules, regulations or by such easements, covenants, or agreements, the provisions of this ordinance shall control.

#### Section 10--Amendments

The Town Board may, from time to time, amend, supplement, or change by ordinance, the boundaries of districts or regulations herein



established. Any proposed amendment, supplement or change shall first be submitted to the Planning Commission for its recommendation and report.

A public hearing shall be held by the Town Board before adoption of any proposed amendment, supplement or change, notice of which hearing shall be given by placing said notice in three (3) conspicuous places within the unincorporated village, stating the time and place of such hearing, not earlier than ten (10) days from the date of such posting.

If a protest against any proposed amendment, supplement or change be presented in writing to the Town Clerk, within ten (10) days from date of posting, duly signed and acknowledged by the owners of twenty (20%) per cent of the frontage immediately in the rear thereof, or by the owners of twenty (20%) per cent of the frontage directly opposite the frontage proposed to be altered, such amendment, supplement, or change shall not be passed except by a unanimous vote of the Town Board.

#### Section 11--Penalty for Violation

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects or refuses to comply with or who resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, or more than One Hundred (\$100.00) dollars for each offense. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

#### Section 12--Invalidity of a Part

The sections, sub-sections, districts and building lines forming parts of or established by this ordinance and the several parts, provisions and regulations thereof are hereby declared to be independent section, sub-section, districts, building lines, areas, parts, provisions and regulations and the holding of any such section, sub-section, district, building line, part, provision or regulations thereof to be unconstitutional, void or ineffective for any cause shall not effect nor render invalid any other such section, sub-section, district, building line, part, provision or regulation thereof or hereof.



Section 13--Repeal of a Portion of the Present Ordinance

Sections two (2), three (3) and five (5) of the present zoning ordinance of the unincorporated village of Waunona are hereby repealed.

Section 14--When Effective

This ordinance shall go into immediate effect upon its passage.

I understand that at the present time a court action has been brought to restrain the Roselawn Memorial Park from proceeding with any further development. If you should be successful in your court action, then of course it would no longer be necessary for this board to pass upon the question of expansion.

We require each cemetery licensed to do business in this state to annually file with this board a statement concerning their trust fund and a statement concerning operations of the company. These reports are required to be placed on file with this board prior to February 15 of each year. As soon as the Roselawn Memorial Park Company has filed its statement, we shall advise you and you may then examine the statement and if you find objection you may advise us of your objection and we will schedule a hearing concerning your objections.

TRAILER AND TOURIST CAMP ORDINANCE

An ordinance defining and providing for the regulation of tourist camps, tourist cabins, camp cottages, automobile trailer camps, automobile trailers, house cars, and camp cars within the Town of Blooming Grove pursuant to Section 146.026, Wisconsin Statutes.

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove, Dane County, State of Wisconsin for the better protection of public health and to promote the public welfare in said township do ordain as follows:

Section 1-Definitions

a. An "Automobile Trailer" shall be defined to be any vehicle used as sleeping or living quarters, mounted on wheels, and propelled either by its own power or by another power driven vehicle to which it may be attached.

b. A "Tourist Camp" as used in this section shall mean any lot, piece or parcel of ground, municipally or privately owned or operated, where two or more cabins, camp cottages, tents, tent houses, trailer coaches or similar structures used as living, eating or sleeping quarters are or are intended to be located and operated for or without compensation.

Section 2-Restrictions Applicable to Automobile Trailers

a. No automobile trailer shall be used for living quarters upon any street, alley, or other public way in the Town of Blooming Grove.

b. No person, firm, or corporation shall make any electrical connection for any automobile trailer to any building or other source of electricity without the approval of the Inspector of Building as to the method of connection.

c. No person, firm, or corporation shall deposit garbage or waste water from any automobile trailer on the premises where the trailer is stationed or on adjoining premises in such a manner as to menace the public health.



d. Automobile trailers having their running gear, wheels or other equipment designed for the transportation of said vehicle from one location to another removed, or blocked up, or otherwise made stationary and in use for living quarters shall be classed as tourist cabins and shall be subject to the regulations herein set out for tourist cabins.

#### Section 3-Trailer Permits

a. No person shall use, occupy or maintain any automobile trailer for living quarters for a period of more than one week without first obtaining a permit from the board of health, the fee for which shall be One (\$1.00) dollar for each week the trailer remains in the Town of Blooming Grove. Such permit shall not be granted until said person shall have established to the satisfaction of the board of health or its sanitary supervisor that arrangements have been made for the use of adequate sanitary facilities proximate to the location of the trailer. The sanitary supervisor shall make periodic report<sup>5</sup> to the board of health as to the conditions existing on the premises. The board may revoke the permit at any time for good cause shown.

#### Section 4-Restrictions Applicable to Tourist Camps

a. All lands used as tourist camps shall be located on well drained sites of ample size. The land shall be free from marsh and shall be graded to insure rapid drainage during and following rain.

b. Every tourist camp shall have a water supply of pure, sanitary quality in ample quantity to meet all requirements. No permit to operate a tourist camp will be granted unless the applicant presents a certificate of the State Board of Health showing that the water supply has been tested within the last thirty days preceeding such application and is of a healthful quality. The sewage system must be of a type meeting with the approval of the town board of health and its sanitary supervisor.

c. All cabins or dwellings shall be spaced at least ten feet apart and not less than 600 square feet, exclusive of driveways, space shall be allotted for each cabin, camp cottage, or trailer site. All cabins and camp cottages shall be erected at least five feet from



~~any~~ property line. All cabins, camp cottages, and trailer sites shall be arranged in rows facing on a continuous drive or court at least twenty (20) feet wide.

d. Each cabin shall contain at least one water closet, one sink, and one shower or bath tub and where trailers are accommodated there shall be maintained in addition to the above facilities, one toilet for each sex and every ten units thereof and one shower or bathtub for each sex and each ten units or fraction thereof.

e. Each cabin or camp cottage used for sleeping purposes shall contain 400 cubic feet of air space for each person accommodated.

#### Section 5-License

a. No person, firm or corporation other than the Town of Blooming Grove shall maintain or operate a tourist camp within the Town of Blooming Grove without obtaining from the Town Board of Health a license therefor on or before the 15th day of May of each year. Such license may be issued by the Sanitary Supervisor upon written application therefor being approved by the Board of Health and the Town Board and payment of a fee of Ten and no/100 (\$10.00) dollars for the first ten cabins or trailer sites or fraction thereof and fifty cents (\$.50) for each additional cabin or trailer site over and above the initial ten units. In granting such license the Town Board and the Board of Health shall take into consideration the location of the proposed trailer camp and the responsibility of the operator thereof.

