(9) Every bicycle operated upon a public highway during any of the time between one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise shall be equipped with a lamp on the front exhibiting a white light visible from a distance of at least 500 feet to the front and with a lamp on the rear exhibiting a red light visible from a distance of 500 feet to the rear except that a red reflector approved by the Industrial Commission may be used instead of a rear light.

(10) No bicycle shall be ridden upon any sidewalk area except as a permanently or temporary established driveway.

(11) It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in trick riding of a bicycle upon any street in the Town of Blooming Grove.

(12) No more than one person shall ride on any bicycle except a tandem bicycle at one time upon any street in the Town of Blooming Grove.

(13) Every bicycle operated on any street or alley in the Town of Blooming Grove shall be equipped with a horn or bell in good working order capable of giving a reasonable warning.

(14) Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$10.00 or by imprisonment in the County Jail for a term of not more than ten days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and publication.

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

TOWN BOARD PERMIT FOR POWER LINE CONSTRUCTION

The undersigned, being supervisors of the Town of Blooming Grove, Dane County, Wisconsin, hereby consent to the construction, maintenance and operation by the Madison Gas and Electric Company of Madison, Wisconsin, or its successors or assigns, of a line of poles and wires for the purpose of transmitting light and power along and within the east and west highway in Section 12, beginning at the center of the section and extending easterly one-half mile to the easterly section line, Dane County, Wisconsin. Said transmission line shall be constructed so as to conform to the Safety Code prescribed by the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin, and shall be located so as not to interfere with travel upon said highways, as near the outer limits of said highways as is practicable, and shall, if necessary, be altered so as to permit such modification or improvements in said highways as may hereafter be ordered by duly authorized officers. In the construction of said transmission line, care shall be taken to avoid undue or unnecessary cutting of trees or shrubbery along the roadside. Whenever such power line is constructed along a county highway, the County Highway Commission shall be notified at the time the construction force is about to begin operations. When the construction is along a state trunk highway, the State Highway Commission shall be notified. Such instructions with regard to construction as may be given on the ground by an authorized representative of the county or state with reference to construction along a road over which either may have jurisdiction as provided by law shall be obeyed implicitly.



THE TIMING FOR LONG TERM CONSTRUCTION



RESOLUTION

October 15, 1940.

The matter of the case of Darrell MacIntyre against the Town of Blooming Grove was presented by Mr. Barkenhagen. An action had been commenced on the 24th of February, 1939, by Mr. MacIntyre, seeking to recover from the Town the sum of \$ 1174.50. The Town Board had decided to defend the action, and had previously retained Hall, Baker & Hall to represent the Town in the defense of the action. The case came on at the January Term, 1940, for a conference, but was not disposed of and was continued to the September, 1940 Term of the Circuit Court for Dane County.

The case came on for trial October 14, 1940. The entire Town Board appeared together with their attorney, and after the case was called for trial conference was held with Judge Hoppmann and with the attorneys for Mr. MacIntyre and the Town Board, and after considerable discussion it was finally agreed to be advisable to settle the action for Three hundred eighteen dollars and fifty cents (\$318.50), and our attorney was directed to sign the stipulation settling the case on that basis.

In this connection, two former members of this Board, Mr. Wayne Fisher and Mr. Edward Voges were present in Court with Mr. MacIntyre, and indicated that they were prepared to testify that they had authorized and directed Mr. MacIntyre to act in behalf of the Town in the Roselawn Memorial Park matter.

The amount involved was substantial and it was deemed in the best interests of the Township to make the settlement, rather than to run the possible risk of a larger recovery, or in any event to make a substantial saving on the expense of litigation.

On motion of Mr. Fisher, seconded by Mr. Evan Ellestad, it was moved and carried that the sum of Three hundred eighteen dollars and fifty cents, (\$318.50) be paid in settlement of the action, and the Clerk and Treasurer, were authorized and directed to issue the draft of the Township in satisfaction of the stipulation hereinbefore mentioned to pay to the plaintiff to settle the matter.

