REPORT TO TOWN BOARD OF LEGAL MATTERS HANDLED BY TOWN'S
ATTORNEY.

I. TOWN OF BLOOMING GROVE V. JOINT SCHOOL DISTRICT #3
CONTROVERSY.

On December 9, 1941, a notice and written demand was made upon the Joint School District #3 for the payment of \$775.11, that sum representing the amount paid by the Town Treasurer from the general funds of the Town of Blooming Grove to the Joint School District in anticipation of collecting the school tax. Since the service of said notice, your Town Attorney has spent considerable time in making a complete legal research to support our cause of action. The law pertaining to our cause of action is rather scarce but that authority that exists is in our opinion sufficient to commence a law suit against the School District for the above mentioned sum. We are at this time in the process of drafting a complaint and expect to commence the action within the next ten days.

II. OPINION IN REGARD TO COLLECTION OF DELINQUENT PERSONAL
PROPERTY TAX.

This office has rendered a legal opinion to I. B. Johnson, the Treasurer, for the collection of the delinquent personal property tax. Said opinion is now in the hands of the Treasurer, Mr. Johnson.

III. CONDEMNATION OF CERTAIN BUILDINGS IN THE TOWN OF
BLOOMING GROVE.

A legal opinion was rendered to the Town Chairman, Mr. Barkenhagen, regarding the condemnation and razing of certain buildings in the Town of Blooming Grove, along with the necessary legal notices that are necessary to commence said condemnation proceedings. The legal notices to the two properties inspected by the Building Inspector, the Town Chairman and the Town Attorney are now in the hands of the constable of the Town of Blooming Grove, for service on the respective parties.

arduous task of sifting and putting the laws in final form so that a decimal system similar to the Wisconsin Statutes may be used. It is believed that we will have the final draft of these codified laws ready for your inspection sometime within the next sixty days.

V. RELIEF CLAIMS.

(a) Helgeson Claim. Your attorney has made a comprehensive study and research into this claim with the view in mind of definitely establishing a possible legal settlement in the City of Madison for the Helgeson family. With the help of Mrs. Schaefer, investigator for the Dane County Welfare Department, such a study was possible and we have now in final form enough material to commence negotiations with the City of Madison toward the end of forcing them to pay the claim. It is our opinion and also the opinion of the County Welfare Department, that Floyd Helgeson has a derivative settlement in the City of Milwaukee, having obtained such from his father on April 4, 1939, and has had no opportunity to loose his derivative settlement. We are ready to meet with the City and attempt an out of court settlement, but are waiting for a corrected bill to be served upon the City and County from Miss Wisowaty of your Welfare Department.

(b) The Klemstien relief claim. We have been unable to find anything definite relative to pinning the legal settlement of Harry Klemstein on the City of Madison, inasmuch as it is difficult to say where Mr. Klemstien has lived from 1926 up to 1930. In other words, we have been unable to ascertain any more definite information than Fred Armstrong had in his affidavits and file. Your attorney has also discussed this case with the County and the County is definitely of the opinion that the Town of Blooming Grove will ultimately be responsible for this relief claim. It is therefore, our opinion that the Town of Blooming Grove is liable in the absence of any other affirmative evidence for this relief claim.

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RESOLUTION No. 147, 1941-1942

WHEREAS, circumstances have arisen that make it advisable to change the zoning ordinance with reference to the operation of tourist camps; now, therefore, be it

Resolved that the Dane County Zoning Ordinance be amended as follows:

1. Section VI (6) be stricken from the ordinance;
2. That Section VII (12) relating to service district A be stricken from the ordinance;
3. That there be added a new subsection to Section VIII which subsection shall be number 6 and shall read as follows: Tourist camps, provided such camp provides not less than 1,000 square feet of lot area for each cabin, trailer, tent, or house car, and provided further that such camp is clearly bounded by a fence or a hedge on all sides. Whenever used in this ordinance unless a different meaning appears from the context: a. A trailer or house car shall be understood to mean any vehicle or structure intended or capable of human habitation or designed primarily for sleeping purposes, mounted upon wheels or jacks and capable of being moved from place to place, either by its own power or by power supplied by some vehicle used or to be used, excepting a device used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks; b. A tourist camp or trailer camp shall mean any park, court, camp, site, lot, parcel, or tract of land designed, maintained, intended, or used for the purpose of supplying a location or accommodations for more than one tourist cabin, trailer, tent or house car and shall include all buildings used or intended for use as part of the equipment thereof, regardless of whether or not a charge is made for the use of the trailer camp or tourist camp and its facilities. Tourist camp or trailer camp shall not include automobile or trailer sales lots on which unoccupied trailers are parked for purposes of inspection and sale.

Any action toward the removal of wheels except for temporary purposes of repair from a trailer or house car or any other action to attach the trailer to the ground by means of posts, piers, or foundation, shall subject the trailer or house car to the requirements of the zoning ordinance in general regarding setback lines, side yards, amount of space necessary, and all other requirements of the ordinance.

No person, persons, or other party other than the owner of the tourist camp or trailer camp shall occupy such tourist camp or trailer camp either in a tourist cabin, trailer, tent, or house car for more than 90 days in any one year.

(NOTE: Towns should act on the approval of this amendment and report their action to the County Clerk before the County Board meeting on Feb. 11)

Mr. Meeks, of the Shady Oaks Trailer Camp, was present and requested a license or permission of the Town Board to operate an amusement park at his Trailer Camp. He would have rides, such as the Merry go Round, Ferris Wheel, Scooter Cars, etc. He would also rent his grounds to various organizations to hold their picnics, such as the Eagles, Elks, and various unions. He also planned to erect a platform for dancing at the picnics, and possible a roller rink.

Mr. George Mackin, Mr. Vauk, Mr. Clairmont, and Mr. Milo Brandt of the Hoboken Beach, Esther Beach area were present and the board asked them if they would have any objections to such a park, as they would be living in the near vicinity.

Mr. Mackin and Mr. Brandt both agreed that it would probably be rather noisy and would not help the prestige of the community very much but if it would be run well and would observe all the rules and regulations layed down by the Town Board, they did not see any reason why it could not be given a trial. Mr. Schmidt of the Health Board suggested that it might be a good thing as they could demand that they install the proper sanitary facilities and if they did not operate according to the rules they could be stopped at any time.

The Board took the matter under advisement to investigate the necessary zoning changes to permit such an enterprise and are to reach a decision at the next regular meeting of the Board.

The change in the County Zoning Ordinance with reference to the operation of Tourist Camps was read.

Mr. Mackin informed the board that several persons who had signed the petition in favor of consolidation did not understand the petition and thought it was a petition to hold a hearing on the matter, and that they were not in favor of consolidation and were planning to ask the Town Board to withdraw their names from the petition. Mr. Mackin also assured the board that a large number of persons from the districts involved would be present at the hearing to protest the consolidation.

The purchase of a Carbon Di Oxide Extinguisher for the fire department was discussed and it was ordered. The cost of the extinguisher is \$49.50 and the bracket to hold it on the truck is \$5.60. Refills \$3.00

Hearing on Petition for Consolidation of
Joint School Districts #4 and #11

8:00 P.M.

The Hearing was formally opened by Mr. J. J. Barkenhagen, Chairman of Blooming Grove.

A roll call was taken and the following were present:

Representing the Town of Madison: Mr. Carl Felton, Chairman; Mr. Fred Wakem, and Mr. Ed. Stober.

Representing the Village of Monona: Mr. E. F. Rothman, acting President; Mr. Stanley Stemp, Mr. W. C. Tompkins, Mr. Harold Stone, Mr. Verne Starry, and Mr. L. C. Gunderson.

Representing the Town of Blooming Grove; Mr. J. J. Barkenhagen, Chairman; Mr. Henry Fisher and Mr. Evan Ellested.

The petition was read by the Clerk, Mrs. Nancy Michaelis, and the hearing was open for discussion.

Mr. Barkenhagen requested that order be maintained and that both sides would be heard.

Mr. Frank Weston, Resident of Blooming Grove, speaking in favor of Petition:

Mr. Weston passed out a printed report to the members of the boards present and read from the report in detail. (See Exhibit 1) He also discussed a report of Mr. Mickle which had been presented at a meeting of the Community Club at an earlier date.

Mr. B. H. Ashman, Resident of Blooming Grove, Member of School Board #11, requested a copy of the report read by Mr. Weston and Mr. Weston agreed to see that Mr. Ashman received this report.

Mr. E. F. Rothman, President, Village of Monona, speaking for the Village Board, said that the Board feels the reading matter is not pertinent to the matter at hand and should be limited to just the items that are pertinent to consolidation, leaving out all personal differences of opinion. The Village Board would like to hear from more people on the matter.

Mr. Barkenhagen asked Mr. Weston to skip part of his report and to only discuss the matter of consolidation.

Mr. Gunderson, member of Village of Monona Board, stated that the Village Board was not interested in any controversy that had developed between persons in the Community. The Village Board wants facts that have bearing on the matter of consolidation only.

Mr. Weston continued his report as requested.

The clerk was asked by the Chairman, Mr. Barkenhagen, to read the Petition against consolidation and the petition was open for discussion.

Mr. E. I. Cooper, Resident of Blooming Grove, speaking against consolidation.

Mr. Cooper explained the origin of the question at hand, told of the meeting of the Waunona Community Club, the appointing of a Committee and the result of its findings. A vote taken at a Joint Committee meeting was against consolidation and the building of a school. Mr. Cooper pointed out that Mr. Westons reference to the altering of the districts was an other matter and did not concern the present hearing or petitions involved.

Mr. E. J. Schmidt, Treasurer of Joint School District #4

Mr. Schmidt stated that the boundaries were not as Mr. Weston had said and that a map of the boundaries of the school district was on file and could be established. Mr. Schmidt also stated that the books of the school district did balance and had been audited by the Board of Audit and were not wrong as implied by Mr. Weston. He also explained the bus fare referred to by Mr. Weston. The school board feels the fare they are charging is a like matter to tuition and is a saving to the district as they have plenty of room in the bus to accomodate the extra pupils. The school board do not feel it necessary to build a school for 13 or 14 children.

Mr. A. T. Mickle, Resident of Blooming Grove

Mr. Mickle said he believed the Boards were here to abide by the wishes of the people. He gave the average tax rate as being 23.7 mills as compared to 26.5 mills in the city and the average attendance as 25 to 27 pupils including both districts. He quoted from the minutes of the meeting of the Committee of the Community Club, quoting Messrs. Iler, Peterson and Schmit of the Board of Public Instruction.