#### Section 6-Penalty

a. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor to exceed five hundred (\$500.00) dollars or by confinement in the county jail for a period not to exceed sixty days.

#### Section 7-Ordinance, When Effective

a. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and publication.

In view of the fact that the case is pending, & the Board refuses to allow the legal expense already claimed & is in doubt as to its legal rights,

Now, Therefore, it was moved by Supervisor Fisher & seconded by Supervisor Elstead that Mr. Lawrence H. Hall, attorney, be requested to advise the board with reference to its rights & duties with reference to the claim against the Board of Mr. D. Mac Dwyer, & with reference to the questions involved in the appeal, in order that the Board might intelligently act in determining what position to take with reference thereto.

It is further resolved that Mr. Hall be instructed to obtain his substitution as attorney for the Town in the Court action, but to take no steps either for or against the appeal until further resolution be adopted by this Board. Resolution unanimously adopted.

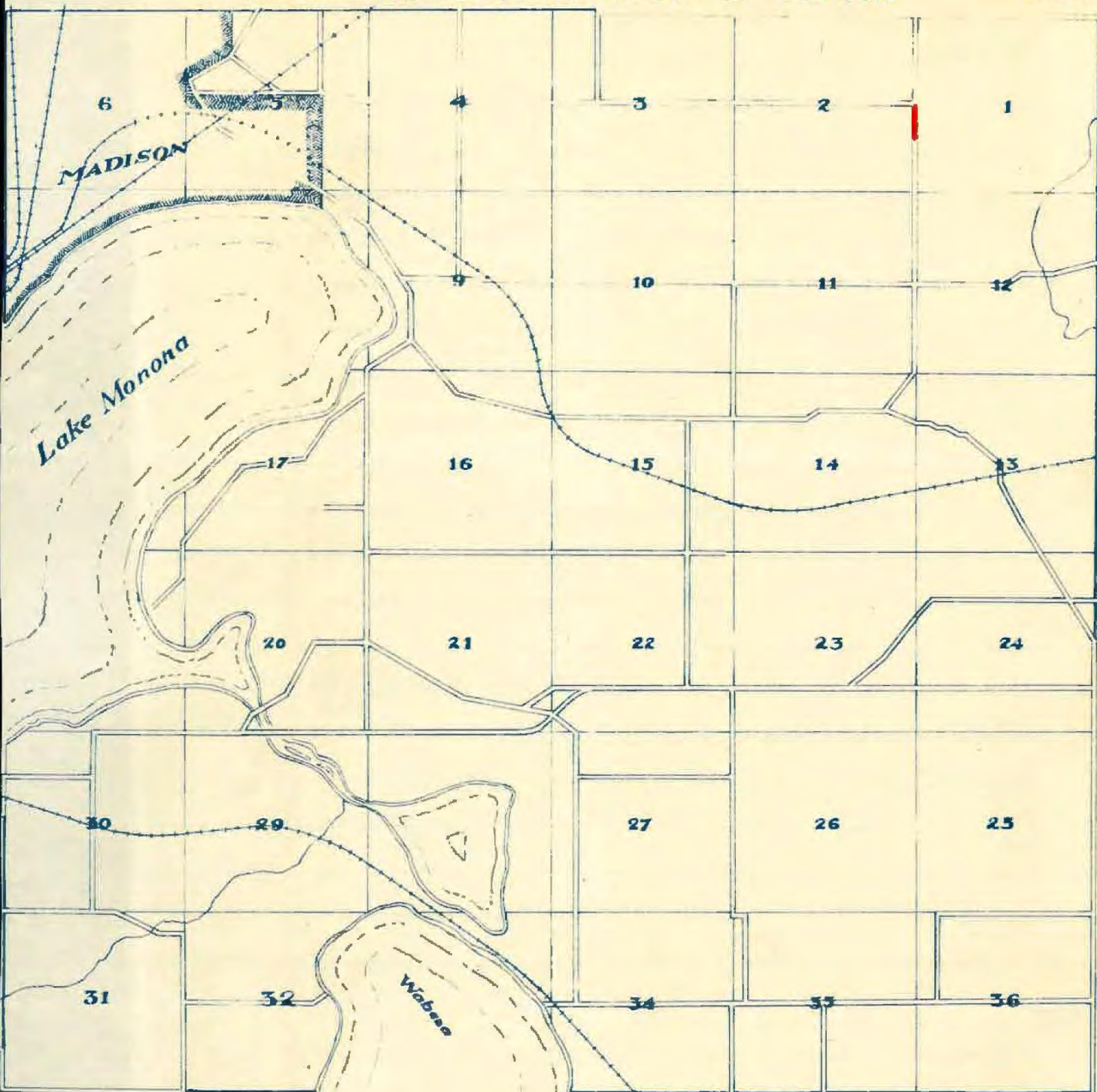

## Electrical Inspector

(1) The electrical inspector shall be elected by the Town Board every other year, on the Third Tuesday in April or within ten days thereafter, and he shall hold his office for a term of two years, or until his successor is elected and qualified. He shall be under the supervision of the Town Board. He shall make all inspections of electrical wiring as prescribed by town ordinances.

(2) The electrical inspector may be removed from office at any time by the Town Board for flagrant or repeated failure to carry out the duties of his office, for any dishonest practice or practices in connection with his work, provided that before he is discharged he shall be given written notice enumerating the charges and specifying a date, not less than ten days after service of such notice, on which date he shall be given a hearing by the Town Board and an opportunity to present testimony in his defense.

(3) The electrical inspector shall be a person, who is skilled in the installation, planning, designing, superintending and inspection of electrical wiring and equipment and who has at least four years of practical experience in such work. He shall be well versed in approved methods of electrical construction for safety to life and property and the laws and ordinances pertaining thereto.

(4) The electrical inspector shall make all inspections of electrical wiring and equipment, shall have the right to enter any building during reasonable



hours in the discharge of his official duties, and shall have the authority to cause the disconnection of any wiring or equipment where such wiring or equipment in his judgment is dangerous to life or property or may interfere with the work of the fire department.

#### **Board of Examiners of Electricians**

(1) The board of examiners of electricians shall consist of five members as follows: the electrical inspector, one journeyman electrician having had at least six years of experience as a journeyman electrician in the Town of Blooming Grove and who holds no class of electricians' license, one Class A licensed electrical contractor, one electrical engineer, and a master electrician who holds no license. The examining board shall elect its own officers.