Hall, Baker and Hall, attorneys, having submitted a sworn and verified statement as to the balance of their attorneys' fees in the preparation and trial of the action wherein Darrell MacIntyre was the plaintiff and the town of Blooming Grove was the defendant, the previous sum of Fifty (\$50) dollars having been paid, and the further sum of One hundred (\$100) dollars still remaining unpaid,

Now, Therefore, on motion of Mr. Fisher, seconded by Mr. Ellestad, the Clerk and Treasurer are hereby authorized and directed to pay to our said attorneys, Hall, Baker & Hall, the further sum of One hundred (\$100) dollars in full settlement of their services rendered in said action.





Dear Sir:

At a recent meeting of the Board of Health, town chairman and Health Officers of adjacent townships were invited to discuss the hospitalization costs and ways to meet them of the Madison Contagious Hospital.

It was explained that the charge for all patients living outside of the city limits of Madison is \$30.00 per week. The city of Madison absorbs the difference between \$15 and the actual operating cost which varies but is usually about \$30 per week. When action was taken by the Board to charge out-of-city patients \$30, it was not with the intention of making the hospital inaccessible to anyone or of making a profit. It was felt, however, that the city of Madison should not be expected to carry the additional expense.



Will you please read this letter at the annual town meeting to be held in your township April 1, as I am anxious that all farmers in my district be informed that emergency crop and feed loans are now available to all eligible farmers, and applications for these loans may be made at the office of the county agricultural extension agent in your county.

As in former years funds appropriated for the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office of the Farm Credit Administration are available for crop production purposes, including the purchase of seed, gas and oil, feed for work-stock and minor repairs for machinery. Applicants are required to give a first lien upon the crop to be financed.

Loans are also available for the purchase of feed for livestock. In this instance a first lien upon the livestock to be fed is required.

An applicant, to be eligible for an emergency crop and feed loan, must be 21 years of age and farming in the county in which application is made. In order that applications may have prompt consideration applicants are urged to be prepared to give the following information:

- (1) Wheat allotment and soil depleting acres.
- (2) If renter, name and address of the landlord.
- (3) 1941 crop planting program.

The 1941 crop production loan will bear interest at the rate of 4% per annum from date of disbursement.







Kindly study the descriptions of these weeds and be on the lookout for them. All Weed Commissioners should be prepared this fall to give as accurate an estimate as possible on (1) the total number and percent of farms HAVING INFESTATIONS of each weed or in the case of villages and cities the known number of infestations, (2) the average size of such infestations, (3) where most commonly found (gardens, lawns, roadsides, pastures, cultivated fields, etc.) and (4) the approximate total acreage infested with each weed in your territory.

Special report blanks will be mailed this Fall.

FIELD BINDWEED: Also called "Creeping Jenny". A long-lived perennial with slender stems 3-9 ft. long lying on the ground or twining around other plants or supports. The root system very deep and extensive. The flowers light pink to white, funnel-shaped and not over $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches across. Two small bracts on each flower $\frac{1}{4}$ to 1 inch below the flowers. Leaves arrowhead shaped and usually but not always blunt. Plants flower from the middle of June to the first of August. Found in cultivated fields, gardens, grainfields, lawns and waste places. Do not confuse with wild morning glory which has a rather shallow root system, larger pure white flowers, larger and always sharply pointed leaves and which lacks the two small bracts on the flower stalk.



LEAFY SPURGE: A long-lived perennial with simple or clustered upright stems 1-4 feet tall. The narrow bluish green leaves set directly on the stem are from $1/8$ to $3/8$ of an inch wide and from 1-3 inches long. The plants somewhat resemble flax except that the leaves and stems of Leafy Spurge are larger. Umbrella-like clusters of greenish yellow flowers are borne at the tops of the flowering stems. Three seeds are borne in three-lobed capsules. The roots are much-branched, rubbery, coarse and reddish brown. All parts of the plant have a milky white, bitter and sticky sap. The plants begin growth about April 1-15 and are in full bloom by June 1-15. The plants usually occur in patches and may be found in both cultivated and uncultivated fields.







Schools The hearing was formally opened by Mr. J. J. Barkenhagen, Chairman of Blooming Grove.

The petition was read by the clerk and the Chairman asked for comments in favor of the Petition.

Mr. Halverson, Chairman, Town of Dunn

I believe this is a problem for the School Boards of the two districts and not a problem for the Town Boards. I think the School Boards have more of a voice in the matter than the Town Boards and should settle it among themselves.

Mr. Barkenhagen, Chairman, Town of Blooming Grove

The Statutes state that the Town Board, not the School Board can create a school district.