Mr. B. H. Ashman

If the consolidation was granted, Mr. Ashman pointed out that the districts would loose \$500 state aid and \$100 state aid for transportation.

Mr. Gunderson

Mr. Gunderson asked why a referendum vote was not taken in the districts involved.

Mr. Barkenhagen

Mr. Barkenhagen referred to the Wisconsin Statutes, Chapter 40.30 on which this action was based.

Mr. Weston

Mr. Weston explained that at the Annual School meeting of Joint District #4 in July, a committee was appointed to bring in a report at the adjourned meeting. At that time the Waunona Community Club was only in District #4 and later enlarged to take in District #11 and the committee appointed to study the problem recommended these steps.

Mr. Gunderson

Mr. Gunderson stated that it seemed to him that the districts should have sought the sentiment of the community first.

Mr. Schmidt

Mr. Schmidt explained that at the meeting Mr. Weston referred to, the question came up in regard to the cost of running the district and a committee was appointed to investigate the cost of running the district and not the cost of building a school or consolidation of the two districts.

Mr. Levenick, Resident of Blooming Grove

Mr. Levenick said he thought the whole thing was a misunderstanding and made a motion that a rising vote be taken.

Mr. Stone, Member of Village of Monona Board

Mr. Stone said he believed that all boards concerned had received a copy of the petitions and that a rising vote would not be in order.

Mr. Brooks, Resident of Blooming Grove

Mr. Brooks stated that he had had the privilege of circulating one of the petitions against consolidation and that he found many people who had signed the petition in favor of consolidation that had not read it and did not favor consolidation.

Mr. Mickle

Mr. Mickle said that none of the people are opposed to a referendum and would like the chance to vote on the question. He also stated that the consolidation had been proposed by a group who have no children and they thought it would be easier to get such a movement put over before a meeting of this kind than at a referendum.

Mr. Weston

Mr. Weston started to explain the start of the action in July and was about to read from letters which he had handed to the Chairman of the Hearing at the beginning of the meeting.

Mr. Barkenhagen

Mr. Barkenhagen objected to the reading of the letters and stated that they were there if the boards wished to read them and if they pertained to consolidation.

The Hearing was declared closed and the boards adjourned to executive session.

Mr. Mackin, Resident of Blooming Grove

Mr. Mackin requested that the decision of the Boards be announced tonight.

Mr. Rothman

Mr. Rothman said that the Village Board did not care to vote on the matter tonight and would take action at their regular meeting on Monday Evening.

Mr. Felton

Mr. Felton said that the Board of the Town of Madison would like to consider the matter at their regular meeting and take action then.

Mr. Barkenhagen requested that the decisions of the Boards be given the Clerk by Tuesday, March 3, 1942.

It was then discovered that the Statutes provide for action on the question at the Hearing, therefore the various boards retired to private session to decide their action.

The Board of the Town of Madison voted unanimously to deny the petition for consolidation.

The Board of the Village of Monona voted unanimously to deny the petition for consolidation.

The Board of the Town of Blooming Grove by motion of Mr. Fisher, seconded by Mr. Ellestad voted unanimously to deny the petition for consolidation.

The petition was declared denied and the meeting adjourned.

You gentlemen of these boards have known me many years; you have worked with me on many matters, civic, but more largely schools, perhaps our greatest problem. Certainly so, so far as taxes are concerned. I believe you will remember I've never asked you for anything for myself as an individual, but rather for the best interests of all. Very plainly, the present matter is of that nature. You gentlemen of these boards have been elected and re-elected several times, largely because you have a record for maintaining a low town and village tax rate, with records of service splendidly within that tax rate, but though you have kept your local municipal tax down, you have had little, if any, control over the largest of all taxes, local school taxes. In the present instance you have the opportunity to decrease the taxes of the people in your municipalities by joining the two school districts No. 4 and 11, together, thereby creating a tax-base spread over a valuation of \$620,760 of property, making thereby a healthy situation possible of things that can be done and at a lower tax rate than could either district do if left alone. You gentlemen who have been making taxes almost half of your lives know how much easier and cheaper you can do things with a tax spread of \$620,760 as against a spread of \$380,610 in No. 4 or \$240,150 in No. 11.

The simple question is as to whether we shall take half of our tax dollars, put them into our own splendid schoolhouse, community center, playgrounds and gardens without any increase in taxes due to increase in scholars, or continuing as we are, to pay every dollar into our present system of schools and transportation.

The present matter, according to law, could be reached in several ways, i.e. by the school boards submitting to referendum, by the town boards on their own initiative, or, as in the present instance, by petition of even one citizen. (We desire to call your attention to three names on our petition, Judge Proctor, Police Captain Kinney, and Mr. Jackson Reuter, all taxpayers, though not residents. Judge Proctor, as does Captain Kinney, knows the value of a community center, where activities such as Boy and Girl Scouts, 4-H Clubs, etc., of the young folks, can be centered, a place for play, theatricals, bands, orchestras, etc., under shelter, and Mr. Reuter, whose every window of his cottage was smashed recently, believes too such a community center would make for betterment of the community.

Had any of these steps been taken, especially by the town and village boards, you would have had to follow the same steps we have followed, namely, go to your highest authority on schools, the Department of Public Instruction, County Superintendents, etc., for authoritative information. So far as local school boards taking such action is concerned, that just isn't done.

The Department of Public Instruction would cheerfully for you, as it did for us, make your suggested survey with recommendations along the line of proper education first, and saving of taxes next. We hand you herewith their figures, suggestions, recommendations and plans.

It has taken since last July, 1941, to assemble, compile, and study this data. It is true this was largely done by one man. His office is but a few steps from the Capitol and with his experience and available time he could and did save the members of his committee much trouble in the securing of the data in question. Our first study of local school tax came in July, 1941, when our local District No. 4 assessed us \$11.04 a thousand. We went to that annual school meeting and asked that a committee be appointed to study the possibility of lowering our taxes and to report at an adjourned meeting. The committee was appointed and the adjournment was taken over the strenuous objection of the local school board. That committee appointed by the chairman of the School Meeting, Mr. Harriman, consisted of Mrs. Alexius Baas, Mrs. Wallace Conlin, John Armbricht, O. A. Frederickson, Frank Weston, and Harry Harriman, ex officio. Immediately the committee went to the best sources of information on schools, the Department of Public Instruction, and compiled the report signed by its chairman and secretary (handed to you herewith as Exhibit No. 1), which was handed to the adjourned school meeting at Hollywood-on-the-River without recommendations.

Later, November 9, 1941, Mr. Harriman, President of the Waunona Community Club, appointed a committee of citizens to further study school and transportation problems. You gentlemen have been handed the report of that committee dated January 20, 1942, with its recommendations. Again this committee went to the Department of Public Instruction and requested a survey by that Department of our problem, school sites, and I hand you herewith the report and recommendations, Mr. Callahan, Superintendent of Public Instruction's letter, Exhibit No. 2; Miss Krakow, Superintendent of Schools (1st Dist.) Exhibit No. 3; Mr. T. S. Thompson (now deceased) County Superintendent Western Dist., Exhibit No. 4; Mr. Walter B. Senty; Supervisor Secondary Schools, Exhibit No. 5; Mr. H. W. Schmidt, Supervisor

The gentleman of these boards have known me many years; you have worked with me on many occasions, civic, but more largely schools, perhaps our greatest problem. Certainly so, so far as taxes are concerned. I believe you will remember I've never asked you for anything for myself as an individual, but rather for the best interests of all. Very briefly, the present matter is of that nature. You gentlemen of these boards have been elected and re-elected several times, largely because you have a record for maintaining a low town and village tax rate. With records of service splendidly within that tax rate, but though you have kept your local municipal tax down, you have not lifted it any, control over the income of all taxes, local school taxes. In the present instance you have the opportunity to decrease the taxes of the people in your municipalities by joining the two school districts No. 4 and 11, together, thereby creating a tax-base spread over a village of \$250,000 of property, making thereby a healthy situation possible of things that can be done and at a lower tax rate than would either district do it left alone. You gentlemen who have been making taxes almost half of your lives know how much easier and cheaper you can do things with a tax spread of \$250,000 as against a spread of \$250,000 in No. 4 or \$250,000 in No. 11.

The single question is as to whether we shall take half of our tax dollars and turn into our own splendid educational, community center, playgrounds and gardens without any increase in taxes due to increase in salaries or continuing as we are, to pay every dollar into our present system of schools and transportation.

The present matter, according to law, should be handled in several ways, 1. by the school boards submitting to referendum, by the town boards on their own initiative, or as in the present instance, by petition of over one citizen. (We desire to call your attention to three names on our petition, Judge Preston, Police Captain Kinney, and Mr. Jackson Weaver, all taxpayers, though not residents. Judge Preston, as does Captain Kinney, knows the value of a community center, where activities such as boy and girl scouts, 4-H clubs, etc., at the young folks, can be centered, a place for play, athletic, bands, orchestras, etc., under shelter, and Mr. Weaver, whose window of his cottage was smashed recently, believes too with a community center would make for betterment of the community.

Had any of these steps been taken, especially by the town and village boards, you would have had to follow the same steps we have followed, namely, to your highest authority on schools, the Department of Public Instruction, County Superintendent, etc., for authoritative information. So the local school boards taking such action is concerned, that that is done.

The Department of Public Instruction would cheerfully for you, as it did for us, make your suggested survey with recommendations along the line of proper education first, and saving of taxes next. We hand you herewith their figures, suggestions, recommendations and plans.

It has taken about last July, 1941, to assemble, compile, and study this data. It is true this was largely done by one man. His office is not a tax office from the ground and with the experience and materials that he could and did have. The numbers of his figures were made in the summer of the data in question. Our first study of local school tax data in July, 1941, when our local district No. 4 assessed an \$11.04 a thousand. We want to that annual school costing and asked that a committee be appointed to study the possibility of lowering our taxes and to report at an adjourned meeting. The committee was appointed and the adjournment was taken over the statement of the local school board. That committee was appointed by the chairman of the School Meeting, Mr. Hartman, consisted of Mrs. Alvin Jones, Mrs. Wilfred Conlin, John Anderson, O. A. Anderson, Frank Weston, and Harry Hartman, as officials. Immediately the committee went to the best sources of information on schools, the Department of Public Instruction, and compiled the report signed by the chairman and secretary (handed to you herewith as Exhibit No. 1), which was handed to the adjourned school meeting at Holbrook on the 11th of August.