(2) The board of examiners shall be appointed by the Town Chairman on the Third Tuesday of April in each year, or within ten days thereafter, and confirmed by the Town Board. Their terms of office shall begin immediately upon their confirmation by the Town Board and shall be for one year, or until their successors are appointed and confirmed.

#### **Contractors Required to have a License**

No person, either individually, as a member of a firm, or as an officer or employe of a corporation, shall conduct the business of electrical wiring construction or contracting either as master electrician or contracting electrician unless such person shall have a license as required by this chapter, and no electrical work except minor repair work

shall be done by a person not having such license unless such work is done under the supervision of a licensed electrician. The electrical inspector may, however, issue a permit to any person desiring to personally install electrical work in his own private residence if the electrical inspector is satisfied that such person is competent to do such work in conformity with all rules and regulations governing the installation of electrical wiring in residences, and such person shall pay the same fee as is required by contractors. Nothing herein provided shall apply to servicing of electrical appliances installed by the manufacturer.

#### **Licenses—How Obtained**

(1) Examinations for all classes of licenses for electricians shall be given by the board of examiners on the first Monday of May and December of each year. No examinations for licenses shall be given at other than the dates specified in this section.

(2) Any person desiring any such license shall make application therefor to the said board of examiners not less than ten days prior to the date on which an examination is to be held. An application fee of twenty dollars shall accompany such application if the same is for a Class A license. The board of examiners shall then examine each applicant at such place as it shall designate, as to his qualifications and competency to conduct the business of electrical wiring and construction, in case of applicants for Class A licenses, or work as a maintenance electrician in a public



building or industrial plant, in the case of applicants for Class B licenses. The examination for a Class B license shall cover operation and maintenance of equipment only. The examinations shall be practical and elementary in character, but sufficiently strict to test the qualifications of the applicant. The said board shall, upon being satisfied as to the competency of the applicant and upon payment by the applicant to the town treasurer of the license fee as herein-after stipulated, issue to such applicant of license authorizing him to conduct the business of electrical wiring and construction, or work as a maintenance electrician in a public building or industrial plant, according to the class of license said applicant has applied for and for which he has passed a satisfactory examination. If the applicant for a Class A license fails in his examination the application fee will not be refunded but he will be permitted to take another examination, provided, however, that he may take such other examination only at the next stated examination period. No such applicant will be permitted to take more than two examinations on one application fee.

(3) It is further provided that in the event that any person holding a Class A license shall sever his connection with an electrical wiring and construction firm, association or corporation which has been in continuous operation within the Town of Blooming Grove for a period of one year or more and there shall be no other person in such firm, association or corporation, or employed by it who is licensed under the provisions of this chapter to conduct the busi-

ness of electrical wiring and contracting, the electrical inspector shall, upon application, continue to issue electrical permits to that firm, association, or corporation until the next regular examination period. At that time, some other member or employee of the firm, association or corporation must apply for a license to conduct the business of electrical wiring and contracting according to the provisions of this chapter. In the event that such applicant fails to obtain such license, then said firm, association or corporation shall employ an electrician licensed to conduct the business of electrical wiring and contracting within the period of thirty days after said applicant for license has been notified of his failure to meet the license requirements. If any work be done by such firm, association or corporation pursuant to permits issued by the electrical inspector shall fail to meet all requirements of the town ordinances and the regulations of the State of Wisconsin or any of its departments, the electrical inspector shall not issue further permits to such firm, association or corporation until some member or employee of such firm, association or corporation shall have obtained a license to conduct the business of electrical wiring and contracting in accordance with the provisions of this chapter.

#### **Renewal of Licenses**

Every license shall expire on the first day of May following the date of its issue, and may be renewed upon payment to the town treasurer of the renewal fee ascertaining to that class of license not later than the first day of



May of the year in which the license expires. Should any person fail to renew his license by May 1 of the year in which said license expires he will be required to make application for and take the examination for a new license in the same manner as a new applicant before he will be issued a new license. Temporary licenses shall not be issued.

#### **Classes of Licenses**

(1) There shall be two classes of licenses issued appertaining to electrical work in the Town of Blooming Grove, namely: Class A and Class B.

#### **(2) Definitions**

(a) Class A license shall be issued to a person desiring to enter into the business of electrical wiring and construction.

(b) Class B license shall be issued to a person desiring to enter into employment in a public building or industrial plant as a maintenance electrician.

#### **(3) Scope**

(a) Class A licensee may engage in any type of electrical work.

(b) Class B licensee may only make necessary repairs or operate equipment within the building or buildings where regularly employed in the capacity of maintenance electrician and he shall not install new work.

#### **License Fees**

(1) The fee for a new applicant for Class A license shall be twenty dollars. Renewal fee for each succeeding year shall be ten dollars.

(2) The fee for a new applicant for Class B license shall be ten dollars. Renewal fee for each succeeding year shall be five dollars.

#### **Qualifications Required of Applicants for Licenses**

(1) Any person making application for a Class A license must have had at least four years of practical experience of executing, estimating, or supervising electric light and power installations within buildings.

(2) Any person making application for a Class B license must have had at least two years of practical experience in operating and maintaining equipment within industrial plants or public buildings.

(3) The board of examiners shall determine whether such experience has been sufficiently practical.

#### **Licenses Required to Give Bond**

Every person licensed as a Class A or Class B electrician shall give a bond to the Town of Blooming Grove in the sum of Five Hundred dollars with such sureties as the town attorney shall approve, conditioned that such person shall comply with the ordinances and laws relating to electrical wiring and that he will pay all damages, costs and expenses



that may be caused by the negligence of such person or his servants, or occasioned by his or their failure to comply with said laws and ordinances.

### **Revocation of License**

Any license may be revoked by the board of examiners, should the licensee violate any ordinance or law relating to electrical wiring. Any person whose license shall have been revoked shall not again be licensed within a period of one year from date of such action.

No license shall be revoked except by a majority of the board of examiners, at a regular or special meeting, and no license shall be revoked unless the licensee has been notified in writing of the charges against him at least ten days before such meeting. The licensee shall have the right to appear before the board of examiners to answer the charges, and present testimony in his defense.

### **Permits**

(1) Before any electrical wires or electrical apparatus shall be installed for lighting or power purposes, or any electrical construction work done, except minor repair work, a permit therefor shall be obtained from the electrical inspector by a licensed electrician. The application shall describe the proposed installation or work and give the location of the premises where same is to be placed. The electrical inspector shall issue a permit therefor upon proof that the applicant has paid to the town treasurer the fees herein required.