Mr. Harold Conlin, Petitioner

We feel that by withdrawing from the present school district, we will better our tax problem, and at the same time the amount of valuation we take from the district will not hurt it. The Badger district will have to build a new school and as we do not have any children attending this school, we do not see why we should have to stay in the district and pay the high rate of school taxes. The children from the territory we represent, all go to high school, and there are no children to go to the Badger School. This new district would be all farm district and we would send our children either to Oregon or Madison to school and if the need arises later, we would have to build a school. We also feel it would be cheaper to send the children to Oregon than to Madison, as it costs about \$87.00 per pupil to Oregon and \$100. to Madison.

Mr. Frank New, Clerk of Joint District #9

The difference in the rate of tuition, is Oregon \$40 and Madison \$100.

Mr. Theo. Christenson, Petitioner

We are now paying about \$3.00 per acre taxes. We are satisfied with the school but we want lower taxes.

Mr. Halverson

I still think we are just as well off as we are now, and I don't believe there is enough valuation to create a new district. The majority want to send their children to Madison and I think we should leave it as it was voted.

Mr. Fluckiger, Chairman, Town of Fitchburg

Who owns the 52 acres in the Town of Fitchburg?

Mr. Conlin

Mrs. Busse owns the land in the Town of Fitchburg and also about 4 or 5 acres in the Town of Madison.

We will have about 18 children in the new district, including both high school and graded school. We will transport these children to the Oregon Schools.

Mr. Dawson, Clerk, Town of Madison

Have the State Board of Education given their approval of this new district, and do you plan on state aid?

Mr. Conlin

Yes, we have discussed this with them and they approve.

Mr. Halverson

It seems the whole thing started when a majority wanted to transport the children to Madison. They could have sent the children to Oregon at a cheaper rate of tuition.

Mr. Berkenhagen

If there is an argument in the school district, the Town Board of Blooming Grove knows nothing about it. If they petition for a right to change their district, we must listen to them and must settle it as we see fit. The school district votes to raise an amount of money and we must raise it and have nothing to say about it. This petition has been presented and we must hear them out.

Mr. Wilcox, Clerk of Joint School District #5

The first I heard of this petition was Friday when I received notice of this meeting. I have done a little telephoning and have found out what it is all about. It seems that a few farmers who have no children in the district have decided to leave the people, who have the children, to carry the burden of keeping and maintaining the school. The petitioners in this district #5, have only two scholars at present and next year will have no children going to the district school. The district is short of funds and we have a thick population. We have Brams Addition, which is thickly populated and has a lot of children and very little property valuation. Why must the farmers withdraw and leave us with all this burden.

The State Board of Education is for Consolidation of School Districts and I don't believe John Callahan would sanction any division of a district.

We have had two or three meetings this year. We have discussed building a larger school and also the possibility of annexation of Brams Addition to the city for school purposes only. The city can

take care of our children, as the city school census has dropped by about 150 children. The city schools are dropping off and the out-lying districts are increasing.

It seems that the tuition is cheaper at Oregon, but if we all send our children to Oregon, they will have to build more schools. We would like to take the graded children into the city the same as the high school.

If it is a question of lesser taxes, it would be fine for them but would raise a hardship on the people left in the district.

Mr. Dawson

About six years ago, a petition was handed to the Towns of Fitchburg, Blooming Grove, and Madison, to detach from #5 that portion which is now district #4. About four years ago a meeting was held and the district was created, and took out of the district about 90,000 dollars property value. Now it seems this is just a nibbling away process. Some one has to educate the Brams Addition children and in our type of society, those that have must educate those that haven't.

Mr. Frank New, Clerk of Joint School District #9

This is nothing new, these arguments date back 8 or 9 years. The tuition figure has just about doubled. The majority of the children in our district are farm children. We also have a large transient population.

Mr. Dawson

The Boards should take into consideration the welfare of the children as well as the tax payers.

Mr. Conlin

As far as the welfare of the children, the Oregon schools are rated on the same level with the Madison Schools.

Mr. Wilcox

I went to see Mayor Law about taking Brams Addition into the City for school purposes only, and his answer was no but if they wanted to come in as part of the city, the city would be glad to take them. If we build a school, we will have a bonded indebtedness and will not be able to get any part into the city as easily.