Later, November 8, 1941, Mr. Hartman, President of the Holbrook Community Club, appointed a committee of citizens to further study school and transportation problems. You gentlemen have been handed the report of that committee dated January 30, 1942, with its recommendations. Again this committee went to the Department of Public Instruction and requested a survey by that Department of our problem, school sites, and I hand you herewith the report and recommendations, Mr. William, Superintendent of Public Instruction's letter, Exhibit No. 2; Mr. Kinney, Superintendent of Schools (last letter), Exhibit No. 3; Mr. E. Thompson (now deceased) County Superintendent, Holbrook, Exhibit No. 4; Mr. Albert E. Smith, Superintendent, Holbrook, Exhibit No. 5; Mr. W. Smith, Superintendent

Building Service, Exhibit No. 6, and Mr. T. H. Bakken, Chief Clerk, Commissioners of Public Lands, Exhibit No. 7. With these reports, proof conclusive to us, of lower taxes, we recommended the joining of the two districts and building our own school and community center. You will note Exhibit No. 7 - the Commissioners of Public Lands were so satisfied with our setup that they even went so far as to APPROVE the loan on January 14, 1942.

To the argument from certain sources that we can't build now because of priorities, etc., we offer you a letter (Exhibit No. 8) from the J. H. Findorff & Son Company. We have no argument to offer you gentlemen, but we have the following facts: First, Mr. Senty, of the Department of Public Instruction's estimated cost of building and maintaining a splendid two-room second class State graded school, and second, Mr. Schmidt's original plans, specifications, etc., for that building, a beautiful two-room modern, with city water, schoolhouse, a splendid 10 ft. high community room with stage and seating capacity of 205 persons, windows all above ground, on a site directly in the heart of both districts, spacious playgrounds, community gardens, and all but a few feet from Monona's best bathing Beach, Esther Beach, the 10 lots averaging 65 x 200 ft (4 for community gardens) are in the site with city water available and proper sanitary drainage disposal, and all this for \$1500 a year (half the amount of our tax money pays for it); that is, for instance, if our local school tax rate is \$5.00 per \$1,000, \$2.50 of it will go into our own building. Neither of these districts could afford such a splendid setup and certainly not at District No. 4's present rate (\$5.50) or No. 11's (\$6.80) per thousand, but together, with a tax spread of a valuation of \$620,760, easily could at \$5.00 per thousand.

When these districts were organized, some of you gentlemen were in at the making - there was only the problem of transportation to Madison schools. Madison's tuition charge per pupil then was about \$60.00 per school year and now it is \$100 (\$99.90). The July 1941 reports of the two districts are as follows:

No. 4 - Net	\$2,660.08	for 17 pupils

Our net - school, education, etc., under Mr. Senty's estimate, is \$2,920.00, making \$1,257.11 surplus. This net amount of \$4,177.11 would have paid all expenses of teaching the 33 grade pupils in YOUR OWN SCHOOL, paid \$1,500.00 for that school and left you \$1,257.11 for transportation of high school and parochial children.

X with \$1500.00 going to our own school. This difference could be used either for increased salaries to teachers or to transport high school pupils to Madison.

You gentlemen should know something of the opposition, where it comes from and why. However, we will touch on that just lightly. First, there is the opposition by the local school boards; second, the opposition of the natural isolationists; third, the "it can't happen here"; fourth, "Now is no time to do it"; fifth, the opposition by non-taxpayers; sixth, just natural opposition like Messrs. Mickle and Peterson (see their answer herewith); seventh, last and perhaps most: "Who the devil started this? If it was Weston, I'm agin it."

To the first the answer is: Naturally there would be a shakeup in the boards as both could not be elected to the new district. This under the circumstances would be beneficial to the taxpayers. (July 14, 1941, District 4 reports 17 grade, 7 high school, total 24. No. 11 reports 16 grade pupils and 7 parochial, or a total of 23. This is a total of 33 grades and 14 high school, or a grand total of 47.

This is at the rate of \$45.83 per school week (37 weeks) for No. 4 and per week for No. 11, \$22.92. The difference is \$22.91 per week, with only one more pupil in No. 4 than in No. 11, a difference for the year of \$396.74, in favor of Mr. Ashman's district, plus the difference in insurance, \$30.18 paid by No. 11, and \$60.36 paid by No. 4. The Annual Report, July, 1941, of District Clerk Dodge, No. 4, and the Treasurer Schmidt, don't jibe. For instance, Mrs. Dodge reports receipts of \$5,058.17, and Mr. Schmidt, Treasurer, reports receipts of \$3,883.17 - he did not count the \$2,000 received 7/16 which was receipts for the year - Mr. Schmidt reported \$3,278.89 disbursements for the year. So did Mrs. Dodge, but neither report as disbursements FOR THE YEAR the current tuition bill of \$1,668.16, making a total of disbursements for the year of \$4,122.05; instead they carried unpaid bills, tuition 1939-40, \$1,668.16 and "Frozen assets, Blooming Grove, \$2,000.00."

Mrs. Dodge reported tuition \$634.15 for 1939-40, which was an old debt and left out the current cost for tuition of \$1,668.16.

School District No. 4 (present board) got off to a flying start by first the clerk fighting the bus driver for the front seats for her two girls; second, Mr. Neckerman, Director, cancelling the then bus insurance, overwriting it in the Neckerman Agency through the Anderson Agency in the Neckerman office; third, Mr. Schmidt told the annual meeting in July, 1941, his Board wouldn't adjourn with the annual meeting. Instead he called his OWN adjournment to a little home where few could be accommodated, and only a ruling of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Mr. Callahan, stopped him from busting the annual meeting all to pieces. Mr. Schmidt and his Board wanted to continue the annual meeting with its usual attendance of about a dozen and to Hades with the other 150 of us. Mr. Schmidt seems to be the bus engineer, for he is now loading on top of our own 47 children, 14 (in all 61) more from District No. 9. The PARENTS of these 14 pupils personally PAY about \$4.00 a month EACH or \$56.00 a month ALL. If this \$56.00 a month was saved from our \$275.00 a month, it might be an object, even though the kiddies were packed in like sardines, but if it is pro-rated, it's a sort of picyune proposition. If Mr. Schmidt has to "farm out" our busses to fill them why not cut one out altogether? (This has been suggested to the districts before by Mr. Beal, the bus owner). And if the parents of the high school pupils in our own district paid their own way as do the parents in No. 9 - they have 14, we have 14 - this would save the district \$112.00 a month. High school taxes are peculiar: for instance, at the rate we pay, \$5.41 per thousand, the average parent - property-owner - would pay about \$16.23 a year. The high school fee is \$3.00 per week or \$110.00 per year. Therefore, the parent pays \$16.23 and the rest of us pay the balance, \$93.77. And THE PARENT WHO DOES NOT OWN PROPERTY PAYS NOTHING, no matter how many high school children he has.

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Our transportation system as is is/expensive joke to most taxpayers. We could and should transport the grades only to Franklin School and there let the high school and parochial pupils go where they please, instead of our "peddling" to several parochial schools, various high schools, and finally away out to Edgewood to accommodate two parents. This direct-to-Madison system could be done with one bus for about \$100 a month. The districts paid last year \$2,543.76 for transportation. The isolationists have everything they want. They don't need community gardens for they raise all they eat and drink on their own great big 400 foot lots. They don't play cards, so what the heck if they do barge into your card party and bust it all to Hades? They have good wells, so block a move that would have given you all five or ten years to pay for the splendid water at your doors, instead of plunking a couple of hundred dollars down at once, as is.

They know no authority but their own, so use school money to hire an attorney whose only tax on the town rolls is for a dog, to combat the highest authority in the State, to compel one man, just because they don't like him, to pay for insurance they have paid for, ever since, out of school funds.

TURVILLE ESTATE

should never have been placed in District No. 4, but Harry Turville, in order to keep from paying for the then proposed Badger \$40,000 schoolhouse, urged us and you gentlemen of the Town of Madison Board to place him in the new No. 4 district, which you did. Then he was all out for us, now he is up and down our streets with a petition against a school for US. Mr. Turville's first headache came when the new district soaked him \$11.04 per thousand of valuation against the \$7.69 in his old district. Now with the current No. 4 school tax of \$5.50 plus 10 acres off his property for a wood-lot, he doesn't want a school nor does he want us to have one. All the children on the Turville Estate go to parochial schools so why should they worry?

The books of the County Treasurer, February 19, 1942, and the Town Clerk of Madison, February 20, 1942, show the town of Madison have assessed town of Madison property for and paid to District No. 4 since its creation in 1937, \$2,923.22. This is property of the C.M. & St. P., Pennsylvania Oil Company WHICH INCLUDES THE TRAILER CAMP, etc.; besides the Turville Estate. District No. 4 has taken that money all these years but have forced the trailer children to go to Badger School which should have a tidy bill for tuition. Just why or how the Powers That Be in District No. 4 could do this is uncertain.

As I said before, this property, Turville's Estate, should never have been placed in No. 4, where it has nothing in common with the thickly settled property east of the Harloff property in the district. Badger District has had a tremendous problem in its school and this District 4 property would have been a great aid to them, but Harry Turville then wanted it so and we all gave it to him. However, it is only a matter of time when the City of Madison will add the Turville property to Olin Park, perhaps reach out and include the Harloff property, and another gob will go off our local tax roll.

In conclusion, in my study of these two districts it seems to me they could be rounded out healthfully by taking that portion (Hollywood in the Village of Monona) from Joint 11 and giving it back to the Nichols District and in the town of Madison taking everything West from the Harloff property including Turville's, all now taxed in favor of No. 4 (approximately \$50,000 of value) and give it back where it belongs and from it whom it should never have been taken, to the Badger district. True, this would cut the new district down to around something over one-half million dollars, say \$550,000, but it would still be healthy and raise a tidy amount at the Ashman average (2 yrs.) rate of \$7.50, or better, with the Schmidt average of \$8.25 which so many seem satisfied to pay, but which could healthfully be reduced to \$6.00 or \$6.50 with proper management by the people and the school board. The joint district would be about a mile and a half long and a mile wide with the school immediately in the center. (A chat with one of the dads in district #9 whose children ride in our bus informs me the Oregon School to which about 30 of these grade pupils go, is filled and they may have to find another school. They don't like the \$100 a year per pupil to Madison, and he believes would be glad to come to our school. Their 30 and our 30 would make for a very healthy condition in our school, lessening our own and their own expense considerably - we could accommodate easily 70 pupils.

Up to 90 grade pupils could be educated properly in this school, whereas 90 pupils to Madison would cost \$9,000 in tuition alone. Every increase of 10 pupils, and no one will say we won't have 10 more, will cost another \$1,000 over the present total of \$3,843.36.