(2) Repair work shall be construed

to mean the replacement of broken or defective sockets, snap, push or toggle switches, base receptacles and portable electrical appliances.

(3) Permits for the erection of, or electrical work on, electrically illuminated signs will be granted only to Class A licensed electricians.

(4) Permits must be taken out for all water heaters and electric ranges exceeding one thousand watts capacity and will bear the same inspection fee as fractional horse power motors and heating devices.

(5) In cases of emergency, work may be started before the permit is issued provided the electrical inspector's office is notified the same day such work is started.

(6) A permit shall be required for the installation of any electrical outlet for use on any circuit other than low voltage circuit. Permits shall be required for outlets, electrical refrigerators, oil burners and other electrical apparatus of a similar nature.

### **Inspection**

(1) It shall be unlawful to connect up the electrical wiring and equipment of any building to any electrical supply lines or to turn on the current, unless a certificate of inspection has been issued by the electrical inspector, and it shall be the duty of the electrical utility supplying electrical service to any building to secure a copy of the certificate of inspection from the electrical inspector



before supplying service to such building.

(2) Upon the completion of the construction and installation of the electrical wiring and equipment of any building, it shall be the duty of the firm, person, or corporation doing the same to notify the electrical inspector who shall inspect the installation within twenty-four hours of the time such notice is given; and if the installation is found to be in compliance with the provisions of this chapter he shall issue a certificate of inspection authorizing connection to the electrical service and the turning on of the current. All wires which are to be concealed shall be inspected before concealment, and no other craft shall cover up or conceal such wires unless the installation has been inspected and approved and officially tagged to this effect by the electrical inspector.

(3) All notifications for inspections must be made at the office of the electrical inspector not later than five o'clock P. M. of the day before the inspection is desired.

(4) No certificate of inspection shall be issued by the electrical inspector unless the electrical wiring and equipment for light, power, heat or other similar purposes is safe both with respect to life and fire hazard, and is in strict conformity with the ordinances of the Town of Blooming Grove, the statutes of the State of Wisconsin and the general or special orders of the Industrial Commission of the State of Wisconsin adopted under authority of the statutes.

(5) A copy of the final certificate of inspection shall be mailed to the person, firm, or corporation who holds the permit for the installation inspected.

#### **Penalty for Failure to Take Out Permits**

In addition to the penalty hereinafter provided for violations of this chapter, a penalty equal to the permit fee will be charged for failure to take out a permit before work is started, except in cases of emergency, and such penalty, together with the permit fee, shall be paid to the town treasurer before any further permit may be issued to the person doing such work. In case of repeated failure to take out permits, the penalty shall be equal to triple the permit fee, and the examining board may revoke the contractor's license.

#### **Arbitration**

Where the electrical inspector refuses to issue a certificate of inspection on the electrical work of any building, or condemns the same, the owner may, within five days after receiving written notice from the electrical inspector, file notice in writing with the electrical inspector for arbitration and the owner shall within two days thereafter select a master electrician who, with the electrical inspector shall select a third party, who shall be a practical electrician; and the three shall constitute a board of arbitration to determine whether said electrical work is defective and unsafe, and the decision of a majority of said board shall be final and conclusive. Said board shall furnish the electrical inspector and the owner with a copy in detail of their findings.



## Inspection Fees

The inspection required by the provisions of this chapter shall be at the expense of the person, firm, or corporation ordering the work to be done, or the agent of such a person, firm, or corporation. The following fees shall be paid:

(1) Wiring for Lighting.—For inspection of wiring for lighting exclusive of fixtures, etc., a minimum charge of one dollar for installation of one circuit and fifty cents for each additional circuit above one up to fifty circuits, and above fifty circuits thirty cents each, shall be paid. It is provided, however, that for inspection of wiring for lighting, exclusive of fixtures, etc., for one, two, or three outlets in existing buildings, a minimum charge of fifty cents shall be made.

(2) Incandescent Electric Fixtures and Necessary Accessories. A minimum fee will be charged of one dollar for installations of ten fixtures or less; for ten or more fixtures, one dollar for the first ten fixtures and five cents for each additional fixture. It is provided, however, that a minimum fee of fifty cents shall be charged for the installation of one, two or three fixtures installed in existing buildings. Fixtures including one, two, three, four, five or six lamps shall be classed as one fixture.

(3) Arc Lamps, Vapor Lamps, Fans, Fractional Horse Power Motors and Heating Appliances. A minimum charge of one dollar for installations of two such units; and for two or more such

units; one dollar for the first two units and twenty-five cents for each additional unit, shall be paid.

(4) Electric Signs. The inspection fee on all electric signs shall be one dollar for the first circuit and on the same basis as inside wiring for more than one circuit. No fee will be charged for the lamps.

(5) Motors, Generators, Electric Ranges, X-Ray Machines, or Other Equipment Connected to Power Circuits.

(a) A minimum charge will be made of one dollar for each machine not exceeding five horse power.

(b) The charge for machines five to twenty-five horse power will be one dollar for the first five horse power and ten cents for each horse power over five.

(c) For machines twenty-five to fifty horse power, the charge will be three dollars for the first twenty-five horse power and five cents for each additional horse power over twenty-five.

(d) The fee for machines fifty to one hundred horse power will be four dollars and twenty-five cents for the first fifty horse power and three cents for each additional horse power over fifty.

(e) The above fees include the fee for inspection for necessary wiring for said machines.

(5a) Meter Testing Switches. A minimum charge shall be made of one dol-



lar for the installation, in existing buildings, of one meter testing switch, and twenty-five cents for each additional meter testing switch.

(6) Special Inspections. For special inspections other than those listed above, or for inspections additional to those to which the permit entitles the holder, the fee shall be computed on the basis of one dollar per inspection.

**Number of Inspections allowed on Permit.**

Each permit shall entitle the holder to the following number of inspections:

- (1) Wiring for Lighting.
  - (a) One circuit, one inspection.
  - (b) Two to ten circuits, two inspections.
  - (c) Eleven to twenty circuits, three inspections.
  - (d) Twenty-one to thirty circuits, four inspections.
  - (e) Thirty-one to forty circuits, five inspections.
  - (f) Forty-one to fifty circuits, six inspections.
  - (g) For each fifty circuits over fifty, one additional inspection.

**(2) Incandescent Lamps and Accessories.**

- (a) One to thirty lamps, one inspection.
- (b) Thirty-one to sixty lamps, two inspections.
- (c) Sixty-one to one hundred sixty lamps, three inspections.