It is hard to tell just what territory this new district will take in. Why aren't the people here to defend their petition?

Mr. New

The #9 district are having a special meeting tonight or they would be here.

AN ORDINANCE :

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove,, do ordain as follows:

"Licensing and regulating the junk business."

1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to engage in the junk business except in strict accordance with the provisions of this Section.

2. Definitions. Whenever the following terms are used in this Section, they shall be construed as follows:

(a) "Junk" shall mean old iron, chain, brass, copper, tin, lead or other base metals, paper, wastepaper, paper clippings, rags, rubber, glass or bottles, used building materials composed of brick, plaster or wood, and all articles and things discarded as manufactured articles composed or consisting of any one or more of the materials or articles mentioned, or other material commonly included within the term "junk."

(b) "Junk Business", shall mean the buying, selling, gathering, delivering, or storing of junk.

(c) "Junk Dealer" shall mean a person who buys, sells, gathers, delivers or stores junk, and maintains the yard and building therefor.

(d) "Junk peddler" shall mean a person engaged in buying and gathering junk by means of a wagon cart or other vehicle.

3. Application for License.

(a) No license shall be granted hereunder until and unless the person desiring the same shall first have paid to the Town Treasurer, the fee hereafter required and filed with the Town Clerk of the Town of Blooming Grove written application therefore, which shall be in duplicate, and shall be filed by the applicant and contain the following information on blanks provided by the Town Clerk.

AN ORDER OF NOTICE:

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove do order

that if any person, firm, association,

1. The full name and residence of the occupant; and in case of a firm or association, the full names and residence of the members of the firm or association; and in case of a corporation, the full names and residence of the officers thereof.

2. Address and description of the premises for which the license is desired.

3. A complete statement of the business to be carried on.

4. An enumeration of the articles and merchandise to be handled on the premises and a statement as to whether the junk to be stored is combustible or inccombustible.

5. A list of the owners of all property within a radius of 500 feet of the grounds to be used for the purpose of which the license is sought.

6. Such application shall also contain such other information as the Town Board may from time to time require.

7. Notice by publication and in writing of each application for a license shall be given to every owner of property within a radius of 500 feet of the premises whereon the junk business as hereinbefore defined is intended to be conducted. Such property owners shall have 15 days within which to file with the Town Clerk written objection to the granting of any license.

8. No license shall be granted under this section, however, until and unless the Town Board shall, in its discretion by virtue of a majority of all its members at a regular meeting or special meeting called for such purpose have authorized the same. In considering such application, the Town Board shall take into account among other things, the nature and development of surrounding property, the proximity of churches, schools, hospitals, public buildings or other places of public gathering, the health, safety and general welfare of the property, and the suitability of the applicant to establish, maintain or operate such yard or business and to receive a license therefor.

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9. Term and expiration of licenses. All licenses issued hereunder shall expire on the 30th day of June, following the date of their issuance unless sooner revoked for cause, or by passage of an ordinance by the Town of Blooming Grove further restricting the junk business for which such license shall have been issued as hereafter provided.

10. Fees.

(a) The license fee shall be \$25.00 per annum.

11. License numbers. All licenses shall be numbered consecutively and the Town Clerk shall furnish to each licensee a card setting forth his or its name and the number of such license.

12. Revenues and expenses. The Town Clerk is authorized to secure the necessary blanks and cards and the expense thereof shall be properly allowed and paid by the Town out of the general fund and all moneys derived from such license shall be turned into the general fund.

13. Limitations upon issuance of licenses.

(a) A separate license shall be required for each place of business and each license shall particularly describe the premises for which issued.

14. Restrictions upon licenses.

(a) No person, firm, or corporation except a licensed junk peddler or junk dealer shall buy, collect, or gather junk in the Town of Blooming Grove.

(b) Storage of combustible junk. No combustible junk shall be stored in any building unless said building is approved by the Town Board and is of fire proof construction.

(c) Inclosure of junk yards. Every junk yard shall be inclosed by a substantial inclosure, not less than eight feet in height and maintained in a proper condition of repair and painted. Junk placed in any junk yard shall be so piled as not to rest against or project through the inclosure. It shall be unlawful to affix or display or permit to be affixed or displayed upon such inclosure.