Last but not least in this picture, what with the Merrimac powder plant and net increase in Madison pupils, where will we go if and when Madison cannot take us any more?

Every one of you gentlemen have seen the school populations in your communities grow by leaps and bounds and have aided in building local schools to take care not only now but in the future, of that growth. Is it reasonable to believe that this community, with its city water, splendid fire protection, and beautiful available homesites, will stand still, now, or for the next ten or twenty years? Both these districts have been plagued with trailer children. At \$100 per pupil plus transportation, they are expensive, but those children are entitled to a school, that cannot be denied to them. 1. This is a cold matter of dollars and cents (sense). Calm and careful consideration of a studied proposal to save dollars from our tax money.
2. The original report of a fact-finding committee was presented to every one of you for study.
3. The Chairman of that Committee aided in building our first School Dist. No. 11, and assisted in making its board of three school teachers, one of which was and still is Mr. Ashman, who lived across the road from him.
4. The paramount problem, then, as now, was schooling for our children. Some had to be transported a long way to school, either to Nichols, which school was condemned, in whose district we first were, or to Madison, which was on our way to work. (Parent transportation). Mrs. Ashman, who is a very good school teacher, taught her own children up through third, fourth, fifth, and I believe the sixth grades.
5. The first parent transportation cost us nothing. The State paid for it.
6. Then the district hired a taxi free to grade pupils but 25 cents a day to high school pupil.
7. Then District #4 was formed from the Badger District. Badger School was over two miles from the neighborhood and across a dangerous highway, so after a battle by the people of that community District No. 4 was created.
8. Neither of these districts could have supported, on the then low taxes they raised (see report) a school or transportation, so they joined in transportation and paid the then low taxation cost to the city of Madison.
9. Enough of this ancient history though it is necessary to study the past in order to get a picture of the future.
10. Now let us take up Mr. Mickle's report in opposition to our report, in which he says "The following are facts and not hot air," which you will note makes no mention of a Community Center.
11. Mr. Mickle says, "Our total tax in school district this year 1941, is 23.7 mills. Our tax in elementary schools is 5.5 mills (\$5.50). He means District No. 4, but does not mention the average local school tax in that district which is, for the past three years, \$7.43 per 1,000 (No. (13), our report).
12. Allis School, with a total of \$13.62, is the school Mr. Schenk of the Madison School Board, warned me years ago of the load that closely populated area would have, and advised connection with Madison schools and thousands of dollars could have been saved to those taxpayers had they taken his advice -- note Mr. Mickle says, Madison tax is between five and six mills."
13. Mr. Leroy Peterson, for Mr. Mickle:
 - (1) "Whether any community should operate its own school and transport its pupils to Madison is a matter for the community to decide." Then why cannot the community decide on a place for itself as well as for a school? We have considered a home of our own to center adult activities, 205 of us, as well as Boy and Girl Scout Troops, 4-H Clubs, Junior Club Theatricals, and other activities, even a good place for community "dog-fights" without coming way over to the Town Hall.
14. Peterson:
 - (2) "Remember you are dealing with your local tax school tax only (5.5 mills). Of course, we know about the high school tax. (The tax in this district No. 4 was 39-40, .00576 (\$5.76); 40-41, .01104 (\$11.04), 41-42, .0055 (\$5.50) or an average for the past three years of \$7.43 per 1000 of valuation. District No. 11 is now .0068 (\$6.80) per 1000.

10. Now let us take up Mr. Nickle's report in opposition to our report, in which he says "The following are facts and not air," which you will note makes no mention of a Community Center.
11. Mr. Nickle says, "Our total tax in school district this year 1941, is 33.7 mills. Our tax in elementary schools is 5.5 mills (\$8.30). He means District No. 4, but does not mention the average local school tax in that district which is, for the past three years, \$7.45 per 1,000 (No. 13), our report).
12. Alia School, with a total of \$13.65, is the school Mr. Schenk of the Madison School Board, warned the years ago of the load that closely paid taxes would have, and advised connected with Madison no more and thousands of dollars could have been saved to those taxpayers had they taken his advice - note Mr. Nickle says, Madison tax is between five and six mills."
13. Mr. Leroy Peterson, for Mr. Nickle:
(1) "Whether any community should operate its own school and transport the pupils to Madison is a matter for the community to decide." Then why cannot the community decide on a place for itself as well as for a school? We have considered a home of our own to center adult activities, 300 of us, as well as Boy and Girl Scout Troops, 4-F Clubs, Junior Club Theatricals, and other activities, even a good place for community "dog-fights" without coming way over to the Town Hall.
14. Peterson:
(2) "Whether you are dealing with your local tax school tax only (\$5.5 mills). Of course, we know about the high school tax. (The tax in this district No. 4 was 30-40, .06378 (\$5.76); 40-41, .01104 (\$11.04). 41-42, .0635 (\$6.35) or an average for the past three years of \$7.45 per 1000 of valuation. District No. 11 is now .0688 (\$6.88) per 1000.

15. Summed up, District 11 pays \$6.80, District 4 averages \$7.43, and we offer \$4.44 with half of it going into our own school, and COMMUNITY CENTER.

He says, "Madison can charge you only what they spend for education of the children, less the State and County Aid and the amount paid on their new building. (Madison should be "tickled pink" to know that for it is in addition to "operation & maintenance" in Wisconsin 1941 Stats. 40.21).

As we have said, Madison schools are the finest in the State and every cent they cost the people is a good investment, and if we don't now we soon will, with say 50 children plus expensive transportation, pay more in our districts than the people of Madison do - then we'll come begging Madison to take us in. Why not? If we ever reach 90 that 90 would cost us \$9,000 plus transportation - a small item of about \$500 a month - to Madison, with nothing but receipts to show for it. But why be so optimistic as Mr. Peterson about the 90 when it has taken us 20 years to get only 30?
21. Mr. Peterson and Mr. Mickle's concluding No. (9) "On the basis of figures presented in the proposed budget the actual saving from 5.5 mills - (he leaves out No. 4's \$7.43 average and No. 11's \$6.80) local tax will be 80 CENTS on each \$1,000 of value of property: Valuation of \$620,760 - \$2,920 = 4.7 mills. 5.5 mills - 4.7 mills or 80 CENTS per \$1,000 of value of property. You have read all their letters of endorsement in our bulletin - they had no axes to grind and neither did they have monkey-wrenches.

4. These 12 men of our Committee took all the above data, assembled it, read it, met in committee with Mr. Schmidt, of Mr. Callahan's Department of Education, discussed it and in their own best judgment signed a petition in its favor. Our blueprints of proposed school and community building have been reviewed by Mr. Marcus Johnson, Superintendent of School Buildings, of Madison, and have his endorsement. Mr. Brown, Secretary of the Madison Board of Education, helped us figure as follows:

Mr. Ashman assessed his district \$6.80 a thousand, to get \$1,750. Mr. Schmidt assessed his district \$5.50 to get \$2,093.36, though his clerk asked for \$3,000 which would have been just about right.

Under the existing plan of the two gentlemen, Ashman and Schmidt, it is just teaching and transportation and bound to increase every time a new pupil is added, even 10 more is another thousand dollars.

5. Under our Committee's plan, suppose we put it at \$6.00 a thousand, a happy medium, we would raise \$4,245.60, put \$1,500 a year into our own schoolhouse and Community Center and have \$1,325.60 to transport pupils other than grade, and even raise the salaries of the teachers. You could, too, even build a brick building for another mill.

6. Concluding: As we said before, it took us six months to assemble and digest data to place before you and which we did place before you in the Waunona Club bulletin. We intended you should have plenty of time to read and re-read it, then come to your conclusion. We know how hard it is to get it, assemble it, and understand it, so you were not prepared yet when the opposition jumped the gun on you, tried to make you vote, and busted up your card party. If you are governed in your conclusions by those who are circumstanced with good incomes, doubled in some cases, who could afford to pay more, don't give a tinker's hoot for us other fellows, don't care for a community center for us, the young folks, won't even join the Community Club (and even complained they were not ASKED in), and governed by hate or with a dyspeptic disposition, always contrary to anything someone else prompts, get on ~~your~~ ^{their} band-wagon and oppose, but not with a club.

7. All the people of No. 4 know what their then Esther Beach Community Club did for them from "Wilcox to the Governor" (we almost said "from-Hell-to-breakfast"). About 50% of the new Waunona Community Club are still Community Club members (District #4). The other 50% are from District #11 - 60 members in all - the Club then, as now, were struggling over the school problems.

8. Now we have added the bus problem, adult transportation, and our special committee made up from the Committee on Schools and Transportation, Don Huseby, Chairman, and H. Levenick, Vice-Chairman; Al Brandt, Treasurer; Frank Ross, Bus Inspector; Frank Weston, Secretary, and Harry Harriman, President, (ex officio) Attorney. All of the Club, with Col. A. E. Garey, Col. Ray S. Owen, and Robert C. Pulley, of Frost's Woods, are securing, assembling, and studying data for a report to you, we hope soon. If you work with these gentlemen, not against them, we can have every good thing we need for the community. If you don't, if you operate as a mob instead of an organized community, in spite of the usual petition, you won't.

10. We understand Mr. Ambrecht is going to run for Town Supervisor, but your Community Club's Resolution will have more effect on any Town Board man could any one Town Board member, even Mr. Ambrecht. We, the members of this Committee, have given our time and have worked together with pleasure in association with the other gentlemen whose letters you have read, and whom we have met to the best of our ability for your service and happiness. Our only regret is that the Pearl Harbor episode of January 26 has lost us, at least, two very valuable committee members from the Club.