- (d) For each one hundred fifty lamps, over one hundred sixty, one additional inspection.

**(3) Arc Lamps, Vapor Lamps, Fractional Horse Power Motors, Fans and Heating Devices.**

- (a) For two such units, one inspection.
- (b) For two to ten such units, two inspections.
- (c) For each ten units over ten, one additional inspection.

**(4) Motors, Generators, Electric Ranges, X-Ray Machines or Other Equipment Connected to Power Circuits.**

- (a) For machines aggregating five horse power or less, one inspection.
- (b) For machines aggregating twenty-five horse power or less, two inspections.
- (c) For machines aggregating fifty horse power or less, three inspections.
- (d) For machines aggregating one hundred horse power or less, four inspections.
- (e) For each fifty horse power over one hundred, one additional inspection.

(5) Failure to obtain the full number of inspections shall not entitle the holder of the permit to any rebate.

**Electrical Construction Requirements**

(1) All conductors operating at voltages higher than three hundred volts shall be enclosed in rigid metal conduit.

(2) All conductors in all buildings



hereafter constructed, except residences and apartment or flat buildings for four families or less, shall be enclosed in rigid metal conduit. (All conductors in all buildings hereafter constructed within the limits shall be enclosed in rigid metal conduit.) All conductors of existing buildings, except residents or apartment or flat buildings for four families or less, shall be enclosed in rigid metal conduit or flexible metal conduit, armored cable or surface metal raceways. Wood mouldings shall not be used. Short sections of armored cable or flexible conduit may be used in show windows and other such locations where it is impractical to install rigid conduit.

(3) All conductors in buildings used partially or solely for retailing, wholesaling, manufacturing, or warehousing, or for barber shops or beauty parlors and in all dormitories, fraternity and sorority houses, public and private club houses, public and private assembly halls, or in buildings devoted to combined uses common to the above classifications, and in all other public buildings, as defined in section 101.01 of the revised statutes of Wisconsin for 1929, shall be enclosed in rigid metal conduit, and no branch circuit wire shall be smaller than number fourteen A. W. G. Lead covered cable shall be used in all conduits installed in floor slabs resting upon the ground unless such conduits are completely surrounded by at least one inch of concrete.

(4) All conductors in basements or attics shall be enclosed in rigid metal conduit extending to the nearest cabinet, outlet, junction, or pull box of the

floor above or below, except that flexible conduit or armored cable may be used for the extension from the basement to the aforesaid cabinet, outlet, junction, or pull box of the floor above or below, of existing buildings.

(5) All service conductors shall be Number Eight A. W. G. or larger and shall be enclosed in rigid metal conduit of three-fourths inch electric trade size or larger. No service conduit shall be concealed in inflammable walls.

(6) Metal outlet boxes of at least four-inch diameter and one and one half inches deep and which are firmly supported, shall be installed at all outlets of buildings hereafter constructed, except that for knob or tube work the diameter may be reduced to three inches or the depth to seven-eighths inches. All outlet boxes shall be provided with a standard three-eighths inches male fixture study. Metal switch boxes may be used for wall bracket outlets. Looping through outlet boxes in knob and tube work shall not be permitted.

(7) Fixtures shall be adequately and firmly supported. Such support shall not be obtained by wood screws in lath or wood ceilings or walls. Ordinary size fixtures shall be supported from conduit, outlet boxes or fixture studs attached to outlet boxes or plates. Heavy fixtures shall be provided with special means of support adequate for the purpose.

(8) Drop cords shall be supported from a proper stem and canopy attached to the outlet box, or from metal or porcelain cover of the outlet box. Res-



ettes and pony receptacles and screw base wall receptacles shall not be used.

(9) No branch circuit of a lighting system shall supply more than sixteen sockets or receptacles or more than 1000 watts. Receptacles for the attachment of portable equipment, when installed in the laundry, kitchen, dining or breakfast room or bath room of a building shall be considered as requiring not less than three hundred watts wire carrying capacity.

(10) Motors for water lifts, oil burners, coal stokers, and for any other purpose where it is deemed advisable by the electrical inspector shall be wired on individual branch circuits.

(11) Twin wires shall not be used except in conduits, armored cable, metal raceways.

(12) Transformers on all neon signs must be permanently grounded to conduit. Neon or similar gas-filled tube signs, not mounted on metal back-grounds shall be securely suspended by means of copper or iron wire in such a manner that the high-tension cable or cables do not act as a partial support for the sign. The high-tension cables on such signs shall pass through porcelain bushings in the transformer cabinet and shall be supported on non-absorbitive insulating supports when fastened to window frames or other portions of a building. Transformers for such signs shall be enclosed in a steel cabinet of code gauge metal and shall be properly grounded to the conduit system. Connections from such transformers to the current supply line shall be made by

means of at least number 14 B. & S. Gauge R. C. wire in rigid conduit.

(13) Weatherproof and waterproof threaded fittings must be used where exposed to the weather. Outlet boxes shall not be used.

(14) No conduit for electric wires shall be placed underground unless such conduit shall be at least three-quarters of an inch in trade size. Steel tube or thin wall not permitted.

(15) All fittings used in the connection of gasoline supply and dispensing pumps must be of the explosion-proof type, and must be properly installed so that all connections and covers are liquid tight. Rigid conduits must be used and all wire joints must be dipped in solder and properly taped. All conduits feeding gasoline pumps must be three-fourths inch trade size or larger. Lead covered wire shall be used to feed all gasoline pumps. All joints in outlet boxes must be dipped in solder. (Steel tube or thin wall not permitted.)

#### **Regulations of Sale of Electrical Appliances.**

(1) It shall be unlawful for any contractor, dealer, individual, firm or corporation to offer for sale in the Town of Blooming Grove any electrical appliance, appurtenances, or materials which are not approved by the National Board of Underwriters, and the Wisconsin Industrial Commission.

(2) The penalty for such violation for the first offense shall be a fine of ten dollars and costs or ten days in jail; and



for the second offense one hundred dollars and costs or ninety days in jail or both.

**Penalty.**

Any person violating any of the provisions of this chapter for which penalty has not heretofore been provided, or who shall violate any lawful order of the electrical inspector issued pursuant to this Electrical Code, shall be subject to a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each offense. This penalty shall not be precluded or in any way affected by the payment of the penalty provided in section 6, page 6, for failure to take out a permit before work is started. Each day on which any violation of this order shall be permitted to exist after notice by the Electrical Inspector shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS AND EXPLOSIVES AND PROHIBITING THE SALE OF FIREWORKS.