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picture, sign, bill, placard, pamphlet, notice or other things for purpose of advertising or notification. The words "Post No Bills"

shall be painted on such inclosure at intervals of six inches high.

(d) Time before disposal. No non-ferreous metals shall be disposed of within 48 hours after purchase thereof by any licensee hereunder.

(e) Purchase from certain persons. No purchase shall be made from any child or children under 18 years of age or from any intoxicated persons or habitual drunkards, or unknown persons.

(f) Purchase of certain property. It shall be unlawful to purchase used pipe, faucets, boilers, spigots, coils from any person except the manufacturer thereof, a licensed plumber, a licensed peddler or the owner of the building from which the metal was taken.

(g) Garbage. It shall be unlawful to store any garbage materials on the premises licensed thereunder, except in compliance with the ordinances pertaining to garbage.

(h) Hours. No dealer in junk shall keep open his store or place of business for the purpose of junk or any operation pertaining to such occupation on Sundays, legal holidays or between the hours of eight P. M. and six A. M. on other days.

16. Revocation.

(a) Upon complaint being made in writing by any 3 residents or any official of the Town of Blooming Grove to the Town Board of Blooming Grove that any licensee hereunder has violated any of the provisions of this Section, the Town Board shall summon such licensee to appear before it at the time specified in the summons, which shall not be any less than three days after the date of the service thereof, to show cause why his license should not be revoked. 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AN ORDINANCE

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove, do ordain as follows:

"SLAUGHTERING OF ANIMALS AND DEPOSIT OF OFFAL"

1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to kill or slaughter any beesves, sheep, calves, hogs or any other animals within the boundaries of the Town of Blooming Grove without first obtaining a permit therefor as hereinafter provided.
2. Any person, persons, firm or corporation that may desire to kill or slaughter any beesves, sheep, calves, hogs or any other animals or that may desire to use, erect or maintain a slaughter house, packing house, building or place in said Town of Blooming Grove for the slaughtering of any such animals, shall first make application in writing for that purpose to the Town Board of Blooming Grove, specifying the particular location of where such slaughter house, packing house or building is to be erected, maintained or used.
3. If the Town Board shall deem such location a suitable place to carry on such business, it may issue a permit for the conducting of such business, at such place, which permit shall specify the place at which such business may be conducted.
4. No such slaughter house, packing house, building or place shall be so conducted as to be or become a public nuisance.
5. The several terms and provisions of this section shall be deemed severable, and if any provision hereof or the application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the section and the applicability of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.
6. Any person who shall violate any or the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00.

Mr. Lee and Mr. Becker, attorneys for the Town were present.

In Reg. Fire chief, Orin Brigham, and firemen, Earl Sime, Art Howe, and Kenneth Lowe, asked the board to pass a resolution to allow them to equip their private cars with siren or red light or both for use in going to fires. They were requesting this action in behalf of the entire volunteer department and any member who so desired would be permitted to equip his car under this ordinance. The following discussion was held.

Mr. Lowe: This law was passed in June and we found out that the local town board must act on the law to make it lawful in each township.

I believe that only a few would equip their cars as this would be at their own expense. If any one of the men who do have the sirens, would violate the law in the use of them, they should have the siren taken off the car at once.

Children riding on the roads on bikes do not get out of the way and it is necessary to the people that we get to the fire as quickly and safely as possible.

I believe that if our men are conscientious enough to put these sirens and lights on their cars, they will use them as the law requires.

Mr. Ellestad: Perhaps a lot of the firemen would get them and the board would be laying themselves responsible for the misuse.

Mr. Lowe: These sirens are expensive and I think only a few would spend the money for them.

Mr. Brigham: These sirens are about \$50 or perhaps a little less. If they misuse them they are liable for a \$50 fine. It seems that when the fire siren blows, everyone follows the truck and if our men don't get started right with the truck they can't get through,

Mr. Fisher: Do you want both sirens and red lights?

Mr. Lowe: At night we have no protection and the red light would help a lot. The red lights are on the bumper rail and are not too noticeable.

Mr. Brigham: If we had a police patrol to go with us we would not have the trouble getting through.

The matter was taken under consideration and will be decided upon at the next regular meeting.

Mr. Brigham requested that the board arrange some kind of grass fire permit.

AN ORDINANCE establishing collection and disposal of garbage within the limits of the unincorporated village of Waunona existing in and being part of the Town of Blooming Grove, Dane County, Wisconsin.