RESOLUTION No. 216, 1941-1942

WHEREAS, That amendment to the Dane County Zoning Ordinance relating to tourist camps adopted by this Board on February 11, 1942, is not sufficiently clear as to whether or not tourist camps are permitted in Industrial Districts; and

WHEREAS, It was the intention of this Board to permit tourist camps in Industrial Districts, it is there^{fore} deemed advisable to enact the following resolution:

Be It Resolved, That the Dane County Zoning Ordinance be amended as follows:

1. That Section VIII (6) be stricken from the Ordinance;

2. That Section VIII (3) be amended by striking therefrom the period following the word "multiple" and a comma be substituted therefor, and the phrase "other than cabins, trailers, tents, or house cars" be added immediately thereafter;

3. That there be added to Section VIII a new paragraph following the last paragraph thereof, said new paragraph to read as follows:

Tourist Camps: Tourist camps shall be permitted in industrial districts when such camp provides not less than 1,000 square feet of lot area for each cabin, trailer, tent, or house car, and provided further that such camp is clearly bounded by a fence or a hedge on all sides. Whenever used in this ordinance unless a different meaning appears from the context: (a) A trailer or house car shall be understood to mean any vehicle or structure intended or capable of human habitation or designed primarily for sleeping purposes, mounted upon wheels or jacks and capable of being moved from place to place, either by its own power or power supplied by some vehicle used or to be used, excepting a device used exclusively upon station rails or tracks: (b) A tourist camp or trailer camp shall mean any park, court, camp, site, lot, parcel, or tract of land designed, maintained, intended, or used for the purpose of supplying a location or accommodation for more than one tourist cabin, trailer, tent or house car and shall include all buildings used or intended for use as part of the equipment thereof, regardless of whether or not a charge is made for the use of the trailer camp or tourist camp and its facilities. Tourist camp or trailer shall not include automobile or trailer sales lots on which unoccupied trailers are parked for purposes of inspection and sale.

Any action toward the removal of wheels except for temporary purposes of repair from a trailer or house car or any other action to attach the trailer to the ground by means of posts, piers, or foundation, shall subject the trailer or house car to the requirements of the zoning ordinance in general regarding setback lines, side yards, amount of space necessary, and all other requirements of the ordinance.

No person, persons, or other party other than the owner of the tourist camp or trailer camp shall occupy such tourist camp or trailer camp either in a tourist cabin, trailer, tent, or house car for more than 90 days in any one year.

NOTE TO TOWN OFFICIALS: The intent of this resolution is identical with Resolution No. 147 adopted by the County Board on February 11, the changes being in phraseology to clarify interpretation.

Town Boards should take action on this amendment before the next County Board meeting and forward such action to the County Clerk to be included in the County Board records. A resolution form for reporting your town action is enclosed herewith for your convenience. The next County Board meeting is on April 1st.

NOTICE FOR CHANGING ZONING ORDINANCE

TAKE NOTICE: That the Dane County Zoning Committee, the committee in charge of administering the Dane County zoning ordinance, will hold a public meeting in the Dane County Court House, Madison, Wisconsin, on Saturday, March 23, 1942, at 2:30 o'clock P.M. to consider certain proposed changes in the Dane County zoning ordinance, and a hearing will there be granted to any person interested in any of the proposed changes. The proposed changes are as follows:

1. Proposal to change the Dane County zoning ordinance by striking section VI (6) and section VII (12) from the ordinance and by adding a new subsection to section VII, which subsection shall be number six (6), and which relates to tourist camps, trailer camps, etc. as presented in Resolution No. 216, 1941-1942, the original of which is on file in the County Clerk's office in the Court House, Madison, Wisconsin. Similar in intent to Resolution No. 147 recently passed by the County Board but which had a technical defect;

2. Proposal to change the zoning of the following described land in town of Blooming Grove from Agricultural to Commercial District:

A part of the north one-half of Section 29, Town 7 North, Range 10 East, Town of Blooming Grove, Dane County, more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the west bank of the Yahara River and the south line of U.S. Highways No. 12-18, thence westerly along said highway right-of-way a distance of 1500 ft.; thence south on a line at right angles to said right-of-way a distance of 800 ft.; thence east on a line parallel to highway right-of-way to intersection with west bank of Yahara River; thence northwesterly along said river bank to point of beginning; Res. No. 232; 29

3. Proposal to change the zoning of the following described land in the town of Burke, Dane County from B Residential to A Service District:

All of Outlots No. 2 and 3 of Assessor's Plat No. 1, Town of Burke, Dane County, and a part of Outlot No. 1, more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the north line of Roth Avenue and the east line of O'Neill Avenue in the C.E. Roth Plat; thence north on said east line and northerly extension of said east line a distance of 1000 ft. more or less to the south line of Aberg Avenue; thence east on the south line of Aberg Avenue a distance of 690 ft. more or less to the west line of the C.M.St.P. & P. 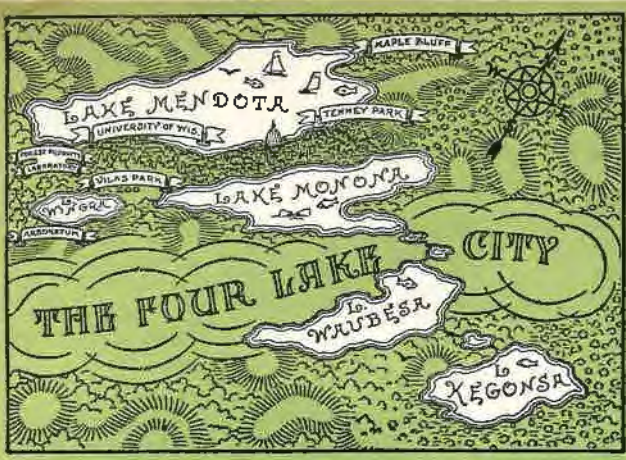



WHEREAS, Section 40.39 (2) provides for a state aid of \$200 for each year of high school work and distributes the balance of state aid on the basis of the average daily attendance during the preceding school year; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That non-resident tuition shall not include building and equipment cost; and be it further

RESOLVED, That all state aid shall be distributed in equal allotments to all high schools throughout the state.

WHEREAS, It is provided by section 40.34 of the statutes that common school districts shall be entitled to state aid for transportation of school children at the rate of ten cents per day for each child transported; and

WHEREAS, Education is a matter of state-wide concern; and

WHEREAS, The percent law creates hardships in many parts of the state; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That this conference go on record in favor of the state's assuming the entire cost of transportation of pupils in common school districts, and high school transportation.

BE IT RESOLVED, That this conference unanimously go on record earnestly requesting all townships not now identified with this movement, to give us their full and active support when our representatives call on them in the near future.

It was unanimously approved by the assembly to put Mr. Arnold Froedrich in charge of the minutes and resolutions of the meeting and submit them to the chairman of conference.

Resolution unanimously passed that minutes and resolutions of the meeting be read to the town people at all town meetings, April 7, 1942.

RESOLVED by this our conference, That this law is inequitable and that the conference favors the enactment of legislation whereby the proceeds of the income tax shall be distributed as follows: 50% to the cities, towns, and villages on the basis of population, 40% to the state, and 10% to the counties, on the basis of population.

WHEREAS, Section 20.49 (8) of the Wisconsin Statutes contains the provision that state aid for each mile of town roads shall be \$65; and

WHEREAS, This amount is far from sufficient to enable towns to meet the demands imposed on their roads; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the conference favors the increase of this state aid to \$95 per mile for town roads.

We further favor townships having a population equal to that of city units being paid on the same basis as the law governing cities.

may petition for another special town meeting, within fifteen days. Any action taken by the special town meeting shall be held in abeyance after a petition is filed.

After the expiration of fifteen days and no petition being filed the town board shall employ by competitive bids architects to draw plans in accordance with action previously taken at the special town meeting.

After architect's plans are prepared and estimates given the town board shall call a special town meeting to vote on accepting, plans, voting when to build, and how to finance.

The resolution not being signed, Mr. Mullen asked who had presented it. The clerk informed that the resolution together with two more had been handed to her by Mr. H. O. Femrite.

Mr. Femrite explained that the resolutions object was to purchase the land and to stop any hasty action that might be taken by the boards or persons in power.

Mr. Eric Onstad stated that the Firemen's Organization had a land contract as of Jan. 1st and that the next payment was due on July 1st. He also stated that it was evident that we (meaning the V.F.A) can't take a resolution now to bind the Firemen's Association to any such deal.

Mr. Holmes asked if the resolution contemplates the condemnation of the property if the firemen refuse to sell.

Mr. Mullen said he did not know.

Mr. Onstad sited the need of the town for a community center, and that the firemen also had the same purpose in view. He stated that it would be a matter of negotiation between the Firemen's Assn. and the Town Board. He said he was not opposing the resolution but wanted the people to know what was going on.

Mr. Anton Field asked if they would build a place for the fire truck there, and he was told that there had been no definit plans made. Mr. Mullen informed the meeting that there was a clause in the resolution to stop any action without a town meeting.

Mr. Onstad said that he wanted it understood that the firemen had not called on the town but that the town was making the proposal.

Mr. Femrite said he had talked with the firemen and know that they have more land than they need and that as it is an ideal site for a community center and for the future growth of the town, making necessary the need for a larger and better town hall and other buildings. He said he didn't believe that the town should take any hasty action and that the town board and the firemen should co-operate.

A motion was made by Mr. Femrite that Resolution Number 1 be adopted. Motion seconded by Mr. Onstad.

Mr. Friday asked if the resolution provided for the town to pay the balance due on the property?

Mr. Femrite said that was the plan.

Mr. I. B. Johnson asked if the firemen would be satisfied with the $E\frac{1}{2}$.

Mr. Scott Sheldon stated that he believed that the resolution should come before the Firemen's Assn. and see if they wanted to sell before the people argued all evening to see if the town would buy.

Mr. Onstad told Mr. Sheldon that there are always two sides to a negotiation and that sometimes the buyer makes the proposal and sometimes it is the seller who makes it.

A vote was then taken on the motion and the motion was carried.

Mr. Armbrecht said he disagreed with the figure of \$60. The general price of a CPA, he stated, was \$50 per day and that an audit could not possibly be made in one day.

Mr. Van Every said that the county paid \$35 a day for a senior accountant.

Mr. Mickle asked if the resolution meant that the audit be from this date on or if the books would be audited back a few years.

Mr. Mullen asked Mr. Femrite to explain the resolution.

Mr. Friday said he would like to make an amendment to the resolution. His motion to amend the resolution to audit the books for the past four years and to audit every two years from now on.

Motion seconded by Mr. Henry Uselman.

Mr. Conlin asked if there was any reason for this audit and if the books were bawled up anywhere.

Mr. Friday asked if anyone could point out a good going business which did not audit its books regularly.

Mr. Mickle stated that any town or business doing 200,000 dollars per year business should certainly audit its books regularly.

Mr. Johnson said that he did not object to an audit but that the town did have a board of audit consisting of the town board every year and that it was a waste of money.

A vote was taken on the motion to amend the resolution and the motion was carried.