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as follows:

1. No person shall fire or discharge any gun, shot-gun, rifle, musket, cannon, machine gun, or any firearm of any description, or any air gun, within the platted areas of the Town of Blooming Grove, ~~limits of the unincorporated village of~~ without the written permission of the Town Board of Blooming Grove or the Constable thereof, which permission shall limit the time of such firing and shall be subject to revocation at any time.

2. No person shall set off, explode, or fire any squib, fire-cracker, bomb, sky-rocket, torpedo, cap, or any other type of fireworks at any time within the Town of Blooming Grove.

3. The keeping for sale or distribution of all fireworks is prohibited. No person, firm, or corporation shall sell or exchange at wholesale or retail or offer for sale within the Town of Blooming Grove any firecracker or any other fireworks containing powder or

or combustible or explosive material, and no person, firm, or corporation shall keep on their or its premises ~~any~~ any fireworks containing powder or other combustible material.

Any person, firm, or corporation violating any of the ~~provisions of this ordinance~~ provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than ~~five~~ ten dollars for each offense, and each day on which any such violation exists shall constitute a separate offense.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS AND EXPLOSIVES AND PROHIBITING THE SALE OF FIREWORKS.

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as follows:

1. No person shall fire or discharge any gun, shot-gun, rifle, musket, cannon, machine gun, or any firearm of any description, or any air gun, within the ~~limits of the unincorporated village of~~ <sup>platted area of the Town of Blooming</sup> ~~Grove~~, without the written permission of the Town Board of Blooming Grove or the Constable thereof, which permission shall limit the time of such firing and shall be subject to revocation at any time.

2. No person shall set off, explode, or fire any squib, firecracker, bomb, sky-rocket, torpedo, cap, or any other type of fireworks at any time within the Town of Blooming Grove.

3. The keeping for sale or distribution of all fireworks is prohibited. No person, firm, or corporation shall sell or exchange at wholesale or retail or offer for sale within the Town of Blooming Grove any firecracker or any other fireworks containing powder or other combustible or explosive material, and no person, firm, or corporation shall keep on their or its premises any firecrackers, or any other fireworks containing powder or other combustible material.

4. Any person, firm, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be fined not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars for each offense, and each day or part of day on which any such violation exists shall constitute a separate offense.

#### AN ORDINANCE

#### CHAPTER VI. Public Streets, Alleys, & Sidewalks

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as follows:

- 6.01-- Speed Limits-- No person shall within the town of Blooming Grove operate along or upon any public highway, street, or alley any motor vehicle recklessly, or at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and proper with regard to the width, traffic or use of the highway, street or alley, or so as to endanger the property, life or limb of any person. And no person shall operate such vehicle on any street, alley, road, or highway within the town at a speed greater than thirty miles per hour and the speed of any vehicle shall not be greater than fifteen miles per hour while passing a school house at those times when children are going to or from school or are playing at or about the school.
- 6.02-- Traversing Curves and Grades-- In traversing curves and grades where the operator does not have a view of approaching traffic upon the highway, the speed of such vehicle shall not be greater than that which will permit him to stop his vehicle within one-half the range of his vision.



6.03-- One Arm Driving-- No person while operating a motor vehicle shall be so engaged as to interfere with the safe operation of such vehicle.

6.04-- Overcrowding Motor Vehicle-- It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to operate the same when it is so loaded or when there are in the front seat such a number of persons, or any person so situated, as to obstruct the view of the operator to the front or the sides, or to interfere with the operator having a free use of both hands and feet to the operating mechanism or control of the vehicle.

6.05-- Passing Other Vehicles-- The operator of an overtaking motor vehicle shall give audible warning with his warning device before passing or attempting to pass a vehicle proceeding in the same direction, and such operator shall not pass another vehicle without first ascertaining that such movement can be made with safety. At all times when not passing another vehicle, the operator of a motor vehicle must keep said vehicle in the right hand lane of said roadway.

6.06-- Passing on Curves and Grades-- It shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to operate on the left side of the highway upon any part of a grade or upon a curve in the highway where the operator's view is obstructed within a distance of one thousand feet.

6.07-- Passing on Bridges & Viaducts-- It shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to pass another vehicle on any bridge or viaduct or on the approach to a bridge.

6.08-- Muffler Cut-out Illegal-- It shall be unlawful to use a muffler cut out or to drive with such muffler cut-out open, on any motor vehicle upon any of the streets or highways in said town.

6.09 Illegal Riding-- It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to operate the same when any person is upon any portion thereof not designed or intended for the use of passengers



when such vehicle is in motion, and it shall be unlawful for any person to ride on any portion of a motor vehicle not designed or intended for the use of passengers.

6.10--Parking Prohibited in Specified Places-- It shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to park such vehicle in any of the following places:

- a. Within ten feet of any fire hydrant.
- b. In front of a private highway or alley.
- c. Upon the highway in front of any school house during the hours of 7:30 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. during school days.
- d. In any area which has been designated as a "No Parking" area by the Town Board and has been properly marked with signs to that effect.
- e. On any bridge or within 100 feet of any bridge or viaduct.
- f. On the main traveled portion of highway.

6.11 -- Lighting Equipment on Vehicles-- a. Every motor vehicle except motorcycles when in use upon the public highway of the town from one-half hour after sunset till one-half hour before sunrise shall be equipped with two headlights in good working order. Motorcycles must be equipped with one headlight.

b. Every motor vehicle while in use on the highways in the town or when parked adjacent to the highway from one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise, shall be equipped with at least one rear red light.

c. Lights on Bicycles- Every bicycle operated upon the public highway in the town during the time between one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise, shall be equipped with a lamp on the front and a red light or reflector on the rear.

6.12-- Intoxicated Persons Forbidden to Operate Vehicle-- It shall be unlawful for any person who is an habitual user of narcotic drugs, or who is subject to epilepsy, or any person who is under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drugs, to operate



any vehicle upon any highway in the town of Blooming Grove.

6.13-- Vehicles to Stop at Arterial Highways-- It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to fail to come to a full and complete stop within thirty feet of the near limits of any intersection in the town at which has been erected an official stop sign or traffic signal designating an artery for through traffic.

6.14-- Windshield wipers and Warning Devices-- It shall be unlawful to operate any motor vehicle upon a highway in the town of Blooming Grove without a proper warning device or without a windshield wiper or other device for cleaning rain; snow or other moisture from the windshield.