WHEREFORE, it is the desire of the citizens of said unincorporated Village, and the Town Board, to promote and provide for health, safety, convenience, and general welfare of the citizens of said unincorporated Village;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove,

1. DEFINITION. The word "garbage" as used in this section shall be held to include every refuse, accumulation of animal or vegetable matter that attends the preparation, use, or cooking of meats, fish, fowl, fruits, and vegetables, and the dealing in or storing of food stuffs by retail dealers.

2. SUPERVISION. The collection, removal and disposition of garbage shall be under the direction and control of the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove and said work shall be done under the supervision of the Town Board of Blooming Grove in strict conformity with the provisions of this section and with such additional rules and regulations as may be made from time to time by the Town Board of Blooming Grove.

3. AUTHORITY OF TOWN BOARD TO HIRE PERSONS AND VEHICLES. The said Town Board of Blooming Grove shall have authority to hire such persons as may be necessary to properly collect the said garbage, and to deliver the same to the point of disposal, and shall have authority to hire teams and vehicles to properly collect and remove the garbage.

4. MANNER OF REMOVAL AND DISPOSITION OF THE GARBAGE. All garbage shall be removed and disposed of in such manner as the Town Board of Blooming Grove shall from time to time designate and direct.

5. PERSONS WHO MAY COLLECT GARBAGE. No person, unless he has a contract with the Town Board of Blooming Grove, permitting him to collect and remove garbage, or unless he be a town or village employee acting under the direction of the Town Board, shall collect or remove any garbage from the premises located within the unincorporated limits of the Village of Waunona.

6. VESSELS FOR HOLDING GARBAGE TO BE PROVIDED--MANNER OF DEPOSITING GARBAGE IN SAME.

It shall be the duty of all householders, tenants, hotel keepers, boarding house keepers, restaurants, and retail dealers dealing in or storing food stuffs to provide or cause to be provided, and at all times to keep or cause to be kept, portable vessels or cans for holding garbage, said vessels or cans to be watertight, provided with handles, and a cover which shall not be removed except when necessary. These vessels or cans shall not exceed fifteen gallons capacity in size, and shall be constructed of, or lined with metal and shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times. Such cans or vessels shall be kept in the rear of the house or buildings, or in a place which is easily accessible to the collector, not above the ground floor, but shall not be placed on the sidewalk, street, alley,

or other public place. Such vessels or cans shall be delivered promptly to the collector and returned by him to the place whence they were received. All garbage from residences shall be drained and wrapped in paper before being placed in garbage vessels and garbage from hotels, boarding houses, restaurants, and retail dealers as hereinbefore provided shall be deposited in the garbage vessels after draining, without wrapping. It shall be unlawful for any person to place in the garbage any ashes, earth, glass, crockery, tin cans, or other refuse than garbage as hereinbefore defined.

7. GARBAGE NOT TO BE DEPOSITED IN ANY OTHER PLACE OR MANNER THAN HEREIN PROVIDED.

It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit garbage in any other place or in any other manner than as herein provided.

8. GARBAGE REMOVAL TO BE AT EXPENSE OF UNINCORPORATED VILLAGE
All garbage shall be collected, removed and disposed of at the general expense of the unincorporated Village of Waunona.

9. TIME OF COLLECTING GARBAGE.

Garbage shall be collected at such times as may be necessary to insure sanitary conditions within the unincorporated Village. The Town Board of Blooming Grove shall arrange a schedule showing the times when garbage shall be collected, and shall properly notify the residents of the unincorporated Village by posting said notices in public places.

10. INCINERATORS.

The provisions of this section shall not apply to the collection or disposal of garbage from premises where the garbage is properly disposed of in an incinerating plant operated on said premises, the construction, maintenance and operation of which is safe and sanitary, and approved in such respects by the Town Board of Blooming Grove.

11. SEVERABILITY.

The several terms and provisions of this section shall be deemed severable, and if any provision hereof or the application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this section and the applicability of such provisions to other persons and circumstances shall not be effected thereby.

12. PENALTY.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be punished by fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 for each offense, and on default of payment of such fine shall be imprisoned for a period of not to exceed thirty days.

13. WHEN EFFECTIVE.

This ordinance shall go into immediate effect upon its passage.