If such highway, street or alley abuts on platted property, the Board shall assess benefits and damages against such platted property in the manner provided in Sections 61.40 to 61.42, and there is imposed upon the towns all of the powers vested in villages under said Sections, and all of the duties by said sections imposed upon Village Boards or Villages, the several committees, village clerk, village treasurer and Street Commissioner, shall be performed in such towns by the Town Boards, the Town Clerks, Town Treasurers and the Superintendent or Superintendents of highways thereof; and where notice is required to be published thereby, and there shall be no newspaper published in said town, such notices shall be given by posting five copies thereof in five public places in said Town."

Under Section 60.18, (12), Statutes of Wisconsin for 1941, said subsection entitled: "Town Board to Exercise Powers of Village Board; When."

"To direct by resolution the Town Board in towns having a population of not less than 500 and having therein one or more unincorporated villages, to exercise all powers relating to villages and conferred on Village Boards by Chapter 61 of the Statutes, except such power, the exercise of which would conflict with the Statutes relating to towns and Town Boards. Any such resolution heretofore adopted pursuant to existing law or hereafter adopted pursuant to this law, shall remain in force until rescinded."

The foregoing Section expressly provides the Town Board to exercise powers of a Village Board when such exercise does not conflict with statutes relating to towns and Town Boards. WHEREAS, circumstances have arisen that make it advisable to change the zoning ordinance with reference to the operation of tourist camps; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Dane County Zoning Ordinance be amended as follows:

1. That Section VIII (3) be amended by striking therefrom the phrase "other than cabins, trailers, tents, or house cars."

2. That Section VIII (6) entitled "Tourist Camps" be stricken from the ordinance.

3. That there be added to Section V a new paragraph numbered 11 to read as follows:

11. Trailers and tourist camps, provided that said trailers and tourist camps comply with the following regulations:

A. Definitions.

1. Whenever used in this ordinance unless a different meaning appears from the context a "trailer" means any vehicle or structure intended for or capable of human habitation, or designed primarily for sleeping purposes, mounted upon wheels or jacks, and/or capable of being moved from place to place, either by its own power, or by power supplied by some vehicle used or to be used, excepting a device used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks.

2. A "trailer camp" means any park, court, camp, site, lot, parcel, or tract of land designed, maintained, intended or used for the purpose of supplying a location or accommodations for more than two trailers and shall include all buildings used or intended for use as part of the equipment thereof, whether or not a charge is made for the use of the trailer camp or its facilities. "Trailer camp" shall not include automobile or trailer sales lots on which unoccupied trailers are parked for purposes of inspection and sale.

3. A "unit" means a section of ground in a trailer camp of not less than 1000 square feet of unoccupied space designated as the location for only one automobile and/or trailer.

4. The word "person" shall be construed to include an individual, partnership, firm, company, corporation, whether tenant, owner, lessee, licensee, or their agent, heir, or assign.

B. Location

1. No trailer shall be parked outside of any approved trailer camp previously defined unless permit for such parking has been obtained from the local health officer or other authority provided for by local ordinance. Not more than two trailers may be parked on any premises outside of an approved trailer camp. The parking of any unoccupied trailer in an accessory private garage building, or in a rear yard in any district, is permitted providing no living quarters shall be maintained or any business conducted in such trailer while so parked or stored.

C. Registration.

3. The camp shall be so laid out that no unit shall be located farther than 200 feet from a toilet and service building as required herein, and walkways to such buildings shall be gravelled or paved and well lighted at night.

4. No occupied trailer shall be located less than 10 feet from any building or other trailer, unless of same occupancy, or from the boundary line of the premises on which it is located.

E. Water Supply.

1. An adequate supply of pure water with supply outlets located not more than 200 feet from any trailer shall be furnished for drinking and domestic purposes in all camps. When a public water supply is not available, the well or wells supplying the camp shall comply with the Wisconsin Well Construction Code, excepting that well pits or pump pits are not permitted. Supply outlets may be located in the service building, if separate from toilet, shower and laundry rooms.

2. No common drinking vessels shall be permitted, nor shall any drinking water faucets be placed in any toilet room.

3. Every trailer camp shall provide hot water at all reasonable hours adequate for bathing, washing, and laundry facilities.

F. Service Building.

1. Every trailer camp shall have erected thereon suitable building or buildings for housing toilets, lavatories, showers, slop sinks and laundry facilities pursuant to this regulation, such buildings to be known as "Service Buildings."

2. There shall be provided separate toilet rooms for each sex. Water flush toilets shall be required in any community having a public sewer system. Privies or other acceptable type toilet units are permitted when not in conflict with local ordinances. Such privy or other type toilet unit shall be fly-tight and vermin-proof, and constructed with impervious floors and risers. No privy shall be located within 75 feet of a trailer or other building used for human occupancy. Each toilet shall be enclosed in a separate compartment. Male toilet rooms shall also be provided with individual urinals.

3. Lavatories supplied with hot and cold running water shall be provided for each sex, such lavatories to be located in the toilet rooms where water flush toilets are provided or in a separate wash room in the service building when such toilets are not provided.

4. Separate shower bathing facilities with hot and cold running water shall be provided for each sex. Each shower unit shall be enclosed in a separate compartment at least $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet square. Each shower compartment for women should preferably be supplemented by an individual dressing compartment at least 10 square feet in area.

5. Each service building shall be provided with a room containing slop sinks for disposal of liquid wastes originating at the trailer units.

6. Laundry facilities consisting of a double tray laundry units, equipped with hot and cold running water, shall be provided in each service building.

7. Floors of toilets, showers, and the laundry shall be of concrete, tile, or similar material impervious to water and easily cleaned, and pitched to a floor drain.

8. The number of toilets, urinals, lavatories, showers, slop sinks and laundry trays required for trailer camps of the size indicated is as follows:

that trailers from any highway, except those on other sources of light and sound, shall be located as follows:

3. Trailer units shall be closely spaced, and the camp shall be so arranged that all units shall be on a driveway of not less than sixteen feet in width giving easy access from all units to a public street. Such driveways shall be paved or gravelled and maintained in good condition, having natural drainage. No well lighted or lighted and such driveway shall not be obstructed at any time.

4. The camp shall be so laid out that no unit shall be located further than 200 feet from a toilet and service building as required herein, and whenever to such buildings shall be paved or gravelled and well lighted at night.

5. No occupied trailer shall be located less than 10 feet from any building or other structure, unless of same occupancy, or from the boundary line of the premises on which it is located.

D. Water Supply.

1. An adequate supply of pure water with supply outlets located not more than 200 feet from any trailer shall be furnished for drinking and domestic purposes in all camps. When a public water supply is not available, the well or wells supplying the camp shall comply with the Wisconsin Well Construction Code, excepting that well pits or pump pits are not permitted. Supply outlets may be located in the service building if separate from toilet, shower and laundry rooms.

2. No common drinking vessels shall be permitted, nor shall any drinking water faucets be placed in any toilet room.

3. Every trailer camp shall provide hot water at all reasonable hours adequate for bathing, washing, and laundry facilities.

E. Service Building.

1. Every trailer camp shall have erected thereon suitable building or buildings for bathing, toilets, showers, also sinks and laundry facilities. Such building shall be known as "Service Buildings."

2. There shall be provided separate toilet rooms for each sex. Water flush toilets shall be required in any community having a public sewer system. Privies or other appropriate type toilet units are permitted when not in conflict with local ordinances. Such privy or other type toilet unit shall be fly-tight and vermin-proof, and constructed with impervious floors and risers. No privy shall be located within 25 feet of a trailer or other building used for human occupancy. Each toilet shall be enclosed in a separate compartment. This toilet room shall also be provided with individual ventilation.

3. Lavatories supplied with hot and cold running water shall be provided for each sex, such lavatories to be located in the toilet room where water flush toilets are provided or in a separate wash room in the service building when such toilets are not provided.

4. Separate shower bathing facilities with hot and cold running water shall be provided for each sex. Each shower unit shall be enclosed in a separate compartment at least 35 feet square. Each shower compartment for women should preferably be supplemented by an individual dressing compartment at least 10 square feet in area.

5. Each service building shall be provided with a room containing soap sinks for disposal of liquid wastes originating at the trailer units.

6. Laundry facilities consisting of double tray laundry units, equipped with hot and cold running water, shall be provided in each service building.

7. Floors of toilets, showers, and the laundry shall be of concrete, tile, or similar material impervious to water and easily cleaned, and fitted to a floor drain.

8. The number of toilets, showers, lavatories, sinks and laundry trays required for trailer camps of the size indicated is as follows:

G. Waste Disposal.

1. All liquid waste from showers, water flush toilets, laundries, faucets and lavatories shall be discharged into a sewer system connected with the public sewer system, if available, or into a septic tank system approved by the State Board of Health.

2. All sanitary facilities in any trailer which are not connected with a public or camp sewer system by means of rigid pipe connections shall be sealed and their use prohibited.

3. Substantial fly-tight metal garbage depositories, from which the contents shall be removed and disposed of in a sanitary manner by the camp custodian at least twice weekly between May 1 and October 15, and otherwise weekly, shall be provided for each two trailer units.

4. Each trailer unit shall be provided with a water-tight metal container for collection of liquid wastes originating in the trailer, unless such trailer is connected to the sewer system. Such containers shall be emptied daily into the service building slop sink.

H. Removal of Wheels.

1. Any action toward the removal of wheels except for temporary purposes of repair from a trailer or house car or any other action to attach the trailer to the ground by means of posts, piers, or foundation, shall subject the trailer or house car to the requirements of the zoning ordinance in general regarding setback lines, side yards, amount of space necessary, and all other requirements of the ordinance.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance of the Town of Blooming Grove, Dane County, Wisconsin, entitled:

REGISTRATION AND REGULATION OF BICYCLES:

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as follows:

1. It shall be hereafter unlawful for any person to operate a bicycle upon any street within the Town of Blooming Grove unless said bicycle shall first have been properly registered and tagged as hereinafter provided.
2. Every owner or operator of any bicycle within the Town of Blooming Grove, shall, within ten days of the effective date hereof, file with the Constable a complete description of such bicycle upon a blank form to be provided for the purpose which such filing of description shall constitute a registration of such bicycle for the purpose of this ordinance. Such registration shall be serially numbered and kept on file by the Constable in his office as a public record.
3. Immediately upon the registration of a bicycle in his office, the Constable shall affix to such bicycle an identification tag serially numbered to correspond with the registration of such bicycle. Such tag shall thereafter remain affixed to such bicycle unless removed by the Constable for cause or for replacement with another tag upon registration. A fee of 25¢ shall be charged for the registration or tagging of any bicycle under the provisions of this ordinance.
4. Bicycles registered under the provisions hereof shall be re-registered on July 1, 1943, and annually thereafter. The Constable shall affix a new identification tag upon each bicycle at the time of such re-registration thereof.
5. The Constable shall inspect each bicycle presented to him for registration and he shall have the authority to refuse to register any such bicycle found by him to be in unsafe mechanical condition.
6. The Constable shall have the authority to cancel the registration of and remove the identification tag from any bicycle being operated upon any street in the Town of Blooming Grove in an unsafe manner or in violation of any state law or local ordinance; and such cancellation of registration and removal of tag shall be in addition to other penalties provided hereunder.
7. Within ten days after any bicycle registered hereunder shall have changed ownership, or be dismantled and taken out of operation, such information shall be reported to the Constable by the person in whose name the bicycle has been registered.
8. Any person who shall operate any bicycle not properly registered or carrying a proper identification tag as required herein upon any street in the Town of Blooming Grove or who

THE LEGAL RIGHT OF THE TOWN OF BLOOMING GROVE TO
REGULATE THE SPEED OF VEHICLES ON TOWN ROADS AND
ON THE ROADS OF THE UNINCORPORATED VILLAGE OF WAU-
NONA.