6.15--Weight Limitations-- It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to operate a motor vehicle on any town road protected by weight limit signs, when the weight of said vehicle is in excess of the limit specified on said weight limit signs. Nothing in this section shall be construed, however, as prohibiting the ordinary use of said posted highway for the delivering of or moving necessary supplies or commodities to or from any place of business or residence fronting on said highway.

6.16-- General Weight Restrictions-- If, at any time any person is operating upon any highway any vehicle which is causing or is likely to cause injury to such highway or is visibly thereof or the public investment therein, the town constable may summarily suspend the operation of any such vehicle on such, and the owner or operator thereof shall forthwith comply with such suspension or be subject to penalty as set out in section 6.15 hereof.

6.17-- Penalties--

a. Any person violating any of the provisions of section 6.12 shall upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than sixty days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

b. Any person violating any of the provisions of



sections 6.01, 6.02, 6.03, 6.06, and 6.07 shall upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not to exceed \$50.00 or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than fifteen days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

c. Any person violating any of the provisions of section 6.08, 6.09, 6.10, 6.11, 6.12, 6.13, 6.14, 6.15, and 6.16, shall upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not to exceed \$25.00 or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than ten days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

6.18--Previous Ordinances-- This ordinance upon becoming effective repeals all previous town ordinances relating to traffic regulations speed of motor vehicles, and reckless driving of same.

6.19-- When Effective-- This ordinance shall become effective upon passage and posting.

*The following zoning Ordinance was read:*

### AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE<sup>N</sup> establishing a building code, regulating and restricting the construction of buildings within the limits of the unincorporated village of Waunona existing in and being part of the Town of Blooming Grove, Dane County, Wisconsin.

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the citizens of said unincorporated village, and the Town Board, to prevent congestion and to promote and provide for the health, safety, convenience, comfort, prosperity, and general welfare of the citizens of said unincorporated village and to prevent fire hazards;



NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove.

701-- Title-- This ordinance shall be known as the Building Code of the Town of Blooming Grove and shall constitute chapter 7 of the revised ordinances.

7.02-- Building Requirements for Dwellings:

1. Classification. This classification includes every building, or portion of a building, occupied as the residence of not more than two families living independently, or occupied as a residence by not more than one family in connection with a public building or place of employment, or used for sleeping or lodging purposes by not more than three persons not members of a family.

(a) Footings.

2. Foundations./ All foundation walls shall extend below the frost line and have suitable provision at the bottom to keep load distribution within carrying capacity of the soil.

(b) Foundation Walls. Foundation walls for solid masonry wall construction shall be of brick, concrete, concrete block, or stone. When built of brick, concrete block, or coursed stone they shall be at least 12 inches thick where they serve as cellar or basement walls, but may be 8 inches thick when the inclosure is not excavated. In the latter case the foundation walls shall be included in the allowable height of 8 inch walls. When built of concrete cast in place they shall be at least as thick as the walls they support, but in no case less than 8 inches. When built of rubble stone they shall be not less than 16 inches thick.

Foundation walls for hollow building tile, hollow concrete block, hollow walls of brick and for frame construction may be built of brick, concrete, approved concrete block, or of approved hollow clay tile which absorbs moisture in the one hour boiling test not to exceed 8 per cent of the dry weight of the specimen. Tile foundation walls shall be not less than 12 inches thick.

Foundation walls for frame construction shall extend at least



8 inches above the adjacent ground surface.

(c) Ventilation. Ventilation shall be provided for the space inclosed by foundation walls, whether it be excavated or not.

3. Roofing-- Either fireproof shingles of an approved type or wood shingles may be used, but if wood shingles are used, they shall be such that five thicknesses at the butts will measure not less than two inches.

4. Exits-- All dwellings must be constructed with not less than two exits so arranged as to provide safe egress from any portion of the building.

5. Frame Walls-- All exterior frame walls must be sheathed with boards not less than three-fourths inch actual thickness. Sheathing boards shall be laid tight and properly nailed to each stud with not less than two eight-penny nails. Wood sheathing may be omitted if the frame is diagonally braced and other measures taken to secure rigidity. Wood studding shall be not less than 2 x 4 inches and spaced not to exceed 16 inches on center.

6. Size of Rooms-- Every sleeping room shall be of sufficient size to afford at least 400 cubic feet of air space for each occupant over twelve years of age, and 200 cubic feet for each occupant under twelve years. No greater number of occupants than the number thus established, shall be permitted in any such room.

7. Ground Floor Area-- Every dwelling house shall have a minimum ground floor area of not less than <sup>four hundred fifty</sup> ~~five hundred~~ square feet.

8. Windows-- The outside windows in every sleeping or living room shall have a total area of at least one-tenth of the floor area of the room, but not less than 12 square feet. The top of at least one such window shall be not less than 6½ feet above the floor, and shall be made so as to open easily.

9. Chimneys: (a) Construction and Foundations of Chimneys.

Every chimney shall be built of brick or other approved fire resistive material.

No metallic or tile smoke stack shall be used in a

dwelling. No chimney shall rest upon a flooring of wood, nor shall any wood be built into, or in contact with, any chimney. The foundation of



every chimney, flue, or stack, shall be designed and built in conformity with the requirements for foundations of buildings. In no case shall a chimney be corbeled out more than 8 inches from the wall, and in every case the corbeling shall consist of at least five courses of brick. Lime-cement or cement mortar shall be used in the laying of chimney masonry above the roof line.

(b) **Minimum Thickness, Height and Flue Requirements for Chimneys.** Every masonry chimney shall have walls at least 8 inches in solid thickness, except that in a chimney with flue not larger than 260 square inches where a fire clay or other approved flue lining is used for the full height of the chimney the walls shall be not less than 4 inches in solid thickness. Every chimney shall be designed throughout (the above minimum thicknesses being increased where necessary) in accordance with the requirements of the structural design of buildings and with the best engineering practice in chimney construction. In every case where concrete block are used for chimney construction the flue shall have an approved fire clay lining.

The top of every chimney shall be at least 5 feet above the top of the building of which it is a part, if the roof is flat, or at least 2 feet above the ridge if the roof is pitched. The top of every chimney having a flue larger than 260 square inches shall be at least 8 feet above the roof. No smoke flue shall have a cross sectional area less than 64 square inches, except that flue linings 7 inches x 7 inches, or 8 inches in diameter inside, may be used.

(c) **Clean-Out Door.** Every chimney shall be provided with a cleaning out door at its base.