The man we lease from says the taxes are too high due to the number of children going to school. He says we must make all people with children, living there to move. Most of these people work in the shops.

Mr. Barkenhagen: The tuition to the city schools is \$3.00 per week per pupil, plus \$2.60 per month per pupil for transportation. You also have about 3 going to high school at about \$108 a school year. Over a period of nine months it is a large amount for a school district to raise.

There is a ninety day ordinance and the trailors would have to move at the end of that time.

Mrs. Meekes: We charge \$5.00 per month for each trailor. Our lease begins Sept. 25, 1941.

Mr. Barkenhagen: That particular section is zoned residential and a trailor camp is not allowed in a residential district, however, we stretched the point and it just didn't work out do to so many children.

Mrs. Meekes: We intend to make a sanitary camp, with showers, etc. We also intended to start an amusement park in the spring.

Mr. Barkenhagen: The only way we can give you a permit to run a trailor camp, is for you to exclude all families with children.

Miss King: What about that sign for Hollywood?

Mr. Thurber: If you lease the land it is on, you can make them take it down. You want to plan on plenty of room for parking cars if you are going to have an amusement park, as no cars are allowed to park on the highway.

Mr. Meekes: We thought we would have a free movie on Sunday nights in the summer as that would draw in the people. Is there anything to prevent that?

Mrs. Meekes: How much is the permit for the trailor camp?

Mr. Thurber: \$10 per year.

Mr. Barkenhagen: If you will enter into an agreement not to keep any trailors with children of school age, the board would be glad to allow you a permit.

Mr. Meekes: What about the man we have to do our building and stone work, he has two children.

Mr. Buehler: Would he be able to pay his children's tuition?

Mr. Meekes: He could take care of the transportation, but I don't believe he could pay the tuition.

Mr. Barkenhagen: It is unfortunate, but if we would allow one trailer with children, we would have to allow them all.

In regard to the amusement park, we see no reason why if it is run right, that the board should object.

The board is to look over the grounds and the proposed sanitary improvements on Friday, Sept. 26,

Fred Schroeder, Re: Building permit.

Mr. Thurber: Fred has complied with the building code in regard to the new building, but has not torn down the old building as he was ordered.

Fred S.: I can't afford to tear it down, as I have too much in it.

Mr. Barkenhagen: You were ordered to tear it down and were violating the law by moving it.

Fred S.: It's there and I'm not going to tear it down.

Mr. Barkenhagen: Then the town will have to take action to see that it is torn down.

Fred S.: The agreement was that I could make ~~a~~ building bigger and live in it.

Mr. Bailey: It is on farm land and it will stay there.

Mr. Barkenhagen: It was ordered torn down by the Town Board.

Fred S.: I am going to let it stand and paint it up.

Mr. Barkenhagen: Did you have a permit to move it?

Fred S.: No.

Mr. Barkenhagen: Then there is only one thing to do and that is to bring you in here tomorrow and see that you comply with the law.

Fred S.: I'm having chickens in there and I'M having enough for my own use.

Mr. Jacob Buehler, Neighbor of Fred S.: I am a neighbor and I do not object to a man having a few chickens and intend to have a few myself. I don't like to see a lot of shacks or a hundred or more chickens in the neighborhood.

Mr. Barkenhagen: We have a law which states that no chickens are allowed in that district.

Mr. Buehler: Couldn't he leave the shed stand and use it as a tool shed or garage? To tear it down would be a waste of money.

Mr. Barkenhagen: It wouldn't have been when he first brought it out there. We are not trying to be tough but he has told us that the ordinances don't mean anything.

Fred S.: I am not trying to buck Blooming Grove.

Mr. Barkenhagen: You are not only bucking Blooming Grove, but you are bucking Dane County.

Fred S.: You let another man move in an old house.

Mr. Thurber: It is a well constructed house and he is building it up to comply with the law.

Fred S.; I want it for a chicken house and if you want chickens to lay you have to keep them penned up.

Mr. Barkenhagen: Don't do any more to the building until we can come over either Thurs. or Friday and look at it.

Fred.: Can't I put any windows in it? or paint it?

Mr. Barkenhagen: No leave it as it stands until we see it.

Mr. Ellestad: When you make an agreement, you want to keep your word.

Fred S.: I should have come down and found out about it before I started.