It is quite clear by Statute that any form of government less than a City or an incorporated village cannot regulate the speed of vehicles within its limits. I quote Section 85.40 Subsection (6), entitled, "In Business Districts". The maximum permissiblable speed within the corporate limits of any city or village shall be 25 miles per hour provided that in outlying districts within any city or village whereon each of both sides of the highway there is an average distance of not less than 500 feet between buildings fronting thereon, the maximum permissible speed shall be thirty-five miles per hour." And further, under Section 85.43, entitled "Powers of Local Authorities" Subsection (1) thereunder entitled "Local Authorities May Increase Speed Limits," "local authorities may by ordinance increase the speeds specified in Subsection (6) of Section 85.40.

Section 85.43, Subsection (1), the power is granted to local authorities to increase speed limits as specified in Subsection (6) of Section 85.40, which limits this regulation only to those local authorities in cities, either of the four classes, or incorporated villages. The Attorney General's office has rendered an opinion in 28 Attorney General, 702, interpreting Section 85.43, Subsection (1), to the effect that towns may not pass speed laws under authority of said Section.

Therefore, in view of the now existing Statutes and the Attorney General's opinion, it is likewise our opinion that the Town of Blooming Grove may not regulate the speed laws in the said Town or in the unincorporated Village of Waunona.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE to create Section 1.02 of the General Ordinances of the Town of Blooming Grove authorizing blackouts and air raid protection and being a part of the Chapter entitled "General Ordinances".

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as follows:

1.02 (1) The Town Chairman is authorized and directed to promulgate and enforce such rules, regulations and orders relative to the conduct and cooperation of all persons, firms and corporations in the Town of Blooming Grove, as shall be necessary to safeguard public safety and welfare and insure necessary cooperation in the public defense. This shall include, without limitation because of enumeration, blackout regulations, air raid protection, public service, emergency health, fire, safety and traffic regulations and measures required because of public disaster, and any other action required in the public interest because of an emergency, including trial drill or practice periods required for preliminary training.

(2) Every rule, regulation or order issued pursuant to this Ordinance shall be filed with the Town Clerk who shall immediately post copies in public places in the Town Hall, whereupon such rule, regulation or order shall be in full force and effect.

(3) It shall be unlawful to wilfully refuse or neglect to obey any such rule, regulation or order as proclaimed by the Town Chairman, or any call made upon any citizen for aid in enforcing the same.

(4) Every Town Officer and employee shall comply with any order issued by the Town Chairman or by any person designated by him to assist in procuring compliance with rules, regulations and orders issued pursuant to the Ordinance.

(5) The Town Chairman may call upon any person in the Town over the age of eighteen (18) years to aid in enforcing such rules, regulation and orders, and may assign special duties to individuals and organizations.

(6) When deemed necessary to protect life or property during an emergency, the Police or any person designated under Section 5, are authorized to enter upon any premises and extinguish lights or take other necessary action to make effective any rule, regulation or order promulgated pursuant to this ordinance.

(7) No person shall utter, sound, publish or otherwise simulate any official signal or warning of a foreign enemy attack from the air or otherwise, or spread any false rumor of a public emergency.

(8) The provisions of any ordinance enacted subsequent thereto shall supercede any conflicting rule, regulation or order promulgated by the Town Chairman.

(9) This ordinance shall constitute an exercise by the Town of its governmental functions for the protection of the public peace, health and safety and neither the Town nor any individual responding to the regulations lawfully proclaimed and published by the Town Chairman or called upon to assist in enforcing the same shall be liable in a suit for damages in connection therewith.

(10) Each violation of or failure to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance, or of a rule, regulation or order proclaimed by the Town Chairman in connection therewith shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding \$200.00 or by imprisonment in the County Jail not exceeding ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Each day that a violation or failure to comply continues to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

(11) This ordinance and each rule, regulation or order issued thereunder shall automatically expire upon the termination of a State of War.

(12) This ordinance shall be severable and if any provision of this ordinance be declared to be invalid all other provisions thereof shall remain valid and enforceable.

This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and publication.

Dept. A letter from Mr. Jack Dvorak, owner and operator of Jack's Garage, was read. (See letter file, Fire Protection)

The minutes of the meeting of November 7, 1940, in regard to the housing and maintaining of the Town Fire Truck were read. The meeting was then opened for discussion of the problem of housing and operating the fire truck under the new war time closing regulations for Filling Stations and Garages.

Mr. Dvorak gave as his reason for closing his garage from 6 P.M. to 6 A. M. and all day Sunday, the problem of getting competent help.

Mr. Ed. Brendler, Fire Chief of the Volunteer Fire Department, stated that he would like to have the truck remain at the present location, as the men had been able to get the truck out very quickly for fire calls. He also stated that if the truck did not have a driver ready to go at all times, the Town people might loose the 5% reduction in rates. Mr. Brendler said that he had one man in the department who worked days, who would be willing to stay at the station five nights a week, Monday to Friday, for \$50 per month.

Mr. Brendler pointed out that as a matter of public safety, there should be a driver at the fire station at all times. He stated that the department has a very high rating in the State as a Volunteer Department. The department had been given recognition by the Industrial Commission and the State Fire Marshall. He also said that the truck had on several occasions beaten the City of Madison Departments to fires, even though the city had a shorter distance to travel. Mr. Brendler then started to make a proposal to put before the meeting.

Mr. Mullen asked that all suggestions be heard before any proposals were made.

Mr. Briggs asked what amount Mr. Dvorak would charge for the housing of the truck on the new schedule.

Mr. Dvorak said the charge would be \$75.00 per month.

Mr. Briggs then asked if there were sleeping quarters at the Garage. Mr. Dvorak said that they would have to put up a cot.

Mr. E. C. Voit asked if any one knew how other fire trucks in volunteer departments were operated.

Mr. Brendler Mullen stated that most places have a different set up, as most Volunteer departments were in Villages.

Mr. Voit said that he believed that the Village of Shorewood Hills had students to operate their truck.

Mr. Brendler said that this department had answered 99 calls in 2½ years.

Mr. C. Burgette said that he did not believe it would be a good policy to have a different man drive the truck each time as the equipment would deteriorate fast. He said that that has been the situation at Poynette, where the first man to the station, drives the truck and the equipment is in very bad condition as the result.

Mr. Mullen asked Mr. Brendler who the fireman was who had offered to drive nights for the sum of \$50 per month.

Mr. Brendler said the man was Howard Tholo. Mr. Mullen asked if Mr. Tholo would sign a contract and Mr. Tholo said that he would. Mr. Dvorak also stated that he would sign a contract.

Mrs. Briggs asked who would build the partition and Mr. Mullen stated that it was already built.

Mr. Mullen said that a citizen of the town had questioned the legality in regard to the extending of a contract beyond the time either stated in the contract or stated orally in case of an oral contract. That is, if the contract was for one year, and neither party terminated the contract at the end of the year, that it automatically renews for another year.

Mr. Brandt said that that was true of leases but not generally true of contracts.

Mrs. Briggs asked if any of the ~~men~~ men could answer the fire calls and know the location of the fire by the fire number system. Mr. Brendler said that they could.

Mr. Dvorak stated the services to be had for the \$75.

Mrs. Briggs asked what the record of repairs had been on the truck and Mr. Dvorak said that it had been very small. The truck being in perfect shape.

The matter of fire rates was discussed.

Mr. Brendler stated that as Fire Chief he would be responsible for the relief men on Saturday nights and Sundays. He stated that the Firemen would take turns for a small fee on the week ends.

Mr. Carpenter said he believed a solution could be found for the trouble. He agreed to go and look over the situation.

Later in the evening the Town Attorney came in and Mr. Mullen asked him what the towns responsibility was in the matter. He agreed to give an opinion at a later date.

The Health board, represented by E. J. Schmidt and M. Hungness *Health* were present in regard to a proposed ordinance to be presented by *Ord.* the Health Board. Ordinance to be presented at next meeting.

Mr. Kelliher gave a short explanation of the preliminary audit report. He also answered all questions in regard to same.

Mr. Christ Weissinger made a motion that the audit be discontinued. Mr. Mullen suggested that the motion be withdrawn as the meeting would be recessed until a later date when a complete audit report would be submitted. He also asked at what date Mr. Weissinger wished the audit discontinued. Mr. Weissinger said that it should be stopped for the year 1938. His motion was then seconded by Mr. H.A. Weissinger.

Mr. Mullen then asked Mr. Carpenter, Supervisor, to take the chair as chairman, that he might speak as a citizen of the town and voter.

Mr. Mullen spoke as follows: stating that he had tried to get an audit four years ago and had insisted upon an audit at the time of his election as Chairman. He said that he was now speaking as a taxpayer in favor of the audit. He said he did not feel that it was good business to stop the audit when it is the taxpayers money that has been embezzled. He stated that he was certainly not trying to hurt anyone, but that the town has certain moneys that it has coming and that he would do everything in his power to see that it is recovered. He asked that no decisions in regard to the audit be made at the present, but that the people wait until the report on the audit of the past 3½ years be submitted and then decide what to do in regard to further auditing.

ORDINANCE

ord WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary for the protection of the public health that the preparing, handling, serving, selling, and dispensing of food and drink should be regulated,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as follows:

1. HOTELS, RESTAURANTS, TAVERNS AND ROADSIDE STANDS TO HAVE PERMITS.

Any person, firm or corporation, conducting a hotel, restaurant, tavern, or roadside stand and persons handling or selling prepared foods, shall procure an annual permit from the town clerk of the Town of Blooming Grove, except that one permit shall be sufficient for a combined hotel and restaurant or tavern and restaurant, where both are conducted in the same building and under the same management. The permit shall expire on June 30th of each year and shall not be transferable. No hotel, restaurant, tavern, or roadside stand shall be conducted, advertised or held out to the Public as such without permit.