(d) **Piercing of Chimney Walls Prohibited.** The walls of chimneys, smoke stacks, breeching and smoke pipes shall not be pierced at any point except to permit of the entrance of the smoke pipe or breeching from the combustion chamber of a furnace, boiler or similar heating unit.

7.03 **Enforcement--** It shall be the duty of the town inspector of buildings to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.



7.04 Building Permit-- Before construction is started on any building an application for a permit to build together with plans and specifications must be filed with the town inspector of buildings. The inspector of building, upon receipt of said application, plans, and specifications shall check the same and if found to be in conformity with the requirements of this Code, shall, upon receipt of a fee prescribed by the town board issue a permit to build.

7.05 Appeal-- If the inspector of building shall refuse to issue a building permit, because ~~of~~ non-conformance of plans with this Code, the aggrieved party or parties may appeal the matter to the Town Board of Zoning Appeals for a further determination.

7.06 Penalty for Violation: Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with or who resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, or more than One Hundred (\$100.00) dollars for each offense. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

7.07 When Effective: This ordinance shall go into immediate effect upon its passage.

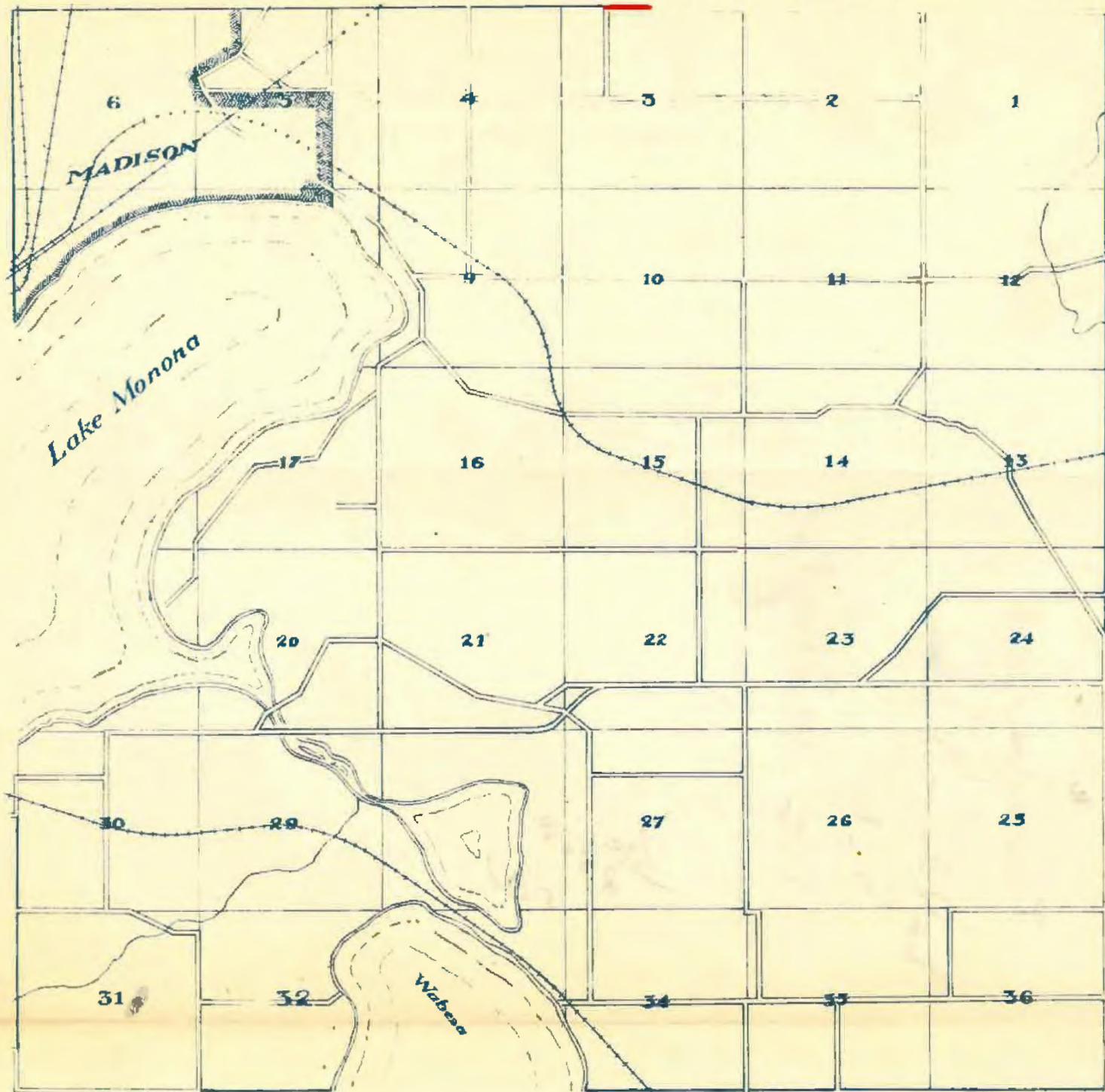

Resolution

Re: Dogs

Running at Large

Complaints have been to the Town Board in regard to dogs running at large. It was decided to adopt the following resolution:

(1) It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of any dog to permit the same to run at large in the Town of Blooming Grove. A dog shall be deemed to be at large unless under the control of a person by means of a chain, rope or chord of sufficient strength to control the action of such dog, or such other personal presence and attention as will reasonably control the conduct of such dog.

(2) Any person who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than fifty dollars.

Police Officer to be Appointed to  
Seize Dogs & Cats Found Running at Large.

(1) The Town Board shall, on or before the first day of May in each year, appoint a special police officer whose duty it shall be to seize any & all dogs & cats found running at large in the Town of Blooming Grove.

(2) Said special police officer shall serve for six months or more of any year when it is deemed necessary by the Town Board, and at such times in any such year as the Town Board shall designate, & shall be paid such compensation therefor as the Town Board of Blooming Grove shall designate.

(3) It shall be the duty of said special police officer to ascertain if possible, the owners of all dogs & cats seized by him & to notify such owners of the fact that said dogs or cats have been seized & where they may be found, & that the owners thereof may get said dogs or cats upon the payment of a fee of one dollar and the board of said animals during the time they are impounded of 50 cents per day.



(4) When any dog seized by said special police officer is known to have bitten any person or animal, said officer shall report the same at once to the health officer for his observation & attention.

(5) After any dog has been kept for five days, & the owner thereof cannot be ascertained by the exercise of reasonable diligence said special officer is authorized & empowered to order said dog killed.

A motion was made by H. C. Fisher, seconded by E. J. Ellstad & unanimously carried, that the above resolution in regard to dogs be adopted.