Mr. Ellestad: When a man doesn't live up to his agreement, we lose faith in him.

Mr. Messiah Peltzer was present in regard to obtaining a building permit to allow him to make a garage out of two old shacks and build a house out of another shack. The shacks were moved from Winnebago Street without a permit. He plans on a large house, two stories with about seven rooms.

for all forward posts we were given some "confidence" by our commandant who

An ordinance relating to the use of sirens or red warning lights by active Voluntary Firemen of the Town of Blooming Grove, Dane County, Wisconsin.

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the citizens of said Town of Blooming Grove and the Town Board to prevent congestion and to promote for the health, safety, convenience, comfort, prosperity and general welfare of the citizens of said Town of Blooming Grove and to prevent fire hazards;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove,

TITLE: This ordinance shall be known as the "Regulation and Use of Sirens and Red Warning Lights on privately owned automobiles of the active Voluntary Firemen of the Town of Blooming Grove."

1. It shall hereby be lawful for the active members of the Voluntary Fire Department of the Town of Blooming Grove to equip their privately owned motor vehicles with a siren or red warning lights, or both, at their own expense, provided such voluntary firemen shall only use such siren or red warning light or both while traveling to the scene of a fire.

2. The several terms and provisions of this section shall be deemed severable, and if any provision hereof or the application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the section and the applicability of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

3. Any person or volunteer fireman who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$50.00.

Upon conviction, such voluntary fireman must remove siren and red warning lights immediately from his car.

This ordinance shall take effect on the 21 day of October, 1941


Dear Mr. Barkenhagen:

Pursuant to your request for a legal opinion as to whether the Town Board may exercise options on real estate and further, whether, said Town Boards are empowered to buy and sell real estate. It is our opinion that Town Boards may exercise such options to purchase real estate when exercising the powers relating to Villages and conferred on Village Boards when lawfully authorized so to do by resolution of the Town meeting, adopted pursuant to Subsection 12 of Section 60.18. Under Chapter 61.34 entitled "Powers of Village Board, Subsection 3, Acquisition and Disposition of Property":

"The Village Board may acquire property, real or personal, within or without the Village for parks, libraries, historical places, recreation, beautification, streets, waterworks, sewerage or waste disposal and for any other public purpose; may improve and beautify the same; may construct, own, lease and maintain buildings on such property for instruction, recreation, amusement and other public purposes; and may sell and convey such property."

The above set out Statute clearly defines the powers vested in a Village Board to acquire and dispose of property, both real and personal.



Dear Mr. Barkenhagen:

Pursuant to your request for a legal opinion as to whether a slaughter house is compelled by law to have a full time inspector on the premises when butchering is being done, it is our opinion that under the laws of this state, the regulation, control of slaughtering houses is in the State Board of Health, and that under the Statutory provisions for the regulation thereof, it nowhere appears that an inspector must be on the premises at all times.

However, pursuant to Statute 146.11, it says that slaughtering houses shall be open to inspection at all times and must be operated in compliance with all state and local regulations. Further, it is also provided that at least one inspection per year must be made by the State Board of Health.

RESOLUTION

Dividing special assessments for certain street improvements in three installments and determining the amount of interest to be paid by property owners desiring to pay assessment in full prior to maturity:

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove has here-to-for by prior proceedings levied assessment to pay the cost of improvements on the following streets and parts of streets as described below to-wit:

The Buckeye Road from Poole Court to Forest Lane
Fair Oaks Ave. from Milwaukee Street to Commercial Ave
Drexel Street from Lake Edge Blvd. to Davies Street.

AND WHEREAS, provisions have here-to-for been made for the construction of said sidewalk improvements pursuant to Statutes of the State of Wisconsin made and provided.

WHEREAS, it is desireable to divide assessment into three equal installments with interest thereon at 6% per annum.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved:

Section 1

That the assessment for sidewalk be and they hereby are, divided into three equal installments as provided by Section 62.21 of the Wisconsin Statutes, with interest thereon at 6% per annum.

Section 2

That all assessments will be collected annually in installments as above provided, except such assessments as the owner of the property shall file with the Town Clerk within ten days of date of notice of determination, written notice that they elect to pay the entire special assessment on their property at the time when the general property tax assessment for the year in which said special assessments are finally determined and levied shall become due and payable.