2. CERTIFICATE OF GOOD HEALTH REQUIRED.

No person shall handle drinks or prepare, dispense, serve or sell food, including kitchen help, in any hotel, restaurant, tavern, or roadside stand unless such person has previously filed with the board of health of the Town of Blooming Grove a certificate obtained from a licensed physician that said person is not afflicted with a venereal or communicable disease. Such certificate to be of the standard form as furnished by the health department for such examination. Said certificate shall be renewed annually on or before June 30th. It shall be un-

lawfull for any person who has a communicable disease or any venereal disease in a communicable form to handle, prepare, dispense, serve or sell any food; and it shall be unlawful for any licensee hereunder to employ for the purpose of handling, preparing, dispensing, serving or selling food, including kitchen help, any person who has a communicable disease or any disease in a communicable form.

3. FEE.

The annual fee for hotel, restaurant, tavern and roadside stand operators permits shall be \$3.00 and the annual fee for the permit for persons handling drinks and foods shall be \$1.00. The fee shall accompany the application and health certificate.

4. INSPECTION.

The health officer and authorized inspectors of the board of health of the Town of Blooming Grove are authorized and empowered to administer and enforce the provisions of this ordinance and to make periodical inspection of all hotels, restaurants, taverns and roadside stands.

5. APPEAL

Any person aggrieved by any action of the health officer and authorized inspectors of the town board of health in enforcing this ordinance may appeal to the town board of health for a hearing.

6. PENALTY

Anyone violating the provisions of this ordinance, or any rule, regulation or order of the town board of health relating to the sanitation of restaurants shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00 and anyone failing to comply with an order of the Town Board of Health hereunder shall forfeit \$5.00 for each day of non-compliance after the order is served upon or directed to him.

Board met at Town Hall to hear property owners in the vicinity of the Mc Cormick Fuel Company in Sunny Knoll who were protesting against the dust from the coal piles.

Mr. Mullen and Mr. Fisher present.

Mr. Mullen read a letter from Mr. L. F. Warrick, State Sanitary engineer, in regard to his investigation. See next page.

There was a general discussion among all those present.

Mr. Albert Brandt, town attorney, discussed nuisances, Private and Public, and suggested possible solutions.

Mr. Gregory McCormick came to the meeting. He stated that the condition that has arisen is called by the fact that he has been unable to get oil treated coal for the past two years. That he ~~has~~ has had to stock greater quantities of the soft coals (untreated) in order to have enough on hand to supply his customers.

He then stated that conditions had changed, that the coal companies were permitted to oil treat their coal, and produced papers to prove that he had ordered and was getting a large quantity of oil treated coal, that he was ordering while he could get same, that he only had a small quantity of untreated coal on hand, that he had planted lombardy poplars to act as a screen and done what he could to relieve conditions.

He also stated that none of the adjoining property owners had contacted him. And that he only wished to stock treated coal if he could get it.

Arguments were made against his extension of his yards from several of those present. Mr Single especially.

Mr. Mc Cormick stated that it was necessary for him to have more room. He had contracts for the east side schools and they required that he have on hand a sufficient reserve as one of the conditions of the contract.

Business was started by the Madison Builders Supply Co. (Quinn) and Mc Cormick took over in 1933.

It was argued that he could have silos, sheds or fences. Mc Cormick stated that silos were obsolete, and that shed would not give him room to stock the necessary coal. Also that if he could get treated coal conditions would be what they were before this coal dust became so abnoxious.

The chairman suggested that the property ^{owners} wait six weeks or two months to see what conditions would be after the untreated coal was disposed of.

Mr. Mc Cormick agreed to cooperate in every way possible.

The suggestion was accepted by those who came to protest.

Dear Mr. Warrick:

According to Mr. Bernauer's file memorandum dated January 26, "Mr. Evan Veith, 15 Powers Avenue, and Mr. Walter Sengl, 26 Powers Avenue, Town of Blooming Grove, called at the office on January 25 in regard to supposed nuisance conditions resulting from the operation of a coal yard by the McCormick Fuel Company in the vicinity of Milwaukee Street and Bryan Street in the Town of Blooming Grove.

"Their complaint was that the dust caused by the handling of coal interferes with the enjoyment of their rights. They stated that proper sheds and coverings are not installed at the coal yard to minimize the amount of dust flying over the neighborhood."

This matter was investigated on February 9, and both Mr. Sengl and Mr. Greg McCormick were contacted.

The McCormick coal yards extend about 700 feet along the railroad tracks and on a tract of land about 150 feet in depth. This area is zoned for industrial purposes. A number of large coal piles are maintained on this tract, and Mr. Sengl claims that coal dust blows into the windows of the three homes he owns within a few hundred feet of the coal piles, and that the dust generally soils the entire neighborhood. He stated that if we would find this condition to be a public nuisance, the town board would act to require that the fuel company abate such nuisance.

In contacting Mr. McCormick it was learned that within the past year the coal had caused some dusty conditions because the coal is no longer being oil treated because of the present war emergency. As soon as conditions permit, the fuel company is planning on discontinuing the use of the area near the Sengl homes for coal storage and will erect lumber sheds. It is therefore not the intention of the company to erect sheds over the existing coal piles. Mr. McCormick further stated that in his opinion the locomotives using the adjoining tracks cause the sooty conditions existing in the neighborhood.

Section 2. Drunkenness. Any person or persons who shall be found in a state of intoxication upon any street, alley, public ground or place in the town of Blooming Grove shall be deemed guilty of drunkenness, and shall be subject to a fine or imprisonment as hereinafter determined.

Section 3. Disturbance of Lawful Assembly. Any person or persons who shall wilfully, maliciously and wantonly interrupt or in any way molest or disturb any public or private school, Sunday School, or church or other place where religious worship is held, or shall create or encourage any noise, riot, or disturbance at, in or near the same, which shall have the effect to disturb or hinder the exercise of any such school, church, or place of worship, or who shall wilfully, maliciously and wantonly interrupt, molest or disturb any lawful assemblage of people, or who shall create any noise or disturbance at or in any place of public gathering or entertainment, shall be deemed guilty of disorderly conduct.

Section 4. Penalty. Any person or persons that shall violate any

of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar nor to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or upon non-payment of such fine by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed sixty days,

Section 5 Other Ordinances. This ordinance shall be deemed to have superseded any other ordinances heretofore adopted by the town board of the Town of Blooming Grove with respect to drunkenness and disorderly conduct.

Section 6 Effective Date. This ordinance shall be effective upon its passage and posting in accordance with law.

Board of Audit

March 21, 1944

9:00 A.M.

The three members of the town board met at the town hall for the purpose of auditing accounts of the clerk and treasurer for the fiscal year ended March 20, 1944. Henry Michalski, town clerk, and J. J. Keliber, department of taxation auditor, were present.

All receipts issued during the year were checked and found to be correctly entered in the clerk's receipt journal and the treasurer's cash book. The check stubs covering all orders issued during the year were checked and found to be correctly entered in the clerk's disbursement record and the treasurer's cash book. Checks which had cleared the town's bank account were cancelled to the treasurer's cash book and a list of the outstanding checks at the close of business on March 20, 1944 was recorded on page 428 of the treasurer's cash book. The clerk's and treasurer's records were found to be in agreement, both records showing a required cash balance of \$8092.87 at the close of business on March 20, 1944.

To meet the above required balance of \$8092.87 the town treasurer had \$7878.35 available. Accounts of the former treasurer were separately checked and it was found that John Hermemier entirely accounted for the required cash balance of \$4757.92 on January 6, 1944, the conclusion of Hermemier's term of office. The variation of \$214.52 on March 20, 1944 was found to result from a failure to account for receipts to that extent during the period January 7, 1944 to March 20, 1944.

March 24, 1944

The town board met at the town hall. The town treasurer exhibited a slip showing that on March 24, 1944 he had deposited \$214.52 in the town's bank account.

(Note) On March 27, 1944 the town treasurer exhibited to J. J. Keliber, state auditor, a check drawn by Arthur Guitzkow, dated 2/29/44, payable to the town treasury in the amount of \$211.70 for 1943 taxes. This check had been misplaced and was not included as cash in office on March 20, 1944. See receipt # 286, 3/27/44.

REGISTRATION AND REGULATION OF BICYCLES:

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as follows:

- (1) It shall be hereafter unlawful for any person to operate a bicycle upon any street within the Town of Blooming Grove unless said bicycle shall first have been properly registered and tagged as hereinafter provided.
- (2) Every owner or operator of any bicycle within the Town of Blooming Grove shall, within ten days of the effective date hereof, file with the Constable a complete description of such bicycle upon a blank form to be provided for the purpose which such filing of description shall constitute a registration of such bicycle for the purpose of this ordinance. Such registration shall be serially numbered and kept on file by the Constable in his office as a public record.
- (3) Immediately upon the registration of a bicycle in his office, the Constable shall affix to such bicycle an identification tag serially numbered to correspond with the registration of such bicycle. Such tag shall thereafter remain affixed to such bicycle unless removed by the Constable for cause or for replacement with another tag upon registration. A fee of 25¢ shall be charged for the registration or tagging of any bicycle under the provisions of this ordinance.
- (4) Bicycles registered under the provisions hereof shall be re-registered on July 1, 1943, and annually thereafter. The Constable shall affix a new identification tag upon each bicycle at such time of such re-registration thereof.
- (5) The Constable shall inspect each bicycle presented to him for registration and he shall have the authority to refuse to register any such bicycle found by him to be in unsafe mechanical condition.
- (6) The Constable shall have the authority to cancel the registration of and remove the identification tag from any bicycle being operated upon any street in the Town of Blooming Grove in an unsafe manner or in violation of any state law or local ordinance; and such cancellation or registration and removal of tag shall be in addition to other penalties provided hereunder.
- (7) Within ten days after any bicycle registered hereunder shall have changed ownership, or be dismantled and taken out of operation, such information shall be reported to the constable by the person in whose name the bicycle has been registered.
- (8) Any person who shall operate any bicycle not properly registered or carrying a proper identification tag as required herein upon any street in the Town of Blooming Grove or who shall operate such bicycle in an unsafe manner, or in violation of any state law or ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be subject to the penalty provided in Section 14 thereof.
